The styling's a bit 'Bond baddie', but it'll make you look important walking down the high street, at the very least.

GAME BOY ADVANCE SP CARRY CASE

The Game Boy Advance SP is notoriously easy to scratch or damage. Just try dropping yours on the floor to see the devastation possible (stop, don't!) Should you be inclined to such foolish behaviour, than this carry case (which also boasts a carry strap) may be for you. The styling is just this side of boring, while your SP will fit snugly between its nylon-esque mouldings. Safety can be yours - don't come running to us if you have an accident...

GAME BOY ADVANCE SP CARRY CASE (OFFICIAL)

This is more like it. A seriously good looking, professional SP carry case that feels as good as it looks. Not only will this beast fit your SP, but it has room for an AC adaptor, a zippered inside pocket for games and accessories as well as an 'S' hook for secure attachment to bags or clothing. The padded case will protect your SP from all bu the most serious of problems and it all comes emblazoned with the beautiful GBA SP logo too. Good stuff.



GAME BOY ADVANCE SP MINI CASE (OFFICIAL)

Still, it's allowed several nice companies like 4Gamers to invent their own, so at least someone's profiting. This package offers the adaptor needed as well as a smart silver and black pair of headphones - all packaged in a lovely soft placcy bag that allows you to transport them without tripping over the wires. An almost essential purchase.

GAME BOY ADVANCE 6 CARRY CASE

The carry cases continue apace, and this one from Intec is for your GBA, rather than your lovely SP model. We're not at all keen on this one. The design is ugly to our eyes, and there's a certain feeling of cheapness surrounding the whole thing. We much prefer the SP models from 4Gamers, but if you're after a GBAspecific case, then you might consider this one. At the very least, it'll protect your machine from bumps and bangs.

GAME BOY ADVANCE SP SCREEN MAGNIFIER

Personally, we don't play well using one of these things, but they're certainly worth investigating to see if you can.

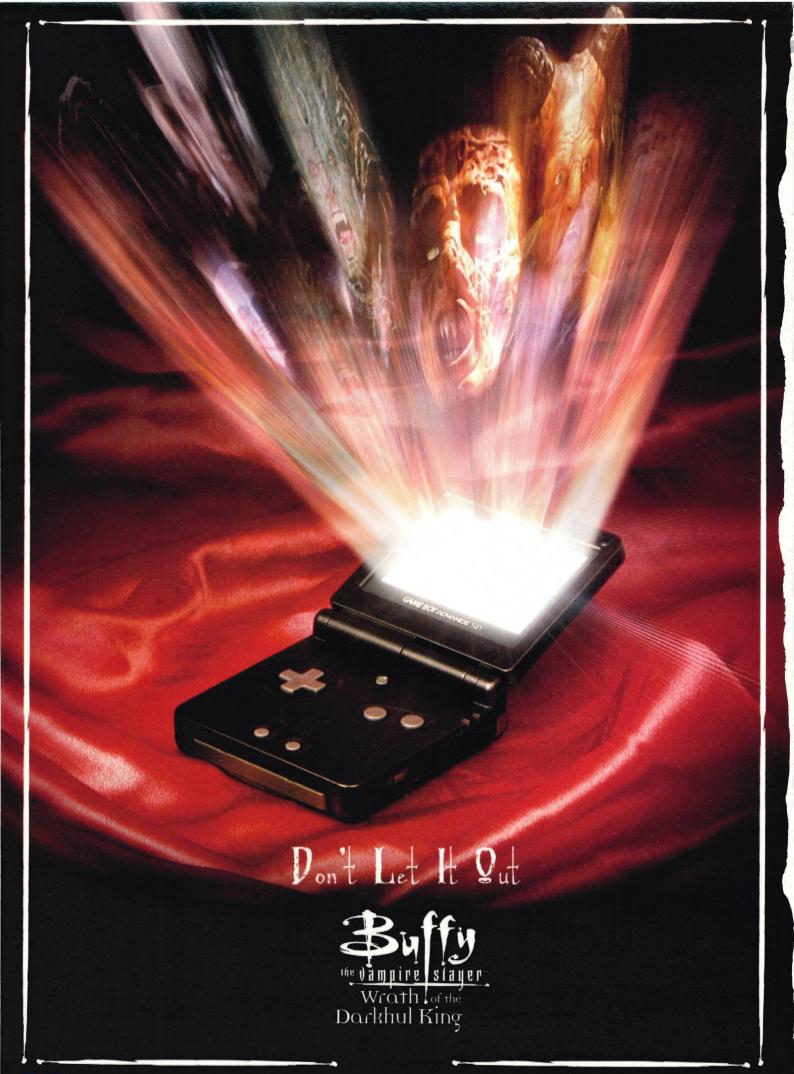

SPYRO: ATTACK OF THE RHYNOCS

There's been so many Spyro games, the series is beginning to drag on (sorry).

f like us you've played a *Spyro* game before, the enforced rigmarole of the training level will leave you de-enthused. Sure these things are worthwhile for novices, but Advance Mag - the greatest advocate of GBA gaming on the surface of the planet - just finds this kind of thing irking. Is that bad? Fortunately to the satisfaction of first-timers and the undoubted relief of old lags, when the game proper kicks off, it's no disappointment. And things have really gone the way of the pear for Spyro this time round.

While hanging about at the Professor's gaff, Spyro and Sparx accidentally rip a hole in the fabric of space, as one does. Unfortunately this gap is between the Rhynoc Lands (that would be where the baddies hang out) and the Dragon Realms (home to lovely dragons, like you.) This is unfortunate on a number of levels, but most pressingly because king bad boy Ripto has decided to send though the orifice swathes of nasty ass Rhynocs to infest the Dragon Realms.

Consequently you're tasked with getting the hole closed again before the

two worlds become permanently fused. And if that sounds easy, you don't know the half of it. This title's going to cram in 14 brand new lands to explore. These are viewed in an isometric perspective (that's kind of on a slant to you) and from what we've seen so far, they look stunning. Much time and effort has clearly been invested in the graphics and the colour is retina-singeing and slopped about willynilly. It makes for one of the funkiest looking GBA titles yet seen.

The odds are not totally against you, as there are a further two other playable

characters tucked away in mini-games, Agent 9 and Sgt. Bird, and there's a brand new inventory system which makes handling items almost effortless. Friendly (or are they?) faces from past adventures crop up again too. Keep your eyes open and you'll happen across Sheila, Bentley, Bianca, oh and Moneybags as well.

There is much more depth promised, new role-playing elements and a selection of mini-quests should combine to complicate Spyro's quest in a very pleasing and involving fashion. A simply massive selection box of weird and wonderful new puzzles are also reportedly in the pipeline. Many will require analysing the special abilities of each land's native creatures. Only then will Spyro be able to use the unique powers of these beasts to assist in opening spanking great new areas of land to explore.

With all new Spyro abilities such as the Head-Butt Slam, the Cyclone Attack and Phoenix Vision to experiment with and a hidden bonus level that allows dude vs dude link cable madness, there looks to be plenty to keep gamers locked within the Dragon Realms for months.

Examining even an early version of this game, with its depth, polish, pristine graphics, sound and quirky plotline, it's difficult not to think of the Spyro series as amongst the best the GBA has to offer.

That said, the version we have is early and not yet finished, so let's not count our dragons before they're hatched... Instead, you'll have to wait for next issue's review.

massive loops, racing through volcanoes and frosty mountains - you've got to forget what's possible and tackle the unimaginable.

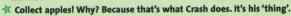

uch is the way of success. Great footballers try their hand at acting, soapstars try warbling as a sideline, while models become TV presenters. Is no-one ever satisfied? BLACKTHORNE

Not a cynical cider promotion, but a classic platformer from the days of yore.

hen originally released in 1994, Blackthorne was played on a PC the size of a small town in Surrey. Nearly ten years later, it fits on your pea-sized GBA. It's hard to tell if this can quite be described as "progress". No matter, this is the ideal size and shape for your pockety friend, being a side-scrolling platformer with guns and orcs and rocks and pits and everything else a side-scrolling platformer was ever supposed to have.

You'll be (and please react calmly to your forthcoming identity confusion) Kyle Blackthorne, a "lethal commando". This means you'll have rippling muscles, be

loaded with weapons, and have the sort of cunning that can kill a wasp from across the room. And you'll be put to good use too, fighting against the terrible doings of the evil warrior Sarlac.

Okay, we come clean, you won't really be him. But if you were to buy this game when it comes out, you could pretend to be. It's nearly the same.

Kyle is the son of the good king Vlaros (alien Christmas carol favourite), who twenty years ago sent his boy to Earth in order to save his life. But now it is time for Kyle to return to Vuul in order to rid the lands of Sarlac's bad doings. And hopefully to teach them spelling.

For those of age, Blackthorne is

reminiscent of the original *Prince of Persia*, using similar sideways action to tell its story. For those of youth, it's like *Abe's Oddysee*, but far more sensible.

Blackthorne's an acrobatic chap, and is able to leap gaps, dodge bullets, roll around, and use lifts to negotiate the tortuous levels. Armed with a shotgun and bombs, it's slightly annoying to have to holster your weapons just to jump, but in general, this is shaping up to be an interesting new platform adventure.

big building on fire. The final part of the trilogy is out this Christmas, and it will bring with it the usual slew of videogames, tie-in T-shirts, novelty mugs, and perhaps even a book of the film... But for now, we're going to delve into the past, into the back history of the tale, into the original book that started it all.

The adventure of Bilbo Baggins is Hobbits are immensely social things (we think) Therefore, talk to anyone that moves in order to probably now just a reference point to those following Frodo and chums on the big screen, but at one point it was get the most help the be-all and end-all of children's fiction.

The book, released in 1937, is now (does maths) 66 years old, which, according to our scientists, is very old indeed. But despite this, and because of the films, it's been revived, dusted down, and through a process we don't understand, made into a game.

It isn't the first time this has happened. Back in 1982 The Hobbit was one of the most important and innovative games ever made. past, and a phenomenally successful film franchise alongside, The Hobbit for the Game Boy Advance has a lot to live up to. But does it?

The fantastically informative answer is: sort of. What we have here is an RPG, focussing heavily on exploration, and the chopping up of nature's beasts with a stick or sword. And while this may sound a little yes-we've-seen-that-athousand-times-before, this time it's built on the backbone of a very strong story, and fabulously, remains remarkably loval to JRR Tolkein's work.

It would have been very easy for Inevitable Entertainment to throw fiction to the wind, and cram in a whole bunch of magic spells and, I don't know, crazy metal ninjas, rather than be innovative within the licence. But despite their foreboding name, they've avoided the worst. While liberties have been taken in as much as Bilbo didn't spend the novel hacking away at bright red wolves and fire-spitting seagulls, all the collectable objects in the game are conceivably true to the lands of Middle Earth. For example, you heal by eating food, just like a Hobbit, and for full life-restoring moments, there are Elf potions. A national Elf service, if you will. And you will. It's all very in keeping with the theme.

Smaug is the big beastly old dragon who guards these parts. His pile of gold is legendary. As is his breath - which is as hot as it is bad. He needs some Listerine, clearly.

At first you'll be dashing about Hobbiton, helping out a couple of friends with some tasks, and finding the bits and pieces you'll need for the quest. Like meat. Stored in the wardrobe. Which is strange. But after a visit from Gandalf, and a large group of dwarves, you'll be off to travel across Middle Earth, on (hairy) foot of course, defeating the hordes of beasties that lie in your way.

And there's more than just knocking the hit-points out of the areas fauna - there are all manner of puzzles to solve too, though these never reach the point of being complicated. And perhaps this is the first weakness to be mentioned. It's all very well to begin with pushing a block onto a blockshaped square on the floor, but to keep offering that as a 'puzzle' in the later stages is a little troubling. Most of us mastered the "putting the square block in the square hole"

when we were three. Those still sat there attempting to bash the triangle through with their fist or toy tractor probably aren't going to get past the "on switch" puzzle on the GBA itself. In fact, it's not until the last couple of chapters that you'll find anything more challenging, and even then it's just a case of just getting on with it, rather than needing to sit

Combat is far more interesting, making good use of the two-armed-ness of your halfling. Using the extremely strong inventory/stats screen, you can quickly set one weapon to 'B' and another to 'L', and then use both in your battles. This is more involving than it may appear at first, since the type of enemy you're facing should greatly affect your choices. Say you're met with an onslaught of wolves, you're going to want your trusty sword in one hand, and some sort of projectile (perhaps darts, perhaps a slingshot) in the other. But if you're attempting to sneak past grumpy wood elves, a far better choice would be your walking stick for defence, and the legendary ring to ensure invisibility.

Statistically speaking, statistics play a very small percentage in your play. Picking up bonuses, such as shield

runes or increased sword skills, will improve your combat abilities. But the discovery of such items is inevitably accompanied by an increase in the level of enemy difficulty. So in the end, it makes very little difference.

So it's light-hearted. It's true to the books. And the combat is often strong. But, and it's an important 'but', it's far, far too short. Never offering a challenge that takes more than two

attempts to get past, the whole thing is easily finished in just a day.

An entertaining day, and a day in which you'll learn the full story of The Hobbit. But still, just a day. It needed to be much longer, and much far more difficult. Like watching Fame Academy.

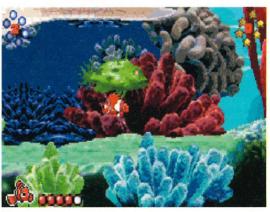

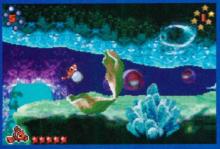

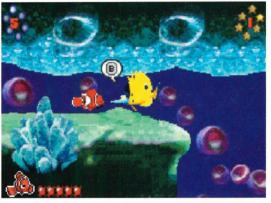

are clearly signposted by a bouncy waft of bubbles. Some require approaching from behind to enable you to sail along them into a new area. Others demand complete removal before you can pass. You'll also find other rocks barring your way, and here, speed-boosting into them a few times will result in the destruction of the stoney slab. Strong for their size, these fish. Oh yes.

Picking up pearls to close seashells and flicking switches in a sunken submarine, the tasks go on. All basic stuff and talents which one learns pretty much at the outset with the guidance of numerous friendly fish. 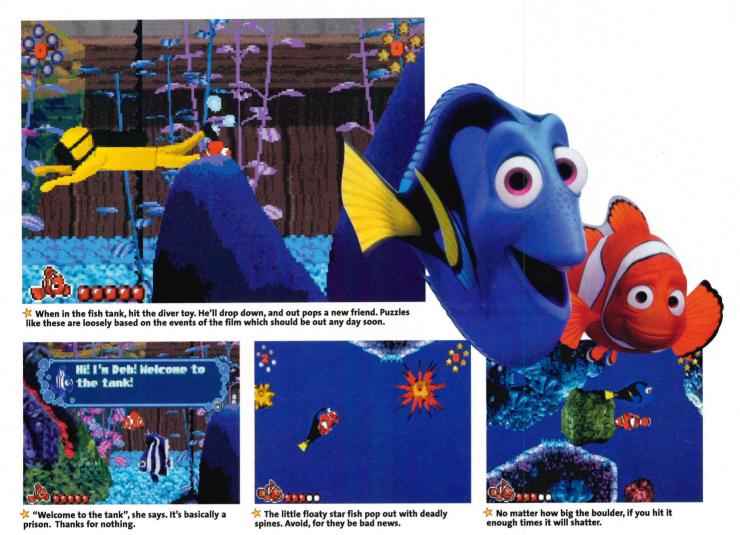
school. This proves slightly more difficult simply because you've got all these other fish swimming round you, often impeding your view. But really, we are in the realm of the 'whoops I've accidentally completed it.'

In some ways, Finding Nemo is as difficult as you want to make it. The main problem is that you'll get killed by your own impatience. Just like many platformers (of which this isn't strictly one, since you're swimming!) you can often see where you want to go. But often, eagerness will get the better of you and you'll try to swim too quickly - resulting in a bash to your life meter. Five hits and you're back to the start of the level - after a brief and kiddy friendly exhausted looking collapse. There are plenty of healing anemones knocking about, however, and if you simply rub up against them you'll be back up to full steam in no time. (And we thought they were poisonous?)

The game does take a turn away from 2D, adding another dimension now and again. At one point you have to chase a friendly fish to a destination, another sequence has you trying to escape from a deep sea horror. In both of these, the game is a 3D affair, but to our mind these sections prove

even more easy than usual and felt a bit tacked on. When things revert back to the more familiar, plainer style, it just seems more effective and fun.

In-between sections, a mini game asking you to match-the-two-identical-images bonus game is offered up. This really is basic with a capital 'B' and will serve only as a distraction to regular games. It should prove fun for the youngest minds though.

Overall, Finding Nemo is very friendly stuff. Gentle, slow paced, yet vibrant of colour and character. It's pretty enough

to look at and will doubtless prove desirable to armies of youthful film fans who've just fallen in love with the cinematic characters. Anyone older, though, will probably find the trials and tribulations of young Nemo and Co a wee bit too simple to ramp up interest.

A little more of the film's pointed wit and some greater challenge in the game wouldn't have gone amiss, but there's no denying that the GBA's version of *Finding Nemo* offers plenty to the younger game wanting one final 'toon hit before bedtime.

OUT Now o, did you see the movie? Too much chat, too little Hulking is what we reckon. Oh so heavy with the blah-blah, chatter, story set-up, meander, oh-my-daddy-was-so-bad-to-me bilge. When all we really wanted was full-on-greenness from the off - a punching, smashing, roaring frenzy of over-the-top muscular barbarism.

Fortunately, and contrary to the impression the glossy modern box art gives, this game is not based around the recent dispointa-flick. Indeed, the talky preamble that so slowed the movie is condensed to a cartoonified, speech-bubble-heavy set of flick screens. Plus, the story, the very reason Bruce Banner becomes The Hulk is taken from the original 50's comics. Hence we're in A-bomb testing territory and in no time at all Banner is Gamma-rayed-up, losing his temper in an underground military facility and rupturing his seams. Then it's over to you true gamer...

He's misunderstood, say we. "Shoot him!", say the army. It's enough to make a man angry.

STOP... GAMMA TIME!

While it may at first appear fairly simplistic, you would have to have a stoopidly muscular brain to actually believe that there's no subtlety beneath the brawn. So here we map out the gist of an average level. It's not all punching you know... Although most of it is.

There are barrels, banks of computerised parts and oh dear, a bunch of machine gun toting goons. They don't like you too much. So off you go. Wading in fist-first punching away at the gormless soldiers, picking Try to clear an area of goons and then smash up barrels, lobbing them to cause everything in the room Always think about your 'Rage Meter' explosions and battering as much of the scenery as you fancy - and yes there is a point to the latter which we'll get to in good time. But while The Hulk is clearly a fairly mindless brute, seemingly motivated only by an elephantine anger there remains a residual flicker of Bruce Banner's good sense.

And it is his voice from the back of Hulk's mind which gives Hulk an indication of what to do and where to go to avoid militaristic entanglements and ultimately escape.

Little flashing arrows are also dotted about to give you an immediate sense of which way is best, which can be just as well due to the seemingly endless outpouring of soldiers, tossed grenades and mounted machine-guns placed in your way. Helpfully Hulk is not without offensive techniques himself. There are three different punches and combined with a jump it becomes possible to twonk airborne attackers too. As mentioned previously, Hulk can also pick up objects and toss them - chucking a forklift truck for instance can, if aimed correctly, take out multiple armed irritants.

You'll also want to keep an eye on Hulk's Rage Meter. This enables the use of other, more powerful moves. Beat up sufficient foes in one go and you get a Super Smash or Rampage award. These add stars to your Rage Meter - collect enough of these and two-handed thunderclaps, overhead smashes and jump smashes will be enabled. That's major destruction, people. Remember though, these moves can only be used if Hulk is angry enough, so top up your anger constantly by smashing random stuff up. Crates, fences, houses, that kind of thing.

This is a tough game and as you advance and meet classic Hulk super-foes like The Executioner and The Abomination you'll need a strong grasp of the Hulk's abilities and quick reactions. Looks-wise it's average, but the soundtrack of chesty roaring is suitably comic. Good stuff then, and massively more exciting than the film. Although let's face it, that's not hard.

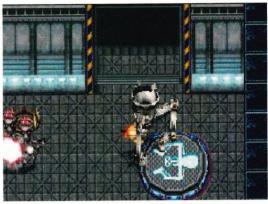

here are some games that are just great. Games that you'd almost not need Advance magazine to tell you to buy. Think the Spyros, Marios, Warios, Yoshis, Zeldas and Pokemons (Pokemen?) of this world... some games just always seem to produce the goods. Now, add Banjo to that list.

mate Kazoo (a bird type thing) and transports the pair of them back in time. Cue Mumbo - a voodoo chappy who magically sends Banjo back in time to rescue the bird and bring da ruckus Gruntilda's way.

So from here, with the player well and truly in control of proceedings, there's a deluge of weirdly named things to get to grips with. Of course the idea is to gently ease the gamer into the gist and it does work, but there are quite a few explanations to absorb. Jiggies, for instance, are jigsaw piece-shaped objects which will open new sections of the world, musical notes must be snaffled to trade for new move information and all the while Bozzeye the mole pops up out of numerous holes adding play tips. It's not massively complicated, just a little bit

overwhelming at times.

While your overriding mission is to get your feathery mate back home, there are countless other side quests to complete. These start by simply freeing some sheep from the clutches of a bouncing plant, then move onto collecting a farmer's lost chickens. Competing these minor trials will reward Banjo in various ways and are often well worth it.

Adding to the gameplay, the controls are absolutely right. Crisp, and with that solid feel that only the best examples offer. The graphics are no slouch either. Detail is blinding, from the grass textures to the blasting of a waterfall.

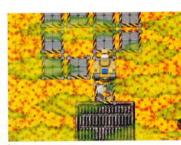


We're now desperately awaiting Rare's next lot of GBA games - Sabre Wulf will follow soon and we can't wait.

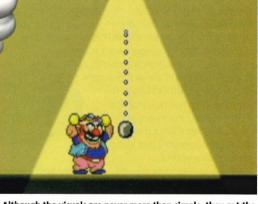

ario's always had it hard. As Mario's secondary nemesis, he's never enjoyed true supervillain status. Bowser is infinitely more threatening and vicious, so Wario's settled instead for filling a more slapstick role as a bumbling nuisance, rather than proper arch-enemy. Bless his fat red nose and ever-growing corpulence.

But for all his drawbacks, Wario has positively thrived on the humble Game Boy. His series of excellent *Wario World* games provided a marvellously twisted counterpoint to Mario's wholesomeness, with our anti-hero's gimmick - he can't die! - lending itself to some superlative gameplay. But it's Wario's latest venture that proves to be his zenith, this bizarre collection of minigames, in its own way, proves to be almost as essential a GBA classic as *Advance Wars 2*. Almost.

The plot, of course, is ridiculous and instantly disposable, with Wario trying to rake in the moolah from this videogame

business by making his own unit-shifters. It's the flimsiest possible explanation for something that doesn't really need explaining (although it provides a hilariously odd backdrop) - a collection of over 200 gibbon-hootingly mad minigames.

But this is no ordinary compendium of phosphor-dot fun. Hurled at you in rapid succession, *Wario Ware* asks that you complete each challenge in a humble five seconds, prompted by a single-word exhortation - 'Fleel','Catch!' or 'Dodge!', for example. As such, while completing each challenge is in itself the point, half of the fun comes from trying to understand, in the few seconds that you've got, what you have to do... and then doing it.

And these activities are probably not what you're expecting. Jumping to avoid a shark on wheels, for instance; guiding a finger into a moist nostril, there's another. Or how about threading a needle, dodging traffic, or simply jumping hurdles... a fascinating, synapsefrying mixture of the ordinary and the surreal that come and go before you've really had a chance to fully understand them or come to terms with their madness.

And there's simply so many of these challenges and minigames that it'll take you a while to see them all. The main game itself can be completed in an hour or two, but you'll need to play through it again and again to see everything that the game has to offer; and while there's some obvious repetition of activities given the sheer amount of things here, it doesn't get tiring for a while. The 15 unlockable minigames also add impetus to further play, and

the fact that games you've played become selectable on the 'Grid' option (meaning you can play them without having to go through the main game) is a nice touch.

In fact, Wario Ware has nice touches all the way through it. There's a few multi-player games that require players to huddle around the GBA together, Micro Machines-style, which promotes giggle-factor no end; and the huge amount of games that are simplified nods to other Nintendo titles is grinworthy (you'll see Metroid, F-Zero and much more...) In fact, our only grumble is that, despite the invention and sheer fun on offer here, the game simply doesn't offer the lifespan that, say, Advance Wars 2 does. But it's brilliant nonetheless. Get it!

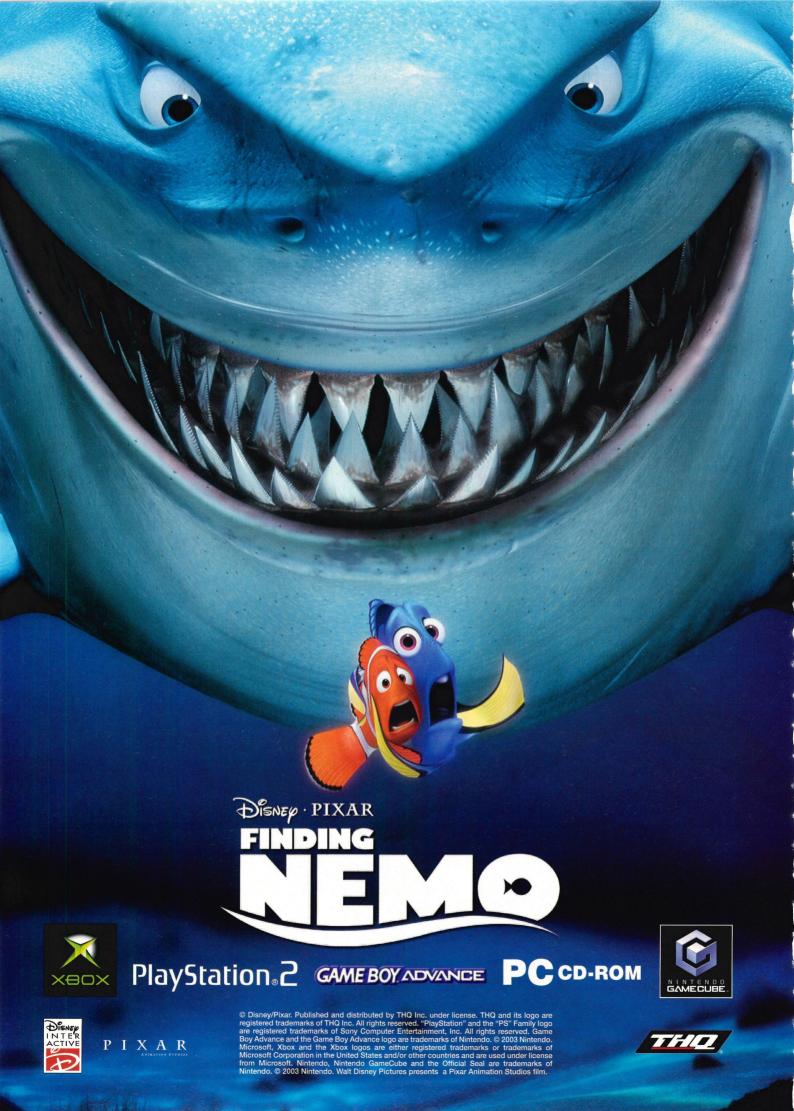

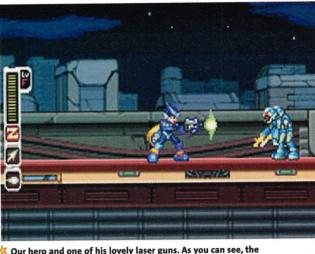

A lot of the skill lies in timing. Jump, shoot, pause, jump, shoot... repeat to fade. Visually it's pleasing enough, hardly redefining what you've come to expect from your dinky platform, but certainly not disappointing either. Zero can obtain all sorts of new abilities, dependent to a certain degree on your style of play, you can steal boss skills for use later and certain characters can be collected and employed to fight the good fight alongside you.

There's also a link battle mode stuffed in there. Yet still the MegaMan vibe fails to totally captivate. It rather smacks of niche entertainment and consequently proves difficult to get terribly excited about. Sorry, MegaMan fans.

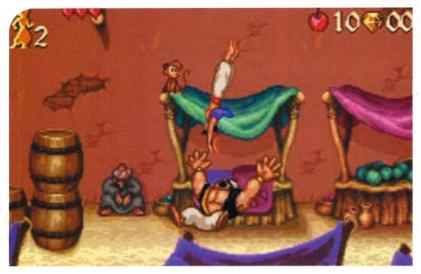

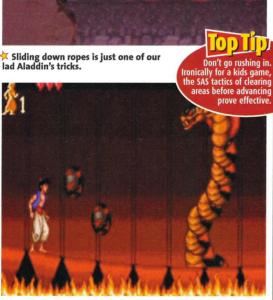

There are magic carpets to ride and some rather interesting environments to explore (interesting in a kind of young way you understand) including Jafar's castle, the interior of the Genie's lamp and an ancient pyramid.

There is also a bonus stage added to each level which extends the rather easy fun somewhat. It's a pretty enough effort, but hardly the rough and tumble madness bad-ass GBA hardcorers demand.

It's unsurprising, formulaic stuff, which passes the time, but may leave you feeling a little undernourished. As such it betrays its roots as very old-school console fodder. 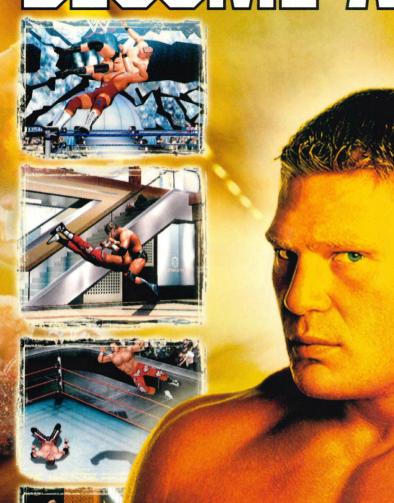

Yet such is the extent of the back story - and you're immediately chucked into choosing one of the six mighty guardians. These manifest themselves as Transformer-looking robomen with names that are easily as interesting as their looks. Pohatu, Onua, Kopaka...

Either way, whichever one you choose determines which level you are transported off to. And these levels are viewed from an isometric perspective (big surprise, huh?) and alternate at various points between smooth scrolling and flicking screens.

Visually, there is little in LEGO Bionicle to impress: walls and cliff faces seem a little chunky, and the irritatingly resilient enemies are rather indistinct - as if they haven't been well-defined by their creators. Some of them, for instance, look a bit like scorpions and take all manner of hits from the mighty guardian's blobby lasers, while others just twist and flit about above you, proving difficult to hit.

These problems are not assisted by a pernickety control mechanism - and coupled with a difficulty in judging perspective (at least we had problems), it makes for an unusually irritating gaming environment. Your heroes can jump, float, ride on air currents, go underwater - variation is not the problem. There's just little sense of overall purpose, and strutting about trying to rescue little alien beasties just doesn't capture the imagination.

Needless to say that in games of this type, gamers' interest and subsequently the sales of the game will be reliant on the fan-base of the licence.

But even with that in mind, Advance isn't massively taken with this exercise in LEGO-ish 3D action. There are too many other better games of this type out there to bother with Bionicle. Try Banjo Kazooie instead.

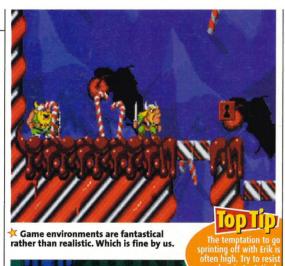

Convenient then that all the problems and puzzles contained within the Tomator's spacecraft can be solved by a combination of these abilities.

The Lost Vikings is yet another airing for the classic PC, SNES and Megadrive platformer. Play is viewed as a side-on affair, the screen scrolls as your team march about trying to come to terms with their unimaginable quandary. Get some bombs, they are told early on, and destroy the computers. Needless to say, both bombs and computers are the stuff of a madman's dreams to the Norsemen and it is from this fish-out-of-water syndrome that the game attempts, if not always succeeds, to squeeze much humour.

Players alternate control of the Vikings with a quick flick of either shoulder button. Up to four items can be carried, used and traded per chap, buttons can be shot from distance by the bow, and tips can be garnered from some of the tentacle inhabitants of the craft... but to give any more away would be to spoil it.

This is a pleasantly-weighted puzzler that'll plod along at the pace you set. It rewards experimentation, while the quaint graphics and absurd premise only add to the enjoyment. But of course, you can fight back. For a juvenile racer there is much you can do to customise your vehicle and this includes adding ramming equipment and guns of varying effectiveness.

Early on you'll be able to pick up mines and armour - you can jump too. Strangely though, we found it more effective, if not entirely preferable, to ignore the power-ups and just concentrate on the racing.

Money, which is gained by either wining races or simply by picking it up off the track, is required to upscale your ride and indeed to buy add-ons. But while this is clearly intended to be a vital part of the game, simply relying on good racing seemed to be sufficient to get through a considerable swathe of the earlier stages.

This lack of balance proves to be an otherwise pleasing game's downfall. Why bother with all the accoutrements when simply taking corners accurately works well enough? Why indeed... but still, on the upside, it does get more difficult and the handling is a pure pleasure. The *Micro Machines* formula has always worked well, and this is essentially that game but for the name. Even though some may find it too easy, overall it remains well worth a run out.

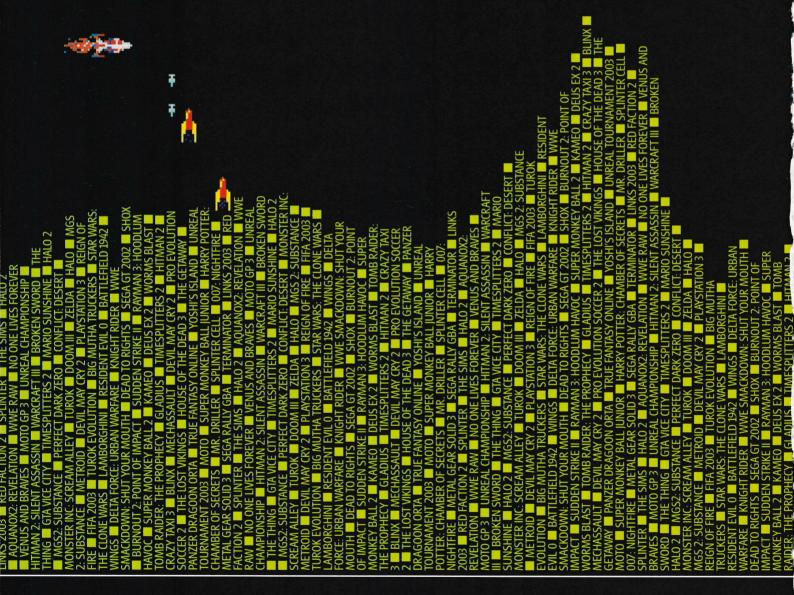

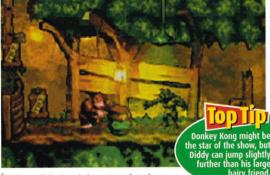

e've seen this game before. Originally a cashhoovering megahit for developers Rare on the SNES, *Donkey Kong Country* was also chopped, pruned and squeezed onto the Game Boy Color a few years back. So why exactly do you need a GBA version of the game, especially since it's almost identical to its portable predecessor?

The answer is dishearteningly obvious; you don't, if you've ever played *Donkey Kong Country* before. You'll know exactly what to expect, it simply looks prettier (although not, disappointingly, as pretty as on the SNES) and offers a few perfunctory extras to persuade you to part with your hard-earned monies. Namely, these include two link-up enabled minigames (involving fishing and dancing) and a host of little tweaks - the ability to save anywhere, hidden camera icons that open up artwork, and so on. Pleasant additions all.

However, despite the cynical nature of the exercise, if you haven't played DKC before, you're in for a treat. It's a visually striking platformer that offers a little tag-team action, as you control both Donkey Kong and his wizened simian sibling/friend Diddy. While the game simply remixes every platforming staple in the book, it does so with such style and precision that the utter lack of originality (collecting bananas, jumping on enemies) ceases to be much of a bother about five minutes in. There are a few modest flashes of invention involved, (the minecarts and animal-riding being three prominent examples) and they help enliven things no end. So if you're a DKC newbie, jump right in. Gaming oldsters, however, save your pennies.

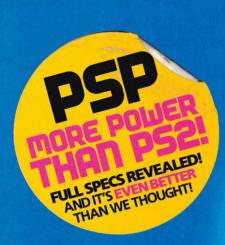

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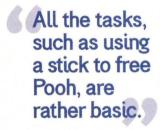

ased on the popular cinematic franchise, this side-scrolling, fighter ties in with the recent 3D outing. Taking a TRON-style angle, the evil Toymaker has constructed the ultimate video game and the Spy Kids have to infiltrate it, rescue some mates and shut it down. This irony for gamers manifests itself in the fact that this ultimate video game appears to be inspired by classic Mario platformers.

Large mushroom guys waddle about waiting to be punched or jumped on and the greeny-brown landscapes are just the right side of familiar. Beat the bad guys with a flurry of punches and they'll disintegrate into oversized blocky pixels - a nice visual touch we reckon. The combat isn't half bad either - with a nice mix of punches, kicks and flying moves that are animated well.

There are myriad crates to punch and kick which may cough up healths and the like, while pin-point jumping is not really required since your Spy Kid can hang onto ledges and pull himself up should leaps fall just a tad short.

With its bold visuals and simple control mechanic, it's really fun to play and while the films may be losing their lustre a little, this game looks to be keeping the Spy Kids brand at the quality end of the spectrum. Well worth investigating.

TM DIRECTORY

Technical Machines contain one-off abilities that can be taught to Pokémon of a suitable class. They can be difficult to obtain, and the abilities contained within might not be exactly what you're looking for – particularly when you consider you'll probably have to make your Pokemon forget a move in order to learn them.

This list shows where you can find the TMs, and some of the effects you can expect to see if you use them in a battle. When you've taught them to a Pokémon, write its name in the space provided. You'd be amazed how easy it is to lose track of which Pokémon knows which move, particularly if you like to switch many different ones in and out of your party, to keep them at around the same level. It's tough out there.

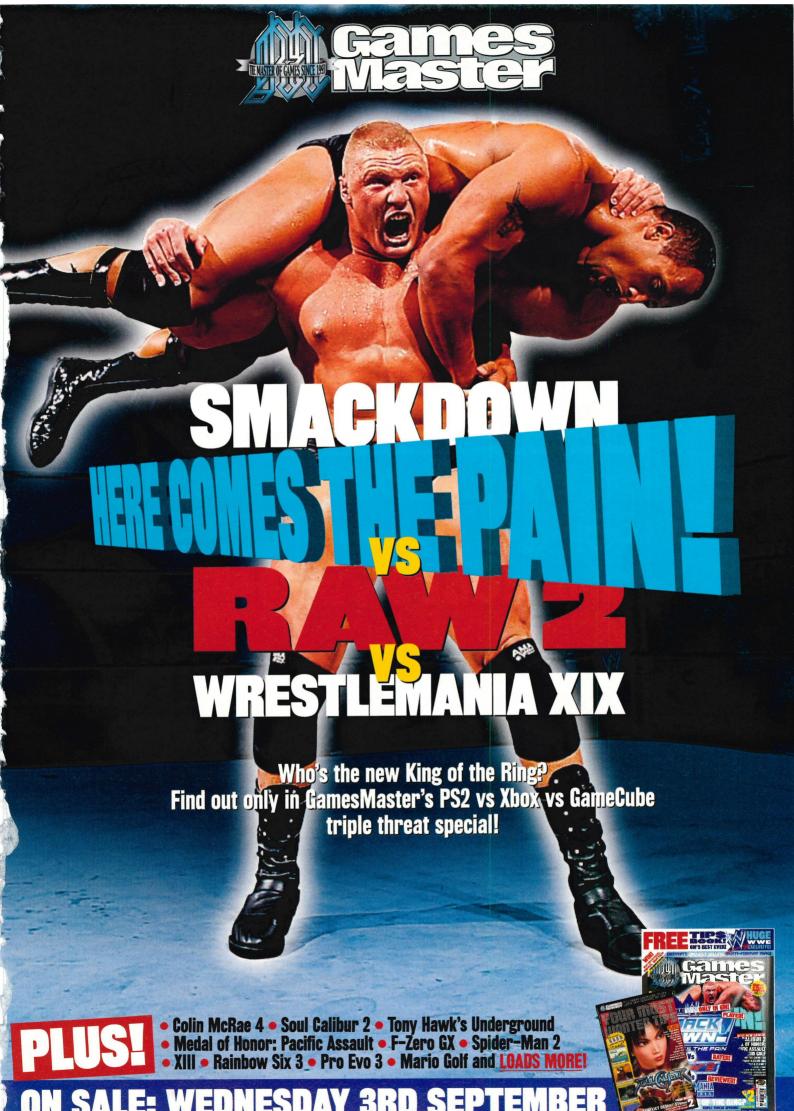

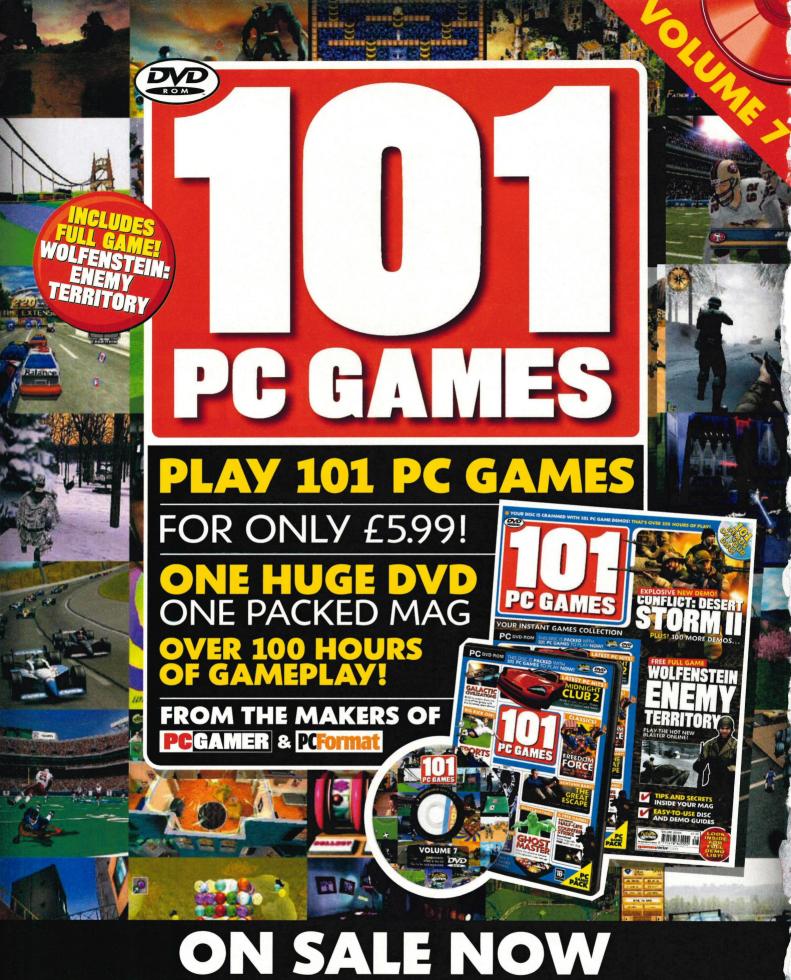

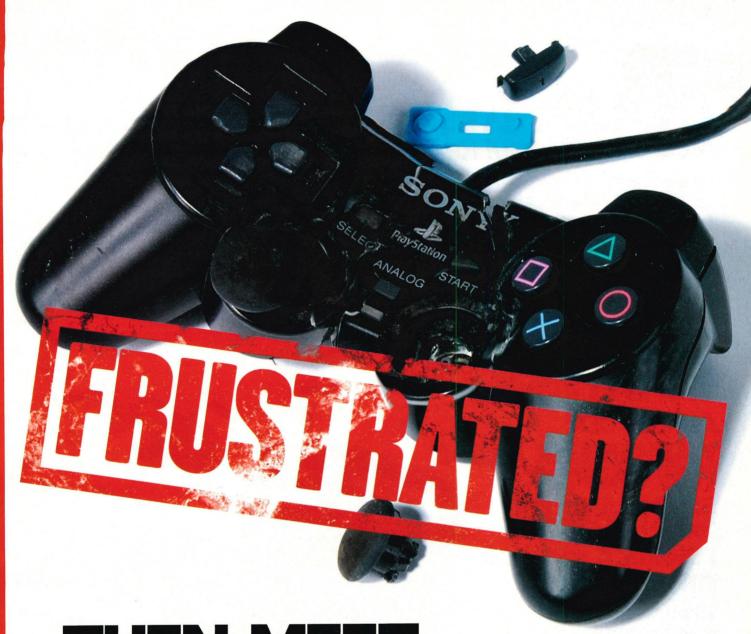
