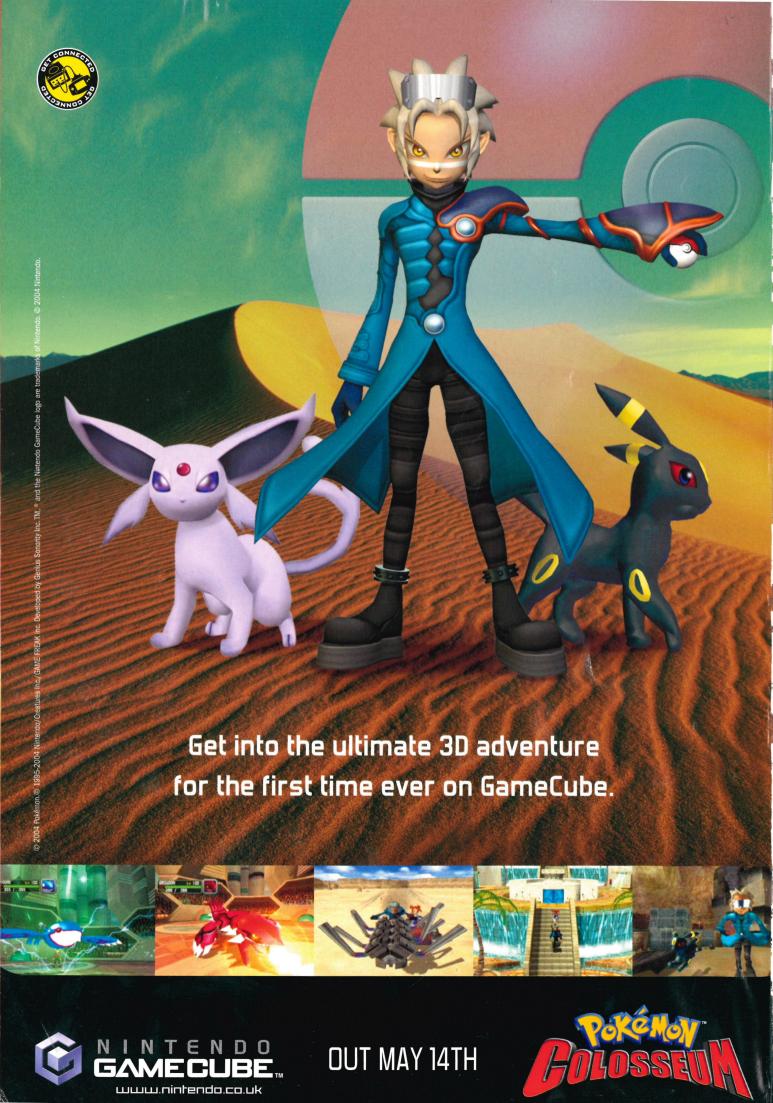

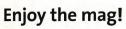

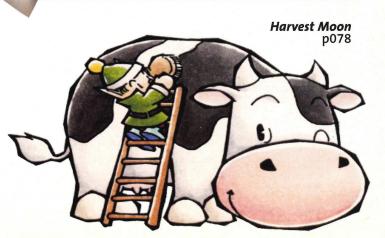

You'll be reading this review a full month before *Pokémon* Colosseum is released to an expectant UK and there's a whole nation of Pokémon fanatics counting down the seconds. How could we keep you all waiting? Remember the Pokémon Stadium games on N64? They were great. Battling in 3D was a real treat to everyone who had adored the little critters since they first appeared, pixelated and blinking on the old Game Boy.

Pokémon Colosseum takes all the battling glory of the Stadium games and adds an entire, brand-spankingnew 3D adventure. Come the end of May, you'll be wandering around the towns and buildings of

a new Pokémon world, battling all of your favourite creatures once again. Pokémon fans, it's

time to freak out. Every Pokémon from Pokémon Fire Red, Leaf Green, Ruby and Sapphire is in here. Blimey, that's nearly 400 in total. That means you'll be seeing Treecko, Torchic and Mudkip, as well as the return of old favourites like Bulbasaur, Mewtwo and all-time daddy of Pokémon, Pikachu, in all their hi-res, 3D beauty.

But you won't be running circles in tall grass to stumble across Pokémon in the wild. There are many differences between Pokémon Colosseum's Story mode and the portable games, with the way Pokemon are caught being one of the

more significant.

In the Story mode you've got a gadget called the Snag Machine. This cheeky device allows you to snag Pokémon from other trainers during battle. How cool is that? What?! No, the answer is "very cool". Very cool, indeed. >>

>> This may sound like blatant robbery, but there are rules. You can't just steal every Pokémon you see. You are not a common thief, which is a shame - it would have been fun. You know all about those annoying Trainers who jump at you in need of a battle when all you want to do is get to where you're going. "Lady Cindy would like to battle"? Naff off! "No"? I'll have your Pokémon, then. Cheers!

Unfortunately you can only Snag Pokémon with á black aura, known as Shadow Pokémon. The story is that you are an ex-member of a gang of Pokémonthieving scoundrels called Team Snagem. In the intro movie your character attacks the Team Snagem hide-out in Eclo Canyon, stealing the Snag Machine and blowing up the building, leaving nothing but a pile of rubble and a bunch of angry thugs.

Shortly after, you rescue a girl who was kidnapped by two Snagem members and discover that the evil team are turning

normal Pokémon into evil, Shadow Pokémon in the hope of creating the ultimate fighting beast. Your job is to steal back the Shadow Pokémon, heal their corrupted hearts and use them to fight the

Snagem dudes, putting them out of business.

The plot is quite cool and there are a lot more surprises that unfold as you go. »

Hearts of darkness

■ First, know this – Shadow Pokémon are not a Type of Pokémon in the way that Steel, Water or Grass Pokémon are. They are normal Pokémon of any breed that have had their hearts closed to the outside world. In normal language, that means they're turned into psychotic killers. Cool! But what are they like to use? Find out...



Snag Shadow Pokémon from other Trainers. If you spot one with a black aura, grab it quick before it trashes your fighters.



Those Pokémon can special Shadow moves that do the same damage against all Types of Pokémon. Nasty recoil damage, though.



They get angry and enter Hyper mode, making them strong and unruly. They won't take Potions and sometimes attack Trainers.



They can't level-up, so don't have an XP bar. Battle and Call them to drop the dark meter, then it's off to Celebi Shrine to be cured.

>> But only being able to catch Shadow Pokémon is very restrictive and almost completely removes the collecting element that fans enjoy in the portable games. You'll only ever be able to catch a relatively small number of the Pokémon in the game and you can't upload Pokémon from a GBA cart to use in the Story mode, so you'll never



truly catch 'em all.

You start off with an Espeon and Umbreon in your squad and you have to build up your team with the Shadow Pokémon you Snag. This means you'll need to track down the Team Snagem dudes and rob their dark fighters, travelling from town to town until you track down their base.

The first town you visit is Phenac City. This is where the familiarity of the Pokémon world hits you. All the typical landmarks of a Pokémon town are there: the Mart where you can buy healing and power-up items, the PC building (the new equivalent of a Poké Centre), the Gym where you can fight the town's best Trainers and all the

adventures, but with no Routes to wander down your exploration is cut to the bare minimum. It also makes the land of Oore feel a bit incomplete and not at all like the rich, Pokémon-infested worlds of the portable games.

Of course, there are two halves to this game. Anyone who's played the *Pokémon Stadium* games on N64 will know what to expect from Battle mode in *Pokémon Colosseum*. It's the part of the game that allows you to fight your Pokémon in 3D without the complications of a long-winded story line. You just choose your team and unleash their fury on other Trainers' unfortunate Pokémon.

This is also where all the connectivity features come into play. Get mates round with their GBAs and *Pokémon* carts and you can link them to the GameCube to use your killer *Ruby* and *Sapphire* teams to battle each other in gorgeous GameCube graphics. And don't forget that when *Pokémon Fire Red* and *Leaf Green* arrive later this year, they'll be compatible too, so your *Colosseum* battling will rage on well into next year. >>

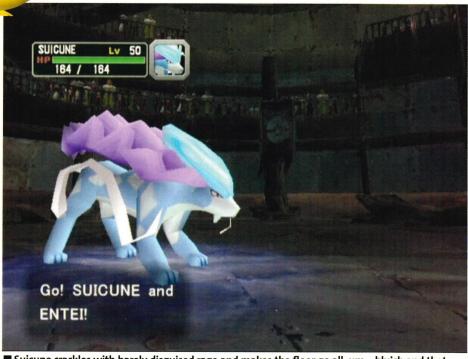

You've got to put together a team of Pokémon – either from your Story mode adventure or from ones you've uploaded from your GBA adventure – and fight your way through 100 Pokémon Trainers. Each Trainer gets tougher and smarter as you go. So if you try to enter with a half-arsed team, the later ones will slap you and your critters into next week.

The classic *Pokémon Stadium* games on N64 were strictly for *Poké* fans who loved nothing more than to battle. Those people should automatically get *Pokémon Colosseum*. It's as simple as that. The

Interview by Chris Kohler

We caught 'em all!

We chat with *Pokémon Colosseum* developers, Genius Sonority. Some of them like talking, others do not.

ur US correspondent was one of a select few to participate in a round-table interview with the key members of Genius Sonority, the developers of *Pokémon Colosseum*. Let's hear what these industry veterans had to say about crafting the first true *Pokémon* RPG on GameCube.

NOM UK: Was there any consideration to make an online competition within the game?

Yamana: I was not thinking about online battles and I am not planning for future online battles.

NOM UK: The story line to Colosseum is a bit more dark and brooding than we have seen in previous Pokémon titles. What kind of challenges did you have when creating a darker, deeper plot? Do you feel that this type of story line alienates the original age demographic that the Pokémon games have been aimed at?

Miura: We wanted to create a Pokémon game that is different from the previous series, so we made this game feel a little bit darker. But although it has dark feelings, once you start playing the game you will know that it also has the familiar Pokémon world. It is not going to turn any established Pokémon fans away.

NOM UK: The Dragon Quest series, which four of you have worked on, may be the only series in the history of Japanese gaming that has been bigger than

Pokémon. What would you say are the fundamental differences between the development and appeal of each series? Yamana: That's a tough question, but thanks for asking! The difference between Pokémon and Dragon Quest lies in the balance between the story and game strategy. I think Pokémon requires more strategy, where Dragon Quest is heavier on the story side.

The reason why I wanted to try the challenge of creating a *Pokémon* game is that I wanted *Pokémon* to feature more story, like *Dragon Quest*. To be honest, I'd like you to play *Pokémon Colosseum* and find out why I wanted to create it.

NOM UK: How does the Snagging feature work and how is it different from catching wild Pokémon in previous adventures?

Miura: "Snagging" is basically done during the battle and you will be taking away your opposing trainer's Pokémon. Why is it okay to do this? That's something you will have to find out by playing the game.

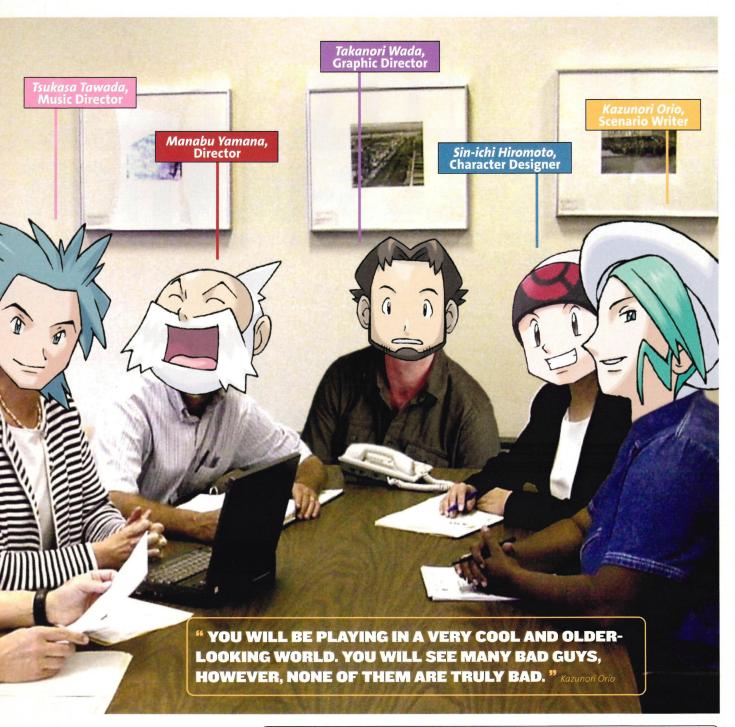

By introducing the Snagging feature we wanted to do something different and so, unlike other *Pokémon* games, you will be catching or Snagging Pokémon while battling other trainers.

NOM UK: The Pokémon Stadium games did not allow you to use items during battles, which is a key element in the Game Boy games. Is it the same way in Pokémon Colosseum? Or have you implemented the ability to use items this time around?

Miura: Even in the Game Boy games, when you play the link battles, trainers cannot use items. We followed this style of battle system, so when you play *Ruby* and *Sapphire* Pokémon in the battle mode you will not be able to use items. In the RPG scenario mode, you can use items.



NOM UK: You've previously spoken about how you geared the graphics and music toward an older audience. Did you also try to alter the actual gameplay to make it more difficult?

Yamana: When we were making the game, we did not change the age of the target audience. However, even if older players play this game, they will find it very

interesting and find out how deep the story line is.

NOM UK: In the RPG mode, will you be able to capture and train the Legendary Pokémon, such as Lugia or Entei? Yamana: That is a secret.

NOM UK: What is the best new feature in Colosseum that will attract gamers who've never played a Pokémon game?
Miura: Those players will be impressed

with seeing how lively the Pokémon are in action in the 3D world.

NOM UK: Do you see the concept of Snagging as something that will make its way into future Pokémon titles, or is it just a one-off deal?

Yamana: This is actually a secret. I cannot really answer it, but in the world of Pokémon Colosseum there is something very special and unique – you will know this eventually.

Does this document lay the Nintendo DS bare? **NOM** delve deeper...



Since Nintendo's announcement of the Nintendo DS back in January, gamers the world over have cried out for more information. Rumours have come and

gone, some sounding more plausible than others. The official word from Nintendo of Europe is that "no more information on the DS will be announced until E3". That was the position even after a fascinating Japanese specification sheet was leaked on the internet.

Now, we have to be clear that we have no evidence that this is the real deal. It wouldn't exactly be hard to mock up something like this as a hoax and pass it off as the real thing. But crucially, development sources have indicated to *NOM* that, official or otherwise, some of the information in the document is accurate – even Nintendo has gone on the record to talk about the memory specs like ARM7 and ARM9. Read on...

Nitro is the codename for the Nintendo DS in development circles. But it's not known if this is the final name of the Nintendo DS. Remember the Nintendo Dolphin? Exactly. Is this spec sheet real? Who knows.

These are two processors. An ARM7 like the GBA has and a 3D-capable ARM9. This much has already been confirmed by Ninty, so it's not exactly news.

Hmm, interesting. If this document is true, the DS will have four megabytes of main memory – the same as the N64 had originally. The eight suggests the development unit will have twice as much RAM for debugging purposes. The smaller values are ram caches for different chips.

Metroid and Zelda confirmed for E3?

Could sequels of two GameCube classics be playable at E3? We investigate...



It's going to be a stunning E3 this year with the Nintendo DS shaking its funky duel-screen stuff

and, if internet rumours are to be believed, two sequels of GameCube smash hits could also be on show.

American sources have stated that a one-level build of Metroid Prime 2 will be playable on the show floor and that the game is well on track for a 2004 release. However, that could all be speculation as when we approached a Nintendo spokesperson about this we were told that "we haven't confirmed what games will be playable at E3".

In his GDC address, *Zelda* guru, Eiji Aonuma, also confirmed that we will

We've heard whispers of co-operative gameplay in the follow up, as well as a slew of new moves and characters. Some are even saying that you'll be able to play as a new female superhero based on Sylvia, but we can't confirm that. Not until next month at least, when we'll have pictures of the game RIGHT HERE. Like you needed another reason to stay tuned...



World of Nintendo



Eiji Aonuma is the boss of the Zelda universe. If he fancies a cappuccino, he sends Ganondorf down to Starbucks. But when invited to speak at the Game Developers Conference in San Jose, USA, Mr Aonuma turned up in person instead of sending a little blond boy with a sword. Here are the edited highlights!

And Aonuma thing...

Link's boss passes Wind in San Jose. ZELDA on DS?!

"For roughly eight years, I've been doing work related to a game known as Zelda, although I joined Nintendo in 1988 at the time of The Adventure of Link. I didn't have much experience in playing games and I was particularly bad at playing games that required quick reflexes. The result was that I was under the impression that The Legend of Zelda was not a game that suited me. So what kind of games did suit me? Those would be text-based adventures.

"Of course, I felt it was strange that I ended up working on enemy design [on *Ocarina*]. But, the type of gameplay used in enemy battles becomes an extremely important mechanic in *Ocarina of Time*, so there was really no way for me to

"In Ocarina of Time, in addition to doing the dungeon design, I

also took up the challenge of incorporating adventure elements into dungeons. By which I mean, giving the dungeon some type of theme. such as rescuing the trapped Goron

or hunting down the Poe sisters.

"When he speaks, there is a phrase that Mr. Miyamoto always mentions that speaks directly about the very nature of the Zelda series. The phrase is, 'Zelda is a game that values reality over realism'. In the art world, realism is a movement to faithfully replicate the real world to whatever extent possible. Reality is not mimicking the real world, but rather making players feel that what they are experiencing is real.

The big difference is that even an exaggerated expression through cel-shading can be an effective means of making things

feel more real.

"So in 2004, we have seen that the Zelda series has developed into top-down styled games on the Game Boy Advance and into full 3D styled games on home consoles like the GameCube and the Nintendo 64. But, this year we will

see the release of the multiplayer game Four Swords, a game that links the Game Boy Advance to the GameCube for a top-down game, taking advantage of the GameCube's 3D engine and allowing for '2 1/2D' artistic expression. "So with this new expressive quality and the upcoming

quality and the upcoming release of the unique Nintendo DS system, I think we'll see more changes coming to the franchise — the likes of which we can talk about at E3, when we will also talk

That is to say, you've got to go through prolonged pain before you can get to *Custom Robo*'s good parts. We had always heard that the series was a kick-ass, four-player robot fighting game. Sadly when we booted up the import version, we couldn't find that part. To get to all the fighting, you've got to play through the Story mode first.

Nintendo says the story mode is an RPG. They're kidding. What you do is watch cutscenes play out, one after another, with a little bit of walking in between them. It is the tale of a young boy whose father was a Custom Robo



Custom what?

This is actually the fourth game in the mechtastic series. Learn more by reading on... Custom Robo is developed by NOISE, a Nintendo second-party developer. The first

two games were developed for the N64 and were pretty much like what you see here, just with awful, awful graphics.

for GBA, which didn't exactly offer all the bells and whistles of the home games – battles were fought in side-view 2D – but did contain lots of dialogue, just like the 'Cube version.

In fact, there are nearly 200 of them waiting to be found – guns, bodies, legs, pods and bombs. Changing your Robo's parts, you can create all kinds of different robots. And by mixing and matching parts, what you're doing is creating your own customised death machine.



The most important parts are the bodies, which determine whether your robot will end up as a slow, hulking behemoth or a light, speedy fighter. You'll choose from all-round Shining Fighter models, powerful Metal Grapplers, hard-to-catch Stealth Vanishers and sky-soaring Trick Flyers, to name but a few.

Then you start changing their limbs and weapons. New legs will make them jump higher or dash further. The gun is the main form of attack, so you'll have to decide whether you want a standard threebullet blast that travels in a straight line or a three-way gun that fires out nine weaker projectiles. The standard bombs try to fly right into your enemy's lap, but take such a long time that they'll usually end up where he was a few seconds

ago – so you might want bombs that plant explosions to his left and right. So now you've

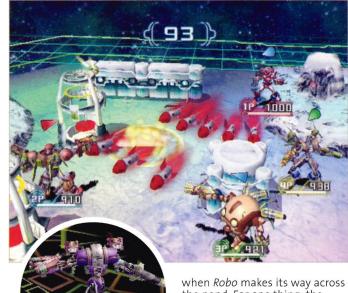

It's a touchingly common sight in the rural British garden. A little blue hedgehog in red shoes padding about just outside the patio doors. But what's this? A FOX?! Oh no, he's going to tear the hedgehog's throat out and leave his spiky cadaver in bits on your lawn. They're coming together... and the hedgehog has somehow combined with the fox to spring himself 30 feet into the air! Nature, kids, is beautiful.

Following on from Heroes, the latest handheld Hedgehog game is all about animal love. Unlikely cross-species teamwork, with a dumb A.I. animal or your dumb friend on the other end of a Link Cable. In terms of the gameplay it's the same as Heroes. You get a period of trademark berzerkness, a brief pause for teamwork, then full-on mentalness is resumed.

What else is new? There are these springs that fire you off really quickly and chequerboard-textured loops... ha ha! No, the traditional Sonic DNA is prominent and the new features are dripped in as you go. There

are cartoon-style seesaws with a rock on one side. Hit the raised end and the rock flies up, catapulting you miles when it lands. Better still is when you're flying along a ledge and it ends. You're halfway through a swearword, when you realise Sonic's caught a bungee cord and comes springing back.

At this stage, we can't say every addition is welcome. Not only is there a hub level to choose worlds, there's another hub to decide what order you want to

play the levels in. It's too slow, when all you want is blinding 2D speed.

The teamwork bits are like they were in Sonic Heroes. Use Tails to give you the gift of height, Knuckles to break stuff and Cream the Rabbit for the unstoppable power of cute. You select your animal team before heading into the level and certain combinations will make it easier for you. You don't have to involve Sonic at all actually. We imagine he sits in the hub area self harming with his own spikes though if you don't.

It's just not the same flinging the other guys around, though. The new flagpoles

that you twang off and springs that catch you and fling you aren't as much fun with an echidna. When you're grinding along a rail, you need to be Sonic. When you're hurtling up a 90° incline, you need to be Sonic. And of course, nobody blasts around a loop quite like Sonic. It's just like the old days, before people started whining

about camera angles.

It's hard to see where you're going, though. Sonic seems to be slightly larger on the screen, meaning Advance 3 looks lush, but you'll only discover a lot of the kill zones by thrashing in blindly at high speed. You have to remember where the spiky death block falls, rather than being able to see it and react. It's

to see it and react. It's frustrating, but an acceptable flipside to the rush of speed.

Next month, we'll have two copies and we'll see how the co-op play stacks up. We should also be able to print our own action-packed screenshots instead of these ones, supplied by the publisher. We'd have liked to show a bit more action and new features, but at least you can get a feel for the new geography. **Dean Scott**

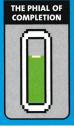

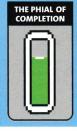

The depth of the gameplay has improved loads, too. As well as stomping around with Harry, you'll get to play as Hermione and Ron. There are sections where the conditions of the level or plot force you to use a particular character, just like in the scene we described earlier where Harry faints and you must use Ron to drag him away from the Dementors. Most of the time, though, you're free to switch control between them as you wish.

It works like a tag-team system. Each character has their own physical characteristics and unique spells. You'll have to switch between the three and use their skills to overcome puzzles and obstacles. You'll also need to make them work together to lift heavy objects and move them. For example, you might use Harry's agility to jump a big gap and push a switch to lower a bridge for the other two. Then it's up to Harry and Ron to lift a heavy metal gate for Hermione to get through (being the smallest she can squeeze under it). The exploration is a three-way effort. Mike Jackson

Really, what is the freaking point of making a shoot-'em-up when you can't be entirely sure of where the line is between life and death? The whole point of these games is evasion and returned fire, which is an absolute farce when the collision detection around your ship is bigger than the ship itself. We're good enough at games to evade a bullet that's millimetres from killing us. *R-Type III* doesn't give you the chance to show that.

This finished US version just stinks of a really bad conversion. There's no word on a UK release yet, but miss this and you won't miss out. Compared to the cracking *Gradius Advance*, this is a tragedy. The wide GBA screen is perfect for a sidescrolling shooter like this, but justice has clearly not been done.

There's still nothing like a fully tooled up R9 fighter, the Force Ball spinning on the front of the ship, barfing those red and blue hoop lasers across the screen. Possibly a few cheeky missiles arcing out as well. Maybe you're a bouncing laser

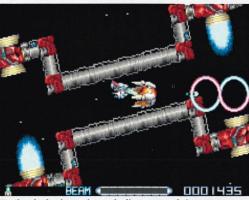

That's annoying, but not as annoying as hearing your Turtle repeating the same phrases over and over again as he hits people. At around the 87th repetition, your brain interprets "SLICE AND DICE!" as the code for you to kill the next real human you meet. Surely

with all the time and effort saved in not making a four-player mode, they could have given each Turtle more than three phrases to say? You're better off muting the sound and doing your own, possibly swear word-packed, commentary. "Eat it, DICK PATROL!"

We can imagine the younger Turtles fan having a blast with this, but most of you will be bored inside the first day. If you remember the four-player arcade machine from, ooh, years ago, then you know what you're getting into with this. Except that cost 10p to play and this is 40 notes. And that had four players. 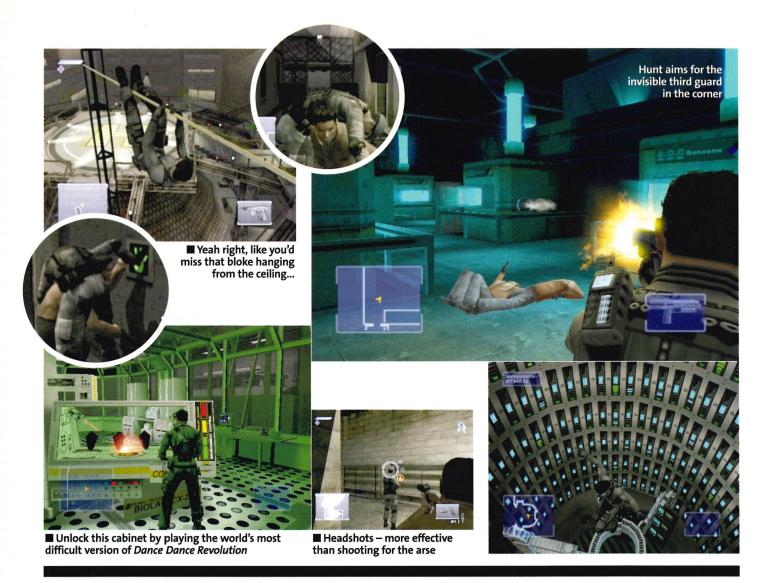

Your mission, should you choose to accept it, is to pretend Metal Gear isn't already out on 'Cube and see past all the cliches to enjoy Operation Surma on its own merits. A tough mission then.

Like *Prince Of Persia* and Splinter Cell before it, this is another game that's been out for ages on rival platforms and inexplicably delayed on the best of 'em all. Unlike those two though, we wonder whether this was worth the wait.

It's got explosions, mental gadgets and juicy stealth kills, but it still comes up short next to Snake and Sam in the stealth game standoff.

Squeezing you into the slinkily stealthy cat suit of Ethan Hunt, M:/ sends you on a series of missions to protect international security and neutralise the terrorist threat. Oh, and you're supposed to do it without anyone knowing you were ever there. Luckily, and as is fitting for a game based on the gadget-loving movies and TV series, M:/ gives you lots of cool toys to help you move quick like a cat and strike like silent lightning.

The gadgets are the best bit of the game. From the awesome binoculars that double up as a

kind of directional microphone to eavesdrop on guards' conversations, to a nifty laser cutter that can slice through steel doors like an eggy fart through a crowded room, it's all good. The Mission: Impossible branding helps with the suspension of disbelief in the gadgetry, too. Like when you're hacking hi-tech government terminals with what looks a bit like a vending machine wrist watch, for example. All you need is to hear that theme song kick in and you don't care how unrealistic it all is.

Sadly the same can't be said

for the real meat of the gameplay. The action is solid enough, but so derivative it's like the game is a remix of every other stealth title ever made. There's the bit where you hang suspended by the ventilation pipes ready to pounce on enemies below. There's the bit where you have to time your stealthy strides to pass CCTV cameras. There's even the bit where you sneak around corners in readiness to disable enemy goons with a swift chop to the Adam's apple. It's not that these cliches aren't done well, it's just that they seem woefully

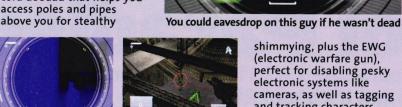

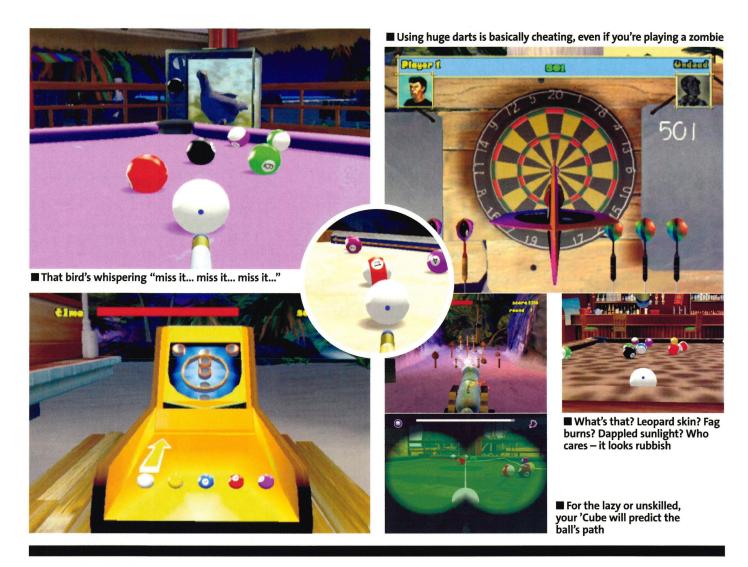

the enemy before they hit him. But he's slow and by the time he's raised his sword to attack, the enemy will very likely have already stuck their weapon in his huge face.

You can block some attacks, but Conan reacts so slowly it's pointless. Plus the computer steers your character

automatically towards the nearest enemy. You literally press nothing other than **a** during fights.

If you're surrounded there's no doubt you'll get hurt and if one enemy knocks you to the floor, another will usually hit you again before you can get up. Then they'll play tennis with Conan's head, while you mash your buttons angrily.

You can find more weapons and learn new moves, like a destructive spinningsword attack, but if you manage to play the game long enough to get them you're a retard.

Invisible walls stop you from passing through wide-open spaces and even something as simple as directing Conan is sloppy. They've built in a utility that makes Conan run on a continuous path when the camera is swivelled. But the camera is constantly moving, so Conan is never running in the direction you're pushing the 3D Stick. Get it? Neither did we.

The characters speak without moving their lips. It's like watching the original Resident Evil game on PlayStation when the characters start speaking in the cutscenes. There's no face animation at all. Their heads just bobble.

The detail in some of the environments is quite good, but that's about the only positive thing we have to say. This doesn't even do the movies justice and they're rubbish, too. Sorry Conan, you suck. Mike Jackson

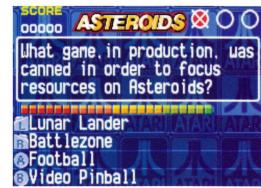

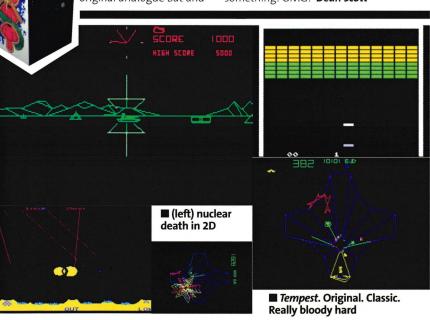

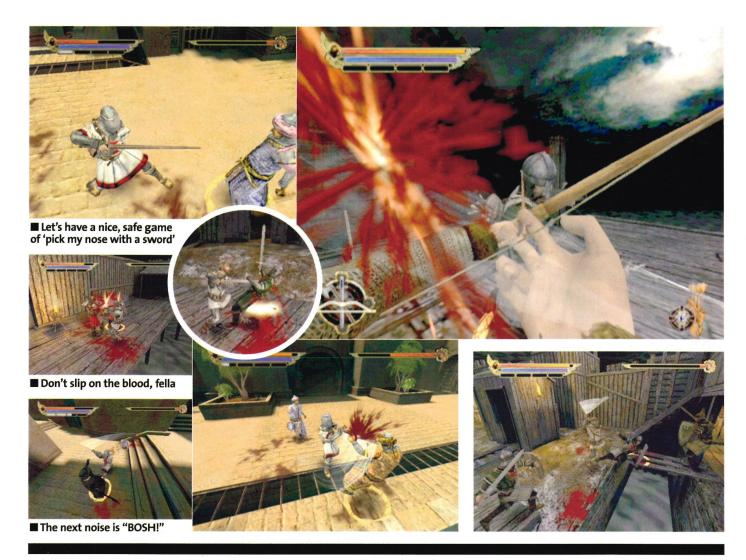

You scour sinister places like monasteries and catacombs in your search for the bishop, fighting his army of knights, ghosts and butcher monks who want to end you with their vicious-looking meat cleavers. You stroll from one room to the next, killing whoever is there and solving laughable puzzles that your

laughable puzzles that your kid sister could work out with ease.

Unsurprisingly your victims drop health and keys to help you progress and that's all that really happens. You open the door to the next room, you kill, you find a key and so on until you get out of the festering place to pick up the trail of the bishop again.

There ARE some cool moments though. Occasionally you'll face more than one enemy at a time and when they actually try and defend themselves instead of swinging madly into thin air you know you've got a fight on your hands. Defending yourself and waiting for the right opening lends itself to Zelda, but at least it makes it feel like you're in

the middle of a real sword fight. Some hard-fighting enemies require you to smash their shield in two before you can hurt them. Impressive combos make each kill more satisfying and the red stuff constantly splatters the walls and floor, so at least it does have a sense of realism. Keep your eyes peeled for a longer sword, an axe and a bow and

arrow for long-distant killing, too.
As Knights goes, the hack 'n' slash action doesn't sound that much different to Lord of the Rings, but at least you cared about the characters in LOTR, the animation was pretty good and enemy A.I. was sound. Here it's just average. At times characters slide over scenery,

some of the environments look ghastly (although the citadel of Acre and the Holy City look great) and more often than not you're forced to fight the fiends from a camera that seems to be filming from Pluto.

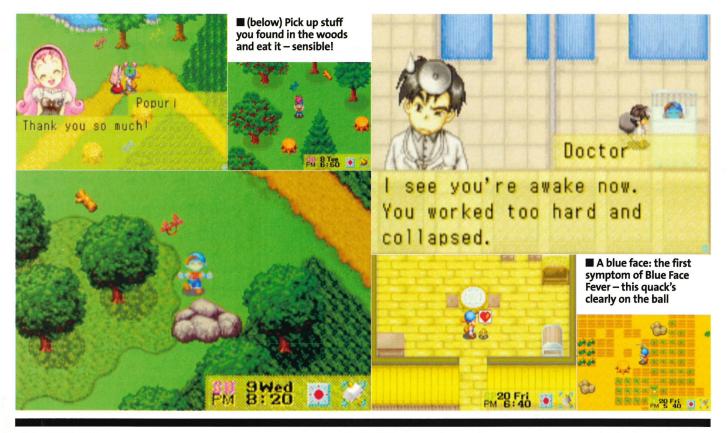

Obsession is good. Addiction is good. They show personality, not a lack of it. If someone calls you an obsessive it just means they're jealous. Fact. They've got nothing in their life and they just want to have a dig at yours. Your GBA keeps you up all night while they nod off ten minutes into Crimewatch.

Enter Harvest Moon, a game designed for obsessives and as addictive as life itself not one for casual blasters, this. After the prologue, in which you're gifted a run-down farm by some old duffer, your objectives are made clear: build a profitable business

and please the local ladies. Fulfiling them will be a lifetime's work.

It's a game of economics. Buy seeds, sow them, apply water (for days on end), harvest, sell your produce, repeat with more seeds. All the time you're making money. It makes you wonder why you're sitting playing a game about profit when you could be making REAL money. Your REAL garden's a mess, but you're pulling up virtual weeds. Your REAL mutt howls for attention as you pet a 2D puppy. You

feel confused. You play on. It's compelling. You realise you've been playing for days without stamping on a single alien face.

FOMT won't thrill you. It won't even try. It's got a different agenda. You won't be leaping from your seat, screaming "have my level-two watering can in your face", but you'll smile having tilled a field before you black out from fatigue or rejoin real life. It becomes a part of you, a virtual home. Comparisons with *Animal Crossing* are inevitable, but this is more structured. You have a purpose. Getting your first cow or chicken is an event - you've worked hard for it and that work has paid off.

Overcoming daily frustrations is a big

part of FOMT. The grind might get you down, as might the attitude of the locals. Go to bed exhausted and you'll oversleep the next day. The supermarket closes at 5pm and stays shut two days a week - not good if you need supplies. You'll usually wake up to a field full of weeds that weren't there yesterday and a horse that hates you because you didn't brush it. And the pub shuts at 10pm.

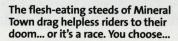

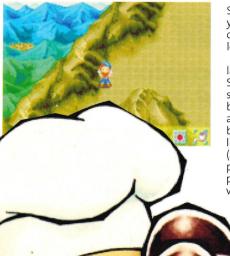

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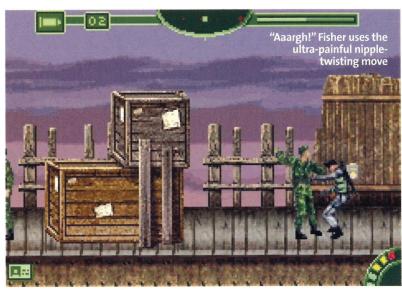

Splinter Cell: andora Tomorrow



With a title so utterly nonsensical, you'd be right to have low expectations. Publisher: Ubi Soft Web: www.splintercell.com

> Like its predecessor, Pandora Tomorrow encourages stealth. As Splinter Cell operative, Sam Fisher, you can sneak along walls, disarm cameras and climb on overhead pipes to avoid enemies. However, nine times out of ten, it's almost to your advantage to run around wildly and blow the head off anything that moves, which might be fun if Sam didn't move like a water-bloated corpse.

Your punishment for taking such action is a siren and a small battalion of armoured guards on your tail. Apparently they arrive through any of the doors in your

vicinity, but they won't do so if the door happens to be on your screen at the time. In fact, if there's only one door around, you can avoid the guards completely, just by standing in front of it and

waiting for the alarms to stop. Even if you're unable to cover a door, there's another easy way to avoid capture. Simply run to the nearest door and step through it. A guard will be waiting on the other side, gun at the ready. Step back through the door before he fires and you'll be face-toface with another guard. Go back through the door and repeat the process until the alarms stop. The guards will disappear, as if they've forgotten you were

ever there.

Each of the game's nine missions is divided up into a smaller number of objectives, which seem to get more ambiguous as you go. The average player, that being myself and anyone not on the Ubisoft development team, can never truly know what they're supposed to be doing at any given time.

On more than one occasion, you can step onto perfectly innocent-looking terrain, only to be bombarded with the MISSION FAILED screen, which apparently is the game's cute little way of telling you that you're walking in the wrong direction. At other times, nonchalantly killing the thirtieth identical soldier in a row also

resulted in failure, because apparently this special little sprite is the only one who can tell me the code I didn't know I needed.

Luckily, the game allows you to fail and start over infinitely, giving you ample opportunity to discern just what exactly it

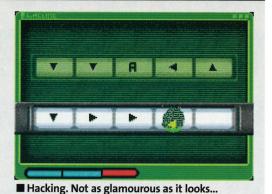

expects you to be doing. It's much like taking a driving test with a deranged and silent instructor. If

Don't worry about getting lost, though. *Pandora Tomorrow* is easily the most linear game ever made. The entire adventure consists of trying to figure out how to unlock doors to advance, which you do repeatedly until your mission, whatever that was, is completed. The rest comes across as mere padding to what would otherwise be a very simple and brief killing spree.

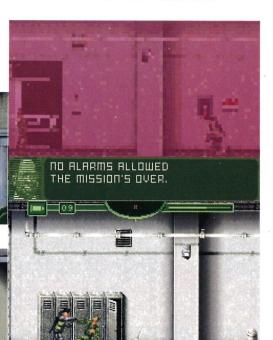
Doors can be unlocked in a variety of ways, though there is only one solution to each individual door, be it a key card, picking the lock, hacking into a security computer via a series of what seem like simple little programming demos, or by forcing an enemy to open it for you.

To its credit, Pandora Tomorrow does have crisp, detailed graphics in many places. However, they do wear thin once you've seen them repeated half a dozen times. The music is certainly varied and

It's a stunning achievement. Some said it couldn't be done, but Digital Eclipse didn't listen. They powered past the doubters and created a game so astonishingly mundane it could have appeared at any time in the last 20 years.

The levels are a kind of surreal-bycommittee yawn, lacking the originality of the books and often so cluttered that you'll miss one of the collectathon items. In the grandfather clock stage you need to grab tiny clocks - that's nice and confusing, thanks.

There are only two reasons you'd buy this. Either you're eight, you've just seen the movie and you've never played a video game before, or you've wandered, blindfolded, into a games shop as a bet - the box is indistinguishable by touch alone.







Scooby-Doo! Mystery Mayhem

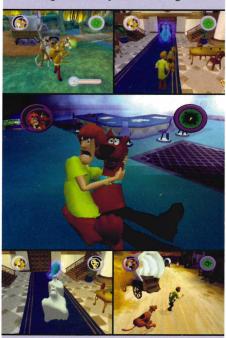

You might be used to people laughing at you while you play games. All those failed attempts to pull that tricky wall-run/wall-jump combo in *Prince of Persia* that end in repeated spikage in the ass. Or the times you've sent Mario plummeting to his death in Noki Bay. We pity you.

But you'll feel right at home with this new Scooby game. It has canned laughter already in it, see? It's just one of the touches that makes Mystery Mayhem the most authentic Scooby game out there. From the cheesy plot and dialogue, to the levels that are set out as individual episodes of the show, even the constant snacking - it's all in there.

Whether you care about *Scooby-Doo!* or not, there's still a decent enough collect-'em-up on offer here. Scooby and Shaggy work co-operatively to pass obstacles and you can switch control between them. Apparently Dragon Ball Z is really cool. Fair enough. Trends come and go. We remember when Turtles and Transformers were big first time around. Anyone remember Biker Mice from Mars? Next week it'll be eight-legged sharks with lasers for teeth.

Some things don't change though. Great games remain great but scarce, while shoddy licensed beat-'em-ups choke the shelves and top the charts. *DBZ: Taiketsu* will probably sell a million copies, most of which will, quite rightly, end up in a landfill site somewhere in Essex.

It's easy to tell that Taiketsu is rubbish: its presentation is weak; the fighters move stiffly and have limited attacks; and the sound effects are confined to stifled grunts.

While there are 15 DBZ characters to use and locations such as Master Roshi's Island, it doesn't look enough like the anime to be convincing. That cool jumping-in-the-airwith-loads-of-thin-lines-around-you-thing that they do has made it in, but it's not used well: you leap into the sky and mash the buttons, Track & Field style. It's rubbish.

Why didn't they do what Marvel did and get Capcom to seamlessly insert their characters into a proven fighter? DBZ vs. Capcom might have been wicked. This isn't.







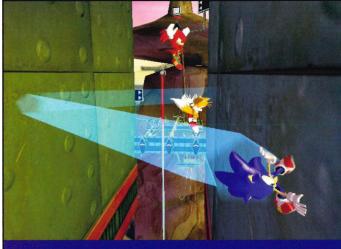
