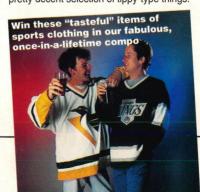

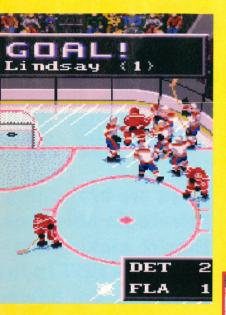

Ah, the lovely sea air, the gorgeous view of the English Channel and as many goes on *Virtua Racing* as you could wish for. This may all sound like a dream but it was, in fact, the press opening of Sega World – Bournemouth, a huge 24,000 sq. ft. arcade with all the Sega stuff you could ever wish for. But what has this arcade got that all the others haven't?

Well, several things actually. Although this is Sega's arcade flagship (and as such will get all those fabulous games before anywhere else, even London), there's more to this than meets the eye. With other activities such as Karaoke Rooms, Mini Ten Pin Bowling (imaginatively called Sonic Strike), children's areas and even a Burger King, this is one seriously cool place to hang out. But, and this is where the hard sell comes in, there's a Sega shop. If you want anything Sega, from the latest game to that lovely fluffy Tails character you've always had your eye on, this is the place to get it. Set in a lovely clean environment, with plenty of room to move and lots of games to play on, this is the first of a new breed of arcade centres which Sega hope to open around the country, but if you're desperate for some serious Sega action, get down to Bournemouth and have a whale of a time.

ver the past few months, Sega's name has been linked with all sorts of unlikely businesses: cable TV operators, giant theme parks, "family" amusement arcades and even Japanese airlines. So what's going on?

Well, it could look pretty bad, but on the positive side let's start off with the following (vaguely amusing) conundrum. What have the following got in common: Carlsberg, Sega, the M4 and Neil's aunt Beryl?

Tough one isn't it? (No substitute for the lack of aforementioned amusement though – Neil). The rather surprising answer is that none of them are console manufacturers.

With Carlsberg and the M4, we expect no argument. Brewing lager and, er, being a very long road are the respective bags that they're into. With Neil's aunt Beryl, you'll just have to trust us, she's a hotel receptionist.

But Sega? Well, OK. Sega manufacture consoles, but they are not a console manufacturer. There's a difference. Manufacturing consoles is just an important ingredient in what they do, they don't purely manufacture consoles.

No, Sega are an entertainment company. How do we know? Because Nick Alexander, president of Sega Europe, told us so. Why do we believe him? Firstly, because Nick's a good guy and he wouldn't lie to us, and, secondly, there's plenty of evidence to back up the crafty old rogue's preposterous claim.

You may have noticed some of this evidence, as the Sega name is cropping up in wider and wider and weirder and weirder circles: Cable TV, theme parks, airlines etc.
But the question is, while Sega are branching out and going for broke, where does this leave the Mega Drive? At the bottom of a bloody long list and crushed by mammoth theme parks and global TV networks: that's what could be interpreted.

# WHAT ABOUT THE MEGA DRIVE?

"Certainly not," Alexander insists. "No one should be concerned in the slightest about the importance of our consoles. They are still absolutely our core business.

"But if you take Sega as a whole, consumer sales account for around 70% of our business and it is simply not good sense to rely too heavily on one area.

"We've seen incredible growth in console sales over the last few

years, but it just can't be sustained at its current rate. There will be a slow down. By exploring other markets, we make sure that we are in a better position to be around longer and stronger. If the games market ever did dip dramatically, I would have thought that was excellent news for Mega Drive owners."

And Alexander also feels that there could be a more direct and immediate benefit in the consumer market. He believes that by working on projects like VR theme parks, there could be some sort of technological trickle-down effect.

"Remember, Sega started out in the arcades and the Mega Drive itself is a result of arcade technology. I think that by researching VR and working with people like W Industries (VR pioneers and the firm behind the systems at Piccadilly's

Trocadero) we can only learn more, and apply our knowledge to home systems."

Sega have recently signed a deal to work in partnership with WI, their main task being to come up with VR arcade

machines for the new Family Entertainment Centres that Sega are opening up. Already popular in Japan and with the first European FEC site having been opened in Bournemouth last month, Sega plan to open more "as fast and as frequently as appropriate sites become available".

Sega are already heavily involved in the arcade market; they own around 1,500 amusement centres around the world, but these FECs are from another planet.

"They're more like theme parks," claims Alexander. (The theme seems to be incredible rides that blow your mind and lose your stomach.) "They're the ideal environment in which to display things like the AS-1 and R360 and there will also be VR experiences."

Sonic will be putting in an appearance too in his own arcade game, housed in a customised Sonic cabinet and due to be launched in 1994. But perhaps the most exciting spin-off that Sega are currently involved in is the establishment of what they have been joking about in its Mega CD campaign; Sega TV.

In the US, Sega have teamed up with Time Warner (the biggest entertainment corporation in the world) and Tele Communications Inc to form a new cable company planning to pump Sega games down cables, through a decoder box and straight into the TV. The system goes online in September in four test markets and could eventually hit 20 million homes.

Alexander revealed to us, however, that a similar project is "almost certain" to be up and running in the UK in 1994.

The penetration of cable over here is not high, but exactly the same set-up as the one being implemented in the States would be possible through satellite broadcasting.

Sega are currently in negotiations with all of Europe's leading satellite broadcasters, including, of course, Sky TV.

"I'd be very surprised indeed if there wasn't a Sega channel by the end of 1994," Alexander confirms, "and if we went through satellite, all you'd need would be a dish and a little black decoding box."

The channel, like movie channels (and

exclusively revealed in MEGA issue nine) would have a selection of around 20 to 30 "old but not that old" Mega Drive games to choose from, plus one or two level previews of new titles. There is also the

possibility that, as with some movies on America's HBO Channel, a handful of games would be written specifically for Sega TV. Whether or not it'll feature that grinningdeath's-head fat bloke and pointless parodies of Apocalypse Now remains to be seen.

So, with Sega TV very firmly on the agenda and the possibility of trickle-down from the spectacular new Sega theme parks, Sega's diversification looks anything but a retreat from being the number one console manufacturer in the world.

#### **WILL SEGA SURVIVE?**

It is obvious that consoles cannot carry on growing at the rate that they have and it has to be probable that, simply through the vagaries of fashion and cultdom, there may come a time when the games market goes through a decidedly slow patch. If that killed Sega off, what would happen to the supply of games for the Mega Drive? Not a pleasant thought, right?

A better scenario is Sega continuing to supply some of the best games in the world for the best consoles on the market – and being able to do so because even if that market is in depression, Sega can survive because of its strength in other areas.

Altogether now: "There will always be a Sega..."

Sega have been showing off early versions of Sonic CD at their London HQ, and it's looking good. The main bulk of the game is the same as

Sonic's always been - fast, frantic, platform action - with just a couple of new animations and redesigned levels. But it's the bonus sub game that will set Sonic CD apart, much as Sonic 2 improved on the original. This time Sonic finds himself on a 3D racetrack, similar to how Mario starred in Nintendo's "Super" Mario Kart. Are Sega using the Mega CD to emulate the SNES purely "because they can"?

Sonic can turn on the spot, run (in a very strange manner - wait until you play it) and jump, in a bid to knock all of the spaceships that are circling the race track out of the sky. It looks great, although it must be said that the 3D doesn't look quite as impressive as Thunderhawk.

The actual structure of Sonic CD isn't in place, but it looks like this sub game will be entered from the main game much in the same way as the Special Stage could be dabbled with in Sonic 2.

Another addition is the appearance of Sonic's missus who appears at various stages of the game entrapping Sonic in cuddles, leaving him open to attack. Trouble and strife, readers. Big style.

There's also an evil alter-ego of Sonic who crops up from time to time, but (in the words of Sega's own marketing department), "we're not really sure what this geezer's doing here, to be honest". It'll be a nice surprise when we do find out.

One thing that is missing at this stage in development is a two-player mode, and at the moment Sega have no plans to include one. Big mistake, we feel, but there you go.

I remember the day very well. For the whole of the previous day, a tense hush had fallen over the office. Everyone went home that evening without saying a word. The next morning, once the day had finally arrived, things were worse.

post room bloke, handed the parcel to Neil, and within seconds it had been opened to reveal a shiny new copy of Earnest Evans on Mega CD.

It was like Christmas had come, everyone cheered, drank, hugged each other and danced around the maypole that we'd hastily constructed a couple of days previously. This truly would be the best day of Neil, Andy, Paul and Amanda's lives. How could it fail to be. The power of the Mega CD finally realised. The scaling and rotation exploding out of the screen and the soundtracks, oh my, the soundtracks, and the most stunning character animation and extensive platform gameplay ever seen and experienced on a Sega console. And indeed we weren't disappointed. How we gasped when we saw how well the hero of the game moves. So fluid, so smooth, so, so...

OK readers, let's face it, so cack. He walks like a, er, well, like something that's having great trouble sending coherent signals from its brain to its limbs. It's hilarious. His arms and legs sort of rotate around independently of each other and what's worse without very much regard to whether there's actually any scenery around. It's quite possible to end up on your head with your legs and arms gaily waving around under the mistaken impression that they're still taking part in some 'walking along'-type exercise. I could highlight the rest of the game's faults but it's far easier to highlight it's good points, here goes:

And that's it.

# Saturn based on Virtua Racing!

Believe the hype. The latest word from Sega is that Saturn, the 32-bit successor to the Mega Drive, is based on the hardware used inside Sega's pocket money-vaporisingly awesome coin-op *Virtua Racing*. There's been no official announcement on Saturn's tech spec, but MEGA's sources at Sega have confirmed that the new machine will be awesome.

This principle of using trickle-down arcade technology to form the basis of home consoles was restated by Sega USA's Tom Kalinske when he pointed out to MEGA that "with our arcade experience, we know more about 32-bit technology than anyone else".

This was backed up by Sega Europe's head-honcho Nick Alexander, who pointed out that "Sega started out in the arcades and the Mega Drive itself is a result of arcade technology. I think that by... (working with sophisticated, top-of-the range games systems)... we can only learn more and hopefully apply our knowledge to home systems".

Of course, Sega aren't saying much about Saturn at the moment – all their promotional effort is behind the Mega CD. But if you want to take a glimpse into the future, check out your local arcade for a *Virtua Racing* coin-op. In less than 18 months time you could well be playing this arcade classic at home...

# Keeping the MEGA DRIV

Software Project Co-ordinators, to find out what's new... ega want to welcome you to a third generation of carts, that look set to keep the Mega Drive at the forefront of console technology through 1994 and beyond. Digital Signal Processing (DSP), Dynamic Play Adjustment (DPA) and QSound are just some of the techniques Sega's designers are using to make sure that Mega Drive gaming continues to evolve

Effectively, Mega Drive carts are being souped-up, customised and refined much in the same way as a car would be. The Mega Drive game of '94 will involve the sort of technical trickery, gadgetry and peripheral add-ons that will make the game the equivalent of a Williams' Formula One racing car compared to the humble Ford Escort games that were around three years ago.

#### **GOLDEN YEARS**

and standards continue to rise.

As we speak, the Mega Drive is enjoying its golden years - it's the most popular console in the world (and that's official folks) with the most games and the most exciting new developments. However, time passes quickly in the hi-tech world of computer technology, and so although the Mega Drive is now only three years old, it's actually quite a veteran of the console scene.

When it first went on sale in the UK in September 1990 it was the hot piece of kit fresh from Japan - years ahead of its time. The first Mega Drive games were straightforward, basic 2-Mbit affairs - barely scratching the surface of what the Mega Drive was capable of. These "first generation" games were OK, but little to prepare us for the impact that, in July 1991, Sonic The Hedgehog first made on the gamesplaying world. In the previous 12 months, programmers the world over had been getting to grips with the Mega Drive's custom chips and the comparatively huge amount of memory space which a 4-Mbit cart offered.

But since the breathtaking leap forward in Mega Drive game standard that was the original Sonic The Hedgehog, Mega Drive games haven't, technically, improved greatly.

The video-game war is a bloody one - and second best is

demanding faster, more sophisticated games, Sega's R&D teams have been back to the drawing board. Their brief? To take Mega Drive gamesplaying to the next level. Andy

Until now that is. We spoke to Sega UK's Software Project Co-ordinator, Gary J Foreman, to unveil the mystery behind the new methods and programming techniques that are being used to keep the Mega Drive at the forefront of video-game technology.

# MAKING SENSE OF TECHNICAL SOFTWARE

First off, how does DPA (Dynamic Play Adjustment), a system which enables the game to "sense" how well you're doing and adjust the difficulty accordingly, work?

"The method used depends on how

much control you want the player to have. If you get to a certain point in the game and the player still has plenty of lives, it'll make it more difficult. Some people do it in more subtle ways. If you're running low on energy, it'll put more energy pick-ups on the screen. I know for example that Gods does that. Some of the older games you could

get on the Commodore 64 way back in 1986 had something similar in there so it's not something really new, it's kind of been going on for a very long time."

But how effective is it? Is the margin of adjustment large, or is it just a token gesture, and something the marketing boys can crow about?

"It depends to what extent it's done. If you put in things like extra lives, that's a fairly big benefit. If you put in extra energy, it can have a big effect. Usually it will be gauged with each individual level so that it will be easier and more beneficial for the game to help you at the early stages but not at the later stages, because by that time you should be fairly good at it. In one of the games I worked on - Super Off Road for the arcades - it would gauge how much you beat the other cars by on the last race and then would make it so that the computer cars could beat you. Once you know this, the trick is to only beat the

Thunderhawk. The Mega CD's hardware can scale, rotate and, unlike the SNES, tilt the landscape computer cars by a small margin."

This DPA is to be used more in forthcoming titles - Ecco The Dolphin having been the first to benefit. So what else is there? What about data compression? It was commonplace in disk software for the home computers, and we regularly heard of compression techniques that would enable you to pack three or four times as much data into a game as you normally would. But apparently (as the costs of memory chips show no sign of dropping) similar techniques are now also used in cartridge games to squeeze more and more data into chips.

So, what exactly can you tell us about data compression?

'Sometimes there will be an area of RAM in the machine and they'll decompress the data into that area, which

then acts in the same way as a disk-based product. But alternatively, you can also decompress directly from the ROM. If people want to get the best out of these machines, they have to cram in as much as possible. People I'm working with at the moment are compressing all sorts of things background blocks.

character sets - some of them are even compressing the sound."

And this in turn leads us yet more neatly onto QSound, a 3D sound technique which, we are informed, was first used on Madonna's immaculate Collection and. most recently, was used on Ecco The Dolphin CD.

What's so special about QSound?

"It gives a more three-dimensional feel to the sound output but only using two speakers. Depending on the quality of the system I don't think you get a perfect match for quadrophonic sound, but it does give a very real 3D effect. I think it's fairly sophisticated - certainly, listening to normal music CDs with QSound on, you can notice different areas from where you're getting the sounds, so I think you can be fairly accurate with it."

#### THE HARD STUFF

Indeed, it would appear that there are a wealth of methods and techniques that have been developed which can now be used to make the games that much more demanding of the

machine. But, it must be said, with any games system, there is still only so much you can do through the software.

Ultimately, as players demand more and more sophisticated games, so a change in hardware is needed, and this is where the DSP (digital signal processing) chip comes in. Like the Super FX chip in *Starwing* on the Super NES, it's an additional coprocessor which actually sits inside the cart and shares the workload of the Mega Drive's central processor.

### So what are programmers actually using it for?

"Basically you can use it as another CPU (central processing unit) to manipulate data in whatever way you like. Most people seem to be using it for data compression or graphics calculations, which it's really good at doing. Most of them are very simple instruction sets but because of that they can run extremely fast. This gives you very good performance."

#### Does it have any built-in functions?

"It's purely a processor, just number crunching. What you do is feed it some data, run your process on it and it'll give you your output; normally it will be graphics, which you then display. I've had a brief play around with an emulator of it but I haven't seen a live system yet. I think the first we'll see of that is *Virtua Racing*."

#### Will that run very fast?

"It should do yes, given the performance of the chip itself."

Well, of course, he would say that wouldn't he? But we also have it from a fairly reliable source that the performance of the chip is comparable to a fairly high-spec PC and this is just on the one chip. While

we won't make any rash judgements before we get to see the game, we suspect that Virtua Racing is going to be rather special.

# TOMORROW'S TECHNOLOGY

But something that's been intriguing us here at MEGA is the prospect of the new Sega VR peripheral. This is very much Sega USA's project, but can you tell us anything new about it?

"I assume it will be on one cart, so you'll get your VR game on a cart with, I'd guess, a DSP chip on it. If you've got the DSP in there, it should have the power to deal with it and give fairly good results. However, I've only seen demos so I don't really know what it's capable of."

So that's settled, still very much a mystery and very much tomorrow's news story – although we can divulge that Sega are working with VR supremos W Industries in a bid to learn more about VR technology. But one thing we do have right here and now is the Mega CD.

### How does Gary reckon the hardware actually rates?

"It is very powerful. What you've got is another 68000 processor running at 12.5 MHz, which is about one and a half times the one in the Mega Drive. You also have enhanced features for scaling and rotating graphics, which you see on *Thunderhawk*. But by actually using this and another processor in parallel with the Mega Drive processor, you can do quite a lot more.

"Basically, you can have a lot more things happening which are a lot smoother. It's a very good machine, but the problem is that because it's still very new, people haven't got to grips with it. If we look at a brief history of the industry, it's taken quite a few years for people to become fully aware of the capabilities of the various machines. It took, I think, four years for the C64 to get a smooth scrolling game at 50 frames. Obviously the actual technology has increased a lot, so the time period of getting to the upper reaches of the abilities of the machines has increased. But I don't think that at the moment we've seen really what the Mega CD can do. I think maybe it'll be18 months to two years before we might be able to say 'we don't think we can better this'."

#### **MEGA CD VS MODE 7**

And now the big question. How does the Mega CD compare to the SNES's mode 7?

"With Mode 7 you've got the floor effect but you can't tilt it left and right on the screen, whereas with the Mega CD hardware you can. Basically, the Mega CD offers everything that you've got on Mode 7 plus an extra bit as well. Have a look at *Thunderhawk* – it's the best advert for the Mega CD. If they can do that now, give the guys at Core another six months or a year and I'm sure they'll come up with something that makes even that look silly."

### At the moment it does look a bit blocky though...

"That's just a resolution thing. There's no reason why you can't increase the resolution, but it wouldn't be as fast. It's always a trade off, but when they get to grips with it a bit more they'll be able to increase both."

Ultimately though, despite the Mega CD slightly outstripping the performance of Nintendo's machine, us Sega players are still restricted to 64 colours on screen. Is this a major bummer?

"In terms of presentation, I think having less colours does make things difficult, but at the end of the day people are buying these things because they actually want to play the game. So I don't think the smaller number of colours on the Mega Drive and Mega CD really has much effect. A good game can be equally good on both systems."

Sticking with the Mega CD for a moment, news recently broke of a deal Sega struck to allow them to incorporate something called CinePak into their CD titles. What's more, this technology is rumoured to be able to produce full-screen, full motion video in 128 colours.

#### What, pray tell, is CinePak?

"It's a collection of graphics drivers which give you full motion video. It'll be a standard set of routines which people can use for replaying FMV."

#### If it's just software tools though, how can that increase the colours and quality of the screen output?

"There are various techniques you can use to achieve more colours on screen. And with the power of the Mega CD and additional CPU you can use that to increase the overall performance of the system. It all depends on what the programmer can do. From my experimentations, I think that you can do more than what's there at the moment, but so far there's nothing that's actually pushing the Mega CD. From what I know

about CinePak though, it's simply video playing and manipulation software, so you'll get lots of nice effects which will enhance the presentation. I don't think, however, it'll make the games significantly better."

#### THE WAY TO GO

OK, so to wrap this one up, what can we expect from Mega Drive and Mega CD gaming in the future?

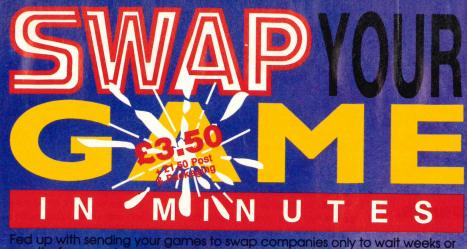
"The release of the DSP will change things a lot because it will give the programmer a lot more power, a significant amount. They'll be able to manipulate a lot more data, a lot more sprites, a lot more things happening in the games. And

polygons. At the moment you have reasonable detail and speed, but with DSP that will be significantly increased and there'll be quite a big change in what you see. There's no reason why you can't use DSP in conjunction with a CD game too, but it might be unlikely purely because of the cost."

In conclusion, the future looks good for the Mega Drive and Mega CD – the Sega machines look set to be the platform for a whole new bunch of developments. On the Mega Drive side, the DSP chip looks set to bring us spectacular things which may well make anything Nintendo come up with look a bit ridiculous. And those of you who bought a Mega CD and thought "Oh my God, I've just been ripped off a treat" can rest easy. The machine is powerful, and we're not just taking one of Sega's bods word for it – we've seen *Thunderhawk* and it is truly stunning.

Six months ago we may have been slightly sceptical about the future of Sega consoles, but these developments (most notably DSP and the now-visible power of the Mega CD), along with Sega's increasing commitment to getting the machines to do what they're supposed to, have reassured us that the Mega Drive and Mega CD are undoubtedly the consoles to own.

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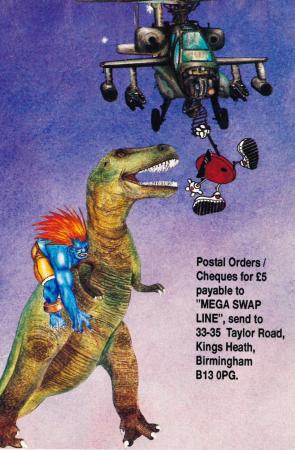

#### **ROUND ONE**

"Apart from the obvious reason that it's from Sega, the Mega Drive beats the SNES for many rational reasons. Firstly, it's been designed to be the engine of an entire compatible system rather than being just a device on its own.

"With a suitable adaptor it will play Master System software. It powers the Mega CD – the latest breakthrough in video-game technology – and it will drive the new Virtual Reality headset which we hope to introduce early next year. Because it's been around two years and is better established than the SNES, it didn't contain some of the latest graphic thrills which were built into the SNES, but most of these (and more) are abuilt into the Mega CD.

"Even Nintendo recognise the limitations of the SNES by introducing software cartridges that needed to include their SFX chip, but Sega's own DSP chip can more than match its performance. The first DSP game will be *Virtua Racing* due early next year and the early demos I have seen are tremendous.

"Turning from hardware to software, the range of Mega Drive games is second to none, with more than 300 titles available internationally. Add to this that Sega's games, while not cheap, are probably £5-£10 cheaper than Nintendo's equivalent with prices now starting as low as £10 in some cases. Also, Sega games can be legally rented out overnight in nearly 2000 outlets around the UK so you can try before you buy. You can't do this with Nintendo, and so the choice must be obvious; Sega!"

s I've always said, if you're going to break bones, at least do it on a comfy ice-pack the size of a car park. Actually, I haven't always said that, as it's just occurred to me. But it's quite a good way to start this review.

You see, the thing is, I haven't really got an idea of how to approach this. I'm a great fan of NHLPA

Hockey '93, and I know exactly what the game is all about. However, what about those lucky individuals who have yet to experience any of the EA Hockey games? Hmm. It's tough. But what I'll do is split the review into two. Simply read the one which is

relevant to you. (This is a brilliant idea, and a first in publishing history.)

# FOR THOSE WHO HAVE NEVER PLAYED ICE HOCKEY...

Right, ice hockey's a bit like football, except that you are allowed to be far more violent. Obviously, the idea is to score loads of goals, but there is an undercurrent of total anarchy, in that with their armour, each player weighs about three tonnes. This makes collisions inevitable, and at the end of each game, blood washes across the rink.

Throughout the action, you always control whichever geezer is nearest to the puck (as the ball is rather humorously called), and you can slide around, pass to another team member or even fire at goal. Meanwhile, your opponents are barging into you at every opportunity, tripping, slapping and poking with their sticks.

It's fast, mad and pumped full of adrenaline. Goals come as fast as injuries and sending offs. Basically, anything goes. But let's not get carried away; there's a great degree of skill involved as well. You've got to work out your turning circles, be aware of everybody on

the rink, and generally keep your red-hot tip-top instincts with you as the violence, death and blood begins to flow. Sorry, there I go again.

Each team is from the proper NHL in North America, and everybody on the team is just like in real life. There are 157 players, each accompanied by their own piccy, and, if you forget the possibility that some might have left, retired or been smashed to a few bony splinters in the interim, it's got to be the most accurate sports sim around. Even the players' individual statistics are correct, so you can



Facing off occurs whenever a rule is broken. It's a case of whacking your foe's knees with your stick until he loses concentration – then scoring

play around with the positions of your star players until you've got a perfect team. Alternatively, simply select All Stars East or West (which rank as default Good Teams).

Everything that happens becomes a statistic at the end of the half (or the game) and you can pick over the remains of your team, finding out who did what, where you went wrong and how many shots at goal you muffed.

If you are reading this mini-review because you honestly haven't played any of the *EA Hockey* games before, the best advice is to rush out and buy *NHL Hockey* '94. You're going to need a hockey game, and this has, according to EA, 26 improvements over *NHLPA Hockey* '93. And doesn't it make sense to get the latest version of anything? Yes, of course it does. This especially applies when you're buying motorbikes and Walkmans.

# FOR THOSE WHO ALREADY OWN NHLPA HOCKEY '93...

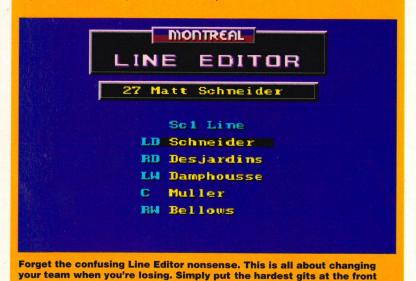
Why should you buy this sequel? For a starter, consider the improvements listed by EA. I'll list them for your reading pleasure, so bear with me, please. Really – it's the most effective way.

1. It's approximately 25 per cent faster than *NHLPA Hockey '93*. This is a vital point, and it really is noticeable when you play the game.

2. It supports the four-way play adaptor thing. Two sets of twins can swap sides and play against their brothers or sisters (or they can stay on the same team as their siblings). Remember though, you'll need the special EA 4-Way Play adaptor and not the Sega one (see MEGA CITY for the full chaotic adaptor story).

### **EDITING LINES**

This is a feature which has been retained from *NHLPA Hockey* '93, and it occurs when you change the team line-up during a match. To take advantage of it, you must really understand the skills of your players. Most of the time, it's just another item on the pause menu bar.





Controlling the goalie is an acquired skill. Forget that too, and just let the Mega Drive sort it out. It's bound to be better than you (well, me)

keeps the action flowing, and means that you don't have to worry about where your men are. There's always someone nearby who can barge into the baddies, time and time again...

Goal. It's a bit obvious this one, but watch out for the goalie who, if you don't muck around with him, will sort you out when you think all is lost

Face off area. There are four of these and they don't really do much. They are the spots where you restart the game once something violent or naughty has happened and you need to get the action happening once more

Players. There are six on each side, and they spend a lot of time lying on their backs, bleeding and saying relevant things like "Ow, oof" and "That really hurt, you swine"

A load of seats where the management teams sit. I haven't got a clue why these are empty. Perhaps the despairing bosses have gone home

A new feature is the central logo. This is accurate, apparently, and changes depending on who's playing who at home and stuff. It's a nice idea, but most of us wouldn't recognise the logos if we fell over and our faces smashed

Some people having a bit of a scrap. Well, they might not be. It's hard to tell. An awful lot of scuffling goes on, so it's best to assume that they are getting involved in a barney. The ref rarely notices

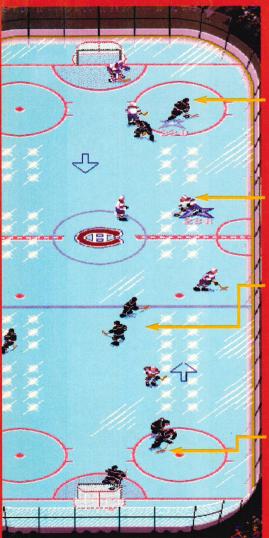

# TOP TACTICS FOR ICE HOCKEY



Yes, not only do we give you a damn fine review of the game, but we tell you how to score ace goals as well. However, be warned. If this doesn't work for you, it's not necessarily our fault.

Perfect scoring position. If you're here, the ideal thing to do is pass to a player in front of the goal, who slaps the puck past the dazed keeper and straight into the back of the net

And to get here, simply try to scoot up the centre of the rink, dodging folk and weaving drunkenly until you switch to one side and get ready for the above move

This is the danger area. If the puck is nicked off you here, you'll have to scoot back and prepare to defend for your life (if you're playing against the console). If you're playing another human, you can get away with letting him make a mess of it on his own (because he probably won't have read this great guide yet)

Whatever you do, DON'T just whack the puck hard up the rink from here. You'll get a call of Icing and have to do the annoying face-off business all over again. This happens very regularly and your teeth will gnash and chomp

### **RON BARR IS BACK**

Fans of NHLPA Hockey '93 will be pleased to see that their old mate Ron Barr is still a part of the action. Spotting him is like seeing Eddie Stobart or Norbert Dentressangle trucks on the motorway. Well, it's not, actually. A truck he may not be then, but in this version of the game he does prove his usefulness by giving you vital information on the state of the two teams playing.



Hi, Ron! Yes, Mr Barr's back with top tips on all the teams. You'll probably pay him no attention and hit Start to get on with the action

- 3. There are fairly unimportant "one-timer" shots, which are like quick passes and slap-shots combined. Hoo-bloody ray, say I. EA Sports waffle on a lot about them in the instruction manual, but it just throws an extra element of luck into the proceedings as far as I can see, as you have no control as to whether the shot hits or misses.
- 4. You can control the goalie. I mean, really. As if anyone would really want to do this. Everyone knows from being at school that being goalie is the first step to social delinquency.
- 5. Battery back-up enables you to save personal records for up to seven humans on the cart. I like this option and it's a slight improvement on last year's halfhearted affair.

- 6. There are occasional crowd animations. Hats are thrown onto the rink and stuff like that. Yawnarama.
- 7. There's a penalty shoot-out option. Very useful, I'm sure.
- 8. There are (wait for it!) penalties in the main game, too.
- You can smash the opposing players up onto the sides of the rink, causing them serious head trauma.
- 10. Players now have runs of good or bad luck. Why? I dunno. (To make the game more realistic of course EA spokesperson) (To make the game more bloody frustrating, as your star player, for some unfathomable reason, all of a sudden possesses the ice hockey prowess of a Shredded Wheat™ in the championship finals, you mean Neil)

# SHOOTOUT AT THE, ER WELL, OK ICE RINK

This penalty shoot-out thing is borrowed directly from football. You skate up to the enemy goalie and try to force the puck through the roof of his mouth and past his brain into the back of the net. It's a very

skillful thing to get right (scoring, not killing the goalie), because you're skating along as you're doing it.

All in all, it's one of the better new features in the latest version of the game.

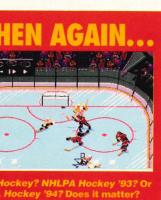

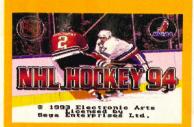

I could wallow in the plot and tell you all about the past of the kingdom where Sparkster lives and the evil forces that hang around there, but it's easier and a lot less boring if I simplify it for you. A guy called Axle Gear (you've beaten him up before and he's a bit miffed about it) has

kidnapped the princess in an attempt to blackmail the king to give him the key to the seal which will give him... well, let's just say it will give him a few useful powers. Knowing all this, Sparkster decides that he must do

something about it. It's your usual goodversus-evil storyline – nowt special but interesting nonetheless.

# MARSUPIALS WITH ROCKET PACKS?

But what's so special about Sparkster? Well he's a Rocket Knight Adventurer (no, he is) and he's equipped with a sword, a rocket jet-pack and more courage that something particularly stupid that's got a lot of courage. To complete his mission, not only must he rescue the princess, he's also got to get rid of Axle Gear for good. To do this he must work his way through seven stages, each with its own unique difficulties and bosses.

#### WHICH WAY UP?

#### ZOOOOOM! WHERE DID HE GO?

Now we all know how to use a sword (if you don't, just press one of the buttons and you'll find out), but getting used to a rocket pack takes a bit more practice. Your rocket pack has four functions; a straight up zoom, a diagonal zoom, an ahead zoom and a spin attack. To activate your rocket pack you'll need to hold down the attack button until the power gauge at the top of the screen reaches the max and starts to flash. Now that you've powered up your pack, just press Up to fly up, a Diagonal Left or Right to fly in that direction, a Left or Right to zoom in either direction or don't press the D-pad at all to spin on the spot. These may seem pretty obvious and indeed useless, but

each one will come into play at points in the game, so you need to get used to them.

Each of the seven levels is split into three or four sub levels and it's nice to see that there are different types of platform

gameplay for the sub levels one minute you'll be swinging by your tail from a tree branch, the next you'll be trying to avoid spikes while floating underwater. This ingenious use of sub levels means that you're never quite sure what's around the next

corner. The real problem, however, is that what is around the next corner probably won't give you too many problems, until you get to about level five that is. This game has one of those lovely difficulty curves that goes from ho-hum to bloody-hell-guv in the

space of one level. On my third sitting I managed to get through to level five with four continues left, but many plays later I'm still trying to finish level five.

The good thing about this is that obviously this isn't going to be another oneday wonder platform game. The bad thing, however, is that you'll get sick to death of the four earlier levels, and whether or not the urge to see level six is greater than the annoyance of playing those first four levels again and again is debatable. Graphically this is yet another of those smart Konami games, with apt scenery, professional animation and little graphical treats (the heat haze on level three for example). The sound, presentation and general feel of the game is all top-notch stuff too, making this a lovely all-round platform game.

you to bounce on. And thirdly, the levels go all over the place - up, down, in, out, backwards... all over really. This has its advantages. Whereas most levels of platform games can be run through with complete disregard for everything (once you've sussed the way to go), Bubsy needs to be treated with respect. It is possible for you to run through bits of level at top speed, but not for long. You'll either run into a wall, stunning yourself, or you'll hit something a bit more deadly (spikes, nasties or even giant Hot Dogs). Now although this is initially annoying, because you're not used to it, you soon begin to realise that there's actually some gameplay in here. The obstacles do slow the

gameplay down a bit, but the replacement of speed for strategy is a very welcome element in a Mega Drive platform game. #### SIZE ISN'T EVERYTHING

This is Accolade's first 16-Mbit game, and they have shoved some really juicy stuff in here. Firstly, there are the graphics. Each level is very detailed both background and scenery wise. Oh, and it all moves with some

very smooth scrolling as well. However, it's the characters that really separate this game from the norm. Each sprite is very much his or her own character, and the comedy element is played up to the max. Bubsy, for instance, has several ways of dying, from splintering into a thousand

nt pieces to falling too far and walking off the screen concertina-style. It's all very Tom and Jerry, and it's all very funny.

Stick on top of that a very polished,

Secondly, the more fair-minded and democratically-aware of you will be saying, "Now what have Microprose done to deserve getting their game reviewed by Neil – who doesn't even like flight sims – when Domark got *MiG-29* reviewed by flight-sim loving Dyer. It's just not fair". Well, no it isn't – which is why we've got an unbiased head-to-head comparison of the two games over the page. Happy? Good. Now we can begin properly.

# MOVING WITH THE TIMES?

Let's go back to that "F-15 on the Mega Drive compared to Thunderhawk on the Mega CD" business. My point is that F-15 Strike Eagle 2 and Thunderhawk both came out previously on the Amiga, at more or less the same time (a couple of years ago). Thunderhawk, regardless of which format it's come out on, has moved with the times, but F-15 hasn't. The Mega Drive market and the Amiga one are two very different propositions – nobody, or at least nobody

with an ounce of sense, gets a Mega Drive because they want to play simulations. It's like buying a Ferrari Testarossa then using it for stock-car racing. It doesn't have enough keys, for a start (the Mega Drive, that is, not the Testarossa), and the very essence of a flight simulation is the scarv multitude of controls and options and things to fiddle with at the touch of a button. The Mega Drive does its best to cope here, but pausing the game and working your way through three sets of nested menus just for a quick external view as you send a missile winging into an enemy base isn't the stuff of which flowing entertainment is made, and it's missing a large degree of the point of why people play flight sims - you're not supposed to have all day to stop and fart about and think about stuff, it's supposed to be at least vaguely reminiscent of the fastmoving, quick-thinking, nerve-shredding action of the real thing.

Another thing about flight sims is that they're MEANT to be hard to get into – you couldn't just climb into the cockpit of an F-15 and go off downing bogeys at the drop of a helmet, and however nice it might be for us pressed-for-time reviewers, I'm really not at all convinced that you should be able to load this up, start a mission without even opening the manual, and have downed your primary and secondary targets and be on the way home without ever having to press anything other than buttons B and C. This isn't supposed to be *G-LOC*, y'know.

I don't know, maybe I'm just in a bad mood or something. The scenario described above WAS, after all, the easiest mission on the easiest of the four difficulty settings, where you start in the air and an autopilot guides you directly to your targets if you leave the controls alone. Things do get an awful lot more demanding if you move up the levels, it's just that they don't do it in a very interesting or rewarding way. Ninety per cent of the baddies you'll blast in this game never make it further onto the screen than a red targeting hexagon on your Head Up Display, shortly followed by a billowing red-and-grey explosion – you

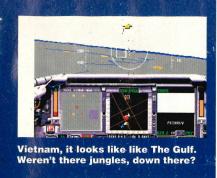

never get to see the shape of their tailfins, far less the whites of their eyes.

#### DICING WITH DEATH

Dogfighting is a confusing affair - the computer handles most of the work and with chaff and decoys it becomes just a series of random dives and rolls against empty backgrounds, waiting for your missiles to lock onto the usually-invisible enemy and then wasting him without any further intervention from you beyond a quick press of the fire button. You can dice with danger if you like by flying directly at ground targets and delaying firing until the last possible second (indeed, it's the only way to get a look at any interesting scenery), but the knowledge that if things get hairy you can blow the baddies up and run for it at any moment, tends to defuse

the dramatic tension somewhat.

The mission structure's a bit odd, too – the manual promises "hundreds" of missions, so after completing the aforementioned first one with flying colours (quite literally – I couldn't be bothered landing, so I just ejected and ditched several million quid's worth of aeroplane in the briny. Still, got a medal) and deciding to have a go at the next job Libya could throw at me, I was a bit surprised to get the exact same mission to do again. Sorry, General, but I just blew them up, can I not bother with this one? No such luck – after you choose your war

theatre, there's no escape clause, you just have to get on with it until you finish the mission (again) or get shot down, which is annoying and stupid. This is also the case with the password

option which, once entered, won't let you out until you've typed a valid password – forget the code or choose the option by mistake, and all you can do is reset your Mega Drive.

#### PLAYING CHESS BY MAIL

The biggest disappointment of *F-15 Strike Eagle 2*, however, comes in the area where flight sims are usually strongest – depth of gameplay. Even on the toughest difficulty level, this is a pretty simple game – long stretches of lonely flying in straight lines towards far-off targets (there's a "time warp" option which is supposed to drastically speed up these bits, but it didn't seem to make any difference as far as I could see), followed by bursts of hectic but unsatisfying

# The page three report MIG-29 vs F-15 STRIKE EAGLE 2

he current Top Gun of Mega Drive flight sims is Domark's *MiG-29*, which scored a not-bad-at-all 80% when reviewed by Andy Dyer in issue nine of MEGA. By a complicated mathematical system of awarding "points" according to "vital statistics", MEGA will now attempt to define which game, on a nittygritty basis, is the best.

#### **ACTION-PACKED SEXINESS**

Oh dear. Well, there's no shortage of enemies in either game, but unless your definition of "action" is an extremely loose one, encompassing dull aerobatic manoeuvres and remote-control baddie-blasting, you're not really going to have your heather set on fire by either of these games. Still, of the two, *MiG-29* seems to have a bit of a more even balance of shooting things down/flying along doing nothing very much compared to *F-15's* huge expanses of emptiness followed by frenzied bursts of activity.

#### **DROP-DEAD GORGEOUSNESS**

Neither of these games are great lookers, it has to be said. Huge expanses of blue, green and yellow are mostly the order of the day, with the biggest visual thrills coming from mountains (read: pyramids dropped arbitrarily in the middle of the desert) and roads (read: long strips of grey with white bits up the middle). *F-15* actually comes out very slightly on top thanks to a bit more variety and some slightly more impressive ground targets to blow away with long-range missiles (ie you never actually get to see much of them, but it's nice to know they're there), but there really isn't very much in it at all.

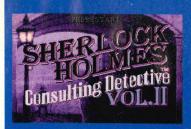

# **GAME REVIEW**



There's nothing more relaxing than a spot of fluffy bunny rabbit frying

o you remember Gonks? You must. They were little toys, shaped like a cone with a tufty bit of fluff on top. They didn't really serve any useful purpose, they simply looked cute. And, in fact, you most frequently found them in cacky seaside gift shops, even though they had no connection with coastal traditions or marine-related fables or anything. Anyway, what was my point? Oh yes, Puggsy, the alien hero of this game, looks just like a Gonk, only he has blobby antennae instead of the tufty fluff appendage, and he has arms and legs which Gonks never ever had. So, in fact, he isn't very Gonk-like at all really, except that he's vaguely conical... erm, oh bloody hell, I think I'll start again.

#### NOT VERY GONKY AT ALL REALLY

Puggsy, the new character from the Psygnosis stable, is a strange blobby little alien whose ship has crash landed on what is described as an "unidentified" planet. It's probably described thus because it would be hard to name or try to rationalise an earthlike environment that is entirely populated by a feudal-style race of raccoons, but there we go.

So the raccoons then nab poor Puggsy's space ship so that they can investigate the technology and set about taking over the universe. Puggsy's task then, is to get his ship back and get home. So starts yet another platform game.

But is it *just* another platform game? Not really, no. You see, Puggsy isn't simply a leap-around-shooting-things sort of bloke. He actually has rather a useful pair of rotating arms, which he can use to manipulate all sorts of objects found in the play area. And because of this, the game is very much geared around using objects to solve puzzles rather than being action based (although there are still plenty of enemies in there to make your puzzle-solving antics that much more difficult).

Initially, the puzzles are very simple indeed. Find an object and carry it through the exit, that sort of thing. As you plough through, however, things get progressively more difficult. For a start the levels get bigger, so you have to do a bit of route finding. Then levers start appearing all over the place. These can do a range of things from simply opening doors to actually changing the shape of walls and things—let me explain.

In one section there's a series of some seven levers. These change the shape of a corridor so that you can bounce a ball along it in the correct direction in order to activate another switch. The thing is, you can't see the corridor while you're stood by the levers, so you also have to find a remote,

The most notable feature of Puggsy is the way in which the main character manipulates the various objects in the

game. As I've said, his little arms can be raised and lowered using the D-pad and this leads to all sorts of possibilities. If he has a gun, then the moveable arms can be used to aim your shot. You can also stack objects on top of one another to make high platforms accessible. Then there's the cunning "heave" manoeuvre (for

want of a better description). If you leap for a platform that's just a little too high, you can hook a carried object onto the lip of the platform and heave yourself up over the edge. And beyond these versatile arm movements you can also throw objects just by dropping them while you're moving, or alternatively you can jump and throw them while simultaneously pressing the D-pad in an upward diagonal - this accesses a super throw. Any object thrown like this will kill enemies on contact.

#### **ALL ARMS**

There are over fifty levels in the game, but some are very short indeed, and because of the way the game is structured you have to complete only about thirty or so to finish the game. Still, there are secret levels to discover and the puzzles get fairly tricky so

> there's an above average challenge here. The only real criticism of the game is also the aspect that makes it so intriguing in the first place - Puggsy's movement. Although it makes for a very unique style of game, it also makes progress rather slow. After a while, the novelty of realistic object movement and realistic gravitational effects

wears off, and you wish you didn't have to keep trudging back and forth through the levels just to fetch a stack of barrels or something. But this is only really a minor niggle. The game is sufficiently different and slickly programmed to make you forgive the slightly repetitive nature of the gameplay and just enjoy fathoming the puzzles. Puggsy's good. It's not great, but it is very good, and anyone who likes platform games will undoubtedly like this.

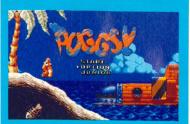

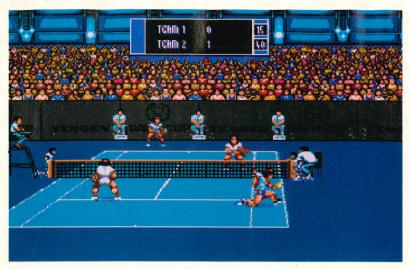

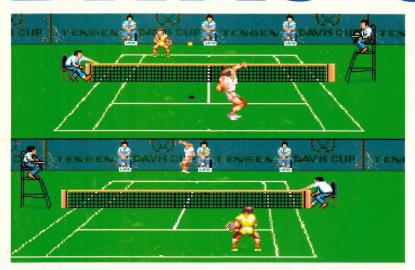

ight, tennis game time again. Having had no tennis sims at all we suddenly get Grandslam Tennis (awful), David Crane's Amazing Tennis (awful), André Agassi Tennis (awful) and now this. So this is awful too, right?

Wrong. Horribly wrong in fact. This tennis game is, in a word, brilliant. It would seem that the designers have written down absolutely everything that appears in the real sport, then striven to cram every single aspect in, and what's

more, they've been and gone and done it.

The first thing to mention, and something that initially may be slightly offputting, is that the computer opponents (all 30 of them) are bloody good. Scoring a point, let alone winning a game or set

against them, is initially a highly difficult

affair. Because of this, there are two things

you should do when you first start.

#### **WARM UP**

Firstly, use the extensive training facilities.

You can practise your returns against a service machine, then you can increase your precision: an arrow marks the point you're aiming for and an on-screen joypad highlights the key presses you need to perform in order to hit

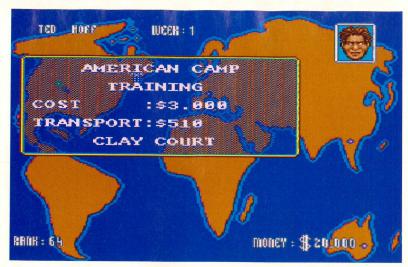

tournaments, go into training and so on, and generally do all the stuff a real tennis player does, with the ultimate aim of becoming the best.

#### GRIPPING GAMEPLAY

OK, so this game has pretty much everything, option-wise, you could ask for, but ultimately it's the gameplay we're interested in. Other than the fact that novices will find the computer opponents frustratingly difficult to beat, the gameplay is approaching faultless at a cracking rate. In two-player mode first-time players will be able to pick it up and still have a damn fine game. Then you start to learn the moves. The three buttons give you three different moves, but also, your position on the court dictates when other moves will be activated (for example, if you intercept a lob near the net, you will automatically smash the ball). Then, beyond that, you can use the D-pad to both aim your shots left and right and dictate distance and speed by pushing up

and down. All fine and fabulous, but the final touch, which puts to rights the criticisms levelled at countless tennis games, is that your player is always at the front of the screen. In one-player mode this is an obvious thing and in two-player mode the game is split-screen (with no discernible loss of quality or speed it would seem).

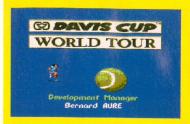
#### THIS IS ONE ACE GAME

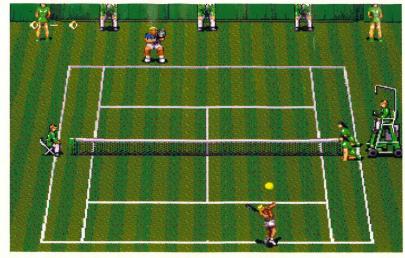


# **GAME REVIEW**

Even though a certain lawn tennis tournament is over and done with for another year, the tennis games just keep on coming.
Paul Mellerick serves up yet another review

ow stop me if I'm covering old ground, but where are all these tennis games coming from? I know the Mega Drive is the most popular games system in the UK and the US at the moment, but don't software companies realise that too many games of the same sport can get a little boring after a while? (You just have to look at the review on page 47 to see that the American football scene is going just a bit too far.)





And as the ball came back down, three aliens came along, did a 30-second version of Oklahoma, and then beamed off again. Honest!

# NOT SUCH AN

Still, as this is an official tie-in with THE tennis tournament, it's going to be something isn't it? Something, yes. The best tennis game on the Mega Drive? No.

OK, so that might sound a bit severe, but if you look at the previous two pages, you'll see a review of *Davis Cup Tennis*, from Domark. And in the funny world that is game reviewing we'd all been playing that for about two weeks before this came in, and furthermore we all thought it was fab. So having got used to the ins and outs of the control system for that particular game, I now had to get used to a completely different one.

Right, back to Wimbledon. Yes, Wimbledon. You know, it's that big tennis tournament played every year in England, during the course of which Harry Carpenter gets to interview someone who isn't a boxer, and which after about two months everyone forgets who won the men's singles title (the women's singles is easy to remember because it's either Stefi Graf or Martina Navratilova). Still, it's a popular little fortnight in sporting history, and as such is ripe for licensing into a game.

But if you're looking for any famous names in this game, you're going to be very disappointed. And if there are any girlies out there who want to play as girlies, well they're going to have to look elsewhere too.

So what does that leave us with? Well, you've got 12 male players to choose from, three courts to play on, and a tournament to win. You can of course play exhibition matches to build up your confidence, and you can also play against three players (controlled by the computer or by some mates) simultaneously using the Sega multi-tap. But what is the playing actually like? Well, the word to use here is simple.

#### SIMPLISTIC CONTROLS

Unlike *Davis Cup Tennis* there are no special moves hidden in here, so after two weeks of playing, you're still going to be using the same type of shots. The game also loses out because of the predictability of the computer. There are two types of computer players, ones that stick to the base line, and ones that run straight into the net.

Once you've sussed out each opponent you can work your way through to the final without too many problems. Then you go up a few player levels and get to go through the whole thing all over again. All these factors add up to a very samey and ultimately dull tennis game that doesn't offer the spark or addictive qualities that the fabulous *Davis Cup Tennis* does.

o you own an American football game? Is it one of the Madden series? If the answer to either of these questions is yes, you'll be asking yourself the same (and very important) question as I am. Do we really need another American football game, and does this offer us anything new to make us part with our spondoolies?

#### ARE YOU READY FOR SOME FOUR-PLAY?

Let's get down to the nitty gritty straight away and see what Bill Walsh College Football can give us. For a start, this is college football, not the stuff you see on Channel 4 on a Sunday evening - there are no Dallas Cowboys or Buffalo Bills here. But not only are the recognisable teams not here, some of the rules have changed as well; things such as a 25-second play clock and the chance to run in the conversion for two points instead of one, making a touchdown worth eight points rather than

the usual seven. Once you've got over the strategical changes, you've then got the game changes - don't think this is just John Madden with college teams, because there are some major differences.

Graphically this is guite a different game. The viewpoint is the same as Madden (you don't fix what isn't broken) but it's slightly deeper and therefore shows more of the pitch. The sprites are also neater and the animation on them is better. There are also a few more stats for you fans to really get into, and some new strategy elements (bluff mode, setting audibles etc). And the icing on the cake is the four-player simultaneous mode. Using the 4-Way Play adaptor you can set up grudge matches with your mates, playing two-on-two, three-onone or four players against the computer.

#### **BUT IS IT WORTH IT?**

This all sounds great, and it is, but how far can the Mega Drive go with an American football game? With 11 games already out

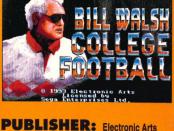

there (and John Madden '94 on its way), does this offer enough to get you to part with your money? The short answer to that is yes... and no. There are several good features about Bill Walsh, such as the fourplayer game and increased play selection, but who wants to play as a college team? I know this might sound very fussy, but college football isn't exactly as popular over here as it is in the States. I can think of several people I know who watch American football, and every time they load up John Madden they play as their favourite team. However, I don't know anvone who knows the foggiest about college football teams.

If you're into American football and you already have John Madden '93, you have the best game money can buy. Bill Walsh is too obscure (simply because it's college football) and yet not different enough to warrant the money. If this game had been made two years ago, we would have raved about it, but now it's just not original enough.

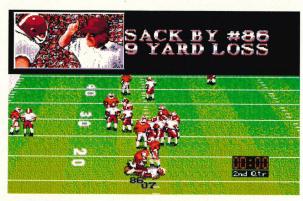

Finding fault in the game is quite tricky because it's such good fun to play. If I am to get picky, however, I'd have to say that the restart points are a bit harsh to say the least – when a game's this tough, it gets a bit frustrating going through the same bits over and over again. Also, when you've been through a section and had the devil's own job of blatting all the enemies, it would be nice to think they remained blatted. Sadly, if you have to go back through these sections (if you died or even if you just have to backtrack) the enemies are back in place.

Despite these niggling faults, *Blaster Master 2* is a splendid game. It's not as spectacular as *Ranger X*, but, to be honest, this does have a more puzzle orientated structure, so, depending on your individual tastes, some people may actually prefer this game. If you're into shoot-'em ups and fancy a bit of thought-provoking puzzley action too, you won't go far wrong.

# CHESTER CHEETAH: TOO COOL TO FOO

There's no denying that the character's hip, but is the game any good? Neil West's not easily fooled...

h, what a missed opportunity. Unusually for a sad commercial merchandise licence, and despite the truly appalling rap-style rhyming used in his name all through the (insultingly poor excuse for an) instruction manual, Chester Cheetah has the makings of a video-game star. He's cool (shades), loveable (furry animal with gigantic face and a nifty repertoire of cute looks to camera), and funny (watch him as he howls along to his own guitar playing). These, as I'm sure you know, are three of the four attributes required for video fame and fortune. The fourth, naturally, is a good game. Whoops.

#### **EASING INTO** THINGS...

It's not that Too Cool To Fool is a bad game as such. There are some elements of clever design, like the way that gameplay devices are introduced a level or so before they actually become important, giving you a chance to get used to them before you get chucked in at the deep end. I'm thinking particularly here of the guitar "power-up", which appears in harmless form in level two as a warning to help out the unwary who might otherwise get caught out by its much





funny and cute, but it doesn't actually achieve anything in the game

more dangerous environment in level three (didn't stop me falling for it, of course, but that's my own problem). There's also the boat in level one, which allows you to develop some familiarity with its controls almost without pressure of danger, so that when it comes into more demanding play later on you've at least got a fighting chance.

Sadly, though, Chester's big chance at the big time is scuppered by an enemy far more common and far sadder than bad game design. Too Cool To Fool falls by the wayside because of an unfortunate set of vital statistics - it's got six

titchy little levels, five continues and one difficulty level, namely that for the likes of a seven-year-old with one eye shut and both hands tied behind someone else's back. You'll finish the first two levels without even noticing any bad guys exist, and by the time you reach the (very slightly) harder later sections, the game's generous and kindly learn-as-you-go

structure lauded earlier in this very review has left you extremely well prepared for the very little challenge that it subsequently throws at you.

# ... AND EASING OUT OF THEM

It's heartbreaking, really - in many ways, despite what seems like an uninspiring

start, this is actually a pretty neat and enjoyable platformer, not least thanks to the excellentness of your character, but while the gameplay contains several of the attractive elements of (apologies in advance) Super

Mario World, it's also a full 90 levels shorter. You'll get maybe two hours out of this one, and lacking even the traditional programmer's cop-out option of tougher difficulty settings to stretch the lifespan out a bit, it'll never see daylight again. Like Marc Bolan, James Dean and Buddy Holly before it, a criminal waste of a true dude.

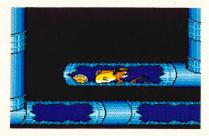

y all rights General Chaos should be brilliant. You control one team of soldiers, and the computer/other player controls the other. You begin by facing each other across a stretch of terrain and, as soon as the signal is given, you try to shoot each other to bits.



Bullets fly everywhere! Grenades explode! Soldiers run around screaming, diving for cover and falling over clutching their chests! Medics run on to tend to injured men! It's all rendered in intricately detailed graphics, with bomb-throwers even sticking their fingers in their ears as their bombs go off. And whoever manages to kill all the other player's men first wins. It's that simple.

Well, actually it's not quite that simple. These battles actually form part of a fullscale war, being waged between Moronica (your side) and Viceria (the other side, commanded by - raises eyebrows pointedly - General Chaos). You've got to fight over various scraps of land, which each have their own terrain features - trees, rivers. barbed wire, buildings, that sort of thing and the one who conquers the most wins.

#### **PICKING YOUR TEAM**

There's a choice of four different units to fight for you. Each has a different composition of Gunners (who fire machine guns longrange), Launchers (who fire whacking great rockets), Chuckers (who throw grenades),

There are some interesting cacti in this scenario. And some rocks

Scorchers (who carry flame-throwers) and Blasters (who detonate bombs).

So, by all rights it should be brilliant. but for some reason it's not. Maybe it's because the playing area is so small, so there isn't enough room for complex strategic manoeuvres. Maybe it's because you always know exactly where your enemy is. Maybe it's because although the controls are as simple as they could possibly be, they're still a bit of a handful considering how fast everything moves.

#### **EASY PEASY**

Or maybe it's because it's so easy. I played right through the game and beat the computer on my first go. The two-player game evens things out, but in General Chaos there are so many bullets flying about that it's impossible to tell what's going on, and who's winning. Much the same applies to the four-player mode.

General Chaos is a brilliant idea for a game, but only a true guns/war/death fanatic ought to actually go out and buy it.

t's a commonly observed thought that there have, in fact, only ever been seven novels written - all the rest are just variations on one of those seven themes. The same principle must also apply to video games, and

here (in the form of Golden Axe 3) we have the grandson of one of those original few.

Yep, Golden Axe was the first (and we're talking ever, in the history of the universe, here) walk-along-

Battle Toads, Captain America are all Golden Axe 3's cousins in the giant family tree of video games.

#### A WINNING FORMULA

But whereas Streets Of Rage 2, Turtles and the like have all taken that basic theme and then altered it slightly, Golden Axe 3 relies heavily on the original formula. The pace and format of the game are

exactly the same as in the original although the graphics have been significantly improved. There are now four characters to choose from (no Gillius

Thunderhead the dwarf) but two new monster-esque geezers waiting to be taken out for a test drive.

Another change is that this time you get to choose your route, Outrun style, to the final confrontation in the Dark Castle. This effectively doubles the game size from eight stages to sixteen as each route decision while not offering any variation in difficulty pits you against different monsters.

But that's your lot - this is Golden Axe the same as it ever was and I for one love it. Some of the more elaborate moves may well be just context-sensitive (pushing the same button will have different effects depending upon how you're facing your opponent), you'll find yourself simply using the same fighting manoeuvre over and over again until you come up against some bad guy who can defend against it and - yes you'll finish it too quickly (I finished it on my third attempt) - but there's something about this game that works.

Golden Axe 3 is one of the precious few games that I've played over the last few months which have made me stay late at the office, until being kicked out by the security guards - so it must be doing something right.

# EA's original *Populous* is one of *the* classic think-'em-ups. Here's Virgin Games with the sequel and here's Neil West playing God (Again – Andy)

wo Tribes Populous 2 - it's just like Populous, only better! But that's not really going to do, is it? Populous or Populous 2, the idea's the same. You're a god (for the purposes of the game, at least), and you're in control of the destiny of a tribe of little people who're struggling to eke a living from a barren computer-generated landscape. There are two or three of them to start off with, and they wander around till they find a nice, flat piece of land. Then they build a house on it. And, if all goes well, after a while another little person will pop out of the house and go and build one of his own - if he can find a flat piece of land. And the bigger the area he's got to

build on, the bigger the house he'll build. Given a really, really huge piece, he might even rustle up a whole town.

#### SMOOTHING THINGS OUT

And that's where you come in. Being a god, it's a simple matter for you to smooth out the landscape by raising and lowering pieces of it (through no more divine a means than pressing the A and B buttons).

Now, this is pretty good fun in itself, and curiously therapeutic. As well as making flat bits of land (like you're supposed to), you can make gigantic mountains rise up from the earth just by pressing button A a few times. Or you could make a huge mountain, and then squidge in the middle of it, just like making a "thumb pot" out of clay (only not quite so messy). Or you could write your name in chunks of ground. Or you could even recreate your favourite continent in its entirety – and all in

a matter of minutes. It's jolly good fun. And it helps, too, that the graphics are really nice – they're 3D, and highly detailed (as you can probably see), and scroll around pretty smoothly considering how complicated they are.

Even so, if that's all there was to it, pretty soon you'd start to get a bit fidgetty, and wonder

how *Populous 2* got to be one of the most famous computer games ever.

But that's *not* all there is to it. Theologically unsound though this might be, there's actually another god sharing the world with you, with his own tribe of little people who he's trying to look after, just like you're looking after yours. And pretty soon, as all these little people multiply and multiply, the two tribes are going to clash. They both want their own "Lebensraum", and they'll fight for it, beating each other up

and burning each others' houses down. Eventually one side will win, and if it's yours, you'll go on to the next of the game's 1000 (yelp) levels.

#### WORLD DISASTERS

But there's more! What Populous 2 is really all about is the "acts of god" you can call upon to assist your people in

their struggle. These range from earthquakes to lightning to floods to volcanoes, and can be launched against your opponent's tribe at will once you've built up the required "manna" (which is produced by your tribe in the fields around

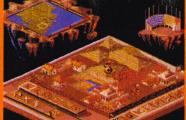

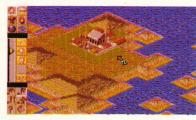

their houses). And this is where Populous 2 starts to improve on the original game. Populous only had about eight different "disasters", which you'd invoke, kill some people with and that would be it. The disasters in Populous 2 are: a) much more numerous and more varied, and b) more open-ended and subtle in operation. For example, columns of fire are much more effective if you dot a few trees around the place to fuel them. But the player on the receiving end can take advantage of the way they tend to search out high ground, and build a mountain in their path to draw

Here's a view of the whole playing area, a small chunk of which appears in the window beneath

The composition of the audience in this arena indicates who's got the most people, and hence who's winning. And if you've got a hero on the go, you'll see him in the middle

This is one of the slightly crap houses people build on small flat bits

They've built a whole town here (which you can smash down again at the press of a button - hur hur)

Your little people wear red...

These icons do little fiddly things, like instructing people whether to build houses, fight or whatever

These choose between six different categories of effects - fire, water etc. Within each of those there are specific "acts of god", not all of which might be available on each level

them away. It's all very tactical.

Another significant improvement over the original is that there's now a proper scenario - a sort of ancient Greece-type affair. This means Greek-style graphics (rather than the assortment of different "looks" of the first game) and a range of classical heroes which you can send behind enemy lines (equivalent to the knights of the original). It might not sound like much, but the game seems deeper and more focussed as a result.

#### IT'S PLAY TIME

However, one or two Populous flaws remain. The icons with which the game is controlled are a bit of a nightmare to negotiate, though they've been tidied up somewhat. (Computer versions of Populous are mouse-driven, and much more manageable.) And the small window through which you view the playing area means it can be tricky to keep track of what's going on in the game - often the only indication that your opponent's burning down your cities is a sporadic crackling

sound effect. It doesn't quite seem fair that the genuinely omnipotent computer always knows what's going on everywhere on the map, while you've got to keep scrolling around to keep tabs on everything. When things start hotting up later on, it can get frustrating, and the computer player's apparent invincibility can often be put down to the fact that you simply can't keep up with what he's doing.

But those are problems that it's hard to see any obvious remedies for and you'll be too busy enjoying yourself to care anyway.

Two Tribes Populous 2 is a fabulous game, and there's nothing else quite like it on the Mega Drive (apart from Populous, obviously). It's got strategy bits and arcade bits and unclassifiable (but fun) fiddlyabouty bits, and enough levels to keep you amused well into the next century. The only question you ought to be asking yourself is whether, as a cutting-edge console owner. you really want to be forking out for twoyear-old computer games. Make an exception just this once, I should.

You must all know about Ecco on the Mega Drive by now, it was one of last year's best games, and to think, there's no real violence to be had. No, the beauty of the game was the atmospheric graphics, the eerie soundtracks the glorious animation and, most important of all, the original and enchanting gameplay.

Ecco CD, however, is very much the

same game. Certainly efforts have been made to ensure that this version had certain "advantages" over the cart version, but what has been done by no means exploits the Mega CD's capabilities in order to spice up

the gameplay. The game itself is essentially the same. Yes, five or six more levels have been added, but the game is

#### HMMM, SOUNDS NICE TOO ...

The sound is presumably what is supposed to sell the game and, indeed, the blurb on the packaging does sound very impressive: "QSound Virtual Audio is a revolutionary multi-dimensional sound placement technology." Oooh, do tell... "This amazing sound placement technology gives you 180 degrees of audio in a greatly expanded

sound field." Erm, yes quite...

How this system works precisely is beyond us, and I suppose in a way it doesn't really matter. Essentially, you can wire the Mega CD up to an amp and a pair of

speakers and you get glorious CD stereo In other words, because Ecco appears in the middle of the screen, any splashes of sounds that he makes will appear to come from the middle of the screen and not any one of the speakers. And, of course, action coming from either side will be accompanied by sounds that appear to come from either side. It's all very clever, and when rigged up to an impressive set of speakers it does work well, and sound very good.

#### TARTED UP CART VERSION

But here's the downside. Ecco, it's true, is a brilliant game, and the CD version is improved, but not enough for it to be considered as an improvement over the cart version. If you already have the cart version, ignore this. But if not, adding Ecco to your collection will be a very wise move. It}s as superb a game as ever, but not as high scoring as the cartridge version for the very simple reason that it doesn't use the Mega CD to enhance either the gameplay or the graphics.

# GUNSTAR HEROES

Is this shoot-'em-up different enough to make it worth your dosh? Andy Dyer observes that the more things change, the more they stay the same, calls his girlfriend by the wrong name and writes this review from hospital

and I alone have solved the mystery of where all the ex-Neighbours script writers go. By the look of things, they get employed to write game plots for Sega. Get this: you and your brother (Double Dragon perhaps?) have to journey through strange and hostile worlds (Star Trek?), collecting four coloured gems (Dungeon Master?). At the risk of trashing the rest of the plot (and what plot would that be, exactly?), the Empire (Star Wars?) then kidnaps your girlfriend (Wonderboy?), offering an exchange - the girlie for the crystals (my God! A vaguely original bit!). You then have to whizz off into space and get past the various defences of the Empire ship, and get the crystals back again.

#### **VAGUE INTEREST**

On start-up, it all looks reasonably impressive. There are loads of different options for your fighter, forcing you to make decisions between being able to fire in eight directions (instead of four), or being able to move while firing. An option of weapons drags your attention span from 30 seconds to around, ooh, 40 seconds, letting you choose between bullets (crap), seeking

rockets (wimp option), and flame throwers (the equivalent of swinging a 15-foot kipper around your head but a great deal less amusing). Time's a-wasting though, so time to get wasting...

#### COLLAPSING INTO TEDIUM

Four words – scrolling shoot-'em-up.

Another two words – nothing new. The first stage holds the usual initial interest of a new game, but when you see that the other three accompanying it are almost identical except for the odd flashy effect and a few graphics, your

eyelids start to droop. Dozing through the next three worlds won't pose much of a problem to you or the fighter blokey, as you won't lose all that many lives if you do (still on the second play).

Having said that, there are quite a few enjoyable bits, but throughout all of them, you'll still only be standing around shooting things. This doesn't seem to be too much of



... until the second real stage of the game, when you reach for OFF

a problem at first, but it's all you'll ever find yourself doing, and after a while, it'll get on your nerves.

If you get to the fifth stage, there's a weird dice and board game system of working your way through about five rooms before the predictable kidnap and ransom scene, meaning you have to fly off into space and get all the crystals back again.

The space level makes for a slightly refreshing change from the normal scrolling platform thing, though it'll take you a while to get used to the pointlessly weird firing system – the only thing making you suffer in the hands of the

merciless villainous space pilot folk, who are presumably armed with half a dozen Kleenex and a cotton bud.

So what we've actually got here is a game that, though it's fun initially, gets steadily more and more dull, as each level is nothing novel enough to actually keep your interest all the way through. If you like Japanese scrolling shoot-'em-ups, you'll probably get on quite well with this, but if you actually stop and take a look at what you've just bought, you'll realise there's absolutely nothing new at all in this game.

### THE FLY-BY

If there's one special technique or playing tip that comes up again and again in the game (and indeed in this playing guide), it's what

we call the fly-by. Simply put, the fly-by is a way of checking out the artillery protecting say, a building, and then destroying it. Rather than give you some long-winded and possibly very confusing description of what to do, we're going to show you instead. Just

# RIP 'N' TIP

#### CAMPAIGN 1: WASHINGTON DC Password: 00000000000

Washington DC is under attack, and the President's life is in danger. There's a lot of flying to be done on this one so take note of where the fuel tanks are and keep an eye on your fuel level. You might also like to know that some gas stations will reveal armour repair crates when you blow them up, and you will get bonus points if you capture all four enemy commanders from the Terrorist HQs.

# MISSION 1: PROTECT THE MONUMENTS

A fairly simple opening task. Use one hellfire and two hydra missiles to destroy each HARV at the Library of Congress, and when you destroy the one furthest west, it will reveal an armour crate. Now fly to the other two monuments, using the same technique to get rid of them. You may need some ammo, but there's plenty of it about.

# MISSION 2: TERRORIST HQS

For Terrorist HQs these aren't very well protected. Mostly guarded by soldiers with AK-47s and the odd Twingun, this shouldn't give you too much trouble. Take out the AK-47s with your chaingun (a few rounds should do it) and use your hydras, about eight, for a quick kill. Now destroy the house, take out the soldier and then pick up the commander.

# MISSION 3: CAR BOMBS

Unlike the rest of the cars in the city, the Station Wagons (the car bombs) are fast and will fire back at you. Once you find them you don't have much time to blow them up because they're on a kamikaze mission. So fly up close to them and use a few hydras for a quick kill. Don't worry about them hitting you, because they don't cause that much damage.

# MISSION 4: AGENT AKBAR

This one's a bit easy. Find the shootout (or look at the map) and circle around the house, taking out the AK-47s with your chaingun. Don't shoot the Police cars (the President's a bit touchy about that), just swing around to the front of the house and chaingun the place. When the guy in the (very attractive?) yellow one-piece runs out, pick him up and he will reveal all.

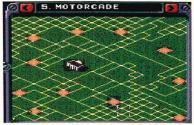

# MISSION 5: MOTORCADE

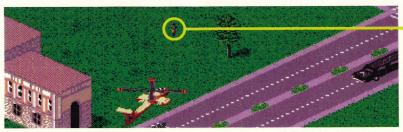
Mr Inconspicuous, that's our President. The city is under attack, there are terrorists everywhere and the Pres drives into the city in a great big stretch limo. Clever huh? Anyway, before you reach the motorcade, make sure you've loaded up with fuel and ammo (you might need some armour as well if you're pretty low). Now fly to the south-west corner and take out the two AK-47 guys. Blow up the road block and you're off. Using the map to determine where the next, ahem, obstruction is, fly ahead of the motorcade and deal with anything you bump into. Guide the car safely to the White House and that's the first campaign finished. Or is it?





# MISSION 6: ENEMY SNIPER

You can actually complete this mission before the last one if you like. As you're protecting the motorcade and you pass by the CIA (Criminal Intelligence Agency) building, pick up the guy running away, and the plans of the jungle fortress are yours. That's most definitely campaign one over. Or you can pick him up after you've done mission five and made sure the Pres is safe.



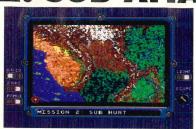

# CAMPAIGN 2: SUB ATTACK Password: RL6PDY39SPM

This is the first opportunity for you to leave your Comanche and try your hand at something else. Once you get into the hovercraft it's a good idea to move around for a bit, just to get used to the controls and weapons. Oh, and when you're in the hovercraft, try blowing up a few gun boats and if you're lucky, you'll find an extra life crate (or two).



# MISSION 1: RESCUE NAVY SEALS

This is a nice easy start for you here. Fly over to the Navy Seals, take out the AK-47s and pick them up. Read what they have to say and then fly them to their helicopter. They will jam the electric fence surrounding the hovercraft and now you've got to go and get it. Try not to worry too much about this because it gets a lot harder from here on in.

#### MISSION 2: ELECTRIC FENCE

Because you've found the Navy Seals, they have turned off the electrical fence surrounding the hovercraft. So fly towards the fence, destroy all the guards around it (your chaingun is probably the best weapon to use for the job) and then simply land on the helipad in order to swap vehicles. Now, er, hover off and get on with the very next mission - Plutonium.

#### MISSION 3: PLUTONIUM

To create nuclear weapons, you need a few substances, one of which is plutonium. So if you take it away from the Madman, he's going to be a little bit miffed, which is the general idea. With land- and water-based craft carrying the plutonium, it's a good job you've got a hovercraft. Use the map to figure out your best route, and see where the fuel drums and ammo crates are as well. The best tactic to use for the water-based craft is to get in front of them and then lay a mine in their path. They sail over it and blow up. You can use the same tactic for the land transport, but your mines are limited, so use your hydras as well.

#### MISSION 4: F-15 PILOT

Do you fancy a different co-pilot? Yeah? OK then, this is what you have to do. If you rescue this guy (Faceman) before he sinks into the ocean, your wish is granted. Take out the AK-47s and then pick him up. Oh, but before you fly off for your next mission, blow up the F-15 so that your technology doesn't fall into enemy hands. But you'd guessed that already hadn't you?

# MISSION 5: NUCLEAR SUBS

You'd think that this being the last mission on the campaign it would be hard. Well, using this technique it isn't. Find a sub and approach it from the front. Lay two mines in its path and watch it blow up. The last sub, however, is a bit more difficult to destroy; use your cannons and rockets to take out the gun turret and then lay the mines in front of it.

# **CAMPAIGN 3: TRAINING GROUND**

Password: 9VMPK39W4HS

There are no new vehicles to find on this level and therefore no special techniques to learn. Although your fuel is quite limited on this level, it's worth hanging around and blowing up most of the huts and tents to see what's hidden underneath them. In fact this tactic can be used throughout most of the game so you'd better get used to it.

#### MISSION 1: TRAINING CAMP

Before attacking the training camp, fly directly south from your starting point and you will see four tents. Blow them and the tents up to reveal a very useful speed winch. Each training camp's guard tower is very easy to destroy and a few well-aimed hydra missiles should do it, leaving you to search under some tents.

#### MISSION 2: LANDING ZONE

Simple really. Pick up the man by the tent and then check your map to see where the landing zone is. Drop him off and you've finished mission two. Oh, but blow up the tower, because you may need to come back here to drop off some people.

#### MISSION 3: MOBILE RADAR 1

Your first real opposition takes the form of Sheridan tanks, and you'd better get used to dealing with them because there are loads of 'em on this level. Use the fly-by technique and let fly with a hellfire and two hydras as you go past. Don't waste your ammo on the mobile radar, just hover and use your chaingun.

#### MISSION 4: COMMUNICATION EXPERT

The communication expert is easy enough to find, just use the map to figure out which hut he's in, but don't fly off without blowing up a few of the other huts so you can rescue some more people. As you fly off to the telephone poles so the communication expert can fix his tap, you will see a Sheridan tank in the far right-hand corner of the barracks – don't ignore this, blow it up because it will give you a very useful extra life. When you've dropped the expert off at the poles, don't be tempted to blow the poles up, just leave them alone or you will ruin the campaign and have to go back to base.

#### MISSION 5: TANK DEPOT

Before you enter the Tank Depot, make sure all your quotas (ammo, fuel and amour) are as high as they can be. The people you pick up from the huts should be dropped off at the landing zone for some more armour points if you need them. Although it sounds obvious, don't attack the dormant tanks in the depot; take out the active ones first with a few fly-by attacks and then use your chaingun to destroy the dormant ones. If anyone runs out of the tanks, pick them up for some armour points you might need later on.

#### MISSION 6: MOBILE RADAR 2

There's not a lot I can say about this mission because it is exactly the same as mission three, so, er, do what you did then all over again.



#### MISSION 7: TRAINING HQ

Each of the three training huts is well guarded, so a few fly-bys may be the order of the day. Once you've taken out all the perimeter defences (all very military this isn't it?) capture the commander from each hut and they will give you the radio codes, and the nuke reactor will appear as if by magic.



#### MISSION 8: NUCLEAR REACTOR

Fly around the three buildings and take out the towers, guns and the tanks. Blow up the buildings and anybody inside them. Blow up the boxes, but don't touch the contents, pick them up instead. You will also find some fuel hidden in one of the boxes. Now fly back to the base and get ready for some really tough flying conditions.

# CAMPAIGN 4: NIGHT STRIKE PASSWORD: XTHC9XTLMZF

This is definitely a very hard level. Not only are there very different missions for you to scratch your head over, there's also the very difficult task of flying around at night. You can see bits of terrain, but not much, so be careful. And because it's dark, you can't see where the ammo and fuel are. But we can soon sort that little problem out.

# MISSION 7: WEAPONS COMMANDER

Mission seven before any of the others? Yep, that's right. Because you can't see any of the fuel or ammo, you could do with all the locations of them, well the Weapons Commander knows them, so capture him first. You will come under a lot of heavy artillery, but be quick and you should be OK.

# MISSION 1: WATCH TOWERS

Although it's dark, hitting things with your chaingun will shed some light on the situation. The towers are in a nice little circle so attack them in a circling pattern, but be careful that you don't attract the attention of any helicopters or you'll have to deal with them. To get rid of the towers, simply shoot the gunners on top of them you don't have to destroy them.

# MISSION 2: GREEN BERET

There are two parts to this mission, and the second part is slightly harder than the first. Pick up the Green Beret and then fly towards the village (marked on the map). Don't fly straight into the village or you'll run into an ACAR. Make a fly-by move using a hellfire and two hydras. This will secure the village and then you can land and drop off the Green Beret.

# MISSION 3: HELICOPTER PADS

A bit of a deceptive title for a mission this one. Although you do have to blow up the pads, it's the helicopters that will cause you real problems. They're as fast as you are and packed with the same armour. But they only fire hellfires at you. So hover a reasonable distance from them and you can avoid the hellfires quite easily. Then return two hellfires and watch the sky light up.

# MISSION 4 & 5: SCIENTISTS & POWS

Rescuing the scientists and the POWs can be treated as one because they're all grouped together so tightly. The prison camp isn't well guarded - one ACAR on the outskirts and then some AK-47s dotted around. When you blow open a cage though, someone may appear out of the bushes, so keep an eye out.

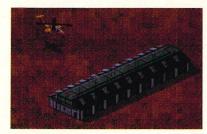

# MISSION 6: WEAPONS PLANT

Here's where you'll encounter the most trouble for this campaign. Most of the ACARs are situated around the weapons plants, and they'll cause you a lot of bother. Concentrate your fire on the weaponry before you even think about destroying the plants. Then simply blow up the boxes and then their contents. You might as well blow up the grounded fighters as well.

# CAMPAIGN 5: SAN PULOSO CITY Password: VNGZKRV7SGG

Our last campaign for this month, and things really are getting tough. This is also your chance to use one of the other attack vehicles to be found in the game, the Assault Cycle. Before you get to that, however, there's a lot of flying to be done. Everything on this level armour repair, fuel and ammo - is in short supply above ground, but there's guite a bit hiding in the numerous buildings dotted around the landscape, so it's always worth wiping out a small village to see if anything is there. To help you out on this level, the speed winch is hidden in a building in-between the left- and right-hand buildings on the first mission. For a very useful extra life, destroy the buildings north of the UN Landing Zone.



# MISSION 1: UN RESCUE

Take out the towers on each corner of the fortress with one hydra. Each building houses seven hostages, 21 in all. You can only hold six at a time, so a few trips will be necessary (you only need 18 to complete the mission but those extra three may come in handy).

# MISSION 2: DRUG PLANT

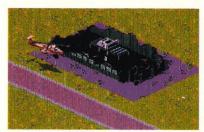
Use your chaingun on the buildings because they don't need much to blow them up. Either confiscate or blow up the drugs, but don't hit the men in white coats; pick them up instead.

# MISSION 3: COUNTERFEITING

These buildings are really easy to blow up, but be prepared for reinforcements to show up from behind you. And don't forget to pick up anyone inside the buildings.

#### MISSION 4: POWER GRID

Approach the power lines from the north or you will enter a Danger Zone. Edge as far as you can go and just simply chaingun them until they blow up. Take out all four and you can move onto the next mission.

#### MISSION 5: ARMOURED CARS

Destroy the downtown buildings, which will flush out the cars, and then fly to the north of the Police Station (north of your landing zone), land your Comanche and switch to the Assault Cycle. To destroy the armoured cars use a similar technique as you did with the submarines on campaign two. Get in front of them and drop a mine, then sit back and watch them explode.

#### MISSION 6: DETONATORS

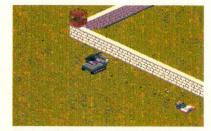
As the cars explode they might drop a detonator. Carefully, ie not too fast, creep up to them and collect them to complete this mission.

# MISSION 7: C4 EXPLOSIVES

Before you collect the C4 explosives from the armoury, use your cycle to take out all the MLRSs. If you are riding the bike, their weaponry can't hurt, but if you're in your Comanche, they do lots of damage. Once you've got them out of the way, get the chopper, destroy the armoury and collect that valuable C4 stuff.

#### MISSION 8: DRUG LORD WAR ROOM

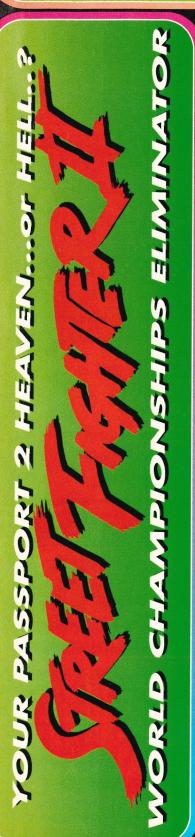
This last mission is actually pretty easy. Fly around and take out the small trucks around the edge of the war room and then land on the pad to drop your co-pilot off. He'll run in and set the charges to blow up the war room. This takes a bit of time though, so while you're waiting, fire a few rockets at the gunners on top of the buildings. When your co-pilot comes out, pick him up, watch the fireworks and then fly back to the base.

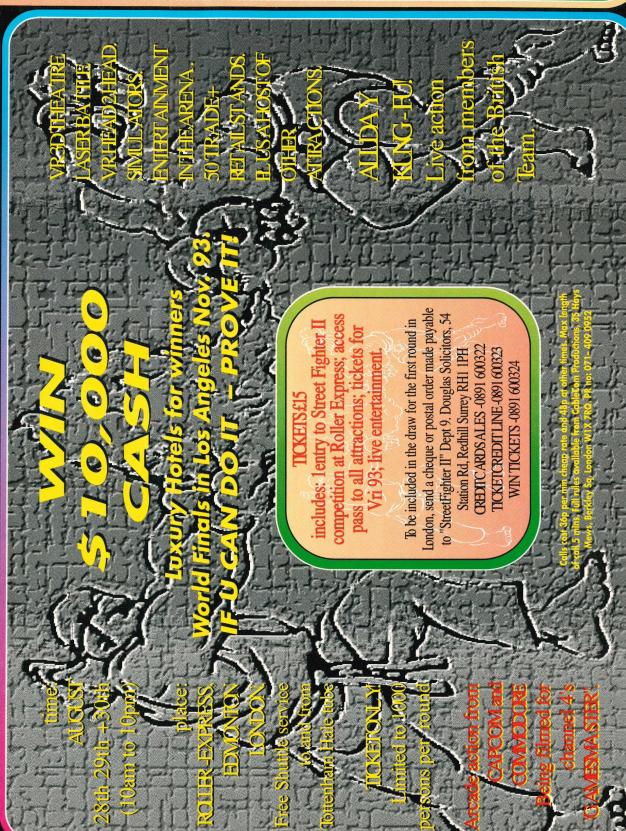

And to really show that the Mega Drive could come up with some exciting, playable and downright gorgeous games, Sega came up with *Castle of Illusion: Starring Mickey Mouse.* 

The first Disney tie-in (since then we've had Quackshot, Fantasia and the soon-to-be-released

Aladdin), Sega wanted to show what their 16-bit wonder was capable of, and boy did this accomplish that. But as this is a Disney game, you can't ignore the plot. It's typical fluffy, cutesy stuff, but that's vital to the game. Minnie, the love of your life, has been kidnapped by Mizrabel the Witch and has been taken to her castle. You don't like this and you set out to rescue your woman ('cos you're like that you see).

In order to reach Minnie you've got to get past five big levels and five bosses. Each level

has its own particular theme and each boss has its own method of stopping you. Mickey is not defenceless though, and has two unique attacking strategies, the first of which is quite normal. By picking up the right power-up on the level, Mickey can throw objects (apples on level one for instance). The second method of attack, however, is a bit er, rude. For some reason, Mickey likes to bottom-bounce people. Yep, one hit on someone's head with Mickey's cheeky cheeks and they disappear.

The reason this game is still reasonably high up in the Top 100 becomes apparent when you sit down and actually play it. Even though there are faster and prettier games around today, this is still a cute, fun-to-play and great-looking game. In fact, the cake level (duplicated in the sequel, World Of Illusion) is a real treat to look at.

But, and there's always a but, don't prepare yourself for a fight. Using the Mickey Mouse name is going to appeal to the younger Mega Drive owners, and as we all know (or at least the bods at Sega do) young gamers just can't handle tough games. With only five levels, although they are quite large, five easy-to-beat bosses and not much else in your way, you're going to finish this one very easily. And because it's not as addictive as, say, *Sonic*, you're not going to come back after you've finished it.

It gets a bit complex here, but stay with us as we try to explain it. Sarah is the mother of John Connor. And John Connor is the leader of the human resistance fighters in the year 2009. Skynet (a computer that controls all the machines in a post-apocalyptic future) has sent a Terminator (old Arnie) back in time to rid the future of John Connor, who is causing a

lot of trouble by not dying when he's supposed to. Stopping John Connor by going back in time is easy, you just kill his mother, Sarah. And that's where you, yes you, come in. You see, you've got to prevent the Terminator from getting to her.

Following the plot of the film very closely, you must work your way through four levels of platform shooting-action, getting rid of anyone who gets in your way. The levels are quite large, but

they're also pretty basic. And while the shootrun-shoot gameplay is fun and very exciting for the first ten minutes, you do begin to think that a bit more could have been made of the game – maybe some sub games or something to break up the monotony. But no, four levels of running, jumping and shooting that's also quite easy to finish is all you get. Graphically, it's a real treat, with some lovely dark, moody scenery. The ears also receive some very nice attention as a result of the excellent futuristic soundtrack. But all this pales into

insignificance, because you'll finish this very quickly and once you've actually got through it you won't come back for more. Don't worry though because the CD version, due soon, should improve on the cart game quite a bit.

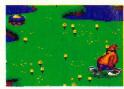

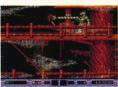

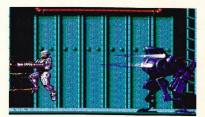

Then of course, in even later levels you travel further into the future and come up against a whole new range of adversaries. By all accounts there are Terminator Spiders, Terminator Dogs, Hunter Killer craft and Terminator Hamsters (Are you entirey sure about that last one Dyer – Neil). And of course, as always in these games, you can pick up a large range of replacement weapons such as missiles, high powered bullets and lasers.

Anyway, needless to say, anyone who's a bit partial to platform shoot-'em-ups will no doubt find a fair bit of entertainment here. The graphics are looking pretty good and the gameplay is very fluid. Although, it must be said, it did appear to be just a little bit on the easy side. Yes, the action is very frantic, and at times you feel like there's no escape from certain hazardous situations, but there's plenty of energy to be found so quite often you'll just plough through showers of bullets safe in the knowledge that you'll be able to power back up shortly afterwards.

Hopefully we'll be able to review it next month, but be warned, despite the title, the subject matter of the game doesn't really capture the feel of the comic-books, but on the upside, it still, at this stage, appears to be quite a polished blaster. Stick with us, and we'll give you so much Exo-skeletal action it'll be coming out of your ears (Ooh er. That sounds a bit rude – Neil)

t's the one we've all been waiting for. EA are arguably the masters of sport sims, so EA's entry into the world of Soccer should, we would hope, be just as spectacular as their previous achievements. Well, it's too early to say at the moment. The game is still in it's very early stages of development so when we played the game it didn't exactly flow, but certainly, it does look promising.

For a start the graphics and the viewpoint used are very effective and there's lots of neat animation on the players. Secondly, all the elements needed to make a stonking footy game are in there too. As well as a faithful reproduction of the rules and so on there are also a few little touches that you don't often find in other games of this sort. A good example is in the passing. Usually if you want to pass to someone who's behind you, you have to turn around. Not so in EA soccer. simply decide who to pass to and if he's behind you, your player will neatly 'heel' the ball back. Oh yes, and something else worthy of note (while not enhancing the gameplay) are the sound effects. Ball sounds and so on are fine. but the best bit is the crowd. A variety of crowd sounds have been sampled and the game automatically plays them back according to what's happening on screen. So for example a chant will be going on then, when a goal's scored a huge cheer can be heard. Better still though, if a shot at goal just misses, the cheer will be cut short to be replaced by an almighty groan, just like the real thing. It really adds a lot of atmosphere. And finally, the game will be compatible with EA's soon to be released Four Way Play adapter so it'll be great for boozy evenings in with a small group of mates.

As I've already said it's still very unfinished but don't worry, we'll get our hands on a more polished version next month and tell you a little more about it. If you're into footy games, you'd better stick around.

has to be taken not to topple over the edge of platforms. The only other control to master is the pick up/drop option. And how tricky it is to master. Press button C to pick up an object then, wait for it, press it again to drop an object. You can carry only three things at once, and to use them you have to simply drop an object in the relevent place. If it's not the right place, the object will just sit there, on the floor, doing nothing. And as an example of the puzzles, at one stage there's a pirate blocking your way onto his ship. Drop a barrel of rum next to him (once you've found one of course) and he grabs it and runs off.

The game is, to be accurate, BLOODY HUGE! You start off having to collect 250 stars from around the play area, but the play area is spread over lots of huge regions like forests, towns, sewers, pirate ships, undersea and over sea environments and so on. And because of the way it's all laid out, it'll take you ages to even progress a little way through it.

Like I said, the original 8-Mbit games didn't really inspire me much, but having seen the Mega Drive game, I must admit to finding the simple yet boggling puzzles rather intriguing, and the map is well designed to the point of just screaming out to be explored. The mansions are viewed in isometric 3D and all of the rooms are very detailed, containing many objects of furniture. What Guy has to do is enter a room with a family member in it. A series of glowing spots will appear on various furnishings. This is a sign that they're ready for the haunting. When a glowing area appears, Guy leaps into it, then leaps back out, and this will trigger off a scary happening (for example, if he leaps into, and out of, a knife drawer in the kitchen, all the knives start flying out of their own accord).

The trick is to make the family members so scared that they leave the room. Then you follow them and continue the process until they leave the house. Additionally, you can even possess a person's body in order to enhance your abilities to put the willies up the family.

We rarely see original games these days, so with any luck, good gameplay permitting, *Haunting* could well turn out to be a real treat.

# SILPHEED

# Silpheed. Not to be confused with Starwing

fter all the hype surrounding this game, MEGA finally got to see a pretty damn-near finished version of Silpheed. And of course we know what form all the hype has been taking don't we? Yes, exclamations of "Poos on Starwing from a great height" and "Stuff that up the cartridge port on your SNES" have been bandied about with gay abandon, but is it really the Starwing beater that everyone's been expecting? Well, that decision will have to be made in the review, but we should perhaps put the record straight first.

This game is not like Starwing, and it shouldn't really be considered a competitor. This isn't a cop out, but, in truth, Starwing was a true 3D shoot-'em-up in which the spacecraft you piloted interacted from a first person perspective with all the surrounding scenery. Silpheed on the other hand is a much more traditional affair with the main sprite moving up, down, left, and right around the screen (although there is a little perspective in there) while waves of alien formations come down the screen towards you. The stunning motherships and other scenery you see here are purely incidental to the game. True, on some levels the backdrops are cleverly overlaid with polygon generated "features" which do interact with your ship (interact is just our ludicrous way of saying you can crash into them), but by and large the scenery is just cosmetic.

So there we have it. Silpheed won't be judged as a 3D shoot-'em-up, it will be viewed as simply a shoot-'em-up. What a rip off I hear you cry, but just bear in mind that the best ever blaster on the Mega Drive is Hellfire, a simple, horizontally-scrolling affair with traditional attack wave patterns rather than any clever or elaborate visual trickery. MEGA STVAR

Dear MEGA,
I have a fault in my
Japanese Mega Drive. It
keeps doing strange
things. It all started in late
September last year for no

reason at all. It started printing sort of double images on the screen and the graphics started flickering, so I took it in for repair at a place that said it would cost £35. On 31 October it came back fixed, or so they said at the shop. When we got it back home it was wrapped up with a security sticker on it signed and dated 31 October. However, it had the same fault, only this time it was worse. So... (Insert heart-achingly annoying tale of waiting, false promises, dodgy repairs, overcharging and general malpractice on the part of the repairer over a period of six months – Ed)... until it ended in a situation by which we were charged £35 for repairs that never took place and yet somehow took six months.

Since then I have been told by the consumer council (who, until it came down to a "my word against theirs" argument, had been very helpful) that there is nothing I can do and had best give up.

So the message is, if anyone is going to have their console fixed, just make sure you photocopy any receipts and make sure you get a receipt so you don't end up like me.

Dear Philip.

Yep — a nightmare. But at least your story may prompt other users to be more careful. Most computer dealers and repairers are completely honest and won't mess you around, but there are always bad apples. The high street shops may have their faults, but you can be pretty sure that your console comes with a year's guarantee and so within that time, repairs will be fixed for free. Buying secondhand, or imported hardware from independent dealers (or simply if your console is over a year old), however, leaves you having to get your console fixed yourself — and that's when problems can occur.

According to the Office of Fair Trading, all repairs have to be performed: a) with a reasonable care and skill – a "proper standard of

workmanship" is to be expected; and b) within a reasonable time (28 days is deemed "reasonable").

When you take your console in for repair, the trick is to pin the repairer down to a fixed price and a fixed time of completion. Get this written down on the slip you're given when you hand over your hardware (you should be given a slip with a reference number on it – purely for the repairer's sake so he can easily work out which console belongs to who) and you'll be in a much better bargaining position were things to foul up.

Remember though, an "estimate" is NOT the same as a quotation – no one is legally obliged to make sure the charge matches the estimate, hence you'll be lucky if you can find a repairer willing to offer you a cast iron quotation for the work he's about to undertake.

If things do go wrong, you're not in the best bargaining position – they've got your console remember. The only advice the Office of Fair Trading can offer the individual is to pester and pester the repairer until the work is completed to your satisfaction.

"It takes a lot of persistence. This, of course, takes a lot of time and effort, but unfortunately there's really not a lot more that can be done," they gloomily point out.

So, it would seem that the only sure way to get your console fixed with 100% confidence is to take it somewhere recommended by a friend who's had dealings with the company and knows them to be reliable and honest. But we must restress the point – MEGA is sure that 99% of repairers are completely honest and won't muck you around.

As for you Philip, MEGA hopes that your console's working OK now, but it must be pointed out that you needn't have paid anything for the work done – as it didn't meet the "reasonable time period" clause. Of course, it's not always easy arguing with shopkeepers who are about to see what they thought was a tidy profit evaporate in front of their eyes, but stick to your guns and (if it's absolutely necessary) threaten to contact the Office of Fair Trading, the Department of Trade and Industry, or even just your local newspaper – and you may be surprised at the results. Neil

A lot of the reason that films on video receive what many would describe as "harsh" ratings is that because videotapes can be paused, rewound, fast forwarded and put in slowmotion, scenes of sex and violence can be de-contextualised and viewed over and over again. This isn't possible in Night

Trap - the "horrific" scenes can't be recalled over again and again but occur just at one stage each playing, making them far less open to abuse and therefore less damaging. Someone ought to point this out to the censors. Actually, we'll do it. Consider it done. Neil

2. Surely you mean £269.99 to £210.99? Well, there are four very good reasons why we can expect a BIG Mega CD price drop: 1) The price in America has just dropped from \$299.99 to \$219.99 and the UK tends to follow the USA's lead; 2) With the imminent arrival of the Mega CD 2 (the same machine but in a different plastic casing) Sega have been able to drop the price of manufacturing Mega CDs dramatically, making room for a price drop; 3) Traditionally, new pieces of hardware are dropped in price soon after their launch the Mega Drive was first on sale in the UK for £199.99, but soon dropped to £149.99; and 4) With the increased competition from new consoles arriving on the scene (such as 3DO, Atari's Jaguar and Atari's 1200based console), the Mega CD will simply have to drop in price to stay competitive.

So it all adds up to a pretty definite price drop – my money says that the Mega CD will be down to £199.99 for Christmas. This isn't disastrous news for all of you who've bought one (although MEGA did point out that prices were likely to drop soon when it was launched) – you still got to play with the hottest piece of videogaming kit six months before anyone else – but it's great news for those of you still keen to buy one.

It's taken a lot longer for decent Mega CD software to appear than anyone anticipated (what you saw of Night Trap and Sewer Shark is, it has to be said, as good as it gets – it's got nothing to do with Datel's adaptor) and no, Nick Alexander wasn't extracting the urine – I'm sure he's as concerned as you are.

One of the main factors keeping Mega CD software back is the number of users. There's little point in a software house making a big splash and releasing a decent "NEW" Mega CD game when (if they were to wait six months) they could release it when there are twice as many Mega CD owners to sell it to. Any game now will be regarded as an "old" game in six months time and isn't likely to be bought. Electronic Arts, for example, are holding back development of their games for this very reason.

honest) most don't bother importing securitychipped games anyway. But, just to make sure, follow these guidelines and you'll be OK.

(i) Be sure to ask the importer if the game will work on a conventional, untampered-with Mega Drive. If in doubt, ask for a demo of the game in action.

(ii) If he can't demo it, make sure you get and keep a receipt for the game when you hand over the cash.

(iii) If, subsequently, the game won't work on your console, then provided you've kept your receipt and provided you made it clear to the importer that you intended to play the game on a UK machine, then legally he hasn't got a leg to stand on – you're fully entitled to all your money back or a substitute game.
