he booze was flowing and the smiles were frequent at the Games' BAFTAs this year, and especially so on the Nintendo table. It's been one of the best ever years for Nintendo games and the ceremony, at which 350 members of the UK gaming industry were gathered, recognised that fact by awarding Advance Wars 2: Black Hole Rising on the Game Boy Advance the BAFTA award for Best Strategy Game and also for Best Game Boy Advance Game.

The BAFTAs seem to confirm what we here at Advance Magazine have been saying all along: Advance Wars 2 is genius in design and execution. If there's a Game Boy game that no one can afford to be without, then this is it. Advance Wars 2 has shattered our expectations by being even better than the original. But it wasn't just the brilliance of the Game Boy format that was recognised at the event, there was also an award for Gamecube's Mivamoto classic The Legend Of Zelda: The Wind Waker, which received a BAFTA for Best Adventure Game. Perhaps even more exciting still was that the multiaward-winning and critically acclaimed Metroid Prime received a BAFTA for Best Gamecube Game

It's safe to say that 2003 was a brilliant year for Nintendo, who's managed to launch some unbelievably fantastic software for both the Game Boy Advance and its bigger static console brother, the Gamecube. In total Nintendo scooped an impressive 14 awards for its 2003 year of gaming and added a further four BAFTAs to its collection.

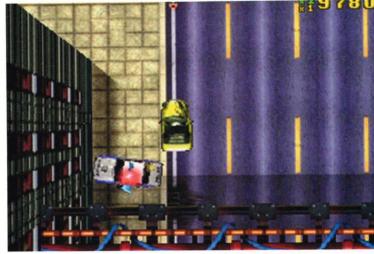
ay back when the Game Boy Colour came out there was a version of GTA, the long running and enormously popular game of criminal activity, based on the top-down version of the game that originally made GTA so famous. Ultra-famous developer Rockstar has declined to comment so far, playing its cards close to its collective chest. But we learned this month that GTA has been in development for GBA, whether it will ever make it to completion and onto your GBA at home is unclear. Some rumours have it that the game will never see the light of day, having been cancelled before its

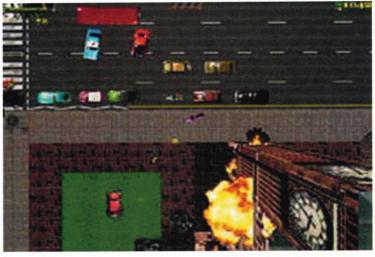
We talked to John Walker, writer and veteran games journalist about how GTA would make an ideal game for the GBA: "The GBA has proven itself as a serious gaming platform

with superb titles such as Advance Wars, Mario & Luigi and Final Fantasy Tactics," said Walker. "Now it's time for the GBA to prove itself as a serious gaming platform for grown ups. With the proven capabilities of dozens of games, the machine is more than capable of presenting a living city in which to recreate the GTA atmosphere."

With the 3D capabilities of various games would it be possible for Rockstar to develop a version of GTA that harked to the recent versions of games such as Vice City? If so, we'd like to see it and not just a game made by someone wanting to cash-in on GTA's enormous success. Watch this space.

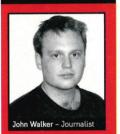


The top-down classic looks like a fine candidate for GBA conversion.

Hello there, in this tiny corner of our magazine we look at some of the news and rumours that are flying about regarding Nintendo games, hardware and events.

First up is the news that Nintendo is investing in wireless technology for Pokémon titles. What does this mean? Well it seems that in forthcoming Pokémon games, the carts will have a little gizmo that allows you to connect to nearby fellow cart owners and play as if you were linked up. The potential for this is very interesting, as pointed out on the Pokémon website pokemon.com.jp, where people have already declared that certain carriages on trains should be 'Pokémon zones' where, equipped with wireless adaptors, GBA owners would simply be able to sit down and play their fellow Pokémon fans. This seems to be a nod towards the wireless technology that might well appear on the DS console (see page 14 for more on that incredible story).

The second interesting tidbit this month is that the BBC's Fightbox game is coming out on GBA. Can it be better than the other Fightbox games that have appeared on other formats? We hope so, since the TV to game crossover really doesn't seem to have worked that well. We will certainly have more on this the rest of the latest developments in future GBA technology next month.

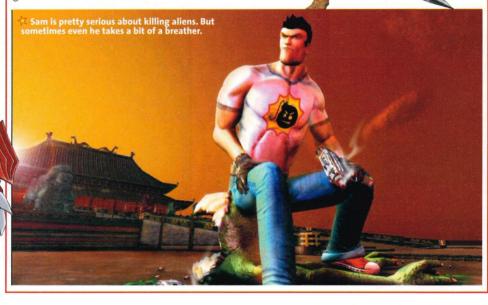

Created by the seriously loony Croatian software development house Croteam, Serious Sam is a square-jawed, muscle-bound hero who's only true love is for guns bigger than himself.

The previous Serious Sam games on formats such as the PC have seen some of the most original and inventive monsters of all time, and Sam has battled wave after wave of freaks with a preposterous array of weaponry. Like its PC counterpart the GBA version will be a Doom-style first person shooter, in which you can expect to battle hordes of nasties.

Within the confines of the game, Sam will be visiting numerous places in a battle to rid the world of alien scum. Ancient Egypt and Rome are just two locations which have been confirmed so far. Needless to say there will also be ceaseless frenetic action, new monsters galore, and a load of neverbefore-seen bosses to keep the action on a knife edge.

Best of all Take 2 has told us that the game will feature deathmatch that can accommodate up four-players, where gamers can battle each other with huge weapons, all linked via the use of the Game Boy Advance Game Link Cable. We don't often get this excited about a game, but this time it's Serious.

No other details have been confirmed as yet, but since all the other versions of the game, which have appeared on static consoles, have been focused around multi-player games, there is sure to be some kind of link up option. Expect to see more on this eagerly anticipated game, next issue.

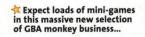

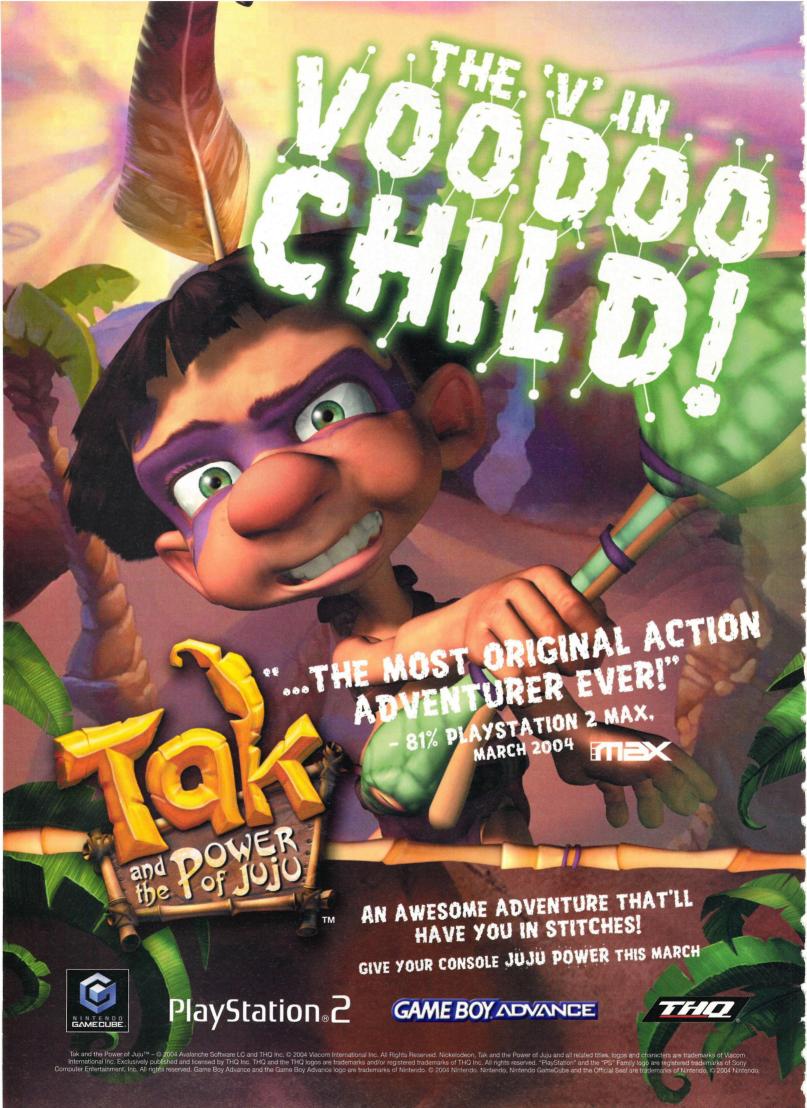

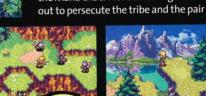

ews and mixed views are currently flying around the world of gaming: Nintendo is going to release a brand new handheld console this year – working title Game Boy DS – and the leaked specs on the internet reveal it to be a peculiar beast indeed.

As you'll notice from the mock-ups that litter this page, it's been revealed that Nintendo is working on a machine with two screens. Sounds weird? Well yes, we think it is, and so do many developers in the games industry, who really want there to be one really good screen to work with, rather than the bizarre challenge of

having to cope with two. Word on the web also indicates that there will be two processors, one for each screen, which will make creating the games even more complicated, then again, Nintendo is notorious for being one step ahead of the rest of the gaming world, so could this be a revolution waiting to happen? It could be that in a few year's time all games will be made this way. We just can't tell.

Another rumour that has filtered through to our office about the console is that it will have a wireless networking capability. This means that you won't need a link cable to play against your friends, you'll just need to be in the same room. We'd like to see this kind of innovation, since it would fit with the recent tradition of making GBA titles brilliant to play with friends.

And finally there's a whisper that it might incorporate a digital camera. There's no concrete evidence to suggest this, but we wouldn't be surprised.

PlayStation developer Sony is also making a handheld this year, which will be the first significant challenge to the Game Boy in many years. It will be very interesting to see how the two new devices fare against one another. We'll have all the latest news as it happens.

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SHINING FORCE: RESURRECTION OF THE DARK DRAGON

Classic 16-bit fantasy strategy lives again on GBA! But will it capture our hearts, or prove to be a drag(on)? Sorry...

rolific publisher THQ has confirmed that it will be publishing Shining Force:
Resurrection Of The Dark
Dragon for the GBA. As those of us who encountered this superb series during the heady days of the Sega Saturn already know, this is a reason for GBA owners to be very pleased indeed.

It was a quality game all those years ago and, if re-imagined classics like *Sabre Wulf* are anything to go by then this

should be a phenomenally entertaining title. A top-down RPG of epic scale and cute cartoon illustration, *Shining Force* is set to be a fun-packed experience.

Resurrection Of The Dark Dragon is the latest incarnation of the popular franchise that dates all the back to the early nineties, with the first game coming out in 1992. This new Shining Force takes the tried and tested formula of a strategic RPG battle game, but also boasts several improved features to distinguish it from

previous versions. Not least the graphics, which have been mightily buffed up (as much as that's possible on a GBA game with cartoon graphics, anyway).

The characters – three of which are totally new to the series – will support loads of new animations. And we can tell you that all the original characters will be included and players can expect to see the same selection of fantasy fellows out of an armoury of over thirty different fighting types. Not only that but working

on this title is the same development company that made the original games, which means that we can expect a good level of quality. We're hoping that it'll be a healthy return to the good old days, when Shining Force was a game that stood out from a mediocre crowd.

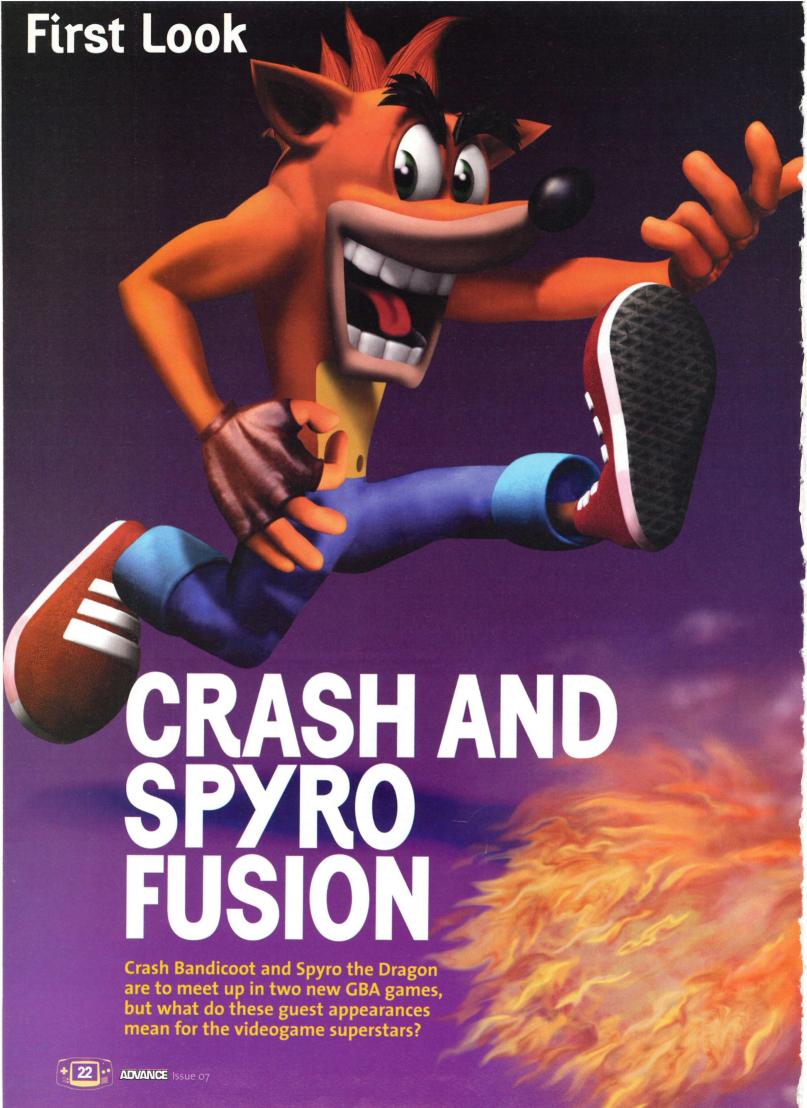
The combat system in Resurrection Of The Dark Dragon is going to be only slightly modified from the original, to refine and hone what the original game achieved. But it's also using the same

characters and themes in an attempt to recapture the original charm, while still giving the turn-based game a new tactical edge. We've been told that the game will employ a 'Unique Card System' that should give the game a new improved dynamic, finely balanced for maximum satisfaction. Not too hard, not too easy.

This is a vast quest in which your lead character must regain his lost memories and defeat the armies of enemies that await him and his selection of buddies.

Having played an unfinished early version of the game we can report that it really does look promising, and might well fill the gap left in our gaming diets by recent, rather lightweight adventure RPGs. We're hoping it all comes together for next month's release.









wo of the world's favourite platform game characters are teaming up to entertain us in their combined worlds of videogame goodness. Yes, Crash Bandicoot and Spyro the Dragon will get together to create one of the best meeting of talents since Ant and Dec. And it will be the Game Boy Advance that hosts the meeting of the two item-collecting, boss-fighting platform minds.

Gamers will also be happy to learn that there won't be just one game, Vivendi is planning to release two carts: Crash Bandicoot: Fusion and Spyro Fusion. The first will star the wompa fruit-loving Australian marsupial, with a guest appearance from the purple fire breather, while the other game features Spyro, with the little Bandicoot crashing the party.

These two new games are action-platform beasts with loads of sub-games, a formula which is almost certain to prove

massively successful when combined with the GBA and the previous success of these two massively popular gaming heroes.

"So why have Crash and Spyro come together?" you may ask. Well as is often the case, sinister goings on are behind things. The story goes that Crash and Spyro's arch-enemies, the evil Neo Cortex and the abominable Ripto respectively, somehow accidentally met up in the underground portals of the gaming world and subsequently plotted to trick our heroes into destroying each another, while they go forth and take over the universe together. Of course Crash and Spyro don't fall for this dastardly trap, and once their misunderstanding has been ironed out, they're soon using their combined powers to defeat their enemies.

Of course, given the enormous, nefarious talents of the two evil-doers, Crash and Spyro are going to have to overcome a huge array of new tricks and traps that the evil duo has devised for them. There are hoards of new enemies, loads of new game types and an array of new places to visit, meaning that these new Fusion games might well be some of the most exciting new releases on the GBA. And if you were wondering what the worlds will look like, New York-based developer, Vicarious Visions has said they will be a merger of both stars' previous game worlds, and familiar characters from Spyro and Crash games will mingle and interweave their stories in these new games.

All this means that there's bags of entertainment lying in wait for you and your GBA owning friends, especially since there is also going to be the additional challenge of a unique multiplayer mode, which we'll come to in a bit.

Both the Fusion titles are 2D side-scrolling action games that still have to maintain the standard of quality set by their 3D predecessors on the static consoles. Spyro has moved to an isometric view on the GBA and in Fusion he'll be seen from many angles in the various mini-games, and the same goes for Crash. Because the main story modes are side-scrolling, so the moves and abilities of both Crash and Spyro have been somewhat simplified, the selection of extra mini games, should, however, keep players busy.

We're pretty confident that it should be very polished game too, since its developer, Vicarious Visions, has also worked on the GBA versions of the Tony Hawk's Pro Skater series, Spongebob Squarepants, Finding Nemo, and Spider-Man to name just a few. (Check out www.vvisions.com for more info on this prolific GBA development team.)

The Fur and The Fire

As we said before, there are going to be scores of new minigames to entertain you, with lots of different puzzles to decipher and action sequences to play your way through. There will be button-bashing tests, where speedy fingers are the most important asset, top-down scrolling games will be included to test your reactions, while timed bonus levels and lots of tricky boss battles will challenge and amuse. This 'many games in one approach is reminiscent of the superb Warioware as well as other 'party' style games - experiences that focus on super fast

gameplay with lots of quick challenges. Obviously the Spyro and Crash games are also based on the characters from the previous games, and have the benefit of all the work that's been done on their art and animation – not to mention the storyline that sets the scene for all the gaming shenanigans.

Players will also be able to enjoy collecting 'trading cards' by doing well through out the game. Get full marks in various sections and you'll open up hidden games, levels and even secret trading cards. For those gamers whose friends buy the Fusion games and who own a link cable, there's a selection of multiplayer games to indulge in, making both Crash and Spyro titles party games for those GBA owners who love to game with friends. The trading cards earned in the single-player game are integral to how this multi-player game is played.

The Big Link
So how does this link game work? Well, it's important to remember that in Crash's game Spyro is a character you can meet and who makes up an important part of the story and in Spyro's game Crash and his friends are characters he goes up against, before realising that they have to become friends to

> save the world once again. But both characters are also available to play in the multi-player section of both games.

There will be 13 different link games between the two new titles, most work with one cartridge and some with multiple

cartridges. The games are divided into three general categories, the first of which is 'Ballistix',

which was first seen in the Crash Bash game on the major consoles. These and the pong-type games, with many different variations in play and power-ups for the characters. Then there's 'Ship Shuffle' which sees two to four players piloting

hoverships across many different maps. Each ship shuffle game-type has a very different game goal, and you can expect to play games such as Tag, Hot Potato and Capture the Flag. Finally

there's the 'Bridge' game in which players try to knock each other off a bridge structure using various projectile weapons.

More exciting still is the possibility that players will also be able to swap the 'trading card' bonuses that they are able to pick up during single-player gameplay, so both players will benefit from their independent efforts in gaming. The trading cards will vary in rarity depending on the difficulty of the challenge undertaken to acquire them. Some cards tie into player abilities and characteristics, while others are components in the multi-player games. The developers of the new Crash and Spyro games suggest that players might like to play some competitive trading cards games, in which players wager their cards on a multi-player game, and the winner takes both cards.

The twin release of the Fusion games looks to be one of the biggest Game Boy Advance events of the year, and with the standards of GBA games getting better and better, there's going to be fierce competition for your attention. As a GBA owner there's never been a better time, so much choice of quality titles meaning that you'll be entertained for months. With so many brilliant Spyro and Crash games already making their mark on The GBA, we can't see how the Fusion games could fail. It's time to get excited.

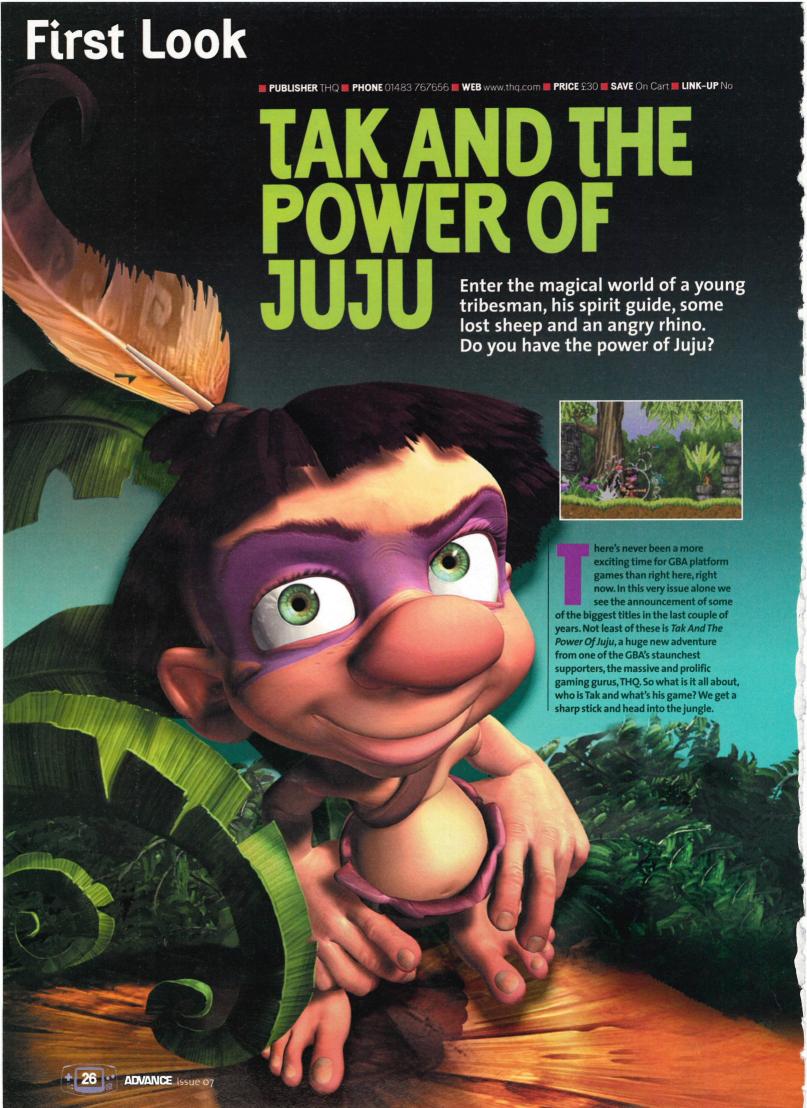

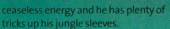

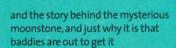

So, will you do Juju? We reckon that at east you'll want to find out what Tak uses his chicken suit for, won't you?





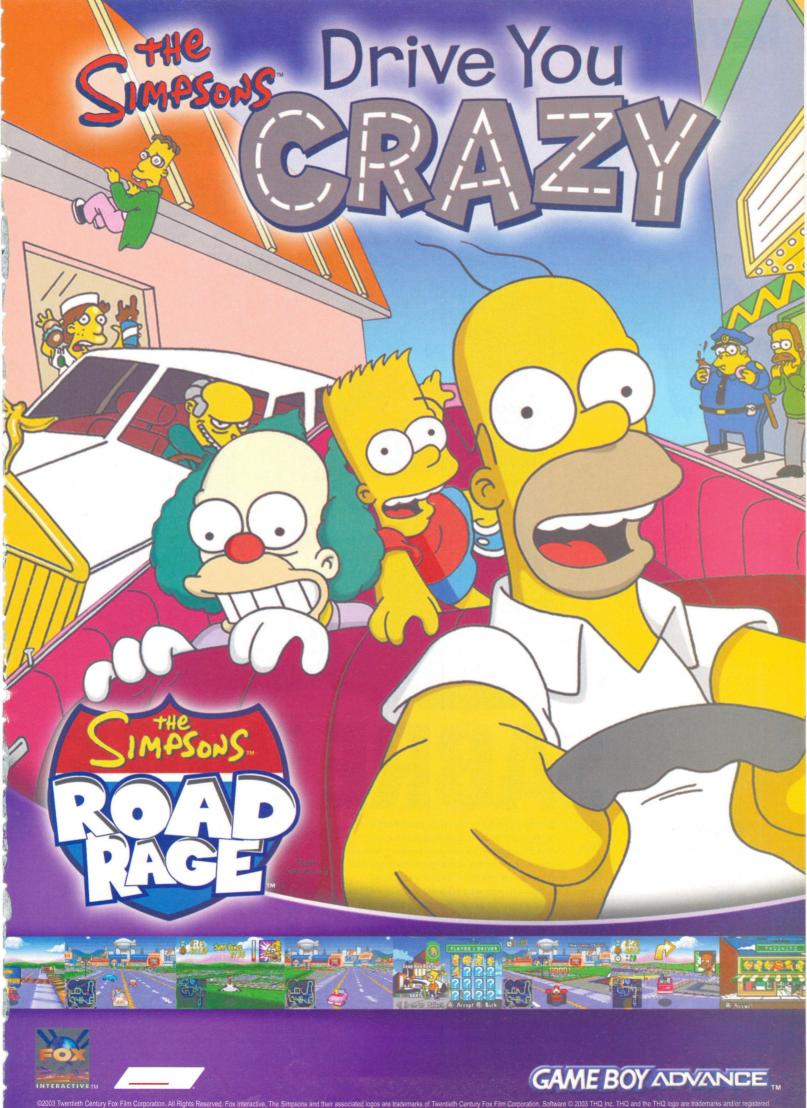

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or the older gamers in our office Sabre Wulf is a name that's remembered with great fondness. Back in they days when computers were powered by steam-engines, this was a game character that won the hearts and minds of many budding gamers. Rare, the developer who invented the blue Wulf (as well as dozens of awesome games over the years) is back once again to resurrect its ancient character and bring us one of the most addictive and well constructed puzzleadventure hybrids on the GBA.

The scene is set with the return of Sabre Wulf to the lands that surround the village of Blackwyche. The amulet that imprisoned the magical Wulf has been smashed by some evil villain, and as is common in the land of puzzlers, the pieces have been scattered throughout the land. Now released, the Wulf is running amok, stealing valuable items across the land, and generally terrorising the population.



On each of the 'lairs' you start out at this camp before head off to meet the many tricky challenges that await you.

A TYPICAL LAIR

Okay, okay – there's really no such thing as a typical Sabre Wulf lair, but we can show you some of the things that will impede your progress as you guide Sabreman on his way. These come in many forms, some are just an inconvenience, but others can be deadly. You're racing against the clock, so things can get tough.

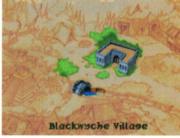

It's the lairs of the blue Wulf that make up the greatest number of the challenges in Sabre Wulf, although there are many different mini-challenges and sub-games along the way, too. As Sabreman makes his way around the maps he'll discover portals that descend into the earth which are topped by a statue of the Wulf himself. On going down into each of these, Sabreman is presented with a side-scrolling series of platform puzzles. These levels are filled with obstacles and weird creatures which the feisty explorer must overcome. To do this, he must use the animals in his inventory. For example he might use a Clubber to clear the path of 'blocker' creatures, or a Boomer (a kind of exploding monkey) to clear a path of bombs. There are loads of different creatures for Sabreman to use, from the Blubber,

which allows him to leap high, to the Sucker which, well, sucks. As Sabreman completes the puzzles, he gets closer to Wulf at the end of the lair, where he must finally grab the treasure and run back to his tent (the exit of the level) while the Wulf chases him. As he does this all the animals on the level are destroyed by Sabre Wulf's howl and they turn into coins, which Sabreman must collect as he travels through the level

Uniquely, this treasure decays with time, from gold to silver and then to bronze. The faster Sabreman completes the level, the more likely he is to get the gold treasure. Not only is this worth more when traded in at the shop, it's also 'completes' the lair, allowing Sabreman to return to favourite lairs which can be tried in a challenge mode. Here he can try and get in and out in the fastest time, without being blocked in by the various monsters that were there on the initial run.

These 'lair' challenges are brilliantly judged. They start out enormously simplified, and follow a genuinely inspirational difficulty curve that means you're always feeling satisfied with that little bit extra you've achieved without it being too easy. The level design constantly produces new tricks

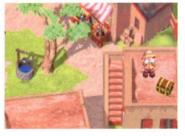

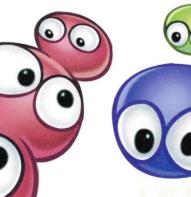

plinter Cell is regarded by many as the ultimate stealth game, and for its GBA incarnation, that's certainly the truth. It has a rival for stealth this month in form of James Bond: Everything Or Nothing, but the classic English spy has nothing on America's most incredible secret agent, who visits the GBA for a second time with ultimate in covert action.

Each of Splinter Cell's levels is a series of challenges for Agent Sam Fisher to overcome. These all involve infiltration in some way. Some are based on his ability to leap and crawl and climb better than any man alive, and various sections of the game will see you clambering over obstacles and guiding Sam as he dangles and clambers into buildings and over dangerous situations. Sam can pull himself up to climb with arms and legs to secrete himself through the smallest gaps. 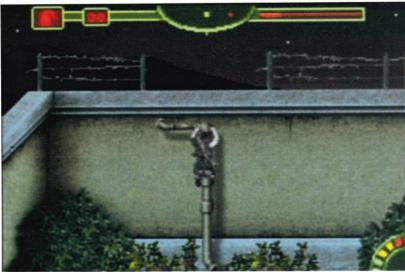

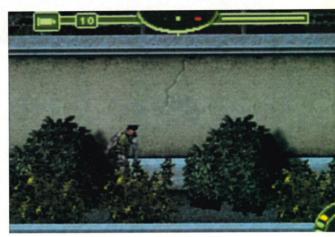

with him getting past guards by ducking behind cover, or crouching and crawling under various bits of the scenery. Almost everything you see onscreen can be used to conceal Sam to some extent and while he's behind a bush or a curtain, enemies will have no idea he's there.

This is a game that relies on you keeping Sam out of sight. So whenever possible you'll resort to sneakiness. But Sam isn't all about hide and seek – he can also deliver some damage. Ideally you'll avoid killing, and sneaking up on your enemies to grab them from behind and knock them out. Even if you're spotted, there's also a chance that you'll be able to knock out your opponent in a brief fistfight, but Sam will take damage like this, so you'll want to limit the number of times when surprise isn't on your side. Many levels will insist that you allow there to be no casualties – it's either

politically bad for your bosses, or the people on the level are essentially innocent people, so you'll have to get good at knocking out the miscreants who get in your way.

But occasionally the gloves come off and you'll then able bring out your rifle: this means you'll be able to kill enemies from some distance, but you'll want to be careful about who can see the body when they fall. In all situations you're able to grab bodies and drag them, helping you to move them in case they are discovered by patrolling guards. As you progress through the game you'll come up against all kinds of tricky challenges to tax your brain. Getting past numerous solitary guards might be easy enough, but what will you do when you're faced with a patrolling guard and a security camera? The solution is tricky indeed. However, there are lots of tools at your disposal, including a flash-bang grenade which will stun guards for long enough for you to get past and also the 'zoom' function which allows you to move the

camera away from Sam himself and check out what else lies ahead of you . He's even equipped with night vision and infrared goggles for those tricky night time missions.

Splinter Cell has made the conversion to GBA look easy, and anyone who's played the 3D version on a static console will be amazed at how well the game's made the transition to a 2D handheld title. This is the kind of game that takes the essence of the idea and takes it back to raw essentials. Meaning that this is a near-essential GBA game, although it's just as tricky as the more complex console versions and many people will find their patience taxed by having to struggle through the same levels again and again. 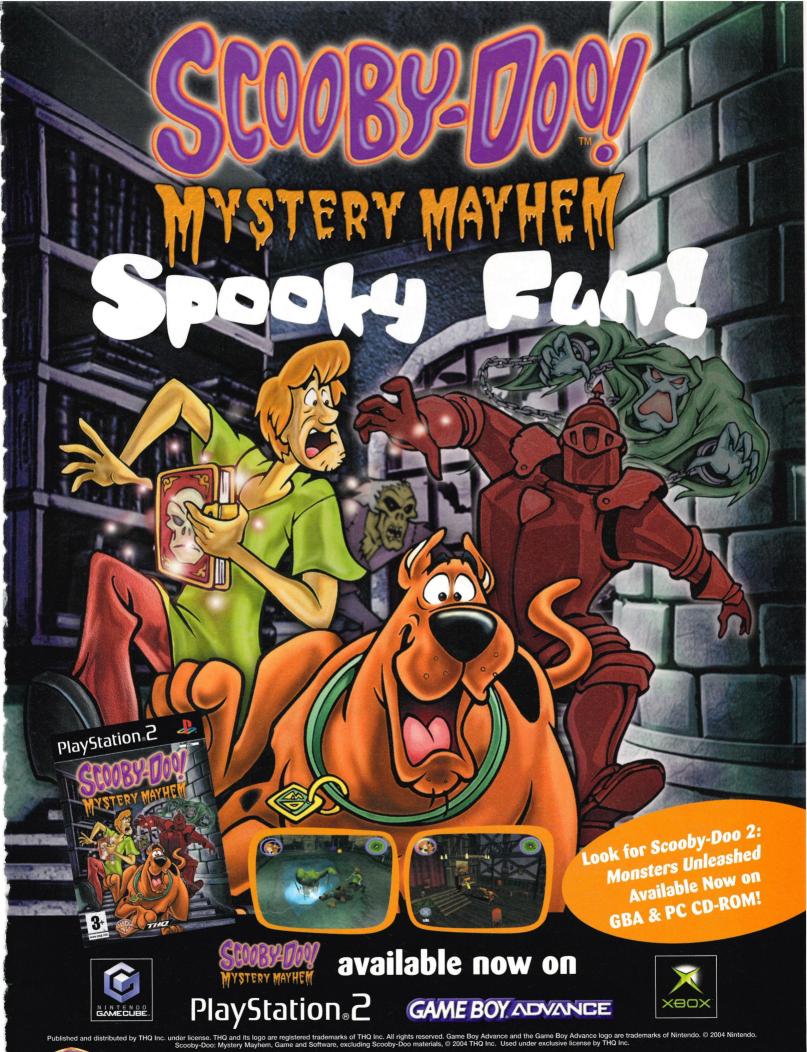

onic isn't all about zooming around collecting coins, not these days anyway. The famous blue hedgehog is moving into newer territories this month, with the arrival of a whole new career for the speedy hog and his collection of colourful acquaintances: that of a martial arts expert.

Sonic Battle is a story-based adventure, packed with fighting action. The game features all the major Sonic characters in an array of different environments where they must select their fighting moves and duke it out for victory.

In the challenge mode of the game you can choose to pitch all the various characters, from Knuckles the Echidna, to Shadow the (evil) Hedgehog to Sonic and Tails, the everpopular heroes of the high-speed Sonic adventures. The game is fairly simplistic, placing the combatants in a small arena where they can leap and flip and generally make use of their tight combination of special powers. What isn't simplistic is just how you go about utilising those powers and, indeed, how you collect them in the first instance.

You travel between areas through the map screen, where you can go and find new objectives to complete, while also learning how the story that is unfolding and finding out how it involves all the different characters that Sonic and his robo-buddy will end up fighting.

The robot must learn the ways of fighting from scratch, and it's up to you to guide him through the game, reward him with power-ups and enable him to gather special moves that will allow him to defeat the multitude of enemies that he will face. Emerl must 'capture' moves from enemies, and is limited in the number of moves he can choose for a battle by the number of skill points he holds.

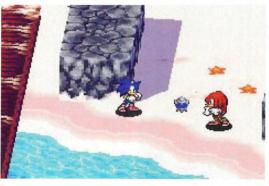

delivered then we'd no doubt have been slapping *Sonic Battle* on the back and praising it as one of the great GBA games of all time.

We have to admit that this is a good-looking, highly unusual addition to Sonic's range, and we won't be unhappy to see more titles like this in the future. It'll be a solid addition to any gamer's range, too, especially if you're going to buy it to play with friends via a link cable. There are a large number of mini-games to unlock and special moves can be traded in a 'card' system between your linked GBAs.

The most entertaining part of the game for us is the battle mode. If you can't be bothered with the far more involved action of the story mode you can simply leap in, choosing pairings of characters to fight in a quick session. This is really entertaining, with you able to leap straight into the action in various interesting maps, without having to slog your way through the story map and the dialogue screens that accompany it. If you have a link cable you'll be able to play each other, picking either a pair of characters if there are two of you, or taking a character each if you're playing with four people. This makes things a little more fun as real people are always a little bit more cunning and inventive than the in-game Al. In the single-player mode the characters are pretty good at using their moves, but they'll

never come up with interesting combinations or ever really surprise you with what they do. It's all too easy to predict what they're going to do and, of course, come up with some combat tactics to counter it. This game might be fast and furious, but it also demands a certain level of thought.

We can't however, genuinely recommend this as a musthave game. The robot is a fun character, but there are better 'raising and managing' games out there, and if it's the fighting you're interested in then Sonic Battle is likely to disappoint too: it just doesn't have enough clout to keep you interested. Nice try, Sega, but we need something a little better than this.

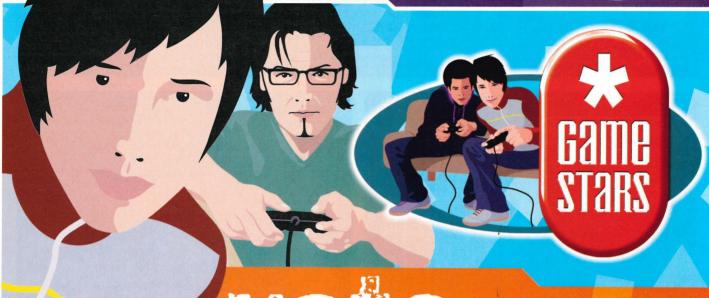

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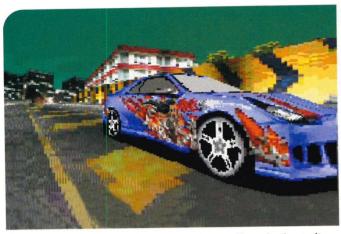




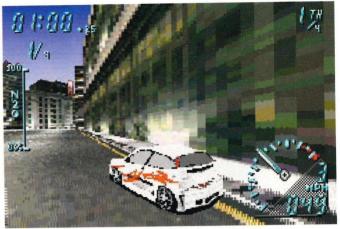

This is all about fast and furious street racing, and here you've got loads of cars and miles of tracks to play with. The 3D graphics can be a little blocky at times, even for the GBA, but there's such a huge wealth of options here that you're nevertheless won over. This is what the game is all about – giving you a sense of progression and a taste of achievement as you accelerate your way through half a dozen game modes and the ten or so tracks that each one boasts. Get your car kitted out and blow away the opposition for maximum satisfaction. The engines don't quite have that cool bass growl on the GBA, but then that's only to be expected.

It's the racing that makes all the difference though, and we can report that it's solid fun, and feels responsive and fast. Jet Set Radio looks smart, too. The rollerskaters themselves are built from pint-sized polygons, Tony Hawk's style, lending them a pleasing fluidity (especially when they're dancing for neo-Tokyo to celebrate the end of a mission). And the isometric overhead perspective gives you attractive, sizeable cities to roll around, which grow to reveal new areas, hidden short cuts and fresh obstacles to 'ollie' and 'abstract' off.

But with that perspective comes a problem. The three-quarters view is akin to those 'vase-becomes-two-faces' optical illusions, as your poor confused eyes try to figure out that a flat diagonal pathway is actually a 45-degree ramp, or that the rail you're trying to leap up to is about 50 metres above you. Add in a tricky rotational control scheme, and you can go through torture just trying to climb a staircase then turn right at the top. Give the truck-climb in level one a go—the phrase 'fell off the back of a lorry' could have been invented for it.

Variety, too, is limited in this game. To be fair, Jet Set Radio does start mixing things up a bit after the first few levels of graffiti'n' grinding. You get races against jive-talkin' challengers, tag games with rival gangs, and

Still, it's clear throughout Jet Set Radio that a lot of love's gone into its creation – just look at the addition of a fantastic design-your-own-graffiti mode. And once your overheated brain has stored enough of the map to compensate for that mind-meddling perspective, there's plenty to enjoy. With a good number of levels, fluid play, and a 'real phat attitude' as we're sure the kids say, Jet Set Radio is a welcome change from all that jackassing around on skateboards.

prowess, Max can struggle through the levels, munching pain killers as he goes, to ease the pain of his multiple injuries. Max collects loads of new weapons from his fallen enemies, so as the game progresses you're going to be increasingly heavily armed. Weapons range from a shiny glock, through to John Woo-styled twin pistols, sawn-off shotguns, double-barrelled shotguns, Uzis and assault rifles. **shotguns**, All this action takes place in a warren of moody environments, mafia pads, debauchery-filled villas and crumbling tower-blocks and there's even some destructible scenery, so that gunfights will smash windows and water coolers, smash doors and crates, and leave bullet scars across walls and pillars.

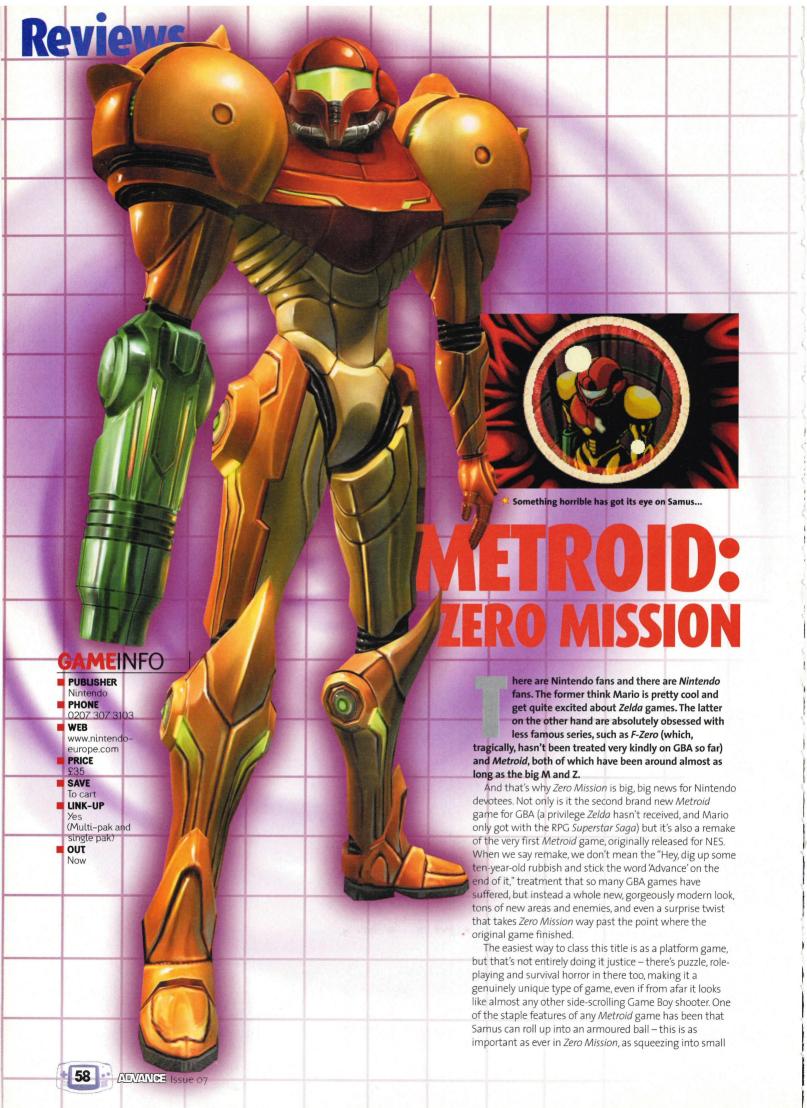

spaces and bombing your way through walls and floors is often essential to make it to the next area. all too often had you miserably searching every last inch of ground, trying to find the secret patch that would let you progress. Here, you're given more space to get used to Samus's many powers and more complicated manoeuvres, while passages are mainly reserved for secret items.

Unfortunately, it is a little too easy at times, especially the boss matches. The half dozen or so gigantic foes look absolutely awesome – anything up to ten times Samus's height, incredibly detailed and fearsome to behold. The trouble is that they can all be swiftly killed by waiting for the right moment and barraging them with missiles, one of the first power-ups you receive. Even the game's final boss can be dispatched with five or so well-placed shots. At least you'll never feel frustrated, something Fusion was often guilty of doing, but a little more challenge would have made a lot of difference – especially as Zero Mission only takes about four hours to complete.

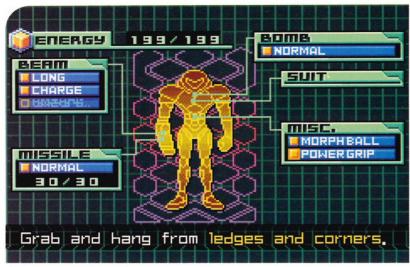

And, of course, being a heavily armoured bounty hunter firing missiles, laser beams and bombs all over the place is always good for a giggle.

In many ways, we're tempted to call this the best Metroid game ever (apart from Metroid Prime on Gamecube) its levels are very well-designed, it looks and sounds gorgeous, and it's insanely addictive. On top of that, the twist is incredible – the last section of Zero Mission is a completely different game from what's gone before; it's also the only genuinely difficult part, but in a very rewarding way. Annoyingly, we can't tell you how this is done, or we'd spoil the surprise, but trust us on this one. Although it is a shame that Zero Mission is so short and, for the most part, so easy. Despite that, it's a must-have GBA game, especially if you don't own Metroid Fusion already.

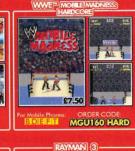

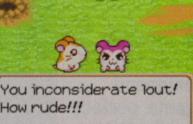
The core game is a top-down exploration-based mode, where you guide Hamtaro around various maps and help him to discover a selection of Ham-Speak, the secret codeword language of the hamsters. By learning the correct usage of all these words you increase the range of Hamtaro's abilities. He can do more and he can work more effectively with fellow hamsters with diverse Ham-Speak. As hamsters teach Hamtaro various words, he records them in his dictionary and is able to use them in the world.

But there's a bigger problem facing the little fluffy one: many of the Ham-Hams (as hamsters are known in his world) are really unhappy; heartbroken, in fact. The reason: a mischievous fellow named Spat has somehow caused a ruckus between the Ham-Hams and Hamtaro needs to sort it out as his quest progresses. Getting miserable couples back together will always yield some bonus and a way on to the next area of the game.

All this is tougher than it sounds though, as it is often fairly obscure as to what Ham-Speak to use in what

situation, or what is needed to solve a problem in a certain area. Lots of exploration and a great deal of trial-and-error experimentation will be required before Hamtaro will get anywhere. The words Hamtaro learns don't often make much sense, so it's easy for you to become confused, and therefore upset hamsters that are in the near vicinity. f we're completely honest, the genuine Disney titles (not including the Pixar related stuff like Finding Nemo) haven't been up to much recently. They've been pretty much the average to poor platformers that we're not particularly amused by. Previous games like the Magical Quest titles have been on a downhill run for the past few years. When we think back to the long lost days of Castle of Illusion it hits us that there really is something missing there. Disney should be able to produce great games based on their near endless catalogue of characters and settings. Perhaps it has something to do with the lack of decent Disney films in the last few years?

Either way we've no reasons to smile. So it is with some surprise that we must admit that, despite our dislike of the recent antics of Mickey and chums, this latest game is actually very good.

It's a straightforward platform game, where Donald or Mickey, depending on who you choose, will traverse the levels, collect the power ups and jump on the heads of the monsters that get in the way as the duo go about trying to save Huey, Duey and Louie. The duck cousins have been up to mischief again and have got themselves sucked into a magic book. Business as usual in Disneyland then.

This is a superbly balanced and designed game, ideal for the handheld format of the GBA. The challenges gradually ramp up in a perfectly judged difficulty curve. The levels are short and sweet, but always throw something new into the mix, whether it's a peculiar enemy, a moving platform, or a new boss. There are new skills to be unlocked and plenty of secrets to discover as the game unfolds. It is a very satisfying game to bash your way through, and while there's not much here that we haven't seen before, or even seen done better in previous GBA platform games, there is enough polish and Disney charm in here to make it a worthy purchase.

It's not the biggest game in the world and there's no link up option, but it's almost worth buying for posterity - it's not often that a really good Disney game arrives on GBA.

Probably the least useful stat. Choose speed freaks like YoYo and Beat only when there's Challenge Racing or Team Tagging to be done.

Crucial. The lower this stat, the faster and easier the tagging. So whether you're up against a tight time limit or need to work fast to avoid those pesky Assassins, choose riders like Tab or Garam.

Not shown in-game, but Tab's the highest at 30 cans.

KEEP YOUR COOL

Five all-purpose tips to victory.

1. Refill, refill, refill

Learn the locations of blue cans and strings of yellows, and return often.

2. Use the map

Not only to locate the tag points, but also to keep a beady eye on your enemy.

3. Grind

It's so much faster than walking (especially on staircases) and jumping along rails speeds you up.

4. Expert tagging

Master the smooth, slow rotate for the combos, and memorise each character's D-pad patterns.

5. Keep moving

Don't bother braking for the tag spots. If you press A as you sail past, you'll stop automatically.

Tags: 14

- Go can-collecting, then take care of the northeast side's seven tags.
- Northwest for a wall tag, then roll south and grind a big'U' around the building for four.
- Go southeast for the final two tags, and The Captain's frustrated again.



TRICK CHALLENGE!

Unlock Mew

Real showoffs should land in *exactly* the same spot as Mew after the helter-skelter. During task three, push down to avoid skidding right off the dish thing.



MONSTER OF KOGANE

Tags: 11

- A green-roofed hut just northeast of the staircase's top is your first job.
- Follow the roofs north for a fence tag, then make straight for the yard, that's top-left of the map for three tags.
- Roll south to the next 'row' of roofs, and reach two high tags by jumping off the northeast and southwest edges.
- Three ground level tags and the one near the start. Choppers? Ha!







TRICK CHALLENGE!

Unlock Garam

No need for flawless linkage or permanent acceleration as long as you touch everything Garam does. You'll need the brake on task two to avoid a soaking.

LOVE TRAP

Tags: 11

- Go east straight away for cans, then run the cops ragged by working clockwise around the ground level.
- Back to the playground for four tags (billboard, billboard, elephant, wall) avoiding The Captain.
- The SWATs are out of the picture because you're grinding an elephant up onto the roof and two big tags northeast.
- Grind the southwest-leading pipe and jump the gaps for tag 11.



GRAFITTI HIGH

Tags: 20

- Twin tags in the start area, then into the plaza (east, south).
- A long anticlockwise grind polishes off all seven outside tags, then the north wall is a two-trip job (so as to lead The Captain and co away halfway through).
- The south ramp leads to a northbound wire jump from there to tag 11.
- Back to the ramp and along the west wire to the old Benton Boogie map, with an added tag for following Mew's helter-skelter challenge route (stairs up are in the map's middle).



Tips



NO. 540

Tags: 11

- Stock up on cans, exit topleft, and tag either side of the hut.
- The west-end ramps lead you to a crane cab – drop southwest from here to find two tags on a hut roof.
- Now use all the east-end ramps for an anti-clockwise wall-tagging route right around the level; you'll need that wallgrind you learned for the high ones.

- Near the bottom of the southwest street is your first tag, then head up the nearby junction and off the right-hand rail for the second (billboard).
- Take the thin wire directly south and drop off north-east for another billboard, then fall east for a wall tag.
- The final spot is back up the east road check the map.

TRICK CHALLENGE!

Unlock Piranha

- Task 1: Jump off the fourth red gate and turn left slightly.
- Task 2: You can pause and regroup between each jump.
- Task 3: The secret is the little semicircular loop to gain speed and direction before the first leap.



BENTEN BURNING

Tags: 19

- Pick Combo for this. Lead the Assassins and Flame Squads away from graffiti spots, and grab red cans from the skyscraper peak.
- In the last area (from YoYo's race) the tags are all easy ground-level finds, except the last one which is just a grind up the northeast stairs.



FIGHT OR FLIGHT

Tags: 26

- Up the steps for the left bench tag, north for the high corner, then to the top-left for three in the yard. The rest should be taken while going back south.
- Into the sewers next grind the half-pipe edges for fast tagging and sniper avoidance.
- Up the northeast passage is a room with four tags and loads of red cans – the stairs are in the east corner. Exit west.
- The rest of the tags should be familiar finish with the two on that hut, and wallgrind off the red girder for no 26.

RACE CHALLENGE!

Unlock Slate

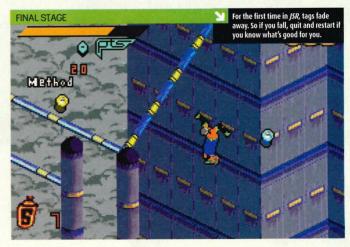
Ignore Slate's route. Grind the south rail to travel anti-clockwise around the level edge, jumping at the end of the green fence to skate for the north exit to No 540 world. Drop right to the bottom to grab a can from the inside area, then find the spray spot on the familiar hut roof back outside.



FINAL STAGE

Tags:7

- Tags fade here, so work fast, and use Combo for strength.
- Take the top left rail first and leap across to the northwest tag. Grind back down for the southwest spot.

he secret to unlocking the magic of Final Fantasy Tactics Advance is, rather obviously, to think like a tactician. It can be all too easy to get swamped and confused by the game's complex array of rules and options, so why not let us lend you a helping hand as we delve into one of the epic releases of last year. We'll kick off with some basic tips, and then we'll go on to explain the key game elements and why they're important to your game. After that, a step-by-step battle guide leads you all the way up to battle 20. That should help you find your feet! But there's much more to come in the hundreds of levels that follow - we can only point you in the right direction...



THE BASICS

To start with, take a look at the instruction manual if you're unfamiliar with the way the game works - all the jargon and basic controls are explained in great depth here. Also remember that an attack from the back of an enemy unit (clan member) has a greater likelihood of success than a frontal attack. Attacking from the side is good, but ideally, you want to creep up on your foes and really stick the knife in





HUMAN: Extremely common, humans are multi-skilled. Statistically, a sure-fire bet if you want to win a battle.

HUMAN JOBS: Soldier, Thief, White Mage, Black Mage, Hunter, Blue Mage, Archer, Illusionist, Fighter, Paladin, Ninja

VIERA: Rabbit-looking girl hunters who are agile and quick. They handle monsters well. No relation to the Arsenal midfielder, however.

VIERA JOBS: Archer, Fencer, White Mage, Summoner, Assasin, Sniper, Red Mage, Elementalist

MOOGLES: Moogles are a curious fairyhare hybrid.

MOOGLE JOBS: Thief, Black Mage, Time Mage, Animist, Gadgetter, Mog knight, Gunner, Juggler.

NU MOU: The long-eared, tailed Nu Mous are masters of magic

NU MOU JOBS: Beastmaster, Morpher, mist, Sage, White Mage, Black Mage, Illusionist, Time Mage.

BANGAA: These reptilian, lizard-like fellows are hard. The strongest race of all, they're indispensable in difficult engagements.

BANGAA JOBS: White Monk, Warrior, Gladiator, Defender, Templar, Bishop, Dragoon.



The completion of some levels will give you a new team member. Whether you welcome the new clan member is up to you. However, if you choose to wave goodbye to the offer of reinforcements. it's goodbye forever to the prospective buddy. The best strategy is to gather duplicates of units only if he/she has a good job, and otherwise forget the weaker ones. Your clan complement reaches a maximum at 24 members, so there's plenty of time to build your roster.

Laws

In short: don't flout the rules. If you get yellow or red carded, you're going to end up in the slammer, which lets the whole side down and causes you to miss opportunities to improve your clan. Keep checking the laws prior to battles.

Rumours

It pays to read the rumours when you enter pubs. Given time (remember the adventure lasts hundreds of days) new rumours will circulate, just like in real life. Pay attention to these. FFTA rewards patience and careful thought.

Shops

Make sure that the clan member you are buying the item for can equip it and make use of its abilities! Don't blow a load of Gil (Ivalice's currency) on too much equipment. Keep some spare in case of emergency.

Experience Points (EXP)

Each time you strike a baddy, you'll gain a certain number of experience points. Basically, you get more experience points if you execute an action on a character on a higher level. Pick on higher level characters and you get 2 EXP for every level higher than you. You'll go up a level for every 100 EXP you earn, which leads us onto Levelling Up.

Levelling Up

Levelling up increases all of your characters' statistics. Levelling up is crucial to the progression in the game. The maximum limit for gaining player levels is 50.

There is a useful trick to levelling up. Go to the shop and buy 99 potions. This'll use up about 4,000 Gil. Then get into a clan battle. Use a potion on yourself every turn. It will prevent you from dying during the engagement, and you get 10 EXP each time. Using this method it's possible to earn a fair few levels per battle.

To easily level up a White Mage, move him next to two or more party members and use Cure. You will gain anything from 12 to 24 EXP. Your White Mages have just become stronger.

MISSION STRATEGY

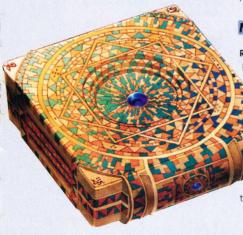
Remember: After each mission, go to the pub to get the next one.

> Regular saves: It's essential to save regularly, even before you've begun. Buy first, then accept the first mission, 'Herb Picking'. When you see the map again, press Start, go down to system, and save

Also: Save after each battle to avoid the irritation of repeat plays.

Mission order: Below is the chronological order of the missions in FFTA. What you do between these missions is up to you. This guide should provide you with the welly you require to make inroads into this vast game It's a daunting prospect for the most hardened gamer, as there are, in fact, 300 regular missions!

Rewards: In addition to those. missions there are side missions which are profitable enterprise earning you Gil, new clan members and overall clan experience. It's a good idea to do these as it will help raise your levels. Be aware though, that high-reward missions come with high risk, especially if your clan isn't up the mission quite yet. Keep checking what new skills you've learned and buy extra equipment with your battle victory pay. Then, between battles and shopping for new kit, you should make your way back to the pub (to rest up, probably with a nice, effervescent soft drink). Let the battles commence!

THE BATTLES

Battle 1 Herb Picking

Objective: Defeat all enemies! **Strategy:** The inaugural clan battle is quite straightforward, as your enemies aren't particularly tough. Leave the Red Cap for your Warrior or Marche to fight. Go for Goblins first, then Red Cap, then the Sprite.

Battle 2 Thesis Hunt

Objective: Defeat all enemies!
Strategy: You're at Lutia Pass. Use
Soldiers, Bangaa Warrior and White
Mage. Use the first two to eliminate
their Thieves and Soldiers. Employ
Montblanc for their White Mage. Keep
watch for the Archer's adept aim.

Battle 3 The Cheetahs

Objective: Defeat all enemies!

Strategy: At Nubswood, you join forces with Ritz and Shara (Archer), both formidable. Send your top battlers to fight. Focus on Black/White Mages first, then devote manpower to the Bangaa because of his counterattack.

Battle 4 Desert Peril

Objective: Defeat all enemies!
Strategy: Your team at Eluut Sands should have a Black Mage, Soldiers and a White Monk. Montblanc's fire spell wreaks havoc on the Cream. Marche can busy himself with the Antlion. Strong units should attack the wolves, while your White Mage can keep everyone healthy.

Battle 5 Twisted Flow

Objective: Defeat the boss!
Strategy: Concentrate on the Ahriman in the back using Roulette. Famfrit can then be fought with Black Mages and Archers. Exploit Soldiers at close quarters, ensuring you replenish their health regularly.

Battle 6 Antilaws

Objective: Defeat all enemies!
Strategy: The engagement at Cadoan needs bulky units. If you're able, summon the Tototh Famfrit for serious damage.
Defeat the Illusionist first, then move up to the high level, all the way playing protector to Ezel.

Battle 7 Diamond Rain

Objective: Defeat all enemies!
Strategy: Aisenfield's soaking with monsters. Exploit Montblanc's fire on the Ice Flan for this point in the game.
Marche and the fiercer fighters should take out the Wyrms and the Bomb. Heal yourself frequently when facing these.

Battle 8 Hot Awakening

Objective: Destroy all targets!
Strategy: Target Roda Volcano's eight
Ultima Crystals. Space out your clan to
minimise all-encompassing damage.
Sturdy attackers and a White Mage are
requisite. For crystals, Archers,
individuals capable of Air Render, and
Black Mages (Montblanc).

Battle 9 Magic Wood

Objective: Defeat all enemies!
Strategy: Space, and lots of it. Marche must attack the Summoner. Afterwards, get the Black Mage. Strong fighters, Archers and Black Mages are essential. Exercise your White Mage's healing power. It takes a thief as well.

Battle 10: Emerald Keep

Objective: Defeat the boss! Strategy: Salikawood's battle needs a full clan. Bring a long-range Archer, White Monks and Soldiers, a Black or White Mage and Bash Babus with all of these guys with all your might. Boost team health at intervals.

Battle 11: Pale Company

Objective: Defeat the boss! Strategy: From Nargai Cave, you meet the Totema, Adrammelech. He and his cohorts are fearsomely strong. Send in your Dragoons (with Wyrmkiller and Jump abilities) and give your Beastmaster an Earth Bell. Shield yourself from fire, For exmple with Blaze Robes and Fire Shields. White Magic units are vital for boosting energy. Target the boss.

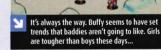
Battle 12: Jagd Hunt

Objective: Defeat all enemies! Strategy: Jagd areas have no Judges/Laws. Keep your clan healthy, otherwise you'll lose a fallen member for good. Their Assassin (Viera dressed all in black) is deadly and their Blue Mage, meddlesome, sending everyone to sleep. The White Mage with Esuna will counter their Last Breath and Night abilities. Remove these first, then turn to the others.

Battle 13: The Bounty

Objective: Defeat all enemies! Strategy: Pulverise the Paladin with magic and Soldier/Archer attacks first. He has the capacity to revive fallen comrades to eliminate that possibility straight away. Go for the Time Mage next, employing similar attackers on him. Follow on with the remaining mages and the job should be done with relative ease.

Battle 14: Golden Clock

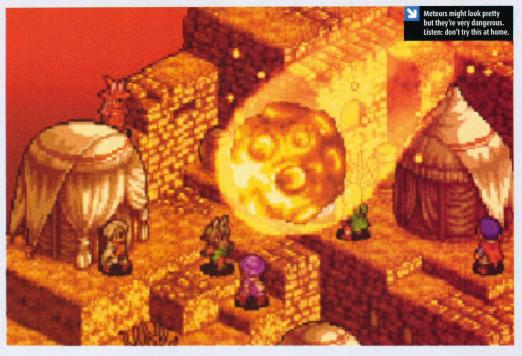
Objective: Defeat all enemies! Strategy: It's quite a good idea to strengthen your lesser clan members through experience points. Select a Thief to use to steal the rare Zeus Mace from the Alchemist. You join forces with Ritz and Shara, and good news for you, they'll stand up well to the enemy. It'll be a doddle for Marche now.











Battle 15: Scouring Time

Objective: Defeat all enemies! Strategy: Judgemaster Cid is scouring all clans for Marche, so be on your guard. You need to have assembled a good arsenal this time. Pick your top trio of units to fight alongside Montblanc and Marche. Destroy the Paladin first and keep watch on the Templars. Their Gunner, Sage and Mog Knights should be defeated in a short time.



Objective: Break all objects! Strategy: How simple or taxing this battle is depends on your tactics. Therefore, you must to beat Babus (and his potent Explode ability) with some chess-like moves early. Now you are free to smash each target, one by one. Cid will wander around dishing out judge points.



Battle 17: The Big Find

Objective: Defeat all enemies! Strategy: The Uladon Bog engagement sees a rival clan claiming that bounty for your capture. Their Far Fist and Air Render abilities must be reckoned with first to preclude distance attacks. A rule of thumb for this battle is to concern yourself with the fighters, then anyone else who gets in your way.

Battle 18: Desert Patrol

Objective: Defeat all enemies! Strategy: Marche's brother, Doned, appears here. Magic (for distance attacks) and Soldiers are key to victory. Watch out for magic being repelled by enemies with Mirror Mail (like chain mail). Utilise an Assassin with Last Breath, or a Paladin with Holy Blade and you're onto a winner. Thieves are useful if you want to pinch neat merchandise.

Battle 19: Quiet Sands

Objective: Defeat the boss! Strategy: Don't be filled with despair when you realise that boss hits do not damage. Instead fight off Llednar's gang members. Quite soon, Llednar will bid to attack Marche, and Judgemaster Cid will cart him off to jail with the red card, effectively winning this mission for you! You'll be singing the virtues of refereeing all the way back to the pub!

Battle 20: Mateus

Objective: Defeat the boss! Strategy: Vampires will immediately devastate your team so keep a White Mage's Esuna to hand for anyone screaming, "Medic!" Other possessors of antidotes are useful. Annihilate the Vampires with your White Monk's Exorcise, and Archer's Burial abilities. Make sure they're dead and gone, otherwise they'll come back to life in three strokes. Finally, kill the boss with your most forceful magic and sword attacks.
