BMW's Disk Charts Reflect Strong Yuletide Buying Trend

NEW YORK — The sharp increase in record sales across the country this month is strongly reflected on BMW's best selling monaural and stereo album charts this week. The same was true of singles sales.

Both LP charts show unusual action, with 11 LP's moving onto the monaural chart and seven LP's jumping on the stereo list for the first time.

Christmas packages dominated the new entries on both charts. Five Christmas albums (Johnny Mathis' "Merry Christmas," Leontyne Price's "A Christmas Offering," Mantovani's "Christmas Music," Bing Crosby's "Merry Christmas," and the late Mario Lanza's "Lanza Sings Christmas Carols"), hopped on the monaural chart and two (the Crosby package and Ray Conniff's "Christmas With Conniff") on the stereo list. Also showing some sales strength, although not yet in the "New Action LP" group, are the monaural versions of "Christmas With the Lennon Sisters" and the Mormon Tabernacle Choir's "Spirit of Christmas."

Pianos & Twist

Pianists and the Twist are the strongest trends evidenced by this week's album charts. Four piano albums (Ferrante and Teicher's "Love Themes," George Greeley's "Popular Piano Concertos of Famous Film Themes," Van Cliburn's "My Favorite Chopin" and Dave Brubeck's "Time Further Out") are "New Action" monaural LP's and two Ferrante and Teicher packages ("Love Themes" and "West Side Story") moved on the stereo chart for the first time.

The Venture's "Twist" LP also

listed as a "New Action" monaural LP; while Ray Charles' "Do the Twist" and Twist star Chubby Checker's new album with Bobby Rydell jumped on the monaural chart for the first time. There are now six "Twist" packages on the chart—four of them by Checker, who has five packages on the best seller list in all.

Original cast Broadway show albums, always a popular holiday gift item, moved out briskly last week. Alfredy Drake's "Kean" is a "New Action" monaural LP. "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" moved on the stereo chart for the first time

this week and jumped from No. 47 to 25 on the monaural chart. Other new original cast albums on the monaural chart this week are "Milk and Honey" No. 18; and "Sail Away" No. 42.

As for Singles

The singles business, sparked by the Christmas impetus, was holding up well in most areas. Such perennials as the Chipmunks, Bing Crosby, and such songs as "Rudolph" displayed their lasting vigor as they bounced back into sales contention. In addition, several new Christmas singles scored well (see separate story).

N. Y. Xmas Buying Wave Carries Old, New Sides

NEW YORK—The New York market had a lot of activity last week. Four new records, which hit the "Hot 100," were moving well. They were: Lee Dorsey's new releases on Fury, "Do-Remi"; the new Bill Black record of "Twist Her" on Hi; the Shirelles waxing of "Baby It's You" on Scepter, and "Seven Day Fool," the flip side of Etta James hit "It's Too Soon to Know."

Frank Sinatra's "A Pocketful of Miracles," which was a breakout last week, is continuing to get strong action in this town according to dealers checked. All of the Christmas singles that were so strong last week, including Bing Crosby's "White Christmas," "Jingle Bell Rock" by Bobby Helms, and another version by Bobby Rydell and Chubby Checker; "Dear Gesu Bambino," and

Brenda Lee's "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree" are all selling well.

In fact, dealers appear to be moving many Christmas records that are leftovers from other years. "White Christmas" by the Drifters, and Gene Autry's "Rudolph" are selling, as is the Chipmunks' version of "Rudolph." Two other nice Christmas sellers here are James Brown's "Please Come Home for Christmas" and Chuck Berry's "Merry Christmas Baby."

A number of dealers mentioned renewed action on an old hit by the Isley Brothers on Victor, "Shout." Although this record, like many other old rock and roll hits, has never stopped selling, its action over the past few weeks has been extra heavy.

PATTI HITS BEER CITY

MILWAUKEE — Business was strong here last week but new material was taking a back seat to the better-known tunes already established on the national charts.

Patti Page's "Go On Home" is the only new single that broke out. The tune also took off in Minneapolis this week and was receiving some interest (but as yet no sales) with Chicago dealers.

Strong Christmas sellers were: "Baby's First Christmas," Connie Francis; "Jingle Bell Rock," Rydell and Checker; "A Kiss For Christmas," Joe Dowell; "Little Drummer Boy," Harry Simeon Chorale, and "White Christmas" with Bob Hope's golfing partner.

Big sellers in the non-holiday category were: "Flying Circle," Frank Slay; "Let's Go Tripping," Dick Dale; "Little Altar Boy," Vic Dana; "Nein Nein Fraulein" by Cathy Carr (broke in Minneapolis last week but has been doing well here for quite a while); "Small Sad Sam," Phil McLean; "Trade Winds," Aki Aleong, and "The Wanderer," by Dion.

Mpls.: 'Kiss' & 'Jose'

MINNEAPOLIS—Two records broke out here last week—"A Kiss on Christmas" by Joe Dowell on Smash and "Happy Jose" by Jack Ross on Dot. Several strong Christmas singles got solid action.

Chet Atkins' "Jingle Bell Rock" started to move, joining the Bobby Helm and Rydell and Checker versions. Other big holiday sellers included "Baby's First Christmas," Connie Francis; "Little Drummer Boy," Harry Simeon Chorale; "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree," Brenda Lee, and, of course, "White Christmas" by you know who.

Several new tunes in the non-holiday category also were selling strongly. Hottest is Burl Ives' "Little Bitty Tear."

Last Week

The Ives tune broke in the Windy City last week and is now starting to get strong action up here. Minneapolis' big hit-playing

WL0L also picked the tune as one of its "Big Five of the Future" last week.

Other hot, new chart items include "Multiplication" by Bobby Darin, "Go On Home," by Patti Page; "Twist-Her," Bill Black, and "Waltz You Saved for Me," Ferlin Husky.

Several disk artists are in town and this stimulates the record business in general. Cathy Carr made the radio station and dealer rounds promoting her latest "Nein Nein Fraulein."

Sinatra

Frank Sinatra's new "Pocketful of Miracles" is being picked as a tune to watch by both WL0L and WCCO.

Up in Fargo, N. D., KXGO's Ron Clark is getting some action on a local product that Clark feels has potential: Myron Lee on "Peter Rabbit" b-w "A Fella Needs a Girl." Lee is from Sioux Falls, S. D.

BROADWAY MOVES TO B'CASTERS AS KEY TO CAST, ALBUM EXPOSURE

Stars, Producers, Composers and Companies Seeking
Broad Radio, TV Coverage to Push Ticket, Disk Sales

By JUNE BUNDY

NEW YORK — The Broadway musical theater is becoming increasingly dependent upon the broadcasting industry as its key promotional outlet. The development coincides with the closer alliance between the legit musical scene and the recording industry. Composers, casts and producers of this season's new Broadway shows are going all out to garner exposure on local and network TV and radio programs to plug their respective shows and original-cast albums.

The most interesting aspect of the drives are the degree to which composers themselves are participating in the campaign. For example, Arthur Schwartz, (who clefted "The Gay Life" with Howard Dietz) has been making the rounds of New York radio and TV shows, working closely with Capitol Records promotion men to push the label's original cast album of the show.

Schwartz will personally warble five "Gay Life" tunes this Tuesday (19) when he appears on Westinghouse Broadcasting's syndicated "PM East," which is carried here by WNEW-TV. Also appearing on the show will be "Gay Life" performers Jeanne Bal and Elizabeth Allen. Following the "PM East" date, Schwartz planes to Detroit, where he will stage a similar radio-TV campaign in co-operation with Capitol's Detroit branch promotion men. "The Gay Life" opened Detroit's new Fisher Theater during its out-of-town try-outs and the town is considered a particularly good sales bet for the original-caster. Among other N. Y. shows Schwartz guested on were Joe Franklin's WABC-TV; Arlene Francis' WOR; and NBC-TV's "Today."

"The Gay Life" also garnered national exposure last Sunday (17)

when its stars, Barbara Cook and Walter Chiari, and featured player Elizabeth Allen appeared in two elaborate production numbers from the show on Ed Sullivan's CBS-TV seg. Sullivan's program is a much-sought after exposure outlet for Broadway hits these days, in contrast to the time not too long ago when producers believed "giving it away" on TV was only permissible when a show was a flop.

Push for 'Kwamina'

Although "Kwamina" folded on Broadway a few weeks after it opened last month, its composer Dick Adler has hired promotion man Danny Winchell to help push Capitol's original-cast album of the show. Both Adler and the show's star, his wife, Sally Anne Howes, have been making the rounds of radio and TV shows to plug the LP.

Miss Howes pulled a real coup a couple of weeks ago when she guested on Jack Paar's NBC-TV program (after the show had folded) and sang two numbers from the musical. Paar also gave the "Kwamina" album a big send-off and has since had Miss Howes back for additional appearances. Her next Paar date is December 21.

In addition to its original-cast album of "How to Succeed," RCA Victor is also to get video exposure for its original-cast package, "Milk and Honey." The show's stars, Robert Weede, Molly Picon, Mimi Benzell and Tommy Rall, have made several TV appearances.

Weede and Miss Picon are set to guest on WCBS-TV's "American Musical Theater" later this month.

Even Broadway's No. 1 hit "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying," is in the race to garner TV exposure. The show's star, Robert Morse, has guested on the Paar telecast, and both he and co-star Rudy Valley have guested on other video shows since the opening. Prior to the opening, director Abe Burrows played and sang tunes from "How to Succeed" on "PM East" along with material from other musicals he has been associated with through the years.

Prime Exposure

Although "PM East" is only syndicated in 11 markets, Broadway producers and record manufacturers consider it a potent plug because all its markets are key cities where original-cast album sales are strongest and people are more Broadway show-minded.

Consequently, Broadway stars and composers not only appear on the program, but also perform for scale. For example, a couple of weeks ago, Elaine Stritch of "Sail Away," Alfred Drake of "Kean," and "Let It Ride" (which has since folded) co-stars George Gobel and Sam Levine were all featured on the same show. Miss Stritch, Gobel and Levine gave live renditions of their respective show scores. Drake was heard, via Columbia's original-cast album, while a montage of still-photos from the musical were shown on the screen. RCA Victor's

GEMA to Press Royalty Payment Fight With AFN

MUNICH—GEMA, the German performing rights organization, is pressing the West German Defense Ministry to ante up royalties for music played by the U. S. military radio network in West Germany.

It had been assumed that GEMA would drop its demands against the Armed Forces Network (AFN) in the wake of an unfavorable court decision.

However, the GEMA board chairman, Dr. Erich Schulze, has just served notice that GEMA has conceded nothing in its demands on the U. S. military, but is merely switching its tactics.

Dr. Schulze, in a statement to Billboard Music Week, scotched the notion that the German court's ruling quashed GEMA's claim. On the contrary, Dr. Schulze claims the court decision affects only the matter of procedure—and not substance.

GEMA's board chairman suggested that his organization is fighting the military network primarily on behalf of ASCAP, the U. S. copyright society with which GEMA has a co-operative arrangement, GEMA collecting royalties for ASCAP in West Germany and vice versa.

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German Gift Idea: Give a Juke Box

DUESSELDORF, W. Germany—A juke box is this season's Christmas gift for the Ruhr tycoon who "has everything."

A record number of phonographs are being sold to private owners, the overwhelming majority in the "castle set." It is not unusual for some German industrialist juke box fanciers to have two or three—perhaps as many as five—juke boxes.

A Ruhr distributor disclosed, "The German tycoon has developed into a great new potential juke box market. The tycoons—at least those in the Ruhr—love juke boxes.

"You can sell one for dancing in his villa, another for the game room, and perhaps two or three for his castle or hunting lodge in Bavaria."

A distributor in Essen added, "None of my tycoon clients will let me talk about it, but I am finding them a terrific market for juke boxes as a Christmas gift gimmick.

"Some of these families have so much money they literally have everything else. Now they have discovered the juke box and are taking to it like mad. Most of these families have three or four cars in their garages, so it's nothing for them to buy a half dozen juke boxes at a crack to play around their various homes and holiday hideaway."

A favorite pastime with some tycoons is "face-lifting" juke boxes. One tycoon reportedly—although this account may be apocryphal—replaced his box's chrome with gold and altered the housing to resemble a music box (boudoir variety). He then presented it to his wife.

PUBLIC'S CHOICE

Jockeys Feel New Twisters Not Teens

NEW YORK—Record manufacturers and disk jockeys may find the answer to lagging singles and the decline of lessening enthusiasm for pop disk shows in the current rage for the Twist, according to veteran deejay Buddy Deane, WJZ-TV, Baltimore.

There is "powerful verification," opines Deane "that great portions of the public currently accepting

the dance as a 'new' innovation are not those who are the normal everyday record buyers influenced by radio and TV disk jockeys or automatic coin machines. These are not the people we have come to commonly accept as the backbone for record sales. Rather, these are adults, or least, sophisticated and ultra-conservative teen-agers, virtually untapped previously as potential customers for pop record sales or as audiences for disk jockey programs."

"This I firmly believe," continues the jock "points to a tremendous but unrecognized buying audience for pop records which all of us are ignoring in our normal attempts to reach what we have referred to as the 'great mass'."

Passé to Teens

Looking back two years ago (when Chubby Checker's recording of "The Twist" was a hit with teen-buyers and last year when his

NEW YORK — The Big Three Music Corporation has lined up six records on the title song from the new picture "Tender Is the Night" and has set a major exploitation drive on the song. Artists who have waxed the tune include Tony Bennett, Clebanoff Strings, Vic Damone, Earl Grant, Gogi Grant, and George Greeley. Earl Grant plays a chorus of the tune in the picture as well as performing another tune, "Honey."

Firm is also making special mailings on the tune to deejays, and sending out head scarves for deejay's spouses to help promote the song.

No Adjudication In Suit Between Rose & Everlys

NASHVILLE—No adjudication has occurred in a breach of contract suit recently lodged by Wesley Rose against Don and Phil Everly. A story in BMW (December 11 issue) erroneously indicated a decision in the suit in favor of the brothers.

According to a statement made to Rose by his attorney, Barksdale and Hudgins of Nashville, "The lawsuit is still in progress and the parties are in the process of taking testimony for the trial of the case. It has not been decided or adjudicated by the court nor has any decision been reached by the court as to your (Rose's) claim that you are still their personal manager."

It was also brought out by counsel to Rose that a recent withdrawal of funds from an Everlys savings account which required Rose's counter-signature, was done with his agreement and not under any order of the court, as had been indicated by the earlier story.

Graveyard Ops Are Victors in Disk Price War

PHILADELPHIA — Stories of colorful goings-on during the recent Gimbels-Korvette price war continue to be heard here in the wake of bitter pricing contests. One of these concerns two graveyard operators who pulled off a quick profit coup through patience and clear thinking.

Each of the operators hooked up with three other individuals to form two buying teams. The teams then invaded both Gimbels and Korvette's. Since, for a time, the stores allowed only one copy of an album per person, the individuals on each team bought one album at a time, took it outside and returned in a few minutes to buy another. Mitch Miller albums were the focal point of the frenzied buying action.

In all, more than 800 Miller albums were purchased by the buyers through repeated trips inside each store. The sets were bought for \$1.39 or less. The albums were then taken to a rack jobber a couple of blocks away and sold for \$1.90, for a total profit of close to \$400.

READER'S DIGEST TESTING DOOR-TO-DOOR DISK PLAN

NEW YORK—Reader's Digest Music, Inc., agent for the RCA Victor Records Clubs is pilot-testing a door-to-door sales campaign involving a stereo phonograph and a package of stereo albums. This was confirmed last week by A. L. Cole, general manager of the Reader's Digest, who pointed out that the campaign, at this point, could be regarded as experimental.

Many executives in the record industry, of course, feel that the anticipated potential of stereo has never been realized; that stereo sales have not achieved the expected peak. Cole stated that the Digest was anxious to broaden the base of stereo sales by familiarizing more people with this relatively new musical experience.

"We, of course, are interested in records, but this campaign could help phono manufacturers, record manufacturers and consumers," he stated.

The executive added that the price of the phono-record package was also experimental—depending upon the number of records. The price ranged, he said, from \$220 to \$290.

It is understood that the package, which has been previously tested in Canada, is now being tested in New York, among other areas.

The Columbia Record Club has had a stereo record and phonograph package special offer for members since the fall of the year. The Columbia deal offered members 15 stereo records plus a stereo phono, and a 200-record rack, for \$179.95. The deal is available on a time payment plan, with \$9.95 down and 20 payments of \$9.35 per month.

Dealers Will Build Volume by Going Where the Shopping Traffic Goes

CORAL GABLES, Fla.—The small, independent dealer who uses his brains can still make it in the record business, according to Mike Spector, former president of the Society of Record Dealers of America, and proprietor of Spec's Records here.

Spector, commenting on a story in last week's BMI regarding distributor take-over of retail record shops in various areas, agreed that one reason for this is the increased activity of out-of-town suppliers of records to chain and discount operations in the big shopping center locations. This has contributed to a loss of accounts for the local distributor who feels he can fight back only by operating his own retail outlets.

According to Spector, however, this very situation offers a major opportunity to the indie dealer if he will simply "wise up to the situation." Says Spector: "It isn't even discounting that's killing the small dealer so much today. Let's face it, almost everybody discounts to a greater or lesser degree. What's really important to a dealer is the matter of location. He is a victim of a major trend that encompasses all retail business—the trend to the shopping center where mass buying of all kinds of goods goes on.

Big Traffic

"More and more the big customer traffic is being attracted to the shopping center. The record de-

partment or separate record store in the shopping center is right there, so to speak, and gets that traffic. And that's where the indie dealer comes in. He is going to have to make himself aware of the trend and realize it is not going to change. If he's smart, he will try to get himself located in the shopping center, too—where the traffic is.

Spector went on to unleash a blast at the various kinds of chain and discount record operation as they are now often conducted. "There are several factors to think about," he asserted. "First, you have the chain discounter with a leased department. In many cases the records are supplied by somebody far away. One of our chains in the Miami area gets its records out of Fall River, Mass. Another is serviced entirely from St. Louis. But the separation factor makes it impossible for them to be on top of the opportunities. How can a guy in New England be fully aware of local buying habits or favorite artists or hit singles in the Miami area?

"With singles especially, it's a rough situation. If a record begins to break through good airplay, they probably don't even have it here in these stores, and it may take them a week or two weeks to get it from Massachusetts. By the time it arrives, the record may be dead. Who profits from that?"

RISE & FALL

Current Singles in Long Chart Life

NEW YORK—A sales pattern of longevity has been very noticeable in the singles record field during the past six months. In contradistinction to the well-known pattern wherein a record quickly rises on the "Hot 100" and rapidly drops off, many disks remain on the chart a long time. Often too, these same disks have had the benefit of long and intense promotion in local areas prior to their appearance on the national chart—so that the total life span of the disk may be five or six months.

On Example

A good example of this pattern of intense promotion and resultant longevity is Solomon Burke's "Just Out of Reach" on Atlantic. This was released on August 3—almost five months ago and has been on

the "Hot 100" for 14 weeks. It has been as high as No. 24, then dropped to No. 38 and is now up to No. 31 again. It is known that Atlantic has sold over a quarter million copies, and it is still going strong.

Prior to landing the disk on the national chart, Atlantic did a great deal of intensive promotion throughout the South, and by slow degrees was able to achieve enough exposure to gain a national spread for a relatively obscure artist.

Plenty of other disks on the national singles chart have been around a long time. The Marvellettes' "Please Mr. Postman" on Tamla, which was in the top slot last week and is now in second position, has a chart total of 16 weeks to date, not counting pre-chart activity. "Bristol Stomp" by the Dovells on Parkway, now at No. 30, has 15 weeks of chart activity. "I Love How You Love Me" by the Paris Sisters on Gregmark, which just dropped off the

ASCAP to Issue Cleffers' Almanac On Monthly Basis

NEW YORK—A monthly ASCAP Almanac, with a list of composers' birthdays, and anniversaries of musical shows, is being sent out, starting in January, to program directors and disk jockeys. The Almanac is being compiled and edited each month by Stanley Green, the musicologist and author of "The World of Musical Comedy," for the Lynn Farnol public relations firm, which is now servicing ASCAP.

The Almanac for January runs to seven typewritten pages, and contains information about many composers and authors, and such Broadway shows as "Pal Joey," "Follow Through," "Rosalee," "Street Scene" and "Strike Up the Band," among others. There is also mention made of books.

There are other items that the Farnol organization is also working on for ASCAP. One is a biographical dictionary of ASCAP authors and composers. There has not been such a listing issued since 1952. The tome will be in one or two volumes and is expected to be ready sometime in the spring.

Yuletide Season Boon to West Coast Record Sales

HOLLYWOOD—Disk dealers here report Yuletide sales booming toward an all-time high, a BMW survey revealed last week, with business increases ranging as high as 50 per cent ahead of last year. Disk sales reflect a sharp increase in this area's economy. According to California State statistics, employment is at an all-time high. In addition, wages during November had reached the highest peak in the State's history.

Clyde Wallichs told BMW that business at his Music City stores is running at 25 per cent ahead of last Christmas. Jerry Johnson reported record sales at his House of Sight & Sound at 15 per cent above last year's all-time high. Bill Denels said that disk business at his Denels Music was keeping pace with the banner sales he reaped a year ago. ("If I do as well as I did last year, I'll be delighted, because last Christmas was, by far, the biggest in all my years in the record business.") What's more, Denels pointed out that he has

reduced considerably his overhead as compared to a year ago, so that he will end up substantially ahead of last year's profits by matching the previous Christmas' gross sales.

Howard Judkins Sr., who decided to try a discount policy during the pre-Yule period, (see BMW, Dec. 11), told BMW that discounting was paying off handsomely. Business is averaging 50 per cent ahead of last year, Judkins said. How much of the sales boost can be attributed to his newly adopted discount policy, and how much of it is due to improved business conditions, Judkins could not estimate. However, indications are that he will stick to discounting after the holiday.

With rare exceptions, all the dealers contacted reported business well ahead of last year, with most claiming that if sales continue at their present brisk pace, they will rack up their biggest Christmas to date.

TOPS RELEASING 138 JAN. ALBUMS

HOLLYWOOD—Tops Records and eight of its sister labels will hit the market with a combined blockbuster release totaling 138 LPs, according to its January releasing schedule.

Artist and repertoire Vice-President Dave Pell told BMW that he has scheduled the 138 album releases for January 15.

Product will be issued (both mono and stereo) on the Tops, Kimberly, Trophy (a new line to be unveiled for the first time), Venise, Mayfair and Golden Tone labels, as well as the recently acquired Eli Oberstein companies of Evon, Acorn and Galazy.

Second Batch of UA Counter Racks Ready

NEW YORK—United Artists Records is releasing a second group of 1,500 patented counter display racks early in January. The racks are now featured in more than 1,500 retail outlets across the country.

Art Talmadge, UA prexy, reports that the racks, which he designed, have been responsible during the past month for the sale of more than 50,000 albums.

Siravo Ad-Lib A.&R. Head

NEW YORK—George Siravo has been named national sales and promotion manager of Ad-Lib Records. Initial release is "Uncle Clyde's Play and Sing Along Too," arranged and conducted by Siravo.

Checker's 'Twist' On Chart for 23

NEW YORK—Chubby Checker's Parkway waxing of "The Twist" has been on BMW's "Hot 100" chart 23 weeks—longer than any other disk currently on the list.

This includes the weeks that the Checker platter was on the "Hot 100" when it was first released a couple of years ago.

EDITORIAL

Let's Do It Again

Nothing but pleasant reverberations continue to be heard as a result of the recent country music concert at Carnegie Hall. Sponsored by Nashville's WSM, home of "Grand Ole Opry," the concert achieved two important results. First, it materially helped the Musicians' Aid Society, for whose behalf it was staged. Secondly—and most significant in a broad sense—the concert keynoted in an important urban area, the cultural contribution of country music—not only in a narrow, cultist sense, but in its broadest outlines: that is, as a powerful, native stimulant to the entire world of pop music.

This is all to the good. But why be satisfied with a one-shot impact? The Carnegie concert proved that a live, country music show can be appreciated and understood in New York. We suggest that the Country Music Association and WSM consider seriously the possibility of an annual New York event of this type—a concert which captures the imagination not only of fans, but of radio executives, time buyers and critics on the metropolitan newspapers. Further, perhaps record manufacturers and artists who appear in such a show should give the necessary legal clearances so that an LP of the annual event may be pressed and distributed—the better to spread among urban folk—both in the trade and at the consumer level—the story of WSM, of Nashville and, in toto, of country music and its meaning to the music art and industry.

MEET SUE THOMPSON

Hickory LPMH 104—Sue Thompson waited a long while for a big hit, but recently she got it, a real big one, with "Sad Movies." Now she's quickly following that up with "Norman," another brisk seller. Both are included in this new set, along with a flock of good country tunes by the Bryants, Don Gibson, John D. Loudermilk and others. Set should get good play.

Christmas Disks Take Off in Windy City

CHICAGO—Christmas finally caught up with the Windy City last week, with "Little Drummer Boy," by the Harry Simeone Chorale, and "Baby's First Christmas," Connie Francis, leading the pack of strong holiday sellers.

Others include "Jingle Bell Rock," Bobby Rydell and Chubby Checker, and Bobby Helm; "Santa and the Touchables," Dickie Goodman (selling steadily here for some weeks) and "White Christmas," Bing Crosby. The Crosby tune is also chalking up substantial sales with juke box operators.

Big sales were being registered with established chart climbers. Very little new material was getting strong action.

Non-Holiday Tunes

Hottest of the new non-holiday tunes is "What a Walk" by Bobby Lewis. The record has been getting air play for some five weeks but is just starting to show up in store sales.

Other new climbers here include "Baby, It's You," Shirelles; "My Boomerang Won't Come Back," Charlie Drake (getting weak action but not too popular with local deejays); "Little Bitty Tear," Burl Ives (listed as a breakout last week and really taking off this week).

"But on the Other Hand," with Ray Charles, is selling well but mainly in the r.&b. markets. "Everybody's Cryin'," Jimmie Beaumont, picked up some sales action, although the tune has long been dropped by local pop radio stations.

"Little Altar Boy," Vic Dana, is already well established on the national charts but continuing to grow strong here. "Peppermint

Twist," Danny Peppermint, is also strong.

Dealers Optimistic

Dealers are generally very optimistic. Pre-holiday buying is continuing to pick up and the trade is looking forward to one of the best winters in many years.

Radio stations likewise report a bullish market. Big singles action, however, is with the material already high on the charts.

One big pop station noted very strong action on "Small Sad Sam," Phil McLean, and "She's Everything," Ral Donner.

Dean Hot

Another big pop station noted excellent results on "Dear Ivan," by Jimmy Dean. The station played the record once last week and was hit by a flood of calls. The disk is now aired every hour.

The same station also noted good action on "Town Without Pity," Gene Pitney; "Let's Go Tripping," Dick Dale (has been hot on the West Coast but picking up here); "Little Altar Boy," Vic Dana, and "I Know," Barbara George.

Of the new releases, the following are being picked by the local radio fraternity: "Jamie," Eddie Holland; "A Little Too Much," Clarence Henry; "Joey Baby," Anita and the So-So's; "Twist-Her," Bill Black; "Tears From an Angel," Troy Shondell; "What Will My Mary Say," Mark Dinning; "Portrait of a Fool," Conway Twitty; "Only Time Will Tell," Gene Montgomery; "He's Not Just a Soldier," Little Richard; "She Taught Me How to Cry," Frankie Sardo, and "Along Came Linda," Tony Bryce.

Wash. Wild For Dorsey, Lynn, 'Baby'

WASHINGTON—Three records which landed on the "Hot 100" this week scored strong local action in the Washington market the past seven days. They are "Do Re Mi" by Lee Dorsey on Fury, "Baby It's You" by the Shirelles on Scepter and "You Don't Have to Be a Tower of Strength" by Gloria Lynn on Everest. The Fury disk received strong air play.

Still selling strong here are earlier breakouts, "Lost Someone," by James Brown; "A Certain Girl," by Ernie K-Doe, and Danny Peppermint's "Twist." Other new "Hot 100" chart climbers doing well here last week were "If You Gotta Make a Fool of Somebody," by James Ray on Caprice; "Poor Fool," by Ike and Tina Turner, and "Letter Full of Tears," by Gladys Knight.

Washington is still buying the old-fashioned Christmas singles: "Little Drummer Boy," by the Harry Simeone Chorale, and "White Christmas" by Bing Crosby. But one dealer notes: "These are the earlier and older shoppers. The newer and hip-type Christmas singles will get rolling when the last-minute buyers get under way."

One of the Super Music outlets, with a "little further out" clientele, is doing a brisk seasonal business in albums like "Midnight Special" by Jimmy Smith, and Clyde McPhatter's "Golden Blues" on Mercury. Salesman Oscar Dillard also reports that Ray Charles' "Twist LP

No Breakouts in Detroit

DETROIT—There were no breakouts in this city last week, but three records are doing mighty well among the newcomers. They include The Shirelles' "Baby, It's You" on Scepter, which hit the "Hot 100" this week, and two sides that broke out last week, "Jamie" by Eddie Holland on Motown, and "Tuff" by Ace Cannon on Hi.

Harry Simeone's "Little Drummer Boy" took a big lead in the Christmas disk field, paced by a pair of "Jingle Bell Rock" recordings by Bobby Helms and the Rydell-Checker combo. Crosby's perennial "White Christmas" slipped solidly into next place.

A dealer reported scathingly on the distributorship problems,

Still Bottlenecks

Sales are gaining holiday momentum in the area—but bottlenecks in distribution and delivery are a worrisome threat. One dealer says he does better when he can "get records in here by bus, from out of town, by arrangement with people we know." He said the express companies charge too much, particularly when you have a number of separate packages coming in on a delivery, and you pay on each one. Also, they have found the express trucking service slow and uncertain. "One shipment of merchandise for the radio-TV department came nearly six months after the order was placed—and the the express costs came to nearly 20 per cent of the price of the parts ordered."

Another dealer said local distributors were held up because pressers didn't make enough records. "This is a big bottleneck with our distributor. For example, we could have sold a lot of Jive Five's 'Never, Never,' and Bobby Lewis' 'What a Walk,' but the distributor couldn't get them from the presser. There never seems to be enough of everything to go around. You'd think the manufacturers would want to work out better distributing and pressing systems so we could all sell more records."

Cadence Tags Zeitler Promo Mgr.; Inks Acts

NEW YORK—Cadence Records has named Denny Zeitler as promotion manager. Zeitler, who began with Cadence last week, had been sales manager at Musical Sales, Baltimore one-stop. He'll spend much of his time on the road contacting deejays, racks, one-stops and juke operators in the Eastern half of the nation. Announcement was made by Bud Dollinger, sales chief, to whom Zeitler will report.

Meanwhile, Cadence also signed the Wright Sisters, Ruby and Sue, who are daughters of the great country thrush, Kitty Wells. The girls, who are 19 and 17, have left for a tour of Germany with Miss Wells.

Newer twisters in an upward spiral were "Mother Goose Twist," by Oliver and the Twisters on Colpix, and "Peppermint Twist," by Danny Peppermint. Others showing plenty of voltage here are "Flying Circle" by Frank Slay; "A Certain Girl," by Ernie K-Doe on Minit; "Norman" by Sue Thompson on Hickory; "I Hear You Knockin'," Fats Domino, and "Pushin' Your Luck," by Sleepy King on Joy, and "Small Sad Sam" by Phil McLean on Versatile.

One big worry here was wheth-

er Elvis' "Blue Hawaii" album would get to dealers in sufficient quantity for the big Christmas run. Last year, two dealers lost "hundreds" of sales when Elvis' "G.I. Blues" was not delivered to them at all during the vital last weeks of Christmas shopping.

Christmas singles doing well here last week were Connie Francis' "Baby's First Christmas"; Bobby Helm's "Jingle Bell Rock"; Brenda Lee's "Rockin' Round the Christmas Tree," and Bing Crosby's perennial "White Christmas." Runaway Christmas albums here are Mitch Miller's "Holiday Singalong," and seasonal albums by Chet Atkins, Lawrence Welk and Harry Simeone. Non-Christmas LP's making extra holiday sales included: "The Amazing James Brown" and "Moon River."

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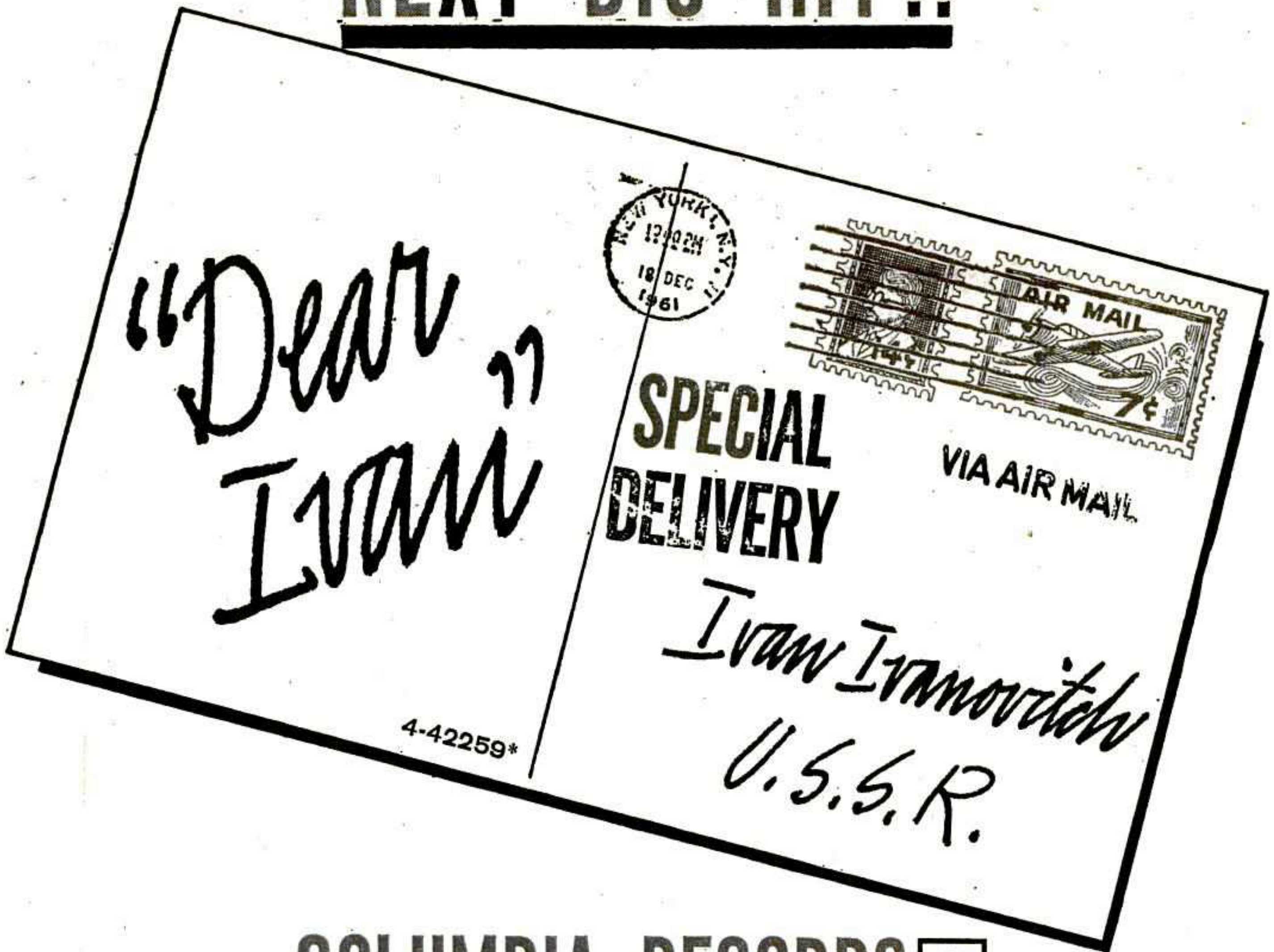
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Old Rock-Roll Hits Bring New Album Life

Record Labels Scramble for Those Big Former Rock Sellers for Top LP Fare

By BOB ROLONTZ

NEW YORK—The demand for old rock and roll hit merchandise of the past seven or eight years is such that album manufacturers are offering as much as \$1,500 as an advance for old single hits to be packaged in albums. This demand for old rock items on the album level coincides with the steady current sales of the old rock and roll hit singles.

The stable sales of rock and roll hits is somewhat analogous to the steady sales of hit merchandise back in the 1930's, when a Tommy Dorsey ("Boogie Woogie") or Benny Goodman ("Sing Sing Sing") single would continue to sell for years after it was first released. Records by top rock acts, vocal acts especially, have followed this pattern. Disks by the Spaniels, the Shirelles, the Moonglows, Chuck Berry, and many, many others, have become solid gold to many dealers.

Oldies Are Goodies

The power of these older hits is illustrated by the sock sales of the "Oldies But Goodies" album which was released on Original Sound label about a year ago. Composed of sides from many labels, the LP turned into a smash across the country. This album was one of the early instances of a label getting tapes from other labels and issuing them on one LP. Since then there have been collections like this one, issued on Roulette by deejay Murray Kaufman (Murray the K), deejay Clay Cole, and recently Alan Freed on the End label.

The Freed LP's, of which there are three, all contain 14 or 15 sides, many of them by artists that Freed had worked with on his live shows in Cleveland or New York. Dealer reports in New York are that the Freed LP's are selling exceptionally well.

Oldie Department

The old rock and roll hits have become so important to dealers that many of them have set up separate sections in their stores to feature these older disks. Sometimes they are called "Memory Lane" hits or "Oldies But Goodies." Most dealers get the full list price of 98 cents for the old disks, even when they are selling new 45's at a discount. There are even some stores who charge two and three times the list for a wanted oldie.

Manufacturers continue to press the oldies even though they okay the disk for a new album. One dealer, who has a big oldie section, stated that the teens will buy a single or an album depending on

the amount of change he has in his pocket. "If he has a buck he buys the single; if he has three bucks he buys the album," he said.

It is not only in the dealer area that the oldies have become popular.

More and more radio stations have added a "Memory Lane" programming feature over recent years featuring older hits, from rock and roll to the sweet and swing bands of the 1930's. A lot of stations stress the rock and rollers, and many jocks, on their regular shows, have a spot for at least a few of the good old rockers.

Synthetic Labels In New N. Y. Hq.

NEW YORK—Synthetic Plastics, operator of the Peter Pan, Promenade and Pirouette low price labels, has moved into new, expanded quarters and has named several new executives.

According to Ira L. Moss, executive vice-president, Ralph Gould has been named vice-president for dealer sales. Gould is now on a trek of 25 cities to meet with key retailers. S. Gordon Stranger has been appointed vice-president for special sales and is now in Hollywood negotiating licensing rights with TV and motion picture producers.

Also appointed were Fred Levi as Southern district sales manager and Mrs. Selma Brody as a.&r. director for Peter Pan. Sid Ascher has been retained as public relations consultant and Alan Berni has been placed in charge of redesigning album covers.

Neil Sedaka Sets East Club Dates

NEW YORK—Neil Sedaka has set a flock of personal appearances in the Eastern section of the U. S. over the next few months. Among the clubs where he is booked are the Boulevard in Queens, the International on Broadway, and the Holiday House in Pittsburgh. Under the guidance of his new manager, Ben Sutter, Sedaka has developed a new night club act, and expects to play clubs across the country in 1962. He also will be the subject of a piece in Life magazine as a result of his solid string of hits on the Victor label.

CHUBBY NEEDS CHRISTMAS \$\$

PHILADELPHIA—Chubby Checker, whose singing antics have spread the twist craze through every echelon of society, asked the Philadelphia Orphans' Court for permission to spread some Christmas cheer — \$2,650 worth.

Chubby, 20, whose real name is Ernest Evans, said in a petition to Judge Harold D. Saylor that the money would be used to buy gifts for business associates and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Evans. The petition was filed by David B. Zoob, attorney for Chubby's financial guardian, Merton J. Matz.

In addition, the singer asked for \$1,700 to buy a three-page layout in a trade newspaper and \$1,000 to pay Zoob's fees. He also requested permission to hire a part-time bookkeeper, claiming that "bookkeeping transactions... have become so voluminous that they can no longer be handled in the office of the guardian."

Atlantic Takes To Twist Kick

NEW YORK—Atlantic Records is on a Twist kick. The label has one Twist album ("Do the Twist With Ray Charles") on the charts, and has brought out a second, "Twist With Bobby Darin" (on the Atco label) this week.

A third Twist package, "The Greatest Twist Hits," will be released by Atlantic shortly. The album, a collection of old Twist-tempo singles from Atlantic's catalog, includes "Last Night" by the Mar-Keys, "Mess Around" by Ray Charles, "Jim Dandy" by LaVern Baker, plus sides by the Bobettes, Joe Turner, Clyde McPhatter, King Curtis, Solomon Burke, the Clovers and others.

Paul Livert Premium Manager for MGM

NEW YORK—Paul Livert has been named premium merchandising manager for MGM, Verve and Cub labels, according to MGM President Arnold Maxin. Livert will be in charge of premium ties with nationally advertised products for the labels.

Livert was once a drummer with Bunny Berigan's band, and has been active in show business as night club booker, ballroom manager, talent manager and has been on the stage himself.

NARAS Preps Series of Eight Trade Sessions

NEW YORK—The National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (NARAS), which recently staged a debate on the question, "Is Stereo Necessary," has announced a series of eight lecture-discussion sessions on various facets of the disk field.

Series commences Wednesday, January 24, and will run on consecutive Wednesday evenings at the Washington Square division of New York University, main building. Chairmen for the series will be John Hammond, Alan Kayes and Billy Taylor.

The sessions will take up such matters as a.&r. functions in the pop, jazz and classical fields; sales and merchandising through retail and other outlets; promotion, packaging, engineering, and the future of the business. Leading industry figures will take part. Registration fee of \$55 will be charged for the entire series.

Gale Attractions Into Road Shows

NEW YORK—Tim Gale, one of the pioneers of road packages both in his own agency a few years ago and at GAC, has set plans for expanded production of packages, TV production and personal management for his new firm, Gale Attractions. His first road show will spotlight Della Reese, and is set for a February tour.

Gale Attractions now has personal management pacts with Clyde McPhatter, Lillian Roth, Marie McDonald and Jorie Remus. The firm has three TV pilots completed and being considered by TV nets. Gale has named Art Treffeisen an associate in the new firm.

Gal Sings the Twist

NEW YORK—One of the first "Twist" records by a femme artist is on the market this week. It's "Mommy and Daddy Were Twistin'" by 15-year-old Susan Summers on Joe Kolsky's new Diamond label.

Miss Summers guested on Buddy Dean's WJZ-TV, Baltimore, show last Friday (15) and is booked for Dick Clark's ABC-TV "American Bandstand" show December 21.

ASCAP Votes Extension

NEW YORK—The members of ASCAP have voted in favor of an amendment to the articles of association which would permit the Society's president to serve for more than three successive terms. An amendment requires a two-thirds vote. Membership, in this case, was better than 80 per cent in favor of the change.

AVALON GETS OWN ESTATE

PHILADELPHIA — Orphans' Court Judge Harold D. Saylor took judicial notice of Frankie Avalon's having become 21 September 18 and gave the singer \$98,629 of his money "in his own right."

By signing an approval of the accounting in Avalon's estate, under guardianship appointed by the court for the eight years during which the teen-age singer earned a gross of \$666,000, Judge Saylor took the court's reins off Avalon's estate this week.

He had earlier noted that all taxes, the last commissions and fees due Avalon's guardian, Peter Ierardi, and his attorney, Harry R. Back, have been paid. The final balance is the \$98,000 figure.

Commented Judge Saylor: "He is now the master of it and I certainly hope something is done to protect it for him." Back assured the court that Avalon has "a fine investment plan."

"Then there's another bad thing going on, where a local record department head gets some kind of bonus deal if he accepts some junk merchandise from the guy who is far out of town. What does the local guy care? He's not spending his own money. So the store actually loses sales because the junk is mixed in with the good stuff. By and large it's a pretty shoddy kind of operation."

Spector feels that there are real opportunities for dealers who will try to take over such departments in local chains or local outlets of national chains, on a leased de-

partment or concession basis. "Who knows more about records and catalogs and customers' wants and needs, an established dealer whose living depends on records or some character who works for the big store and gets assigned to the record department?" he asked.

Class Counts, Too

"The dealer can do himself a big favor because he's taking his business where the customers are. And he can do a better job for the store by picking up the whole character of its record operation. Whether the store actually shares in the profits of the record operation or gets its revenue out of the department through rental fees charged to the concessionaire doesn't matter. It still benefits because it has a classier operation."

As early as last summer during the annual SORD meeting at the NAMM Convention in Chicago, Spector pushed this concept in private conversations with other dealers. Prior to that time, he had held negotiations with one of the larger department stores in the Miami-Fort Lauderdale area to take over its record concessions. Though these talks have not been conclusive, he is now actively negotiating for taking over the leased departments in more than a score of stores in the South Florida area of a prominent discount chain.

PHILLY GOING FOR 2 NEWIES

PHILADELPHIA — Two predominantly rhythm and blues-oriented disks stepped out smartly this week with both achieving local breakout status. Little Richard broke through with "He's Not Just a Soldier," while James Brown and the Famous Flames came up with "Lost Someone." Bobby Lewis racked up strong sales with "What a Walk." The strongest record of the week here, and already a national hit, is Barbara George's "I Know."

In the Christmas derby, Bing Crosby, as expected, has done it again, scoring the biggest sales of the week with the undying "White Christmas." Not previously chart-listed this year, but moving fast in its annual comeback, is "The Chipmunk Song." Meanwhile, an important Christmas seller occurred here with the return of a fine old r.&b. record, "Please Come Home for Christmas," with Charles Brown on Federal.

Despite the closeness of the Christmas holiday, business continued spotty on the Quaker City front.

Coleman Joins Kellem, Takes Over Wildcat

NEW YORK — Larry Coleman has taken over the running of Wildcat Music as co-owner and partner with Milt Kellem. The Wildcat copyrights, of which there are about 100, will go into a new firm to be called Warrior Music. The Wildcat name will remain the property of Kellem. Coleman is also a partner with Jerry Simon in Legion Music and Gladiator Music, and represents with Simon a flock of recording artists. The duo owns two labels, Serene and RSVP.

Coleman, who has penned a number of hit tunes over past years, is presently at work on a new musical, "John Henry," with co-author Jerry Capehart, of American Music in Hollywood. The show is tentatively scheduled for the fall of 1962. Next week Coleman leaves for Europe to discuss foreign representation for his International Artists Corporation firm.

Cap Inks Straeter, Edwards

HOLLYWOOD — Capitol Records last week signed two artists to exclusive recording contracts—singer-guitarist-composer Bobby Edwards and vocalist-pianist Ted Straeter.

Edwards, best known for his recording of "You're the Reason" earlier this year, will be handled by Capitol a.&r. producer, Paul Wyatt. Andy Wiswell, the label's New York executive producer, will handle Straeter's session.

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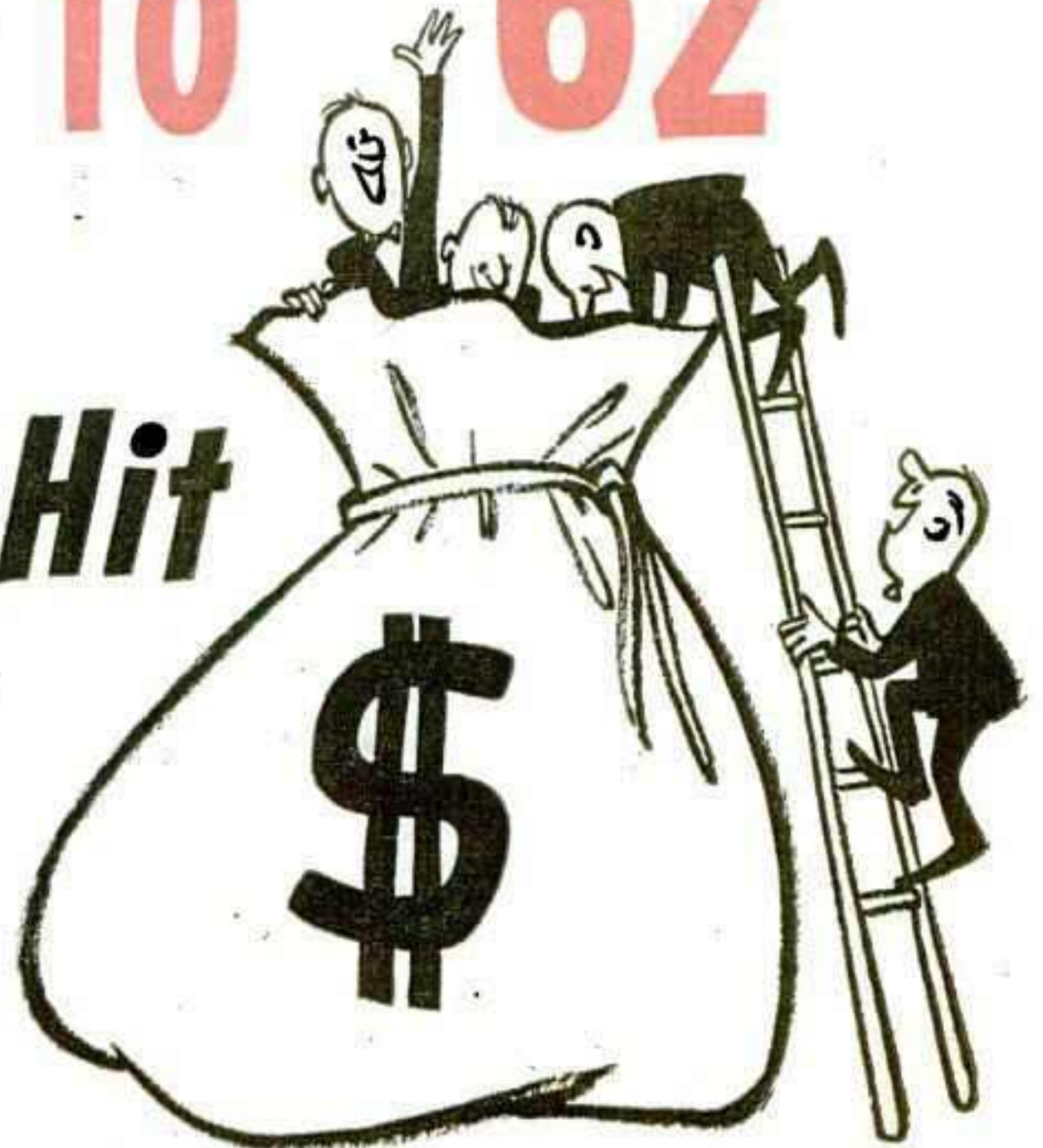



"Let's Twist Again" waxing also clicked), Deane notes, "To the average teen-ager, at least in the Baltimore area, the Twist is archaic, a throwback.

It should be of interest to report that since the current national Twist rage commenced again, this time with more vigor than ever before, that at not one record hop, nor on any of my daily TV shows, have I had so much as one request from one single teen-ager for a specific Twist record. Yet there are a full half dozen Twist singles as well as several albums all selling at a spirited clip in this area. From where then, comes this new fanaticism for a craze at least 24 months old, and about nine dances behind the usual avant-garde of such a popular fad?

"None of us, in this era of lagging public interest and enthusiasm for pop records, can afford the luxury of ignoring that the most current Twist devotees are not the same people as those who were originally caught up in the craze the first time around.

"Whether we be manufacturers, searching for a different and exciting sound to stimulate record sales, promotion men on the alert for new avenues of exposure for the product, or disk jockeys trying to inflate the ratings by garnering interest and hitherto unrealized listeners or viewers, we can all learn from the Twist experience that these goals in the past, at best, have only been partially achieved."

Twistin' at Grossinger's

Gene Kaye, WAAT, Trenton, N. J., is in agreement with Deane. Last Thanksgiving, Kaye hosted an experimental Twist show featuring

Pete Bennett and His Grossinger Twisters at the Grossinger Hotel and Country Club Playhouse, heretofore reserved for strictly adult entertainment. The show was so successful that Kaye is now emceeing regular Friday night "Cavalcade of Twist" programs at Grossinger's. At the same time, Kaye notes that Grossinger's — for the first time—has decided to book teen-type acts in the Playhouse, rather than confining them to a separate room for teen-agers. First act to make the move is the Belmonts.

Meanwhile, deejays and stations across the country are going all out on Twist promotions. Station WJAS, (NBC's Pittsburgh affiliate, and heretofore a big band-type outlet) sponsored a Twist Day last Thursday (14). "Twist disks were played throughout the day, and teachers from the local Arthur Murray Studios gave special terp instructions on the air.

Texas Twisters

A Twist contest in the middle of a downtown business street was staged December 3 by KNOW, Austin, Tex., and attracted "the largest crowd ever assembled in one block of downtown Austin"—2,800. The contest climaxed a 62-hour marathon broadcast from the local State and Paramount Theaters by KNOW jockeys (Bill Noble and Buzz Long) to raise funds for the United Fund.

As reported in BMW last week, Station WAKY, Louisville, will stage a national Twist contest on New Years Eve, and has asked other jockeys across the country to send winners of any local Twist contests to Louisville to compete for national honors.



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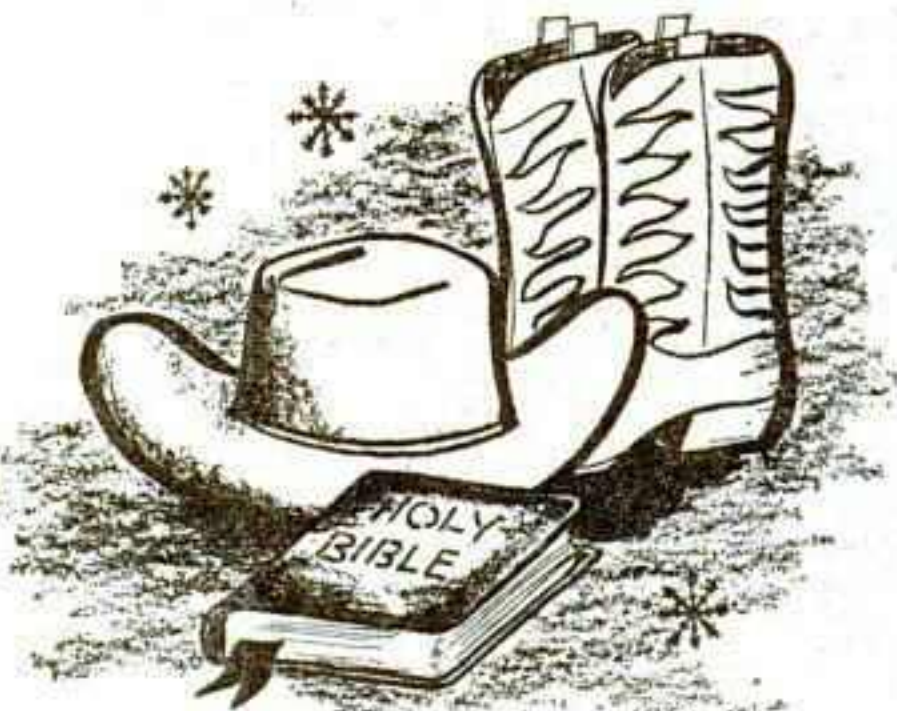

AFN plays primarily U. S. music, although it is giving increasing exposure to European tunes.

Legal Pettifogging

Dr. Schulze said that "nobody can fairly dispute the justice of our claim." His position is that AFN is deriving full benefit from the exposure of copyright music, but is resorting to technicalities and legal pettifogging to evade payment of royalties.

In effect, GEMA accuses the U. S. military of seeking to extract an involuntary donation from composers and authors to military morale through the military's playing of copyright music without royalties. GEMA takes the position that instead of "pettifogging," the military should come forward with the straightout request that U. S. composers and authors (and possibly foreign composers as well) donate their music.

GEMA feels, Dr. Schulze indicated, that the German copyright society is being placed in an unnecessarily embarrassing position.

On the one hand, GEMA is under obligation to collect royalties on behalf of ASCAP for all ASCAP - controlled U. S. music played in West Germany. But on the other hand, the U. S. military forces are claiming what amounts to extra-territorial, diplomatic exemption from German laws and German courts.

It is estimated by impartial authorities that AFN has a regular listenership of upward of 32 million Continentals. Some estimates even escalate the figure to 50 million.

Technically, these listeners don't exist — they are "eavesdroppers." AFN, by agreement with European broadcasting authorities, broadcasts only for the "information and education of the U. S. Forces in Europe."

The broadcasting is done entirely in English except for brief programs in Spanish for Puerto Rican troops serving in the U. S. Forces. The format is U. S. and there are no commercials producing revenue and no programming content directed toward Europeans.

Briefly, AFN functions only for the U. S. military forces, and the station's operation and programming content rigidly adheres to this fact.

However, there is nothing the military can do to regulate the demand for U. S. music among Continentals. This demand is so voracious that its music alone has created AFN's huge listenership, and spawned the music royalty dilemma.

GEMA argues that the station has become the major U. S. music promotional force on the Continent, and that obvious, substantial commercial benefits are created by AFN's exposure of copyrighted music.

Surveys indicate that AFN is even more widely—and regularly — heard than is Radio Luxembourg, which also concentrates on music programming, and which is a highly profitable commercial station.

It is no secret that diskeries work hard to get AFN exposure for their top tunes, knowing that sales can be counted on to spurt from Scandinavia to the Bay of Biscay and from Iceland to Italy.

Anti-Payola Safeguards

In fact, AFN's promotion pull is so strong that the military has had to invoke stringent safeguards against payola (which are regarded by experts generally as a model for the trade).

Thus, Dr. Schulze feels that GEMA is on sound ground in pressing its royalty claims against AFN, the military morale argument to the contrary notwithstanding.

Moreover, GEMA contends that its claims against AFN are ex-

tremely modest in relation to the enormous commercial potentialities of the music broadcast. The German copyright agency is dunning the military web for \$57,000 in back royalties covering the entire postwar period.

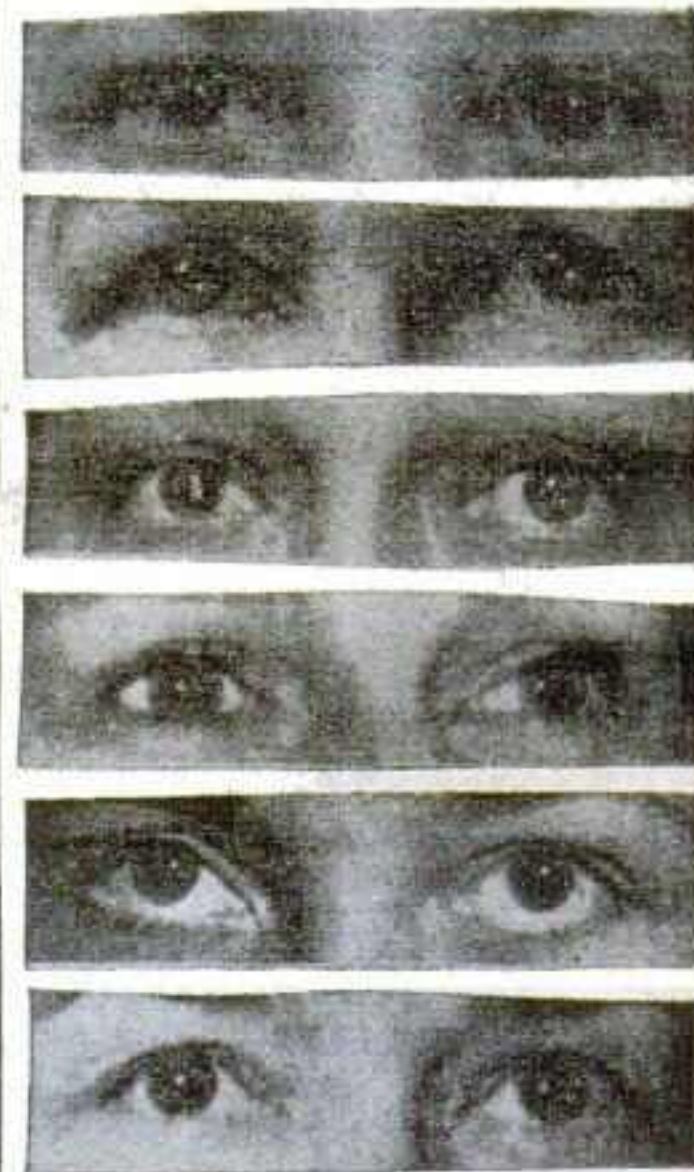
GEMA lost out in the German courts (although GEMA takes the position that the last legal word is yet to be spoken), a Frankfurt court rejecting jurisdiction of GEMA's suit against AFN.

The court ruled it lacked jurisdiction because AFN is a nonprofit organization and an arm of the U. S. Government.

GEMA began dunning AFN in 1959. GEMA went so far as to name several AFN officials and staff members as repondents. But the court refused to hold them legally accountable.

GEMA's most potent argument, and one which the copyright society intends exploiting to the hilt, is AFN's agreement to pay copyright royalties in France and other European countries.

GEMA is prepared to argue that the U. S. military, in effect, is discriminating against the Germans and taking advantage of the fact that this country was under Allied Military occupation when AFN set up shop. Elsewhere, AFN came in cold and had to agree to pay copyright fees.

"Let It Ride" album, Capitol's "Sail Away" and Columbia's "Kean" LP were all liberally plugged on the air.

Last October "PM East" hosted composers Jule Styne, Adolph Green and Betty Comden. The trio played and sang their "Do Re Mi" score and tunes from their newest effort "Subways Are for Sleeping," which opens on Broadway later this month.

Producers, Too

Other recent "PM East" guests have included producer David Merrick (to plug "Carnival" and "Irma La Douce"); producers Hal Prince and George Abbott, "Fiorello" star Tom Bosley, stars from Prince's former Broadway shows "Tenderloin" (Eileen Rodgers, Lee Becker) and "West Side Story" (Larry Kert), performed several songs from the shows. Last Thursday (14) "PM East" spotlighted new young Broadway musical players, including James Hurt and Pat Harty of "Sail Away" and Joan Weldon of "Kean," resulting in still more plugs for the shows and albums.

"Subways Are for Sleeping" is also reaping ample air exposure from WNEW here. The station has purchased a block of 200 seats for the show's Broadway opening and is pushing the show and its score constantly, via a drawing, whereby 200 WNEW listeners will attend the performance, along with WNEW deejays.

The stunt was first staged by WNEW last year, when "Do Re Mi" opened, and was so successful, the outlet is repeating it this year. Needless to say, single records available on the score are currently pulling considerable play around the clock on WNEW, and the original-cast LP will benefit accordingly after the show opens. Station

WNEW has also instigated a series of reviews, whereby current Broadway musicals are reviewed on the air within an hour of the time the curtain comes down opening night.

Ken Banghart, WCBS, here, this season did a three-month study on the history of a Broadway show, following "The Gay Life" through its rehearsals, out-of-town tryouts and Broadway debut. In all he broadcast 22 separate reports on the show.

Another local radio show which is considered a solid plug for a Broadway show and/or album is "Lee Jordan's Music of Broadway" on WCBS, Sundays, 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and 1:15-2 p.m. here. Jordan does taped back-stage interviews with Broadway musical stars and features music from their shows. The series is sold out, and surveys indicated the Broadway shows and albums are exposed to almost 120,000 homes when Jordan spotlights them on the air.

Effective Outlet

One of the most effective local TV outlets for Broadway musicals and albums is "The American Musical Theater," a Sunday morning (11:30 a.m. to 12:15 p.m.) WCBS-TV series, which has paid homage to a flock of veteran Broadway composers.

Last month (November 26) the program's host, Earl Wrightson, presented a simulated recording session to point up the close alliance between the musical theater and the recording industry. Ernest Altschuler, Columbia's pop a.&r. producer, conducted the session, and Norman Paris served as conductor and arranger. Altschuler filled in listeners on the function of an a.&r. man, and Wrightson "cut" three sides from Broadway shows — "Camelot" "Paint Your Wagon" and "Sound of Music."

Tape Industry Looks to 1962 As the Trade's Biggest Year

NEW YORK — Industry executives last week predicted the biggest year in history for the tape business in 1962, according to a round-up of opinion conducted by the Magnetic Recording Industry Association. The MRIA itself also views the outlook for next year with optimism and has recently conducted an extensive educational campaign, with the co-operation of the National Better Business Bureau to help achieve that end.

Executives whose opinions were tapped see the potential growth of the business next year as ranging from 12 to 50 per cent over 1961 levels. MRIA president, Ken Bishop, who also heads up Bell Sound in Columbus, Ohio, believes that "the dramatic growth of tape in 1962 will overshadow any other year in its history," adding that "1961 was a rewarding year for almost all segments of the industry."

Said Columbia Records Sales Corporation vice-president, Bill Gallagher: "Tape sales in 1961 were excellent. Tape, particularly four-track, has enjoyed continued volume increases every year since we introduced recorded tape. We are most optimistic about 1962 and look to continual growth."

Teppaz Makes Bid For U. S. Market; Names 2 Distributors

NEW YORK — Teppaz, one of the world's largest manufacturers of portable record players, is now making its first bid for the American market. The Lyon, France, firm has signed two record distributors as its first American outlet. Summit Distributors, Chicago, and Tell Music, Madison, Wis., were appointed last week by Joe Sullivan, who handles American sales for Teppaz, and Andre Byasson, export manager of the French firm.

Teppaz portables stress light weight, with the lightest weighing seven pounds, while the stereo model weighs 22 pounds.

In addition to introducing a line of six different portables, Teppaz also bowed a new audio playback component designed to play back through any AM radio equipped with a plug-in jack.

The book is distributed to the public through high fidelity dealers. More than 125,000 copies have already been printed of the 12-page volume. Distribution has also been made to visitors at the recent New York Hi-Fi Show, to 900 affiliated U. S. Chambers of Commerce and to 116 Better Business Bureaus.

Motorola Debbsing C.&W. Demo LP's

CHICAGO — Motorola, which has for some time offered its dealers packages of classical records for stereo demonstration purposes in stores, has now embarked on a fling in the country and western field. Bob Farris, ad and promotion director, said that distributors have urgently requested packages of country LP's for dealers.

The current demo package includes LP's by Pat Boone, Wink Martindale and Bonnie Guitar, who, though not completely country, are more oriented in that direction than say, the Boston Symphony. Farris said requests for country records of this type have come in from all over the country.

Zenith Adds New Stereos to Line

CHICAGO — Zenith Radio Corporation has announced a new line of four stereo console phonos and four console stereo and TV combinations. All the units have provision for the addition of an AM-FM stereo FM "drop-in" radio tuner.

The Debussy basic stereo phono and its counterpart, which includes the radio tuner, retail at \$199.95 and \$285 respectively. The Mendelssohn stereo console and the Crescendo (which includes radio tuner) carry suggested price tags of \$319.95 and \$399.95. All four are available in walnut veneers and hardwood solids. The four new console combinations with TV in addition to phono and radio tuner, range in price from \$650 to \$895.

DISK DEALERS CO-OP PLANS RADIO PLUGS

JERSEY CITY, N. J. — Dealers in Sound Corporation (DISC), local dealer disk buying co-operative, announced plans last week for regular radio advertising on local stations. Spot announcements will plug record specials being offered in member stores and different store names will be mentioned on each spot.

The plan, worked out by Joe Shulman of Park Records, Newark, calls for spots from 7 to 9 p.m., on WVNJ, Newark, and during the same hours on WVNJ, also in Newark. Third station listed is WADO Radio, New York, which will air the spots from 11 to midnight nightly. WVNJ and WADO both feature pop and rock material during these hours, while WVNJ sticks strictly to album programming.

EIA Releases Suggested Ad Practice Code

WASHINGTON — Record Industry traders, many of whom have been deeply concerned from time to time over various aspects of discount store advertising, viewed with interest last week the publication of an advertising code for the home entertainment electronics Industry Association, under the tag, "Recommended Advertising Practices." According to Edward R. Taylor, president of Motorola Consumer Products, who is chairman of EIA's consumer products division, the move lends "significant support to Federal Trade Commission effort to combat deceptive and unfair advertising."

Among the main practices of the code are: (1) When price reductions are advertised, the advertiser should have recently sold the item at a higher price in the regular course of business; (2) Models to which advertised prices apply should be identified by number; (3) No product should be advertised for sale which is not then being displayed by the advertiser or available for prompt delivery; (4) Advertisers should be able to support product claims by demonstration or creditable data.

Victor Adding Tuner to Sets

NEW YORK — With an admitted goal of capitalizing on the growth of interest in FM stereo, RCA Victor has added FM stereo tuner units to two of its current combination sets at no price increase, according to Raymond W. Saxon, marketing vice-president of RCA Sales Corporation. RCA is now offering built-in FM stereo-radio in six stereo phonos with AM-FM tuners.

Said Saxon: "We have added an FM-AM tuner to our popular 'compact cabinet' series. This results in a retail guide price of \$40 under that of our previous price-leading stereo combination."

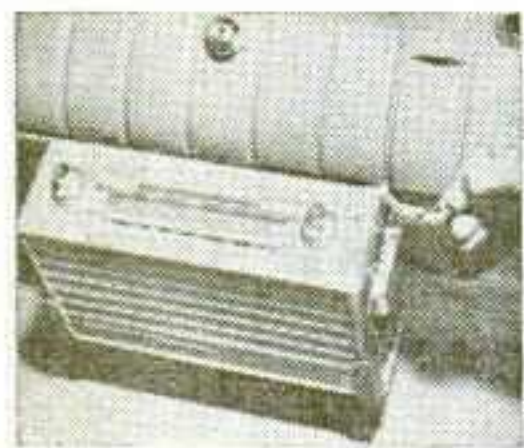
Tape Plays Continuously

This is the gimmick as related by Howell: "Five brand-new disks rushed to WQAM by record companies are aired each night with listeners voting on each by phone to the station. The winners each night battle it out every Saturday night for the champion of the week, which becomes the most played record the following week on WQAM."

BOONE PLUGS NEW DOT DISK: Pat Boone recently gave Station WOLF, Syracuse, a "personal" assist in plugging his latest Dot wax, titled "Johnny Will." The station conducted a drive to raise the \$10 Boone required in the lyrics of the song to win his girl. Boone—in a phone-recorded statement—promised to send an autographed photo to everyone sending in a penny, and even made the pitch for the pennies himself. At last report the station had collected over 600 pennies in four days.

GIMMICKS: United Artists Records sent out eye-catching black and white cardboard boomerangs this week to over 3,000 deejays. The label offers them as a reminder to play the British vocalist Charlie Drake's novelty disk on United Artists tagged "My Boomerang Won't Come Back."

MORE SING-A-LONG: Columbia Records' Mitch Miller and Ray Conniff garnered quite a bit of air time in a recent sing-a-long promotion on Station WCUE, Akron. Harman-Kardon In FM Campaign

LOS ANGELES—A promotion plan that's easily adaptable by any shipment manufacturer has been undertaken here by Harman-Kardon, Inc., in co-operation with its dealers in the area.

A two-hour FM stereo program has been bought on **KMLA**, Monday, from 4 to 6 p.m. A dozen different one-minute spots have been offered to each dealer. These are aired at 15-minute intervals. The announcements invite listeners to "come in and hear FM stereo demonstrated," and the store name and address are mentioned.

Each participating dealer is given a three-by-eight-foot banner which is visible at a distance to passing traffic. The banner, too, asks passers-by to enter the store to hear the on-the-air demonstration. Dealers are also being provided with post cards announcing the broadcasts, for customer mailings.

In another promotion slant, the firm is supplying all its dealers with three-color wall charts explaining the ins and outs of FM stereo.

FCC Hits WDKD On Blue Air Time

WASHINGTON—Some of the "bluest" material ever aired outside of a night club turned up in Federal Communications Commission trouncing of **Kingtree, S. C.**, station **WDKD**, its owner and its deejay last week. The grim, word-for-word quotes from some of deejay **Charlie Walker's** taped out-house humor were included in a hearing examiner's recommendation that the station be refused its request for license renewal and construction permit on the grounds of obscenity, failure to meet program promises and over-commercialization.

The FCC examiner, **Thomas A. Donahue**, says he did a good deal of soul-searching before coming up with his final decision. A careful tally was made of the alleged repeated and wilful nature of the offenses, and the evidence that licensee **E. G. Robinson** knew what was going on in his station. Alternate possibility of fines for the offenses was considered, but technicalities in the law ruled out anything but a yes or no on cancellation of license for this station.

NAB Code Again Bans Hard Liquor

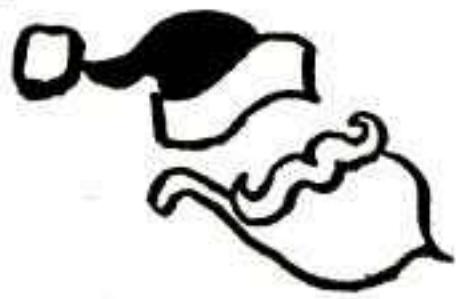

Two Federal Trade Commission representatives, **Edward F. Downes**, senior staff attorney, and **Seymour F. Stowe**, director of information, were guests of the code board at an informal luncheon here last week.

The code board also upheld limitation of advertising to 18 minutes in any single hour, or five minutes in any 15-minute segment, provided weekly average does not exceed 14 minutes per hour. Total radio code membership was given as 1,460 AM and FM stations, a 14 per cent increase over last July's count.

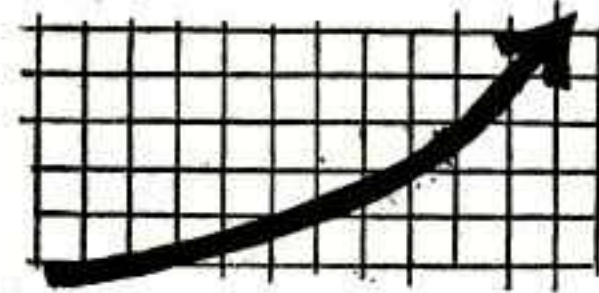

The impassioned Francis touch is evident on all the slower ballads, while humor and swing take over on the faster tunes. The Jordonaires and ork under the direction of Cliff Parman assist with taste.

ALLEN FREED'S GOLDEN PICS; MEMORY LANE; TOP 15



Various Artists. End LP 313, 314, 315—Here are three sock rock packages of old-time singles hits, many of them closely associated with Alan Freed in his heyday as a deejay on New York's WINS. First package, for example, contains old hits by Little Richard, the Chantels and Jimmy McCracklin, all current hit makers. On the second buyers will find "Crying in the Chapel," by Sonny Till and the Orioles; "Eddie My Love," by the Teen Queens and others, while the third offers fine efforts by Lloyd Price, Santo and Johnny, the Shirelles, Larry Williams, etc. This kind of oldie revival package has done well lately and all three of these can do likewise.

TWIST WITH BOBBY DARIN



Atco 138—A good idea and with the swinging, rocking Darin catalog, it was easy for Atco to put this one together in quickie fashion to cash in on the Twist phenomenon. Among the well-remembered Darin hits here are "Queen of the Hop," "You Must Have Been a Beautiful Baby," "Early in the Morning," etc., plus his newest single sides, "Multiplication" and "Irresistible You." Set can grab plenty of action.

THE COLORFUL PERCUSSIONS OF ARTHUR LYMAN



Life L 1005—Arthur Lyman has another fine package to follow up on his potent "Yellow Bird" set that hit the charts. This album is loaded for bear with strong material. Included are ear-delighting performances of "Exodus," "Never On Sunday" and "Blue Hawaii." A swinging change of pace in the program is provided by the group's jazz interpretation of "Moaning." A solid potential seller.

\$1,000,000 WORTH OF TWANG, VOL. II



Duane Eddy. Jamie JLP 70-3021—Duane Eddy had a hot one in his first "Twang" set and this could be another. It features such strong items as "Gidget Goes Hawaiian," "Pepe," "Theme From Dixie" and "Drivin' Home." Colorful cover will help this one sell many, many copies.

STRING BAND STRUM-ALONG



Tony Mottola. Command RS 828 SD (Stereo & Monaural)—This could be an instrumental answer to the vocal sing alongs. It features guitars, mandolins, ukuleles and banjos, strumming along in exciting arrangements of a flock of standards. Tunes include "Tiptoe Through the Tulips," "Bye, Bye Blackbird" and "12th Street Rag." Sound is bright and cheerful, and it makes solid listening fare.

NICE 'N' COOL



Gene Ammons. Prestige-Moodville MV 18—One of the strongest sellers in the Prestige catalog, tenor saxist Gene Ammons, shows his tender side on this LP of ballads. The hornman is in brilliant form playing such touching tunes as "Willow Weep for Me," "Little Girl Blue" and the one medium-tempo tune in the set, "I Remember You." Pianist Richard Wyands, one of the rhythm section of three, plays well throughout but excels on "Something I Dreamed Last Night."

SETTIN' THE PACE



John Coltrane. Prestige 7213—Devotees of the John Coltrane brand of styling should get a boot out of this one. Recorded when the tenor saxist was an exclusive Prestige artist some two years ago, the four tracks here reflect one of Coltrane's most productive periods. The repertoire is a bit out of the ordinary with "I See Your Face Before Me," "If There Is Someone Lovelier" and "Rise and Shine." Red Garland's presence on piano should be a boost to an already solid seller.

KEYBOARD GIANTS OF THE PAST



Various Artists. RCA Victor LM-2585—A release that will excite collectors of great classical piano playing, this contains nine examples of keyboard wizardry mainly from the days of 78 r.p.m. recording, and although several have been reissued in some form on LP, three have not. The artists include Rachmaninoff, Paderewski, Bauer, de Pachmann, Gabrilowitsch, Lhevinne, Rosenthal, Levitzki and William Kapell. These names alone are enough to sell this disk, apart from the extraordinary music.

Reprise R-6010—Soupy Sales has a top-rated TV children's show on the West Coast, and this package should step out briskly in that area. It also has solid appeal for the market nationally. Sales cavorts enjoyingly with his puppet characters White Fang, Black Tooth, Pookie and Hippie and warbles some entertaining comedy ditties.

THE WIND IN THE WILLOWS



Various Artists. London OSA 1216—A hugely amusing, entertaining and dramatic version of the fine children's story by Kenneth Grahame. The readings of the parts, with Richard Goolden as Mole, Frank Duncan as Rat, Tony Church as Badger, and narrator Patrick Waymark, along with the rest of the players are exceptional. This two-LP set makes magnificent giving at Christmas or any other time.

Roulette R25162—Pat Harrington and Bill Dana offer some hilarious impromptu characterizations of this re-release of tapes originally issued under the Signature label. Reporting direct to Lewis, Rowe heads a team including Tony Meehan, until October a member of Britain's leading rock group, the Shadows. Publishing

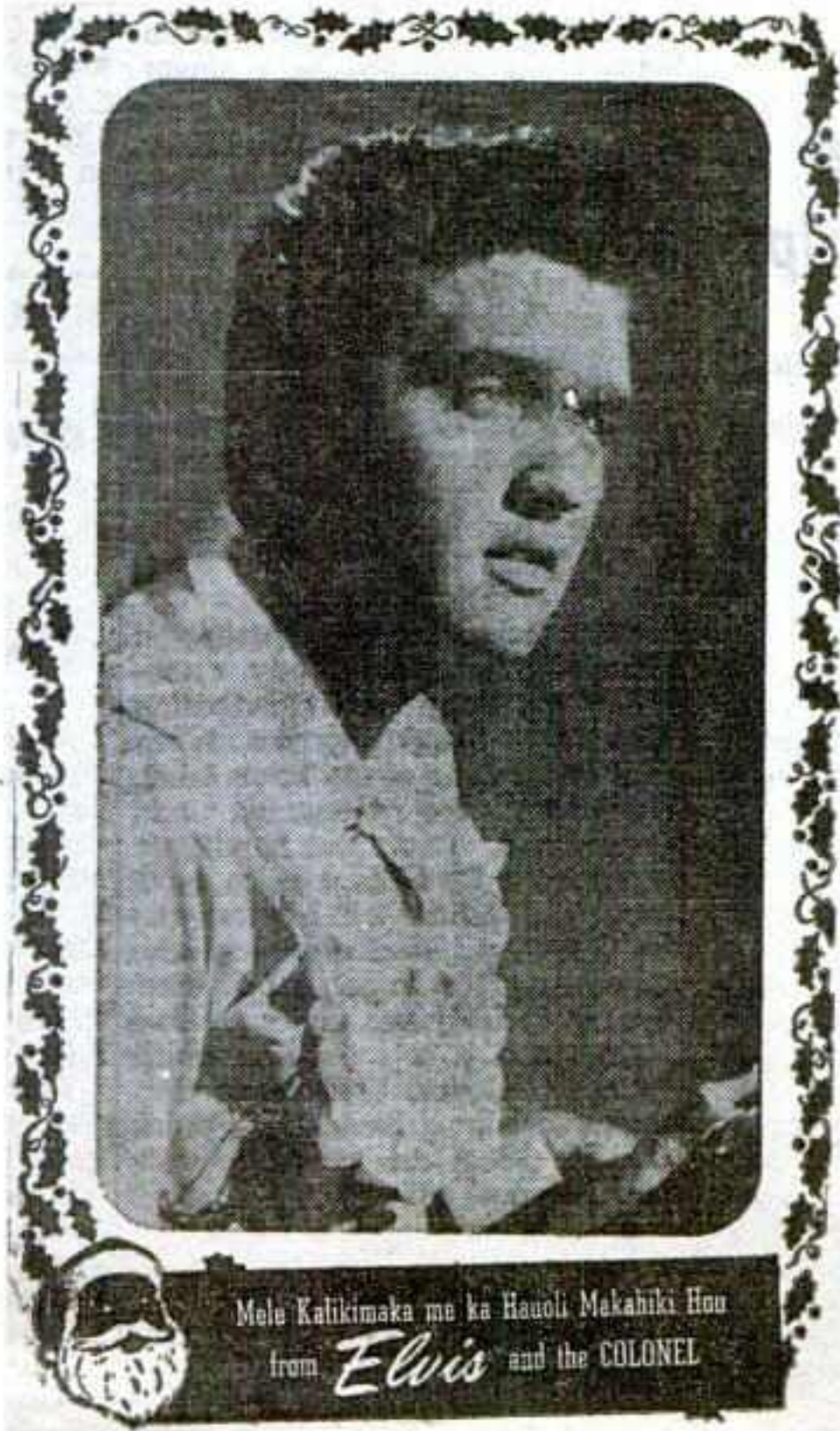

Vaughn will come to Germany at the beginning of next year to receive the award by Teldec, distributor of his Dot recordings on the London label. The band leader is currently climbing the charts with two titles especially suggested and produced for the German market: "Lilli Marlen" and "Zwei Gitarren am Meer." The other million seller is Ger-

Triola was heretofore represented by Bella Musica (now itself distributed by Metronome) in Germany. Austroton has also taken over the Italian label Jukebox exclusively for Germany and Switzerland. . . . The Frankfurt firm of Schallplattenimportdienst Bernhard Milkowski (exclusive distributor for several jazz labels including Verve, Blue Note, Riverside, Contemporary), starts a "buy five, get one" sales plan December 1 through January 31.

Frankie Avalon, whose Chancellor Records are now released by Sonet-Storyville (itself distributed by Metronome), will star for the first time in German TV, January 2, 1962. He will be shown during an interview with a German TV man, Werner Becker, in New York, on "Broadway Melody, 1962."

Toshiba Records cut **Francisco Canaro's** ork in stereo. Recordings include "Canaro en Japon," his latest composition, and other popular Japanese numbers. . . . Toshiba Records, affiliate of Angel and Kapp, for the first six-month term of 1961 (April 1 to September 30) achieved total sales of \$6,196,025 with a net profit of \$7,430. The sales showed an increase of nearly 100 per cent over the same period last year. Upsurging sales of Sonorama-like vinyl sheet disks and electric organs contributed. Business for the next period is expected to increase sales by about \$2,800,000.

Osaka Festival
The fifth Osaka Music Festival will raise the curtain with **Concertgebouw Orchestra** on April 12 and close with **Comedie Francaise** on May 2, 1962. The Dutch orchestra will perform five concerts under the direction of **Euge. Jochum** and **Virtuosi Di Roma**.

Best Seller
The current smash hit here is a disk from Venezuela, entitled in Japanese, "Coffee Rhumba." Originally titled "Ground Coffee," the Spanish disk was released by **Palacio Records** in Caracas featuring **Ugo Branco's** Indian harp. The record was marketed by **Nippon Grammophon**.

Diskeries
Nippon Victor's business result for the first six months of 1961 (April 21 to September 20) was \$26,360,292 in total sales, with a net profit of \$210,770. The dividend is 20 per cent per annum. The sales proportions of products are: records, 16.8 per cent; radios, 9.2 per cent; phonographs, 28.2 per cent; television receivers, 33.8 per cent, and other, 2 per cent. Exports for the same term came to around \$3,400,000.

Teichiku, affiliate of **Decca Records**, held a general shareholders' meeting on November 20. The total sales for the year September 21, 1960, to September 20, 1961, were \$1,731,869, with a net profit of \$169,354. This indicates an in-

crease of 20 per cent both in sales and profit. The sales target for the next year was set at \$2,200,000. **K. Nanko**, president, resigned in connection with **Matsushita Electric's** ("National" brand) recent investment, and one director of **Matsushita** joined **Teichiku** as an auditor. The present capital of 8,450,000 yen (\$23,500) will be doubled, with **Matsushita** owning the increased portion. **Matsushita** is to further purchase additional 10 per cent shares from one of **Teichiku's** directors to make its total holding 60 per cent. **Teichiku** has about 300 employees and its sales comprise 80 per cent Japanese and 20 per cent International (**Decca** and **Fonit**) records.

Nippon Grammophon, affiliate of **Deutsche Grammophon**, announced its total sales for the first fiscal six months of 1961 (April 1 to September 30) were \$1,007,005, and net profits \$67,294. This indicates an increase of \$416,666 in total sales and \$6,288 in net profits over the same term last year. It is expected the projected production of stereo phonographs for the next term will help further promote business of this firm. Unions of major recording companies are now in stiff negotiations with companies to determine the amount of year-end bonus. The amount per capita to be seemingly agreed upon will probably be between \$127 to \$146.

Another local find, and one that might have success overseas, is the **New Zealand** composition "Little Red Snowman," a **Southern** publication. It is already featured on all hit parades in the country, out on two labels, **Pye & Kiwi** here, **W & G** in Australia and selling like a **BMW** chart topper. RADIO REVIEW

George Crater—A Funny Cat

A fellow named George Crater is pioneering as a new type of comic—a jazz comic. He's funny and he's hip, so hip in fact that he's only heard over FM radio in New York, on Saturday evenings at 6 p.m. over Station WNCN. Although he talks about anything that comes into his mind, from bomb shelters to selling Bibles from door-to-door, he isn't so far out that he's hard for the young adults to understand and enjoy, and he stays away from the sick area of comedy entirely.

Between his monologs he spins jazz records, and these are not too far out either—not the Ornette Coleman type things, but the Herman Herds or the Al Cohn-Zoot Sims stuff. Crater's real name is Eddie Sherman, but he's stuck with the pseudonym since he uses it for a Downbeat magazine column. As a jazz comic he yaks a lot about the jazz world, but not too much, and his routines are full of bright, sharp lines, which appear to be as enjoyable to him as they are to his listeners.

Crater got a little rep via his album on the Riverside label, which contained his clever routine about the windup dolls. He could gain more through his FM stint and his appearances at jazz shows around town. His material is his own. Crater's type of comedy will probably never make him a mass favorite, but his rather whimsical and satiric humor should gain him a sizable following in the East; at any rate, with the knowledgeable, jazz-oriented, young in-groups. country in the world to meet the local RCA Victor people. He will be recorded by his own record production firm, Camy Productions, and these records will be released on exclusive basis by RCA Victor throughout the world.

In general, Filipino songs and compositions become popular only in the Philippines. But an exception to this rule is the now well-known Filipino composition entitled "Dahil Sa Iyo," which in English is "Because of You."

Contrary to mistaken belief, "Dahil Sa Iyo" is not a folk song and does not belong to the public domain, but is very much private property and duly copyrighted according to law. The composer is Miguel Velarde Jr.

Aside from the fact that this song has been translated into English and is popular in the night club circuit abroad, such as in Japan, Australia and the United States, this song has been recorded by several companies.

The publishers in the Philippines and abroad is the foremost Philippine phonograph record manufacturer, Mareco, Inc., while in Japan it is handled, with proper authority, by the Japanese Society of Rights of Authors and Composers.

Anita Lindblom has made a sensation with her gospel-styled "Sant ar livet" on Philips. "Sant ar livet" is the Swedish lyric to the American tune "You Can Have Her," which first was known here through the Lenny Welch recording on Cadence.

The Germans have made a stir about the Swedish recording of "Alpens ros" by the Violents, Swedish rock and roll quartet. Ten thousand copies of the record have been sold to Germany under the name of "Alpenrose." The Germans maintain that it is a jazzified version of the Nazi song "Horst Wessel." In fact "Alpens ros" is a very old Swedish folk song with only a very slight similarity to "Horst Wessel."

The music publisher Ake Gerhard has sold three of his tunes in the States, "Augustin," "Kara mor" and "Petter och Frida." He also has got an order from America for Swedish lyrics to "Little Sister" and three other American tunes and he is wondering which American artist is going to sing them.

Bunny, Kids Make Sing Along Scene

NEW YORK—Breezy the rabbit, a character close in concept and the chattering laugh sound to Bugs Bunny, makes his disk bow in a series of five kiddie song along sets turned out by Era Records. Each begins with a brief singing introduction by the rabbit (the corner of the voice is not identified) and then breaks into the particular type of song material for the album.

The current "Sing-Along With Breezy" includes "All-Time Favorites" (like "Old MacDonald," "Mary Had a Little Lamb"), 5001; "Famous Folk Songs" ("Old Smoky," "Skip to My Lou," etc.), 5002; "A Song Trip Around the World" ("Sailing Sailing," "Funiculi Funicula," etc.), 5003; "Children's Party Songs" ("Farmer in the Dell," "Polly Woolly Doodle," etc.), 5004, and "Songs of Christmas" ("Jingle Bells," "Silent Night," etc.), 5005. The rabbit sings with his children pals to organ and rhythm accompaniment on all these selections, and though the kiddie chorus seems to go out of its way at times to be off-key and disorganized, still children will catch the infectious quality of the idea. ★★★★ BASH
The Dave Bailey Sextet. Jazz Line JAZZ 33-01—Bright, tuneful flowing for "in" jazz devotees on this LP. The tracks are filled with fine work, especially pianist Tommy Flanagan and trumpeter Kenny Dorham, two deft players in the modern, non-far out school. Leader-drummer Bailey makes things move along nicely while his cohort on bass, Ben Tucker, accomplishes his job with ease. Tenor saxist Frank Haynes and trombonist Curtis Fuller play nicely also.

★★★★ SOUL BROTHER
Harold Corbin. Roulette R 52079 — A highly listenable jazz album in the com-

mercial vein. The pianist is accompanied by a rhythm section on 11 tracks. It is the album debut for the boy who has a fine flair for the dramatic. He has learned a great deal from listening to both Erroll Garner and Ahmad Jamal and he puts his learning to good use on any number of tunes—ballads and standards mostly.

Birgit Nilsson as "Amelia," and Giulietta Simonata as Ulrica in this performance of Verdi's fine works. Though performed far less than such standards as "Traviata," or "Aida," the opera maintains the lyrical,

musical touch of Verdi, and with a cast like this it should certainly enjoy a demand, especially from stereo buyers who have little else from which to choose. The three-LP set also includes an illustrated booklet with English-Italian script.

★★★★ BIZET SYMPHONY IN C MAJOR
Ernest Ansermet Cond. L'Orchestre de la Suisse Romande. London CS 208 (Stereo & Monaural)—Bizet's familiar Symphony in C Major and the delightful "Jeux D'Enfants" are performed sympathetically here by the L'Orchestre de la Suisse Romande under Ernest Ansermet. The increasing popularity of Bizet's works, and the fine quality of the recording should help this LP reap steady sales.

★★★★ TCHAIKOVSKY-DVORAK VIOLIN CONCERTOS
Ruggiero Ricci and the London Symphony Orchestra, Sir Malcolm Sargent cond. London CS 215 (Stereo & Monaural)—Superb performances of both the Tchaikovsky Violin Concerto in D Major and the Dvorak Violin Concerto in A Minor make this album a delight. Ricci is outstanding here, and the orchestra under Sir Malcolm Sargent is in excellent form. Fine recording quality and the flawless playing of Ricci could turn this album into a very strong seller.

★★★★ LIST: FAMOUS PIANO TRANSCRIPTIONS FROM MOZART TO MENDELSSOHN
Egon Petri. Westminster WST 119 (Stereo & Monaural)—At the age of 80,

Egon Petri probably is the dean of the great living pianists but his age scarcely shows in the agility with which he breezes through some of the most dazzling keyboard works in the repertoire from Liszt's piano transcriptions. These include the "Mephisto Waltz," the lovely waltz from Gounod's "Faust," Beethoven's "Adelaide," the wedding march and dance of the elves from Mendelssohn's "Midsummer Nights Dream" music, and a fantasy from Mozart's "Marriage of Figaro." International fans of Petri will be interested in his return to the recording studios.

★★★★ STRAVINSKY: LES NOCES SYMPHONY OF PSALMS
Ansermet, Cond. L'Orchestra De La Suisse Romande. London CS 6219 (Stereo & Monaural)—An excellent reading in rewarding stereo sound of these two not-often heard Stravinsky works. Maestro Ansermet directs the orchestra masterfully with color and technical precision. There are not many recordings available on these pieces, and this is the only stereo version listed. The attractive cover should aid sales, too.

★★★★ TCHAIKOVSKY: THE NUTCRACKER BALLET COMPLETE
Utah Symphony Ork. Maurice Abravanel, cond. Vanguard SRV 123—Maurice Abravanel conducts the Utah Symphony Orchestra in a stimulating reading of the popular "Nutcracker Ballet." Although there are many fine recordings available on this Tchaikovsky war horse, this top quality stereo version of the complete work in two disks should capture its share of the market. A good gift item for this season as well.

THREE-STAR records, having moderate sales potential, are listed thereafter; these frequently will be of interest for disk jockey programming. Other records, with limited sales potential, are listed following the Three-Star records.

SPECIAL MERIT SPOTLIGHTS, in the opinion of the Reviewing Panel, have outstanding merit and deserve exposure.

whose roots don't spring from the Balkan state. Exciting rhythms, excellent vocals by soloists and chorus, exotic instruments—all make a pleasing mixture with good sound appeal.

★★★★ LISBOA ANTIGUA
Fernanda Maria. Monitor MFS 33—The Portuguese "fado" has developed a following in the U. S. in the past few years. The air of worldly sadness, the minor keys, the harmonies of the two accompanying guitars, all make the music distinctive and pleasing. Fernanda Maria is a youthful exponent whose voice carries rather more sweetness and less tragedy than many, but she has a lovely voice and fine grasp of the style and should make new friends for the music as well as satisfy present followers.

★★★★ SWEDEN REMEMBERS ERNST ROF
Gunnar Lunden-Welde Orchestra. Fiesta FLP 1337—Ernst Rolf, Sweden's beloved entertainer-producer, is honored in this new album with a collection of tunes that he made famous back in the 1920's. The tunes, most of which were featured in many shows he produced, are mainly gay, melodic items, and they are played warmly here by the Gunnar Lunden-Welde Orchestra. Set should interest many of Swedish descent as well as those who enjoy liting tunes.

★★★★ SING ALONG IN GREEK WITH TETOS DEMETRIADES AND HIS FRIENDS
Colonial LP-198—There you have it: A Greek sing-along. This is a good package for specialty shops catering to Greek clientele. Fine for a party. Twenty-seven songs in all.

★★★★ MORE YVES MONTAND
Yves Montand. Columbia WS 380—The sock showmanship and suave Gallic charm of French star Montand are aptly showcased on this package. Warbling (in French) with his usual verve and exuberance, Montand registers solidly with "Bilbao Song," and other newly recorded tunes. His recent Broadway appearance should help sales.

LATIN AMERICAN

★★★★ MISTER PACHANGA
Jose Fajardo and His Ork. Columbia EX 5069—One of the more celebrated of the erstwhile Cuban maestro, Fajardo now is States-based and has appeared in the Waldorf and other elegant spots with his infectious Charanga scorings. Though the Twist seems to have a currently dominating position with dancers, there are still plenty who go for the Latin terp scene, and for them, this is a solid sampling of rhythms, appealingly played by the ork.

FOLK

★★★★ HANGIN', DRINKIN' AND STUFF
Art and Paul. Columbia CS 8502—The first two words of the title refer to folk song material found in this album, and "Stuff" to other generalized folk material. Packaged in well produced and will be liked by buffs of the folk genre. Included are "Lace Maker of Villa Bella," "The Hangman," and "Moonshiner."

★★★★ PASTURES OF PLENTY
The Harvester. Folkways FA 28 — The Harvesters, four New Yorkers, are a good new folk group, who sing folk items from many parts of the world with warmth and

style. The members of the group have been actively engaged in singing folk items for years, and all of them were members of the Jewish Young Folksinger's Chorus. This album, recorded in Hollywood while the group was playing the Ash Grove, shows off their listenable style on such tunes as "This Land Is My Land" and "Mule Skinner Blues."

SPOKEN WORD

★★★★ THE REST IS SIMPLE
Melvin Stewart. Folkways FL 9789—Two important names are paired here to produce a set with considerable appeal to followers of both. In all there are five monologs taken from various books by Langston Hughes, including the one bearing the title of the album, and they are read by the well-known Negro actor, Melvin Stewart. The material, for the most part takes the various plights of the Negro and treats them in a rather jocular vein. An interesting contribution for the collectors of this kind of lore.

★★★★ TIMON OF ATHENS
The Marlowe Society and Professional Players. London OSA 1322—Another high caliber performance by the Marlowe Society and Professional Players in the Shakespeare series on the London label. Unfortunately this particular play, "Timon of Athens," is not one of the Bard's most popular in the way of performances or study. Perhaps, since there are some very beautiful passages of poetry in this play, this excellent recording will help to stimulate more interest in the work. Quality item for collectors.

★★★★ SHAKESPEARE: KING JOHN (4-LP)
Marlowe Society. London OSA 1413—Here's an excellent Shakespearean package by the Marlowe Society. The handsomely packaged four-LP set features solid performances of the Bard's complete and uncut work. Should have strong appeal for collectors and drama students.

★★★★ MAKE FRIENDS WITH ARCHIE CAMPBELL
Starday SLP 162—Campbell is a homespun type from the Eastern Tennessee hills. As announcer, funny man and singer, he's also a regular on WSM's "Grand Ole Opry," which can generate a measure of sales for this album. The tunes are largely inspirational, and in some cases sacred themes are expressed. Material includes the likes of "Grab a Little Sunshine," "Make Friends," and the humor-tinged "Green Stamps."

★★★★ BABES IN TOYLAND, CASTLES IN SPAIN, TOYLAND
John Allen. Golden Record 684 — John Allen does a special narration of the story of "Babes in Toyland" here while the Sandpipers fill in with various melodies from the Victor Herbert score. Good wax for the younger kiddie group.

★★★★ BABY'S MOTHER GOOSE
The London Players and Rhymers. Golden Record EP 676—For the real small fry (up to perhaps the first grade level) is this six-tune EP, well performed with nice arrangements by the London group. Y.: "A lot is said about promoting c.&w. music but nothing can be done about it if the records don't reach the deejays who spin them. The big companies are the worst offenders. Many deejays have dropped country shows because they've had to

Mull Further Mkt. Tariff Cut

BRUSSELS — The European Economic Community's Council of Ministers is considering a proposed further 10 per cent cut in Common Market internal tariffs by this December 31. This cut would be in addition to a 10 per cent cut already scheduled to take effect on that date, and if the additional 10 per cent reduction (or 20 per cent altogether) is approved, it would bring the total reduction in Common Market internal tariffs to 50 per cent.

All coin machines will be included in tariff cuts—juke boxes, games and vending equipment. West German coin machine interests are strongly supporting the acceleration of tariff cutting in anticipation of increased sales in the French and Italian markets.

Eindhoven Ops Forming Co-Op

EINDHOVEN, Holland—A group of five operators in the industrial section of Holland are experimenting with an operator co-operative designed to give the small individual operator the advantages of a large operating organization. The Eindhoven operators have pooled equipment for repair and servicing, jointly hiring service technicians and thus eliminating overlapping service arrangements. Equipment purchasing is being done on a pooled basis, and purchasing standardized. This means larger discounts and improved financing terms for the co-operative operators. Finally, the co-operative handles the adjudication of disputes between its members and locations. Each participating operator retains his financial independence, paying into the co-operative on a pro-rated basis for specific expenditures.

**Public's Mood Spells Change,
Thinks MOA's E. R. Ratajack**

CHICAGO—Edward R. Ratajack, managing director of the Music Operators of America, this week predicted that juke box collections will rise in 1962 "if the music operator doesn't ignore the mood change the American public is going through."

Ratajack bases his prediction of what he feels is a proven relationship between economic trends in the juke box industry and the record industry.

"Juke box operating," Ratajack explained, "is a peculiar industry. While a cash business is vulnerable to reaction to general business conditions, it does not always follow the pattern of the national economy."

Industry Studies

Ratajack has made a study of the juke box and record industries from 1934-1941 and from 1954-1961, with the war years and the immediate postwar period omitted.

He discovered that in the 1934-1941 period, juke box collections and single record sales followed a roughly parallel pattern. But, in the 1954-1961 period, single record sales (based on share of total record market) described an arc, reaching a peak in 1958 and dropping to a new low in 1961.

During this period, juke box collections maintained a slightly downward trend, starting out in the same relative position as single record sales in 1954 and hitting the same relative position in 1961.

Teen-Age Activity

According to Ratajack, "an examination of the economic factors reveals that after following parallel courses for a number of years, the record industry's graphs took an

upward surge which the juke box industry did not follow. The upward swing of the record business was primarily due to teen-age pattern of interest in artist and repertoire.

"The average juke box patron would not pay to hear these tunes. Juke box business dropped off, not violently, but steadily. A drastic drop-off was prevented by two factors—the operator's reliance on standards, and the juke box manufacturer's attempts to put in compensating income-raising factors in the instrument itself.

"About two years ago, the upsurge in the single record business was halted by the sudden drop-off in teen and pre-teen interest. Business fell gradually until the cycle line not only joined the juke box line, but fell below it.

Upward Cycle

In the past several months, the record line again rose and joined up with the juke box graph line. Today, both are in an upward trend. The new upward cycle has begun for both industries.

"This upward trend will die abornin' if the music operator ignores the mood change cycle of the public. People have had enough

**Chicago Operators Bank on Standards,
But New Francis, Miller Disks Help Out**

CHICAGO — Operators leaned heavily on old standards for the majority of their programming last week but several new items were also getting good sales response.

Biggest seller to the juke box trade was Connie Francis' new two-sided hit: "Baby's First Christmas" b-w "When the Boy in Your Arms." The latter tune has been climbing on BMW's charts for five weeks, and the flip Christmas side is now starting to pick up everywhere.

Another big seller is the Mitch Miller Christmas pack. The package was first tried out by operators a few weeks ago, and is now being reordered for most stops.

Big Sellers

Big sellers in the non-holiday category, according to Singer One-stop here, include: "Smoke y

Places" Corsairs (took off in store sales here about a month ago; "I Don't Know Why" Linda Scott; "A Little Bitty Tear," Burl Ives (a breakout in Chicago store sales last week, and now starting to get heavy air play. The tune started as a c.&w. item and has gone popular. Oddly enough, Singer reports it's still getting stronger response from operators than stores); and "Town Without Pity" Gene Pitney (equally strong with operators and stores).

Generally, operators report good business, with collections anywhere from a "little ahead" to as much as 25 to 30 per cent ahead of last year.

Typical is Moses Proffitt of South Central Novelty, large Southside operator here, who reported business about 25 per cent ahead of last year and only about 5 per

cent under 1959, the firm's second best year. (Best was 1953 — but only a couple of percentage points ahead of 1959).

Last Year

Last year, said Proffitt, South Central was hurt in December by the heavy snowfall between December 20 and January 1. Unemployment and urban renewal were also big factors.

This year, the weather has been better, but the big change has been the increased employment. The Southside in particular was hurt by shutdowns of meat-packing plants—many of which have been moved from Chicago to Omaha, Davenport, Ia., and Denver. Most people have now adjusted to the plants closing down and have moved to new jobs.

The tunes getting most play seem to vary by neighborhood and type of location. On the Southside, for example, Porffitt reports "Unchain My Heart" Ray Charles getting the biggest response.

New Records

Other new records being put out by Proffitt this week include: "Christmas Song," Nat King Cole; "Silent Night," Mahalia Jackson; "Merry Christmas," Charles Brown; "Lonesome Christmas," Lowell Fulson; "The Light," Dinah Washington, and "This Time of Year," Brook Benton.

On the Northeast side at Paul Brown's Western Automatic Music, Inc., the tunes getting the most play are: "The Lion Sleeps Tonight," Tokens; "Let There Be Drums," Sandy Nelson; the Mitch Miller Christmas package of five records, and "Run To Him," Bobby Vee.

New material bought by Brown last week includes: "Little Altar Boy," Vic Dana; "Pocketful of Miracles," Frank Sinatra, and "Jingle Bell Rock," Chubby Checker and Bobby Rydell. All, of course, are big on the charts.

Standards

Brown is also going heavy with holiday standards, with the most

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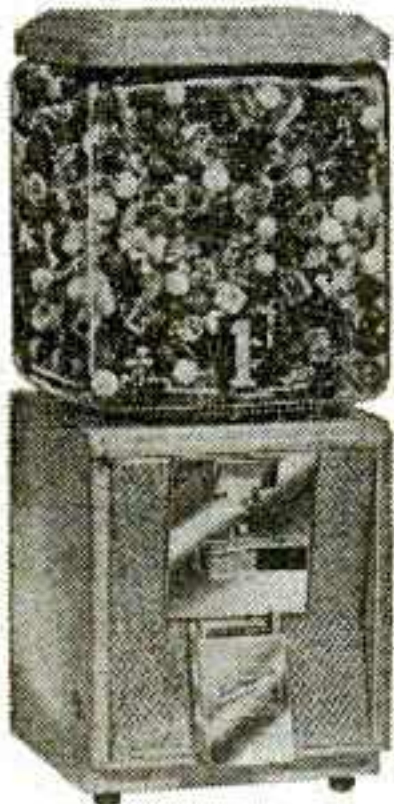
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Specializing in Service Station Needs; Image Holds, Builds Tex. Bulk Route

ARLINGTON, Tex.—Creating the same sort of "public image" as big national business corporations strive to achieve is not only advisable in bulk vending operations but actually indispensable to healthy collections, according to M. J. Whitehead, long-established operator here.



Whitehead, with more than 20 years behind him in bulk vending, specializes in service station locations in the six network of highways connecting Dallas and Fort Worth, 30 miles apart. Vending ball gum, peanuts, and tab gum exclusively, he has held most of his locations for more than a decade, and some of them for twice that long, through good personal and business relations.

Recognizing the fact that the bulk vending route operator is usually a shadowy figure whom the location owners sees only briefly once or twice per month, Whitehead deliberately allows himself just about twice as long a period of time to service each route as is usually the case.

Conversation

The extra time is spent in conversation with location owners or employees, and even customers, introducing himself as a bulk operator, discussing any point which will help to impress his face and personality upon the location owner.

Thoroughly familiar with the service-station industry, Whitehead can talk such elements as volume-building and gasoline and service sales, legislation which affects service station operation, and similar points, on an intelligent plane.

Frequently he has been able to help a service station locate a needed mechanic, one service station operator to sell unneeded equipment to an-

other who is searching for exactly the same item, etc.

Acting as a "clearing house" of information on the service station field in general, the Texas operator has won a lot of respect from location owners everywhere.

Business Garb

Out on the route, Whitehead wears a business suit, tie and hat. At first glance, he is more likely to be mistaken for a salesman than a bulk route operator—all of which he feels is well and good. An elderly man with white mustache and hair, he can, of course, match his appearance to his name, another point which helps.

Advantages which accrue from presenting a strong image in the location owner's mind are many, Whitehead indicated. First, location owners are inclined to take far better care of the vending machines, keeping them convenient to customers, bringing them inside in the event of bad weather, and even polishing and cleaning up machines as part of over-all appearance maintenance operation.

Another advantage has come from the fact that former employees of large service stations, who go into the business themselves, signing leases for brand-new stations, quite frequently telephone Whitehead at Arlington, and ask whether he would like to install bulk venders in the new station going up. (There have been at least 36 such unsolicited installations developed in the past two years.)

Like many businessmen who retire, Whitehead found inactivity bothersome, and enjoys his route operations tremendously. With no stop more than a 15-minute drive or so from his headquarters, he never has too much to handle and looks upon service station owners and employees as friends, throughout his whole territory.

Folz Stock Begins 1st Week of Jan.

OCEANSIDE, L. I., N. Y.—Trading in the stock of Folz Vending Company, Inc., is expected to begin around the first week in January, according to Roger Folz, president. The firm, which operates about 20,000 machines, is the first bulk vending operation to offer its stock to the public.

Folz said the sale of the stock is going "very well," according to the underwriters. Some 55,000 shares are being offered at \$6 a share.

COURT DECISION

Find Detroit Bulk Operator Sole Heir to \$250,000 Will

DETROIT—Frank F. Hopkins, Detroit bulk vending operator with a route of penny venders for about a quarter century, received national attention this past week when he was declared the sole heir of a quarter-million-dollar fortune left by his father, through the decision of a Probate Judge in Kansas City, Mo.

Hopkins, like a number of penny machine operators, is blind, and, according to the press summary of an unusual history, he agreed to keep his existence secret when his father, now deceased, married for a third time in 1914, with the implication that the father's wife was not to know that the father had a blind son.

The reports stated that Frank Hopkins last contacted his father by telephone in 1931, and that the court ruled the father either had forgotten the existence of his son or was mentally unable to remember him in his will.

Frank Hopkins also operated scales and other types of vending

equipment, retiring from active operation some time ago. His son, Carl F. Hopkins, who formerly assisted him in the operation of his route, is now head of Hopkins Vending, a diversified operation in the Detroit area.

2 Ohio Vending Firms Merge

DAYTON, Ohio—A merger of the Acme Merchandise Vending Company, Inc. and the vending operations of the Miami Cigar and Tobacco Company, into an organization with about 1,200 vending machines, was announced by the principals.

Name of the new organization will be the Acme-Miami Vending Company.

Headquarters for the merged operation have been established at Acme's Springfield Street facility.

Details

Details were outlined by George L. Flanagan Jr., president of Acme and of the new firm, and Ralph Skilken, president of Miami Cigar and vice-president of the new partnership.

Skilken emphasized that only his firm's vending operations, known as Miami Vending of Dayton, are involved in the merger. Nor does the deal involve Flanagan's Air City Distributing Company.

The report of the merger settles a sea of rumors about the two companies for several months.

Size

Skilken asserted that "there are no negotiations at this time to sell the vending operations to an out-of-town company."

Acme operates about 500 cigarette vending machines, plus around 200 others for food and soft drinks. Miami has about 500 (Continued on page 50)

Abby Vending Will Introduce New Machine

BROOKLYN—The Abby Vending Manufacturing Company will go into production on a two-column card and merchandise machine by the end of the month, according to Jack Marofsky, president.

Marofsky said the machine will vend 5-cent gags and toys in one column, and trading cards in the other column, with a capacity of \$15 worth of merchandise. He added that the unit will fit on most bulk vending multiple stands.

The firm has just finished its consolidation move in the Brooklyn plan, with manufacturing space about doubled.

Abby recently announced that its common stock is being offered to the general public (BMW, December 11).

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Scare'ems Pull Heavy Response

NEW YORK — Paul A. Price, Inc., local charm manufacturer, reports that response has been excellent to the firm's new Scare'ems series.

Designed for use in either 5-cent or 10-cent capsule machines, the series consists of nine assorted reptiles and other repulsive creatures. The line-up includes an eight-inch snake, a seven-inch snake, a frog, mouse, lizard, spider and scorpion, in various colors.

The charms are molded from a soft plastic, and they have a cold, slimy feeling, akin to that associated with reptiles.

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Berlin Ops Say 'Nuts' to Reds As Machines Move Into Bars

By OMER ANDERSON
WEST BERLIN—Their collections diminished by the Communist seizure of East Berlin, West Berlin juke box operators are diversifying into bulk vending—in a most resourceful manner. They are answering "nuts" to the Communists, who boasted that the

loss of East German patronage would put "many" West Berlin juke box operators out of business.

Operators are having spectacular success in placing bulk vending machines alongside juke boxes in bars, taverns, and even snack bars. Operators here are finding that nuts are a red-hot bulk vending item in tandem with juke boxes.

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No More Free Nuts
It is easy to induce bars and bistros to discontinue the free supplying of nuts with drinks and force patrons to patronize the bulk vending machines of the juke box operator.

The location not only saves the cost of the nuts but also gets a cut from the bulk vending receipts.

Many bars and bistros had never supplied nuts to their patrons. Checks show that most such locations report a noticeable increase in receipts, the nuts stimulating liquid intake.

Aids Juke Box
At the same time the bulk vending machines appear to stimulate juke box play. An operator explained, "As nearly as we can figure, patrons get nuts from the machine, and while they are at the machine they also drop a coin in the juke box."

Peanuts are the most popular machine stock, but some operators are experimenting with more expensive nuts, and charging accordingly. Some operators are thinking in terms of multi-head venders selling several varieties of nuts.

At the moment a number of operators are having vending machines built with heating units for certain varieties.

Latest Bullwinkle, Rocky Charms Deb

NEW YORK — Karl Guggenheim, Inc., this week released the latest in its series of Bullwinkle and Rocky charms — a flexible plastic item which may be used as either a ring or tie clasp.

The charm has a flexible loop in back, which, when crimped serves as a tie clasp. When extended, it is used as a ring. The Bullwinkle and Rocky series is based on the popular kiddie television series.

German Mfrs. Pitching Danes

COPENHAGEN — German coin machine producers are opening a sales drive in Denmark and the rest of Scandinavia to dovetail with negotiations to bring Britain into the European Common Market. If Britain enters the big market, as is now virtually certain, Denmark and the rest of Sandinavia will follow, or so it is being assumed by the German firms. German firms are striving to persuade Scandinavian customers that the Common Market automatically will give producers inside the supermarket a competitive advantage, and that, therefore, they should switch to German equipment now in anticipation of the trading reshuffle. This applies to operating concerns particularly with mixed equipment of multi-national origin. Inducements are being offered such firms to standardize with all German equipment. Bergmann, NSM, and Tonomat (the AMI German subsidiary) are particularly strong in the Danish market.

Competition Automatics in New Hq.

ANTWERP — Alex Van de Wege has moved his coin machine firm, Competition Automatics, into a new building at Aartselaar, on the Brussels-Antwerp highway. Van de Wege, president of the Union Belge de l'Automatic, the Belgian operator and general trade associations, deals in juke boxes, games and vending equipment. The ultra-modern new building contains showrooms, workshops, and office space.

Mount Anti-Location Owner Drive

FRANKFURT—German operators are mounting an operator-to-location public relations drive aimed at acquainting the location with the many headaches involved in juke box operation. The drive is aimed at discouraging location ownership of equipment by familiarizing locations with the problems involved. An operator association official here explained, "As a rule, operators have only themselves to blame for the spread of location ownership. The time to prevent, or at least to discourage, location ownership of equipment is before it occurs—not afterward. Once a location is saddled with equipment, it is usually easier to keep it and try to recover the money invested or the contract assumed than to go back to operator ownership. However, our surveys show that most locations never would have attempted juke box ownership had they known what they were getting into. The operator can forestall most of the location ownership simply by chatting with the location about his headaches." German operator associations are encouraging what is called the "Partner ploy," the operator treating the location as his business partner.

IF YOU KNOW WHAT YOU'RE DOING:

Juke Box Rentals Can Be Source Of Extra Income During Holidays

CHICAGO—Renting older juke boxes for parties and social functions can be a profitable business but you have to do enough of it and charge enough for the service to come out, according to Paul Brown of Western Automatic Music, Inc., here.

Brown has been renting equipment for over 10 years and has built it into a very nice—if small—sideline.

Most of the activity is, of course, during Christmas and New Year's but Brown does a steady volume during the year also.

Price

The price structure is the most important thing, he feels. "We charge a flat \$50 for an 80 or more selection machine and \$30 for a 40-selection model."

This includes delivery, setting up of the machine and complete programming. The machine is set on free play and Brown furnishes any supplementary speakers that might be needed.

Brown prefers the AMI "D" in the 40-selection category and the AMI-D-80 or Seeburg "B" "C" or "G" models in the 80 or above selection group. "The AMI-D is a little easier to handle so we use it in the hard-to-get-to locations," Brown notes.

Deliveries

The machines he used are those already retired from locations and kept in stock specifically for rental purposes. He has a steady flow of about a half dozen machines out during the year with the number going up substantially during the holidays.

For making deliveries, Brown

prefers the new Chevrolet Corvair rampside truck which has room for two juke boxes or three cigaret machines.

Big feature he feels is that it's ideal for unloading. The truck's drop center is only 15 inches off the ground so you have a very slight loading incline to worry about.

Less Parties

"One thing we note," says Brown, "is the drop off in office Christmas parties," which he feels is due primarily to the large amount of "poor publicity" such parties have received during the past few years.

Brown numbers quite a few "regular customers" in his rental business—"many have been with us for close to 10 years." Christmas customers are mainly business organizations — factories and distributors.

During the rest of the year, he rents phonographs for weddings, confirmations, graduation parties, club affairs and even picnics.

Deposit

One important rule of the business—he feels—is to be sure and receive a written confirmation from business organizations and a deposit from the private parties.

"Many times the private parties have several people who will call different operators for a juke box, and the first one to come gets the location and the money."

Most rental business is done on weekends, but during the Christmas holidays the office parties are often held all week and the machines are constantly busy.

Perhaps most significant is

Brown's philosophy about the entire thing. "We're not crazy about the business, but it can be profitable if you carefully figure your cost and charge accordingly." He feels many operators in the rental business tend to think of it as something extra and aren't realistic about the time it takes to get the machine ready for operation.

He doesn't feel it's good to cut corners, since people would much rather pay a little extra and receive top records and a good phonograph.

He advises other operators to remember the following in computing cost of rental: (1) Servicing and cleaning machine up for delivery. (2) Programming with good record selection. (3) Delivery and installation — generally two men are needed. (4) Service calls if machine breaks down during operation. These have to be made promptly since there's no better way of "killing" a party than having the music stop. (5) Picking up the machine after use.

If all these things are taken into consideration and costs figured realistically, says Brown, the business can be a very nice "plus" to your operation.



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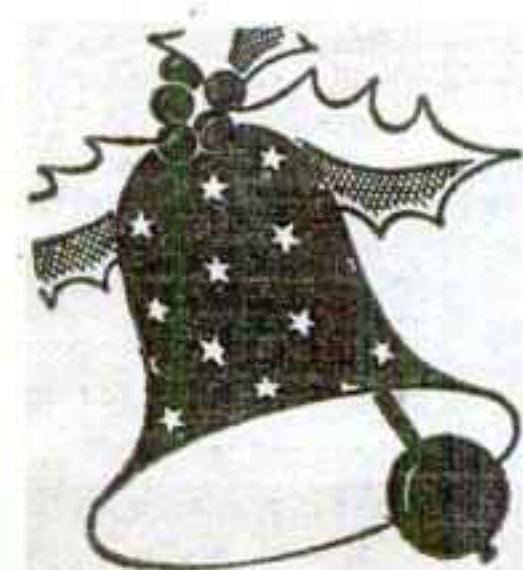

A series of tycoon parlor games are developing around the juke box rage. One of them is "Guess That Tune," in which guests wager the numbers of a list of records placed in the box without identification.

Lucky Tunes

There are endless variations on this theme. In one variation the guests keep depositing gold coins into the box until one guest plays the lucky tune, the collection of gold coins from the game going to him.

Another variation is played with disks so titled as to require a participant to perform a certain act (a la "Truth or Consequences"). Disks are placed in the juke box anonymously, and participants draw numbers, the number drawn determining the order in which they play selections.

Still another game is called "Know Those Coins," with the coin slot being adjusted specially for one certain kind of rare coin or unusual coin.

For example, one prominent Ruhr tycoon threw a party in his Bavarian holiday castle at which each guest was required to appear with a "do-it-yourself" disk for juke box play. Some tycoons sang and others played musical instruments, their artistic performance being professionally recorded for juke box playing at the party.

The coin insertion mechanism of the host's juke box was then altered to take only American silver dollars. The party was then staged, deep in the Bavarian Alps, with a Western mining camp setting, guests turning up in miner and bar belle garb, pockets and handbags clanking with silver dollars.

There are various reasons for the juke box' appeal to Ruhr tycoons. One is the sheer novelty; another is the shortage of musicians because of the general labor dearth, which makes private dance bands difficult to hire.

The Duesseldorf distributor observed, "You must remember that some of these tycoons really have everything. They're loaded to the extent that only novelties appeal to them.

"A juke box gives a party 'atmosphere' and originality. Aside from gagging it up, having a number of juke boxes sited around some of these fantastic mansions lets the guests amuse themselves playing their favorite music."

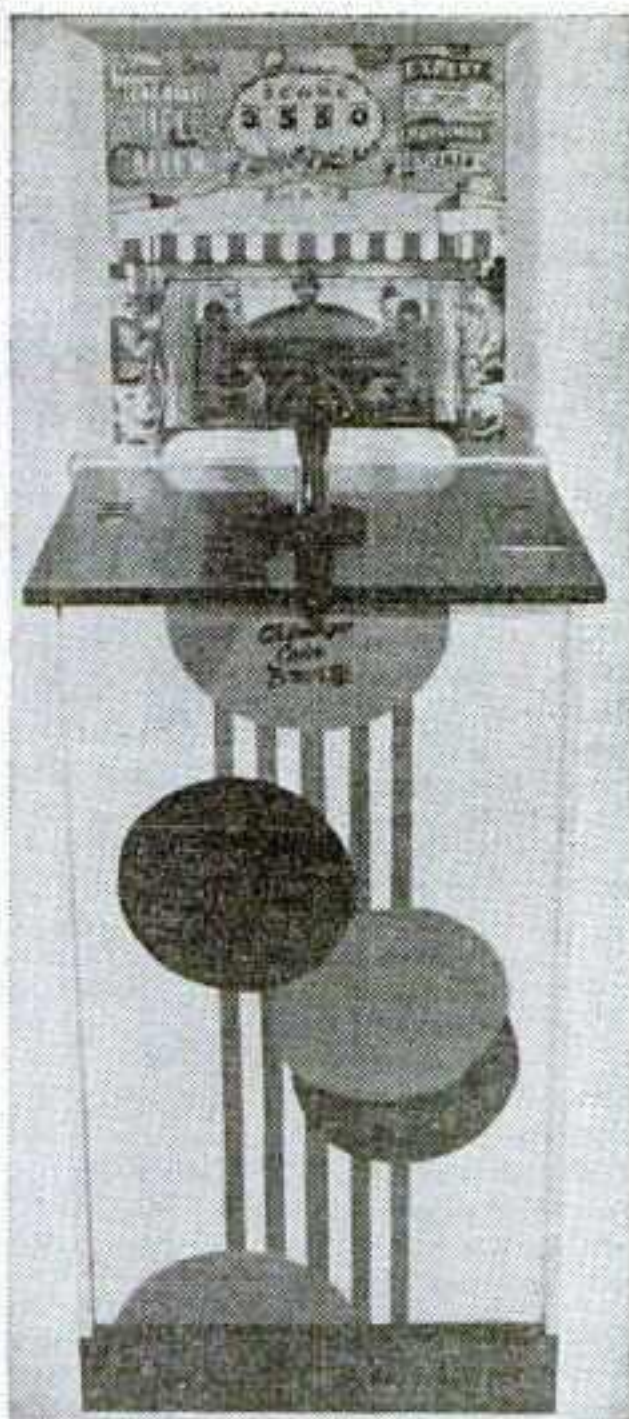
Yule Disks

Tycoon Christmas juke boxes began making their appearance the first Sunday in December, when the Christmas season begins in Germany. The box is loaded with Yule disks and unveiled at an eggnog party.

Few tycoons remove the coin box, which exercises universal fascination for wealthy Germans. In fact, most tycoons peg the per-play price at one mark (25 cents) a selection—and make the guests fork up.

Tycoon juke boxes are becoming a favorite means of assisting charities, and at such charity affairs it is usual to charge either two marks (a two-mark coin is 50 cents) or five marks (\$1.25).

**Chicago Coin's Rifle Gallery
Gives Impression of Depth**



LONG-RANGE RIFLE GALLERY

CHICAGO—A unique illusion of depth is the big feature in Chicago Coin's new Long-Range Rifle Gallery being shipped to the trade this week.

By an arrangement of multiple mirrors the shooter gets the impression that the target is some 15 feet away from the gun. Actually, the depth of the game is standard. Players get 25 shots for a dime. The shooter is rated expert, sharp-

shooter, marksman or rifleman, depending upon his score.

The game has a colorful carnival and clown motif. Targets include a pair of high-strike men, three clowns, four animals and a large center target with flash-o-matic bull's-eye scoring from 10 to 100.

All targets score 50 points (except the bull's-eye), but the player can earn a bonus score for each target at certain intervals. The clowns, which move from side to side, give a 300 bonus when lighted. The animals and high-strike men score 100 when their light is on.

Extended play is also available. Other features include Formica top, metal coin box door, and attractive red, white, black and blue trim.

DEBS MONTHLY**

ROME — Sezione Apparecchi per Pubbliche Attrazioni Recreative, an Italian coin machine association of the nation's 3,500 operators, importers and owners of automatic equipment, has started a monthly publication, *Revista Italiana dell'Automatico*. The publication will attempt to promote the juke box and amusement machine industry in Italy and will carry news of domestic and international production and trade.

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Chi Case Probes Location Loans

By JOSEPH KLEIN

CHICAGO — A pending challenge of a trade practice in the dairy industry may result in an indication of the legality or illegality of loans to coin machine locations, the attorney in charge of the Chicago office of the Federal Trade Commission said last week.

As a rule, it was pointed out, the FTC approves of the lending controls embodied in an ordinance enacted recently by the Chicago City Council (BMW, November 6). William F. Lemke Jr., the Commission attorney here, said that the final decision of the FTC complaints charging nine major ice cream manufacturers and 55 subsidiaries with unfair competitive methods could cast light on the propriety of operators' loans to premise owners and the status of the practice under the Sherman antitrust law.

Under Study

At the same time, the public relations office of the Federal Trade Commission in Washington informed this correspondent that the issue in the dairy case was still under study and that no date for adjudication could be fixed at this time.

Loans to dealers are among the challenged practices specified in the charges against the ice cream manufacturers and subsidiaries, Lemke explained.

By orders of Examiner John Lewis, the complaints were dismissed on July 23, 1959. The Commission stressed, however, that the decision was not final and that opportunities for appeal, stay or review would remain open.

The appeal from the decision was heard late last year. On March 24 of this year, the Commission held that "the records as presently constituted do not contain accurate and reliable statistics from which this information may be ascertained," remanded the proceedings to the examiner.

"Exclusive Dealing"

As raised in the complaints, the issue of "exclusive dealing" might apply to the coin machine industry also, Lemke said.

"In my opinion," Examiner Lewis said, "the existence of a tradition of single dealing in the industry tends to defeat the argument supporting the complaint. It demonstrates that exclusive dealing agreements have little practical preclusive ef-

fect since most dealers will deal with a single supplier anyway, irrespective of whether a formal agreement requires them to do so or not."

Lewis observed further that offering financial assistance is widespread and the manufacturers and subsidiaries do so only to a limited extent. He said further that their loans are to "mama and papa" grocery stores desiring modernization in order to remain competitive with chains and supermarkets. Frequently, he declared, the loans result in a substantial increase in sales, thus benefiting all concerned.

In the March 24 remand order, however, the Commission asserted that an informed disposition of the appeal requires an appraisal of all aspects of the competitive effects of the challenged practices.

"This involves, among other things," the Commission said, "a consideration of the approximate amount of trade which has been or may be restrained or otherwise affected by these activities."

Lewis was instructed to receive "such further evidence as may be offered for the purpose of showing, for some reasonable period of time,

the extent to which requirement contracts, 'trade agreements' or other exclusive dealing agreements have been used by various respondents, their subsidiaries and affiliates in connection with, or ancillary to, the sale of ice cream and other frozen products, the identity and location of the customers with whom such arrangements have been negotiated, and the quantities and dollar volumes of the products which have been involved in the transactions."

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W. German Coin Exports High

BONN—West German coin machine exports established a new all-time record in 1961, according to provisional figures, but juke box exports skidded from 1960 totals.

Total German coin machine exports in 1961 are expected to top 30 million Deutschmarks (the mark has a value of 25 cents), compared with the 1960 record of 27.5 million marks.

Of the 30 million-mark 1961 total, about half is represented by vending machine exports, which are soaring under stimulus of the world-wide automation boom.

Juke box exports declined slightly from 1960, from 10.03 million marks to 9.5 million marks. Games gained slightly, rising from 4.28 million marks in 1960 to 4.50 million marks.

Little Change

The federal statistical office said the final year-end totals could alter these figures somewhat, but they are expected to show little change on the basis of quarterly totals together with the four-quarter projection on the basis of exports in October and the first half of November.

Despite the new record, the figures are being received with gloom by the trade generally. The vending boom was discounted long ago, and main interest has centered in prospects for an upsurge in phonograph and games exports.

This has not occurred; on the contrary, the figures seem to confirm that the juke box export slide, which first became apparent in the 1960 export totals, has been checked substantially but not halted.

Sharp Drop

The 1960 juke box export total of 10.03 million marks represented a sharp drop from 1959 exports of 13.3 million marks. Now, the 1961 total of 9.5 million, which is only slightly above the 1958 total of 9.38 million marks, apparently confirms the decline in German phonographs in response to tougher world competition.

Most German producers favor: (1) diversification into vending equipment; (2) concentrating on a few entirely new export areas and

those nearby (3) continuing to stress hand-crafted production tailored to specific customer wishes.

At one time German manufacturers were certain they could vanquish American phonograph competition wherever it reared its head. There was even heady talk on the part of the German trade about gaining a "beachhead" into the U. S. market.

More Realistic

However, in their battle against U. S. competition the Germans have taken their lumps, and the talk in the trade here now is less heady and more realistic.

The German trade intends battling U. S. competition tooth and nail for the European and Scandinavian markets, including Britain. But elsewhere the Germans are withdrawing from extended positions and consolidating and concentrating effort in markets where conditions, meaning primarily shipping costs and trading tradition, place them at a disadvantage over U. S. competition.

The two such obvious areas are Africa and the Middle East. Asia is a toss-up, although some German manufacturers are wary of over-involvement in this area since they look for strong eventual Japanese juke box competition.

Latin America is the major area where the Germans compete at a standing disadvantage with the U. S.

Competition

With the speeding up of the Common Market, German producers, along with those in other EEC countries, must calculate the effects of strengthened competition from French, Italian, and Belgian producers in 1962.

Most German manufacturers discount the domination of the EEC coin machine market by any single national group of producers, or even by any single national firm.

It is expected, on the contrary, that a series of mergers will occur over the next few years, with the result that the big market's coin machine, as well as other, producers will take on a supranational character.

There is already talk, for example, of a merger of a major West German coin machine producer with a well-known French firm, their object being to create an organization large enough to compete effectively in the Common Market against Automatic Canteen, which is strongly entrenched in the European market.

chart, had been on for 15 weeks. "You're the Reason" by Bobby Edwards on Crest, now No. 59, has a total of 17 weeks on the chart. "Foot Stompin'" by the Flares on Felsted just dropped off after a total of 15 weeks. "I Understand Just How You Feel" by the G-Clefs on Terrace, now 16 on the chart, has been on for 14 weeks. There are many similar examples.

Regional Hits

The pattern of longevity is illustrated by still another group of disks—those which have not been on the national chart very long, but which have been on the market a long time, have been selling regionally, and recently made the national chart. Such disks include "Soothe Me" by the Sims Twins on Sar, released months ago and on the "Hot 100" the last six weeks; Barbara George's "I Know" on AFO, also on the chart for six weeks after months of pre-chart activity.

A number of disks have never as yet made the "Hot 100" but have come close to it and have been selling quietly for a long period. Good example is Prince La La's "She Put the Hurt on Me" on AFO.

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Nail-Tone Firm Buys Into TDI For Coin Dist.

MIAMI—Nail-Tone, Inc., a local cosmetic manufacturing firm here, has paid \$100,000 for a half interest in Tech Development, Inc., at Dayton, Ohio, primarily for the distribution rights to a coin-operated golf putting machine which has been developed by TDI.

Principal officers of the Dayton firm are Joseph Flatt, president and treasurer; Sidney M. Gamsu, vice-president, and Lewis Froikin, secretary. Robert D. Grossman is president of Nail-Tone.

The machine has electro-mechanical devices for scoring and returning golf balls to the players. One to four may play the game. The unit will list for \$1,895, and will be designed for use in bowling alleys, country clubs and arcades.

According to Gamsu, TDI has started its first run of 10 machines and has a firm order for 100 more.

EDITORIAL

Meanest Man in Town

By and large, the coin machine industry has done a pretty fair job in policing the activities of its own people. It hasn't been too difficult a task, as the overwhelming majority of persons engaged in the industry are decent people, and they will obey the letter and spirit of the law without being pressured to do so.

With this in mind, we would like to comment on a news story which appears on this page. The story concerns a Gary, Ind., location owner who is not connected with the coin industry, but whose actions are bound to reflect on the integrity of every man engaged in the making, selling or operating of coin machines.

This man is charged with loaning money to school children—at 20 per cent interest—to enable them to play an amusement machine on his premises. The evidence is pretty strong—a stack of IOU's signed by the youngsters.

Because this is the time of year where peace on earth and goodwill toward men should be uppermost in our thoughts, we will refrain from saying what we think of this man.

No doubt the daily press will seize the opportunity to launch tirades to the effect that the "coin machine racketeers" are corrupting the nation's youth, and that the morality of the Gary storekeeper reflects the morality of the industry.

But, just to set the record straight: The storekeeper is not a member of the coin machine industry, and we are sure that the industry wants no part of him.

The game involved is an amusement device which has given pleasure to hundreds of thousands of children. There is nothing immoral or unwholesome about the game itself. What is unwholesome and immoral is the use to which the game has been put.

We don't know if the location owner has title to the game, or if it belongs to an operator. We suspect that the piece is location owned.

However, if an operator is involved, he should have known what was going on.

Members of the coin machine industry are seldom given the benefit of the doubt. It behooves them, not only to conduct their own businesses in the most scrupulous manner possible, but to make sure that outsiders do not besmirch the name of the industry.

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Loans to Kids for Coin Machine Nets Arrest for Location Owner

GARY, Ind.—A location owner who allegedly made usurious loans to school children to play amusement machines was in police custody here.

John Pearson, 33, owner of Emerson Confectionery, near Emerson School, was arrested Friday (8) as he was collecting a 12-cent loan from a 12-year-old boy.

"I did it because business was bad," Pearson explained.

Gary police were informed of the candy store transactions by a mother who caught her 12-year-old son stealing to pay off a debt to Pearson.

The child readily admitted that he took the money to repay a loan he obtained from Pearson to play the machine in the store.

Pearson charged a 1-cent interest for every borrowed nickel. Loan limit was \$1.

Detectives Gus Cominus and Milan Yovanovich, who made the arrest, learned that the children, in the main, would use their lunch money to pay off their indebtedness to Pearson.

A stack of I.O.U.'s, signed by the children, was seized by the detectives. Also confiscated by them as evidence was a coin-operated target pistol.

Pearson will be tried in Lake County Juvenile Court for contributing to the delinquency of minors.

CHICAGO—Rock-Ola last week gave away four new Princess phonographs, one each to an operator in the North, South, East and West, to kick off its Grand National Sweepstakes contest.

Eight more phonographs will be given away, four each in January and February. Grand and final prize, to be drawn in February, will be a rtip for two to Hawaii.



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New Juke Box Models to Bow In Few Weeks

CHICAGO — Two juke box manufacturers will introduce new models after January 1 and a third will follow shortly.

Seeburg held sales meetings for its distributors in Chicago and San Francisco last week and showed a prototype of its new 1962 model to be introduced after January 1.

Rock-Ola has already held private showings for its distributors and is expected to bow a new 120-selection and 200-selection Empress to the trade during the first week in January.

Wurlitzer is planning its introduction for the middle of the month and is slating "Wurlitzer Week" to start January 1. Distributors will unveil the firm's new line to operators in a series of showings and open-house celebrations.

Details of all three lines have been kept secret.

Seeburg held its meeting at Chicago's Palmer House for distributors from the East, South and Midwest. The firm's West Coast and Texas distributors saw the machine last Friday (15) at the Villa Hotel, San Mateo, Calif.

ANTI-RED TUNES BOOST W. BERLIN PHONO TAKE

WEST BERLIN—Operators in this cold war outpost are discovering that the cold war, which has brought financial hardship to all of them, can also be used to boost collections.

The device is anti-Communist music programming. Operators find that the programming of anti-Communist tunes or records spoofing the Reds is an automatic collections-booster—in West Berlin.

Some enterprising operators are even arranging for specially recorded disks, so great is the demand for anti-Communist music. "It seems childish, probably," an operator agreed. "But you must understand it's the only way we can get back at the Reds. It is a means of blowing off steam, of giving vent to our frustration."

The usual practice is to salt five anti-Red records amid each juke box's stock.

Tunes such as "John Brown's Body" and "Red Sputnik Rock" have been reworked by enterprising German tunesmiths to fit the anti-Red formula. The John Brown melody has been revamped to capitalize on the removal of Stalin's corpse from the Lenin Mausoleum in Moscow's Red Square.

Holidays Mean More Taxes For Boston Phono Operators

BOSTON — The Blue Laws of Massachusetts have made holidays revenue days in the city of Boston. The Christmas holiday, at least, will be somewhat dampened for operators of juke boxes in the city. The city apparently did not think of it in time for Thanksgiving, but is not planning to miss the boat on a little extra revenue on Christmas.

dancing are not allowed to operate on Sundays or legal holidays.

Local operators of music routes apparently will have to go along with whatever comes along since they no longer are represented by any organization. The Music Operators Association of Massachusetts, which fought against legislative problems affecting the industry, was disbanded in October.

This week all locations received the glad tidings on a typewritten sheet announcing that operators must apply for special licenses to operate on the holiday. The fee is the usual Sunday charge for mechanical music—\$2 to the city of Boston and \$2 to the Public Safety Department (State Police).

The notice said in part: "All entertainment on Christmas Day requires a special license. Please notify this office before December 1 (this gave two days) if you do NOT intend to operator a phonograph on that day so that the police may be informed. The fee will be the usual Sunday fee for mechanical music, \$2 to the city of Boston and \$2 to the Public Safety Department."

Fee Schedule

The cost in the city of Boston (since 1958) for operating a juke box on a seven-day basis is \$160 per machine per year. The fee for weekday operation is \$50 to the city, plus \$10 to the federal government. Sunday operation calls for a yearly fee per machine of \$50 to the city and \$50 to the State.

Curiously enough, the city of Boston is the only community levying this fee for Christmas Day operation. Recent enforcement of Blue Laws has caused a great deal of trouble on every level of entertainment and other activity.

For example, the opening of "The Music Man" has had to be postponed until Tuesday evening (December 16) since shows with

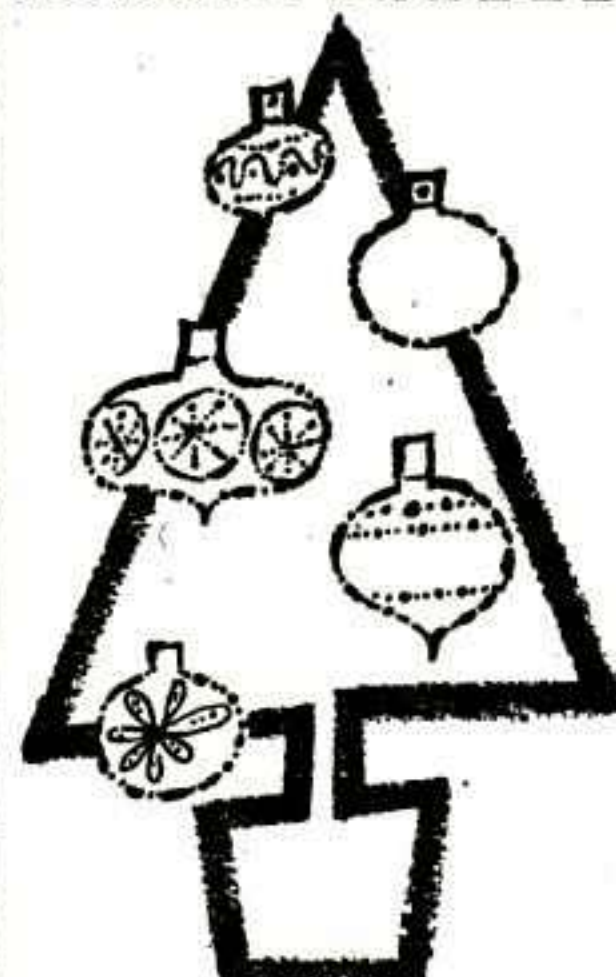

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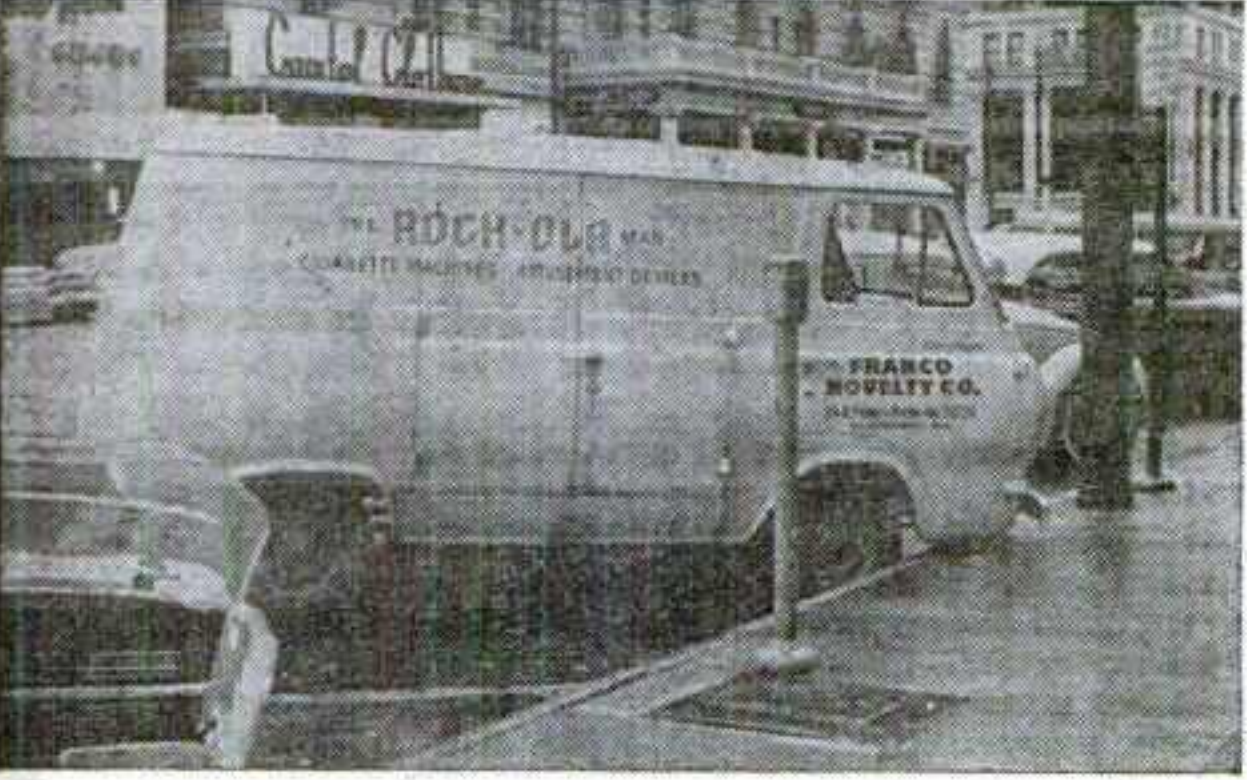

N. Y. Post Says Corallo Was Moore Partner

NEW YORK — According to a report published in The New York Post Thursday evening (14), Antonio (Tony Dicks) Corallo, a leading figure in the local underworld, was partner of Sanford J. Moore in the operation of Gibraltar Amusements, Ltd., a Long Island juke box and game operation.

Moore, currently a federal convict, has been indicted for the alleged bribing of a New York State Supreme Court judge. Moore is doing three years following a bankruptcy fraud conviction (BMW, December 11).

Corallo has been indicted along with Moore in the alleged fix. Two other defendants — New York Supreme Court Judge J. Vincent Keogh and former Chief Assistant U. S. Attorney Elliot Kahaner—were arraigned Thursday in U. S. District Court, along with Moore and Corallo. They all pleaded "not guilty." The fifth defendant, Dr. Robert Erdman, was to have been arraigned Friday (15).

Moore, still in the custody of U. S. marshals as a federal convict, is free on \$50,000 bail. The case has been adjourned until January 15.

The Post reported that Corallo raised the \$35,000 for the alleged bribe. It added that Corallo later learned that Moore had hidden some of the Gibraltar firm's machines from him and had been receiving the revenues.

After Corallo learned that Moore had been holding out on him, The Post reported, the New York hoodlum became quite upset, and he and Moore are no longer friends.

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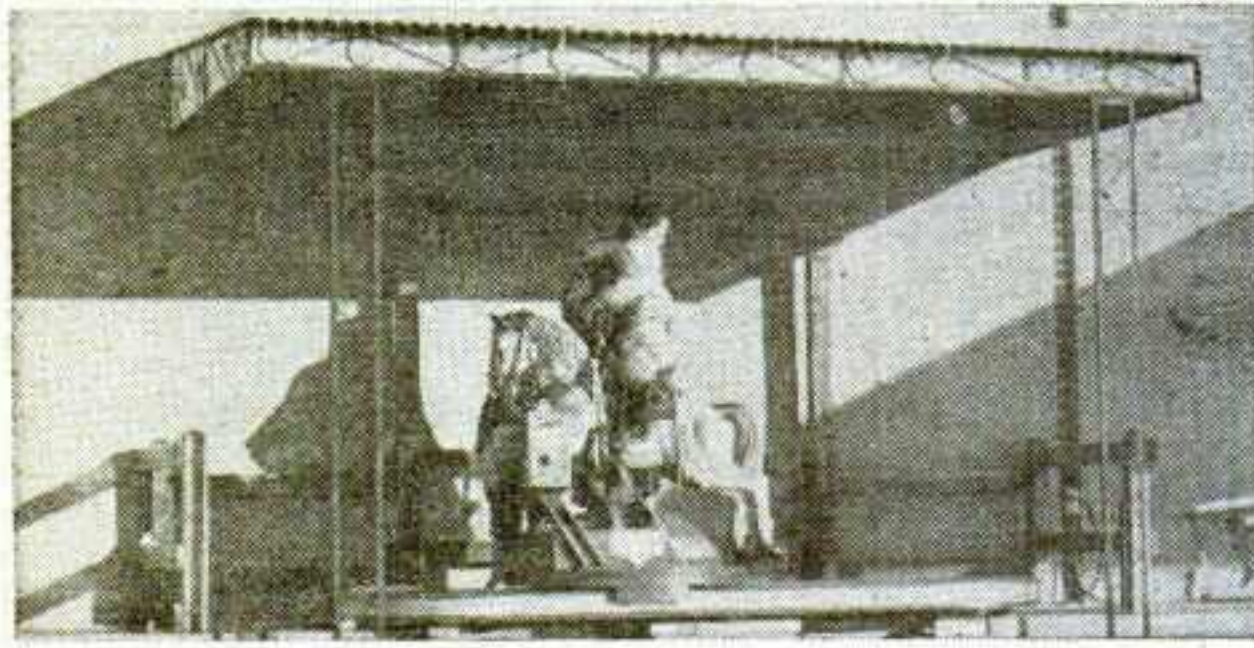
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Model Vending Co. Buys Elkins Park

At Frank Padula's Melody Music, Charlie Marchetti reports the two-sided Connie Francis tune is the big earner. Collections are about the same as last year with business good.

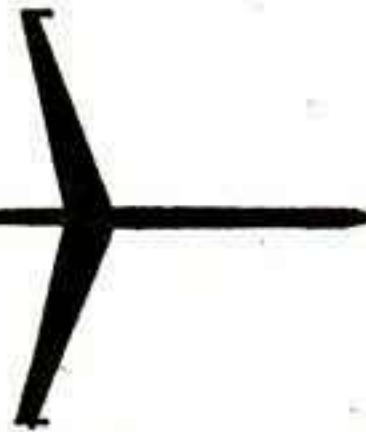
