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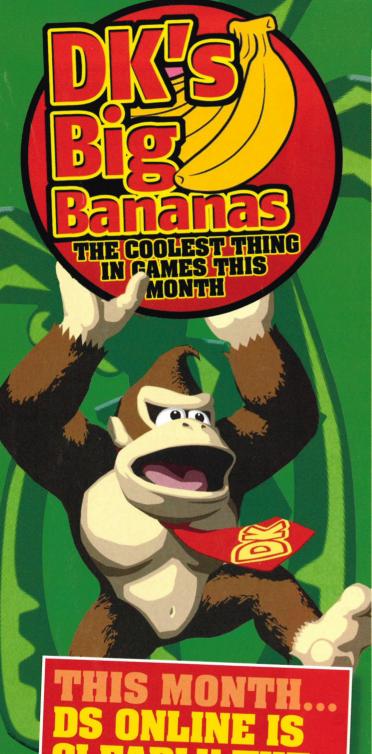


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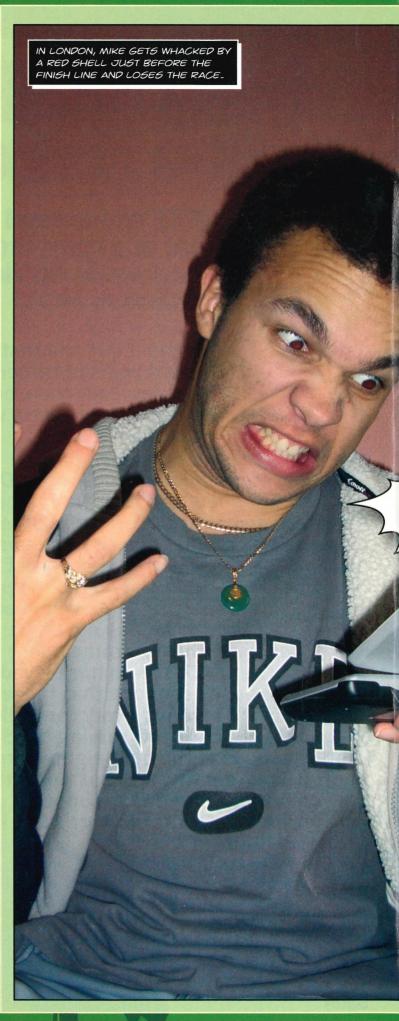

Was it because of the town's beach, town hall, shopping facilities or museum? We think that, depending on how you answer these questions, they alter your appearance. At first we said we were there for the beach and ended up with a sad-faced character. Next time round we said we liked the shopping and started as a character with rosy cheeks and a smile. Of course, it could also be totally random.

The taxi ride comes to an end and you arrive in your new town. But wait... Tom Nook's not waiting for you. What's going on? Kapp'n tells you to visit the brand new town hall (more on that later) to sort out your living arrangements. Inside the town hall is the office clerk Pelly.. but wait, it's the same pelican from the post office. Luckily, Tom Nook has briefed her all about your arrival and she tells you exactly where to find your new home. She even marks it

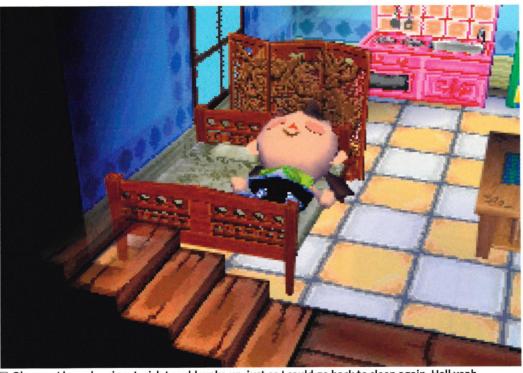

on the map for you. The map is pretty much the same as the GameCube version. Which is fine but we would have loved it to mark where the actual animals are in the town. That would be so incredibly useful.

Now it's time to get out and explore. One of the first things you'll notice is the control method for the game. You can either choose to run around using just the touch screen or the D-Pad. If you use the touch screen, it acts like an analogue stick. Put the stylus in the centre and you won't move but drag it further away and your

character will start to run. It works really well and makes the analogue control in Super Mario 64 DS seem like a bit

of a bad joke. Once you've adopted the far superior touch screen running about, you need to find your house. It looks pretty much the same

as your one in Animal Crossing but there's a secret waiting inside; an ATTIC. Right from the beginning. It

only contains your bed at first but if more residents want to move into your town, they all live upstairs in your house - we think. Instead of getting their own houses, they all have to share a room. It's like the Victorian slums all over again.

Unfortunately, we weren't able to decorate the upstairs bit but you can get different beds. You use the bed to sleep and save your game. Or you can just press START at anytime to save. That's a God-send. It saves time and makes sure you're always

more willing to save. Whereas before you might not have bothered, because you had to trawl all the way back to your house each time.

Also, Resetti the Mole is back and he's just as angry. He doesn't tolerate any kind of excuses and will bust your ass if you switch off without saving. Your character will even tell you if the battery is running low, to ensure you don't run out of power and lose your save.

So, your house is looking pretty cool. You're already thinking about the items to put inside. But then Nook turns up and says you now owe him a whopping 19,800 Bells.

))) Have you got the Bells to pay for it? Have you heck as like. So it's time to start working part-time for Nook again. To be honest, we were disappointed the DS version starts in exactly the same way as the 'Cube one. Animal Crossing is a game that started life on the N64,

the 'Cube version was almost identical to that and now the DS one is the same. Something crazy should have happened in this new game. You even have to plant flowers around Nook's shop. This isn't much of a reward to those people who've already slogged through the introduction before.



But all is not lost. When you really start to look round the town, you'll notice some clear differences from either of the

previous games. For starters, the horizon now curves into the distance as you walk; it's like your town is on the back of a huge sphere. It's a cool effect, particularly when you see other characters walking about just on the edge of the

horizon. It does mean the whole town is very flat though. There are no hills, like the 'Cube one. But there is still a beach, trees and a river that runs through the town though. There's also a

actually has an office this time. The town hall has two main functions; a civic centre and a post office. The post office is pretty much the same as before and you'll use it to post letters, obviously, and pay off your mortgage to Nook. The only new feature is a savings account you can withdraw and deposit money

into. We never used that, we preferred to spend all our money on pinball machines.

The civic centre is something entirely different though and will become an important part of your daily routine. Particularly if you want to make sure everyone in the town is happy. The civic centre has replaced the wishing well. So instead of getting subtle hints from the well about how to improve your town, Pelly the clerk will actually tell you how residents feel. It's a lot better and makes the job of sorting your town out éasier.

However, caring for the town can be a real nuisance. Now,

not only do you have to clear trees out the way, you also have to plant flowers and water them. To be honest, we thought having to water the flowers as well as plant them was a bit much really. We're scared that making a really great town could be more like playing Harvest Moon, rather than Animal Crossing.

You can also make donations to charitable causes at the centre. When we played, we were told the terrible plight of a town called Boondoxia. Unfortunately, the Boondoxians could only eat cheese on toast but because they were so poor, they couldn't afford cheese and had to eat mud instead - seriously. Clearly we were moved by this story and donated 1,000 Bells to the cause... but nothing happened. Later on, another resident told us not to donate because the Boondoxian fund was supposedly being raised to help Tortimer buy a plasma screen TV. We're not sure what will happen with the Boondoxians but we can't wait to be visited

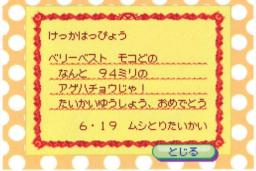

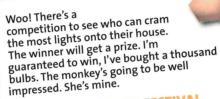

difference in Nook's shop, it sells pretty much the same things as before, like carpets, furniture and tools. He also has a catalogue to order items

> and can still tell you all about the price of turnips.

But in the corner of the shop sits something new; the Point Tracking Machine. That's right, inspired by the Tesco Clubcard, Nook has set up his own customer reward

scheme. You get points each time you buy something from the shop and eventually you become a fully-fledged member of the club. It's a nice little feature to drive you to shop at Nook's store instead of just getting items from the animals themselves.

Something else we spotted when first shopping at Nook's Cranny was some medicine. Eh? We bought some and kept it with us, not really knowing why we'd bought it in the first place. But then there was a revelation... Blaire the chipmunk/squirrel became ill and asked for MEDICINE!

))) We gave her some and she was over the moon. But unfortunately we'd made a rod for our own back. After that. we had to give her medicine for three days before she was better. And at 400 Bells a pop, it's not a cheap cure. But this added another level to

the friendship factor. If she'd died, we would have been saddened at a needless lost of life... oh, and we wouldn't have received any reward. So the course of action was obvious.

One thing that we didn't spot in Nook's shop were the NES games we got so used to in the original. We're not sure if they'll even be making an appearance at all in Wild World. That would certainly be an absolute crying shame.

The Able Sisters have also expanded into new wares. Now the hedgehogs sell accessories

as well as T-shirt design. There are all sorts to customise your character with, like different hats, glasses and even wigs. It's a very nice feature to make sure that when you do go online, your character is totally unique in the other towns.

We've also seen some awesome items that are available in the Japanese version. One young chap was wearing a Mario hat and even has a moustache to match. It makes the items in Nintendogs look like a load of rubbish. Plus the best thing is, you can

But the best visitor, who also happens to be a new one, was Lyle the gopher. Believe it or not, Lyle is actually an insurance salesman. First of all, he quizzes you about your future, before laying a load of life insurance off on you. You actually can't say no and will only get out of a sale if you don't have enough money. It costs a massive 3,000 Bells but it may not actually be such a rip off. You see, if you ever get stung by bees or fall into one of the many pitfalls, you'll receive 100 Bells as compensation. We purposely went around smacking trees to get the cash. Who cares about the pain when there's money to sweeten the blow?

Although we're not worried about getting stung by bees anymore, we're a bit concerned about the events in Wild World. To put it bluntly, there just don't seem to be enough. We quickly skimmed through most of the year and were actually disappointed by the number of events. Of course, there's always the possibility that we were just missing them but when we checked the notice board

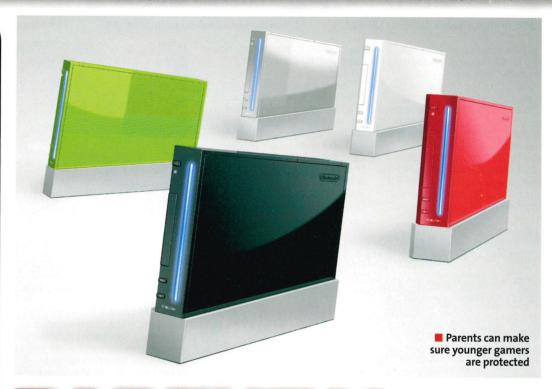

PARENTAL CONTROL FOR REVOLUTION

Nintendo unveils enhanced security for young gamers.



Parents will be given tighter control over the types of games their younglings play on Nintendo's next-generation console.

The Revolution will utilise a parental control system that will allow your old folks to stop the console playing games over a certain age rating. Using a password setting, set by an adult, the Revolution will be able to prevent younger users from playing games with adult scenes or scenarios, while allowing older gamers access.

The age rating a game receives will be stored

The age rating a game receives will be stored within every game disk. If a game has a higher rating than has been permitted on your Revolution, you will need to enter a pre-set password to play. This is not so much of a problem for young Nintendo fans — most of Nintendo's best games are made for players of all ages anyway.

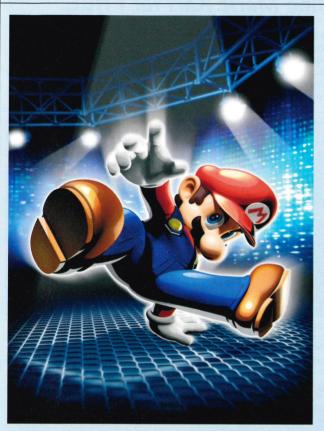
In other news, it has been revealed that Masahiro Sakurai is on-board for the development of the next *Smash Bros*. game coming to Revolution. Why do you care about this? Because he's the dude responsible for the *Smash Bros*. series when he worked at HAL Laboratories.

Since Sakurai-san left HAL Labs in 2003, he's flexed his game-making muscles at Q Entertainment on *Meteos*, the genius puzzler on DS. Now having left Q, he's turned his attention to Revolution and will be heading the development team for the next Nintendo all-star brawler. No details about the game itself have been released yet, but we can't wait to see how it will utilise the amazing new Revolution controller. 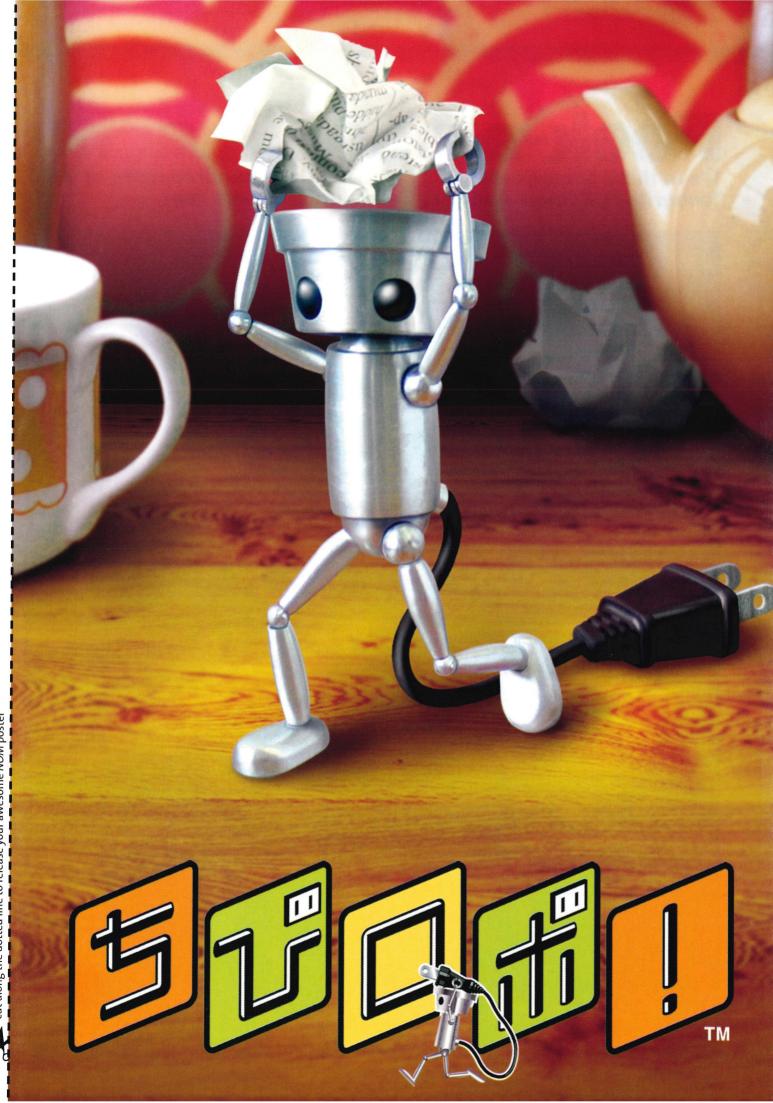
Resi 4 wins big at 'gaming Oscars'

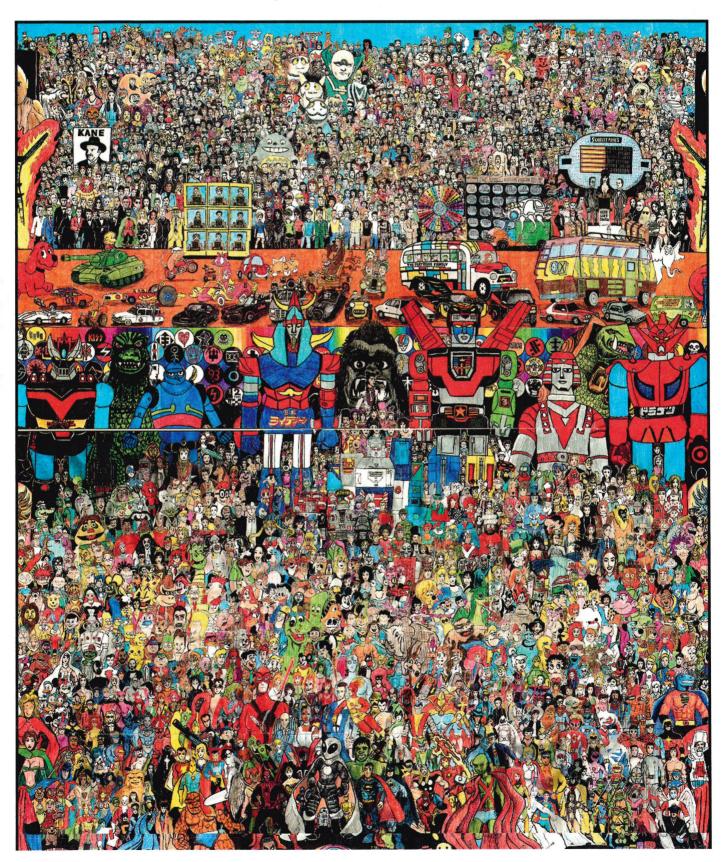

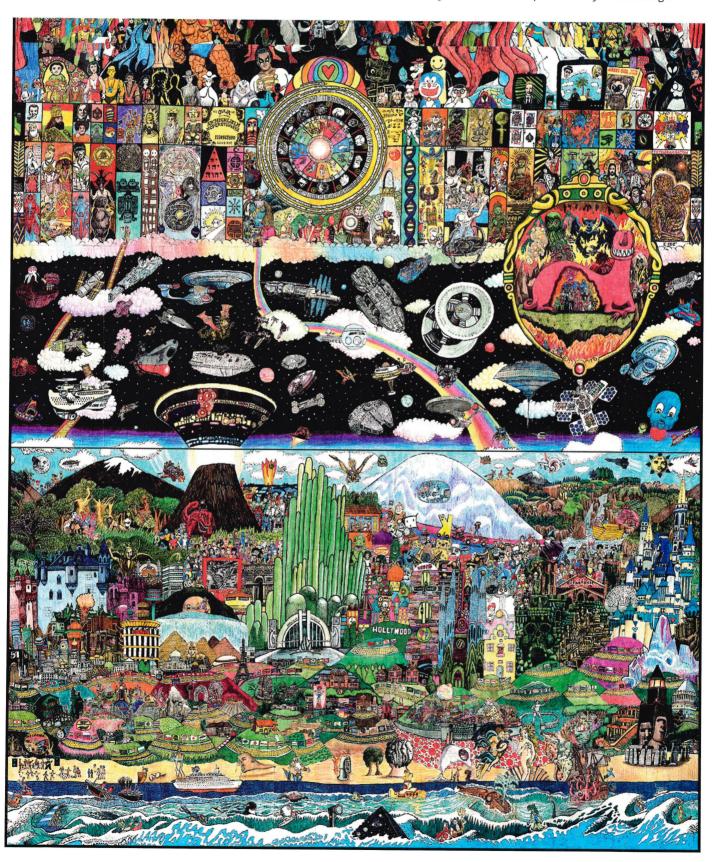

Revolution revs up

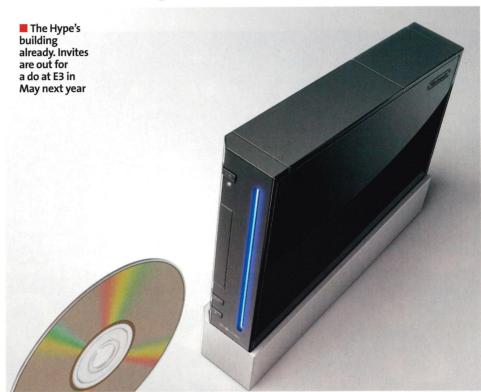
Let the E3 excitement commence right NOW.

This means you can play by holding the GBA in just one hand while your other hand can be used to hold a suitcase, some noodles, an umbrella or a tiny Sodoku playing gibbon. Japanese adverts boast about this factor and show tens of people in crowded tube trains playing the game. It makes us want to live in Japan, where they APPRECIATE this game. There may be the chance for you to show your respect next year, because there are rumours this version will be hitting the UK. Do the honourable thing and buy ten copies - at least.

When this hits Earth some time next year, it's going to blow you away. It'll leave you gasping for breath like you've just been dropped out an air lock and into deep space. This isn't a handheld game. The presentation value is higher than the budget of most NASA missions. Seriously, there are times when you'll have difficulty distinguishing between this and the 'Cube Primes.

As we've already described, things kick off in the Alimbic Cluster and Samus has to investigate. At first she arrives on a seemingly abandoned spaceship in the middle of nowhere. Everything about this ship stinks of mystery. The music when you first arrive is eerie and with a decent pair of headphones, you'll actually find yourself becoming more and more tense. It makes the hairs on your neck stand up as you exploré.

But we pulled ourself together and went through the first door. Once you get through, you end up in a long corridor. It all seems very claustrophobic as you navigate your way along the silent halls. Through a few more doors and you end up in a large room full of computer equipment. You'll gape in awe when you first walk into this room and get a glimpse of just how awesome this game is going to be.

The room has two large computers in the centre. Their orange blinking screens rise up to the ceiling and look like something

other publishers, that's especially the case. This is the DS at its best, there's simply no excuse for porting a GBA game with the odd touch screen feature for the hell of it.

After a while we made it to our first enemy encounter. Firing your beam is exactly the same as the Metroid DS demo that came bundled with the DS. You use the touch screen to aim and to fire. There's no lock-on but it's actually really easy to keep track of the enemies using the touch screen,

There was also another slight niggle we had with the controls. After beating the robot enemies, we came to a section where we needed to jump our way up a series of green platforms. The room looked great but the jumping wasn't. To jump, you need to double tap the touch screen. Jumping about during general movement isn't a problem but trying to make precise jumps that require timing can be a chore.

There are times when the screen simply doesn't register a double tap, so you fall back down to the start.

But our concerns evaporated when we had our first encounter with one of the six other bounty hunters. Kanden, the slug-like creature, burst into view and we pursued him. The ensuing fight was chaotic, sometimes he'd turn into a slug and start laying huge Power Bombs, before transforming back into his normal form and blasting us with a cannon that interfered with our visor. This fight was incredible and we're salivating with the possibility of yet more to come. Without a doubt, Hunters is going to be one of the best DS games yet.

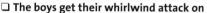

point. It would be hilarious if Bowser's dad was actually a really good king and was annoyed that his son was such a bad lad. Once again, that's glorious speculation. But it would be great.

While the young Mario Brothers are fighting Bowser, all Hell breaks loose as the aliens start to arrive. They land in hundreds of UFOs and start blasting everything in sight. It's a cool and funny introduction so far but then things get better. Next we flash forward to the current Mushroom Kingdom, the one you're all familiar with. Prof. Gadd is unveiling a time machine which Peach decides to test out. Unfortunately, on its return, the machine is damaged and out pops one of the aliens. It's fight time...

Those familiar with the Mario and Luigi style of fighting will be

delighted to see the system has not been changed for DS. You still need to press ① or ②, depending on which character you want to control, to either attack or dodge incoming. You still need to time your presses just before you hit an enemy, to deal some real damage. It might have been cool to perhaps use the touch screen in some way for battles but we reckon that might come later in the game, as you unlock more special items.

After battling the alien, Luigi falls into the time machine like a bloody idiot and that's when things really start to happen. On arrival in the past, you meet Stuffwell the Suitcase. Unfortunately this is a rather irritating speaking version of the suitcase from Superstar Saga. He trains you in the art of fighting and using his innards to store

things. We didn't like Stuffwell. He's a berk. We wanted to stuff him with Bob-Ombs and leave them to go off.

Once you've finished listening to him yammering on, it's time to explore. Although the graphics aren't a great improvement on the GBA, it doesn't mean they don't look any less sweet. The first area is a Mushroom zone that's full of giant fungi. It's a beautiful thing to look at. It's certainly a lot brighter and more colourful than Superstar Saga and we hope Alpha Dream have made sure all the environments are as interesting as this first one.

Normally the top screen is used to show a map of the area you're exploring. We're not really sure just how useful this will actually be. From playing *Superstar Saga*, it was normally self-explanatory

where you had to go. Perhaps the map will help to show secret items or areas that you wouldn't normally see? We're just not sure but at the moment, we really aren't all that impressed by the top screen.

The only saving grace could be the puzzles that use both screens. Once you get to control both young Mario Brothers and older Mario Brothers, there will be times when you take control of one set of brothers and use a single screen. Sometimes actions you perform in one area will affect something on the other screen. This could be a cool recipe for some awesome puzzles later on in the game.

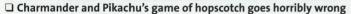

The first challenge saw us doing some simple maths. Use the different amounts of animals on the bottom screen to equal those on the top screen. A few seconds later we were identifying which object was the heaviest on a set of scales. Then we were counting the number of cubes within a shape. Next it was time to identify the silhouettes of items. Finally we needed to memorise shapes and say which ones went missing. It's all played at a frantic pace and the desperation to prove you're dead clever often results in a lot of panicking as your brain struggles to keep up.

Although these were the only five puzzles in the preview version we played. we're sure there'll be more in the finished one. It may sound all a bit too academic but it was actually strangely compelling. Plus, if you've got a few mates round, it's bound to turn into a competition to see who's the cleverest. 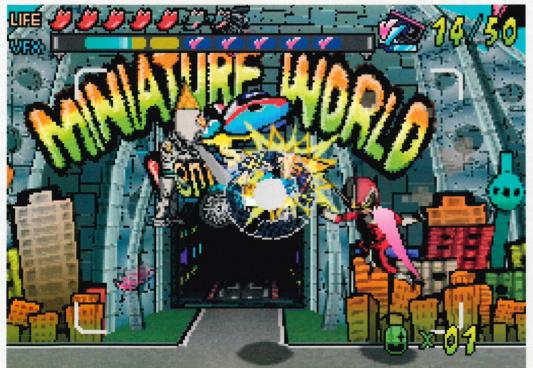

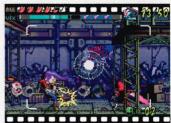

Last time we checked, parties were s'posed to be fun.

These guys know how to throw a big bash and with the cold hands of winter creeping across the land, a cruise ship is the host of this year's festivities. All thanks to Princess Peach; royal connections get you anything, apart from a new dress. We've never been known to turn down an invite to the Mushroom Kingdom for a shindig. At least, not up to now.

All the features that have already made this series successful are here once again, plus a few extras. As we've come to expect, there are six brand-spanking new boards to take on, including Pagoda Peak and Neon Heights. Just like MP6, each board has

its own tasks and hazards; some are based on collecting Stars, others need you to go out and pick up coins.

Mario Party isn't about big wallets though, it's all about the mini-games and there are a whopping 86 new ones to get your teeth into. Included are 11 challenges, which require you to use the GameCube mic. These should be avoided at all cost. Once you've opened the mini-games by playing the boards, you can revisit them in the Mini-game mode. It's the usual mix of racing against the clock or other players to test your gaming instincts.

No party would be complete without your mates and this time around, you can have seven of them join the action. This'll mean sharing pads, but if you want to play well with others, you're just going to have to give a little. The degree of chance involved in playing the game continues to amuse and infuriate in equal measure. It really all depends on whether it's you or your mate who's getting pounded by the Hammer Bros.

You may end up taking a hammer to your GameCube and smashing it to bits. For all the fancy new bits and pieces, Mario Party 7 just can't disguise the fact that this is essentially the same game as before. Each sequel has added more games and new boards, but it's still the same old system. There's absolutely no point in playing Mario Party on your own, with all that tedious dice rolling and collecting to do. As diverse as the different games are, they get old very quickly. What sense does it make to put Sonic on a HOVER BOARD to race? He can already hammer along like Concorde on foot. He doesn't need any stupid hover board. Especially not when it corners like a shopping trolley on an ice rink. We've only seen a two-level preview version. We really hope the non-reactive steering is improved for the final version.

We already know that there will be many different types of boards in the final game, each with its own unique performance. Maybe other boards will have better turning performance than the standard board we played on in this early version.

The boards are powered by air. There's air all around but the boards can't breathe. They only recharge their Air Bar when you do stunts. If you run out of air, your board becomes inactive and Sonic has to run. And this SLOWS him down. Stop laughing, we're not joking. You have to jog over to a pit stop to get more air before you can go fast again.

But there are plenty of opportunities to stunt. Thermal air streams run through each course. Apart from making you go even faster, these streams are shaped like half-pipes, so you can flick off them from side to side, performing stunts as you pelt along. They help you get round bends too, which is good, even if it does

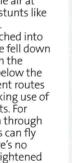

sort of feel like the game is playing itself. But without those streams, we found it tough to corner properly, even when using the Mario Kart-style drift. It was disappointing because the courses look great. Long wide straights are full of grind

rails and air streams, and you will often find yourself flying through the air at some silly height, doing mad stunts like Tony Hawk with a death wish.

At one point, we were launched into the sky above a vast forest. We fell down through the canopy to land on the racetrack which was hidden below the trees. You can also take different routes through these courses by making use of your character's specific talents. For example, Knuckles can smash through scenery to new areas and Tails can fly through hovering hoops. There's no doubt that if the handling is tightened up, this will be a very cool racer. If it's not, we'll avoid it like a lingering fart.

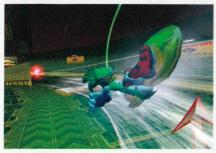

Super Mario Ball may have been utter garbage but Fuse Games isn't a quitter. It's been a while since we saw a truly brilliant pinball game, but Metroid Prime Pinball could well be it.

Samus spends so much of her time as a Morph Ball, it all makes sense in a rather strange way. All the classic features that you would expect from a pinball game are here.

You've got rails, flippers, bumpers, buffers and Space Pirates. Hold on just one moment... Space Pirates?

Samus can't even be smacked around a giant pinball table in peace without Metroids and Space Pirates turning up for a ruck. But that's good, because blasting their asses is what makes this game cool. Numerous nasties from your favourite bounty hunter's previous adventures

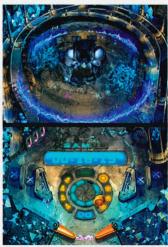

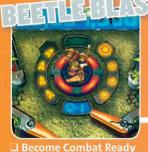

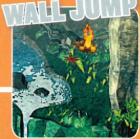

on a special multiplayer-only table. The first to reach the target score wins. It's a simple concept but it can all get pretty frantic.

The DS was born to play pinball. The dual-screens mean there's no scrolling, which makes it much easier to target bonuses. The physics are flawless and really smooth, even when there are six balls fizzing around the table. We thought the 'dead zone' between the screens, where you can't see the ball, might make things confusing but it doesn't cause any problems at all.

No pinball game would be complete without the ability to tilt the table and for this, the touch screen comes into

play. You dirty cheaters will be glad to know that it doesn't freeze your controls if you tilt the table loads. So

you can just prod the screen with your finger, mad-style, as much as you like.

We're not entirely sure about the Nintendo DS Rumble Pak. It's certainly a great idea - a Rumble Pak the size of a GBA cart that slots into the GBA port in your DS. But its kicks are puny, like a little fish flopping around inside your DS. And it's noisy, too, aking it more annoying than

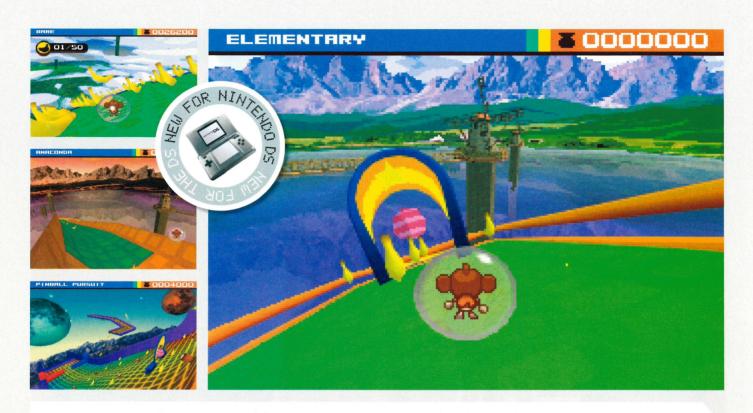

The big issue here is control. Monkey Ball is perhaps the greatest test of raw skill on GameCube. For that to remain the case on DS, it needed to have PRECISE control, even without the analogue stick. Don't even worry, guys. Sega has used the touch screen to make it happen.

Super Mario 64 showed everyone how NOT to use the touch screen for analogue control. It drew a circle on the screen which indicated the range of analogue movement. Only, this circle moved about so it was almost impossible to judge accurately. Touch & Roll doesn't make the same mistake. It uses the entire screen like a giant, but very precise, analogue control plane.

It works exactly like an analogue stick. The centre of the screen is neutral, obviously. As you move your stylus away from the centre, the game

will apply tilt in that direction. The closer to the edge of the screen you touch, the more tilt that is applied. The key thing is, the neutral point is ALWAYS the centre of the screen, NOT where you first place the stylus. So if you just plonk the stylus straight on to the top of the screen, the ball will instantly charge forward.

This is great because it allows your mind to adapt to a set plane of movement. It feels strange at first. Your Monkey Ball mastery will want to unleash itself instantly but you will feel a little twitchy.

However, we had this stylus business locked down within 20 minutes. Give it an hour and if you haven't got back your tilt-master control, you're rubbish at games. Return to your turn-based strategy, where your feeble fingers can live an easy life controlling characters with thrilling menu options.

Of course, you could always use the D-Pad to control the ball - if you're an idiot. Eight-way control is a joke with a game like Monkey Ball. It's okay on

platforms and intricate moving mechanisms on the stages will aim to send your monkey-in-asphere plummeting to the void below. And Sega says there will be more than 100 to crack, so you'll be balling for some time.

One element carried over from the 'Cube version is side-on battles. Nobody in their right mind wants to just press (A) and watch some magic spells happen. No, it's all about running along, swinging your huge sword and killing terrible, terrifying, nasty, evil... bees. There's actually quite a lot of strategy involved with fights and you can choose how your comrades will attack during battles. You can select the formation and whether they'll use their special attacks or not.

We only played through a few fights and it seems like the AI of the computer-controlled characters is a bit hit and miss. Sometimes they'd just get themselves killed for no reason, whereas other times the enemies we were fighting would commit hari-kari. This is something we hope will be sorted out for the final version. Another problem with the battles is that they're random. One of the positive points of Tales of Symphonia was the removal of irritating random fights. Having to slog through them here is just a chore. We're better than that now, we've evolved. Randomness is for RPG chimps

But apart from a few issues with the battles, we reckon *Phantasia* could be another essential GBA RPG, along with

the likes of Golden Sun and Final Fantasy. Now. if only Namco would change Cress's name to something sensible, like Peter, then it would be perfect.. Rob Burman

If you've ever wandered into one of those old-fashioned places they call an 'arcade', you might have seen some

golf game called Golden Tee. Famous for its trackball, used to ping the ball down the fairway, you could do all manner of hooks and slices. But it looked like a dog. Now take the crap graphics, change the trackball for a stylus, throw it on a cart and you're not far off Touch Golf.

After half an hour's play, it's obvious there isn't much depth to this. Its only gimmick is the game's stylus control. It's how you'd expect a touch screen golf game to play, yet overall it's only slightly better than Tiger Woods DS.

It works like this. To play a shot, the action switches to a top-down view of the club and ball. Using the stylus, you drag the club back to the desired strength and smack it towards the ball.

What makes it different to Tiger is the control you have over slice and hook. Finish your move on either side of the ball and there's nothing to stop it hacking off into the trees or landing deep in the sand of a bunker. Crack it bang in the centre though and the ball will launch off the tee and straight down the fairway. It's a fine line between a birdie and a double bogey but that's what keeps you focused.

So while the control is good, it's the power that will cause the headaches. A yellow line marks the distance to the hole, but if you want to bring it up short and let the roll take you nearer the pin, you'll have to guess. That's 'cos there are only three other lines that mark the distance from zero yards to the maximum distance. Sometimes it's as much as 50 vards between each marker, so if it's pinpoint accuracy you want, you won't get it here.

Elsewhere, the game is your staple diet

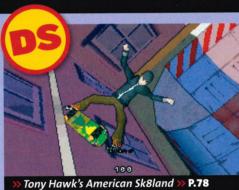

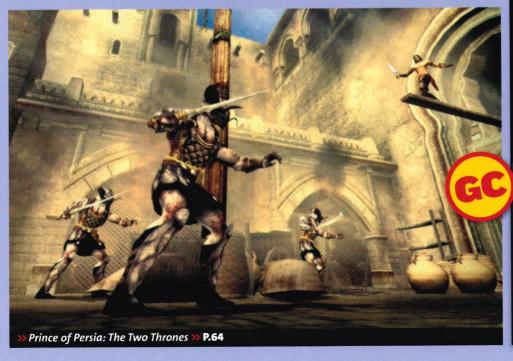

Shadow's lost his memory. We'd like to lose the memory of the hours we spent playing his latest game. But we can't. We tried electrocuting ourselves, slamming our head in a fridge, drinking ten cans of Tesco Dutch Export, getting shipwrecked and even considered a DIY lobotomy. But there was still a shadow across our brain. Absolutely nothing could clear it.

Before now, only one Sonic

character has managed to con his way into making Sega let him star in a game. That young chap was Miles 'Tails' Prower and the resulting game messes were Tails' Adventures and Tails' Sky Patrol. They're games only spoken about in hushed voices at the annual Tails Fan Club expos, held in a shed somewhere in Dorset. But Sega, never a developer adverse to a challenge, has decided it's time for another character to take his time in the limelight.

Shadow the Hedgehog, come

on down. Things don't get off to a good start though. Earth's being invaded by black aliens who are fed up with everyone thinking creatures from outer space must be green. So they start wrecking everything. At first, Shadow's not going to get involved, he's too busy being moody. But

then the leader of the aliens appears and says he knows about Shadow's past. Actually, we knew about Shadow's past after playing Sonic Adventure 2. He should have just asked us, instead of going off on some half-baked mission to half-inch the Chaos Emeralds.

In Sonic Adventure, Shadow was basically Sonic but black. Don't get all snooty with us,

Sonic purists. That's the truth and you know it. In *Shadow* the Hedgehog, he's basically

the same as Sonic again depending upon how you play, that is. If you've been following the progress of this game, then you'll know that Sonic Team has broken the unwritten rule of Sonic games by giving Shadow guns to play around with.

Oh dear. There's a reason guns haven't been included in Sonic games before and that's because, on the whole, guns + Sonic = rubbish

But let's talk about them anyway. Who knows, it could be cathartic. Shadow can pick up guns by either killing enemies or finding them in ammo boxes haphazardly left around the levels. There are different types of guns, the alien ones, crazy

weapons from Dr. Robotnik and ones from the G.U.N. soldiers. Holding down B will start to fire your gun. Normally they home in on the nearest target, although this is prone to not actually working. The weapons are quite interesting. You normally start out with a weak pistol but can usually upgrade to automatics or even rocket launchers as you progress through the levels. It's funny to see a hedgehog with a grenade launcher, it really is. But that

doesn't necessarily mean it's going to be any good.

The problem with the guns is they spoil the traditional run, run, run and run some more style of Sonic gameplay. Something that has actually always been a problem in the 3D Sonic games. Normally, to make sure you hit your target, you have to stop and shoot. You can even jump up in the air and magically stay there while you spray a 360 degree arc of bullets around you. It doesn't

try playing it like a traditional 3D Sonic game and use the homing jump attack from Sonic Heroes and the Adventure titles. Some of you may remember that in Sonic Heroes, the homing attack would often hilariously throw you off the side of the level after you'd hit the enemy

Brilliantly, that unmissable feature is back in Shadow. In fact, the only times we died were normally a

result of the homing attack being set to the 'suicide' option instead of the 'kill enemies' option. Shadow would casually lob himself off the scenery, never to be seen again. Look Sega, we know he's supposed to be moody but

making him suicidal is just a bit much, don't you think?

When he wasn't trying to kill himself, Shadow was obviously trying to recover those valuable memories. At this point, the

game does actually get a bit interesting. You may have noticed

in the adverts for Shadow that it says: "He's a héro... but whose hero?" Well, this is where you step in. On each level there are normally three missions you can choose to finish:

Dark, Normal and Hero. Dark will see you siding with the aliens, Normal is just a case of getting to the end and in Hero, you must help Sonic stop the marauding invaders.

))) Whichever mission you choose to finish will determine the level you play next.

This isn't a bad idea but it has its problems. We started off with the best of intentions of becoming as evil as possible. But we just couldn't be bothered. After you've hammered it through the level, trying to kill all the G.U.N. soldiers, only to miss one somewhere near the beginning of the stage, you'll be severely tempted just to collect the giant shining ring and finish. In the next level it might be easier to finish the Hero path than getting to the end. Obviously there's huge replay value because you can actually complete the game in little more than two hours without seeing everything that's on offer. It just depends if you can be bothered.

Another problem with the Dark/Hero idea is that no matter which side you decide to join, nearly everyone is your enemy. This can be irritating when you're being good but you'll lose rings when you run into one of your allies.

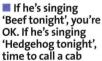

"We all make mistakes," says the game as soon as you turn it on. "Some are small, some are large." We assume it's referring to taking one of the most exciting games

So now the Prince can perform STEALTH KILLS! And do that splits kick thing to suspend himself above ground in a narrow alleyway. The stealth kill is renamed a speed kill, but it's not altogether a bad thing. It actually adds a dimension to the game, because you can then choose to massively cut down on all the crappy, drawn

out fighting that split opinion on the last two. If you're all about exploring and acrobatics, just apply that same rigour to dropping in silently behind a foe. Executing the kill means a few precisely-timed button presses for certain death.)))

))) You've got to be coldly calm to pull it off, and being even a split second off means your enemy is going to grab you and get the first dig in.

Wait, there's more. Little round portals in the wall that you can jab your knife into and hang from, and triangular boards on walls that send you flying off DIAGONALLY with a squeeze of the A button. The dagger holes are probably the most annoying new feature. The splits kick leads to some improbably grip-defying wall scaling, but the split second timing of the dagger jab is guaranteed to see you utter at least 100 swear words. The first game could be irritating when you fractionally mistimed a wall run to back-jump onto a thin ledge, but these new features ratchet up the number of times you fail drastically.

The Two Thrones really isn't a game for the impatient. It's very

rare that you can pan out the camera, plan all the points on your squirrel-like room exit, and execute it first time. You'll often have to pick your way though a twisty corridor, and you'll only get an idea of where you have to go next as you're in the middle of a precarious wall run. You'll fall and fail countless times, but luckily you can still rewind and slow down time. The frustration can be high, but not as high as the one you'll feel when you crack a hard bit. We accept the repeated play to solve these action puzzles, because we love the core action so much.

Then, the screen letterboxes. The Prince grabs his scabby arm and is consumed in a whirlwind of mysterious black whirly stuff. Oh no! He's become infected by the Sands of Time! He's now a devilboy Prince that needs to kill people to stay alive. You know that tranquillity you thought you might be able to maintain

with the speed kills? Gone.

The Dark Prince has spiky hair and is black all over. We don't just mean he wears the right trainers and listens to some rude tunes; it's like he got drunk and his mates coloured him in with marker pen. Dark Prince has a chain he can swing about as well as the Dagger of Time, and moves faster and hits harder than the pink prince. His life ticks away constantly, and you replenish it by killing people and, err, breaking boxes open.

The chain also makes Dark Prince a bit more mobile. He can chain swing along walls and across massive gaps like Spider-Man. Although you're forced to kill people, he does it a lot quicker, so it's less annoying. There are these zombie dog things that the pale Prince takes ages to kill while getting bitten to hell. Dark Prince wallops

them twice with the chain and their doggy dream is over.

At really basic levels, we're twits. So as soon as Dark Prince appeared, we wanted to believe this was the poison from Warrior Within striking again, to wreck a series that looked to be back on the right track. Turns out we don't mind beating people up when the odds are in our favour. If it's going to be quick and violent, yeah that's fun. We're bullies, it seems. Long drawn-out fights where we have to concentrate hard not to lose? We'd rather be swinging about. The way you unDark - by running through some water - is fairly lame though, it has to be said.

So the climbing bits are awesome, and those where you're forced to fight are also pretty awesome. You're no longer able to commit suicide as you're hurling people from ledges for a quick kill. There are still long button strings to learn to pull off your spinning death combos, but learning a few new moves keeps the fighting fresh.

Visually, it's a stunner. Graphics aren't always important, but when you're balancing on a beam a hundred feet above burning city streets, the detail adds to the vertigo. You feel like you're in a truly precarious position, and few games do that as well as this one. The Babylonian architecture is beautiful, even if their doors do often seem slightly too impractical.

Imagine if your doorbell went and your mate was outside. To open the door to meet him, you have to run up a slit in the wall, jam in a dagger, slide down with it wedged in, then flip into slow motion so you can roll under the door before it slams shut again. That's what's awesome about this game: getting from one area to another is rarely as

Because of the way it plays, *The Two Thrones* is like one big puzzle. But we wish there were a few more explicit, *Zelda*-style puzzles in the game. Throwing levers to make platforms move around, stuff like that. It seems that in making every area a monkey's playground, the designers burned out their brains for bigger puzzles.

We'd have liked boss encounters a bit more frequently, too. You're hours into the game before the first boss rears his ugly giant head, but it's a false dawn. It's not the first of many, unfortunately. But because *The Two Thrones* is so accomplished, so close to being legendary, you're just willing it

to go the extra mile. The only games that actually manage to contain all the elements you want are the *Zelda* series, so finishing a not-too-distant second to that is a serious achievement.

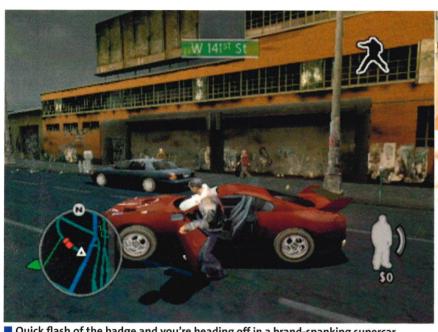

many basic functions based on a combination of two buttons, things are confusing at first. But you soon get used to it and become lethal

If you shoot innocent people or unarmed suspects, or mount the pavement and mow down dozens of pedestrians, your fellow cops will turn on you. You'll hear a radio alert of a rogue cop and suddenly, you'll have sirens on your ass. All that fuss over a few innocent people. Jeez.

But the MAJOR problem is that you'll have a job staying off the pavements with the truly horrendous steering in TCNYC. To start with, it seems like there's a half second delay between your control pad and the car. This alone makes it hard to control. To make it worse, you're faced with steering that doesn't allow for subtle adjustments, hardly moving as you tap the steering. Then, when you get a little anxious on the wheel, it over-reacts, swinging erratically in that direction.

The result is that you plough uncontrollably through a crowd of people, battering their broken bodies all over the street. And this happens often. It's a huge problem because, just like the original game, you will spend a lot of time behind the wheel, getting round the huge game map.

The virtual Los Angeles in Streets of LA was shockingly large. TCNYC is absolutely enormous. The game spans the full length and breadth of Manhattan Island. This is not a smaller 'game' version of Manhattan, like in Spider-Man 2. This is the actual island in polygons. Obviously, not all the shops and buildings are identical, but it mimics the main landmarks and structural layout of the entire island. And it's breathtakingly large.

Try to imagine rocketing along a straight road in a sports car for over 15 minutes; that's the kind of immense size we're talking about

here. And it'd take even longer in a slower car that you hijacked from some old granny on her way home from the bingo hall.

With such a large world, you would expect the size would come at the expense of detail, but you'd be wrong. The buildings look great. Instead of being simple square blocks with windows, doors and other effects drawn onto their flat surfaces, the details have actually been modelled in 3D. Most of the residential blocks and shops have interiors, too. You can walk right in whenever you like.

But it's the finer touches that take the streets of TCNYC to supreme levels of realism. Litter like newspapers, cups and whatever else those dirty New Yorkers chuck away blows about in the wind. Apart from the obvious street lamps, pavements are full of objects like bin bags, boxes, newsstands and the like. They're

not part of the fixed scenery either. You can plough through this stuff, scattering it all over the road. The physics and attention to detail are worthy of praise.

Forget the Need For Speed-style deserted streets. This virtual New York is brought to life with dozens of pedestrians, parked cars and dense traffic. There are random weather effects, too. That's not just a drop of rain now and then. but full-on thunderstorms that fill your TV with water droplets and lightning flashes which blind you for a split second.

As well as the visual additions, the missions have been improved, too. The main storyline is now far more linear than the previous game. Streets of LA was too openended, meaning you could have completely missed some of its coolest missions. Not only does TCNYC guarantee that you will see all of its missions, it also maintains

control over the way that the plot unfolds, so it's easier to follow.

Most of the main story missions involve shooting your way through gangster bases to eventually capture and question the gang leader. If you get the information you need from him, you'll get your next lead in your investigation. If you fail to get the info you needed, you're left without a clue.

What happens now? You have to see one of your informants. During your adventures you meet various shady figures who will act as sources of information. A dodgy taxi driver, a brothel manager or even your imprisoned father. You perform a task for them and they'll give you the info you need for your next lead. This is a great way of portraying the illusion that you are conducting an investigation and not playing through a pre-set storyline. You'll feel like Columbo. Well, a slightly more gangsta version and not a scary old man.

And when you're not acting like Columbo, you can patrol the streets, busting up a large variety of crime scenes that occur in the streets around you. There are loads, and you're told about them over your radio. Simpler ones involve people fighting, or chasing a stolen car. Others are more diverse. You will be called to hostage situations, robberies at banks and even rape scenes in apartment blocks. You bust in, put new holes in brothers, and throw the book

at anyone who survives. And it feels great.

So we've got a great game on our hands, right? It should have been. But sadly, one major technical flaw has prevented this from being the case - BLATANT and disastrous slowdown.

The moment you step out into the streets you will notice one of the most disgusting frame-rates you've ever seen. It's like you're watching CCTV footage on Crime Stoppers. Honestly, we were in such disbelief that this was the final product that we phoned the publishers just to make sure. They sent us another copy of the game with the word 'FINAL' written on the disc. Unfortunately, it was no better

The constant jerkiness goes from bad to worse as the screen gets busier. We're not tech-junkies but a frame-rate that renders the game BARELY playable cannot be ignored. The problem is, you will be spending the majority of the game outside, in four-frames-per-second mode and this is totally unacceptable.

Imagine buying a box of cornflakes that were so tough you could barely chew them. Or a pair of glasses that were so dark you could hardly see a thing. You would be forced to power-slam them straight into the bin. This piece of software costs 40 sheets and it's technically broken. And we're not happy. Luckily, we got both of our copies for free but you probably won't.

Or whatever. He is oblivious to the entire office falling silent, as he screams out "EAT IT, DEUTSCHLAND!" and "DIE, YOU DIRTY GERMAN MO-FOS!" It all looks terribly unsympathetic on Armistice Day.

It's not like he was so into this, he couldn't even bear to press pause to honour Britain's war dead. It's more about there not being a clock in his eyeline, and him wearing headphones. In fact. Dean had been using all kinds of excuses to stop playing Call of Duty 2. "I thought I saw Jesus outside!"; "I need to check my car hasn't turned into a snake!"; "I forgot how to make my fingers move" - each time, an icy glare from Tim sent him

slinking back to the console.

We're bored of World War 2 games. This is certainly more enjoyable than the last two Medal of Honor games, but the experience is practically identical. World War 2 games can't surprise you. You know you're firing the same crappy slow-loading guns, you know you're just fighting humans, and you know you're going to have to shell tanks at some point.

How is that better than killing ALIENS with LASERS? Aliens can look like anything. They can build awesome giant robots, which you have to waste with rockets and giant cannons that vomit rainbow laser-streams. Possibly with an excellent buzzing sound.

Smoke billows from bomb-ravaged buildings and every near miss from the Stukkas above sends dust and debris flying into the air.

The 'Big Red One' in the title has nothing to do with sex toys, and was the nickname of the 'legendary' US First Infantry unit that you're part of. We love pretending to be American, because Americans are so awesome. When one of our comrades goes down in battle, we're all like "OMG! WHY?!" and

we sit shaking our fists at Heaven, crying onto the Stars and Stripes.

But hey, at least the mouthy one from Brooklyn didn't die, so we'll get to hear his hilarious 'rough diamond' talk in the cutscenes. The game's mostly first person, but there are a few

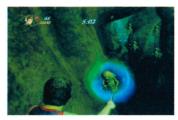

A fourth Harry Potter movie can only mean another Potter game. That thought doesn't exactly get us jumping for joy. But wait; let's give the kid a chance. He's older, wiser, spottier, so maybe he can pull a rabbit out of his hat this time around.

After Prisoner of Azkaban, this series needed a desperate overhaul and that's exactly what it's got. The cartoon-like characters and RPG gameplay of searching for books and chatting to teachers are gone. In their place the choice of controlling Harry,

is a much more accurate depiction of Harry, Ron and Hermione, with levels taken straight from the film.

Most importantly, this game is all about action. All three Triwizard Tasks are here for you to complete, plus some levels in-between for the whole gang to get involved in. Just like in the book and film, Harry's growing up and that means some scarier monsters and stronger spells. Each level has a different style to it, but the tone is set straight away, as you try to escape the Death Eaters rampaging outside the Quidditch World Cup.

For some of the levels, you get

Ron or Hermione, although all three are always on-screen. There isn't much difference between them at first, but as you buy upgrade cards, you can equip each of them with special skills. The cards are bought with all the beans you collect.

The multi-character feature has been much-touted and there are plenty of occasions when you simply can't solve a problem with a single character. The other two will come to your aid, lifting and pulling objects. The Al isn't too smart though and often lags behind you, which becomes pretty annoying after a while. All the more reason to grab a couple of

mates and have them control the other characters instead.

Using the Co-op feature can add plenty of laughs as you fight one another for the rewards. The ultimate aim of the Co-op levels is to collect all the Triwizard Shields. Each time you collect one, the level ends, which means repeat visits. Fortunately, each time you get a Shield or learn a charm, new areas open up for you to explore. Although this adds to the longevity of the game, it doesn't stop it from getting really repetitive eventually.

spell-casting skills and teamwork.

The Triwizard Tasks are for Harry alone and often stray away from the platform style of the other levels. The Dragon Task, for instance, is all about accuracy and speed as you fly around Hogwarts on a rail, avoiding the flames that a Horntail dragon is spitting at you. Eventually you're judged on the number of rings you hit and how quickly you managed to reach the end.

Unfortunately it's not all good news. Although GoF looks and feels darker and more serious, it certainly doesn't play that way. Being chased by a dragon sounds fantastic and the sense of speed is breath-taking at times, but there's very little challenge. You only have a limited ability to move around; there's no free roaming. Much of the rest of the game is similar in this respect. You never really feel as though you have to try very hard to complete each level.

For instance, there are plenty of different Charms and Jinxes to work with, from Carpe Retractum to Avifors, but you don't get to choose between them. All the spells in the game are situation-sensitive, which means you hit the same button to put out a fire as you do to lift a boulder.

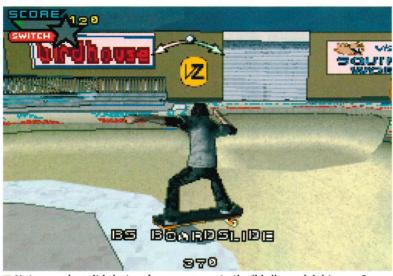
You don't choose the spell, and you don't even need to aim them. This really isn't too helpful when your character lifts a rock when what you actually wanted was to hose down a Salamander.

Without a targeting system, you spend most of your time shooting off Jinxes in all directions, hoping they'll hit enemies while your Charms just go for the nearest object. Any suggestion that it wouldn't just be button-bashing has proved to be false. This kind of gameplay works fine with swords and axes, but not with wands. It doesn't really make you feel very involved in the action.

Despite all the shiny new features and clever adaptations from the film, there just isn't anything new about *GoF*. We've seen all this stuff done before, and often much better. The book and film that this game is based on both tried to take things up a notch or two. More danger, more scares, more puzzles and mysteries. None of that has been translated to this game and because of that, it's weaker than it could have been. Make no mistake, younger fans will probably still love this game but it has no tricks up its sleeves to enchant anybody else.

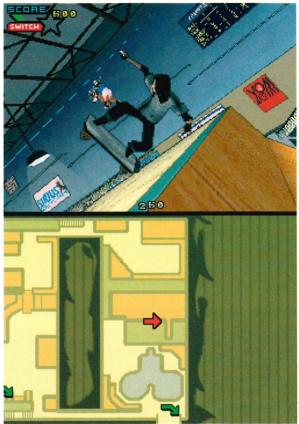

Plus the number of buttons on the DS means all the flips, grinds and grabs are very easy to pull off. You can seamlessly link tricks together without a problem. Thankfully, Vicarious Visions avoided the temptation to make lots of tricks use the touch screen. The only thing you really need it for is to perform special tricks. This is extremely handy and the special moves are context-sensitive. Pressing one while in the air will perform a flip, whereas pressing on a rail will perform a special grind. You can also use the touch screen to 'freak out' but that move is just as pointless as it is on the 'Cube.

Luckily, the dual screen isn't quite so pointless. The top screen is used to show a map - how original. But it's actually useful in *Tony Hawk* because you can see the people you need to speak to. Normally they 'pop up' when you get near to them. So using the map makes it easier to spot them. Also, when you're playing Classic mode, yes the bastion of pure *Tony Hawk* entertainment is in *Sk8land*, it shows you where the S-K-A-T-E letters are. Thank you very much.

So... what other reasons do you need to play it? Well, there's kind of a skate park creator. As you get more money in the Story mode, you can purchase objects for the Warehouse skate park. There are all sorts of things, like a lava-filled pit and a treadmill. Okay, it's not quite as good as making your own park from scratch but it's not a bad effort. What other reasons... well, the graphics are lovely. It's kind of like *Ultimate Spider-Man* but

fully 3D. Admittedly, there isn't a lot of detail in people's faces but when you're whipping past them while kick-flipping onto the next grind, you don't really care if someone's got a moustache or not.

Another attraction of *Tony Hawk* on DS is the online mode. Unfortunately, at the time of going to press, we couldn't access the Nintendo network to play against some sweaty Americans. But we reckon the chance to play combo challenges and the like against THE WORLD will be a lot of fun. Plus you can play it in normal multiplayer with a mate who's also got a copy of the game.

The reason why we think this version is so much better than the 'Cube one is because it feels so fresh. You haven't played anything like this on DS and the 3D is among the most impressive so far. It's a game that's perfectly suited to handheld. The quick challenges, particularly the two minute Classic mode, are great for bus journeys or wasting time while on the toilet. Tony Hawk may be over on 'Cube but he's got a long life ahead of him on DS.

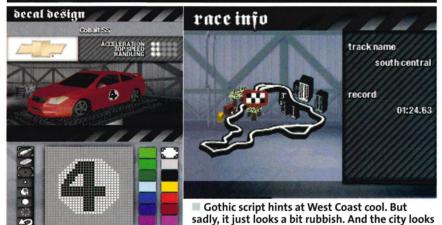

The crowd love it, all the mini-games, the colours, the fun music... looking good. The court fills with cheers. But then Power Tennis starts running through its Power Moves and the crowd turns nasty. It's going to be tough.

The Power Moves should have been out but Camelot let them back in again.

For those not in the know, Camelot's previous sports outings on Nintendo handheld were a revelation. Aeons ago, people travelled by horse and cart to queue for months outside candle-lit shops to purchase *Mario Tennis* and *Mario Golf* for their top of the range Game Boy Color. The intriguing combination of sports sim and RPG worked well together, like gin and tonic. People rejoiced and the king was happy.

Since then, Golf has already been updated for GBA and now it's the turn of Tennis. It starts off pretty much the same as Mario Golf: Advance Tour. As a rookie tennis player, you decide to

attend the best club in the universe to hone your skills. While getting better, you climb through the ranks and eventually take on the top dog - Mario. Unfortunately, unlike *Advance Tour*, there isn't a particularly large area to explore and you'll see the whole of the

see the whole of the tennis club pretty easily. But, in its defence, the club does look lovely and bright, like Camelot turned all the colours up to 10 and didn't care what anyone said.

The actual tennis is identical to its GameCube brother but perhaps a little slower. Although you only use ① and ② to pull off your shots, the depth of moves available is good. There are slices, lobs, volleys, smashes, serves, backhands... everything you could possibly wish for. It plays beautifully and against the

tougher opponents, you really have to have your wits about you to win. Don't be fooled by the small packaging, this is an in-depth tennis game.

by the levelling-up aspect of the game. Before each match, it's always best to hit the

training courts. You can perfect your serve, volleys or net techniques. It's vital to do this, so you can level your character up. Unlike Advance Tour, in which you basically levelled-up everything.

Here you have to think about what kind of player you want to be. If you want to be a tricky spinner, avoid the power and go for the spin. Or if you prefer control, perhaps consider using points on your technique and speed. There are also secondary stats, like serve,

volley and topspin you can increase as well. At first it may seem daunting but once you know just how you like to play, it really shouldn't be a problem.

The club features a cool tennis lab you can visit when you want to get some more points. The challenges here remind us of the mini-games from the 'Cube Power Tennis. One sees you hitting balls against a wall, with the balls getting progressively faster and faster as you play. Whereas the other is a frantic stand-off against a robot tennis machine. A ROBOT TENNIS MACHINE. They're nice additions to the main game and are a good break from the standard court action.

But there's a darker side to the levelling-up. The Power Moves. These ridiculous things spoiled the GameCube version and rear their head here. At first they're nowhere in sight. When you open the special gym, it's a different matter. Suddenly a whole can of Power Move whupping is released on your ass. It's a

shame because the actual way of training for them (see panel) is actually quite fun. But during games they still interrupt play and generally seem a bit unnecessary. At least the action doesn't stop quite as much in this version as it did on the 'Cube. But still, when you're playing doubles, it can all get a bit ridiculous.

Thankfully though, the Power Moves aren't as in your face as they were before. If you stick to the training and the mini-games, you can pretty much ignore them. Plus if you're playing a Quick Match you can just switch them off entirely. The daft gimmick courts are missing as well, although that does mean it doesn't quite feel like a Mario game.

There's nothing in the majority of play, apart from the odd sound-effect, and a few characters, to suggest you're playing a Mario tennis-sim at all. Buť if you're looking for a fun and lasting portable tennis game, then that really shouldn't put you off anyway.

So far, your stylus has carried out a variety of roles; a magical paintbrush for Kirby, a cloud-maker for Yoshi and a comb for your Nintendog. It was pretty magical already but now EA has turned it into a WAND.

That's right. Although this is basically a repackaged GBA game, there are some fancy 3D bits that use the touch screen. Wooooooo. When you attack one of the ridiculously-named creatures, like the Snorgbuggler or Bumwrangler, it'll randomly go all 3D. Your spritebased eyes will pop out your head when you see the blocky polygons lurch onto the screen. Then you have to touch the screen to cast spells. It's not hard and it's slightly pointless. But kudos for trying.

Actually the majority of the game suffers from not being very hard. It holds your magical hands all the way through and, although it's for young fans, it would have been nice to let them use their brains. There are also some

mini-games that would insult a badger. They involve the touch screen in such a rudimentary way, it's like the mini-games in Super Mario 64 DS never existed.

In fact, the actual adventure suffers from just being a bit boring and repetitive. The levels seem too large and go on far too long. That wouldn't be so bad if you were doing exciting things. But you're not. You're wandering around, casting the same spells and killing the same monsters you've been

fighting all along. It lacks the magical spectacle of the 'Cube version. Plus the co-op element with Ron and Hermione is just irritating because they get in the way when you're casting spells.

Generally it suffers from being too much like a GBA game with the odd 3D bit. But EA has clearly seen how popular Nintendogs has been and has tried to copy that with a Care of Magical Creatures side game. Unfortunately a Niffler just isn't as much fun as a Labrador.

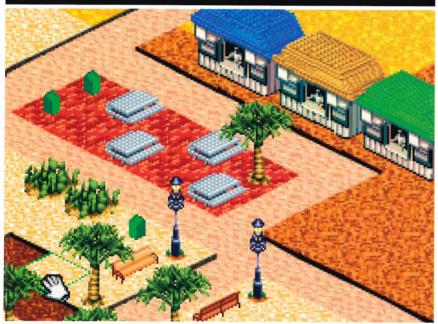

Lost in Blue

Most games are about not dying. But it's usually aliens that kill you, not the fact that you couldn't find enough coconuts. That's the unique gameplay proposition offered by Lost In Blue: the only thing that's going to kill you is starvation. Or perhaps boredom.

You're washed up on a desert island after a shipwreck. Unfortunately, nobody's sat around, drinking Lilt and having a wicked time. You're there on your own, with no food and wet clothes. Worse, your name is Keith. Worse still, your Nintendo DS is still lost at sea somewhere. That's the start of the game. There's no tutorial, you just have to get by on instinct.

You find some coconuts lying around. You find a cave to sleep in. So far so good. Then you make your first mistake: you find another survivor. Her name is Skye, and she ruins your life. A life that, without her, would have just involved scrabbling around for nuts and berries to stay alive. So, a crap life. She manages to ruin the crappest life imaginable.

She's as good as blind. So you have to drag her by the hand if you want her to go anywhere. Her

You'll wish you'd gone to Majorca instead.

role in the game is to sit on her arse in the cave, while you try to keep BOTH OF YOU alive. So that means finding twice as much food. This is literally a game where you wake up, slowly plod around looking for carrots and stuff, then plod home at night to eat and go to sleep.

This makes for a bizarrely slow-paced RPG, where almost nothing happens. You have a bizarre telepathic link with her, and constantly worry about her being hungry, thirsty or tired. She's human, so is comprised of many millions of cells. But none of them are brain cells. She'll never look for her own carrots, no matter how starving she gets.

"Back so soon?" the brainless cow asks after I walk back into the cave moments after leaving. "Did you forget something? Hehehe." Haha, Skye! Yes, I'M the stupid one. That's why YOU'D DIE OF THIRST if I didn't lead you by the hand to a river that's ten seconds walk away for a drink.

Lost In Blue takes advantage of the DS' unique features better than most games. You 'dig' with the stylus to uproot a potato, and blow on embers to develop them into a raging fire. You hunt fish with a spear by jabbing with the stylus, and rub the screen to search for herbs among the grass.

The problem is the pacing. Before you're in a position to kill big animals for food, your days are filled with the monotony of subsistence. Skye does her best to make a meal out of some dodgy mushrooms, seaweed and a coconut. But the small amounts of health you regenerate mean

you're slow to expand your knowledge of the island's geography for fear of dropping down dead of exhaustion.

It's too realistic in this sense. When sharpening a stick to make a spear becomes an air-punching triumph, you know you're being as starved of fun as Keith is of KFC. It's not DINOSAUR ISLAND or ZOMBIE ISLAND, it's BORING ISLAND. As the game advances, you get to hunt deer with a bow. The fur makes for a nicer bed, which means you'll sleep better and recover more health. That's the sort of reward this game is all about as you struggle to find a way off the island and back to the civilised world.

It takes far too long for the game to stop being about boring

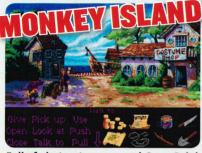

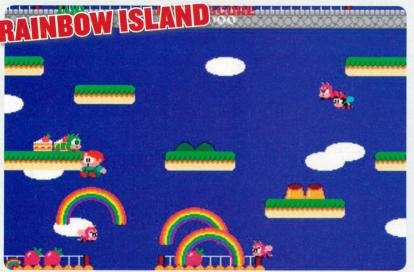

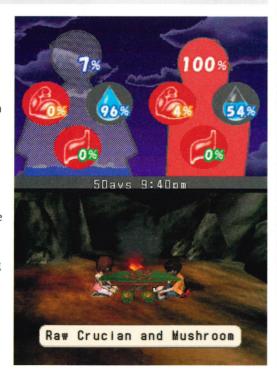

It's satisfying in unconventional ways, even with its comatose pace. It's not going to thrill anyone who knows the definition of action, and it doesn't do a lot for women's lib. Unless chilling in a cave waiting to be fed is the ultimate expression of girl power.

The collision detection is so awful too that you think you've cracked it but end up on the receiving end, collapse and die.

There is an element of strategy in the form of topping up your experience and deciding your battle strategies - yet it's too fiddly when there's an army standing around needing a sword in the gut. The last thing you want to be doing is deciding if Edmund should attack the weakest character.

Interestingly, you'll need to keep warm by finding a cave or be faced with slower characters, which isn't great when you're confronted by a pack of hungry child-eating wolves. The only problem is caves are few and far between, so make sure you

know where the nearest one is before heading out on the prowl.

Being on the DS, you'd expect some of the machine's functions to be put to good use. However, it's touch screen conversations and drawing spells. So it's not going to bowl you over as you talk to horses, Gimli lookalikes and badgers with the stylus.

We haven't seen the film yet, but if it's as boring as the game, we're dumping the popcorn and walking out. Just don't be a fool and let this game cast a centurylong shadow over your DS.

You can also trade paintings with your mates using your wireless connection.

Sims 2 is tailor-made for the

DS and uses just about every trick it has to offer. The fixed camera on your character makes you waste half a fight looking for your opponent, and they aren't too smart either. They can often be found beating up a wall instead of you.

Most annoying of all is that it uses one of the most pointless applications of the touch screen to date. You tap out special moves, fly and activate Spidey's web. Even hardcore comic fans are going to find it hard to enjoy any of this.

Driv3r is going to give you a headache. Not one of those ones you get after eating too much ice cream, but one that hits you on a hot day and hammers away at your brain like a psychotic builder.

Starsky & Hutch this is not. For a game based on a lead character being a demon behind the wheel, there's no skill required. The cities are big enough for exploration, but apart from Undercover missions and the odd side quest, there's little to do.

And the headache? Well those 3D environments warp all over the place and turn your eyeballs inside-out.

Stuntman doesn't have anything like the excitement or speed. Accuracy is the name of the game, with ever-increasing demands from the director to hit your mark on time. Not that you're going to be too bothered when you realise the cars

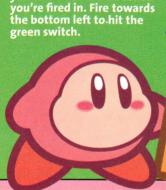

Look to your right and you should spot a door-shaped area. Make your way up to it, avoiding the flames. Once inside the new room, pound the stake and hit the orange switch. the orange switch.





Location: 5-1 (Cold Course)

In the second area after the checkpoint, look out for a fan over a pit. Instead of activating the fan, head downwards and you'll see a breakable ice wall on your right. Break it and proceed forwards. Once in the room with the switch, tap the blocks so that Kirby can launch out of the cannon and into the one that allows and into the one that allows you to choose the direction you're fired in. MEDAL TWO

In the second area, roll forward over the cannon. Steal the Sparky's ability and don't lose your power. Once you reach the top, near the exit there'll be some Spark Blocks. Break them and head through to get the medal.

MEDAL THREE

You need to have hit the orange switch for this one. In the third area, you'll come to a section with two paths. Head downwards past a few platforms to grab the medal.

STAGE 2-2 (GROWTH GRASSES)



MEDAL ONE

After reaching the first checkpoint, have a careful look below you. You'll be able to see a hidden door among some Bubble Blocks. Go down to the door and go through it to find the medal you're after.

MEDAL TWO

As you head through the second area, it'll be on your right. It's surrounded by some Bomb Blocks which you'll need to destroy and some Bront Burt enemies to boot.

MEDAL THREE

Before the exit, you'll see a Twister and a static field. Kill the Twister to get the Tornado ability and then fly up to the medal.

MEDAL ONE

After the first checkpoint is a wooden post. Kill the Rocky to the right and absorb its ability. Hit the post, smashing the blocks and swim to the medal.

MEDAL TWO

In the second area, after you've escaped the boulders, you'll have to travel across some water with a strong current. You need to swim against it using your multi-coloured paint lines. Once you get far enough, you'll arrive in a hidden room containing the medal.

MEDAL THREE

In the third area you'll have to hit some coloured panels to open a red gate. The wall to the right of the switch is actually fake. Go through to find the medal.

STAGE 4-1 (MACHINE MANSION)



MEDAL ONE

Roll into the cannon. Hit the Bomb Blocks above you and the medal will drop down as you land on the green platform.

MEDAL TWO

In the second area get the missile ability and head for the checkpoint. Roll left and down to a cannon. Get in but don't fire. Hit the Bomb Block to your right so the cannon falls, then fire. You'll get to another platform. Detonate the block, fall to the ground, fire and end up in a room of enemies. Use Missile ability to smash the blocks and enter the door to the medal.

MEDAL THREE

Keep heading right. The medal is next to a few mine enemies. Watch 'cos the floor may squash you.

STAGE 4-2 (DREAMY DARKNESS)



MEDAL ONE

Before the end, there's an alcove with a Tick enemy inside. Kill it then backtrack to the first checkpoint. Go further until opposite the checkpoint near a pillar. Go down and find blocks you can smash with Spike ability. The medal is there.

MEDAL TWO

Try to keep Spike ability. If not, you can kill the Tick by drawing a backwards C that takes you up to it but doesn't force you onto the platform. Once you get the Spike, smash through to the medal.

MEDAL THREE

You'll see the medal trapped in some Bomb Blocks. You'll only see the detonation switch if the light is on though. Head left to switch on the light.

STAGE 4-3 (PALETTO POLIS)



MEDAL ONE

Hit the green switch before this one. Once you start, look out for a door that's below and to the right of the first green moving platform. Head inside for the medal.

MEDAL TWO

After you open the yellow gate, fall down and head right to a new switch. Hit it and a wall to the left of the gate will open. Head into the ceiling tube and through the spike-filled corridor and hit the switch. Now head into the room to the left of the yellow gate to find the medal.

MEDAL THREE

When you reach the exit in the last area, don't finish the level. Instead, go over it and into a pit to the right of the exit. The medal will be in front of you.

After the first checkpoint, go up to the ceiling. Head right and watch the map for a secret door hidden by a fake wall and alcove. The door is near the ceiling.

Hit the blue switch before this. At the last checkpoint, you'll end up in a static field. Head through it and try to get Kirby to bounce by dashing. Bounce over all the pits and the exit to reach the medal.

MEDAL THREE

You'll get to a section with a static field and some cannons. Towards the end you'll be in a cannon held up by Bomb Blocks. Before triggering, look below to some blocks between two platforms. You'll need to blast through these as the cannon drops down to get the medal.

STAGE 6-2 (VOLATILE VOLCANO)



MEDAL ONE

At the first checkpoint, look right for a fake wall with holes. Go through and dash across the platform to the medal.
