

Lap of luxury

Japanese mega-manufacturer NEC has launched its first notebook PC into the UK, with the announcement of the Ultralite 286F.

Measuring 8.5" x 11.5" x 2.0", the Ultralite is slightly smaller than the standard A4 size, and weighs just over six pounds. It runs at 12MHz and comes with a 20Mb hard disk, and IMb of RAM on board expandable to 5Mb.

The black and white backlit LCD screen boasts a resolution of 640 x 400 CGA double scan. There are slots for a modem and dedicated high-speed memory, ports for serial and parallel connections and a connector for an external floppy drive. An internal 3.5-inch drive comes as standard.




Enter the computer.


IMAGES ON THE MOVE



Working with Dorset Trading Standards Department and the Dorset Constabulary Fraud Squad, a lengthy investigation led to charges under the Copyrights Act, Trade desriptions Act and Criminal Attempts Act.

FAST's chief executive Bob Hay commented: "Innocent end-users were being systematically deceived by an unscrupulous dealer. Over recent months our telephone hotline has been used extensively to help would-be purchasers become aware of what they should expect from legitimate packages. Only when they know what to expect will they be able to identify illegal resellers."

The Californian company has set up Apple Central Europe Corporation in Warsaw which will market its products to the Soviet Union, Poland and Hungary. Technicians are currently working on localised versions of Macintosh systems software with a brief to be ready by the middle of

Representatives from the company are meeting in Paris to decide how best to tackle the difficult Eastern European markets. Apple's top-brass are planning a fact finding trip to Moscow next month.

IBM, the world's largest computer company, has recorded a loss for the first time in its history.

Big Blue lost \$1.7 billion in its last financial quarter as hardware sales plunged by 17 per cent. IBM's sales performance was down 4.5 per cent to \$13.6 billion. The company can take some solace in the fact that it made basic profits of \$532 million but that does not include a new \$2.3 billion charge which requires that funds be held back for the company's post retirement health funds.

Chairman John Akers said: "The worldwide economic slowdown has created an uncertain and difficult business environment. However, we believe the long term need for our products has not been diminished."

World beating machine leaves competition in the shade

MIGHTY NOTEBOOK DUE FROM UK FIRM

A notebook computer offering performance ratings which far outstrip even the best of rivals is to be launched this Summer, Express can reveal.

Cambridge based Tadpole Technology has developed a tiny machine which offers speeds of 18 Million Instructions Per Second (MIPS), but which weighs just 5.5 pounds. The notebook is based on a sophisticated 25MHz Sun Sparc processor and can run UNIX as well as DOS software. Amazingly, it costs only £3,500; a quarter of the equivalent desktop price.

Tadpole's SparcBook has been under development for the past two years, but the British company has managed to keep its plans a secret. Last week chairman Bob Gilkes told Express: "We didn't want to make a big announcement and leave people wondering what it's all about. We want to educate the market slowly. This is a very special machine."

He added: "Because of the way the market has developed many people see notebooks as mere executive toys for such functions as word processing. But this is something different. It's a powerful workstation in notebook form."

He predicted that sales of the SparcBook would exceed 50,000 in its first year with launches planned in the US and Japan. Tadpole is banking on would-be purchasers being bowled over by the machine's impressive technical specifications, and reasonable price.

"This has given a small company a chance to grow into a manufacturer with international presence," said Gilkes, "We employ 100 people and have developed a state-of-the-art manufacturing capability. Because we've always been at the sharp end of technology we can see

Researchers produce pollution simulation

British researchers last week unveiled an 'environmentally friendly' program to help tackle pollution.

The software package, known as ECoS, Estuarine Contaminant Simulator, has been developed by scientists at the Natural Environment Research Council's laboratory in Plymouth. With this software scientists can simulate the behaviour of any contaminant in any estuary. By feeding in details of the estuary and the contaminant it is possible to estimate the extent of damage upon the

environment. The computer indicates where the worst pollution is likely to be.

ECoS is simply an extension of work undertaken by the lab on behalf of the British Government to estimate the impact of the anti-fouling paint TBT, Tributyl Tin, the most toxic substance released into the sea in the last 20 years.

ECoS could prove to be an invaluable aid to emergency services dealing with the after effects of a chemical or oil spillage such as the disastrous Mediterranean tanker accident three weeks ago. ■



Though the company has not confirmed the move, sources at the company have revealed that the price of the console looks likely to be cut by £40 sometime next month. This will take the recommended retail price down to just £59.99.


The machine was originally launched last September, but has only sold around 25,000 units. In comparison the UK user base for console market leader, £124.99 and the larger price dif-Sega, is 420,000.

Almost from the date of its release the console's performance was not as good as the company had predicted, and chain stores had started giving discounts on the machine even before Christmas.

The official price cut is being seen as a last ditch attempt by Commodore to boost the machine's market share, though it is also believed that the company is eager to redefine the function of the machine in the market. It is expected that the emphasis will be shifted away from competition with Sega and Nintendo, and that the console will instead be used as low cost introduction to Commodore's range of 'real' computers.

The next machine up the rung is the C64 which retails for ference will emphasise the advantages of the home computer over the console.

Commodore is denying that the future of the C64GS is in doubt. A spokesman said: "There is no price cut for the C64GS planned at the moment."




NeXT black beauty wows the buyers

As we discover another route planner bearing remarkable similarities to Door to Door, Express asks...

HAVE WE BEEN HERE BEFORE?

Another piece of the *Door to Door* jigsaw fell into place after last week's issue of *Express* went to press. Keith Pomfret picks up the tale....

t was our Editor, who thought he'd seen it all before. Andy Storer was casually teasing our PC copy of Door to Door, asking it for simple A to B routes and waiting to see where it would try to send him, when he remembered looking at another product that had behaved nearly as strangely.

Casting his mind back to the start of last year, he remembered receiving a route planning program for the Psion organiser that proved impossible to review. It was called *Routewise*, and the development ROM we were sent to evaluate drained the Psion's batteries in a few minutes – before the package managed to deliver a route.

As our Editor remembers, tempers frayed, the Express stock of batteries was exhausted, and a review was clearly impossible. So we sent it back and asked the company behind Routewise, Titan Computers, to supply a working version of the ROM – a replacement ROM never turned up.

CASH ROLLS IN?

Titan was the brainchild of one Glen Grant-Müller who booked the advertisements and sat back and waited for the cash to roll in. The money may well have rolled in but, as with the Geographic saga, the money didn't roll back to pay the advertising bills. Titan disappeared after it placed a series of half-page adverts in Express and other magazines.

Of course, we no longer had a Routewise ROM – so how could we compare the program to Door to Door? Phone the Bradford telephone number given in the Routewise advertisement, and you find it's discontinued. Then Jeremy Spencer, the Editor of Computer Shopper came to the rescue – nearly a year ago he'd reviewed a working version of Routewise, and still had the ROM.

We arranged a head-to-head test...

Just like Geographic, Titan Computers made bold claims for its product in advertising copy. And just like Door to Door, Routewise failed to deliver. In fact, Routewise proved to be amazingly like Door to Door. Plugging the ROM into our office Psion Organiser we decided to ask it to plan a route from Swindon to Stroud – the route that Door to Door had so much difficulty with.

The Organiser fired up with a screen that said simply:

Routewise
It cleared and said
Titan Computers (c)
Type Start Town
We typed Swindon
It asked for 'Y/N' confirmation
It echoed
Type end town
We typed Stroud
It asked for 'Y/N' confirmation
It then asked
Output to printer?
We typed 'N'
It displayed
Finding Route

When it finally decided to offer a route it displayed the following:

To Stroud
From Swindon
Take the A4259
Take the A419/Jn 15 (M4)
TAKE THE M4
AT JN 15 (M5)
TAKE THE M5
AT JN 13 (M5)
Take the A419
To Stroud

While the PC version of Door To Door suggested:

From Swindon
Take the A4259
Take the A419/Jn15 (M4)
Take the M4
At Jcn 15 (M5)
Take the M5
At Jcn 13 (M5)
Take the A419
To Stroud

Time to ask an expert. We handed the ROM and our copy of PC Door to Door over to Paul Whiteley who lives and breathes code. He said that the slow

speed that both Door To Door and Routewise operate at was the result of poor programming, and added: "Both versions look like some very untidy compiled BASIC. They're not very well written."

Further investigations showed that many of the 36 data files accessed by the PC version appeared in the Psion version with the same file names. Clearly, there is more than a co-incidental link between Titan's Routewise and Geographic's Door to Door.

Checking our copy of the Leeds and Bradford A to Z, another strong link emerged – we reckoned it would be a five-minute drive from Titan's letterbox to Geographic's letterbox...

So it was off to Bradford. The imposing 'Titan House, Cleveland Road' address quoted in the Routewise advertisement revealed a row of terraced town houses in need of a lick of paint and a good gardener. We knocked on the door of Number 3.

Declining to give us his name, the man who answered the door said that the chap from Titan had been a lodger and had moved away last year without leaving a forwarding address. And when this lodger left, mail continued to arrive but was never collected. A sesnse of deja vu was developing . . .

The man at the door then mentioned that he still saw the man from Titan around – he was a local. And he drove a white Saab. Readers will recall that a white Saab was the car driven by the man from Geographic known to witnesses as John Gold.

We drove around looking for that Saab, but drew a blank. The Titan trail was growing cold, but it is plain there's more than a casual link between the two companies.

On MONDAY 15 APRIL, at 8.45pm, the man known as John Gold arrived back at 3/5 Cranford place. But he didn't arrive in his striking white Saab.

TUESDAY 16 APRIL, at 10am, after a diligent search, we found a white Saab with a green stripe in a car park in Wilsden.

At 10.15AM, knocking on the door of 3/5 Cranford Place brought no answer but the figure of a man, identified by the neighbours as Gold was seen peering through the windows.

Around 10.30AM, corner shop owners
Rita and Bernard Raby confirmed that Gold
was back. "A neighbour saw him come in at
quarter to nine last night," said Mrs Raby.

11.30AM. We telephoned West Yorkshire Trading Standards Officer Graham Hebblethwaite and told him John Gold now appeared to be at 3/5 Cranford Place. Hebblethwaite was on his way...

Around 12.30PM business had slackened off in his shop, so Bernard Raby came with us to the car park and examined the white Saab. "Yes, that's the one," he confirmed. "That's his (Gold's). It hasn't got the diffuser on the roof."

We asked Raby if it was the car parked outside Dr Watson's house in Cranford Place until recently. "Yes, " he replied. That's his car."

Just after 1PM Trading Standards Officer Graham Hebblethwaite arrived, having parked in a public car park and walked down the hill to Cranford Place.

Susan Watson opened the door but refused to allow Hebblethwaite into the house. Hebblethwaite told Express: "There's definitely someone in there with her but she doesn't want to let me in."

Around 1.45PM, Hebblethwaite knocked on Watson's door again, but she still wouldn't let him in. "I've nothing to say," she told him. "I'll get in touch with a solicitor. I'm being harassed."

CANON CAMERA

A LOOK THROUGH ITS LENS

he Canon ION RC 260 is Canon's second still video camera. Instead of a film it uses electronic circuitry to capture what the lens sees and the resultant electronic image is saved to a two inch disk.

The Canon uses an electronic analogue process to capture and store the pictures. This means that each tiny two inch disk can hold 50 pictures. Unlike film though, the disks can be used and reused. Individual pictures can be erased or the whole disk electronically wiped for re-use.

The technology used is similar to that in a Camcorder. Instead of taking a continuously moving image and spooling it to a moving cassette of tape, an electronic 'time slice' image is taken through the ION's electronic shutter. This is then saved to the two inch disk. The ION is powered from an internal rechargable battery or a supplied mains unit and accessory pack.

A composite video output on the camera allows direct connection to a video recorder to view the pictures on a TV and save them to a video for playing back through a TV later.

FOR THE FAMILY

A typical home application would be to transfer the 50 pictures from disk to video and erase the disk for re-use. A video carousel of pictures could be built up almost instantly with the reusable media meaning that there's no wait or mess in processing pictures. A family photo album could be gradually built up on a video with a three hour tape having typically enough room for over 1,000 pictures in a carousel format.

An accessory module supplied with the ION allows connection to an RF modulator so the pictures taken can be directly viewed through a TV. The accessory module also provides mains power and can charge the ION's battery pack.

A preview feature lets you see pictures on a TV as you take them. Playback can be controlled by an infrared remote control unit. Images can be stamped with the date, time and time lapses between pictures. The ION weighs less than a pound and is ergonomically designed to rest comfortably in the hand. An integral flash means indoor photography is practical (at some expense to the battery) White balance is automatic and a switchable backlit feature adjusts the exposure so that subjects lit from the back have enough light at the front.

Exposure and focus are fixed and macro pictures can be taken using a switchable distance changer. When in use, an indicator in the viewfinder confirms that macro-photography is in use.

INTERFACE

The composite video and modulated video output options of the ION mean that it can be connected to any video digitiser that grabs a composite or TV signal.

For the home user that's good news as many affordable video digitisers accept a composite signal.

Instant cameras aren't exactly new, but one that saves to disk and is compatible with all home computers is enough to raise an eyebrow. Keith Pomfret investigates

ION IMAGE







 Left to right: Zoom, standard and wide angle lenses on the Canon Ion still video camera. The colour pictures were taken on a bright spring morning and saved directly to a Macintosh via a frame grabber. Video digitisers make good results possible from most home and business computers. It's also compatible with your video recorder!

The signal from the ION is similar to that from a video camera or VCR so any digitiser that can digitise from camera or VCR should accept the ION as an input.

The Rombo VIDI range of digitisers was tried with the ION Rombo produces video digitising hardware and software for a range of 8-bit and 16-bit machines. Starting with the simplest machine, we hooked a VIDI interface to the back of a CPC 6128 and fed the direct video lead from the camera to the digitiser.

The CPC cannot digitise in true RGB, but instead offers three resolutions for a digitised picture to be displayed on the CPC. The Stop Press program has the ability to accept input via the Rombo interface too and with this it was possible to grab a picture directly from the ION on to a page display and print it directly as part of a newsletter.

Other 8-bit machines that we managed to digitise to (although not using rombo digitisers) were a C64 and a Spectrum. Again the results were as strong as the software. The still video image made it simpler for the various digitisers to grab a sharp image.

The PC, and Amiga were given the Rombo treatment too. The Canon ION was connected to the digitisers and the output was captured in its constituent red, green and blue elements. The VIDI software combined the three elements to make a composite picture. It was possible to display the picture on Amiga and PC and save to a file and reloaded into a DTP program.

To complete the round up of machines, we attached the ION to a frame grabbing digitiser attached

to one of the *Express* Macs. While this whizzy piece of kit is probably beyond pocket money status (nearly a couple of grand) the results speak for themselves. The pictures taken with the ION were saved on the Mac and then imported into *Quark Xpress*, the program that we produce *Express* on. The images could be used as either colour or black and white and considering that they were 'snapshots' taken on a hand-held camera, the quality was good.




Extras available for the camera included a film adaptor that allows you to take photographs of either colour transparancies or negative film and save it to the disk. In the case of negative film, a switch on the adaptor reverses the image to get a positive picture.

The small battery pack won't last forever and if you want to take pictures away from a mains power, there's a battery pack available that gives you up to 4,000 pictures or over an hour of uninterrupted playback. Using the remote control and the battery pack, you can control playback from a distance. Finally, two additional lenses change the ION into a wide or telephoto lensed camera.

The ION is a fine piece of equipment worth the £499.99 price tag. The optional film adaptor (£149.99), power pack (£49.99) and lens set (£89.99) complement it and make it a useful and usable camera for snapshots, DTP work, colour and mono digitising and publishing. The reusable media and 'instant' processing of pictures make it convenient and highly specified.





RUMOURS...

I have seen the future, and it's called System 7. Can't tell you any more than that, because I'm under a non-disclosure agreement which means that I could probably lose several vital organs just because of the first sentence. But when System 7 is released, it's going to make a lot of people very happy. A lot of people, that is, except those who've just bought PCs with Windows 3 because "it's just as good as the Mac". Prepare for a mass eating-of-words ceremony...

While I was at Stockley Park (Apple's HQ, known as Stockley Park to hacks so that we can laugh at people who don't know what it is) I noticed that a new painting had appeared on the wall. Now, I wouldn't know a piece of art if it came up and bit me on the butt, but I commented that it really did look rather nice. It's a multi-coloured background with a black, hand-drawn apple and the word Macintosh underneath. As I say, it looks rather smart. When I enquired where it had come from, I was treated to a slightly embarrassed silence. It turns out that it had been sitting in the warehouse for years, and had only just been noticed. Personally, I don't see what all the fuss is about. I mean, who is this Andy Warhol person anyway...

And apparently Apple's Creative Services team isn't too impressed with the painting, because the word 'Macintosh' doesn't have a little TM symbol next to it...

In the States, Apple's distribution of both hardware and software doesn't rely on AppleCentres as it does over here. So Apple itself has to provide telephone technical support. Apparently, people who purchase System 7 and register will be able to ring a toll-free 800 number for tech support free of charge. Not that people who don't register will get left out. They will be given a 900

number which they can ring. American 900 numbers are similar to our 0898s, except that their premium rate charges make Telecom look positively philanthropic by comparison.

PRINTING IN STYLE

The StyleWriter printer is an innovation in Apple printers. But now that the machine has been in use for a little while, one or two people are expressing slight reservations about it. For instance, a couple of users have reported that, printing from some applications, the image appears slightly off-centre. The speed of the printer has also come in for some criticism; one user has complained that printing a page from PageMaker 4 took well over 10 minutes.

Well, it is certainly true that the printer cannot output in 'faster' mode from applications like MacDraw and Quark XPress. But then, surely it wasn't aimed at such high-end users? I'd say that the people who think that the printer takes far too long to output pages should weigh that against the cost of the machine. If you want to print highly complex pages, get yourself a laser printer; why are you bothering with the StyleWriter anyway? For the rest of us, though, the machine still offers exceptional value.

APPLE HE EMULATION

Apple in the States has finally released a card for the LC which allows it to emulate the Apple IIe. The card is claimed to enable about 90 per cent of all lle programs to run on the LC, which means that at a conservative estimate the LC will be able to run more than 10,000 extra programs.

If you have a horde of Apple Ile programs, you may find that this card is the answer to your prayers - now you can run outdated programs for an

Apple put a revolutionary (for Apple) capability into the Macintosh LC. One of the video formats supported by the LC's onboard video circuitry is Video Graphics Array (VGA). As the dominant video

technology today, VGA benefits from the huge MS-DOS market, where intense competition keeps prices down.

The kit is a special hardware adaptor to match the LC's outgoing video signals to the VGA monitor's incoming ones, and to switch from the Mac's two-row DA-15 connector to the VGA's three-row highdensity D-15 connector.


You need to be careful about which VGA monitor you buy. The Mac LC's video output is weak, supporting only one TTL load. Many VGA monitors, even high-quality ones, sink more current than that. But the LC is so portable you can easily take it to the store to test it out.

The kit includes the wires, clips, plugs and plastic shell you'll need to make the adaptor. It's available for \$12 plus \$6 postage from BMUG, 1442A Walnut Street #62, Berkeley, CA 94709 USA.

464 PLUS QUESTIONS

"Why is there no tape counter? This can be very irritating in multi-load games, e.g. after reaching Level 5 of Operation Wolf I have to reload from Level 1 as soon as the game ends. If I don't rewind the tape far enough, I have

to wait some five minutes before I'm told to reload, but if I go too far back, I have to wait 10 minutes for Level One to be found. I can tolerate waiting for games to laod, but surely not every couple of minutes?

"Of the 100 or so games I have, five go no further than the title screen. There was no problem on the CPC464. Why don't they load on the 464 Plus? The games that don't load are American Football, Sultan's Maze, Death Stalker, Nigel Mansell's Grand Prix and International 3D Tennis.

"Finally, can a disk drive be connected to the 464 Plus?"

Well, you're right about the tape counter, that's for sure. Multi-load games on tape are an absolute pain in the neck, and the idea of trying to get by without a tape counter... yuk!

The problem with games not loading is one we've come across before. Apparently, it's all to do with a minor modification inside the new machines that shouldn't make any difference at all. Unfortunately, programmers are a lazy bunch, and some of them in the past have taken a specific programming short-cut that didn't make any difference to the old machines but which manages to prevent

Why do the French always turn out such weird games? The graphics are always brilliant, the sound is always great, but the gameplay is almost invariably odd.

Take BAT from Ubi Soft, for example. The game takes place way, way in the future, when you can travel from one point in the universe to another instantaneously (oh, BR's gone out of business, then). You're an employee of the ultra-secret BAT organisation, and you've been sent to the rough 'n' tough city of Terrapolis to track down a couple of crims. You can find out all this - and a whole lot more - by reading the manual, which is probably a good idea if you want to make any real progress, since it contains useful information.

You carry out your search for these fugitives from justice by exploring Terrapolis and talking to the inhabitants. These folk can be quite friendly. They can

also be extremely nasty - so tread carefully. Instead of typing in your commands, you get to use a sophisticated WIMP (Windows Icons Menus Printers) interface which is even 'intelligent'! (The function of the pointer changes according to the object it's over.) In this

way you can get through the game options quickly and simply, leaving you free to enjoy the gameplay.

The graphics are fantastic. They're detailed, colourful, atmospheric and extremely imaginative. Unfortunately, the same can't be said of the sound, because there isn't any.

BAT takes a bit getting into for two reasons. Firstly, many games players have an instinctive dread of role-playing games. Secondly, it's a huge game with a complex scenario and lots of manual-consulting. It's not an arcade blast you can pick up in five minutes, but once you get stuck in it'll last you ages.

all keyboard input with the new ones! If only five games out of a hundred don't work, though, I guess it could be worse. Unfortunately, I doubt software houses are likely to re-issue Plus-compatible versions of 'problem' games, unless they're very recent and very big sellers.

Lastly, yes, we understand it is possible to connect a disk drive to a 464 Plus. Unfortunately it's not quite as simple as getting hold of an adaptor to let you plug the DD1's disk drive interface into the Centronics port of your Plus, though.

The problem is that the new 464 has the same ROM as the 6128, which means it has a disk drive controller built in. Plug in the DD1 interface, which has its own disk drive controller, and the hardware gets very confused and doesn't work. The answer is to disconnect the ROM in the interface, and then all should be well. However, I haven't tried this for myself yet, so I can't guarantee it.

CHECKMATE GO 24-BIT

Back in the days when the Amiga was young, 4096 colours was thought to be pretty impressive. And indeed it was, for most computer users of the time were more accustomed to talking in terms of tens of colours, so it came as

something of a shock to most of us when we had our first glimpse of a HAM digitised image.

These days, of course, HAM is no longer the knock your socks off thing it once was. Despite the quality of Amiga digitised images and artwork from such well known Amiga artists as James Sachs, it's a case of been there, done it, read the book and worn the tee-shirt. What's next? 24-bit graphics of course.

Until quite recently, everyone thought that 24-bit graphics were jolly expensive things in which to get involved, which is hardly surprising when you consider that the vast majority of 24-bit graphics cards would have set you back around £1800, then on top of that you had to buy an expensive multisync to view your 24-bit creations. At that kind of price, it's no wonder that we're all still playing around with HAM.

If you want to get into some serious graphics, but can't quite afford the asking price of such devices as the Amiga Centre Scotland's Harlequin board, then you'll be pleased to learn that Checkmate Digital has taken on the exclusive distribution of the amazing HAM-E 24-bit RGB adaptor from US-based Black Belt Systems (Express passim).

When I last spoke to Steve Jones of Checkmate, he was still waiting for shipment of the first batch of HAM-E's to arrive, but they should be available by the time you read this. It's available in two different configurations – the basic unit costs £299, but there's also a more powerful version available for just £100 more that also includes an impressive piece of circuitry called the 'Anti-Alias Machine' which basically doubles the resolution of your 24-bit images.

A1500 UPGRADED

No, Commodore hasn't finally decided to offer Amiga 1500 buyers a little bit more than a rebadged 2000 – we're talking the Amiga 1500 shell, here, the one that used to be known as the Checkmate Amiga 1500.

Now the Shell is being manufactured by a company called A1500 Ltd (though Checkmate remains a distributor among others) According to the London-based company, there's an upgraded version of the successful A500 case conversion kit on the way. To be called the A1500 Plus, the new system offers many of the advantages of Checkmate's forthcoming IQLR Tower system. For starters, the £350 (approx) kit has expanded in size – it doesn't take up that much extra deskspace, but

it's height has doubled to match that of Commodore's own Amiga 2000.

The reason for all this extra space is simple – unlike the original A1500, the A1500 Plus comes as standard with two 2000-compatible Zorro slots and (best of all) an Amiga video slot. With the A1500 Plus, A500 owners can now take advantage of 2000 video peripherals including genlocks, video processors, flicker cards and even the infamous Video Toaster (for American users only, of course).

Don't worry if you've already bought an A1500 – the company hopes to make an upgrade available which will allow existing users to upgrade the new system for just £150. Details have yet to be confirmed, so phone 081 907 3636 for further information.

HUNGRY HIPPOS

Meanwhile Checkmate has a product in the pipeline which is sure to appeal to anyone who wants the expandability of a 2000 without having to chuck away all their old A500 peripherals.

Called the HiQ Hippo (they're a strange lot at Checkmate), this handy box of tricks is basically a very powerful card cage that steals more than a trick or two from Checkmate's existing IQLR Tower system. Put simply, Checkmate has taken the expansion card capabilities from tower system and thrown them into a tiny box which connects to the expansion connector on the A500. For just £200, you'll get a box that offers three 2000-compatible Zorro slots, 1 2000 processor slot and a video slot, all of which are driven by a high power 200W power supply. At a later date, it will also be possible to upgrade your Hippo to the full IQLR Tower spec.

For information on this and any other Checkmate products, give the Checkmate lads a bell on 071 923 0658. Once again, I'll be bringing you reviews of all these new products as soon as my review models arrive (fingers crossed).





An extra expansion pack is available which adds support for Rendition, Mac TIFF and TARGA formats.

Funny that. You may think that the computer world was fairly safe from this sort of caper, well you'd be wrong. I vividly remember a brilliant one page ad (of which I still have a copy) from 'Wild Bill's Rodeo' in PCW the year after the ZX81 came out claiming all sorts of unbelievable statistics about the revolutionary ZX82. Closer to home, Acorn User published a games page a couple of years back that had many people thinking that a BBC version of

> Zarch was on the way. Last year, I think, it published a 'Disc Cleaner', and many years ago there was a software patch to emulate a

screen. I must admit I eye out for spoofs in the press but instead had one 'forced' on me while innocently getting on with some DTP work on Impression. The time: 10.30am, The date: 1 April 1991,

Impression's main document window. What happened? Well, the pointer changed into a carrot.

If you've ever looked through the sprites file in the resources directory of Impression, you may have found the 'carrot' pointer, I thought it was just Computer Concepts having a laff with the obvious pun on 'caret'. I'd tried all the obvious ways of getting it to appear, and had just given up on it when suddenly along came April Fool's day and there it was!

Impression gets its time and date from the Archimedes' real time clock, so it's a fairly trivial matter to set it back to the 1 April (with TIME\$=' ... ' or with Alarm) and see for your yourself. A couple points to note. I think it only works in the morning (as it should), and I've only managed to get it to work on two machines (out of four). All four machines were running Impression 2.05

POINTS OF VIEW

Viewpoints is the latest educational package from Wiltshire-based Sherston Software. I don't usually see many pure educational programs, so cannot really compare the package to others, however I felt it well worth writing about as it is really fun to play! There are three phases to Viewpoints; mapping, exploration and the database. You don't need to have all of these 'active' and switching one or two off enables the program to be used by various age

The mapping section is used in conjunction with an A3 colour map supplied, the screen shows three 3-D views of your current location, forward, left and right. You can face in any primary compass direction and move forward. This allows you to explore the Viewpoints world. At certain key locations, such as the cliffs or the woods, you can also 'investigate'. This leads to a more detailed view of your current location, you can then 'Watch



and Wait' or move in 'Closer' and examine various highlighted areas.

In most cases an animal will appear and scurry, flap or wriggle across the screen. At this point the mouse is controlling a view finder and clicking a mouse button will take a photograph. Up to eight photos can be named, kept and later used in the database section.

I let my six year old half-sister loose on it, and she quickly found that the mapping was rather too difficult for her and the database was unnecessary. However she quickly came to grips with the exploration and had fun taking the pictures of animals.

I'm sure I'm glossing over many of the uses of the program, but the main use seems to be as a nature trail. However, switching off 'exploration' turns the game into a sort of treasure hunt. The supplied *Teacher's Book* has a large section of suggested activities, further studies and places to visit. All in all a very nicely put to together package. Sherston can be contacted on 0666 840433.

WHAT'S THE IDEA?

It seems that IDE (Integrated Drive Electronics) is the buzz word of the moment. Ian Copestake Software pioneered the use of this technology in Acorn machines (with the A3000 IDEA internal hard disk), but a number of other third party developers are very close to releasing their own hardware. I hope to bring a full report on the upsurge of IDE in a week or so.

ICS has recently announced the appearance of Oddules; these are similar to Podules, in the sense that they are hardware, but are connected to the Archie's IIC slow data bus (like the two teletext adaptors I reviewed in Express 123). These offer the potential of simple and cheap expansion with such devices as A/D or D/A convertors. The AnDi is now available and provides

emulation of the old BBC user and analogue ports.

ICS has also released Cross-32, an assembler for the Archimedes, which I think the first to rival Acorn's own Aasm. It supports all the usual macros and conditional assembly. More importantly, lists of instructions and opcodes can be added for any processor; data for over 50 processors (including Arm 2 and 3!) is included. This makes Cross-32 an exceedingly versatile cross assembler.

A MONITOR FOR ALL MODES

If you're currently stumped by the bewildering array of multisync monitors available, I can strongly recommend the Eizo 9060; this will set you back about £400, but is capable of displaying all modes without needing a VidC enhancer fitted to your Archimedes. This means it can display Mode 12 (and, in fact, all modes lower than 18) as happily as Mode 20. It also has lots of nice twiddly knobs on the front...

It's a 14-inch monitor, looks neat and gives a nice, stable picture. Its bigger and more expensive brother, the 9070, is a 16-incher of a type known as 'high line-rate multisync', which means that it's fine in multisync modes, but needs a VidC enhancer to display the normal modes like mode 12.

Fitting a VidC adaptor is pretty simple, but it does have one drawback; as it speeds up the clock rate on the VidC chip, which also looks after the sound, it speeds up the sound system too. And this sometimes makes the music on games too fast. Other games can't be played because they bypass the VidC enhancer software and use a normal mode (say 9 or 13) which can't be displayed on the monitor if it's a high line-rate type.

MEGA DIZZY

One computer character guaranteed to send a shiver up anyone's olfactory nerve is Dizzy. If you have never heard of this egg-straordinary little bloke then you could do much worse than pick up a copy of the Dizzy Collection from Codemasters. For the princely sum of £9.99 you can get hold of every Dizzy game so far: Dizzy, Treasure Island Dizzy, Fantasy World Dizzy, Magicland Dizzy and Fast Food Dizzy. That works out at £2 per game – far cheaper than going out and buying each one individually.

CLOSER EGGS-AMINATION

Anyway, let's take a closer look at this egg-citing compilation (and I promise you, no more egg yolks). For those unfamiliar with the genre, I'll elucidate: Dizzy is an egg-shaped hero who makes his way through a flick-screen kingdom, collecting objects and using them to solve a plethora of puzzles while avoiding the ubiquitous nasty alien creatures. Err, that's about it.

Dizzy – A nice, gentle introduction to the series. Dizzy decides to kill the local

wizard, Zaks when he uncovers a hidden encryption on his travels. Four ingredients must be found and mixed together to concoct a lethal potion which will destroy the evil wizard. Objects are scattered far and wide across a huge landscape, which includes a crystal mountain and an abandoned mine. The puzzles are logically structured in that they become more difficult the further you progress, but anyone with half a brain should be able to complete the game pretty quickly. The spectrum-esque graphics are detailed and colourful while a jolly (if irritating) tune keeps everything rolling along at a lively pace. One for the kiddies, methinks.

Treasure Island Dizzy – This time Dizzy's stupid behaviour has left him stranded on a desert island from which he must escape. Again the game is set in a colourful hi-res backdrop along with a couple of merry melodies. Very similar to the original in many respects, including the somewhat awkward control method. In my opinion this is the most difficult of the five games; the puzzles are incredibly tough and there

is also a multitude of hidden traps and unfair situations. Couple this with the fact that you only have one life and you have a difficult task on your hands to say the least. Possibly offers the greater lasting interest of any of the Dizzy games, though.

Fantasy World Dizzy - This time Dizzy's girlfriend Daisy has been snatched by the evil king's trolls. Dizzy must rescue her from Fantasyland and everything will be peachy-keen. The presentation, graphic style and gameplay is virtually identical to that of the other Dizzy games. The music is a bit more bearable and playability is enhanced by the power to converse with the other characters who appear throughout the game. The puzzles are quite straightforward, as is solving the game. Not exactly the most challenging piece of software around, but it's great fun to play nevertheless.

Magicland Dizzy - The final Dizzy arcade adventure... hopefully. The evil wizard Zaks is back with a vengeance. All Dizzy's chums have been transformed into a variety of weird things and, in case you hadn't guessed, Dizzy has to return them to their normal states and send them back to the safety of the village. Poor chap. The game features some interesting ideas but it is possible to have too much of a good thing. Really it's a case of seen it all before and I was not particularly inspired enough to play the game through to its completion. A pity really, as the control method has been tweaked to enhance the playability, but graphics and sound do little to elaborate the already exhausted concept. Pity.

Fast Food Dizzy – Quite a departure from the other games, this is a warped version of PacMan. Dizzy runs around a maze collecting food and avoiding the nasties and err...goes onto the next level (of which there are dozens). A tad samey, but I must admit to playing this one quite a lot. It's enjoyable, cute fun.

In conclusion, the whole package represents great value for money. My only gripe is the saminess of the four arcade adventures. Still, give it a try if you have a spare tenner lying around (and if you have, perhaps you should consider buying a wallet as well).




WHEREFORE ART THOU?







DIGITAL SAMPLING DEBUTS ON THE AMIGA



Beta Unlimited of Brooklyn has come up with an interesting device called Audiolink, a 16-bit linear sound sampler for the Amiga. The as yet unpriced system supports CD quality sample recording, editing, and playback of 16-bit audio at sampling rates of up to 48KHz in stereo, and 96KHz in mono.

A prototype version shown at the recent World of Amiga show in the US, consists of an interface card, a stereo analogue to digital converter and an external box of tricks as well as sample editing software.

According to the New York based company, Audiolink can receive signals from both analogue and digital audio sources. It can also process the signals onboard without tying up the Amiga's microprocessor. This, the company claims, allows the Amiga to run sequencing and/or notational software in real time. GFA OPENS FIRST US OFFICE

IBM, claiming to be suffering from sagging business, unfavourable exchange rates and a new accounting charge, has announced a first quarter net loss of \$1,730 million, the first ever quarterly shortfall for the world's largest computer maker. The loss was due, company officials claim, due to a \$2,260 million accounting charge against earnings to cover a new accounting standard that community service.

Without the charge, net income for the first quarter of the year would have been \$532 million. In the first quarter of 1990, IBM earned \$1,037 million. Big Blue officials announced plans to cut IBM's work force of about 373,000 by 14,000 in March.

'PHIBER OPTIK' SUPER HACKER PLEADS GUILTY

Mark Abene, known in hacker circles as 'phiber optik,' has pleaded guilty in a New York court to hacking specifically, a reduced charge of 'unauthorised use of a computer.' He has been sentenced to do 35 hours of community service.

Abene, who had his computer equipment and notes seized during the execution of a search warrant in January last year, was arrested in February this year and charged with felony counts of computer tampering and computer trespass and a misdemeanour count of theft of services. Originally, the charges laid against him could have put him away for up to ten years.







HELP! Earthy problem

What on earth can be wrong?

I recently bought an STE and coupled it to a daisywheel QUEN-DATA typewriter used in computer mode (I had previously satisfactory run this as a printer with an old Sharpe M280A computer).

There is not much wrong as sometimes the daisy wheel will print out the full text of whatever the STE tells it, but more often than not it seems to have a mind of its own and print just part of it, refusing to print the rest and all stays frozen till the STE has completed 'transmitting' the document.

The printer just prints until some point at random is reached.

The intercorrection is not excessively long and I have connected into the printer as many incoming and outgoing signals as are available on the STE.. But what on earth can be wrong that it stops printing at random, usually before the end?

Sounds like a buffering problem. The STE could be sending more data than the computer can accept. A simple way to find out if this is the case is to beg, steal or borrow a printer buffer and put this in line. Typewriters that allow connection to computers often have little or no buffering. If you send a constant stream of data to a typewriter printer that has insufficient buffering and no 'intelligent' way of telling the computer to stop sending data, you will end up with a situation as you describe.

Alternatively, it may be that one of your connections is astray. If you intermittently get an acceptable result, it suggests that perhaps the typewriter isn't sending back a code to stop the data stream. This could be because a connection on the cable is intermittent, a connector is faulty, levels are incompatible or settings haven't been arranged for compatibility.

Check with the manufacturer of the typewriter on its compatibility with the STE or watch Circuit City for a bargain parallel printer at less than fifty pounds.

HELP! Sick Amiga

Could you please help me with a problem I have regarding my Amiga 500. Ever since I got it I have been unable to find a copy of F29 Retaliator to work on my machine, even though the shop has swapped it every version I get will run happily on my neighbour's Amiga which is the same version but won't run on mine. When I load it up my plane just blows up mid flight, and in the top left of the screen it prints ILLE-GAL COPY (I assume the plane blowing up is part of the protection). I have had similar problems with Galaxy force, TV Sports basketball, Rainbow islands and find I can't load the installation program on Ant Heads.

I took my Amiga back to the shop stating my problem clearly only to find that they kept it for a week did nothing, and then claimed that the disk drive heads were dirty.

I then rang the Commodore value added care number where I talked to a confused person who thought the Amiga used tapes (messages to Commodore: If you are going to have a help line please use staff who know something about computers and who can actually help you).

Is there anything I can do? I have read that you can experience these problems if your disk drive heads are not aligned exactly. Is this my problem?

I would also like to comment on the PCW DTP debate. Surely any comments

about the mono chrome display being useless if you get a colour printer also apply to the ST which can only cope with a mono hi-res and a four colour medium-res which isn't enough for colour printing. I could add here about how the Amiga can have 16 colours in medium and hi-res, but that would be going into the MCIBTYC.

On the topical subject of two fire button joysticks I thought I would say that when you flick your joystick to Sega Mode you can use the second fire button to activate one of the weapons on *Turrican* and *Star Ray* also supports the second fire button and also says how to convert your joystick to have two fire buttons.

The Star Ray manual says: two joystick buttons: the second (right) one is connected just like the right mouse button, thus between pin 8 (earth) and pin 9 of the joystick connector. For reasons of cost, a super joystick is not enclosed, but you could of course build yourself one and vaporise with it.

Could be a disk drive problem. If your machine is in warranty, take it back to where you bought it, demonstrate the problem in the shop and demand repair, refund or replacement under the Sale of Goods act. We've found that the best time to get satisfaction from an exercise like this is when the shop is busy and full of potential Amiga buyers.

If you get no satisfactory result from this speak to your local Trading Standards Officer.

If your machine is out of warranty, a simple way to check if it is the disk drive or not is to have a compétent computer repairer swap the disk drive for one out of another machine that you know will run the games. This only takes a few minutes and will tell you whether it is the drive or the machine. If it is the drive, get your 'expert' to take remedial action and check the alignment etc. If it isn't the drive, it's probably a matter requiring serious surgery.




HELP! Re-inking

Advice given in several computer magazines over the last couple of years about re-inking printer ribbons has been inconclusive. One magazine suggested endorsing ink, another preferred black silicon powder and Fairy Liquid. There have been correspondents who thought Indian ink or even fountain pen ink would do the trick. One person evensaid diluted laser or Photocopier toner would do the trick. Before I damage or destroy the print head of my Epson, can you give me the definitive answer.

Don't take any notice of any of the old printers tales you hear about re-inking. The ink on a printer ribbon contains pigment, fluid and a silicon lubricant. It is formulated to allow several thousand print head strokes per minute while transferring the right amount of ink to the paper and lubricating the print head.



 Old printers tales about re-inking your printer ribbon will end up damaging your machine.

You wouldn't use Fairy Liquid in the engine of your XR3i, so don't use it on a printer. The only way to re-ink ribbons (if you must!) is to either use a professional ribbon re-inking service or use a re-inking kit or fluid specifically designed for the job. Anything else will harm your printer and although it may not grind to a halt immediately, eventually the print head could be irrepairably damaged.



HELP! Questions

Nintendo and Sega games and graphics are dominating the corners of Dixons' shops and attract groups of children wide-eyed at the abundance of Mickey Mouse graphics. Ataris and Amigas seem to be under threat from these cartridge-loading games machines. But is it true that the

Amigas are due for a cartridge socket? Could you explain how and where this might be attached to the A500? Will it take over the A590 socket and make things awkward if you've got one?

I like the look of the very sensibly priced TriGem 88e reviewed recently. It seems to be on a level with my own Commodore PC-1, except that it is able to take a hard disk and has a few more ports. In terms of speed I don't think there is a noticeable difference and in screen display I tried out a PC1512 at the OU day School at Brighton Poly recently and it didn't impress. Hercules mono in amber is definitely the best, in my experience, for all text and programming work.

Finally, UCSD Pascal has a funny way of sending program output to the printer. As far as I know there is no equivalent of the Basic LPRINT and so after X(ecute) you have to type <filename> PO=PRINTER: and when the program runs and you have to type in reponses to prompts, it has to be done without seeing the text on the screen at all – like playing Blind Man's Buff in an empty room!

It is a painful experience glancing at what's appeared under the printhead and then very carefully typing in a reponse, letter by letter, like a three-year-old finding you've hit a wrong key when it prints out! It happened in the most recent assignment: and the result came out, "They went to sea in a sieve (yes they did!)". But with great concentration I then got "Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32)" completely right, though to see me doing it would have raised a laugh - a finger poised very carefully and deliberately over each key and saying it out loud character by character. Try turning out your monitor and typing a line in - I'm not joking, it'll give you a shock; you'll feel really deprived and cross after a while.

This seems to suggest that we all become pretty good touch typists eventually and the text on the screen really does get most of our attention - amazing since I for one never learnt how to touch type. How often do you look down at the keys? John Grey, Eastbourne

Yes, the Amiga is due for a cartridge socket. No we don't know where it is going but the three logical places are 1 - the parallel port, 2 - the hard drive/expansion bus socket or 3 - the trapdoor. It could be made to work in any

of those places.

The trapdoor looks like a non-starter as Commodore has taken to gluing it shut on upgraded A500s. The parallel port would do the job, but has some restrictions. The expansion bus sits next to the main processor on the board and is my bet as the place to attach cartridges. In real terms it could be done in an elegant way that wouldn't cause hassle with the hard drive. A small plug in expansion that sat between the A500 and the hard drive with a vertical port for inserting cartridges would probably do the trick. It could be made the same wedge shape as the Amiga and if lined up with an A500 and A590 hard drive wouldn't spoil the sexy lines of the machine.

That's all guesswork though and we'll have to see what Commodore decides. Thanks for your interesting comments on programming and printing.



HELP! Fast basic

I dabble in programming on my PC. I have to admit that I'm no expert and the some total of my knowledge is GW BASIC. The problem with BASIC is that although it can do a lot, it takes an age to complete the simplest routines. Over the last three years I have tried C, Pascal, and assembler. Whether I'm plain thick or whether you do need to be a special sort of person to program, I'm not sure. C and Pascal made sense in an obscure sort of way, but Assembler was gibberish. I'll never get the hang of all of those pnemonics.

Is there a way that I can take all of my finely tuned BASIC programs and make them faster without re-writing them into machine language? The programs are used at work and comprise a database, mini spreadsheet and invoice generator that shares data files with the database.

If someone knows of a programmer or company that could help me, I'd be willing to pay.

If the programs are in daily use at work and you are able to invest a little cash to tune them up, you could contact a little company on the Isle of White that specialises in compiling GW Basic programs into code. This may prove a tad expensive if you want to do every ten line wonder that you've ever written. For the commercially viable ones, a price range that starts at £35, shouldn't break the bank. HELP! Lost number

We bought a computer from a company in Wales called Ricard. It is an XT clone with a hard drive and the £500+ that we paid for it was a fair price. When we bought it, someone at Ricard told us about engraving software that was available from them. We've lost their phone number, but need to get in touch. Directory enquiries can't help. Can you?

HELP! Mono monitor

My Amiga is used for word processing as well as games. The Excellence WP program is fine and the printed output to a Star LC10 is OK, but I find that looking at a colour monitor in the intense way that word processing demands gives me headaches. I am going to need a mono monitor but before I buy one, I want to

know if a monitor from a closed circuit TV system will do. It is a Hitachi 14-inch black and white mono screen and was surplus to requirements when we installed a security net. It has a single screw type co-axial connector of the kind used on the antenna of radio transceivers. Will it work with the Amiga or will I need to buy the more common green or amber monitor?

The CCTV monitor that you have should work as a text monitor for the Amiga although only testing it with your machine will confirm whether it has the necessary clarity for applications software. The cable between the monitor and the computer can be made using a phono plug for the Amiga end, an antenna plug for the monitor end and a piece of low loss co-axial cable between them. The mono composite port on the back of the Amiga provides the necessary signal for the mono display.

We tried four CCTV monitors on the office Amiga and while all produced a picture, the differences in display quality were great. Two were crisp and sharp, one was of TV-like quality and one was unsteady and fuzzy. The components to make the lead will only cost a few pounds and even if your monitor is unsuitable, the lead should be able to be modified for any proprietary monitor that you buy.

If your monitor works, make a note of the model number and let us know in case anyone else writes in about the same piece of kit.



HELP! Fax line

British Telecom was its normal unhelpful self when we asked for a dedicated fax line. "Yes, it'll cost an arm and a leg plus VAT,"BT said "No, you mustn't take any notice of anyone who says that a fax will work on an ordinary line," they added.

I'm puzzled. When a local office supplier demonstrated a fax machine on a card in my PC, he used an existing phoneline that hadn't been supplied (at great cost) for fax use. The documents that he sent and received were clear and readable. He said that as we were on a digital exchange we didn't need a fax line. As there's a spare line anyway, is there any reason why we shouldn't use this for the PC fax instead of spending several hundred pounds at a time when the budget can't stand it.

The Express office fax is on an ordinary phone line and a straw poll of businesses that we have regular contact with confirmed that many firms don't bother with a dedicated fax line. Indeed, the voice fax switchers now on sale mean that a line can be automatically shared by voice and fax machines.

Whether Telecom has any small print that makes it a capital offence to put a fax on a voice line, I'm not sure, but the important thing to remember is, anything that you attach to the telephone network

must have the little green BABT approval sticker on it. If it hasn't there's a goodly chance that you will be dragged screaming into court for an egress of funds from your wallet.



TIP! Moneysaver

Over three years I upgraded my ailing XT clone to a 286, added memory, added VGA colour changed to the nice resilient 3.5-inch disks and bought every new product that could help my office DTP. Scanners, printers, software, the list goes on and on.

Over £6,500 was spent on the system and there was still a wide gulch between our best output and that of a profesional printer. The system went down on my secretary while I was on holiday and she had to get a DTP bureau to do the job on our presentation.

In one tenth of the normal time, they turned out a job ten times as good for £150. We are selling all our DTP stuff and leaving DTP to the experts. £150 is less than one third of what the job would have cost us in labour and resources.

HELP! CPC hard ones

There was a firm advertising a hard disk drive for an Amstrad CPC in the computer magazines. I have a 6128 (old style) and two external floppies

These are a 5.25-inch and 3.5-inch and both give me over 700K of storage (although to do this, I've had to disable the internal drive and connect the internal drive's lines to one of the external ones.

I've seen hard drives offered very cheaply at shows and fairs, but I've also read your advice about compatibility. Question: Can I simply adapt a hard disk bought cheaply at a show to work with a CPC. If I can't, is there any way of attaching more floppies to the CPC?

No, you can't simply weld a hard drive to a CPC. German company Vortex did it as has another German company recently. These are expensive beasts and although they work well, they are at best a compromise.

To add more drives to your CPC, you'll need to invoke some sort of switching. The main board of a CPC has only the logic for two drives and one silicon drive (RAM drive). In order to connect more drives, you need to have them physically switched so for instance you could have 4 (B) drives on a four way switch. You could only access one at a time but nonetheless, they'd be there. It's possible to make both drives switchable and at least one person has patched the Amstrad Amsdos-CP/M operating system and upside down Shugart interface to the Shugart interface of IBM high density 1.44Mb drives.

I'm sure a couple of 1.44Nb 3.5-inch floppies will give you a bit more kicking space than your existing ones.(and a damn sight more than the original single sided 178K drive.)



CHH FULLY FUNCTIONED

t may not always be convenient to define a function the first time you call it. The code for the function may be in another file that will be linked during compilation, or you may prefer to define all your procedures at the end of the main program, in a logical order. If you declare a prototype of the function, you can define the function itself wherever you find most convenient. The prototype tells the compiler how many and the type of argument the function has, so that the compiler can check later if the functions that you are calling are defined correctly. Thus you do not need to define them at that point, as the information can be cross-checked.

Using function prototypes can help you make sure that you call functions with the correct number of arguments, a frequent cause of difficult-to-find bugs. If you are using function overloading, you need a prototype for each definition.

A function prototype is simply the function header followed by a semi-colon. You have to list the types of the arguments and you can include names for them if you find this helpful. So the function prototype for the function string() could look like:

void string(int, char);

or

void string(int n, char ch);

Void means that the function does not return any value to the main program.

CHANGING THE ARGUMENT

Writing the function string as string() indicates rather different things in different versions of C and C++. In K&R C, the de facto standard that evolved before the ANSI standard, the empty brackets indicated that the function might return any number of arguments, but it was also used by some programmers to indicate that a function did not return any argument. To avoid confusion, in ANSI C this would be written string(void).

A function can take a fixed or variable number of parameters. In ANSI C, writing either string() or string(...) indicates that the function can take any number of arguments. In C++, string(void) and string(...) have the same meaning as in ANSI C, but string() once

WATCH YOUR LANGUAGE

C++ was developed in the early 80's and because it is such a modern language, the environments provided with implementations tend to be excellent, giving you editors, debuggers and other tools, including extensive libraries. Borland C++ for Windows, for example, provides class libraries that do much of the work of writing a Windows application.

A second look at C++ shows how it uses functions as the basis of object-oriented programming. Mary Branscombe makes light work of functions.

If you often use one particular value when calling a function, you don't have to write it into the function but you can specify that value in the function declaration as a default argument. This means you can use another value when necessary. If you give another value to the argument when you call the function, that will override the default, but if you do not, the default will be used.

INHERITANCE

Rather than writing these functions separately in one area of the program and naming them, the functions that can use particular items of data are associated with the classes and objects that store that data. A function that is a member of a class is defined within the class and objects that are examples of that class inherit the functions defined in the base class. If a more specific

class is needed, this can come from an existing class and can also inherit functions from its parent class.

If the accounts that customers can hold with a bank are defined in the hierarchy shown, then Account is the base class. Current-Account, Savings-Account, Tiered-Account and Combined-Account are all classes derived from Account and they inherit functions for updating the balance, making credits and debits and maintaining the account history from Account.

Inherited functions can be rewritten in the derived class if necessary. The Tiered-Account class will need a different way of updating the balance, because the interest rate depends on the previous balance. The Combined-Account class inherits functions from both the Savings-Account and the Current-Account classes: known as multiple inheritance.

One advantage of structuring data in this way is that it is easy to understand what each class represents. Classes are ideal if you want to define a component of a program and produce many copies of it. Also, each class represents a manageable chunk of code with a definite purpose. If you choose objects

carefully, you can reuse them: a class of objects that writes text or graphics to the screen can be used in many programs. This modularity makes code easier to maintain. Another advantage is data hiding. Each class has an interface to other classes through its public data and functions, but data that is not to be used outside the class is kept private. Unless you change the interface to a class, you can rewrite the code inside that class without making changes elsewhere in the program.

This approach treats a class as a "black box". If you know what the class does, you do not need to know how it does it to use the class; you can give it parameters and ignore the implementation of the class. If you define these interfaces carefully, this makes it easier to split a program up between several programmers.

STREAMS

Input and output in C++ are handled by streams, a simple and powerful notion first used in Unix. Data is input onto a stream at some point, whether this is the keyboard or a file, and the stream carries the data until it reaches the output, which may be the screen or another file. Unless you specify otherwise and open a file, input is from the keyboard and output is to the screen. The input stream is cin and the output is cout. Other streams are available: cerr carries error codes.

Data is moved on and off a stream using the operators << and >> respectively. More than one item of data can be put onto a stream. For example, this code outputs a message and collects two inputs:

/*declare variables*/

int i, j;

/*message to screen*/

cout << "please type two values:";

/*input from keyboard*/

cin >> i >> j;

Another new feature is that comments can have a different syntax: for a comment that only lasts one line, you can use //, so

//this is a comment.

NATIVE CODE

C++ was developed by Bjorne Stroustrup and it has been specified by an ANSI standard. Because C++ is an extension of C, the first implementation, Cfront, was built on top of an existing C compiler: the Cfront compiler took in C++ source code and produced C source code, which was then compiled by the C compiler. This two stage process is used by any implementation of the language which is based on Cfront.

New compilers, like those from Borland and Zortech, take C++ code and compile this into the machine code instructions native to the machine you are using. This is known as native code compilers. ■

space, but for this costly memory greed, you will have over 700 different font files, these alone taking up 5Mb.

The suite of programs is very flexible, and is limited only by your ability and understanding of an admittedly complex system. The documents are created by inputting a sequence of commands while you type.

The system could be likened to a kind of primitive BASIC, but is much easier to get to grips with. For example, to centre the title 'Grapes of Wrath', the necessary command would look this:

/title (Grapes of Wrath) /maketitle

And there you have it, a fully centred title, and the logical start to your document. The results are very clear, and once mastered, the control method is simple and logical.

The program is constantly updated, and has so many configurations. Mathematicians will find themselves

especially well catered for, with an enormous array of math specific characters and functions. Perhaps the most impressive thing about Tex, is the fact that the whole package, with add-on files and text fonts is entirely public domain, not even shareware.







hile Shopping Express is undoubtedly the perfect way to track down the best bargains in the computer world, many people are still, perhaps understandably, wary of buying products through mail order or through personal ads. This is mainly because you usually don't see what you are buying before you hand over your money. We do everything in our power at this end to make sure that all the advertisements we run are above board. But here are a few tips designed to take the risk out of buying through the post or over the phone.

- Be precise in describing what you want to buy. Leave no room for error. Feel free to go overboard in double checking details - make, model, specifications, colour, size, the page number and name of the magazine in which you saw the advertisement etc.
- Confirm the price you are supposed to be paying. If you are phoning a company check if there are any hidden extras, such as postage and packaging.
- Check how the item will be delivered to you and how long it should take. This is especially important with reader ads where delivery details are rarely mentioned.
- If you are writing off for the product keep copies of all letters. If you are phoning, note down details of when you phoned and who you spoke to.
- If possible enquire about guarantees and servicing. Check the supplier's policy on returns and refunds. With reader ads, it is probably best to make the effort to see the item personally before you hand over any
- It is best to to pay by credit card, especially for items over £100, as this provides extra cover under the credit card companies' own insurance schemes. Otherwise use a crossed cheque or postal order. Avoid sending cash at all costs. m

CIRCUIT CITY

You've found a bargain piece of kit, but can't figure out how to use it with your system? Keith Pomfret looks at how to add cheap surplus IBM drives to an Amiga and keep your peripheral purchase prices as low as possible.



bout 50 per cent of the mail that arrives on the Circuit City and Tech Tips bench is to do with old machines and bargains. Readers want to rip the re-usable bits from their dormant machines and give them a second life in an Amiga or ST.

We also get many letters from readers who have picked up a really cheap piece of kit. Your new hardware may look like a bargain, but until you've figured out how to connect it, it's scrap metal. We looked at some ways to add surplus IBM drives to an Amiga and how to power them.

DISK DRIVES



Slim line PC drives can find a new home in your Amiga.

The 3.5-inch disk drives from an IBM PC or clone are an attractive proposition to an Amiga owner. Proper Amiga disk drives can cost anything between around £60 and £120. With bare PC drives selling as cheaply as £15 at radio rallies, computer fairs and in the small ads, they seem like a bargain not to be missed.

The de facto standard for PC disk drives is becoming the 3.5-inch 1.44Mb high density disk. This means that all of the 720K PC drives are fast becoming defunct in PCs before their robust mechanisms have worn out.

So if all disk drives are created equal, it should be

SAFETY AND SECURITY

If you open up any kit that is still in warranty, your warranty is lost. If you open up anything using mains voltage you could kill yourself.

If you open up a power supply and kill yourself, don't come running to us for compensation. Electricity is very dangerous. If you don't know what you are doing you will end up fried. You are warned... a simple matter of inserting the PC drive on to the external drive connector of the Amiga. Unfortunately, all drives aren't created equal. The PC uses the slightly universal Shugart standard while the Amiga uses a standard of its own.

If you buy a PC 3.5-inch drive for £15, the chances are that it will be a bare drive removed from the PC's case. Unless you've a B2000 or a 1500 or some other beast with room to add internal drives, you'll need to case it. If you're using several peripherals and other power gobbling devices, your basic A500 won't be able to supply enough power for an extra drive so you may need either a more powerful power supply for the A500 or an internal power supply for the disk drive. once you've sorted that problem out, the Amiga/Shugart interface is your next problem. In order to persuade the Amiga hybrid Disk Operating System and Disk interface to work together, serious surgery is called for.

The simplest way to mate an Amiga with a PC drive is to build your own interface. There are several 'best ways' of doing this floating around in the public domain, so we took one that almost worked and asked Amiga technical supremo Paul Simpson (Simpson Electronics) to look over some of the attempts and produce a working version that could be easily assembled.

EASY TO WORK INTERFACE

Paul's Amiga PC/Drive interface is a re-work of earlier interfaces using components that are easy to source. A piece of stripboard was chosen as the simplest soldering media and the components list was a couple of logic chips, some wire and seven resistors.


A ring round a few electronic suppliers confirmed that the bits are indeed easy to source. Everywhere that we tried sold stripboard. The 74SL00 and 74L374 logic chips were priced between 75p and £1.50 depending on where you get them and the resistors were a common off-the-shelf article.

The diagram of the interface is for reference only and before you decide to build this interface, you should be aware of the following: the boxes with a single diagonal slash in them (/) are an indication of the position where the track on the stripboard must be cut. The strips run horizontally (that is left to right on the page). It's important to cut in the right places as the point of cutting tracks on stripboard is to be able to use the same track more than once.

A simple way to break the tracks is with a drill. Choose a bit that is slightly wider than the track to be cut, but not wide enough to cut other tracks. By gently 'drilling' the strip, you can break the tracks.

While we have made every effort to draw the inerface diagram as an accurate representation, we suggest that anyone wanting to build the interface contacts Paul Simpson for advice on the project. Paul can supply the parts and the know how to help you build the interface. Alternatives if you want to go ahead yourself without the recommended help, suppliers are Maplin or High Street store Tandy. Both should be able to supply the necessary bits and pieces.

As far as assembling the drive interface goes, it's not a difficult job. The two chips can be a bit fiddly

because their legs are close together and if you're not capable and careful with the solder you could get a live short. As well as that, chips don't like to be cooked so it's maybe a good idea to solder a pair of sockets to the stripboard and then place the chips into them. This gets rid of the danger of frying your chips (groan).

The Amiga side of the interface can be connected to multicore cable which in turn is connected to the Amiga drive connector. The PC side of the interface can be connected to the Shugart interface of the drive by whatever generic connector the drive has. If you're planning to use the Amiga power supply from the drive interface, you'll wire as appropriate.according to the diagram and the Amiga pin connections.

POWER UP

A dedicated power supply to add power for extra drives on your Amiga can be done one of two ways. Either a hunky external power supply for the Amiga that plugs into the Amiga's power supply connector or a drive only power supply that powers the drives direct. The more elegant way that needs less sockets is a replacement for the Amiga power supply. This may be a bigger job and cost more, but it will be more satisfactory.

The Commodore power supply offers a somewhat parsimonious 5v at two and a half amps and 12v at one amp so anything that greatly improves on this figure will do the biz. There's also a -12v line at 0.1 amps so make sure that any power supply you intend to use has this to. The connector from the Commodore power supply to the A500 is difficult to get so you'll probably have to utilise the one from your existing power supply.

If you decide to use a separate power supply for the drives, you'll need to connect it as specified in the diagram. If you buy a second-hand power supply, don't believe everything that you read on the label. Check that the power supply is giving the right voltages before you bolt it on to your expensive kit. A good multimeter will help you with this check.

HARDWARE REVIEW

ON THE FONTLINE

ompact, light and brimming over with fonts, Kyocera's F-800T is an extremely impressive machine for an entry level laser printer offering double the amount of typefaces you would normally expect to find on any comparable machine.

Weighing in at 17kg, the F800T has a reasonably small footprint area and would suit a small and busy office where space is scarce. While it is not exactly portable, neither is it one of those monsters under which all the biros become irrevocably lost because no-one can be bothered to move it.

In terms of speed and print quality the F-800T offers good, if not outstanding, service. It prints at eight pages a minute at 300 dots per inch, both of which are fairly average. However, where it does score is in terms of its versatility and compatibility. It can emulate seven different types of printer and is compatible with most of the popular word processing packages, but it is not PostScript compatible.


To be able to emulate all these formats it has an incredible 79 different fonts resident in its memory, an remarkable amount for a printer which retails for less than £1,500. Comparable machines price-wise will usually offer between 5 to 35 fonts.

The F-800T has six standard font families along with all their variations, such as bold and italics. Some major international characters sets are also included in certain emulation modes, including Danish, French German. This means you can print characters such as ä, é and ø.

QUIET QUALITY

Laser printers have two main advantages: the print standard is of high quality and they operate extremely quietly. A laser printer stores the document data it receives from the computer as a bit mapped image, that is, it decides whether a certain point on the page should be left white or printed black. A good quality laser printer, of which the F-800T is an example, will break down each square inch into 90,000 of these points and this will be expressed as 300 dots per inch (dpi). Laser beams then draw this image onto electrically charged toner particles on the printer's drum. The drum then rolls over a charged sheet of paper onto which the particles are attracted.

All this is much quieter than a clattering print head, and indeed the F-800T operates at very low 52 decibels, which is only slightly louder than the hum of a fridge. This is very useful in a busy office where a noisy printer would soon drive everybody mad.

DESIGN YOUR OWN

It also offers three fonts which the company terms 'dynamic outline fonts'. These let you design your own typestyles using the range's own printer command language, Prescribe. From your computer you can take one of these fonts and compress, stretch, reduce or enlarge it. It's a pity that you cannot do much more than this and create some really outlandish typefaces, but it is quite useful for more formal posters and document headings.

Another useful feature of the F-800T is that it can print out bar codes. It offers 39 bar code formats as standard and using Prescribe they can be doctored to suit individual needs.

Where the F-800T does score is in its versatility and compatibility.

One feature of the whole Kyocera range of printers is the IC cards for storing documents, graphics and logos. These are credit card-sized slices of plastic which slot into the printers and save the need for complex downloading from the computer. A nifty idea, but with two drawbacks. First, the cards stick rather a long way out of the printer when in use and can be easily knocked about. The major problem, though, is the price

 the IC card Reader Writer kit costs a further £236 with individual cards costing £36 each. Perhaps it would be better to endure complex downloading.

The printer can handle paper, labels, overhead projector sheets and envelopes, but unfortunately cannot handle anything over A4 size or continuous stationery which is a bit limiting. However, the paper feed tray can take up to 150 sheets at a time. The company reckons the toner should last 4,000 sheets, which means that you should not be changing cassettes every few days.

COMMON FAULTS

The main drawbacks of the F-800T are ones you will encounter with most low end printers. It is not supplied with sufficient RAM as standard; 512K just about copes with plain text documents, but once graphics of any kind are added you soon run out of memory, so you will probably find that you will have to buy a RAM expansion. Also, no printer cable is supplied, which is very annoying, and means that if you (reasonably) assumed that there would be one included, then you will not be able to set it up straight away.

At £1,350 the F-800T is incredible value considering the amount of fonts and features it offers. In terms of non-PostScript compatible printers it is definitely one of the most competitively priced laser printers around. Kyocera can be contacted on 0734 311500. ■

This means that word processing

and graphics software compatible with any of these printers, such as Lotus, MS-Word and Wordperfect, will also work with the F-800T so long as it has been set to the correct printer emulation for the word processor you are using.

However, there are some differences in the F-800T's emulations. It cannot print on paper larger than its A4 cassette, so continuous stationery and wide forms are ruled out. Also, proportionately spaced text which has been right justified on the word processor, might not have a straight edge on the print-out. Some fonts are not duplicated exactly, but in the case of dot-matrixed fonts, the laser printer emulation can be preferable.



What an odd title. And what odd prices. Thanks, Norman. And thank you Demonware, for Gem'X is considerably more entertaining than 17.5 per cent VAT. My name's Penn Elton, good night.

Gem'X is, loosely speaking, what seems to be generally described as an arcade puzzler - a sort of thinking man's arcade game really. However, it doesn't fall into the same category as that classic Soviet invention Tetris which is more concerned with hand-eye co-ordination than solving any form of puzzle. Come to think of it, Tetris isn't actually that far removed from Space Invaders.

Anyway, back to the game in question. Gem'X is all about arrangements of gems. The idea is simply to rearrange a collection of gems presented on the left-hand side of the screen so that it matches the arrangement on the right. The catch, of course, is the way in which this has to be achieved.

The gems are like the Royal Family in that they have erarchical structure. Unlike the Queen and her kin however, a gem's importance is determined by its colour. At the top of the tree is Red, followed by Green then Blue then Purple and finally Yellow.

When you touch a gem in a special way (via a handshaped pointer, actually) it's demoted two colours down the scale - so a red gem would turn blue. There's more; any gems horizontally and vertically adjacent to the molested gem are also demoted, but by one colour. So what happens to purple and yellow gems when they are touched you may ask? They disappear and the force of

gravity plays its part.

There are over 400 such screens in Gem'X. And that's about the size of it, so to speak. However, to add a bit of spice there is a liberal sprinkling of titillating imagery and saucy sampled speech from a hostess of Japanese cum European persuasion called Kiki. And it goes further. Rewards in Gem'X come in the form of crude pictures of naked gals - that's to say, the pictures are crudely drawn.

There's nothing too tasteless, really. Even Kiki's speech is tame. She does little more than gasp and sniff occasionally, apart from when she's proclaiming, "I love you!" when you start and, "Good luck!" before every level. She also cries "You made it!" and "Oh no!" on the

It's a bit of a bugger trying to get your head around the concept of Gem'X at first, especially with the time limit running out all too often. Once you get into the swing of things, though, it becomes difficult to leave game alone. And with all those naked girls Gem'X is guaranteed to break the ice at parties.





LEARNER DRIVERS

Fancy an alternative to the business management seminar? Tim Smith looks at seven pieces of software which turn your PC into an interactive learning centre.

omputer-Reinforced Education is the name of a suite of programs aimed at the PC user in the business world. The seven packs we are reviewing here deal with topics as diverse as How to master bookkeeping through to How to deal with other people via An introduction to banking and money.

Essentially, the format of each unit is the same regardless of subject matter. What you get inside your smart blue box are two 5.25-inch disks, a single 720K 3.5-inch disk, a quick start guide and a warranty which to quote: "... insures your lvy product against spilt coffee, children with scissors and hot sun on car seats ...". The look of the whole package is confidence inspiring and professional. With all of these basics comes a manual, or 'reference text' as it is called, supplied to be used along with the on-screen activity.

So, with How To Master BookKeeping Part 1, the manual deals with the details of concepts such as 'Prudence' (this states that profits should not be anticipated, but should only be recognised when realised), Double Entry accounting, and the bought-day book.

There are case studies which are used later in the computer element of the system. Most importantly for anyone new to the matter in hand, diagrams and chapter summaries are also included.

Each package is credited to a qualified author; bookkeeping to Henry Lunt B.Com, FCA; Fundamentals

The look of the whole package is confidence inspiring and professional

of Marketing is to Harbridge Consulting Group, thus specialist attention has been paid to each subject.

The computer-related section of the program is graphically a hit and miss affair. The graphics, when they are used, bear resemblance to LS Lowry with a Spectrum. This is only really apparent when the normal run of primary coloured windows which flash up to present a point, is interrupted by representations of men. Sound isn't a matter for consideration, there isn't any.

Each of the packs comes with a 'pre-test' of multiple choice questions. If you have read the reference text before embarking on the interactivity then this is normally a breeze. Once you've completed this, and written down your score, you are taken through a number of 'Chapters' which once again draw on the reference material and tend to repeat the pre-test questions. Finally there is a test, which is in effect the pre-test once again. Screen dumping of information is achievable via the SHIFT+PRT SCRN key combination.

Talking of keypresses, that's your interactive. If you have a mouse forget about it, you won't need it. Aside from entering answers to the multiple choice questions, movement through the modules is achieved via the space bar, and END or ENTER keys. It would certainly be an advantage to build-in mouse compatibilty, and maybe even some 'hot spots' on screen.

Generally, all of the packages achieve their aimsto present bite-sized chunks of information in a clear
style. Everything is professionally presented - save for
those stick-people - and deals with its subject matter in
a mature manner. The PC is kept as user friendly as
possible, even if the 386 we used was under-used in
terms of processing power, sound and graphics.



This package deals with a grey area of business and succeeds in clawing a few decent guidelines. Once again it is pitched firmly at the management strata. Questions

are set and answered and the user is taken through with diagrams and summaries. The tests are once again simple if you have paid attention to the reference text this in itself must suggest that learning is actually achieved.

INTRODUCTION TO BANKING AND MONEY



This one relies far more on the computer element than it does the reference text. Here we see the use of stick-man graphics which takes you through the evolution of the European financial system. The feel of the whole thing is of a comprehensive school economics class. It may well be of use as a beginner's course for students but as a business system it is rather too simple.

UNDERSTANDING THE PROFIT AND LOSS ACCOUNT AND THE BALANCE SHEET

Good down-to-earth information presented in a clear style. This package takes you through aspects such as Accounting Entities, Shareholders funds, and Operating Profits among a heap of other highly relevant data. There are plenty of clear diagrams rather than blocks of text. One rather doubtful element is that no author is credited here.



ARCHIMEDES (DESKTOP)



The Arc is a fabulous machine, although its singular lack of success in the same fields as its nearest competitor the Amiga is almost certainly down to its lack of software support. The GUI on the Arc is called simply Desktop and it is a very fast multi-tasking environment. Fast is too small a word for it perhaps. Everything on the Arc is fast, and that is down to the ARM 3 RISC (Restricted Instruction Set Chip) processor which cuts down instructions for extra speed.


Its tremendous speed allows scalable fonts to be drawn to the screen in real time and that is very fast, considering the amount of calculations going into it. The one thing about the Arc is that the on screen fonts are stunning and this is achieved by skilful antialiasing. A pixel of mid grey is placed in all the jaggies on the curves of a letter, making it much smoother to look at and matching the kind of output you can get on the printer. Desktop is the fastest GUI around and one of the most friendly. But the lack of a really good range of multi-tasking software is holding it back.

PC (ENSEMBLE)



This is a new low end GUI for any flavour of PC written by the team which brought the GEOS GUI to the C64. This was one of the best selling programs on the C64 and it was a very flexible and usable system, considering what it was running on and how little you had in the way of memory to support it. Although not in wide use as yet, this looks like it might carve a little niche for itself at the bottom end of the scale.

Although not much software exists for this GUI yet, Geoworks has started you off with a suite of extremely well written programs that come with it.

Geowrite, GeoDraw and GeoPlanner come free with the Ensemble package, and very slick they are too. The Apple Mac did this to begin with and survived a long time after the freebie packages went. A strong start, but it remains to be seen if anyone picks up the ball.

KING OF THE WINPS

The graphic user interface or GUI is now the rule rather than the exception it once was. Neil Davey offers a personal view of the strengths and weaknesses of today's desktops.

hen I first started using computers dinosaurs ruled the Earth, at least the things I was computing on were dinosaurs. Huge cabinets with whirring tape drives and hard disks that looked like a cross between a fridge and a juke box. As well as looking like a dinosaur, they talked like cavemen, short commands typed into a command line interface which only a few people were privy to, a private language. Working with these computers was like sucking porridge through a straw, and about as much fun.

It's a wonder that any computing got done at all in those days, as you had to type everything onto cards before you could add anything to the machine, and programs were written on to punched paper tape. Using a computer was something the man on the street wouldn't even think about, due to the amount of things you had to know before you could do it.


AT THE FRONT END

Then at Xerox Palo Alto they created something they called a Graphic User Interface or GUI, something which they thought may or may not see the light of day. These were called Front Ends, as they were a graphical interface over the top of the operating system, which

enabled the user to control all the functions of the system without any laborious typing. Using a little puck or mouse, the user moved a pointer or arrow around the screen, and clicked on icons or pictures representing the programs on the computer's disk. This was called a Windows Icons Mouse and Pointers interface, or a WIMP, and this style of interface is the predominant method of accessing computers in the 90s. So much for never seeing the light of day.

Firstly Apple Computers adapted the idea and used it, first in the Lisa and then later and more successfully in the Apple Macintosh. The Mac has gone from being a quirky cult machine to being something of an industry standard, if the industry you're talking about is publishing. The Apple WIMP really caught on, so it seemed only natural that when the new 16-bit computers were being designed that they too should feature a WIMP of some kind. Some of the first efforts were on the PC and Atari ST, which for a time shared Digital Research's GEM system. The PC added it on disk, whereas the ST had GEM as part of its code on the chips. Following the success of the ST, Commodore decided on a WIMP interface for the new Amiga, and sure enough when the Amiga came out it had a GUI called Workbench.

PC (WINDOWS 3)



Version 3 of Windows caused such a stir when it came out, that most of the people I know who usually asked me if I'd seen such and such a game asked "Have you tried Windows 3 yet?" It has that effect on people. Once you've used it, you can't live without it. MicroSoft sold 1.3 million copies of it in just seven months, and this must make it one of the best selling GUIs of all time. I think the only people it doesn't affect quite so strongly

are those used to Mac or Amiga GUIs.

Windows can multi-task, after a fashion at least, and it is fast. But, this is mostly due to the fact it only runs on 286 and 386 machines. You can customise the interface, with backdrop pictures being the favourite racing stripe. These are pictures which replace the standard backdrop against which all the icons sit.

Windows is very simple to use, and very stable too. It doesn't go wrong very often, even if you try to trip it up. The only real drawback to Windows, and it shares this with GEM, is that it isn't quite as free and easy with the placement of icons. Instead of being like a real desktop where you can shuffle stuff around wherever you like, it tends to be a bit like an inflexible graphic representation of directories and files.

THE BEST OF THE BUNCH

But the PC needed a reliable WIMP interface in answer to all these best selling WIMPs, and so PC standards maker MicroSoft was charged with the task of producing an industrial strength GUI that would be stable, easy to use and most of all an industry standard. It delivered that with Windows.

Although UNIX has been around for some time (in fact about the same time as the C language since that is what UNIX was written in) it lacked a GUI until comparatively recently. X Windows is the industry standard, and it is available on anything from a DEC VAX, through UNIX PCs all the way to the Amiga 2000UX and 3500UX machines.

WHICH IS THE BEST?

It seems that today everyone needs a GUI for their computer, and they've got them. But which of them is the best? In choosing our King Of The WIMPs, we had to decide on some categories to classify them, and so we have ease of use, speed, design, degree of multitasking and customising. The last one is the degree to which you can make the WIMP your own by altering the default settings.


There are more and GUIs appearing every day, with each claiming to be the best. Sooner or later some will fall by the wayside, and I'd put my money on the Mac, Amiga and UNIX with X Windows systems as being the fittest to survive.

NeXT (UNIX)

The UNIX environment supports a wide variety of standards, although at least in the UNIX forum some effort is being made to standardise. But with so many manufacturers involved it's likely that some differences will creep in. The main differences are between the GUIs that systems use. Commodore has plumped for System V and X Windows on its Amiga UX series, as does Sun Systems. UNIX GUIs will always have some degree of multi-tasking, as UNIX was designed from the start as a multi-tasking OS, although there are precious little programs that take full advantage of X Windows as yet. Most of the ones that do exist are just common PC programs ported across to the UNIX environment.

Steve Jobs' NeXT uses a GUI called Workspace Manager, incorporating a thing called Display PostScript which basically interprets Adobe's PostScript and prints it to the screen. Very flash, very fast, but very expensive and about as portable as a pigmy hippo. Being Steve Jobs' baby of course, the GUI, scored below, has much in common with the Mac, and this reflects the fact that most of the design team were ex-Apple techies.

And finally Acorn has its own UNIX baby in the shape of the R140, which uses X.Desktop written by IXI. This was rumoured to be the GUI for the NeXT machines, but was pipped at the post by Workspace. X.Desktop interfaces with RISCOS in the same way as Desktop on a




normal Arc. It provides a front end to the system, but still uses the same DOS style file trees etc, meaning it is more of a graphical representation of the normal file structure rather than the more freeform methods used on the Mac and Amiga.

AMIGA (WORKBENCH)



The Workbench was programmed by Commodore to be as little like the Mac interface as possible, and yet have the same level of usability. Commodore has recently backtracked and put back a lot of features to make it more Mac-like with Workbench 2.0.


The system works on a two button mouse, one for selecting and clicking, and the other one for revealing menus. Workbench is one of the very few front ends for a small computer that was intended to be multitasking from the very start. It's very rare that programs take over the machine completely, and so all programs you buy will happily multi-task with others, provided of course you have enough memory. Workbench has its faults, but it is very keen to be customised. The colours of the Workbench can be altered and so the icons with very little problem, something which is a real pain in the bum on most other GUIs.

Workbench 2.0 has a lot in common with the Mac's Desktop, with the ability to drag a box around a group of icons to select them all, and a new drawer menu item, saving you having to copy the empty drawer all the time.

ST (GEM)



By far the ugliest of the WIMPs. It's slow, has garish colours which you can't alter and on the ST it is quite hard to use. Most of this is down to the standard ST mouse, which is very spongy. But this can be fixed by using a replacement like the Naksha.

Using the menus is a very hit and miss affair, as you just push the mouse up to the top bar and the menus plop down. This often happens by accident and getting yourself disentangled from the menu you've picked up can waste a few seconds and distract you at the crucial moment. The system uses a two button mouse, although most of the actual clicking is done with the left one.


The system wasn't designed with multi-tasking in mind and so there isn't any at all, which cuts down any chance of doing anything else while the computer is printing, formatting disks or checking directories.

Basically the design is a washout and is an example of old style thinking which has somehow survived into the 90s.

MACINTOSH(SYSTEM)



The first really popular GUI and in fact still one of the most clued up. System 7 has just been released and it makes the first major improvements to the system since it was introduced in 1983-84. The strength of the Mac system is that like the Amiga's Intuition routines, a lot of the drawing of windows and stuff has been programmed into the system with special fast.

System 7, not unlike the Amiga's Workbench 2.0, looks 3D, with all the little on-screen buttons and windows drawn in colour and in bas relief. This doesn't show up on mono systems, but than again if you have a mono system you don't get many of the benefits of recent systems. Multi-tasking is OK, as most Macs are multi-tasking anyway, it's just that the software hasn't been written to support it. MIDI manager, for example, is a recent addition which enables you to play MIDI tunes and work on another program at the same time. Why you would want to is dubious, but you can do it.

It's still as hard to customise a Mac system as it ever was, usually having to resort to dodgy (and highly crashy) system level PD utilities to do so.

he Epson Equity LT has 640K of memory, a backlit LCD screen, a 720K floppy disk and a 20Mb hard disk. The Equity's distributor is UK Home Computers and boss Ron Gladwin said: "We're offering what people want - a hard drive laptop. But our price is one that they can afford."

It is possible to add an external 5.25-inch drive and the floppy disk controller can handle two floppies of either size. The hard disk controller card is generic to the internal drive.

INTERFACES

Printers are reached by a standard 8-bit parallel port conforming to 25D female configuration. As this port is also used for an external disk drive, it can be used either as a printer or disk drive unless a splitter box is fitted.


