

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# Believe '53 Will See: Return of the Roadmen

For some years now that cheery, breezy, friendly gny, who called around with the very latest news, and then went into his sales "song-and-dance" regarding his new (and, as always, the-finest-his-factory-hadbuilt) "equipment story", may soon be seen in greater numbers again.

Ever since before War II, roadmen began to decline in numbers. The last war practically pushed them out of the picture.

Long distance telephones, speedy airplane travel, faster communication and shipment of all kinds, sort of closed a modern-type steel door in the face of the friendly, cheery, breezy roadman.

But, these past few years, roadmen have been returning. They've been popping into offices of distributors, jobbers and operators, everywhere thruout the industry.

And the funny thing about all this is these people like to see them. Like to hear them tell of their experiences "on the road". Like to hear the news of what's doing in some town some miles away. Just exactly what's happening at the big factories. And what's new for the coming months.

Tremendous boom demand for equipment of all kinds, as well as continued closer telephone conducted sales by wholesaling forces, sort of lost contact for many manufacturers between their ultimate source of sale, and their factories.

Few of the modern factories have enough roadmen (like factories had in what is now nostalgically known as "the old days") to cover anything much, but the high spots of the country.

Usually, roadmen of this modern era, make it their business to call on the firm's leading distributors. They scoot about here and there for a day or two. And then keep right on going to another large distributor's headquarters where, once again, they repeat the procedure.

Yet, the advertising of each one of the factories, as well as the advertising of jobbers and distributors, hits right to the ultimate and final source of sale (and income) —the operators.

Only a very, very few factories can today | to beat the bushes for business.

boast that they have any sort of coverage at all of their ultimate consumers.

This is rather sad, according to many well known operators. Especially those operators who headquarter in out-of-the-way towns, "hidden in the country", as the trade expression goes.

These operators used to look forward to the visits of roadmen. They liked to have them call around. Enjoy a meal or two with them. Listen to the roadmen tell about what was going on in other territories. Get better acquainted so doing. Get closer to the factory thru the roadman. And, thereby, better understand the roadman's firm and the people who captained the firm.

The roadman was sort of a lighted human lantern—the lantern of factual knowledge —of this and that and the other thing that was of vital interest to the operator—especially the small town operator.

With production zooming to higher levels because of the inflow of more and more materials to factories, there will soon, many leaders in the trade believe, be a rebirth of the old-fashioned type of roadman.

The guy who made his home his auto. Who traveled from town to town and spent time with the operators. Who "sold" the equipment of his factory. And his factory only. Who could tell what was happening everywhere in the field. Who knew the habits, the likes and dislikes, of all of his customers and almost everyone else, too.

The kind of friendly, breezy, cheery sort of lad who always wore a smile. Who always had a ready laugh. Who always knew a new joke or two. Who could entertain a bit. And who always could enjoy himself with the families of his friends — the operators.

Who, in the long run, proved a tremendous and profitable asset to the factory he represented.

Perhaps it's just a nostalgic factor in the continued better business of leading factories. But, at the same time it's based on hard-headed, cold business facts.



The record business is booming.

Page 4 (EDITORIAL)

Almost every company reported that December was the largest sales month in many years. Moreover that accelerated rate of busi-ness is continuing into January, from all available evidence.

Why this great increase in sales?

There are three basic reasons, it seems to us.

First, American Music during the past couple of years has gone through a revolution. And it has taken the American public until now to catch up with it in acceptance.

In the last couple of years, our music has come to be almost completely dominated by the folk field. Where hits have not actually been written by folk writers, they have at the very least been in-fluenced by them. Renditions have almost all had some folk flavor. In other words almost the entire business has revolved around the folk wheel.

While this type of music has gained great favor, there were many former record buyers who were not attuned to it and it has taken a period of constantly hearing it for them to accept it.

Now folk music—and all its derivatives—is firmly established with the American public. That is the kind of music they want to hear. Even in their popular music, they want the folk feeling.

And so the result is that we are now attaining a greater record buying public than ever, what with those who liked the folk type before and those who have learned to like it from constant hearing.

The second influence in making for greater record sales has been the increased number of adults who have begun to buy records.

Until very recently-and even now-record people would speak about hits being made by the 12-18 group. They were undoubtedly the largest buyers of records. But now a change seems to be coming into the buying picture. Adults are frequenting record shops more than ever before.

Perhaps the acceptance of folk music, which we just discussed, is one of the reasons, i.e. adults too now find they like that type of song and so buy it for their own enjoyment.

Another reason that is advanced is that now that TV has played out its initial impact, listeners are more selective in the shows they see and so have a great deal of time left for other forms of enter-tainment. Since, however, TV has taught them to center their entertainment in the home, record playing is one substitute that fits in very well with their new habits.

Lastly one of the major reasons for the increased sales of disks is the greater exposure they have been getting. Dick jockey shows have been increasing all the time as the economics of radio favors that type of program.

And juke boxes, which have been spreading to every type of location, have at the same time been increasing in capacity and pragramming possibilities.

The newest type juke boxes play anywhere from 80 to 120 sides. This means that records which formerly could find no place on them, now have much greater chances of being heard. The great value of juke box play is that everyone in the location must hear it when it's played. And it's a well known fact that listeners learn to like disks and buy them after hearing them a few times when they might never have even considered them if they had only heard them once.

These seem to be the main considerations in the current disk boom. There are undoubtedly other reasons which we will discuss from time to time.

But the most important thing is that people are buying records at a faster rate than ever before. That's what everyone in this business wants to see.



# BETTE McLAURIN (Coral 60906; 9-60906)

B "MY DREAMS OF YOU" (2:56) [CHALLENGE MUSIC] Bette McLaurin does a top flight job in her sweet manner on a lovely ballad. Her voice is lovely.

"DO YOU KNOW WHY" (2:20) [MUSIC PUBLISHERS HOLD-ING CO.] This might be the one the thrush has been waiting for. She does a top flight job on a most lovely ballad with an interesting lilt to it. Don Red-man supplies a great backing.

## AL MARTINO (Copitol 2353; F-2353)

B "RACHEL" (2:35) [HALLIBUR-TON MUSIC] A fast moving rousing and beaty background is set up by Monty Kelly for a powerful belting vocal rendition by Al Martino. This presentation by Al is real ex-citing and might happen. It's great for the boxes.

**B** "ONE LONELY NIGHT" (2:51) [LAUREL MUSIC] Al softens up to ease through a lovely ballad that he delivers warmly with his strong voice. The lush backing of a chorus creates an inviting air.

# DON CHERRY (Decco 28548; 9-28548)

G''CHANGEABLE'' (2:17) [KINGSWAY MUSIC] An ok vocal interpretation of a cute romantic ditty is offered by Don Cherry. The light backing is set up by Grady Mar-tin and his Slew Foot Five.

B "A LOVER'S QUARREL" (2:26) [MELODY TRAILS] The song-ster shows up to better advantage on this lovely ballad with a folk like aire. The tune is pretty and might happen with a push. The string backing is fit-ting ting.

# THE WEAVERS (Decco 28542; 9-28542)

B "DOWN IN THE VALLEY" (2:54) [FOLKWAYS MUSIC PUB.] The Weavers and their fine manner of putting across a pretty folk tune can be well noted as they chant this classic oldie that everyone knows. A fine side.

(2:41) (THE BAY OF MEXICO" (2:41) [FOLKWAYS MUSIC PUB.] The talented group harmonizes on a most beautiful folk item that might develop into another "Top Of Old Smoky." Their whistling, and solo chanting are excellent.

B "BLUE PORCELAIN'' (2:07) [VERONIQUE PUB.] Norman shows some more top notch arranging on a flighty fast moving full string and lush instrumental. This might happen



more fine coverage on a tune that was big in Philly. Jo Ann handles the vocal on this slow ballad too. BLUE BARRON ORCHESTRA (MGM 11404; K-11404)

(MGM 11404; K-11404) G "DID ANYONE CALL FOR ME" (3:11) [LEEDS MUSIC] Blue Barron and his ork set up a smooth backing for Susan Laughton as she eases through a slow blues item. Jack McCormick narrates in a low voiced Ink Spot talking style. Interesting. G "SECOND FIDDLE" (2:26) [VA-LANDO MUSIC] Betty Clark and the Ensemble glide through a cute bouncer with leader Barron. The hand-clapping, peppy novelty makes for good listening.



**G**"WEST VIRGINIA POLKA" (2:34) [DANA MUSIC] A sock instrumental delivery of a peppy and rousing polka is sent forth by Frank Wojnarowski and his boys. The clari-net takes the lead. Polka fans ought go for this one.

<sup>a</sup>BOHEMIAN POLKA" (2:32) [VITAK-ELSNIC] Another spunky polka item that's perfect for the polka dancers is eased through by the men. This side is not as jolting as the top.

# JOE KURAT ORCHESTRA (Dano 3107)

© "SUNNYSIDE POLKA" (2:29) [DANA MUSIC] Joe Kurat and his men belt out a polka that's a natu-ral for the right locations. The instru-mentation is terrific. It's full of pep.

Accompanying the dice was a little "explanation" penned by the M-G-M recording artist: "Anyway you spin 'em . . . you win again."


# **Disk Biz By Storm**



The 25 year old bucktoothed Swedish gent, whose real name is Gosta Nordgren, is thrilling the pub-lic with millions of his records. The singing heartthrob who lacks any voice at all has a natural quality in it that leads the public to identify themselves with it. Snoddas, a former fishmonger who



Snoddas, a former fishmonger who liked to play bandy, a Swedish form of ice hockey, always snodde (whisked past) the ball which won him the name of Snoddas. The athlete became a crooner when he was asked to sing on an amateur radio show. The tune that he warbled instantly became a national anthem, and on records sold a reported half million copies. Since then the artist has had a string of hit records. An estimated figure of half the population of Sweden is said to have paid to watch and listen to the crooner. His name is so imbedded in the lives of the public, that when Johnnie Ray's name acquired fame in Sweden, he was immediately referred to as an American Snoddas. His pic-ture and signature help promote the sale of an endless number of items from nail files to chocolate, from toys to clothing, from lemonades to sau-ages. Not only one but five of the chanter's waxings are reported to have gone over the 500,000 mark. Everywhere the singer travels, he is swarmed by crowds of people. He is so popular that the Swedish po-litical parties are trying to get him to make personal appearances for them. In answer to their request Snod-das says, "I am standing above all parties."

The few hours of music from the high-lights of the wonderful Fred Astaire arrow howght hack moments of the career brought back memories of the days when the members of the staff saw and heard Fred perform these numbers.

In presenting the nostalgic voice of the great artist, Norman Granz of "Jazz At The Philharmonic" fame, did a grade A job of putting across the natural actions, the sincere and re-laxed traits, and the inimitable style that made the artist the king that he is. Norman Granz had the foresight to nate that he do a calleator's item in

that made the artist the king that he is. Norman Granz had the foresight to note that he had a collector's item in the "Astaire Story". He surely does. This limited edition of 1188 copies of the album sells for \$50.00 and fea-tures some of the best Astaire tunes. Fred sings and dances to "Top Hat", "The Continental", "I Won't Dance", "Cheek To Cheek", "Putting On The Ritz" and other inviting numbers. Providing the backing for the Astaire delivery are the Norman Granz jazz men. Oscar Peterson sits at the piano, Ray Brown is bassist, Barney Kessel is on the guitar, sax man is Flip Phil-lips, Charlie Shavers is on the trumpet, and Alvin Stoller beats the drums. Fred not only sings and dances on these numbers, but introduces them informally with an explanation of their relation to the Astaire career. Aside from being top notch listen-ing, the album is beautiful to the eye. It contains ten pages of text and twenty outstanding candid photos of Fred as one really would picture him. The photos were taken during the six-teen recording sessions. It'll probably be a tough job for anyone to make, on wax, as impres-sive a life story of an artist as Nor-man Granz has done with Fred As-taire.



La Rosa Disk Taking Off





# WEEKLY TABLOID OPENLY FLAUNTS LOCATION **COVERAGE IN TRADE'S** FACE

NEW YORK-The question before the industry, for many years, has been whether a coin machine trade publication should be made available to locations.

So that the locations can learn, not only inner-trade workings, but of tremendously GREATER IMPORTANCE, the price of all equipment as well as where to buy that equipment. The answer has always been NO—from all in the industry. And

always will be NO.

It has been proved, by hard experience and loss of revenue by operating companies, that when a location discovers it can purchase equipment (and obtains the prices of these machines for only 'twobits') that the operator is harmed beyond calculation.

The location either buys its own machines (pushing the pro-fessional operator out of the spot) or demands more percentage from each collection.

In most instances, where the location buys its own equipment, sooner or later, the location owner discovers he's made a grievous error. He then frantically calls for a professional operator.

However, the original operator usually isn't the one who is recalled. And in the interim, with no operator serving the location, there is no revenue forthcoming to the entire trade, in the further purchase of machines and merchandise.

It was with this premise in mind that The Cash Box established

It was with this premise in mind that The Cash Box established its policy of distribution: NO NEWSSTAND SALES. It is bad enough that another publication, a tabloid weekly, which delves into the coin machine business, is available to anyone on newsstands for just "two-bits". Any operator can tell of personal experiences whereby loca-

tions, having obtained this publication, have ousted him from lucrative spots.

Now this publication is going even further. It will now send these locations its tabloid and openly so advises its readers.

What's going to happen to the operator who has contracted to service these locations?

What's going to happen when these locations are openly advised where they can purchase the same equipment they are now featuring?

What's going to happen when they learn the actual price the professional operator pays for his equipment? Will the operator have to:

1) Take out his machines?

Take a cut in percentage? 2)

**3**) Sell the equipment to the location?

No matter what the answer, the operator is due for another beating!

These, then, are the questions:

How long can a servant serve two masters?

How long can the candle be burned at both ends?

How long should a publication be allowed to serve the coin operated machines industry when it flagrantly and openly offers the location confidential industry information such as where to buy, and how much to pay for the equipment from which the profes-sional operator earns his livelihood?

Kiddie Ride Manufacturers' Execs Express Fear Ops May Lose Good Spots. "Billboard" **Reports It Will Circulate To: "Dept. Stores,** Super Markets, Shopping Centers, Theatres, 10c. Stores, Resorts"

Amusement, Music And Vendors Ops Also Feel Endangered As Prices And Source Of Supply Made Known To Locations

CHICAGO - Not only are kiddie ride ops plenty burned, but even executives of the leading kiddie ride manufacturers are worried about what will happen when the tabloid weekly known as 'Billboard,' and which also somewhat delves into the coin operated machines field, along with burlesque, pitchmen, night club, stage, and other such outlets, mails its January 31, 1953 issue (which is supposed to be a special issue devoted to the kiddie rides) to what 'Billboard' reports, in an open advertisement, in its Jan. 10 issue:

"Department Stores, Super Markets, Shopping Centers, Filling Stations, Theatres, 10c Stores, Resorts."

The manufacturers have been selling kiddie rides, and at extremely good prices, to operators everywhere in the nation.

These operators have worked hard and long to get this equipment into these new type locations.

Operators complain because now comes a weekly tabloid, which also somewhat delves into the coin operated machines industry, and openly publishes prices of equipment (which prices are confidential to this industry and this industry only) and which weekly tabloid can be obtained on newsstands by any location owner for "two-bits," to tell the locations aforementioned all about kiddie rides; how why, when, where to buy them, and what they cost.

Executives of leading manufacturers are puzzled. One of them stated that altho he doesn't care to advertise in such an issue, due to his firm's contract he will be represented, but he is going to be careful what he says in his ad.

In the meantime the operators, who worked hard and long hours to get into the locations aforementioned, will be faced with the very real danger that they may lose these locations.

Now that the location owners and their executives, are going to actually be mailed this weekly tabloid (with the whole story about kiddie rides as per their very statement) operators may find that the tremendous investments which they have already made may suddenly go by the boards.

This is truthfully laying it thick right on the operator's neck, operators feel. It's bustin- right in the operator's face, they are convinced.

But that's not all. Operators of other type amusements, music and vendors, who have also been able to get into these spots, since they've been opened to the field, now also face the real danger of losing them, they say.

These location owners will see prices of juke boxes, vending machines, pinballs, and all other types of coin operated products, the operator claims.


And, as indicated, many a location may be lost. Such lost locations will only be returned to the industry after years and years of effort.

It will mean loss to the entire field. It means, with the professional operator out of the picture in a number of locations, and all in the field know this to be a fact, no machines of any kind will be sold to the operator who lost the spot, especially for that spot or other spots he loses.

Whatever machines the location owner buys will stay there-for years on end-as has happened in the past.

Therefore all in the field, from manufacturer, thru distributor to jobber, stand to lose more sales outlets. While operators stand to lose more locations.

Outlets the manufacturers and wholesalers, and locations the operators, can ill afford to lose at this time.



# **Competition Increases Kiddy-Ride Revenue**



JACK NELSON

CHICAGO — The merchant who "guessed" that his store was good for just so many ride-dimes a day is get-ting a pleasant surprise when he per-mits his operator to place the Bally "Space-Ship" side-by-side with "The Champion," reports Jack Nelson, Bally general sales manager. Instead of the ride-revenue being divided between the two rides, earn-ings from each ride are usually equal to average earnings of the previous single ride. Thus total ride-revenue is immediately doubled by the addition of the Ballyhorse's airborne companion, he states.

"More amazing to skeptical mer-chants is the fact that, when, after

'The Champion' has galloped for sev-eral months in lonely glory in a store, the 'Space Ship' is moved in alongside of the horse, horse-earnings actually go up, while profits from the 'Space-Ship' exceed average previous profits of the horse," Nelson says.

He quotes an experienced ride-oper-ator as attributing the beneficial ef-fects of ship-and-horse competition to the "try-them-both" psychology of children and parents. "When only "The Champion' is on location," the opera-tor-psychologist observed, "a parent may be inclined to limit the little gold-digger to one ride per shoning-trin may be inclined to limit the little gold-digger to one ride per shopping-trip. But, when the 'Space-Ship' and 'The Champion' are both there, exerting double fascination on parent and child, the fond father or doting mother is tempted to indulge the youngster to the extent of letting him or her try both rides. Often in the excitement the kid manages to promote a second ride on the ride he happens to like best at the moment. So 3 or maybe 4 rides are rung up where only 1 was rung up before. before.

"The same psychology works with the kids. The lad who is loaded with, say, 2 or 3 dimes may want to invest only 1 dime for a ride on 'The Champ-pion', if the horse is the only ride in sight—saving the rest of his bankroll for candy and comics. But, if he has to choose between 'The Champion' and the 'Space-Ship', he solves the prob-lem simply by riding each in turn. If he is still holding, after he gives each ride a whirl, he is inclined to go back to the first ride just to double-check his appitude for a life in the saddle, as compared to the sky—figuring he can always go home for a cooky in-


### **Juke Box Blows Top**

COLUMBUS, O.—It happend. A juke box actually blew its top.



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
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
