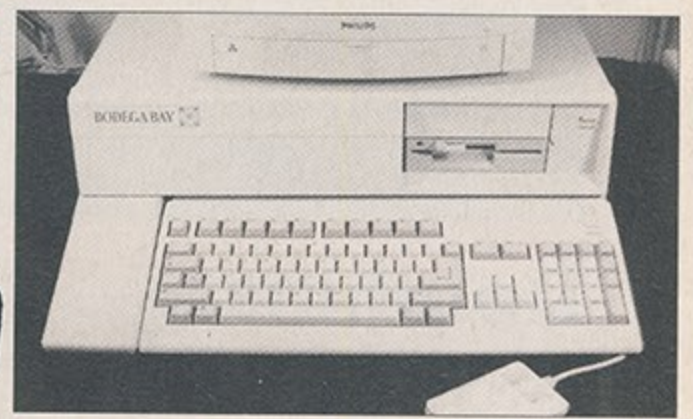

JAPANESE WAR SIM OUTCRY

In a move which might herald the end of the road for war simulations in Japan, the Japanese Government has clamped down on software publishers using gory military images in games.

The Japanese, who were constitutionally banned from entering the recent Gulf War and received heavy criticism for its role in the crisis, are understandably sensitive about images of war.

The Ministry of International Trade and Industry (MITI) has told games publishers that not only should they avoid using war pictures to sell their games, they should even stop selling the games out right! The thinking behind all this is that the number of war related titles which are being produced for Japanese gamers could encourage war.

Not content with berating the

game makers, the MITI has also lashed out at computer magazines which advertise and feature the products. Specifically sited was *Icon* magazine which recently ran a feature on a new

Gulf War simulation. *Icon* is published by ASCII, whose president, Kazuhiko Nishi, agreed that the article was in bad taste but pleaded freedom of expression. ■

This one is called *I Play 3D Soccer* and it comes from Simulmondo and is said to have scaled bit-mapped, 3D vector graphics among other whizzy game development terms. Gamers take play in one position and view the game from that angle. Changing position to keep up with the game is also allowed. You can either play the computer or another human. Different levels of difficulty are included as are various match lengths. Of course, it was designed in Italy.

Available this very month for budding Beckenbauer's with C64s, Amigas, STs and PCs. Price is £24.99. ■



Sony's micro-movie tie in

Like an unstoppable blob from a 1950s B movie, Sony has expanded its software division yet again. The new addition is called Sony Electronic Publishing and will work closely with Columbia Pictures, the company responsible for such films as *Look Who's Talking* and *Ghostbusters*. Columbia Pictures was recently purchased by the Japanese giant.

Sony Software's president, Michael P Schulhof commented: "This is an exciting opportunity for Sony to focus on new areas in entertainment, education and information. It will provide additional creative opportunities for the Columbia Pictures and Sony Music staffs to work with Sony Electronic Publishing in developing new expressions in entertainment."

"We will also continue to work with our hardware company to support new innovative products that Sony brings to the market. We will develop software on several formats, including CD-based products, interactive multimedia, video games and other optical and magnetic technologies".

This is likely to mean film tie-ins to be released on CD-ROM format especially for Nintendo's Super Famicom computer. Because the tie-in between Columbia Pictures and Sony Electronic Publishing will be so close, they are both based in New York. The chances are that programmers will be on the sets when the film is being made and will launch games at the same time as the film rather than months afterwards. ■

Dolphins digital deals

Everyone remembers Flipper being a wonderfully helpful creature, but not even that aquatic hero ever helped scientists improve digital communications.

Other dolphins are somewhat more helpful in this way, as scientists studying the way the ocean going mammals communicate have found out.

According to boffins who are trying to understand dolphins at Rochester University in New York, USA, the codes derived from the way dolphins speak to each other can be used to help computers do the same. They have found that the codes can be used to cut down on the amount of 'cross-talk' in digital communication. This has the potential to increase the number of channels available in all forms of communication which use digital systems. Squeak squeak! ■



What a touching story

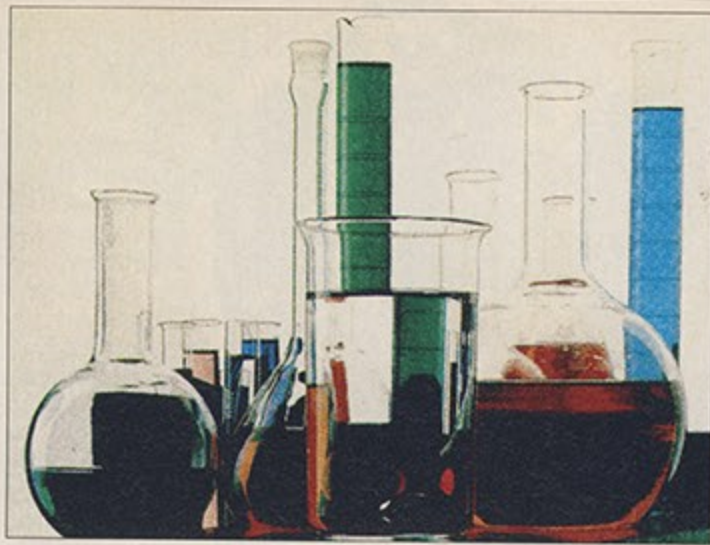
Ever had problems getting information out of a British Rail employee? Do you have to shout or even plea to get the time of the next train to Reading? Well in the near future you may have to touch them as well!

That's if a trial program currently working at Cambridge BR station works out. Sitting on the platform at the university town is the UK's first interactive computer timetable with a touch sensitive screen. At the moment it is linked to a PC in the enquiries office and allows users to plan their routes. The plan is to extend the system so that it can handle timetable information and ticket prices as well.

CHIP CUTS DOWN ON DRUGS



Scientists in America have developed a tiny 1cm squared chip upon which they have built 1,024 chemicals. Using a system called Very Large Scale Immobilised Polymer Synthesis (VLSIPS) small amounts of chemicals can be layered onto chips and evaluated. Not only does this speed up the process of study, it also means that extremely small amounts of chemicals need to be used to gain the same results as previous test tube and spatular methods.

The process starts by overlaying the chip with chosen chemicals, or 'building blocks'. The next stage is to wash it in another chemical which will react with these blocks. The reactions can be tightly controlled by exposing certain areas of the chip to light from a computer guided laser.

Different areas of the chip are exposed to different amounts of laser-light allowing for many separate compounds to be built-up in the same 1cm squared area. Unlike the old lab

experiments where one scientist would have to spend time studying a single chemical reaction, a computer can be programmed to observe and note all 1,024 reactions at the same time.

This technique can be extended not just to synthesising new drugs for uses in medicine, it can also be used, claim the scientists in California, to create DNA strands, accelerate DNA 'fingerprinting', and even detect invisible micro-organisms for use in blood and food testing. ■

Russian RAM robbers

Thieves who stole 100,000 RAM chips in Russia could be looking at the death sentence. The Soviet authorities have already started a massive hunt for the crooks who made off with 2.2 million roubles worth of silicon booty. The raid took place at a factory in Zelenograd in the north west of Moscow.



The danger, as the Soviets see it, is that the thieves will attempt to sell the chips back into the black market at inflated prices. It is well known that the black market in computer goods fluctuates daily and that large sums of money could be made by the perpetrators of Russia's biggest ever computer hardware theft.

Time, however, is of the essence for the brigands. With the police acting quickly the chip nabbers could be looking at 8 to 15 years in prison or even death, if the full powers of the USSR's criminal code article 93 is enforced.

CHIPMAKERS BID FOR GLORY

American chip makers were badgering George Bush recently in a bid to raise their commercial profile and moan about European trade tariffs following the Gulf Techno War.

Known as the 'war card' it has been played by the big semiconductor manufacturers for some years now, but has never been so potentially successful since the use of computer guided Patriot missiles.

In a letter to President Bush, the chippers commented: "We are proud of America's men and women in the Gulf and of the role of American technology in this effort exemplified by the Patriot missile. Our industry supplies the American semiconductors which

make these high technology weapons possible".

The corporations claim that less than 10 per cent of their trade is carried out with the military and that commercial business was what drove the technology behind the war effort. In a comment aimed directly at European markets, the chippers noted: "To preserve our ability to make advanced products we need the GATT talks to result in a tariff-free environment for trade in technology and computers".

Whether or not the rest of the Coalition agrees to these claims following the defeat of Saddam, remains to be seen. The chip makers know the honeymoon can only last for a short period in the commercial battlefield. ■

Latest IBM portable leaked

Details of the latest IBM notebook computer were leaked to the press last week. The newest portable from the Stateside giant is called the PS/2 L40SX.

Weighing in at 8lbs, the machine comes with 2Mb of on-board RAM, a 10-inch monochrome, edge-lit liquid crystal display in VGA mode, and a 60Mb hard disk. Also included is an internal fax and modem, and 3.5-inch floppy drive. The whole thing is powered by a single rechargeable battery.

Six expansion ports are built

in: parallel/Centronics, serial, colour VGA for an desktop monitor, mouse, numeric keyboard and an AT bus expander. In order to preserve battery life there are also plans for 'smart' power down routines.

Along with these details comes news of several price reductions on IBM's PS/2 family of machines in the United States. The cuts range from 5 per cent to as much as 20 per cent. Whether these price changes will affect European IBM PS/2 machines has not yet been announced. ■

Six million dollar fish

James Pond, Underwater Agent, is due to undergo two dramatic changes this year. The first comes in the form of a sequel to the original game, provisionally titled Robocod, for the ST and Amiga with the possibility of a 16-bit console version to follow.

Ian Saunter from publisher Millenium, said: "James has to go on a land-based mission to thwart the evil Doctor Maybe. To make the entire mission out of water, James has to be bionically altered. Someone had to do it and he volunteered." Whether James is able return to his normal self at the end of the game, "depends on the outcome of the game," says Saunter.

The other change is more immediate, as James Pond, the original game, is set for release on the Sega Mega Drive in April, priced at £39.99. It will be the first Mega Drive game both designed and coded in Britain. ■

The right hook

Boxing sims move into a new dimension of gritty realism with Mindscape's 4-D Sports Boxing.

Modelled and simulated on actual human movement, the animation of the fighters is fluent and realistic. The game also involves management skills since you can create and save a team of up to 10 boxers of your own, setting their heights, how much they weigh and how strong they are, and then you have to train them into mean fighting machines.

4-D Sports Boxing is available now for the PC, retailing at £29.99.

Also just out from Mindscape is Cardinal of the Kremlin, a PC game based on a book by Tom Clancy, author of Hunt for the Red October. A Cold War adventure game with interactive animated sequences, Cardinal retails for £14.99.

Mindscape has also released a C-64 version of the fantasy adventure Ultima VI for £24.99. ■

Cleaner machine

Truly intelligent machines and peripherals have always been one of the aims of computing, and now the world has Headmax – a clever floppy drive cleaner.

Headmax comes in the form of a floppy disk which, the makers Telematic Systems claims, will clean heads on a specially formatted surface and then check to see if any more work needs to be done.

Headmax is said to go further than simply cleaning, it also carries out a diagnosis which checks for head alignment. All the cleaning facilities are accessible from a menu system. ■

SX machine, notebook and colour portable announced

AMSTRAD'S NEW BUSINESS PCs

As first predicted in Express Amstrad has launched three upmarket computers aimed at executives.

A small-footprint SX machine, a notebook and a colour portable were announced by the company at Cebit Hanover on Wednesday 13 March. The Amstrad PC4386SX is just about the smallest computer which can claim to be a desktop. It's about one foot square and under three inches high, yet comes with a 20MHz 386SX processor, 80Mb hard disk, two half-length expansion slots, 4Mb of memory and a 3.5-inch floppy.

To match its small size, it uses a VGA monitor with a tube size of just 10 inches. With mono monitor the machine costs £1,499, and with colour monitor (using a Sony Trinitron tube) it costs £1,699. No other options are offered.

Amstrad says it is aiming the PC4386SX at executives who have little space on their desks and little time to learn to use a computer. The machine is supplied with Windows 3, but Amstrad says this is still too complicated for many executives, so it has written an easy front-end for Windows.

When the machine boots, the Amstrad Program Manager shows icons for applications (including spreadsheet, card index and word processor) which can be selected with the mouse. The joke in Amstrad is that this makes the machine so easy to use that even Alan Sugar can manage it. Experienced users can switch to the full version of

Windows 3 with a simple key combination. Most of the applications offered by the Amstrad Program Manager come with Windows 3 as standard.

The spreadsheet, however, is the trial version of Microsoft Excel. This has most functions of Excel, but worksheet size is limited. If the full version of Excel is bought by the user, this replaces the trial version. Other application programs which are bought separately, such as a full database or word processor, can link to the appropriate icon.

Amstrad says no compromises have been made to build the machine. It has 64K of cache memory which, combined with the 20MHz processor, makes it over a third faster than most 16MHz 386SX machines.

The 80Mb hard disk is made by Sony and has 19ms access time. A 20MHz 387SX maths processor can be fitted and the memory can be upgraded to 16Mb. The 10-inch Sony Trinitron colour tube has 0.26mm dot pitch and so is able to show the full 640x480 VGA resolution. The built-in display adaptor also has a 800x600 mode which the monitor can display, but this really needs a higher resolution monitor. The display can emulate Hercules, EGA and CGA display cards.

A full-size, 102-key keyboard is provided – the only attempt to reduce the size of this has been to minimise the border around the keyboard. The normal Amstrad mouse is included. Because Amstrad has become

frustrated with the problems associated with MS-DOS version 4 it has decided to bundle version 3.3 in with the machine. At some stage the company will probably switch to MS-DOS 5, once this has been released and proved problem free.

Several companies offer small-footprint SX machines, but none has produced machines as small as the PC4386SX while still retaining two expansion slots. The Carry-I 9000 from Centreprise is smaller, but has only one expansion slot, is slower and uses an external transformer. The SX version of the Carry-I starts at £1,295, but versions roughly comparable with Amstrad's new machines are £150 more expensive.

The Amstrad PC4386SX is made in Korea and should be in the shops by June. Amstrad hopes the machine will become a status symbol among the type of executives who have previously resisted using computers.

Along with the PC4386SX, the Amstrad notebook and colour-screen portable machines are hoped to boost the company's image in the corporate market. Amstrad says that much of the damage done by the 2000 series has already been compensated for by the 3000 series machines and its ALT model portables. The '4' designation of the new machine does not mean the replacement of the 3000 – they are complementary ranges, says Amstrad. ■

'Brick' PC promises desktop power where you want it

TRUE PERSONAL PORTABILITY

Billed as 'an elegant intruder into the boringly utilitarian world of personal computing', the Brick computer is the size of a ream of copy paper, contains a 20MHz 386SX processor, 8Mb of RAM, a 212Mb hard disk and weighs just 8lbs.

Developed in the US by Ergo Computing, the machine is described by its British distributor Polaron as 'a tote-able' - a lightweight link between office and home.

The idea behind the Brick is that you keep a keyboard, monitor and power supply at each of your working locations and carry the machine in between. The unit offers all the expansion ports you're likely to need in order to connect up to monitors, printers and keyboards.

For the serious business user, a 2400baud modem is also fitted as standard. The Brick is also capable of driving a 1024 x



768 VGA display with 16 displayable colours. It will also be complimented by a portable mono VGA LCD monitor this summer.

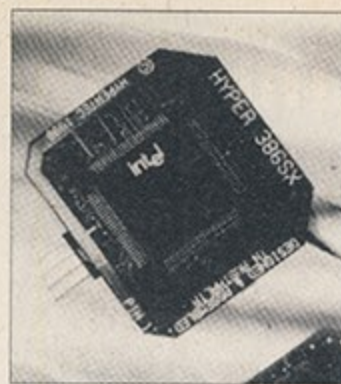
For a limited period Polaron is supplying the Brick with a 44Mb hard drive, 2Mb of RAM, two keyboards, two power supplies, MS DOS 4.01, Windows 3 and Logitech mouse for £2,760.

DAT and CD-ROM connections will also be introduced later this year as will a 486 version. More information from Polaron on 0923 240272.

386 upgrade on a card

Hyper 386SX is the name of new credit card sized 286 to 386SX upgrade board, recently released by Australian-based Hypertec.

The board fits into the processor slot of an 80286 machine and replaces the existing chip. According to the manufacturers, the board is compatible with both micro channel and standard PC architecture. In order for the widest number of 286 machines to benefit, four configurations have been developed by the company. These are the PLCC, PGA, PLCC and Tower version.

Colin Lillywhite, general manager of Hypertec Europe said: "Once installed the boards give full compatibility with all the latest 80386-based software while retaining full compatibility with existing 80286 software and hardware."

Prices for all configurations are £259. For more information on the products you should call 0672 63936. ■



Metal mayhem

According to a new game called *Metal Mutant*, the ultimate battle machine of the future will be a metamorphosing mechanoid which can transform at will into one of three forms to ensure the optimum combat capabilities against any enemy.

In the game the metal mutant is sent to the planet Kronox to search out and destroy the evil tyrant Arod-7. On this mission your robot faces over 40 savage foes, using a huge arsenal of weaponry including missiles, axes, torpedoes, battle computers and remote flying mini-robots.

However, the game is more than a mere shoot-'em-up, and involves some intriguing puzzles and humorous moments, "especially a sequence involving a swiss army knife," according to Palace spokesman Richard Hennerley.

It has been written by the french-based company Silmaris, the developer behind *Colorado*. Hennerley reckons that the new game is, "very french in style. The best thing about Silmaris games is that they are always supremely playable and they also look very good."

Due out in May, it will cost £24.99 for the PC, ST and Amiga. ■

Printer firm pre-empts Apple

As Apple launched its two low-cost printers this week a company in the United States was claiming to have got there first.

GCC Technologies announced the Personal LaserPrinter II with a \$999 price tag, claiming that: "Owners of the new low-cost Macintosh systems can now have the same uncompromising output quality that Macintosh users have come to expect, for a price that's more in line with the cost of their computer."

In a statement which was obviously aimed directly at Apple and its StyleWriter bubblejet

printer, GCC vice president commented: "We are taking the industry lead in meeting the budgetary requirements of small businesses and educational institutions, while still providing high quality, laser printed output."

Apple's own official launches took place on March 11 with the arrival the LaserWriter LS and the StyleWriter bubblejet printers. The LaserWriter LS is a four pages per minute machine, built around a Cannon LBP-LX engine. It comes with a 50 sheet paper tray, serial connection, and 512K of on-board RAM. It comes with TrueType outline fonts

rather than a full PostScript interpreter which saves Apple the cost of a PostScript licence, thus keeping the price down. According to Apple a Mac 2MB Classic with 40Mb hard disk, and LaserWriter LS bundle should cost as little as £1,795.

The StyleWriter bubblejet is aimed firmly at the owners of the Classic who want high quality printing, but can only afford a low-cost Mac. Apple claims that the printer produces laser quality print-out at 360 dots per inch. Again TrueType compatibility is built-in. The StyleWriter is expected to cost sub-£300. ■

In the game you have to battle hordes of aliens, using a huge variety of weapons while trying to locate a self destruct mechanism before it destroys the Earth. Good news for hint-hungry gamers; not only has Sierra On-Line, bought back the rights to its game catalogue from ill-fated Activision, it has now opened a new phone helpline. Sierra is famous in the UK for the antics of *Leisure Suit Larry* in his quest for fulfilment.

The helpline, based on the latest smash idea imported from the States and well used by companies such as Nintendo, will be a 24 hour affair. It offers game hints and technical help, is fully computerised, and you don't even need a modem to access it. All you do need to get up to the minute help is a touchtone telephone - the one with the buttons that go bleep. The hint line number is 0734 304004.

Along with this system, Sierra has launched a new bulletin board which also includes a hintline, along with downloadable demos, an enquiry facility and customer support liaison. It can be accessed with a 300/1200/2400 baud modem and the number is 0734 304227.

However, the company's plans to release a multimedia software package have been shelved.

Sources within the company explained that the move came because there is currently no satisfactory industry standard for multimedia systems. They further maintain that multimedia technology is developing so rapidly that any software is in danger of becoming obsolete in a very short time. ■

CBM announces 1Mb Amiga Screen Gems bundle

ONE MEG ENTRY
LEVEL AMIGA

Both Commodore and Atari have plans to revamp their entry level 16-bit machines in the near future.

The Amiga 500 will be available with a free half megabyte RAM upgrade, priced at £399 in an offer which will last for a limited period, from now until the end of June.

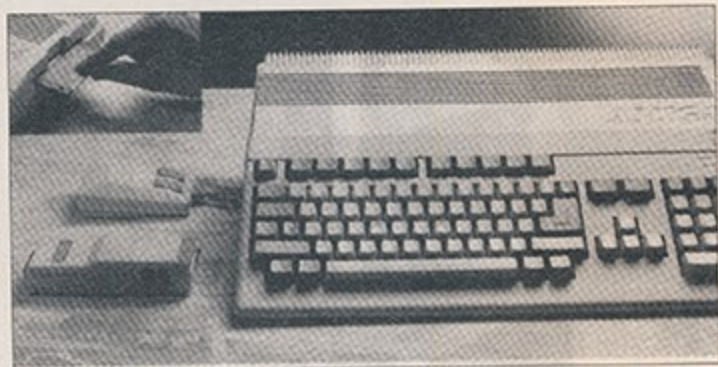
Commodore is bundling the A500 Screen Gems pack with its A501 RAM expansion unit, which normally retails for £99.

"Things are a little bit slack with the recession, and the expansion to 1Mb is ideal offer to keep sales ticking over and to make sure that the Amiga retains its number one position in the market," reckons Commodore spokesman Andrew Ball.

The move has fuelled specula-

tion that Commodore may decide to make the 1Mb machine its entry level Amiga. However, the company is keen to point out that it will continue to produce the standard A500 while the offer lasts. In order to retain the impetus in a busy market, Ball was keen to point out that "Replacing the 512K machine with a full megabyte model is an option which we would obviously reconsider at a later date."

Not to be outdone in the race for 16-bit home computing supremacy, Atari is also to announce a special 1Mb ST package, aimed at serious computer users rather than games players. Atari's spokesman, Peter Walker, said the company sees Commodore's offer as an

attempt to challenge Atari's own lower entry level ST price point of £299. He told Express: "The price premium is hurting Commodore. The ST is still the ideal entry level machine for the home user, and our new pack-

age will be aimed at positioning the ST much more as a computer and not as a games machine."

For further details of Atari's strategy for the ST in the next year read Express next week. ■

Transatlantic price parity

Borland, one of the largest manufacturers of business software in the world, is taking the unprecedented step of pricing products at exchange rate rather than straight pound for dollar.

A product on sale in the US for \$800 will now cost between £400 and £450 in the UK depending on the exchange rate. This will be welcomed by software buyers more used to a pound for dollar rate on imported

computers products. Current practice in the computer industry is to complain of shipping costs and import tariffs. This has maintained a situation whereby products selling for \$1,000 in the US (£500) would sell for £1,000.

Borland managing director Rikke Helms said: "We need to help our channel partners match up to 1992 by ensuring that our UK pricing is in line with mainland Europe." ■

Telecom flat rate means 200 per cent rise

PRESTEL PRICES HIT HOME USERS

Charges for Prestel, BT's Viewdata network, are to rise dramatically for residential users from April 1.

Telecom is to introduce a flat rate charge for both home and business users. This charge is equivalent of the old business charge of £80. For home users this is a rise of £48.

Once on-line, the story gets worse with charges increasing a staggering 200 per cent; from 1p to 3p per minute, during off-peak times. There will be an

additional rise from 7p to 8p per minute during office hours.

Express this week asked for an explanation of the moves from BT Managed Network Services (BTNMS), the section of the company which deals with on-line systems. BT spokesman, Chris Ott, explained: "BT can no longer afford to provide a special discounted tariff for domestic users. After all, the service provided is the same for both the home and commercial user. Frankly, the home users are a

relatively small percentage of the overall user base, and if you're a business user, you will wonder why you have to subsidise these people."

In the light of the changes, a number of companies which use Prestel and are specifically aimed at the home user, such as Kays catalogues, are considering leaving the service.

But one group who may welcome the new charge are subscribers to specialist services like Micronet. From April 1

Micronet's annual subscription, which includes a Prestel subscription, will rise from £80 to £120, but users will be able to access most Prestel areas outside of office hours (8am-6pm) free of on-line time charges.

"Now our subscribers can access the service in the evening, after 6pm, as well as all day Sunday, for the price of a local telephone call. That's the equivalent of halving all their on-line costs," says Micronet editor Paul Needs. ■

Upgrade your ST database

An upgraded version of the *Adimens* database, compatible with all versions of the ST operating system and offering a full set of relational features, has just been launched for the Atari ST and TT.

Adimens 3.0 is the latest version of the database which is backed by over 90,000 users. The package includes a 300 page manual and tutorial and an on-line help facility.

Publisher Kuma claims it is simple to use without compromising on power and can import and export data, calculate fields, sort at multi-level, time fields, replace characters, provide graphical controls and prompt via menus.

Facilities exist to search, sort, merge, link and interface with many other programs including *KWord 2*. Multi-level sorting, date handling, error checking and file handling are completely explained and there are 'soft' editable printer drivers to allow configuration to many printers.

Adimens 3.0 costs £129.95 and is available from Kuma Computers on 0734 844335. ■

A 16-bit Super-VGA colour board for PC ATs and compatibles will ship from the beginning of April. The £250 VG-5000 can be configured with either 512K or a full one megabyte of memory on board. Its 1Mb configuration supports graphics modes up to 1024 by 768 pixels.

The board, from DFI, can produce up to 256 colours and supports all of the common PC display modes including Super VGA, VGA, EGA, CGA, MDA and Hercules.

The two models available are the VG-5000A with 512K on board and the VG-5000B with

1Mb on board. The VG-5000 is designed for use within applications with an intensive graphics overhead, such as Computer Aided Design or Windows 3.

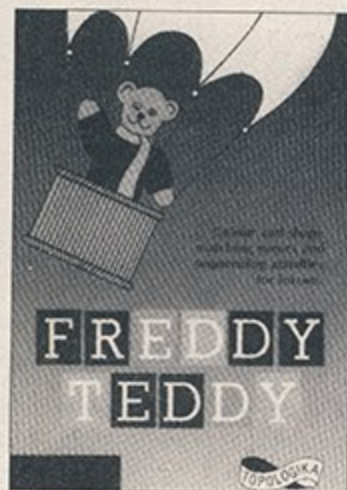

As Apple launches its new low-cost printers, Express asks...

IS THIS THE CLASSIC BUSINESS PACKAGE ?

October 1990 saw the arrival of the machines which UK computer users had been waiting to see; the low cost Apple Macintoshes. The Mac Classic, the Mac LC and the Mac IIsi hit the UK and world markets amidst a heap of media hype and public expectation. The 'oohing' and 'aahing' went on until well after Christmas, with those people who had never seen a Mac being carried along by the wave of enthusiasm created by both the press and the folk who had used the older machines at work.

Certainly the Classic at £1,030, with 20Mb hard drive, 2Mb of RAM and a single 1.44Mb SuperDrive floppy is an ideal wordsmith's tool. It has been called a kind of extreme high-end PCW, mainly because of its user-friendliness. But unlike the PCW bundle, the Classic, LC and IIsi came without any way of outputting the text so lovingly created. It is untrue to say that there was no way at all of printing out. Apple LaserWriters, in the form of the IINT and the NTX, come in at £3,565 and £4,140 respectively. Lower down the scale comes the Personal LaserWriter range starting at £1,564 for the SC, with the NT in at £3,565. All of these machines, however, make the £1,030 price tag on the Mac Classic look a little pointless. The only real low cost option prior to the arrival of the new printers was the ImageWriter II. This dot-matrix machine came with the Apple name and company support but not with the quality of printed output which the computer and its new users demanded.

Apple, it seemed, had lost the impetus which the Classic and its low cost compatriots had so readily instigated. People were caught in two minds about whether to go for a 386 running Windows or move Macwards. Why was this?

Why were people prepared to use a PC with a DMP (dot matrix printer) but not a Mac? This was a major hurdle which needed to be cleared before the Mac bundle could really take the home-users world by storm.

BARRIER RELIEF

The main reason is personal rather than financial. A strange psychological barrier had to be overcome in order for a Mac bundle to make it big outside the professional environment.

The barrier did not, and does not,

involve the idea that the Mac is a poor machine. Far from it - its quality of manufacture is undoubted. The notion that it is too technical for the home user is also fallacious; the friendly front end, devoid of command lines, root directories and complex syntax is almost legendary in its ease of use. Even the Apple bugbear of high price had been blown away, at least as far as the computer was concerned.

A ROLLER WITH DICE

The problem lay in the notion that, for some inexplicable reason, you cannot use

Macintosh computers with dot matrix printers. This idea has less credence in the United States where the Mac is a normal, everyday computer available at college stores and computer shops. However the UK user still views the idea of a Mac with a loud, slow DMP as being akin to running a Rolls Royce car with plastic covers on the seats and furry dice in the window - it doesn't actually affect the

why did Apple take so long before making the ideal bundle of low cost Mac and cheap, high quality laser and bubble-jet printer available?

In some camps this was seen as a deliberate ploy. Get the machines out there and then really make the money out of the peripherals. Other people thought that Apple Computer was in fact carrying out a straightforward piece of marketing; make sure that the cheap Macs sold before committing yourself to an undercutting current peripheral stock. A third, and probably more important reason, was the

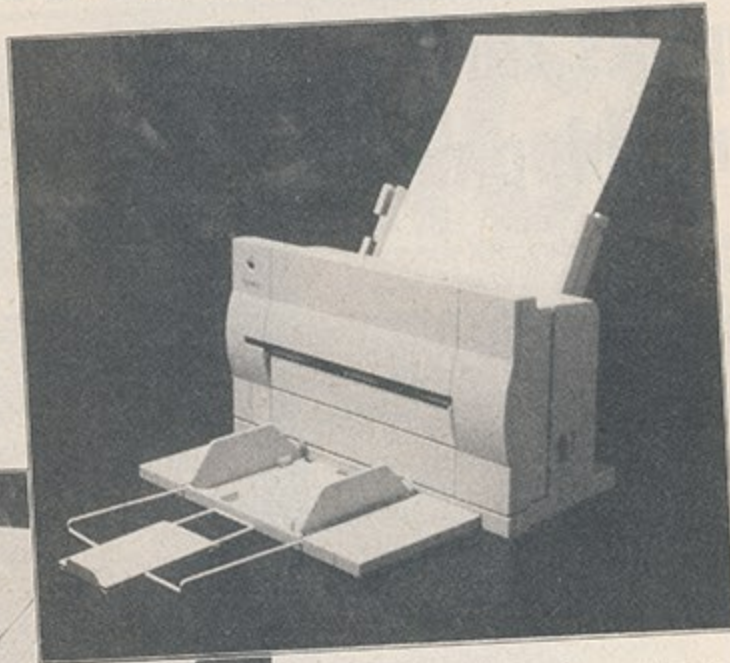
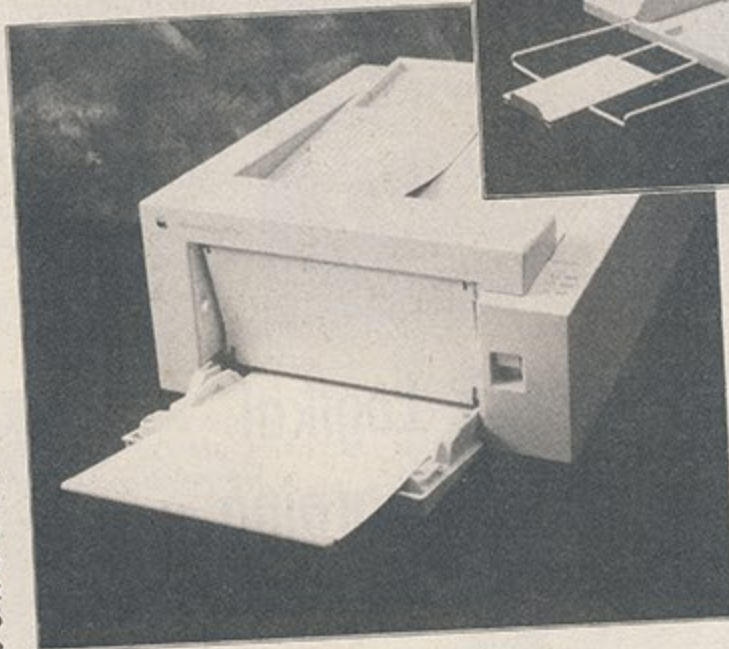
being passed on to the end-user. There were two ways around this problem; either Apple bought PostScript lock, stock and barrel in order to level the cost overheads, or it helped develop its own typographical standard. The first option was a non-starter, PostScript is too popular across many machine bases. The second option, however, presented an excellent upside for low cost printers which were aimed at business and home users with no requirements to output PostScript compatible graphics such as EPS (Encapsulated PostScript) files.

Using TrueType allowed the printing engine to be taken from the printer itself - PostScript printers require PostScript interpreters and that's what Apple had been paying through the nose for. Secondly, Apple was not paying out to third parties (PostScript again). This point allows for lower costs and cheaper prices to the end-user. Bearing in mind that font prices between the two systems differ only slightly and that most people who buy a Classic will be happy with the four bundled faces, and you have a problem solved both for Apple and the end-user.

A final point in the race to produce a decent and affordable Mac printer is the looming presence of System 7, the upgraded Mac operating system. By developing new standards, and consequently retaining a hold on the peripherals market, Macintosh has made sure that it, and its tied developers, can do with System 7 as they wish. The market will be lead by the company rather than the other way around.

JOB DONE?

So, two major problems stood in the way of the affordable Macintosh bundle: psychological and financial. Both were intertwined and both have been solved quite neatly with the new printers. The psychological barrier has been shattered by the fact that Apple-badged high-quality, non-dot matrix printers are about to become widely available. The financial problem has been overcome by the fact that Apple has cut its own overheads by moving away from PostScript and into TrueType. All that remains to be seen is whether the Windows threat (Windows will also make use of TrueType) can be overcome, and just how many units Apple will move in the next year. ■

performance, it just seems wrong.

While many UK users are quite prepared to go for DMP output, and after all 24-pin dot matrix printers do offer a reasonable quality of output, as long as the computer driving the printer is a PC. Macs go with laser printers, or bubble jets. A popular consciousness was in place which seemed to have consigned the Macintosh to a high-end ghetto. Apple only had one option.

The only way out was to meet the challenge head on and bring the public the machines which it appeared to want. So

PostScript question.

The two new printers - the Personal LaserWriter LS, a laser printer which will cost around £920, and the StyleWriter, Apple's first venture into bubblejet technology, to be available for £345 or less - make use of the new 'standard' of TrueType. The underlying story to this being nearly as interesting as the fact that it enables users to output high-quality text without the need for PostScript. Apple had been paying out large sums of money on every PostScript compatible printer it sold. This cost was obviously

AN EXOTIC EXPANSION

Bodega Bay sounds like an exotic location to hold a press conference, but my hopes were dashed when I found out that it was a product, not a place. Its manual describes it as a modular expansion console for the Amiga 500 and it offers A500 owners an opportunity to upgrade to a 1500/2000 like specification by connecting to the expansion slot and providing a card cage and expansion bay.

Bodega Bay does away with the need to power your Amiga from the somewhat quirky Commodore power supply and its own internal 200 watt lump takes over that job. This way, the power switch turns on the A500 too. With an optional extra cable, the monitor can be powered making the entire system a single switch turn on operation.

The Bodega Bay comes equipped with a mains cable, power cable and manual. The manual has a simple illustrated approach to installation and use, offering the experienced user a quick walk through while the less confident get a detailed description.

To connect the Amiga to the Bodega Bay is child's play with the Amiga sliding sideways under the Bodega Bay and connecting via the expansion port. Once in place the Amiga and Bodega Bay make a solid looking 'complete PC' style console.

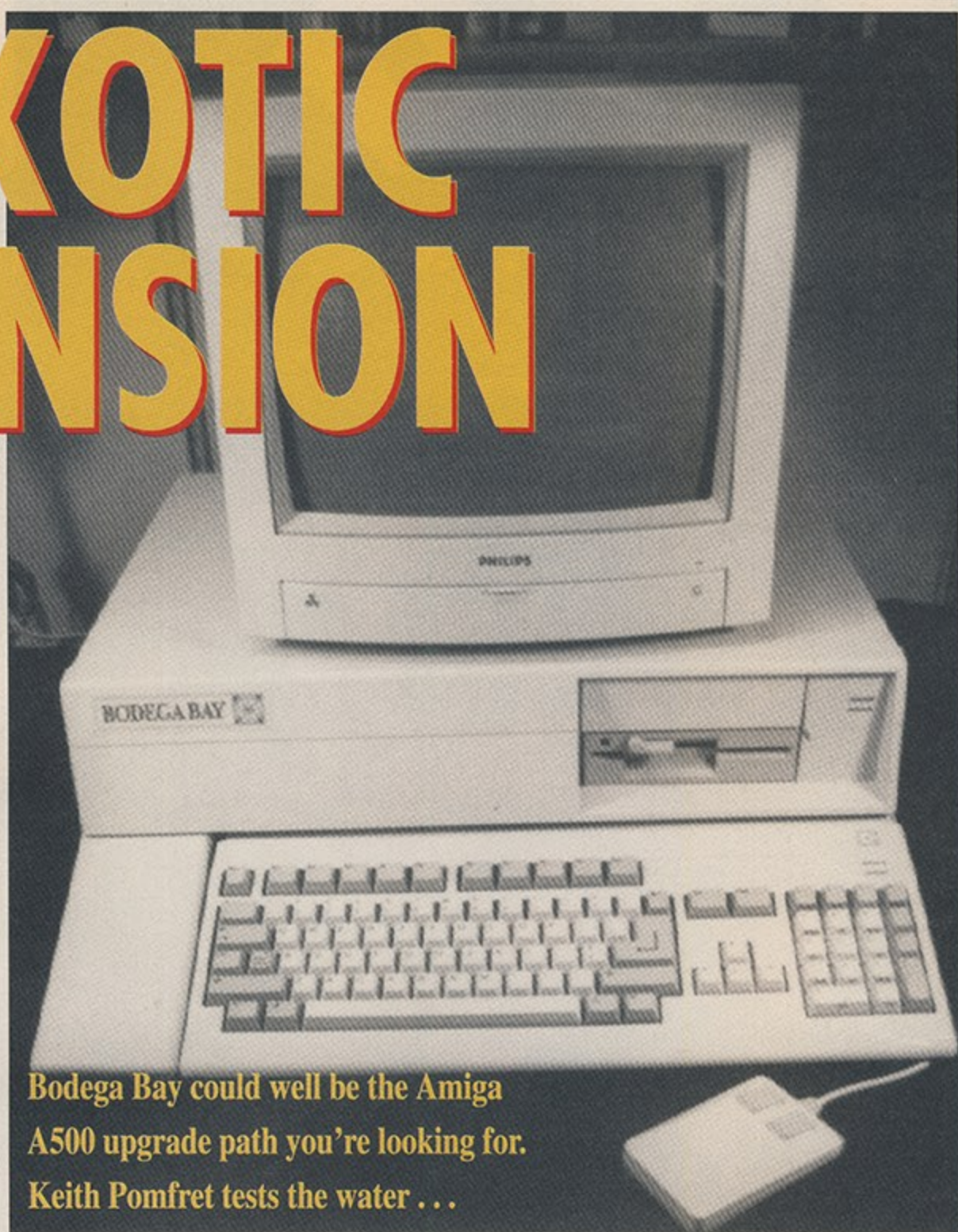
The connection via the A500's expansion slot means that no more A500 specific add ons can be connected at the side, but that small drawback is more than made up for in the PC and B2000 expansion capabilities that the card cage in Bodega offers.

It's possible to plug the Bodega Bay straight into the A500 and go, but most people will want it for expansion possibilities so it's probably a good idea to have a dig around inside and add any immediate expansion you are planning.

We had a collection of boards to try, so off came the lid. The manual offered sound advice not to open things up with the power on or indeed power up before the physical installation of all planned devices had been done. Four cross headed screws at the rear secured the cover and with them removed, the large cream plastic cover slid off forward. This revealed the internal cage with its mounting places for cards and additional drives.

FACTS

Bodega Bay is available from Amiga Centre, Scotland. At the time of going to press, it hadn't fixed a firm price for it as Bodega Bay is only now arriving from California. A rough estimate from Amiga Centre was that it would cost around £350 for the base unit. With an XT bridgeboard and a colour monitor, that would bring the price to slightly under £1,000 making it on a par with the Commodore Amiga 1500 for price and an option to trading in a 500 to upgrade. The mounting bays are for 5.25-inch drives and one was already fitted in the review machine. It is possible to fit 3.5-inch drives with optional adapter plates. A bay is included to hold a 3.5-inch hard drive and card slots for Amiga and PC cards are included. There are four 100-pin Amiga expansion slots and three of those can have optional PC XT/AT 98-pin slots.

A section in the manual explains which slots take priority and offers advice as to the optimum way to install various forms of expansion. For those adding a PC Bridgeboard in order to take advantage of PC compatibility, there is a section explaining its position in relation to other Amiga cards and how incompatibility may cause malfunction if things aren't in the right order.

Further instructions on the addition of floppy drives and various controller cards complete the installation section.

All of the cards that we were able to try worked with the exception of a PC Fax/Modem/Answering machine card, but then again that's difficult to get running on some PCs.

So far, the boards that we know will work are XT bridgeboards, AT bridgeboards, hard disk controller card (HC2+), Harlequin framebuffer, AMAX 2+, serial cards and RAM expansions.

In theory, any card that follows specific operating system and programming guidelines should work, but there may be problems with PC cards that take hardware short cuts.

The review sample that we tested was very much a pre-production model for the UK market and although the general build quality was good, there were a few irritating things that we felt needed addressing. These were simple things such as a cable was a tad (15mm) too short. Amiga Centre provided us with a list of things that were earmarked for correction on the production UK versions and its list matched ours perfectly. We will be grabbing one of the first production models to check that these quirks have been remedied, though!

In general, Bodega Bay was easy to use, the instructions were clear and concise and the procedure for installation and expansion were more than adequate. The design is a bit lumpy and once in place, the big cream box with an A500 poking its nose out from underneath was reminiscent of a card punch console or a teleprinter. It's a love or hate design. It makes a mockery of the 'small footprint' trend with demands for large amounts of desk space. If you need to rack mount your kit then this isn't the box for you. But if you're happy with a big sturdy expansion system that will take a 40 pound monitor then Bodega Bay is for you.

It did all that US manufacturer California Access claimed and more. Running with cards inside, the space available offered adequate convection and there were none of the overheating problems that have been experienced with teeny PCs. If expansion is your path and you want to retain your A500, Bodega Bay is an option that must be considered. ■

■ DIPswitch romances

However, one day an engineer revealed all (*to one of the Philly girls, presumably? - H F-W*) He was of course instantly blackballed throughout the industry, and was last heard of putting labels on 3.5-inch disks and putting them into wallets. After that revelation, printer manufacturers put DIP switches mainly on the outside of machines, but still observe tradition by making them inaccessible in the hope that the old mystique - and business - will return.

Why else should they do this when a software solution that could auto-configure printers to a particular machine is perfectly possible?

■ Amiga defender

Strange how people seem to get more vitriolic about the Amiga as its gets more and more successful, isn't it? John Goldsmith's letter in *Express 121* was a typical instance.

1) True, the Workbench does take over a minute to set itself up, but to be

more accurate, the Workbench is mostly in ROM and loads in under a second, typically. The rest of the time is used by the system setup routines which are fully user-customisable. Read my book John (plug plug) if you need an example of Workbench loading in just a few seconds.

Workbench disks are slow to open because the system has to load and display dozens of different icon images.

2) AmigaBASIC is truly awful - you're quite right there. But there are plenty of other ones: GFA 3 and AMOS for instance. Atari's BASICs for the 400/800 and ST, and Commodore's 64 BASIC to name but three others are all as weak as AmigaBASIC.

3) The odd one out was BBC BASIC. Any programmer will tell you, it's much easier to reference cartesian Y from the top of the screen - inverting it only slows things down.

4) What awful flickering mess? Surely you don't mean cracked and packed pirate copies?

5) Whadaya want? One minute you complain about flickering screens, and the next you want 'game loading' information. Strewth!

6) The Amiga doesn't crash - the software does. If your PD games hit the ROMs then it'll crash just as quick as an ST would, given the same treatment.

■ 'Apalled' of Bootle

I am apalled at your reply to A Sharp's letter (*Express 121*). You agreed that the 'sampled soundtracks, snatches of music and film clips are all the property of the copyright holder', but the fact that no-one has been prosecuted for taking these sam-

ples and clips does not, by any means make it a legal practice.

Then you go on to say that the material in such demos is not pirated for commercial gain and probably serves to promote the original work. Does this mean that I can now buy software, CDs and LPs, record part of them and freely distribute to friends? Of course not.

You seem to condone this thin end of the piracy wedge. If you think I have an axe to grind, you're right - I have. Since buying my Amiga I have refused offers of hundreds of pirated disks for free from fellow Amiga owners. Being unemployed, it is a great temptation to justify taking such free disks. Don't get me wrong - I'm not 'Mr Honesty', but I am concerned that many software programmers will get sick of people ripping off their work, and leave the Amiga to program consoles in the future.

Your comments surprised me. Is it now the case that *Express* condemns only large-scale piracy and lets these 'mini-pirates' off the hook? It makes me wonder if my personal anti-piracy stance is worth the trouble.

I'd like you to go back to your copy of *Express 121* and read that letter and my reply to it once more, Mr R. It may be my fault, or it may be yours - but you seem to have got the wrong end of the stick.

I was trying to point out the difference between pirating games wholesale or taping an entire album, and taking short samples from a copyright work. If you accept a pirate copy of a game or a cassette that contains a complete LP, then you are depriving the copyright holder of the income due from a sale, and doing real damage to the artist who created the work.

If, however, you get to see a short film clip, listen to a few sampled bars of a song from an album - or get a one or

two level demo from a game, then you are likely to have your appetite whetted for the full product - such extracts can act as samplers, and may lead to increased sales of the complete work.

Which might be why the massive corporations that own the copyright in films, videos and music don't bother to take action against the people who sample their works and use them in demos. In effect, they are getting free advertising. If bootleg albums or complete copies of films were being circulated on videos, then you can be sure that the copyright holders would want to come down hard on the pirates. And as I said, some cunning software publishers have, in the past, deliberately leaked significant chunks of their games onto the pirate circuit to take advantage of this free advertising.

Your personal stance against piracy is admirable. It is harder to turn down the offer of 'free' games when you are on a low income and there are plenty of very well paid people who have libraries of pirated software. If more people took the approach to life that you do, software prices might well be lower.

As it is, piracy is forcing some software houses to think very seriously about the future of magnetic media - indeed I heard that one software house plans to complete all its current projects for disk and tape and then move over to cartridges, abandoning cassette and disk software for ever. This is not good news for the average computer owner - but then the average computer owner only has himself (or herself) to blame...

■ Technically speaking

In *Express* 119 you published two erroneous 'facts' about CPU bus widths. The first is Tim Smith's Centrefold contention that a 16-bit data bus allows you to address 64Kb of data. In fact, you can address all the data you like with a 16-bit data bus, provided your address bus is wide enough – it is the number of bits on the address bus that governs how much memory may be directly accessed. 8088/8086 PCs have a 20-bit address bus, while 80286 ATs have a 24-bit bus. I guess Tim doesn't know there is a difference between address and data buses, but since he's so clever in um... some other

way, he will no doubt be forgiven.

The second mistake is in the chip comparison article and chart on page 62 and 63, where the 8086 is listed as having an external data bus of eight bits. It is the 8088 which has only eight data lines to the outside world – the 8086 actually has 16, though it may often be the case that only eight are used, since the standard IBM PC bus itself only supports eight.

The notable exceptions to this are the Amstrad PCs, which (in direct contradiction to Stuart Anderton's statement) use all 16 of the 8086 data lines, and have 16-bit data flow between the CPU and the main on-board memory, allowing word-size data to be moved in one read/write cycle instead of two. Unfortunately, the limitations of the IBM PC expansion bus prevent this being extended to plug in cards.

Macintosh

PRINTER JOY

Well, here they are then. Although there have been rumours flying around for the last few months about exactly what form the new printers from Apple would take, there were still some surprises when they were finally revealed.

So, who will be buying the new machines? Well, essentially anyone who doesn't need PostScript output. If you own Adobe Type Manager for any PostScript fonts which you have, and make a habit of buying TrueType fonts in the future, you will have a top-quality output device for a fraction of the price of a PostScript machine.

The new machines will be superb for those of us who want high quality without the cost. Expect to see thousands of TrueType fonts appearing at reasonable prices in the near future.

CHEAP LCS

If you're involved in education and you meet Apple's criteria, you could qualify for a Mac LC at a special low price - but only if you apply before the end of March. Until then, you could get a 2Mb LC with 40Mb hard disk and 12-inch colour monitor for £1,085 plus VAT. The same configuration with a monochrome monitor costs just £985 plus VAT.

Get in touch with your local AppleCentre for more details if you think that you might qualify for the discount.

RUMOURS...

After reading this column a couple of weeks ago, Apple's PR agency rang us to let us know that the Mac appears on the TV programmes *Spender*, *Lovejoy* and *Boon*. So there.

Not quite so trivial, System 7.0 is now being slated for release on May 13, the first day of Apple's Worldwide

Developers' Conference. Although not officially confirmed by Apple, sources 'close to the company' are quoting this date. Expect to see versions available to the public about two or three weeks after that. Final Beta versions are now shipping to developers; with a bit of luck I'll be seeing one within the next couple of weeks, and will be able to give you some first-hand info about the improvements that it offers.

Rumours are beginning to circulate that sometime this year Apple will introduce a version of the Mac Classic with a 68030 chip replacing the current 68000 processor. This will increase its speed to about the same as the Ili or Ilicx, and will probably result in a slight reduction in the prices of those Macs. But don't hold your breath - it's likely to be the end of the year before the 'SuperClassic' appears, and it certainly won't replace the present Classic.

The Mac LC doesn't seem to be selling as well as Apple had hoped. Insiders feel that perhaps it hasn't been marketed with as much vigour as the other two new models - it falls in the halfway house of not being a member of the Mac II family, but not being a 'non-modular Mac' like the Classic either. Expect a heavy advertising campaign to raise consumer interest in the LC in the near future.

Newsbytes, the on-line information service, reveals that at a recent conference in Japan, Apple Chairman John Sculley was overheard to say that Apple is "discussing" sharing Macintosh technology with other companies. This would include the Mac operating system, and the Mac's GUI.

At the same conference, referring to the release of Windows 3, Sculley said that: "So far there is no damage to the sales of the Macintosh. On the

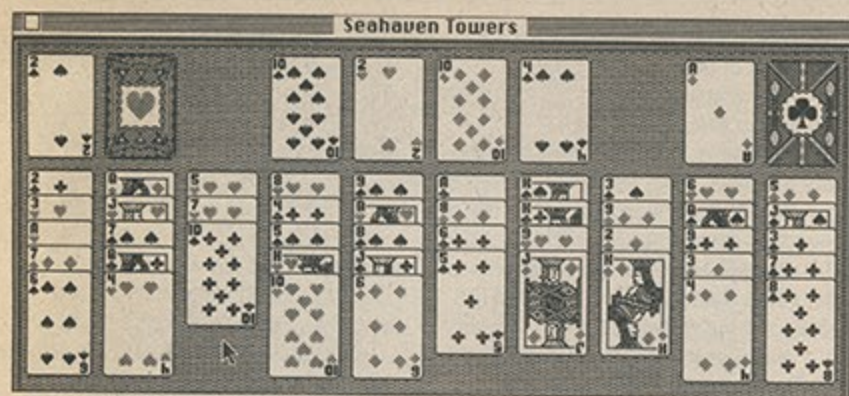

Following on from the NuTek Mac clone story I told you about a couple of weeks back, Cork Computer, a US-based company, has apparently said that it expects to ship a \$2,999 Mac IICI clone on March 25. This clone will only require a 128K ROM from a monochrome Mac, which will plug into the clone's main logic board. The company has developed colour ROM chips which will provide the same functionality as 32-bit QuickDraw without infringing Apple's copyright. Watch this space for details...

CARD SHARP

For the past few weeks, work at Future Towers has been reduced to a crawl by the invasion of a shareware game called Seahaven Towers. It's not brand new, but for some reason it's only just appeared in the office.

Seahaven Towers is a variation on Patience or Solitaire, and it's highly addictive. It's also extremely difficult (Tim 'Smith' Smith has just spent three days completing one game), and it has that 'well, just one more game' feature with a vengeance. The shareware fee is \$20, and, as usual, it's available from on-line services such as CIX as well as most PD and shareware distributors.

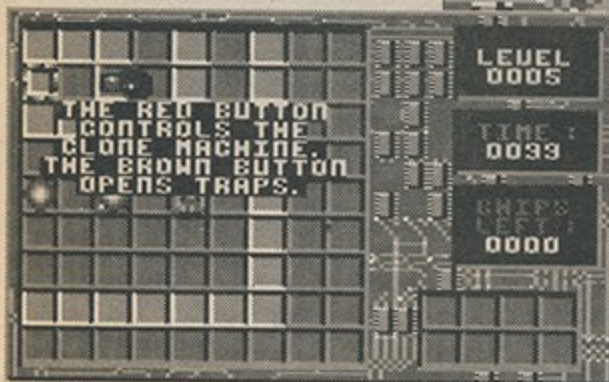
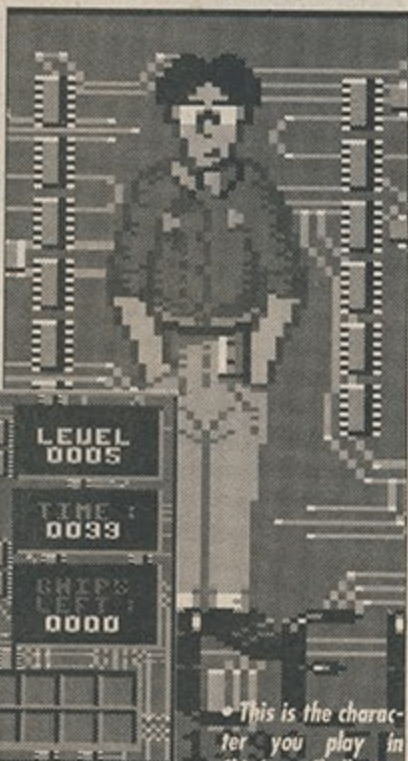

Each level comprises a variety of traps, monsters, puzzles and useful objects. Keep a lookout for things like the cleats, which let you walk across ice, and keys to get you through locked doors. You can also push various blocks around, too, to help you cross gaps - or maybe you'll discover something interesting underneath...

The levels differ considerably in size - the first is a tiny 'training' level - and you only see a portion of each on-screen at any one time. This really is a very big game. Fortunately, each level comes with its own password, so you don't have to play through the easier early levels every time you load the game up.

The scoring is a bit strange - there isn't any! Neither do you have a set number of lives. Instead, this game is simply about progress. If you 'die' you simply start again on that level. Since most people are only interested in progress anyway, this successfully

removes one of the most frustrating elements of most puzzle games.

The graphics are OK, but rather on the blocky side, one of the disadvantages of small characters and lots of colour. Also, the screen scrolling can be decidedly sluggish, especially on the more complicated levels. That said, the slow speed doesn't interfere with the game too much, since most of it is about solving puzzles anyway.

It makes a welcome change to see US Gold trying out something a bit different especially when the result is as good as this.

F-16 FLIES NEARER

Digital Integration has been pretty quiet on the CPC front over the last couple of years, but all that's about to change with the imminent release of *F-16 Combat Pilot*.

So far I have only seen it running briefly - and then in the hands of an experienced DI 'pilot' - but it looked smooth, fast and rather good; the static screens are especially impressive.

Also coming up on the games front is *Turrican II* from Rainbow Arts. The original was the classic shoot-'em-up of 1990, featuring fast action, lots of baddies, ultra-tough gameplay and generally remorseless violence.

Frankly, it's hard to imagine Rainbow Arts improving on it, but I look forward to the sequel all the same. So far, only a rolling demo has been completed, but it looks like it might well be capable of upstaging the original.

464 VS 6128, THE OTHER ARGUMENT

The sad fact is that 6128 owners tend to regard the 464 as a poor cousin. The tape-based machine seems to act as a kind of lowest common denominator, its inferior memory meaning that the majority of commercial applications (games, principally) aren't designed to exploit the greater capabilities of the 6128. Wouldn't it be wonderful if Amstrad phased out these 64K tape-

based machines, leaving software houses free to cater exclusively for their 128K big brothers...?

Well, A Sugar (it's true, I tell you) of Glasgow has some other, rather interesting, ideas:

"Firstly, budget computer games would die a sad death on the abolition of cassettes. For many young computer fans like myself, who own cassette machines, and whose only means of buying software is weekly pocket money (I get £4 myself), this would mean an end, basically, to buying games. And the action of recoding from tape to disk does not offer any consolation.

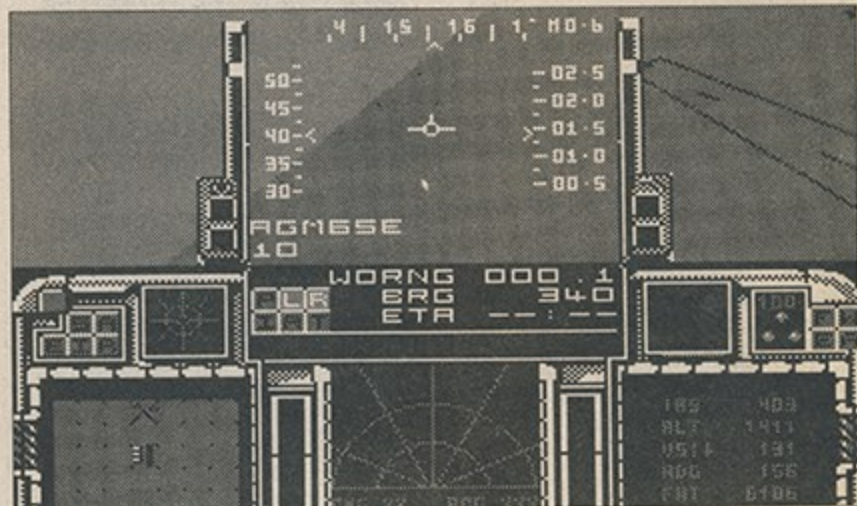
"Consoles, being devoted to games, may provide stunning graphics, but at £20-30 a throw for software are they worth it? I think not, when you compare that to £2.99 for much the same game on cassette. I know console graphics are heavenly, but when you think about it, the Amstrad graphics aren't altogether hell-bound either. Anyway, it depends on the game.

"Also, surely the variety of games on offer on disk is limited? With cassettes, my eyes gaze lovingly at row upon row of neat, rectangular budgets bargains while I might find the odd disk game dotted here and there."

Certainly, the budget market is much underestimated. Just because full-price games have the highest profile, it doesn't mean they sell the most.

Also, Amstrad's relaunch of the CPC series has had some interesting and subtle effects. The 464 Plus is much less the poor cousin in the gaming world that it once was. After all, it can now play the entire range of games on sale, from budget £2.99 offerings through full-price tape-based games and even console games. In contrast, the new 6128 Plus is 'comparatively' limited in the games that can be played on it - how do you load budget games on a machine with no tape port?

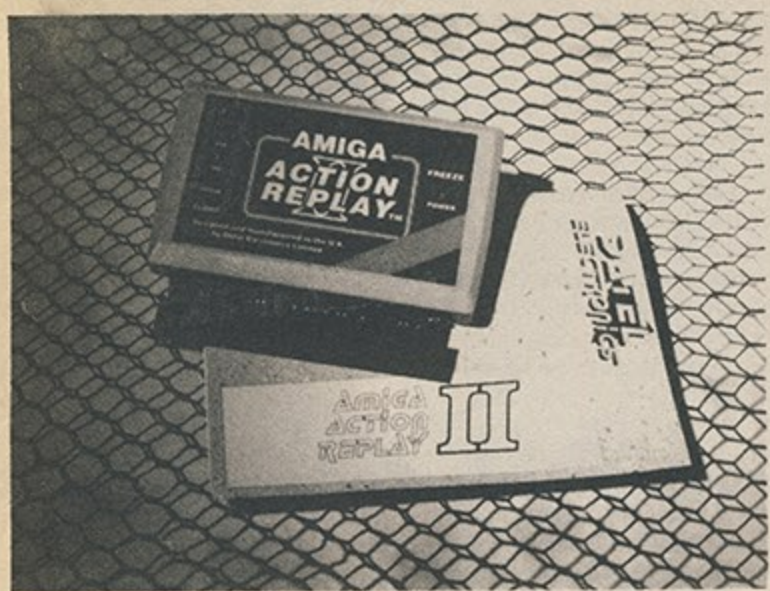


CARTRIDGE

Many of you may have noticed that Dattel Electronics has produced an Amiga 2000 version of its highly regarded Action Replay Mk II utility cartridge. It simply plugs into the processor slot on the 2000 and contains exactly the same features as the Amiga 500 version.

A word of warning though - it seems that the card is only compatible with 2000's that have a minimal amount of expansion hardware installed.

My 2000 has 9Mb of RAM (1Mb of chip RAM) and a hard drive installed, so I was rather annoyed when I received my Action Replay card, only to find that it did not work. So I phoned Dattel's

technical support line (which is actually run by some very helpful people), only to find out that the card will only work on a 2000 with no more than 2Mb of RAM. Datel also claims that the card will only work with Commodore-produced hard drives so if you've got another make (which, let's face it, are usually better than the Commodore's own), you're stuck.

The question is, then, what's the point in producing a utility cartridge for the 2000 if it won't work on an expanded machine? People buy the 2000 because of its expansion capabilities, so it goes without saying that the vast majority have at least some form of expansion hardware fitted. OK, I'm not saying that we all have 9Mb of RAM, but I'm sure that most serious 2000 owners have at least 3Mb.

So I sent back my card and requested instead an Amiga 500 cartridge which Datel claim will also happily work with my A1000. But, surprise surprise, more disappointment – it doesn't work with the A1000 either! Oh well, looks like I'm finally going to have to take the plunge and buy an Amiga 500.

Meanwhile, there's still no sign of the promised follow up to Data Electronics' Nordic Power cartridge which was released in April of last year. When I spoke to Klaus Roregar of DE back in September of last year, he promised me that the new cartridge would be made available in a 2000 plug in card form sometime in January of this year. As we all know, January came and went without a sign of a single cartridge from the Holland-based company.

According to Klaus (perhaps he would like to contact me if he's reading this?), the cartridge was to be designed in such a way that it could be used on both an A500 and a 2000 (there are two connectors on the board).

WRITE TO REPLY

I recently received a letter from Gary Devey of Ealing in London concerning my review of the Applied Engineering High Density floppy drive which I featured a few weeks back in Express.

Gary wanted to know a few more details about the drive. Firstly, I forgot to mention that the drive is available Stateside for \$189 (which will probably translate to approximately £140). This isn't a bad price at all when you consider that the drive will also take

standard Amiga 880K floppies as well as the 1.52 Mb high density floppies.

Secondly, Gary asked whether the high density drive would function with Bitcon's KCS Power PC Emulator card for the 500 and Consultron's CrossDOS. The simple answer to this is 'yes' and 'no'. If you want to read and write high density PC floppies, then it won't work (you'll need a modified version of both CrossDOS and the KCS emulation software for this to work). If, on the other, you wish to use standard 720K PC floppies, then you won't encounter any problems.

Changing the subject slightly, Gary also wanted to know whether it is possible to connect PC hard drives to the Amiga. Well, he's in luck again. All you need is the correct controller card and you're in business. There are a large number of different controller cards available for the Amiga which will allow you to connect XT (indeed, the A590 uses an XT drive), SCSI, AT IDE, ST506, etc drives to your machine. Contact Third Coast Technologies on 0257 472444 who will almost definitely be able to help you.

It's also possible to connect up PC SHUGART floppy drives to the Amiga by constructing a very simple interface. Complete instructions on how to achieve this can be found in the latest issue of JAM which is available by telephoning 0895 74449.

If you're after a very cheap external floppy, then these SHUGART drives are a very good bet. Simply by scanning the advertisements in a PC magazine, you can buy a bare drive for a fraction of the cost of an Amiga drive.

Finally, Gary enquired whether there is a drive available which will work from the parallel port. The only such drives of which I am aware are the range of 'Tiny Tiger' hard drives from George Thomson Services (I'm not quite sure if they still sell them, but give them a bell just in case). These also offer 'pass-through' connectors, so you can still connect up and use video digitisers, samplers etc. GTS is on 077082 234.

A COMPLETE LEMMING?

It saddened me to read in Express issue 121 that 'Psychosis' Lemmings had been 'cracked, hacked and packed' within days of its release. After all, we all complain endlessly that many of the games released for the Amiga are either totally devoid of gameplay, have appalling graphics and sound or are

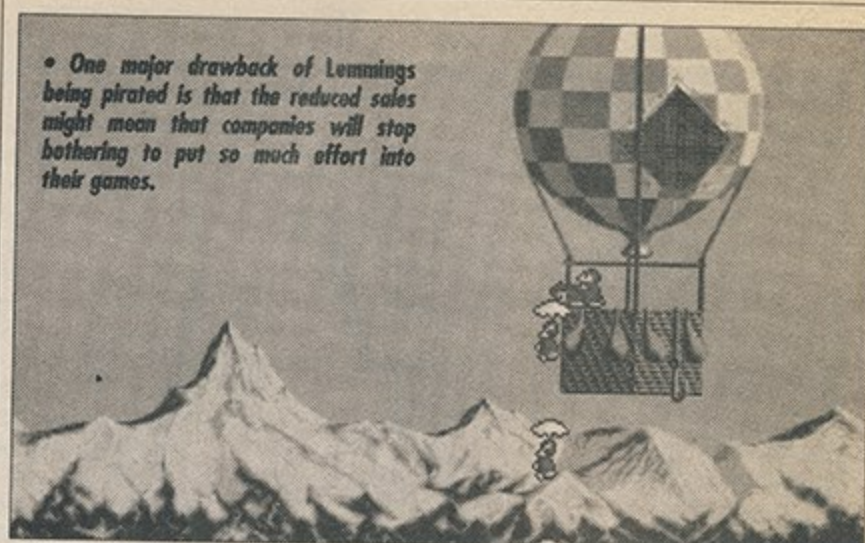

direct ports from lesser machines (or even a combination of all three).

But what happens when someone finally produces something that is actually worth the £25 asking price? Some moron goes and pirates it.

I've got no sympathy whatsoever for software houses that produce naff games software (some games aren't worth 25p, let alone £25), but when a software house really puts in the effort to produce a top notch game, we owe it to them to respect that effort. By buying the product, we can demonstrate that users are prepared to pay for a quality product and hopefully this should encourage software houses to put in the extra effort to produce even more decent games (as they say, vote with your wallet).

You may well argue that price of games is too high, but that is simply no excuse for pirating games. The fact is,

a game is a product like any other – just like, say, a car or a chocolate bar. The producer of that product can only afford to develop future products (a tastier chocolate bar or a new model of car) if they have made enough money from previous products.

You've heard it a million times before, but it still holds true – where software piracy is concerned, the only people that suffer in the long run are the users themselves. If companies like Psygnosis cannot recoup their costs, then they will simply stop developing products for that particular machine. Already there have been rumours that the Psygs may do just this and move across to the consoles, which would be a great loss to us all. So come on, do the sensible thing – if you already know that a game is good, then go out and buy it.

TELETEXT ADAPTORS

Over the couple of weeks I've been trying out two teletext adaptors, one from the well-known Morley Electronics and the other from the less well-known Ground Control. Both are separate boxes, ie they're not podules, but they do require plugging into the Archie's IIC bus via the podule backplane.

The IIC bus is a 'slow' serial connection that allows communication between all sorts of odd bits of electronics. For example, my Philips video recorder has an IIC bus connection on the back. Having this sort of connection means that these adaptors are truly 'universal'; with only an appropriate driving routine they could be plugged into BBCs, Nimbuses (Nimbi?), PCs or even Spectrums!

The Ground Control unit has a 'data' socket on the front and you must order the appropriate connection lead with the unit. The Archie lead I received is particularly pleasing with a very smart, sealed podule connector. The Morley unit, on the other hand, has a rather disappointing piece of ribbon cable emerging from one end with a podule connector soldered onto it.

Both units need separate power supplies from the Archie; Ground Control has one built in, with a big chunky on/off switch on the back of the box. Morley has a mains plug transformer which must be connected to a BBC B-style socket near the podule

socket. This does mean it is a little untidy with another wire going into your Archie, but once plugged in, you soon forget about all the spaghetti at the back of your desk.

The Ground Control unit also sports an AUX socket which has composite video and audio connections. This means you can connect a suitable monitor (eg Philips CM8833) to it and watch the telly!

The final cosmetic difference is in the case. Ground Control has a strong BBC beige, steel case making it look remarkably like a Music 500, while Morley's case is plastic. This, along with the lack of internal power supply, does make it much lighter than the Ground Control unit!

Of course, nobody is really interested in the dimensions of the case; it's the supporting software you need to know about. The only problem I have at the moment is that it isn't really fair to compare the two yet. Ground Control has a full multi-tasking 'Mode 7 in a window on the desktop' application whereas Morley is a single-tasking Basic program that uses Mode 7 directly. But I have been told that a RISCOS version is in production.

So without too many comparisons, here's what you get.

GROUND CONTROL

The Ground Control software installs itself on the icon bar and will change the

default Mode 12 palette if you so desire. Clicking on the icon brings up an emulated Mode 7 window (no flashing characters, though) and a numeric keypad for entering page numbers.

You'll probably need to tune the channels before starting; this is achieved by selecting 'TUNE' from the menu then manually stepping through channels 21 to 69 to find a signal. Fine tuning from -49 to 49 is also available. If you're lazy, you can also use the SEARCH facility which automatically steps through the channels until a strong signal is found.

Assuming you've set all this up correctly, channels can now be selected by pressing 'CH' followed by a channel number on the numeric keypad (I would have liked to see separate BBC1, BBC2, ITV and Channel 4 buttons). This will automatically take you to the index page.

As mentioned above, page numbers can be entered by typing the number on the keypad; you can also point to the coloured 'FasText' buttons at the bottom of the window to take you to related pages or, best of all, by simply pointing to a page number displayed in the window and clicking the mouse. This is a really simple, but very effective feature.

All the usual functions are available, such as Hold, Conceal/Reveal and page-saving. There is also a handy Edit-style Notepad for jotting down page numbers. Another useful feature is the facility to customise the menu by adding four preset pages of your own choice, but you really need to be able to do more than four.

The Emulated Mode 7 screen is very nicely done, (apart from the lack of flashing characters); the character set is particularly easy to read - double height especially so - and if you try displaying the test pages on Channel 4 (Page 693) you'll see it also has a set of foreign character sets built in. Double width, smooths, mosaics and palette

changing (under Extended Level 1/Level 2 teletext) are not supported.

MORLEY

The Morley software is a bit of a let down after Ground Control, but should not be dismissed as useless. It uses the Archimedes' own Mode 7 display, and so supports flashing characters. Everything is controlled via the keyboard - mainly with the function keys (a keystick is provided). Shift f1-f4 select channels while the ordinary number keys select pages.

FasText links are supported, but there is no method of picking page numbers off the screen.

Shift f5 allows the unit to be tuned (with the cursor keys) and a readout in channel number and MHz is displayed. As there is no video output, though, it is quite tricky to find the channels.

Pages can also be saved, loaded and printed. The only real feature of the software is the ability to search for a given subpage - for example number three of seven - which you cannot do with Ground Control.

THE FINAL VERDICT

To sum up, both units do their job well. Neither is perfect, and I can think of a number of absent features which would be desirable, including auto page caching. The attention to small details makes the Ground Control adaptor the most appealing of the two at the moment and at £75 is almost half the price of the Morley which is £147.20. Maybe the Morley RISCOS software will change that, but with such a large price difference I don't think Ground Control has too much to worry about.

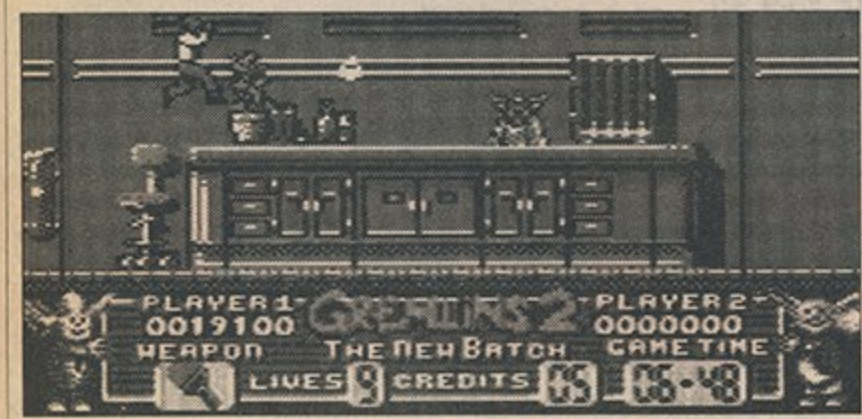

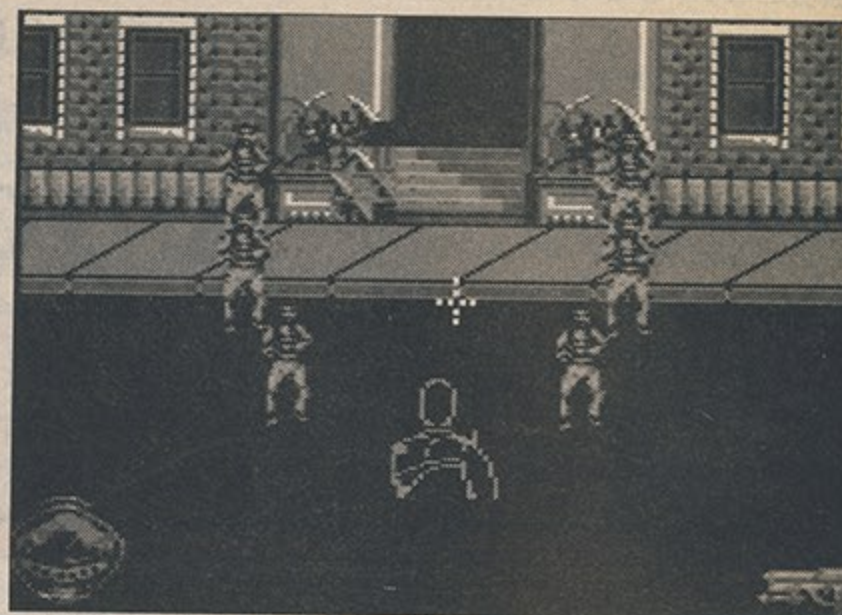

QUICKIES

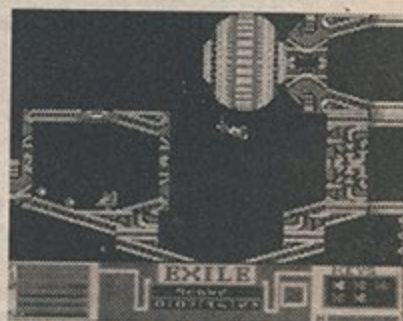
Colditz is finished and I stand by what I wrote last Christmas about its potential to be one of this year's biggies.

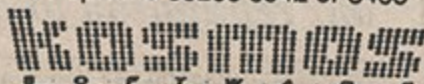

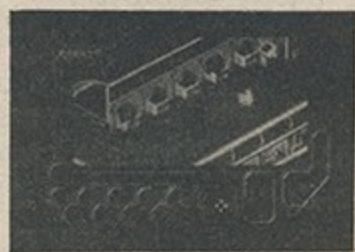

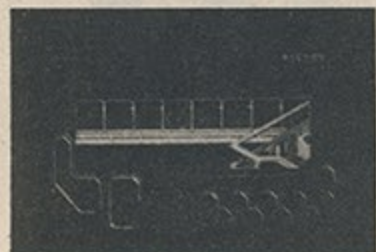

PROXIMITY ALERT

It would seem that the ST DTP market is alive and kicking as both Pagestream and Proxima are due for major updates.

Pagestream 2 will be a colour version and we're told by Softlogic that will be a vast improvement on all previous versions. Pagestream's big opposition is Proxima from Network News Services which has just been

updated to version 2 with lots of new features; text will change foreground and background colours as appropriate; letters can be subjected to various distorting effects such as blocking, x-raying, twisting, rotating or slanting; the editor will work in columns or in a word-processing mode; block editing, cut and paste and a spell checker have all been incorporated and the whole speed of the program has been tweaked.

Graphic objects can be created with a CAD module. These graphic items can

WHOLE WIRED WORLD

A quality hallmark for Atari software, Intel loses copyright on a certain three figure number and much more from our globetrotting reporter, Steve Gold.

INTEL LOSES BATTLE OVER 386 COPYRIGHT

Intel has lost its court battle with Advanced Micro Devices (AMD) over the use of the number '386' in its family of 32-bit microprocessors.

Intel remains unbowed by the US court decision, however. In a statement, Thomas Dunlap, the company's vice president and general counsel, said: "As a result of this decision, we will refer to the 'i386tm' microprocessor and 'Intel386(tm)' microprocessor in order to more clearly distinguish Intel products from imitations."

Unsurprisingly, AMD's chairman Bill Sanders said that the court's decision was a wise choice: "It removed another obstacle to Advanced Micro Devices' breaking Intel's monopoly in the IBM-compatible 32-bit microprocessor arena."

He added: "The ruling is also an important one for the manufacturers of

personal computers, who are now protected from legal harassment by the leading supplier of 386 microprocessors if they wish to use the number '386' in their product names."

So what does the removal of copyright on the numbers 386 mean to the average computer user in the street? The chance of cheaper PCs, that's what.

While Intel has kept its prices high on the chips that drive PCs, AMD - as well as several other PC makers - have been working on 386-compatible chipsets which will cut the cost of high-powered PCs. If they can call their chips 386s as well, then there will be no confusion in the marketplace.

VARIOUS FORMATS, ONE PRICE

Strategic Studies has begun shipping an interesting fantasy/strategy game called *Warlords* in the US. The package is available for the PC and Commodore

Amiga, with versions for the Apple Mac and Atari ST expected very soon. Unusually for a multi-format release, it will cost \$50 in all versions.

According to the Californian software house, the program invites you to destroy enemy castles in "ruthless economic warfare while turning their own castles into impregnable fortresses."

ATARI MARK OF EXCELLENCE

Expect to see a new sticker on Atari product releases from the US.

The 1,300-strong (and growing) Atari Users Association has begun applying its own 'mark of excellence' to ST products and word is that software houses are sitting up and taking notice.

According to the official blurb from the AUA, its own members vote on whether a new product deserves the mark and, if it does, the group awards it to the software house concerned.

The AUA hopes this scheme will inspire software/hardware developers to produce ever more excellent products for the ST marketplace.

CUTTING DEVELOPMENT COSTS

One of the biggest problems about developing serious software for the Amiga is that, unless the author/software house charges the earth for the package, the development costs take an awfully long time to trickle back into the designer's bank account.

Techbyte, a growing software house in Montreal, Quebec, reckons it has the answer in the shape of its Software Portability Environment (SPE). SPE is a multi-platform software development system, the idea being that you create your software under SPE on one machine and then let SPE convert it for use on another computer.

The reality of the situation is, of course, that nothing is ever quite that simple. Still, if the program saves a

recode, or allows packages to be swiftly ported onto the Commodore Amiga it can't be at all bad.

According to Bill Gattis, president of Techbyte, the programming environment on the Amiga was designed in close liaison with Commodore US.

He describes the Amiga project as "an extremely appropriate extension to the Software Portability system, especially in view of the impressive capabilities of the Amiga in the areas of graphics, animation and multimedia."

Pricing for the SPE system on the Amiga depends on a number of variables, such as site licenses, the number of users and whether the licensee intends to generate standalone code from the program. Despite this, Techbyte reckons that its licencing terms are extremely reasonable.

BOOST FOR PEN-DRIVEN PCS

This time next year, don't be surprised if your notebook computer doesn't have a keyboard, at least not if Microsoft plans reach fruition.

The operating system software giant has announced that 21 computer manufacturers have committed themselves to the fledgeling Microsoft Pen Windows operating system.

According to Microsoft, specific details about products and release dates will be issued later by the individual hardware manufacturers, some of which include Canon, Grid, Fujitsu, Hitachi, NCR, Samsung, Sanyo, Seiko Epson, Sharp, Toshiba and Wang.

Pen Windows, which has been under development by Microsoft since 1988, is a graphical operating system designed to provide the best platform to take advantage of the benefits of a pen while using a computer. Several manufacturers are expected to release stylus-driven computers before the end of the year.

A key feature of these computers will be the ability to recognise handwriting and convert them into standard ASCII data. ■

ATARI STARTS SYSTEM 7.0 BANDWAGON STARTS ROLLING



Apple is reported to be putting the finishing touches to its System 7.0 operating system software. The computer giant has just sent out final beta versions of the software to more than 13,000 hardware and software developers around the world.

"We're in the final phases of preparing System 7.0 for release to Macintosh users," revealed Jim Davis, Apple's director of System Software Marketing. "We're dotting the I's and crossing the T's, and we should be shipping System 7 to customers in the first half of this year."

Apple is hoping that in conjunction with the trio of new Macs launched at the end of last year, System 7.0 will give MS-DOS a real run for its money. Watch this space!

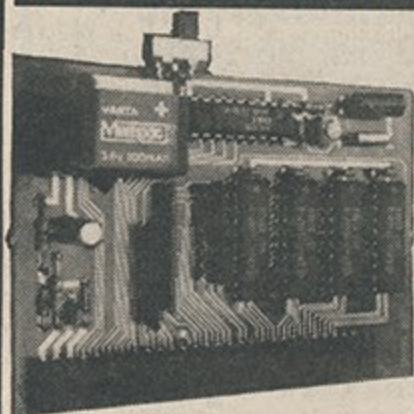

CIRCUIT CITY



Turn your breadboard ideas into professional PCBs. Keith Pomfret shows you a program which can turn your PC into a PCB designer.

You may have the best hardware idea in the world but no-one's going to buy it if it looks like metal spaghetti welded to an old biscuit tin. Open up your PC and you'll see row upon row of neat green cards purpose designed to elegantly arrange the various circuits in a tidy configuration.

The manufacture of these boards is still generally the domain of the specialist company, but it's possible to do all the design work and produce professional PCB designs using your PC.

The simplest way to do this would be to choose an art package in which you could define patterns or brushes and define all of the symbols and tracks that you would be likely to need. This isn't the most elegant solution, but will work and I've seen quite a few commercial designs that started as a basic PCB design in an art package.

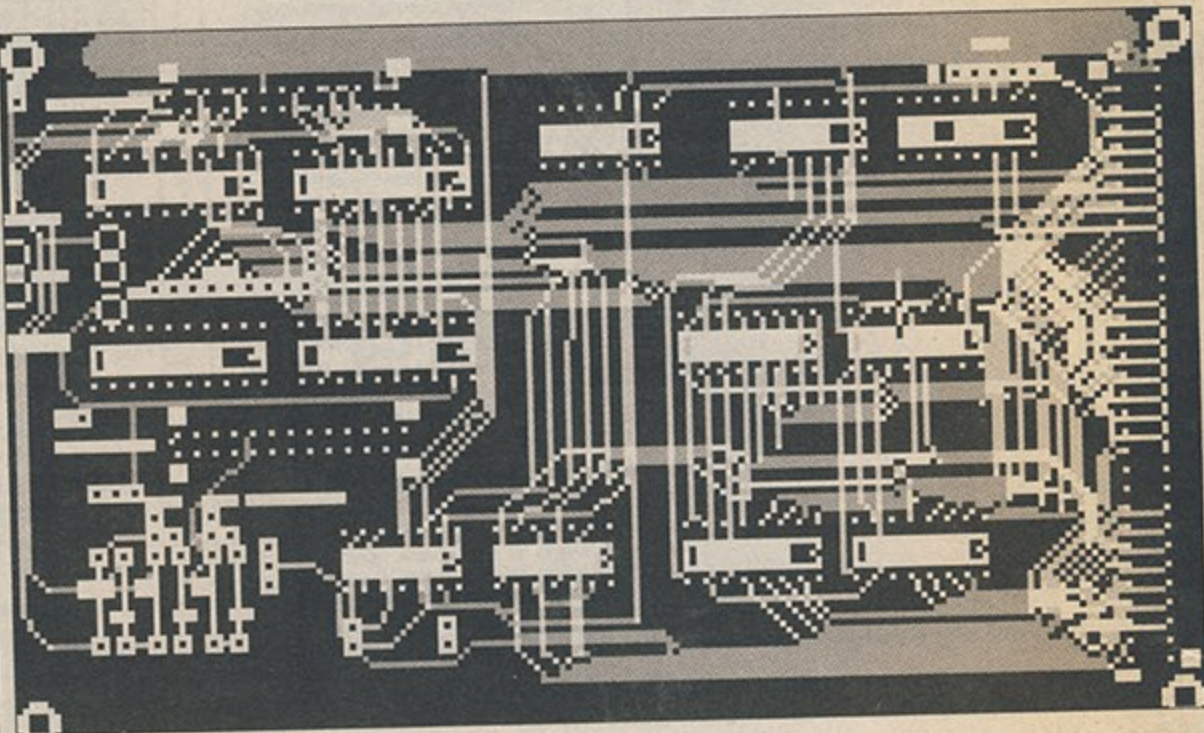
At the other end of the power and cost spectrum are full blown CAD (computer aided design) packages that cost thousands and need a power PC or workstation running some exotic operating system to function. Again, this is a workable solution but far beyond the budget and requirement of most casual users.

Somewhere holding the middle ground is Easy PC from Number One Systems. When it hit the carpet behind the front door I was inclined to disregard it on account of its sub £100 price tag, but a need to design a gearbox control module for the family coach meant that it soon saw use.

A software product is only as strong as its manual and a design program specialising in a discipline that is probably new to most users must be intuitive and simple to understand. With the review pack came a set of demo files that were in essence a complete walk through giving a demonstration of the package's features and their use.

Easy-PC describes itself as a Printed Circuit Board Layout and Circuit Diagram Draughting Program. Installing on the office PC (a VGA 386) was as simple as copying all the files to a pre-prepared directory. The office machine is a Silica/Goldstar 386 and is a pretty powerful piece of kit. However, Easy-PC will run on any PC that is at least a 512K CGA XTclone.

Design work of any kind can be mathematically intensive, but the Easy-PC program managed OK without a math co-processor. Once installed and running,

Easy-PC offers a written tutorial that gives hands on experience of the program using pre-prepared schematics and drawings.

A mouse is desirable to the operation of Easy-PC but not essential. After installing the software and playing with the demo, I rang Number One Systems to verify a couple of points and in conversation was told that the hands on back up and help they could offer the new and inexperienced user was based on experience. They use Easy-PC in their own drawing offices.

Back to basics and although it's fun to play with any design package, your £98 plus VAT and carriage should be put to better use than doodling so you need something to design.

You shouldn't attempt to design and produce a PCB unless you already have a circuit up and going. I've spoken to several hardware aficionados who thought that they could throw away some of the initial development in favour of on-screen editing and de-bugging, but in real terms that doesn't work.

First, design and build your circuit on a breadboard or one of the trackboards that you can get from suppliers such as Tandy or Maplin.

When you're sure that you have an efficient working product, it's time to try to transfer your design from breadboard to PCB.

One of the readily available templates in Easy-PC is a small euroboard. This loads an outline with a euro connector on to the screen and you are able to work with some idea of your constraints. Other pre-determined symbols are available and you can save any design that may be a good jumping off block for something else.

A simple but useful PCB is a switchable hardware serial port for a PC. In order to design this, you'd need to design a short PC card PCB. It may not be a bad idea as you design the board to save the generic PC card design. This way, you'd save yourself some work

next time you wanted to design a PC card.

Likewise any other circuit board that used a generic shape. This way you could build up libraries of often used board shapes. Taking that philosophy a stage further, often used processors and chips that are generally configured the same way could be saved in the same way that regularly used clip art is saved in DTP programs.

This modular approach to design may not seem essentially necessary if you're only planning one project or the occasional design but as you learn the rudiments of design, the ability to use oft used circuits and components will be a benefit in terms of saved time and productivity.

Listen to half a dozen wireheads and you'll hear at least six: "There's only one way to design a PCB properly," theories. In short, find the way that you work most efficiently and comfortably and use that. First attempts will look clumsy and before you shoot off to the local PCB manufacturer, it's probably best to let your masterpiece lie for a few days. After a few nights sleep, you will see obvious changes that can make the board tidier and more elegant. Once the fine tuning has been done, see if you can do the job on a smaller board. A small board with shorter tracks may look busier but it is also less use of resources.

As well as the ability to design manufacturable PCBs from the ground up, Easy-PC can take some of the stress out of simple circuit schematics too.

Easy-PC is a well featured design package that can best be described as DTP for the circuit designer. The output to file or printer is easily good enough match the most stringent manufacturing criteria and at £98 the package is excellent value for money. ■

TECH TIPS



Having problems with your printer? Wonder how you can get your office and home computer to talk to each other? Ever wondered how ATOnce can help you? Send your stories and queries to Keith Pomfret, Tech Tips, New Computer Express, 30 Monmouth Street, Bath BA1 2BW.

HELP! Amiga printer

You guys are totally brilliant and between the weekly *New Computer Express* and *Amiga Format*, there is very little of interest that either seems to escape your notice, or goes uncovered. Keep pluggin! Now, can your expertise come up with an answer, please, regarding my printer problems – yes there had to be a reason for the grovelling opener!

I have an Amiga and among the software I use is the Publishers' Choice DTP program and I dumped what I produce to my Star LC24-10 printer.

All the equipment is not that old, so isn't worn or abused. My problem is the printer and horizontal lines. This is a problem that began just prior to Christmas and commenced with the lines appearing infrequently and often only stretching about two inches across the page. It's got progressively worse and I don't know why. I can't class this as 'handling' because density, or lines of density, has never been a problem.

Could it be the stepper motor? Printer head? Preferences? Can you please help in any way?

Now we have got that matter out of the way, I have a suggestion for a future feature. I have a modem. I read the usual articles relating to BBs, etc, and use them no problem. But never have I read anything that would take the newcomer, such as myself, through the various stages that will allow us to download or even upload files. My comprog is ACCESS! but I have yet to successfully download anything from BBs'. Am I just being thick or are there others like myself out there with the same problem?

Thanks again for any assistance you may be able to provide re the printer.

First, try your printer on another Amiga and using different software to check whether it really is the printer. If the problem doesn't appear with other software, you could have a printer driver problem. If it doesn't appear with another Amiga, you've an Amiga problem. If it's neither of these, then it looks like it might be the printer.

If the printer is still in warranty, return it to the supplier with an example of the flawed output. If it's out of warranty, either take it to the supplier or to another reputable computer/printer repair

and service agent.

Thanks for the idea for the feature. It must be getting time for a comms splurge again. The only problem with your idea, though, is that out of at least 20 comms programs across the different machines, none seem to work in exactly the same way. The process of downloading is essentially the same, but different programs approach it in different ways. A particularly user friendly comms program allows you to pre set download and upload criteria and implement it by the simple expedient of clicking on an icon. Other programs expect some input from you and some of the more unfriendly ones make you drop to the operating system and type all sorts of mumbo jumbo.

Access, however, is one of the easier to drive ones and if you're having problems with it you should first check that you are trying to work with programs that are compatible with your machine and then check that you are following the correct upload and download protocols.

There are several file transfer protocols and if both ends of a comms link aren't using the same, you will get garbage. If the sending system is operating in the X Modem protocol, the receiver must also operate in X Modem and so on. Watch out for comms specials, but you'll have to get to know your own comms software better too.

HELP! Slow laser

At present I run both an Atari 520 STFM and an Acorn A3000 on the latter I use ATELIER and EUCLIO 2. I have been offered a Ricoh PC Laxezer 6000, with a laserjet and emulator cord and three toner cartridges for £370 (its counter shows 45000 copies). Is it a good buy? I have seen it in use with a PC200 with hard drive, the output was good with four tone grey scale, but it took 15 minutes to plot a simple graphic – is this normal?

The laser that you are thinking of buying is definitely not the ideal add-on for your Archimedes. As well as being slow and having little memory, it isn't suitable for some of the output that you'd want to do, even with emulation. The best way to get a cheapish laser for an Archimedes seems to be to trundle along to the All Formats show or suchlike where you can

see the requisite piece of kit in action. On two recent visits to the All Formats, there have been Arch lasers and various other peripherals for sale although it's probably best to check with the organiser before you invest in a trip. If you plan to buy a laser and you know what software you wish to use with it, make sure that you see it demo'd with the software before you buy.

HELP! Monitor stuff

My Philips CM8833 monitor has died on me and has to go away for repair. Fortunately, I also own a Commodore 1901 monitor. My problem is connecting this to my Amiga A2000. I know such a lead is available, but I would rather assemble one myself. If at all possible, could you please illustrate or explain which pins from the Amiga D-plug connect with the RGBI plug for the monitor. I would be very grateful.

If you want to make the lead yourself, the company to contact is Simpson Electronics on 0332 760353. Paul Simpson works on the principle that by supplying the goods and offering technical help, he provides a complete service.

As well as the two connectors and the electric string, if you twist his arm, he might even scribble down a schematic for you so that you can put together the lead yourself.

BARDS! Tale

First a cautionary tale.

I recently bought a 1Mb RAM upgrade for my 520STFM from Evesham Micros. This is the type which gives you four SIMMs slots once it is fitted, made by Zydec. The guy in the instruction manual fitted his upgrade with consummate ease, but I found that with mine the ribbon cables were stretched like fiddle strings. They were so tight in fact that as I reassembled the ST the plugs kept pulling out. After several frustrating attempts I was forced to cut cable slots in the RFI shielding to get the circuit board to sit in a "comfortable" position.

Once this was done everything worked fine, so it seems such a shame that a good product is spoiled by skimping on the cables, another three or four centimetres on the length of all the connectors would have made things so very easy, for little extra cost.

OK, so now I am zipping along with 1Mb of RAM, but those empty slots are playing on my mind, seems such a waste.

Now the questions:

1) Are the SIMMs an industry standard, or do I have to use SIMMS made specially for the ST? I have seen 1Mb PC SIMMs advertised fairly cheaply, can I just replace my 256K SIMMs with these? If my SIMMs must be Atari specific could you give me the name of a supplier and an approximate price.

2) I know from looking at the circuit board logos that my Commodore MPS1250 printer is made by Citizen, can you confirm my suspicions that it is in fact a boxed and badged Citizen 120D?

If you can it will make finding printer driver software much easier.

Thanks for the tip about short cables and how you solved the problem. Your suspicion that SIMMs are not all created equal is correct. The ones that go in an ST are 8-bit wide by 256K or 8-bit wide by 1Mb. The PC ones are 9-bit by 1Mb and therefore incompatible.

The ninth bit is there to check parity and the ST already has this feature implemented elsewhere. I am told that it is possible to disable the on-board parity and run PC SIMMs on an ST, but it's a lot of hassle when the prices aren't really that different. If you want the full run down on what chip does what, the person to contact is Chris Barrow at the Chip Shop on 061 476 3070. Your printer problem is a mystery to me and the chaps at Commodore and Citizen were understandably tight lipped about it too.

HELP! Amiga emulation

I wish to buy an A500 Amiga with 1Mb of RAM and fitted with a PC emulator. Two options seem to present themselves: the A501 memory expansion plus the ATOnce card, or the KCS board (which comes complete with extra RAM). Which of these do you recommend?

The KCS is easy to fit and has the extra RAM and comes with MS-DOS, but is only an XT emulator, costs almost £300, and is limited to CGA graphics.

The ATOnce is AT standard, boasts EGA graphics, and is about £100 cheaper, but is difficult to fit (I have the technical know-how of a small gerbil and none of my local dealers seem keen).

The KCS apparently gives 16 colours on screen, but a recent magazine review stated that CGA could only give four colours in low resolution and was virtually obsolete on real PCs. Which is correct?

I suppose the bottom line is - do you know of a firm that will supply me with an A500 ready-fitted with ATOnce?

I have an Atari 1040 STE with colour monitor, external hard and floppy drives and Star LC10 printer, but I want to be able to transfer at home First Word files to Display Write 4 on IBM at work.

As I have read in Express (and elsewhere) the procedure is to format disks to IBM and then save the First Word files in ASCII format, that is with WP mode off. I have tried, but honest it doesn't work.

It could be Display Write 4 which does not recognise the file type? But if the procedure is usually OK why do PD

libraries offer First Word to ASCII conversion programs?

Please help or recommend mail order for Prototext 5.

You may think it rather awkward to turn the machine on or off but this is quite easily performed with a suitable use of pressure applied with the sharp end of your foot. This is quite common in Amiga circles where it is known as Kickstart. Hope this proves helpful.

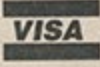

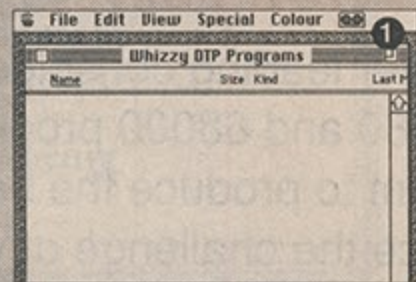

Essential pieces of equipment for this task are as follows: Mac-O-Make compiler/assembler/disassembler from KnoBsoFt (£223.99). A piece of paper, a pencil, Cedric LeMay's authoritative programming tome *How To Turn Your Horrid Old Computer into a Mac Really Easily, No Probs* (Centrefold Press, £22.95, 1212pp) and a deal of patience.



1) First get some idea of what the Mac desktop looks like. You can do this by phoning the following toll free number 0101 803 737 333 838 3939 which is the Independent Global Mac User's club. You will need to have a modem and the ability to download files in MacDoWnload format at 1200 baud.

2 & 2a) Second have a quick peak at the rather simple code which goes into

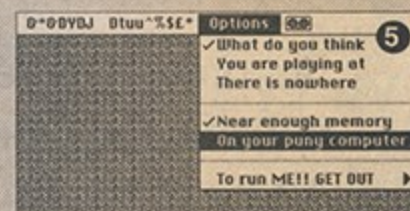

could not be simpler. All you have to do is copy the Mac desktop from your downloaded file and paste it into your own operating system's high memory low user interface coded system file.

To Turn Your Horrid Old Computer into a Mac Really Easily, No Probs, chapter 121, section 3. This deals with altering the Potential Stack Register so that it reads concurrently with the Inverted Keyside Stack. This might be a bit fiddly but keep trying.



5) Finally reboot your own computer and you will see the change. From now on you will be able to run all Macintosh and NeXT programs on your machine without any modification. Be sure to work either with a back-up of your machine or with some else's entirely. If you encounter any problems it's probably because you haven't followed the instructions properly.

A CENTREFOLD EXCLUSIVE ANCIENT GREEKS USED COMPUTERS FOR MATHS

Mr Duranicabrosos said that:

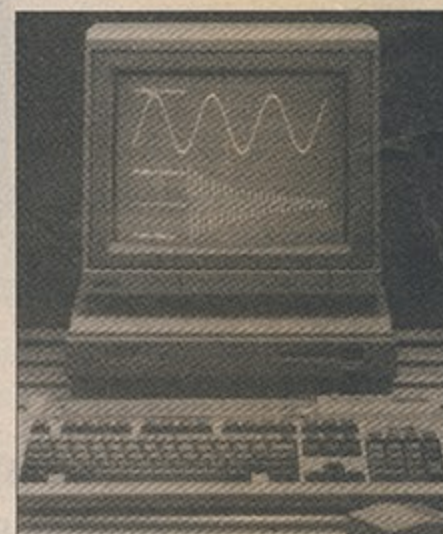
- Archimedes was named after his computer and not the other way around.

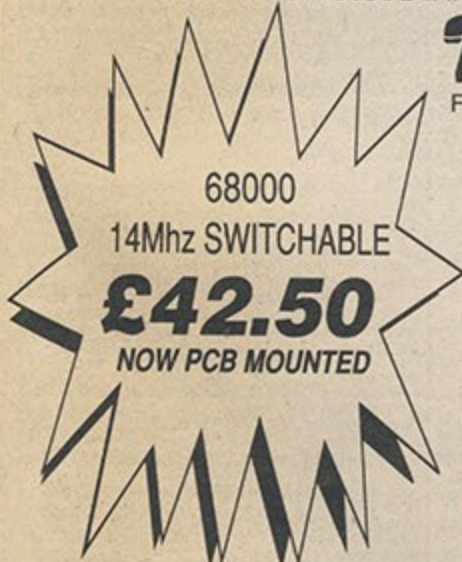

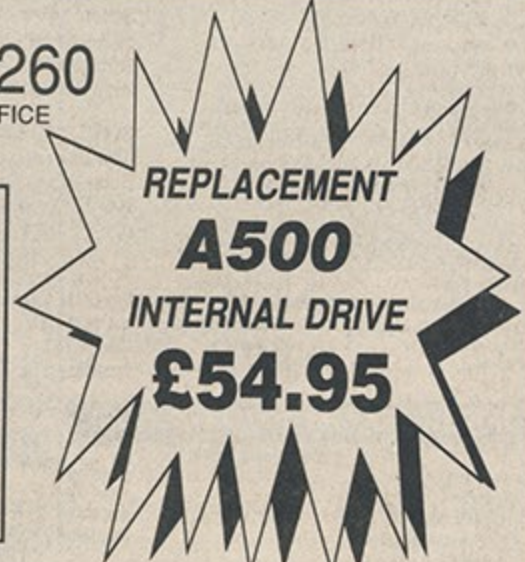

In terms of last week's definition of functional languages, Lisp does not strictly qualify. However, it is more widely available than most of the true functional languages, although Miranda is gaining in popularity, and it is based on the Lambda calculus. There are advantages to allowing side effects, to set against the need to order the steps of the program. Lisp is well suited to describing situations or "states" and applying rules or processes that cause transformations from one state to another.

States can be used to describe a wide range of problems, from the state of the board in a game of chess, to the stages of a mathematical problem being solved, to the description of an unknown disease that we are trying to identify. If we know how to cause different states, we can search through all the possible states of the problem, until we find one that we can use as a solution; this is called a "state space search" because we are searching through the space occupied by all the different states. To make these transformations one variable at a time, as we would have to if a function could not change the values of any other variables, would be rather impractical.

Like Prolog, Lisp is based on recursion. It applies this technique to functions, rather than to logical definitions; to evaluate a function, evaluate those functions that make up the main function, and so on until an answer is reached that can be passed back up through the chain of function calls to provide an answer for the main function, the program itself.

Lisp is an interpreted language for manipulating symbols — objects that represent an item of data. Individual symbols can be assigned to atoms, variables or constants defined in a program, and lists are a very convenient pre-defined data structure for storing groups of symbols. There are built-in operators to process them, but programmers can define virtually any data structures they require. All objects and structures in Lisp are "first class citizens," which means that there are no restrictions on what objects can be used for. Any object can be passed to a variable as a value, passed to a procedure as an argument, returned as a result or stored in another data structure, so that all expressions can refer to any other expressions in the program, directly or indirectly. Added to this freedom is the fact that the symbols or objects in a program do not have to be given values by the program until such a decision is unavoidable and these values can be altered without much difficulty. Another advantage is the power that some dialects of Lisp give you over memory allocation and the recovery of memory used for data that is no longer needed — garbage collection.

There are a multitude of Lisp dialects; Scheme was designed for teaching programming and although it is not fully compatible with Common Lisp, it is an excellent

starting point. Once you have learnt how to use Scheme, other dialects of Lisp can be seen as extensions of what you already know.

Objects in Lisp that can be executed, as opposed to those that simply represent basic symbols, are represented by Lambda expressions, a term which derives from the Lambda calculus on which functional languages are based. Lambda expressions in Scheme start with the keyword Lambda, followed by a list of parameters which may be empty, represented by (), and a sequence of expressions. When a Lambda expression is applied to its parameters, these expressions are evaluated in order and the last value calculated is returned as the result of the function application. The Lambda expression we saw last week, for calculating the square of a parameter in a rather roundabout manner, would look like this in Scheme:

Here, (x) is the list of parameters and (/ (+ (*xx) (*xx)) 2) 5 is the sequence of expressions. Five is taken as the value of x and 2x² is divided by two, to give x², or 35. Lambda expressions may have a fixed number of parameters, or they may take a variable number of parameters depending on the circumstances; this is a particularly useful feature. If the number of parameters is fixed, the parameters are enclosed in brackets, with comments indicated by semicolons, as follows:

WHAT IS LISP?

There is no ANSI standard for Lisp, probably because it was initially distributed mainly by users taking copies of the language with them when they left MIT, where McCarthy had developed the language in the "MIT Artificial Intelligence Project." Many dialects of Lisp developed in the 70s and early 80s, the most popular of which was the Interlisp partly developed at Xerox Parc and Stanford University. The use of Lisp in universities and the many modifications made to the language within those universities made it

hard to find a standard, but Common Lisp represents the only agreed standard so far.

Dissatisfaction with the specification of Common Lisp led Jerry Sussman of MIT to develop Scheme, a version of Lisp designed for teaching programming. Versions of Scheme and Common Lisp have been developed for parallel processing. Object-oriented programming, where the code of the program is separated into "objects" which deal with particular types of data, was catered for in some Lisp

dialects and a standard has been devised to go with Common Lisp, the Common Lisp Object System (CLOS).

Many smaller languages, such as MicroPlanner and Conniver, have been written in Lisp and Prolog was first implemented in Lisp.

The previous lack of low-priced implementations has contributed to the relative unpopularity of Lisp, but there are many good implementations now available, some of which are distributed as Shareware.

THINGS ABOUT LISP

- Lisp is designed for manipulating symbols.

DisplayList is simply a function to display a number of objects. Because it is inside quote marks, hello is treated as a string and the program does not try to execute it as a function. The single quote before madHatter serves the same purpose, because madHatter is the argument that the expressions are applied to, not another expression in the list; we are telling the interpreter to pass the quoted object on without trying to do anything with it. Many dialects of Lisp provide the eval function, which forces the interpreter to try to evaluate an expression, but this is not available in Scheme. The response of the program is 'hello madHatter'.

If the number of parameters is not fixed, then we do not put brackets around them. Again, the arguments are quoted so that Lisp passes them to the expression DisplayList rather than trying to evaluate them.

The arguments are put into a list and passed to the DisplayList lambda expression.

Seven Tiles • Amiga • NBS • G199

Seven Tiles is a futuristic football simulator, which resembles a PD version of the classic full-priced game *Speedball*. It's loosely based on the nation's favourite sport, in that there are two goals at either end of the pitch, and you have to place the ball in the back of your opponent's net while stopping the same thing happening to you. Apart from that, though, it's very different.

The background is a sort of metallic grid, constructed mainly from bas-relief squares. The playing pitch is many times larger than the screen, which scrolls to keep up with the progress of the ball.

The game starts with the ball in the centre of the pitch. Players from each team position themselves in both halves – there's no boring off-side rule here – but they are all some distance away from the ball. When the whistle blows both

sides have to charge towards it in a mad scramble to gain possession.

Having so many players means that passing is quite accurate and profitable. Indeed, each player is only allowed a certain amount of time before he has to relinquish the ball. A bar at the top of the screen indicates how much time you have left. Kicking is achieved with the fire button; the longer you hold it down

before releasing it, the harder the ball is struck, and the further it travels. Should it hit the side of the pitch, it merely bounces from the walls that surround the playing area. There's no such thing as a throw-in in this game. In fact there aren't really any rules at all except for scoring.

You always control the player nearest the ball. This works well most of the time, but occasionally it is annoying

when you're chasing the ball with one player, and another suddenly appears nearer to it. For a few moments, you're unsure which is which, and lose control.

Either one or two players can take part. In a one player game the computer takes control of the other team. The computer plays well, but is not unbeatable, so it's quite a challenge playing your Amiga. The real fun is, of course, when you face a human opponent. Then the competition really is fierce, as you battle it out goal for goal.

The players are quite small and viewed from above. This isn't a drawback, however, as it makes the field seem so much larger, and so much more impressive in comparison.

The sound is great; there is a constant excited buzz from the crowd over which are a variety of sound effects and digitised samples of speech which announce things like bonuses, half time and so forth.

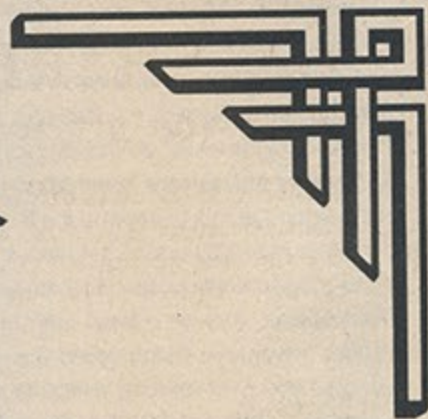
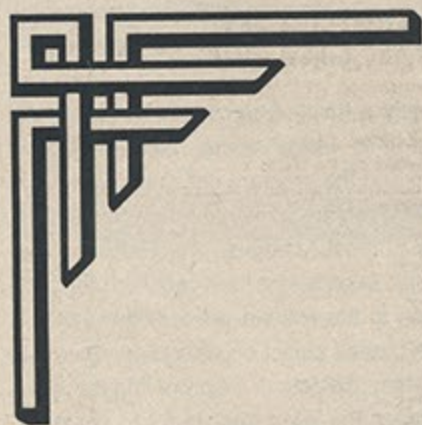

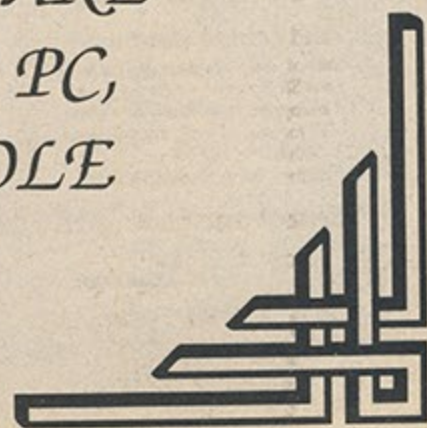

This is a demo version of a TV titling program (the full program costs £25 from Caledonia). A full set of effects is available, so as well as the traditional text scrolling up the screen, there are various fades, colour cycling operations, and so forth with which you can experiment.

A rolling demonstration shows what the program is capable of doing and a text file containing step-by-step instructions accompanies the program.

Michael was lonely. He wanted a friend with whom he could play. One day a wizard came along and magicked one up for him. What exciting adventures they would have together!

Michael's Big Adventure is a great little graphic adventure for kids. It was written by Tom Zunder for his eight year old son Michael. The pictures are so

rough, they look like they were drawn by Michael himself, rather than his Dad. Wonderful stuff!

It's not one of those boring traditional adventures, where you have to type in reams and reams of text to perform even the simplest action. Michael's Big Adventure (we'll call it that for short) is much friendlier, as no keyboard interaction is necessary. Instead it features pictures which you point at and click on using a mouse.

You can click anywhere you like on the screen, but information is not always forthcoming! A good bet is to click on the characters that appear in the game, and on any new objects you come across. For example, Michael wears a badge that says things like "Hi! I'm a badge".

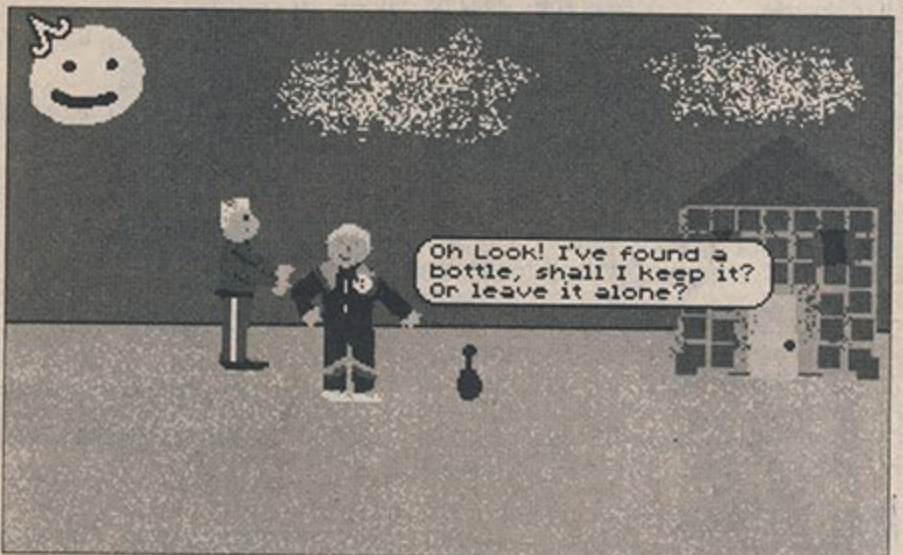
When text does appear it takes the form of a speech bubble. Often these present you with a number of options and you make decisions by clicking on the course of action which most appeals to you.

For the first few screens you have little control over events as there is only one option available on each. But once the initial sequence is over, there are far more choices and the game really starts to open up. It is possible for Michael to be killed, though, so beware of strange men offering to show you his puppies.

Michael's Big Adventure was written using Talespin, the adventure creation system from Microdeal. ■

LOW-COST SCANNING

Jeff Walker samples the new GoldenImage JS-105 image scanner for the Amiga and ST. At less than £200 it could be the best bet there is...

If you are into desktop publishing on your Amiga or Atari ST, a scanner of some kind is a toy you'll love to play with. The best scanners are colour flatbeds, and they cost too much to mention. Colour hand scanners start at around £600. But then colour is not much use to you unless you have a top notch colour printer or you are into colour reproduction, two more expensive hobbies. What the casual or monochrome desktop publisher needs is something cheap and cheerful that does the best possible job for the least possible money.

For a monochrome hand scanner, the GoldenImage JS-105 is at the top end of the price range with a recommended retail price of £277, although I've already seen it being discounted to £199. This £80 discount is important, it made all the difference in the world to my perception of this bit of kit.

The JS-105 is beautifully packaged, which has without a doubt added to its cost, but it also means you shouldn't be frightened of buying it mail order. It comes in a good, solid cardboard box with plenty of foam inside to protect what is a delicate piece of equipment.

TOUCHING MOMENTS

The software bundled with the scanner – for both the ST and Amiga versions – is *TouchUp*, developed by Migraph Inc in the US. It comes with an impressive 170 page manual. I spent an evening reading this before even installing *TouchUp* on to my hard drive. By the time I had read all there was to read it was 3am. But I couldn't go to bed – *TouchUp* sounded so exciting I simply had to have a play. Now, I have to admit that I'm a sucker for anything that's remotely connected to art, but it's a long time since a piece of software has kept me from my pit. Liz Mitchell gets my vote for Manual Writer of the Year.

TouchUp is a black-and-white art package with three sets of tools for painting, clipping and scanning. The first tools you'll want to play with are obviously the scanning ones, it's what you bought the thing for, after all. But first you have to plug in the hardware.

The power supply and scanner cables plug into an interface, which in turn plugs into your parallel port. The scanner itself has 6ft of lead attached, so if space is tight on your computer desk you'll be able to position another flat surface nearby for doing your scanning on.

Scanning is very easy. First you choose settings for the switches on the scanner itself. On the right-hand side there's a wheel for adjusting contrast and a four-way slider for selecting 100, 200, 300 or 400 dots-per-inch scans. On the left-hand side there is another four-way slider for selecting either Text Scan – that's pure black-and-white, no grey tones in between (like text) – or three sizes of grain for scanning photographs or anything else that is more than two colours.

Next come the software switches. You need to tell *TouchUp* whether you want to use the full (4-inches) or half (2-inches) width of the scanner, plus the height of what you are going to scan, which can range from 2-inches to 14-inches. The American developers have

added a Metric button for us Europeans.

A further click on the Scan to Full icon sets the ball rolling. You need to pull the scanner over the picture you want to scan slowly and evenly. If you pull too quickly a small red light on top of the scanner flashes to warn you that you are almost going too fast for it. Slow down slightly and it will stop flashing. If the light goes out, you have gone too fast and data has been lost. It sounds fiddly, but it's not. You soon get the hang of it.

DOWN TO DETAIL

Once your picture is scanned in there are a lot of things you can do to it. For a start, you've probably scanned in more than you wanted, which is where the clip tools come in. *TouchUp's* clips are similar to the brushes that paint packages like *DPaint* use. The difference is that you can't pick the clip up and move it around. By drawing a clip box around part of the picture you have scanned you have simply isolated the area inside that box from the rest of the scan.

As well as being able to save the whole scan, you are able to save just the clip area. And you can manipulate the clip area – rotate it, slant it, mirror it, copy it, fill it with a pattern, or attempt an automatic clean-up process which removes stray black and/or white pixels.

TouchUp has various zoom facilities, one of which is a negative zoom to show you the whole "page", which can be some 1600x5600 pixels for a full 4-inches x 14-inches scan. You can't see details, but it's usually quite easy to see approximately the area you want to clip.

This ability to work on the reduced page is one of the things which makes *TouchUp* special. For instance, you can re-scale the clip by shift-dragging the handles of the clip box. Or you could use a paint tool to erase the junk you don't want outside the clip area and another paint tool to draw a frame around what's left.

TouchUp can save pages and clips in a variety of

monochrome formats – IFF, Encapsulated PostScript Format (EPSF), MacPaint, PCX, TIFF, GIF, Degas, IMG and PrintMaster. You would have thought that if it can save images in all those formats, then it can load images in all those formats. Sadly no. You can't load EPSF, GIF or PCX images. But you can load all the rest, along with TNY and NEO format. Monochrome images will load straight in, colour images must be mapped to black-and-white; you are given the choice of various mapping methods and dithering options – trial and error is the only way through this puzzle, although the manual does an excellent job of describing how colour mapping works.

The paintbox part of *TouchUp* has tools for drawing lines, ellipses and boxes as well as freehand, a selection of 36 fill patterns, a spray can, paint brushes of any shape or size and a zoom facility for touching things up. A special icon allows you to draw Bezier and B-Spline curves, the stuff structured drawings are made of.

WORTH THE DOUGH?

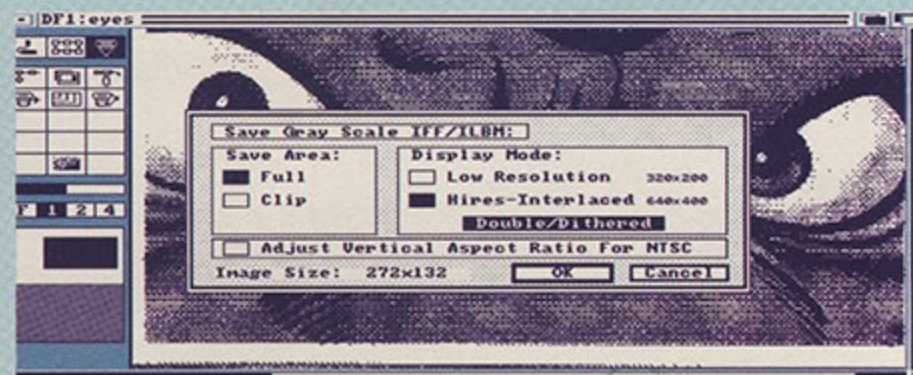
For scanning in black-and-white line drawings, logos and the like, it is a supremely competent tool. It is less competent at scanning colour and greyscale images, but then so is every other monochrome hand scanner. With continual trial and experiment, however, it is possible to get acceptable results – especially from illustrations, as opposed to photographs.

The Amiga software is too wobbly and too slow; you will swear at it often, in between marvelling at some of the things it can do. The ST version, from which the Amiga version was ported, is much more stable and a joy to use. It is the most powerful program I have seen bundled with any Amiga or ST hand scanner. ■

Mirrorsoft is quietly active again this week, plotting its future grasp on the world of 16-bit, with its two top secret titles which have been bubbling away in the background for a while now. First up is *Mega-lo-Mania*, which is the brainchild of past-masters Sensible Software. It could be described as a global conflict simulation, a planet-in-a-bottle, or a giant ant-farm. Falling into the same class as games like *Populous* and *Sim Earth*, *Mega-lo-Mania* puts you in control of a part of a whole planet. Your objective is simple – get control of the lot.

To do this, you must influence the life on the planet and make the inhabitants fight wars to gain control. There are many different types of species on the planet, though all are basically human. Some are cave-dwellers, with little or no sophisticated tools, while others are high-tech warlords with thermo-nukes and other nasty playthings. You set the thing in motion, and then influence the level of wealth, industrial development and evolution. Before long, you may find that your cavemen have developed weapons and are attacking the non-aligned portion of the world. They may even have gone so far as to have built planes and nukes themselves, but are operating them with the subtlety

you'd expect from cavemen.

There are three computer opponents which are also struggling to gain control of the world. All are worthy opponents, but some can be cajoled into joining forces with you, thus furthering your chances of success. But in any event, you'll have to destroy all the opponents to win, whether they are allied or not. Mirrorsoft is promising the best-ever sound effects for any computer, with digitised voices and a host of amusing little touches. That's probably why it is earmarking this as a "one or more megabyte only" game. Games Week looks forward to giving this a real test, sometime soon. Mirrorsoft

has yet to announce a firm release date, but it's expected around March/April for the ST, Amiga and PC.

Mirrorsoft's next title looks set to be a hit if the concept is anything to go by. The aptly named *Brat* is a game all



about a small, angelic baby who has something of a personality crisis. Once asleep, the cute little darling undergoes some kind of Jekyll and Hyde transformation and turns into a street-smart roughneck who roams the strange worlds of his dreams looking for trouble. The release date for this offbeat cyberbaby is set for 24 April on ST and Amiga, at the usual price of £24.99. ■

Amiga and ST

Direct from the horse's mouth, as it were, Games Week presents 25 hot tips for Mindscape's incredible role-playing adventure. Tony Crowther, the man behind the computer, has 25 ways to extend your survival time.

- 1) Always, always, always collect the gold dropped by the aliens. It all comes in handy.
- 2) Open every cupboard you find. They are all there for a purpose, whether good or bad.
- 3) Find the computer for each level, or you won't get the co-ordinates for the next base.
- 4) If the computer's password doesn't work, then it isn't the correct one. Keep searching.
- 5) Doors don't work without power, so make sure they're open before you blow the generators.
- 6) Powerpoints are the same. Tank up with juice before you torch the supply.
- 7) Tool up, repair and refuel before you leave any base. The next shop may be a long way away, and you might not make it if you start out weak.
- 8) Powerpoints make an effective weapon. Put your hand in the socket and fire bolts of pure electricity.
- 9) Characters with high Dexterity hit harder and do more damage.
- 10) Characters with high Vitality are better able to dodge hits, and suffer less.
- 11) Characters with high Wisdom gain more experience.
- 12) Make sure you map out where you go. Getting lost is frustrating and pointless.
- 13) Remember to initiate all the droid chips.
- 14) Never leave a base without first obtaining a new planet-probe.
- 15) Throwing heavier objects inflicts more damage than throwing light objects, but you can't pick everything up. Some things are just too heavy.
- 16) Remember to update your skills as you gather more experience. Experience is gained more quickly during the early levels, so put it to good use.
- 17) Save regularly, using a different slot for each save. It is possible to become trapped, by locking yourself in. No save means having to do the whole lot again.
- 18) The very first airlock door won't let you out until the generators have been destroyed.
- 19) Avoid using Tindron heads. They're marginally better-sighted than bats, but not much.
- 20) During battles, you must move or die. Try using the keyboard for faster speed across the floor.
- 21) All the shops stock different items at different prices. Make a note of this as you need to save money to maximise your capabilities.
- 22) Attacking to the side is not as effective as attacking to the rear. The party at the back will attack aliens directly behind them as well as aliens to the left or right. Side-on attacks only attack in that direction.
- 23) Put your party leader at the back. This minimises the risk of someone taking his head off, and you being plunged into darkness.
- 24) Use doors to squash aliens, but stand in the next square to stop the aliens squeezing through to your side of the door.

AMIGA EMULATES



When's an Amiga not an Amiga? When it's pretending to be something else. Damien Noonan looks at how the Amiga can be even more versatile.

The Amiga is a versatile machine, sure enough – but did you realise it is so versatile that it can pretend to be a whole heap of other things? All you need is the right kind of hardware or software. In some cases this means an 'emulator', which allows the Amiga to pretend it is another kind of computer. In other cases it's a clever bit of electronics that allows your Amiga to do something you wouldn't expect it to be able to. So when is an Amiga not an Amiga? When it's...

A MACINTOSH



One of the most impressive and most popular of all the emulators is A-Max from Entertainment International. It allows your Amiga to pretend it's an Apple Macintosh and to run Mac software. Macs are a good deal more expensive than Amigas, feature an extremely easy-to-use WIMP system for running programs and a great deal of very high-quality software, especially for Desktop Publishing and graphics.

There are three main drawbacks to A-Max. First, to emulate the Mac's very high-resolution monochrome screen display A-Max runs in Interlace mode, which flickers like crazy and can be unpleasant to use. Second, to use A-Max you must get hold of an Apple Mac ROM chip and operating system disk, which is not at all easy (although you can now buy A-Max with the necessary chip) and is of dubious legality. Third, A-Max cannot run all Mac software: the protection systems of some mean they won't run on the Amiga.

The latest version of A-Max comes in two different forms: A-Max 2 and A-Max 2 Plus. The latter is a hard card variation to plug inside the Amiga 2000 and includes several enhancements over the basic unit, which is a grey box that plugs into the back of the Amiga. The new A-Max 2 has the great advantage of

hard drive support – anyone who has used a Macintosh will tell you that it really needs a hard drive to be viable. The original A-Max costs £134 without Mac ROM, A-Max 2 is £169.95 without ROM, £269.95 with and A-Max 2 Plus will cost £249.95 without or £349.95 with. Telephone Entertainment International 0268 541126.

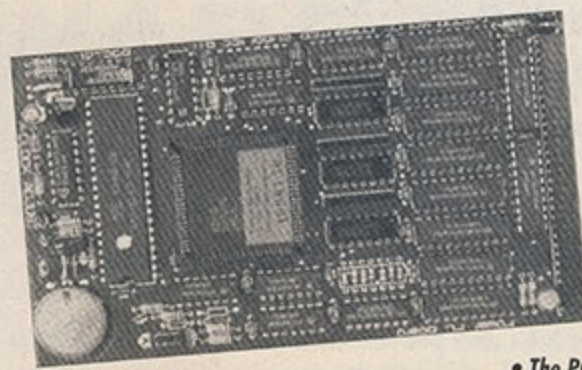
...OR A PC

The industry standard set by the IBM PC and compatibles is the most useful to be able to tap into. One way to do this is enable your Amiga disk drives to read and write PC disks so that you can transfer files to and from PCs and Amigas – and also, incidentally, to and from more the modern Macs. The best way to do this is with a utility called CrossDOS, which runs as a background task enabling you to save out of your favourite programs straight to a PC disk. All you have to do is specify your drive as, say, pc0: rather than df0: when telling the Amiga where to save to. CrossDOS is 100 per cent efficient and foolproof. It costs a mere £29.99 from Power on 0234 273000.

The other way to tap into the PC pool is to buy a hardware-based PC emulator. These are more or less a PC on a PCB and are available both for the Amiga 2000 and the 500.

The 2000 version is the famous Bridgeboard, manufactured by Commodore, which slots into the 2000 internally and comes in many different PC varieties. It is excellent, but expensive, costing a four-figure sum which is actually in excess of the price of a cheaper PC.

There are two Amiga 500 PC cards, both of which slot into the 'trapdoor' underneath the Amiga 500. Slightly the older is the PC Powerboard, made by KCS in Holland and sold over here by Bitcon (88 Bewick Rd, Gateshead NE8 1RS) at a price of £299 which includes handy extras like MS-DOS v4 and PC GWBasic. The other is the Vortex AtOnce board which emulates a PC-AT and is available from Silica (081-309 1111) at a price of £199, though the MS-DOS operating system will cost an extra £50.

WHEN IT'S A BBC MICRO

The BBC Emulator is a software-only emulator that enables the Amiga to run a large amount of BBC software. It was originally conceived as part of Commodore's strategy to take over the market that was being conceded by Acorn's ageing 8-bit machine, particularly in primary schools. It is an excellent idea because much of the educational software written for the Beeb is very good indeed.

The Emulator works well, but because it only works with legal 6502 programs it will not necessarily run all BBC software, particularly games. It is available from Commodore (0628 770088) or as part of the Class of the 90s educational pack. The newest version has just been released by GeniSoft (0753 680363) for £29.99.

OR EVEN A SPECTRUM!

Yes, believe it or not, there is a Spectrum emulator for the Amiga. And it doesn't run as fast as a real Spectrum unless you run everything in mono. Sound pointless? Well, not entirely. It includes a special interface which enables you to load Spectrum programs straight from tape and save them out to Amiga disk, so if you used to own a Speccy and would hate to bin all those 8-bit classics, it could be handy. Only problem is we do not currently know of a UK supplier – the unit is manufactured by Digimail SRL of Milan, Italy on 39 02 426559.

A DIFFERENT AMIGA...

No, not an Amiga emulator for the Amiga. This is a new kind of Amiga that even Commodore has very little to do with. Checkmate's A1500 is basically a recase of the A500 with a separate keyboard and a nice, compact box for the CPU and internal disk drives. Apart from the fact that it looks a sight smarter, the recase has a couple of advantages. The case is sturdy metal and puts the joystick ports and disk drives (yes, there is space for two internal disk drives) at the front. It includes room internally for genlock or MIDI interface cards, as well as allowing for expansion units to contain other cards. The A1500 can be bought as a kit so you can fit your own A500 into it, or you can send your computer off and they will convert it for about £200. Phone 081-923 0658.

A FAX MACHINE

Fax machines – for the uninitiated, gadgets that transmit pictures down the phone line and print them out at the other end – are becoming an increasingly large part of modern telecommunications. They're dead handy, but very expensive so not many people have them in their own homes.

Fast FAX from Microdeal allows you to turn your Amiga into a full-featured Fax machine for the relatively low price of £699. This may sound like an awful lot of money, but if you run a small business based around Amigas it could prove a good alternative to buying a separate Fax machine. You can buy Faxes a fair bit cheaper, but not with the range of features that Fast FAX offers. Manufacturer Microdeal is on 0726 68020.

A TELETEXT TELEVISION!

Microtext is an adaptor unit that plugs into the back of the Amiga and allows it to receive Teletext signals from the BBC's Ceefax and ITV's Oracle services. It also comes with an added bonus – to receive the Teletext signals, which are in with the ordinary TV signals of the respective broadcasting companies, it also has to act as a TV tuner. So all you have to do is plug the unit in, attach a TV aerial to the back and you have an Amiga TV. The software lets you store and print pages and it would be possible, for instance, for it to print out a regular TV schedule every day and when you get home from work, there it is waiting for you. Good stuff and, considering it can replace a television, a bargain at £143.50. Available from Microtext on 0705 595694. ■

Depending on how heavily you want to get involved with programming, there are a variety of different languages to choose from. BASIC is the easiest to learn and use but it's also one of the slowest – not much use for games. Assembly is the professional programmers' choice since it's the internal language used by your ST. Each language has its own advantages and aficionados. Here is the pick of the crop across several different fields.

BASIC is most popular programming language and unfairly maligned by those who haven't used modern versions. Its advantages are its friendliness to the first time user, its interactivity and its forgiving nature with errors. Super modern versions of BASIC can be very good – often having compilers and structures like procedures borrowed from 'better' languages. BASIC is a good all-rounder.

The second most popular language, C, claims to offer near machine-code speed without the complexity of low-level programming. C can be a little hard to understand at first, as its source code is not as self-explanatory as more verbose languages. The structure of the language, though, enables you to do almost anything you like with the machine. Obscure bugs can produce the strangest effects in C programs.

Pascal produces very readable source programs; it also majors on rigid constraints to make you write 'good' code. Pascal is only available as a compiler and is good if you like a language to check what you're doing. It is happy to throw up all kinds of error messages during compilation to let you know of syntax and program errors before you get near to running the code. Pascal is particularly good for writing long programs, as its imposed structure makes the source code maintainable. Its string handling is not as advanced as BASIC's, nor is its machine access as good as C's.

Assembler – because compilers generate machine code by set formulas, high-level language programs are rarely as fast as if you write them directly in Assembler yourself. Assembler is hard to write because it takes you 10,000 lines to do what 1,000 lines of C would do, and any mistakes usually cause an instant machine crash! If you need really fast code, most languages let you write the critical routine in assembler and leave the rest in C or whatever.

PROGRAMMING IN C

This is one of few C interpreters which actually assumes you know little about programming in C. The software is aimed specifically at BASIC programmers who are looking to move up to C.

This is an excellent interpreter for the newcomer, enabling you to carefully watch your code using trace options so that you can see exactly where it went wrong and why. There's even the ability to dump each line of code to the printer once it's been executed. On top of this, it checks all point assignments and trap exceptions to avoid any crashes. The interpreter is supplied with a 470-function library of commands and is a very close implementation of the ANSI standard.

Hisoft also includes a 250 page manual to lead you into the complexities of programming in C. If that's not enough, there's an on-line help feature which displays text files to guide you through the harder operations.

Devpac ST is a fast assembly language development system. It includes all the various parts necessary for developing machine code programs, including a macro assembler, editor and linker. Features may be accessed by using conventional menus or by key shortcuts.

The debugger, which is accessed via the editor, enables you to examine programs and memory, exe-

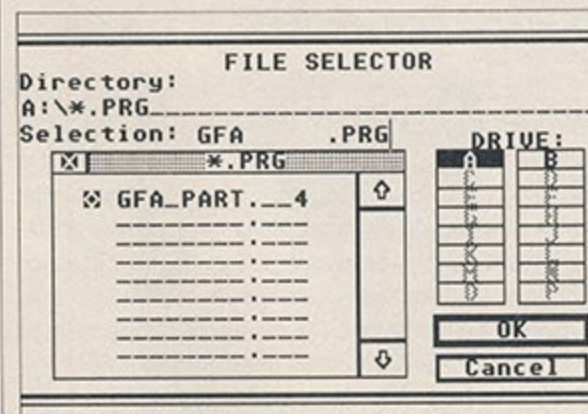


cute instructions one at a time and trap processor exceptions. Although the debugger is of the low-level variety, displaying such things as 68000 instructions and bytes of memory, it can be used for debugging programs written with any compiler that generates machine code. If the compiler or assembler has the option to dump the symbols into the binary code, then you see procedure and function names with the code. You're even able to view your original source code. For really huge programs, symbolic debugging is a luxury.

Fast assembly speed, powerful directives for optimising code, extensive conditional assembly options, symbolic debugging... Devpac 2 has it all plus a lot more. It is packed with features and has all machine code program developers could want.

• GFA's work environment: editing, bug-fixing and execution can all be done from the same place. The editor (in action) checks syntax and formats the program lines.

After seeing Computer Concept's Fast BASIC, Glentop responded by importing GFA BASIC from the land that produced 'Vorsprung durch Technik'. Updated versions have been drifting in ever since and version 3 is much more than a slight improvement with greater speed, more commands, bigger and better manual and an enhanced editor.

GFA is crammed with powerful instructions that often replace groups of commands from other dialects of BASIC. For instance, GET and PUT enable software sprites to be manipulated effortlessly, POLYLINE and POLYFILL help you draw pattern-filled shapes quickly, menu bars and windows can be set up and interrogated with OPENW and ON MENU GOSUB.

Traditionally, speed – or lack of it – has been the reason for programmers choosing languages other than BASIC to create games and business utilities. GFA gives the lie to this for many operations, as it is faster than a good few compiled high-level languages. GFA's wealth of variable types (boolean, byte, word, integer, float and string), memory management and sophisticated instructions make sure that it is always one of the fastest programming languages around.

PASCAL

Prospero Pascal • Prospero • £99.99 • 081-741 8531 • All STs

There are very few Pascal compilers on the ST, but this is one of the better ones. Prospero's programming shell comes with its own text editor which is particularly easy to get to grips with.

Contained in the program is Prolib – a librarian utility used to manage object files. New files are formed by combining old ones and useful information about files is extracted. A handy cross-reference utility is supplied as part of the deal and this lists where variables are used in the code. A symbolic debugging tool is also available and this enables you to track programs and look at the contents of memory.

The compiler is excellent and can be set to accept standard Pascal only if you're using it for coursework. There are extensive enhancements to the Pascal language which make it easier to use. The compiler library has bindings so that you can access the ST's internals. The compiler comes with a good library of bindings. The manual is disorganised and badly laid out, but there are two excellent manuals devoted to GEM which go a long way towards making up for them. With an integrated editor, this is the best Pascal package on the market. ■

The StyleWriter cannot be networked – it may only be connected to one Mac at a time. And unfortunately it cannot print in 'background' mode – other Apple printers have been able to print while the user does something else on the machine, whereas the StyleWriter holds up other tasks until output is complete. However, most Mac users will happily live with this small inconvenience in return for the quality the machine produces; especially when the price is taken into consideration.

MAC PRINTER OPTIONS

Until now, owners of Macs who wanted a reasonable-priced printer had two options: either go for the ImageWriter II, a 9-pin dot matrix not exactly beloved by many of its owners, or buy a third-party printer. The problem with going for the second option was that many printer manufacturers did not provide driver software for the Mac, so owners were stuck with public domain solutions, which were often full of bugs or did not use the printer to its full potential.

With the release of its two new printers, though, Apple has solved the problem. People who were considering purchasing a dot-matrix printer will be just as happy – or happier – with the StyleWriter. It costs about the same as a 24-pin dot-matrix, provides quality at

least as good and has the advantage that it is an official Apple product, so upgrades to things like the System software are guaranteed to work with it. On the other hand, anyone considering connecting a third-party laser printer to their Mac would do well to look seriously at the Personal LaserWriter LS. Again it has the advantage of being an official Apple product, and at a £920 you would be hard pressed to find a cheaper laser printer of similar quality (or, indeed, at all!).

Apple says that it will not discontinue the ImageWriter II, since some people need a dot matrix printer for printing multi-part stationery. The Personal LaserWriter SC, on the other hand, is likely to be discontinued in the near future as it offers no benefits over the Personal LaserWriter LS. ■

POSTSCRIPT AND TRUETYPE:

Fonts come in two sorts: bitmapped and outline. A bitmapped font is stored inside the computer as a series of discrete points which make up each character. So when a character is increased in size, all that happens is that the points are scaled up, resulting in a 'jagged'-looking character.

Outline fonts, on the other hand, are stored as mathematical descriptions of the curves and lines which make up a character's shape. So when increased in size, outline fonts do not exhibit the jaggedness of bitmaps; they are always sharp.

Until TrueType came along, the standard outline font format was known as PostScript. For high-

quality fonts on the Mac, PostScript was the only option; which meant that its inventors, Adobe, could license the technology for large sums of money. One of the most lucrative licensing deals was for the PostScript interpreter inside printers which converted the mathematical description of characters, graphics and so on into the final dots which make up the printed page. Although some clone interpreters appeared, many printer manufacturers – Apple included – preferred to use the official Adobe version, paying the company hundreds of pounds for each printer sold.

Partly for this reason, Apple decided to create its own outline

font format, known as TrueType. Along the way, the company has been joined by a number of others, including Microsoft, which will be including the ability to display TrueType fonts in version 3.1 of the IBM-PC user interface Windows.

At present, the vast majority of fonts available for the Mac are PostScript, but most font manufacturers such as Bitstream, Monotype and Linotype have said that they will be adapting their fonts to TrueType format. In fact, Bitstream has committed to converting the whole of its library; the Times and Helvetica fonts which come with the new printers have been designed by the company.

THE BEST SYSTEM?

A Macintosh Classic combined with a StyleWriter now costs around £1,005 for the single floppy machine, £1,375 for the 40Mb hard drive option. This makes it a viable proposition as a starter machine both for small businesses and for those who'd previously have had an IBM PC-compatible and printer for home use.

As a comparison, we specified and costed out two systems: a Mac Classic with StyleWriter and a PC-AT with a dot-matrix printer.

To get the same type of performance from a dot-matrix printer as from the StyleWriter, a 24-pin machine would be needed; a trawl through a recent copy of *Express* came up with an average price of around £255 for a 24-bit printer from 'box shifters'. Then add the cost of an 80286 PC (some would say that a fairer comparison would be an 80386); again, a flip through the magazine came up with a rough average of about £980 (with a mono monitor and a hard disk). Throw Windows 3 in with that and your set up will set you back somewhere in the region of £1,300 – almost the same as for the Mac system.

Software, it is true, tends to cost slightly more for the Mac than for PCs, but there are some excellent public domain and shareware packages available; the chances are that you will be able to find everything you need for less than £100 in shareware fees – this figure will be roughly the same for either the Mac or the PC.

So, you could either have a PC with a 24-pin dot matrix printer or a Mac Classic with a StyleWriter, for almost identical costs. Now who says that the Mac is overpriced...?

For those who are convinced that the Mac's not for them, there are a number of options available to owners of other computers. For starters, have a look at these:

● Canon BJ10e/BJ130e. The BJ10e costs £397, while the BJ130e, which is larger, faster and has a longer quoted lifetime, costs £915.

● Epson SQ850/SQ2250. The SQ850 is an 80-column machine which costs £885. The 132-column SQ2250 sells for £1,150.

● Hewlett-Packard Deskjet. This is a 300dpi machine, which sells for £690.

Remember that the prices quoted are recommended retail prices; you will probably be able to get the printers for less if you shop around.

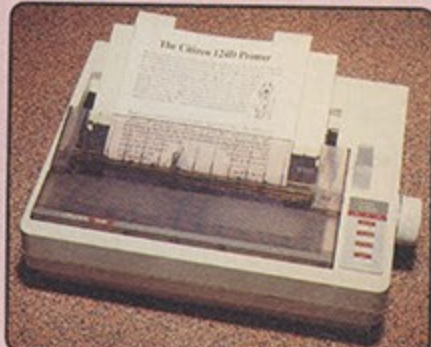

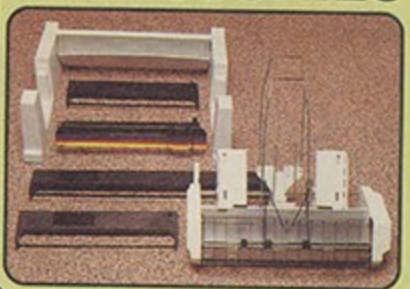
