For many many more years than probably anyone now engaged in the coin machine industry can remember, there has always been an air of "mystery" maintained for and about this business.

It seems that the average man engaged in the operation, sale or manufacture of coin operated equipment always believed that the one and only fashion in which he could assure himself a continued profitable business for the future was to say nothing, or as little as possible, about his industry.

This has continued on to this very enlightened day. It is now kicking right back into the faces of the members of this industry. There are a great many coinmen who are of the belief that the "mystery" should be taken out of the coin machine industry.

The reason is both logical and simple. First of all, it is this "mystery" which causes the average person to identify this business with something which must be shady and, therefore, it is catalogued in anything but a respectable category. It is this very lack of understanding explanation which creates more and still more trouble for the men now engaged in this business.

The very fact that the press, as well as many legislators, civic leaders and officials thruout the country simply cannot obtain any facts and figures regarding this industry, has caused these men to, many times, exaggerate the facts and, in most cases, not intentionally.

Any newspaper in the country can publish whatever it desires regarding this industry and generally the public will believe it. There are no facts and figures presented to the public to cause them to believe otherwise. Therefore they are more or less forced to think of this business as anything but what it actually is.


There are many leaders in this industry who claim that is one great reason why greater taxation is being smashed down on this business everywhere in the nation. That is further why newspapers and publicity seeking politicos, crusaders, fanatics and hypocrites have been able to use this trade for capturing front page attention to themselves. All because this field does not answer them truthfully. And does not take the "mystery" out of what this industry is really composed of and how it ticks.

The Cash Box urged upon this industry for over three years that it create a "Public Relations Bureau" as a division of a "National Board of Trade" with the sole thought in mind that such "mystery" would once and for all time be eliminated. Elimination of this secretive sort of attitude would eventually place this business on a par (and perhaps far above) other entertainment and merchandising industries.

All the world today knows the great power of the juke box. It knows all about cigarette and other merchandising machines as well as pin games and consoles and slots and penny arcades and ray rifles and practically every single piece of equipment turned out by this industry. There is no earthly reason, then, to maintain an air of dark "mystery" around this business. It's a good business. It's a business where men are striving to earn a livlihood — openly. This attitude of enveloping this business with a cloak of "mystery" is actually harming, not benefitting it, one bit.

The time has come when everyone in the trade realizes that this great division of American business must come to the fore and make itself better known to the public. It must assure the people to whom it caters that it is an industry which, by its economy and efficiency, is definitely leading the way to an era of greater entertainment, service and merchandising.

No longer should a dark sort of suspicious "mystery" surround the coin machine industry. It is up to the members of this trade to help formulate and make active a public relations program which will eliminate such "mystery" and thereby forever wipe away a great deal of stigma which has attached itself to this field.





# ORDERS PLACED FOR THE NEW EQUIP'T BREAK ALL RECORDS

### Music Leads, Amusement Machines Next, Venders Close Third. Many Distribs Taking Only Sample Orders.

NEW YORK—A survey by The Cash Box completed this past week revealed the orders which have already been taken from the many showings of new equipment all over the country have broken all records for machine sales.

As was expected, music machines led the parade by a large majority, with many juke box and music accessory distribs reporting that the orders already taken exceed by far all the business which they formerly did for their lines in pre-war years.

It was the general consensus of opinion among the music distribs that it would take over two years, at the present rate of production, to fill their orders. Tho most of these men are optimistic regarding this production lag, and believe that it will suddenly spring out of its present state of laxity to boom shipments from their factories, they are still of the belief that the orders which they have taken will stand up regardless of how long it will take to fill them.

Next in line, in quantity of equipment purchased, as well as in dollars and cents valuation, were the amusement machines of all types. These include consoles, pinballs, slots, arcade machines, pay tables, etc., etc. These distribs claim that they could today outsell all former pre-war years if equipment was available. They also stated that the average coinman will take whatever they can

give him and feel that this will continue to be the fact for sometime to come.

In the amusement machines field a return to conversions was suggested by many of the distribs. These men feel that since the new machines aren't coming off production lines in the quantity they should, that the reconversion manufacturers should get back in action to make over present old type games into new equipment along the lines of the machines they are now producing.

This latter belief seems to be quite prominent among all distrib leaders. They also brought out that some of the new type games wouldn't take too much reconversion effort compared to the effort required to obtain new materials with which to produce these games.

The amusement machine wholesalers did bring out the fact that the games they are now receiving are better than anything ever formerly produced and that the ops are better satisfied with them.


A close third to the amusement machines were the sales of merchandise venders of all types. Leading this field, as usual, were the cigarette machines. The vender men declared that they have a tremendous market before them and that much new blood wants to enter into their division of the business.

They claim that they could dispose of all equipment the manufacturers can ship them. One distributor of small bulk venders claimed that he has orders on hand, with deposits, exceeding anything he has ever sold in all his career in that business. He claims that he is attempting by all means to get as many lines as he possibly can so as to satisfy even part of the large number of orders he now has.

There is very great interest in beverage dispensers. Also in the new electrified hot dog venders and in many other types of machines like washing machines, shoe shine equipment and various others.

The vending machines field needs only production to help clear the way for the biggest sales in all of its history, these men claimed, and further believe that this year has seen the start of a new era for their equipment.

In general, tho, the amount of business, if computed in dollars and cents, would run into a very fabulous amount. But, rather than report such a figure, *The Cash Box* contents itself, in this survey, to state that the numbers of orders in volume as well as on a dollars and cents basis taken for all coin operated equipment, exceeds any sales records ever established by the wholesalers of the coin operated machines industry.



# LEADERS BELIEVE BUIN TO BEGIN WITH 47 GONVENTON

CHICAGO — Reports from this city are to the effect that all leaders here believe that the real boom for the coin machine industry will begin with the 1947 convention.

At that time, they claim, the industry will actually return to normal production once again and that many of the machines which have already been presented to the trade will then first hit their full sales stride.

This is attributed to the fact that the production difficulties now being encountered by the coin machine manufacturers will become even more severe this summer rather than ease. The men here state that this can be easily gauged by the fact that some of the largest manufacturers in this area, and thruout the rest of the country as well, are actually laying off help at this time due to the fact they cannot obtain the raw materials necessary to start their production schedules going.

Reports all seem directed at the many strikes which have already been settled and which threw production back over three months and those which are now in effect and others which are on their way and which will, naturally, again throw the industry back many months.

But, most of these men state, they

feel that this will not in any serious fashion affect the coin machine industry. They claim that it will continue to give the operators a breathing spell like that which they have enjoyed during the war period and will ease the purchase of new equipment, making it possible for the average operator to continue to deal on a cash basis for a few more years to come.


"The one who will be hardest hit," one leading wholesaler here stated, "will be the distributor. He hasn't any equipment to sell. The few new machines he receives he actually hides and waits until he accumulates at least a small quantity so that he can pass these out at one time without causing it to appear as if he is favoring one customer over another."

One manufacturer here explained, "We realize that whatever we will do for the balance of this year will not even scratch the surface as far as the demand for equipment is concerned. Our best bet is to proceed as easily and carefully as we can so that we will keep everyone in good business condition until the production swing comes about."

A noted operator here had this to say, "Frankly, I don't care whether they produce new machines this year, next year or even three years from

now. My route is well set up. The only difficulty we are experiencing is where someone comes along with a new machine and we then get calls from our customers in that neighborhood asking us for new machines. This is very unfair all around for it creates the impression with some of our customers that there must be new machines available and we aren't purchasing them. This is one thing my boys have been fighting and we are asking some of the operators to take it easy in this regard and not place new machines where others are going to have to fight their locations to prove to them that there just isn't any quantity production.

"Then, another thing, the longer we don't get new machines the better off we are financially, at least as far as the operators are concerned. We've placed some very large orders for new equipment. It took a lot of our cash to make the deposits, but, if they hold off for some months to come, and we figure that real production won't become a fact until 1947, it means that we can now accumulate money to pay for the equipment we ordered without dipping into our reserves. From my standpoint, and I believe that I can say the same for other operators, we are of the opinion that new machines are some months away as yet and that this is a good thing for all of us operators."



# ARE GETMG REGURDSP

As is well known thruout the automatic music industry, The Cash Box stepped to the fore when the very first complaints were being registered by the music machine ops that they weren't getting records from their distributors or the record manufacturers and that they were being cut off from the former lower dealer's prices which they enjoyed, and has since brought into the open, time and time again, the case against the "big four" record manufacturers, namely: Decca, Victor, Columbia and Capitol.

Thruout the trade there has only been praise for the efforts put forth by The Cash Box to reach some solution for this problem with the "big four." We have asked time and again that the "big four" arrange a meeting with leading music machine ops from all over the nation and that all cards be laid face open on the table so that there would never again, in the future, arise such hypocrisy as was practiced by the distribution outlets of these manufacturers during the war period.

Just a few weeks ago we again published the fact, due to the many letters we had received, that music machine ops were still not getting the records they ordered and needed from the "big four." Now the time has come to arrange for some sort of a solution to this problem. The Cash Box is therefore asking each and every music machine man in the nation to give as complete a detailed report as he can regarding whether he is getting the records he needs at this time.

We further ask that each one of these reports be kept straight to the line and we, in turn, will keep them confidential in the complete interests of everyone of our readers now engaged in the automatic music machine industry.



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# Votes Continue to Pour in Urging That "Nat'l Tax Council" be Started Quick

NEW YORK — As reported in last week's issue of *The Cash Box*—"yes" votes—for the immediate creation of a "National Tax Council" were pouring in like a flood — this past week saw this flood continuing to increase with each business day.

The trade definitely wants a "National Tax Council." Not one negative vote was received. In addition to the votes which poured in, came many letters advising *The Cash Box* that plans to hike taxes of coin operated machines of all types were already under way in a great many communities thruout the nation.

The Cash Box has been warning the trade that unless some central agency is created where the industry would have access to complete tax data, precedents, ordinances and license bills, tax experts and legal tax information, that whenever any coinman was suddenly faced with

new and higher taxation he would simply be forced to expend money in large quantity without any legal facts to back up his case.

Every community in the nation is today sorely in need of revenue. This revenue can only be obtained by taxation of the businesses in each of these communities. And, most naturally, the coin machine business will be among the very first to feel the weight of the tax hammer.


Many cities which formerly never paid any license fees at all for much of the equipment of this industry are now suddenly forced to pay anywhere from \$10 to \$50 per juke box and more than that for amusement devices.

In cities where taxation of this type has already been in effect — taxes are going ever higher. Bills and ordinances have already been introduced in many important coin

machine centers practically doubling the present license fees. At the same time there are bills pending in many state legislatures which will be brought out to the light of day all over again when these legislatures meet.

There is only one way in which this coin machine industry can protect itself from excessive and inequitable taxation. And that is for the men in this business, who are interested in the future of this trade, to come together to form the nucleus for a "National Tax Council" by first setting up a central bureau where all present tax data will be gathered together. Later, as this bureau begins to function with efficiency, there can be added legal and tax experts who will then be able to bring relief to many coinmen in almost every community in the country.

The time to start is now.





# "The House of Blue Lights" "Hey Mr. Postman" Ella Mae Morse with Freddie Slack (Capitol 251)

• Ella Mae Morse, the "Cow Cow Boogie Gal," comes up with two swell blues vocals, "The House of Blue Lights" and "Hey, Mr. Postman." An additional feature to this tiptop disk is the wonderful piano of Freddie Slack. It's a double feature and should be a top money getter in the music boxes all over the country.

# "Wet Deck Mama" "Love Strike Blues" Champion Jack Dupree (Davis 5108)

• Jack Dupree displays a nice piano in waxings of two blues numbers. "Wet Deck Mama" and "Love Strike Blues." They're good for the race spots and might even click in other locales where the fans like a hot piano.

# "Polly Wolly Woddle" "The Old Square Dance" The Korn Kobblers (Majestic 1036)

• The Korn Kobblers have won a lot of fame in clubs and on the radio for their zany way of treating songs and their waxing of "Polly Wolly Doodle" and "The Old Square Dance" will add to it. The combination really jazzes up the barnyard tunes and rip them out with belting vocals. For novelty they're tops and this disk is sure to get plenty of play in a lot of sections.

# "It Take a Long, Tall, Brown Skin Gal" "St. Louis Blues" Louis Prima and His Orch. (Majestic 1037)

• Louis Prima and his boys really do a bangup job with "It Takes a Long, Tall, Brown Skin Gal," with Louis heading the vocal arrangement in his customary rasping but pleasing style. There's plenty of swing to the number the way the Prima crew does it and it should be a favorite most everywhere, with the probable exception of the quiet spots. On the backing, the Prima band gets hot and lowdown and beat out the famous blues number for all it's worth.

#### SLEEPER OF THE WEEK

"In Love in Vain"

• Every once in a while a tune comes along that is slow to catch on but suddenly its haunting melody hits the wiseguys of the music business and it be-comes a smash hit. That's the story with "In Love in Vain," and Louanne Hogan's singing of the number is right in keeping with the mood of the song. The gal has a nice voice and smooth phrasing that help her put this recording across in great style. It's a natural for spots catering to romancers as well as dinner places that specialize in soft music for the customers. Art Newman's Orchestra does a nice job with the musical background in some plain and fancy arrangements. The backing is another popular tune, "All Through the Day," with the Hogan gal again doing the vocal. The disk should click off plenty of nickels in the jukes.

# "There's No One But You" "I Don't Know Enough About You" Mills Brothers (Decca 18834)

• The stellar singing group of the Mills Brothers is slated for another hit with its latest recording, "There's No One But You" and "I Don't Know Enough About You." Both are in ballad style and with the usual harmony arrangement that has made the group famous. The beer places everywhere will cash in on this disk. That's for sure.

# "There's Good Blues Tonight" "In Love In Vain" Les Brown Orch. (Columbia 36972)

• Les Brown's band has been consistently good and on "There's Good Blues Tonight" maintains that reputation with as nice an arrangement as heard in a long time. Doris Day does well right by the lyrics. On the backing the Brown crew hits a top ballad pace with "In Love in Vain," the tune we've picked to hit hit parades in no time. Jack Haskell does a nice vocal.

# "Let's Walk" "A Ghost of a Chance" Artie Shaw Orch. (Musicraft 357)

• Artie Shaw is still one of our top bandleaders and his new crew is every bit as good as any other he batoned for. Its waxing of "Pet's Walk," a pure instrumental, is right in the Shaw groove, with plenty swing and zing to it. On the backing, Hal Stevens does the vocal of that oldie, "A Ghost of a Chance," and the boy is better than all right. The Shaw fans will go for both sides and the coin boxes serving them will reap plenty of profit.

# "Tear Stains on My Letter" "Oh Why" Jimmy Walker and His Western Stars (Coast 224)

• For plaintive cowboy tunes, Jimmy Walker is just what the doctor ordered and on this disk he warbles two cowboy torchies, "Tear Stains on My Letter" and "Oh Why." The locales that go for this sort of thing will get a bargain with this ebony pancake.

# "Straighten Him Out" "Young Man's Blue" Wynonie "Blues" Harris (Apollo 360)

• Wynonie Harris comes up with two blues numbers with lyrics a teeny bit on the purple side, "Straighten Him Out" and "Young Man's Blue." Maybe we're too squeamish about such things. At any rate they're good blues numbers, with Jack McVea and his All Stars doing a nice job musically on both sides.

# "Ya Ha Ha" "Ding Dong Greeney" Slim Gaillard Trio (4-Star 1078)

• The Gaillard Trio is a good small combo and when it does a novelty, like "Ya Ha Ha," you can bank on it being good. The lyrics are really jive double talk but the tune is jazzy and okay for the hot jazz centers. The backing is another number in the same vein, "Ding Dong Greeney." The Gaillard Trio does a swell job instrumentally and Slim Gaillard's vocal is more than just okay.



Blue Book, rather than show no price, retains the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices continue to be very widely divergent these days. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustment to fit the peculiarities of his own territory.

METHOD The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week: Second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.

IMPORTANT Machines underlined mean these were most active in trading the past week.

CODE Check this code carefully. Become acquainted with each one of the code numbers and what they signify. These code numbers appear in front of the name of each machine.

## LOCATIONS SQUAWK AT 10¢ WIRED MUSIC PLAY

# Claim Too Many Arguments Result from Girl's Demand for "Extra Nickel" to Play Tune. Ask that 5% Play Continue.

Special to The Cash Box

NEW YORK — Investigation among location owners where there are wired telephone music installations revealed that those spots, where 10c per tune has been placed into effect, are against the wired music getting this dime.

These location owners report that too many arguments have resulted with the price at 10c. They claim that the girl operators "on the other end of the system" are always asking for that "extra nickel" and, especially when a customer has a snootful, a real argument results.

One Newark, N. J. location owner reported, "I've walked up to the machine myself, many times, and inserted the extra nickel so that the argument wouldn't continue."

He also said, "I don't like it. The customers don't like it. It's nice to have the girl's voice come out of the machine repeating the tune and all that sort of thing, but, when she asks for the extra nickel the customers get mad. They can get the same tune for 5c from any juke box. Why should this kind of music be 10c?"

Another location owner over in New Jersey had the following to say,

"I don't see why this unit has to get 10c for a record. We work on volume here and all business works on volume. I believe that the juke box operators are better off getting 5c a play and continuing on that basis for they are going to get more plays.

"The customer doesn't care too much about a nickel. But, he doesn't like the idea of putting in an extra nickel or a dime when he wants a record played. A dime buys him another beer. He's used to the nickel in the first place.

"My operator tells me that he'll be better off if he gets only half the number of plays for a dime a shot. I think he's wrong. I'm riding along with him because he's a friend of mine but I don't believe this is going to work out from what I've already seen and heard in this place."

In contrast is the report of one spot here where the owner stated, "It's okay with me if the machine gets a dime instead of a nickel. After all, it can play only so many records a day. If the customers here want to play it let them go ahead and put a dime in the machine. The girl's talking to them and she should be able to take care of any arguments that

might come up about the 'extra nickel' she wants for playing the record."

In the meantime the wired music ops in this area are interested in getting 10c per record. They claim that only by obtaining the dime from each play will they able to make it pay off They cite the higher cost of records, supplies and especially the salaries being paid to good telephone music operators these days as their reason why they must get 10c per tune.

One of these ops said, "Where the location owner squalks too much we'll just have to pull our telephone music system. It doesn't pay us these days to sell wired music at 5c per record. In fact, we don't believe it can be done. It might be possible if we adopted *The Cash Box* suggestion of 70%-30% commission basis."

He also claims, "Front money is a hard thing to get in this territory without having the other boys demand it, too. The competition would rock us back on our heels if we tried it by ourselves. Therefore the only way out for us to get the money we need to continue operating profitably is the 10c a record play."

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# WILL DIRECT SALES OF COIN METERED WASHING MACHINES KILL COIN OPERATED LAUNDRIES?

NEW YORK—The opening of coin operated laundry stores, now in progress thruout the nation, has aroused much enthusiasm, especially among newcomers to the coin machine field.

These men and women believe that in the laundry stores, where the washing machines are coin operated and they charge 25c for so many pounds or for so much time use of the machines, opens a new path to a steady business.

The further fact is that the average newcomer who enters into this coin operated laundry business usually searches out the poorer neighborhoods where people will bring bags of laundry to the store, have it washed while attending to other business, and then call for the bag of washed clothing and carry it home.

It has also been said that even in more prosperous neighborhoods this will prove profitable in view of the fact that the average laundry won't work as cheaply and furthermore because of lack of laundresses to do the washing. This sounds fine in the small apartment sections.

There enters into the picture just one flaw. That is, that as washing machines again become available in quantity, the coin operated time meters which are being produced will also become available.

There are distributors in the coin machine industry, as well as in the electrical appliance business, who look upon coin operated meters as the answer to larger and better volume sales.

They figure that wherever a coin operated laundry store proves profitable will be a good neighborhood for them to send in salesmen who will actually give washing machines to the housekeepers and have these families pay for the machine by the insertion of quarters as they use the washer. This has already been proved, especially in apartment buildings. In this way, there is no doubt, many sales will be made and the lady of the house will, in the

end, wind up owning her own washing machine.

These men also explain that they can get all the financing they need from local finance firms and banks to back the sales of washing machines with coin meters on them to homes.

Therefore, these men stated, the coin metered washing machine will literally wipe out the greater majority of coin operated laundry stores. They also believe that the only thing

which these stores are doing is to educate the housewife to the use of coin metered washers.

At present there are a number of distributors in this and other areas in the country who are making deals with manufacturers of washing machines, and will attach meters to the machines themselves, so as to arrange for direct sales to the homes in their territories. They will have these sales backed up by their banks.


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# WILL HOT DOG VENDERS TEACH LOCATIONS TO INSTALL OWN EQUIPT?

NEW YORK—One of the new businesses which seems to be attracting much attention, but mostly from new blood, is that of the new automatic hot dog vending machines.

These units have received more newspaper space than any other new idea in vending machines which has been proposed in the past 25 years.

Even the advent of the idea that eventually there might be frozen food venders hasn't gained as much publicity in the press of the nation as have the new venders which will deliver a completely broiled hot dog in a roll on the insertion of a dime.

Already one of the largest vending machine chains in the country, Automatic Canteen Company of America, in conjunction with the General Electric Company, who developed and are producing the Canteen hot dog vending machine, are preparing to place these in thousands of locations thruout the country.

Other machines of like ilk have already been announced. Many of the large merchandise machine operators are seriously thinking of arranging operations in taverns and other of their locations.

This brings to mind the same turmoil created by the candy machines that went into the theatres many years ago — and simply educated the theatre owners, where the profits were good, to installing counters with pretty girls selling a much larger variety of candy at a better profit to them — than could the machines. The big fact remains that it was the machines that educated them to the fact that candy vending in theatres was a profitable business.

Now the interest has switched to the hot dog venders and already some of the larger factories, engaged in the manufacture of radios and other products, noting GE's entrance into this field, are also seriously considering the manufacture of hot dog machines. One large tube and radio manufacturer has already indicated that he is entering into this business.

One noted merchandise machine operator believes that his locations, or at least a good majority of them, will sell more than the 180 capacity of the hot dog venders each day. This means (if even the 180 are sold) a gross profit of \$18 per day per machine. And since the most commission that would be paid would be about 10 per cent — the location owner would receive a return of \$1.80 per day.

Of course, all this is all based on the fact that the machines will work perfectly. That there will be no smoke and smells and other problems to contend with which have buried other such types of venders in the long forgotten past.

Would the average location owner be content to take \$1.80 per day — or even a little better if the operator can afford to give it to him — for the sale of 180 hot dogs and rolls at 10c each from a machine in his place?

There are certain merchandise machine ops who believe that the hot dog vender will simply educate the location owner to installing his own equipment and selling hot dogs where his profit will be about \$10 of the \$18 each day.

At the same time, these experienced merchandisers explain, the average location owner, now that he has installed his own equipment, will arrange for no smoke or smudge or smell and will see to it that he plugs the sale of these hot dogs so that there will be more than \$10 profit in it for him each day.

In short, it is the belief of those merchandise machine experts who have been in the field for sometime, that the hot dog vender is going to educate a great number of the successful locations to equipping themselves so that they can sell this very edible American food themselves — without the use of a machine where they give away the major share of the profits.





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#### **MORE PARKING METERS**

SALEM, N. J.—That old, familiar question, "What can be done to eliminate the parking problem in the business section here?" — cropped up again at a City Council meeting here this past week. When everyone had his say it was finally decided that parking meters would have solved the problem. The only trouble was that the Council in a previous meeting had voted against parking meters, an action prompted by complaints from many merchants. Now this city is wondering what to do.

PHILADELPHIA, PA.—The "Committee of Seventy" recently urged the city to install parking meters wherever cars are left in large numbers, and frankly confessed that chief reason for the proposal was the estimated \$985,000 a year the meters would bring.

#### FREIGHT RATES MAY RISE

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Of interest to coinmen in all phases of the industry is the petition made last week by rail carriers for a general 25 per cent increase in freight rates.

The application for the price rise was made to the Interstate Commerce Commission. If the application is approved, observers here foresee the additional freight charges being carried over thru every channel of the cointrade on new and used equipment shipped by rail, causing a noticeable rise in costs to be paid by operators.

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#### PATENT OFFICE TO SPEED UP

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Coinmen who have spent years awaiting action on patent applications will be glad to learn that plans are now being considered to reorganize the U.S. Patent Department to speed up decisions

The reorganization, to be handled by the Department of Commerce and the Bureau of the Budget, already has under advisement three recommendations, including: 1) Centralization of the patent office, 2) Expansion of the examining staff, 3) Simplification of regulations,

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#### **TEST CASE ON SLOT BAN**

"IF YOU MISS US - YOU MISS MAKING MONEY"

COLFAX, IDA. - A test case in Idaho's Supreme Court looms for the near future as a result of the Whitman County prosecutor's decision to force slots out of this territory.

The prosecutor declared that state laws specifically prohibit the operation of slots even tho the state takes a cut of their profits. He added the only possible "loophole" for the machines is a provision in the Steele Act, which he said "seems to legalize" the operation of slots in clubs having a bar license.

It remains for a supreme court decision to clarify this "discrepancy, the prosecutor said; however, in the meanwhile, he will prosecute clubs continuing operation of the devices.

#### O.K. Gov't Stamp Venders

MILFORD, DEL.—Sharp criticism of the government's announced decision to place its own stamp vending machines in post offices thruout the nation was made here recently in the editorial columns of "The Chronicle," local newspaper.

Declaring that "Competition is as foreign to a government bureau as the bureaucrat is to foreign industry," the editor went on to crack that had there been an equitable competitor to the government, "stamp vending machines would have been installed twenty years ago."

The article went on to criticize the government as lacking interest in technical developments which are the very lifeblood necessary to the successful operation of private industry.

#### JUKES PRAISED TECHNICAL TRIUMPHS

CLEVELAND, O. — "Die Casting." trade publication of the die casting industry, doffed its editorial cap in praise to the coin machine industry for its engineering triumphs in the use of die cast parts on equipment.

Devoting a lengthy article to the technical composition of juke boxes, the magazine said of the instrument: "Although most often associated with youth, dancing and entertainment, (the juke box) has very little frivolity in its construction. On the contrary, the equipment involves extremely complex mechanism calling for sound engineering design - automatic record players are a big business with large investments in equipment and engineering talent.'

Taking the Seeburg "Symphonola" as a typical example of juke box construction, the article devoted several of its pages to a detailed analysis of the engineering principles used in the manufacture of the machine.

The appearance of this article gives a very definite indication of the increasing respect this industry is gathering for itself thru its mechanical and electrical developments. Technical magazines, recognizing that the industry has emerged from the war years as a fitting, adult member in the society of big business, are anxious to report the scientific achievements thru which coin machine engineers are climbing to national prominence.



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
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## BILL GOETZ URGES MUSIC OPS GET \$10 FRONT MONEY FIRST

NEW YORK—Wm. A. (Bill) Goetz of Capitol Automatic Music Co., this city, one of the veteran music ops of the nation, urges all music machine coinmen to immediately get \$10 front money from everyone of their juke boxes and to then split the balance on a 50%/50% basis.

Goetz is today arranging this plan with most of his locations. Prior to the war when competition became extremely keen among the music ops and all were obtaining the old 50%/50% commission basis, his firm jumped to \$3 "off the top" and then

to \$5 front money and are now gradually raising their locations to \$10 from the gross collections prior to splitting the balance.

Goetz says to America's music ops, "You are paying more for labor, records and materials than ever before, but are still getting the same old nickel for a song. Furthermore, since all locations are taking in more money than they ever did, they are not losing much, if anything, when you start this new commission basis with them.

"Figure it out; if you have only 50 phonos and pay out 50% over \$3 or \$5 or even 50% over \$10 you will increase your returns from \$75 to \$200 weekly, without materially increasing your expenses. Put this extra money aside so that when the new machines come out you will not be stranded, but will have the cash to make replacements."

Goetz believes that if all coinmen will organize themselves into groups in all parts of the country that they can very easily put this plan over.

He claims, too, that the distribs and the manufacturers will be more than happy to work with the juke box ops for this will mean a better, more stable and more financially powerful group of coinmen they will then have to sell to for the years to come.



# COINMEN CAN LICK "MUZAK" WITH SELECTIVE MUSIC CONTROLS

Special to The Cash Box

NEW YORK—Leading coinmen are beginning to enter into the type of music being offered by "Muzak" to various eateries, professional and industrial locations.

"Muzak" is already in 125 American cities and reports that by next year 90,000 out of 120,000 factories will pipe "Muzak" music to their employees.

The one problem with which these coinmen are confronted in offering exactly the same type of non-selective, non-coin operated music as the "Muzak" system, is that of paying ASCAP for copyright privileges. (It is understood that "Muzak" has an agreement with ASCAP.)

But, these coinmen report, they believe that they can very easily overcome this one problem by offering complete selectivity to every type of location into which they enter by use of a coin operated system.

"This will mean," as one noted music machine man who is already contacting various professional and industrial spots explained, "that we will have to use the double-channel two-wire system just as we now have on our wired telephone music.

"But," he continued, "this gives us a real edge over 'Muzak' for they can only pipe in a program set up far in advance."

He stated that there are many factories which prefer a certain type of music, entirely different from that which other locations, like banks, restaurants, haberdashery stores, dentists and doctors may be getting in their offices.

"It sure wouldn't be sense to pipe in a hot boogie tune into a doctor's or dentist's office just when he is in consultation with a very serious case and upset the patient," he says. "Instead," he claims, "the doctor could call and advise just what he wanted and our operator would be more than happy to furnish the sort of music he requested."

According to general opinion, at least among music ops who are thinking seriously of entering into other than coin operated music spots, "We can easily lick the 'Muzak' system once we again get the equipment we need. Furthermore, we can match and even beat their charges and still make money for our wired music will be going into other than these locations at the same time. And since we already have to pay the lineage charges to the telephone company anyway why not take advantage of all the rest of the locations around the same area and give them the music they want by setting aside a

turntable or two for them which our operators can control, can turn off at request, and can even change the program in a minute or two on demand of the customer?"

Investigation, these coinmen state, has proved that they can get the very same locations which "Muzak" are trying for and yet give this better service than "Muzak" can for they are already geared to do the job, they say, with their present wired music set-ups.

It will be an interesting race to watch as the weeks go by and note how coinmen stack up against the idea of selling into spots near their present coin operated locations.

The only thing which seemed to, at first, halt coinmen in this race with "Muzak" was the fact that they might be faced with ASCAP suits where there were no coin operated machines in view. They can, they claim, install automatic wall boxes as well as a regular coin operated cabinet, and even if the switch is tripped to allow for calls they can do so without intervention, they believe.

Legal minds of the coin operated music machine industry are digging further into the subject for these juke box ops and will probably give some opinions very shortly in regard to the copyright problem.



# Westerhaus Appeal | Happy Over Stepped | Clicks With Hockey on Fed. License Info **Wins Support**

CINCINNATI, O. — The report from Joe Westerhaus of Westerhaus Amusement Co., this city, given the trade in this past week's (April 22) issue of *The Cash Box* regarding the fact that the coinmen in this area definitely want a "National Tax Council" in view of the fact that the press here, by publishing the number of Federal gaming licenses issued in greater Cincinnati and Hamilton County closed this territory.

The press listed each location for which a gaming license was issued when they found that over 600 such licenses had been issued by the Federal Government at the cost of \$100 per license.

The result was to upset the entire trade in this area and coinmen here are steaming mad over the fact that this is public information which can be grabbed by the press to upset their livlihood.

Since that report was published many other coinmen have written to The Cash Box and have suggested that one of the very first jobs of a "National Tax Council" should be to arrange with the Federal authorities that information regarding licenses remain only for their own officials and not for public dissemination.

These coinmen believe that the fact anyone can enter into a Federal building anywhere in the nation and be given such infromation places them in a precarious position.

Joe Westerhaus reported this as follows, "Every operator in Hamilton County, including myself, thinks this is a very unfair practice since paying your taxes is the incriminating evidence against you."



# Permanent "World Fair" of U.S. Exports Planned

ALBANY, N. Y.-Coin machine manufacturers may soon be invited to exhibit their newest wares for the world export market at a permanent "Fair" with the recent announcement made here that a \$100,000 corpora-tion to plan and develop a world trade center in New York State has been approved by Governor Thomas E. Dewey.

The trade center, expected to be established in New York City, will be used for "exhibiting and otherwise promoting the purchase and sale of products in international trade." It will be established similarly to the prewar Leipzig fair in Germany.

The world trade corporation will be placed in the hands of a nine man board of directors to be appointed by the governor for a nine year term.

By January 1, 1947, the ground-

work for organizing the project is expected to have been completed, with the building program for the center to begin shortly thereafter.

# MUSIC FIELD EXPANDS

# Ten Types of Automatic Music Now Branch Off From Original Juke Box

NEW YORK—The remarkable expansion of the juke box business in the past years is gaining attention of all American industry. It is also opening the way for the million automatic music locations, long foreseen by all juke box leaders.

As is well known the advent of the amplification unit and the lifetime needles opened the path to the modern juke box. For some years only, 1) the juke box itself was known to those interested in automatic music. This was expanded by the use of wall and bar boxes, wired and wireless.

Following this, 2) comes the hide-away installations. These have grown tremendously during the war period.

Along with this growth, and now growing greater in demand is, 3) wired, or telephone music.

And with this there also developed, 4) non-selective music. These music boxes offer approximately six minutes of continuous music for either 1c or 5c and are growing in importance each day.

Of late there has been a definite trend to, 5) commercially sponsored music. This is piped in music of the telephone (double channel) type which is backed by a commercial sponsor who is allowed to make a short announcement on a recording.

Now new developments come along in, 6) industrial music for factories, which is gaining more and more followers who are battling "Muzak" for these locations.

Then there is, 7) professional music for doctors and dentists offices which is also gradually gaining headway and which is featured on the double-channel telephone music system giving the location complete selectivity which "Muzak" cannot offer.

Further along this same line is, 8) apartment house music. This will either work from a basement hideaway or from a single channel or double channel telephone music system.

A new trend is, 9) development of wired telephone music with selectivity to department stores and other retailers. Single channel music men are also searching out these spots.

And, according to many music coinmen, 10) music-on-film should not be overlooked for during the wartime period this proved a good money-maker. There are new machines forthcoming to feature music-on-film and these, it is believed, may develop an entirely new and different market.







# MUSIC OPS SQUAWK ABOUT 'FALLEN ANGEL'

OTHER DISTRIBUTOR TERRITORIES AVAILABLE!

NEW YORK-Music ops have been expressing indignation over the manner in which Twentieth-Century Fox portrayed the juke box business in their current motion picture, "Fallen Angel", according to letters received.

"When are we going to get a break?" asked one coinman. "In the picture, Bruce Cabot, portraying the juke box op, is shown as a shady sort of character, 'wise to the ways of cops;' his business associated with gambling, etc. When are the people in this business going to be given fair representation to the public?"

In another letter, the questions asked by the above quoted operator appear to be adequately answered.

"The motion picture, 'Fallen Angel', is as good an example of why we need a public relations program as any I have ever seen. Only thru effective publicity can we present this industry in a more favorable light. I further recommend that any such program include a separate division to cover the motion picture producing companies so as to halt adverse presentations such as 'Fallen Angel' even before they are put into production."

# SHORTAGE IN PLASTIC SUPPLY LOOMS

NEW YORK—A critical shortage of plastic parts may soon confront this industry unless measures are taken to sharply multiply material and equipment available to plastics manufacturers.

This shortage situation was revealed this past week by W. Stuart Landes, president of the Plastics Materials Manufacturers Association, who announced that manufacturers of plastics materials can supply only about one-third of the present de-mand, altho they are operating their plants at capacity and have doubled their 1941 production figures.

Speaking at the convention of the Society of the Plastic Industry, held at the Commodore Hotel, this city, this past week, Landes placed the reasons for the production bottlenecks as the result of strikes in the steel and coal industries

He further pointed out that a great proportion of planned expansion, totaling more than \$125,000,000, is involved in a program which may be affected by the recent Federal directive which limits industrial building

to the \$15,000 category.
"We are hopeful," Landes declared, "that the authorities will consider the end products of the plastics industry important enough to grant the necessary permission, but there will be several months additional delay in getting projects approved."

Well aware that this industry is among the heaviest users of plastics in its production set up, many coin-men observers are of the opinion that unless plastic supply is eased, production lines within this industry may be affected.

**Predicts Greater Credit Demand** 

CHICAGO—In line with the constant urgings made by The Cash Box for the necessity of a "National Credit Bureal" for this industry was the announcement made at a conference of the Credit Management Division of the National Retail Dry Goods Association held in this city last week. It was declared there that the boom in goods sales will be accompanied by a corresponding increase for credit despite swollen bank accounts.







# TAXES SLASHED ON PINS AND **GAMES AFTER COINMEN APPEAL**

NETCONG, N. J.—An ordinance providing for the licensing of pin games and arcade equipment was amended recently by the Mayor and Borough Council of this township, after spokesmen for the pinball and arcade ops had urged that the license fees on these devices be reduced.

Judge Frank C. Scerbo, representing the pinball operators, told the mayor and council that receipts from pinball games were not high enough

(Coinmen observers noting what happened in this township thru the intelligent handling of the license issue, were of the opinion that it could also happen in other localities if there were an organization always ready and available to fight exorbitant tax demands.

# PUBLIC OPINION POLL PROVES ITS WORTH

# Parking Meter Survey Results Point Way on How to Open Territory

Special to The Cash Box

PHILADELPHIA, PA. — Coinmen here are showing increasing interest in the recent suggestion of The Cash Box that closed territories be Galluppolled for public reaction to the proposed return of coin machines.

Reason for this late consideration is the public opinion poll which was conducted thruout this city during the past few weeks by "The Bulle-tin," local newspaper, on the contemplated installation of parking meters.

The direct result of this poll is that the Committee of Seventy is recommending to city law-makers that the meters be installed, and the general belief here is that the suggestions will be carried thru.

With the parking meter issue having pointed the way, a number of observing coinmen in various cities are seeking support to institute the same sort of public opinion poll on the issue concerning banned amusement games.

"Many of us feel that the war's end has brought with it a more lib-eral attitude among the people," advised one coin leader in a midwest city. "In addition, returned servicemen who have had occasion to use the banned equipment while they were at military installations would look upon the reopening of closed territories with favor.

"Holding these factors in mind," this coinman continued, "we feel that a public opinion poll would show the majority of people to be inclined toward a change in the current set-up."

It was further pointed out that in treating the issue of banned equipment in the same vein as the parking meters had been considered thru the use of an accepted, reputable medium such as an impartial public opinion poll — such a measure would reflect credit on the entire industry.

"After all," volunteered another supporter of this proposal, "this business has matured to become an important industry, and we would be handling this question in a manner befitting its importance if we were to regulate the return of games with the use of a confidential public opinion poll."

Remarking on the recent politic-

ally-inspired explosion against the "phantom appearance" of banned equipment in New York City, he added, "Everything that happened there could be tied up to too much misinformation being circulated. It may have all been averted if the public had been allowed to express its voice by a confidential poll before the members of the trade began any attempts to reopen their city."

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# SEN. MYERS' BILL "S. 1206" DUPLICATES "BUCKLEY B

# No Action as Yet Being Taken on this

WASHINGTON, D. C .-- Introduction of Bill S. 1206 by Senator Myers occured on June 28, 1945, almost a year ago, after two readings. It was then allowed to go on to the Committee on Patents in the U.S. Senate.

So far, according to word received from Washington, no action has as yet been taken on this bill by the Senate Committee on Patents.

But, like the "Buckley Bill" in the House of Representatives Patents Committee, it is in committee and therefore continues to hang as a threat over the heads of the men engaged in the operation of juke boxes.

This bill duplicates the Buckley bill to a "t." The wording is the same and all the phrases are arranged in the very same fashion. (Note, when reading this bill, that the motion pictures have been exempted, just as they were exempted in the Buckley bill.)

The entire bill, proposed as a measure to amend the "Copyright Act of 1909" seems to be simply another method being used by ASCAP to collect from every recording which is played in a juke box probably on a yearly license fee basis. (This license can be anything from \$100 to \$1,000 per year — once this bill becomes Federal law.)

There is also a worry here that perhaps James Caesar Petrillo, who heads AFM, may also have his eyes on this bill as well as the Buckley bill.

It is a known fact that Petrillo is reported to be getting all set to jump on the juke boxes thruout the nation regardless of the fact that his musicians are being extremely well paid

There is revenue in records — and Petrillo knows it. But, the one hope is that if Petrillo does decide to enter into a revenue hunt from juke box records that he will arrange, thru his musicians' union, to make records exclusively for juke boxes and thereby tie up the record companies and ASCAP to an agreement which will, small and weak as it seems, somehow prevent the further encroachment on this industry by those who desire to change a "copyright act" and address that change exclusively to juke boxes.

It is up to the members of the juke box industry to watch the action that may, or may not, be taken on this bill — just as closely as they are watching the action which may, or may not, be taken with the Buckley bill.

The growth of the juke box industry can be stopped instantly should either this, or the Buckley bill, be sneaked thru the House or Senate Patents Committees and placed up for vote in either the House or the Senate.

IN THE SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES June 28 (legislative day, June 25), 1945

Mr. Myers introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Patents

#### A BILL

To amend the Act entitled "An Act to amend and consolidate the Acts respecting copyright", approved March 4, 1909,

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Act entitled "An Act to amend and consolidate the Acts respecting copyright", approved March 4, 1909, as amended, be amended as follows: Amend section 1 by adding the following new subsection (f):

"(f) To make or to procure the making, if the copyrighted work or any componet part thereof be an acoustic recording, of any duplicated or recaptured recording thereof on a disc, film, tape, wire, record, or other device or instrumentality, by or from which, in whole or in part, the sound recording on the copyrighted work may in any manner, or by any method, be reproduced or communicated acoustically; to publish and vend such recordings of sound; and to communicate and reproduce the same acoustically to the public, for profit, by any method or means utilizing any such recording in, or as part of, any transmitting or communicating apparatus: Provided, however, That, except if the recorded sound be part of a copyrighted motion picture, no exclusive right other than contained in this subsection (f) shall exist in respect of any acoustically recorded work."

Amend section 1 of such Act by striking out the last paragraph thereof which reads: "The reproduction or rendition of a musical composition by or upon coin-operated machines shall not be deemed a public performance for profit unless a fee is charged for admission to the place where such reproduction or rendition occurs."

Amend section 5 by striking out the present subsection (1) and substituting therefor the following subsection:

"(1) Motion pictures, with or without sound."

Amend section 5 by striking out the present subsection (m) and substituting therefor the following subsection:

"(m) Recordings which embody and preserve an acoustic work in a fixed permanent form on a disc, film, tape, record, or on any and all other substances, devised, or instrumentalities, by any means whatever, from or by means of which it may be acoustically communicated or reproduced."

Amend section 6 to read as follows:

"Sec. 6. That compilations or abridg-"Sec. 6. That compilations or abridgments, adaptations, arrangements, dramatizations, translations, or other versions of works in the public domain, or of copyrighted works when produced with the consent of the proprietor of the copyright in such works, or works republished with new matter, shall be regarded as new works subject to copyright under the provisions of this Act; but the copyright secured in any such "Of the acoustic recording, except if such recording be part of a copyrighted motion picture with sound, any duplification protection under section (f), of this title, shall be manufactured by a process wholly performed within the limits of the United States."

This Act shall take effect as of July 1, 1945.

new works shall not affect the force or validity of any subsisting copyright upon the matter employed or any part thereof, or be construed to imply an exclusive right to such use of the original works, or to secure or extend copyright in such original works: Provided, however, That acoustic recordings of any copyrighted musical work made pursuant to the provisions of subsection (e) of section 1 upon payment to the copyright proprietor of the royalty specified in such subsection whenever the owner of such musical copyright has used or permitted or knowingly acquiesced in the use of such copyrighted musical work upon the parts of instruments serving to reproduce the same mechanically, shall not be regarded as new works subject to copyright under the provisions of this title unless the proprietor of such musical copyright has consented to the securing of copyright in such recording."

Amend section 11 to read as follows:

"Sec. 11. Copyright may also be had of the works of an author, of which copies are not reproduced for sale, by the deposit, with claim of copyright, of one complete copy of such work if it be a lecture or similar production or a dramatic, musical, or a dramatico-musical composition; of a title and description, with not less than five prints taken from different sections of the film, accompanied by corresponding portions of its acoustic recording, if any, if the work be a motion picture with or without sound; of a photographic print, if the work be a photograph; of a title and description, with the record or instrumentality containing the recorded sound, if the work be an acoustic recording; or of a photograph or other identifying reproduction thereof, if it be a work of art or a plastic work or drawing. But the privilege of registration of copyright secured hereunder shall not exempt the copyright proprietor from the deposit of copies, under sections 12 and 13 of this title, where the work is later reproduced in copies for sale."

Amend section 12 by adding the fol-

"For the purpose of this title, any duplicating or recaptured recording on a disc, film, tape, wire, record, or other device or instrumentality, by or from which, in whole or in part, the sound recorded on the copyrighted work may in any manner, or by any method, be reproduced or communicated acoustically, shall be deemed a copy of the work."

Amend section 15 by adding the following:

"Of the acoustic recording, except if "Of the acoustic recording, except if such recording be part of a copyrighted motion picture with sound, any duplicated or recaptured recording thereof given protection under section 1, subsection (f), of this title, shall be manufactured by a process wholly performed within the limits of the United States."

**Mutoscope Raid By D.A.'s** Office In Which Press Reported 300 Machines Seized Now Revealed As Only 9

NEW YORK-The raid on the large Mutoscope plant in Long Island City which was so widely publicized in the press here with reports that over 300 machines had been seized, "many of which were the type that could be converted to gambling equipment," are now revealed to have been only nine machines.

Furthermore, when the case comes up, some faces are going to turn a very glistening red when the facts are heard — for these 9 machines are regular arcade machines now licensed and in operation here in the city of New York.

Members of the trade, naturally disturbed at the newspaper reports, were greatly relieved when they had the good sense to check the reports and found how ridiculously exaggerated they were. Knowing of the

unblemished reputation for forthrightness and law abiding that Mutoscope has enjoyed in the 51 years of their existence, many people are wondering what the city is up to. Is somebody's personal grudge in-volved here — is the whole thing a smoke screen — or what? The facts certainly do not warrant such commotion.

The Mutoscope firm is continuing right ahead with reconversion and production and eagerly looking forward to their day in court when they can bring out the true facts in this case and perhaps cause the press to wonder "what's all the shootin' for?"

# PRESS CLAIMS THAT PETRILLO'S FIGHT IS JUKES vs. MUSICIANS

NEW YORK—The April 15, 1946 issue of the "New Republic" magazine, this city, claims in itts "Washington Notes" column that, "On the labor front, the Senate has now passed, 47 to 3, the 'anti-Petrillo bill,' which had previously passed the House by 186 to 6.

As yet there have been no efforts made by "Little Caesar," but all in the juke box trade are aware that he will not let this sweet revenue go unchallenged and with the many victories he has already won — he may prove to be a serious threat.)







## INTERNAL REVENUE DEPT. HEAD TELLS PRESS "NO SLOT DRIVES"

## Claims "Unusual" for Public to be Able to View Revenue Dept. License Data

CINCINNATI, O .- Thomas A. Gallagher, Collector of Internal Revenue in this city, told newsmen here recently that his office was not initiating any drives against slot machines.

His statement was made following the publication here of slot machine registrations which appeared in the newspapers thruout this territory.

Gallagher's statement follows: "The Collector's Office is neither initiating nor participating in any slot machine drive. We have not and are not now publishing facts and figures with reference to slots registered in this district.

"The fact is that under the law and as an exception to the general rule, the slot records are open to public inspection and, of course, this includes the newspaper men.'

Many coinmen here have expressed bitter resentment over the fact that the Internal Revenue Office is obliged by law to grant public view to slot machine records. It is felt here that the payment of a federal license fee should carry with it the provision that all information given to the U. S. Government would remain confidential.

In the meanwhile, it was reported that the city sheriff, C. Taylor Handman, is having two deputies copy the list, and he has called all mayors, inviting them to use the information. Oris E. Hamilton, City Safety Director, also received a copy of the list.

The State Liquor Enforcement Executive, William E. Hopper, has notified all clubs in his district holding D-4 liquor licenses that they risk revocation of their licenses and confiscation of the machines if any are found by state liquor enforcement officers. He had given them a one week notice to dispose of the equipment.



Sponsored by the Red Cross, the dancing sessions have become a vital part of the medical program being followed to aid the Navy, Marine and Coast Guard heroes who lost arms and legs in helping to win the war.

#### Frozen Food Vending May Be Delayed 3 Years

COLUMBUS, O.—Coinmen who have been considering the operation of frozen food vending machines will be obliged to wait three years before the frozen food industry levels off to the point where the operator can count on a normal supply situation

This is the opinion of R. M. Fisher, expert in frozen food matters and general manager of the Creasey Co.,

who spoke before the annual meeting of the Associated Wholesale Food Distributors of Ohio, held here recently.

Multiplicity of brands and products, an inadequate quality control program, and insufficient plants for expanded production were among the reasons for the three year delay predicted by Fisher.



#### Kansan Calls "Automat" "A Glorified Slot"

HAYS, KANS .- The "News", local paper here carried the following account of a visit paid to the "Automat" in New York City by Kenneth Freidel, editor of another newspaper

"An automat is a glorified slot machine," wrote Freidel, who ate breakfast there. "The process of eating at one of these grub garages is this," he continued, "You get larger money changed into nickels, dimes and quarters at a booth where presides a bored and weary cashier. Then you proceed over to the wall where behind glass in little pigeon-holes are contained the various dishes. If you want coffee you push a nickel in a slot, turn a crank, and a cupful of stuff comes out of a spigot. No backtalk from the waitress, no good morning from the waitress, no nonsense of any kind."

Then Freidel went on to explain how impersonally personal is the place, with any sort of character likely to be your dinner companion. "You find yourself plumped down beside somebody," he continued, 'and he is not interested in how you feel, your opinion on Truman, or what you think of the UNO. He just wants to be let alone while he gets his food down.

"I'm not surprised at anything here," Freidel concluded.

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

## TAX JUKES IN REGULATORY ORDINANCE TO "CONTROL NOISE" AND "IMMORAL SELECTIONS"

LA SALLE, ILL.—This city wrote an entirely new kind of ordinance for the juke box trade this past week. In the first place, and for the first time, juke boxes are being taxed here at the rate of \$15. per yearly license fee.

But what came as a surprise to juke box coinmen here was the "reg-ulatory ordinance" under which this new tax came into being.

This regulatory ordinance opened the way for complaining neighbors of establishments which operate juke boxes by making the owner subject to a fine of not less than \$5 and not more than \$100 if the noise becomes

The city can also govern the records played in the juke box by censoring what it deems "immoral" selections.

It was specifically noted by Mayor Orr of this city that complainants on either or both of these charges must appear in court and sign complaints before the police will take steps towards enforcement of this regulation.

#### **BOSTON NEWS BUREAU** REPORTS MANY NEW **JOBS CREATED BY JUKES**

BOSTON, MASS. — The "Boston News Bureau," this city, reported this past week that, "Many new jobs are seen by manufacturers in the making and servicing of juke boxes this year and in 1947.

"An estimated 400,000 beaten and worn boxes, barraged with nickels since 1942, are ready for replacing."

## WANTS 71/2 COIN

NEW YORK - Dr. J. Rice Gibbs, dentist of this city, put teeth into the odd change problem this past week when he recommended that a new coin worth 7½c be minted.

Dr. Gibbs was inspired by the present N.Y. subway problem which must raise its fare. The fare at present is 5c but the subways are operating under a very great deficit and are thinking of increasing the fare to 10c. Dr. Gibbs logically points out that the 7½c coin would solve this problem and would save subway riders some \$60,000,000 per year.

(All coinmen should crusade for the 7½c coin for this would be the solution to the needed revenue increase. Instead of 70%/30% commission basis; instead of 10c per play, 3 plays for 25c; and instead of "front money"; in most instances the 7½c coin would answer the need to obtaining greater collections.)

## Orange Juice V'nd'r

MIAMI, FLA.—A new orange juice vender has been invented here. This machine shows each phase of its operation openly to the public.

When a nickel is dropped into the unit an orange rolls into view from a refrigerated container. It is sliced open right in front of the purchaser (inside of the machine) and then crushed while the buyer looks on.

The juice then spills into a paper cup which, when filled, is then thrust out to the customer.

(This machine has been discussed for some time and as yet vending machine ops are wondering whether it is practical. The problem of the quantity of oranges, the refrigeration unit, what happens to the pulp, sanitation, and many other angles enter into whether the machine is, or is not, as yet practical for coin operation.)

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
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
