Will Retailers Already Featuring Free Television Install Coin Operated Video?

With the fact that many operators have approached the new coin operated television units with great caution, and with the further fact that the retailers themselves seem to have tossed caution to the wind and have instantly purchased video receivers to boom business, the question which seems uppermost in the minds of the operators now is, "Will retailers already featuring free television install coin operated video?"

This is a logical question. A good question, especially for those operators who have seen television invade their locations.

The facts are simply that as television receivers enter into locations they do, for a definite period of time after installation, cut down collections from juke boxes.

As time goes on, and as has been learned in the Metropolitan New York area where over 52,000 public places have installed television receivers which have been in operation for over a year now, juke box take returns to a more normal basis as the public becomes accustomed to the video receivers.

In fact, and as has been noted, most of the public places featuring television have, of their own accord, cut down on the time they formerly used to feature the video programs. Of course, big athletic events still retain their standing, and these cut heavily into juke box take for they come on, in most cases, during the peak play hours when the public places are most crowded.

Yet, television has also had a good effect on juke box play, even in these instances. By crowding the locations, and immediately after the broadcast, the juke boxes get into better and speedier action than ever before and, in most cases, have been able to make up whatever play was lost during the period when the video was in operation.

The average operator has therefore learned that television is a close companion to juke box performance. And because of this has become more interested in using coin operated video as a basis for obtaining better collections and, if possible, the full take from the location.

Here are some facts regarding whether retailers will take on coin

operated video, even after featuring free television for some months.

The Cash Box asked questions of six New York City locations where video is now being featured free to the public and four Newark, N. J. locations where television is also free.

Of these 10, eight stated that it made absolutely no difference to them whether coin operated video was installed and that they believed it would make no difference to their customers.

The other two believed that they should continue with free television and did not believe that coin operated units would meet with the "complete approval" of their clientele.

The average location owner claimed that he paid approximately \$1,000 for his video receiving equipment. The majority paid this out over a period of installments. There is and continues to be a "service charge" when servicemen are called in to take care of the unit. This service fee mounts rapidly, in the opinion of these locations, and has added much to the initial cost of the set or sets which they have installed.

At the same time they have been forced to build platforms high above the heads of the people at the bar and in the anterooms and this, too, has cost them money. Tuning the sets has been a real problem. It is necessary for the bartender or the owner to get up on a small ladder or footstool and tune "blind." In short, being so close to the receiver, he can't tune it in perfectly and must depend on his customers, who are a distance away, to advise him whether the picture is clear.

Another thing which seems to bother the locations is the fact that most of their sets are now outmoded, and daily more and more are becoming outmoded. This means investing in new equipment. This is one thing which the average location owner does not want to do at this time and, as the majority stated, they cannot afford to do at this time.

Humorous and harrowing experiences were related by these retailers regarding their sets. In some cases they have found their places jammed with "lookers" and not "buyers." In others they have found minors sneaking into the place to watch baseball, hockey, boxing and other athletic events, endangering their license.

Such stories as related by these retailers, it seems, perfectly paves the way "for someone else to assume the headache." In short, for coin operated video to be placed in the location, serviced by the regular juke box owner, and taken care of by him entirely in all regards.

Some of these retailers stated that they would be willing to guarantee "a reasonable amount per week" for front money to the operator if he were to allow the set to continue on a "free basis".

The majority, tho, would much rather have the set coin operated. They were especially fascinated with the fact that the "voice" and "tone" would come thru the more powerful amplification unit of the juke box, instead of the amplification unit of the video receiver itself.

When it was explained to them that they could now also enjoy remote control and tune in whatever channel they wanted right from the bar, instead of getting up on a ladder and fumbling for the controls on their outmoded instruments, they were willing to have such sets immediately installed, regardless of the fact that these would be coin operated.

When they were also told that they could now enjoy individual tone in each booth as well as at the bar, along with radio stations and juke box records, they were absolutely amazed and wondered why their own juke box operators hadn't as yet approached them with this system.

In short, the sum and substance of the question, "Will retailers already featuring free television install coin operated video?" comes to this one resultant—they will be more than happy to do so, as long as they don't have to pay for the equipment, as long as they can get the proper servicing that is required, and as long as the receiver will bring them every channel with greater clarity as well as more powerful and better tone quality.

The operators who now have coin operated and non-coin operated video working for them are enthusiastic over these receivers. They claim, in the majority, that they have been able to obtain "front money guarantees" which they never before enjoyed. In

fact some of these ops, especially one man in Milwaukee who is well known to all in the field, is enjoying \$30.00 per week front money guarantees from each and every one of his locations.

The truth of the matter seems to be that the average retailer who was questioned was a bit tired of it all. He felt that he had been imposed upon. He now realizes that he made a "very big investment" and that this investment continues big because of the constant servicing fees he is paying. He would, very much, like for someone else to assume the obligation and give him the proper new receiving unit as well as service free of charge.

In short, even if he had to insert his own coin to keep the video in action during an important event, he still believes (after it was explained to him) that it would be much cheaper in the long run and that, too, he could probably get his money back from the average take of the juke box-video unit, even with a guarantee to meet each week.

The opportunity is therefore rife for the average operator of juke boxes to enter into locations. The operators have waited for the "proper equipment". This equipment is now being manufactured. The five or six manufacturers in this industry now in the market with commercial television units (coin operated and non-coin operated as the operator desires) have worked out some truly marvelous units for public places and have, at the same time, taken into consideration the fact that the juke box must remain as an integral part of the video system.

The juke box operator is in the logical position to handle television in any of his locations. Not only has he won the confidence of the location owner over the years he has featured juke box music, but, he understands tone and understands the mechanics behind music units.

He will find, as he makes the same sort of explanatory survey *The Cash Box* did, that his retailers will install his units and, in the majority of cases, will ask that they be coin operated, regardless of the fact that these same locations may have featured television free to their customers.

● What a pair of pipes on this kid! It's thrush Kay Starr, out with a bang-up rendition of "You Broke Your Promise." The ditty and this waxing should win a ton of new fame and fortune for the gal, and likewise set this platter whirling on phonos across the land. The gal's warbling, in rich, husky tones that make you pay attention, is nothing less than sensational. Tune is one that grows on you, and makes you want to listen. The flip, "Second Hand Love," has Kay taking the tempo down a bit as she wails the jazz lyrics to this great tune. Both sides show the chirp in high light—latch on.

"Cruising Down The River" (2:48)

● Pair of sides by orkster Frankie Carle and the set-up of "Cruising Down The River" and "Mississippi Flyer" in the offing for music operators. Top deck is well known to ops since it is one of the hottest wax items around. This rendition, teaming chirp Marjorie Hughes and the Sunrise Serenaders, is there for the asking. The flip, "Mississippi Flyer," is a train story dressed up in mellow fashion. Same vocal group comes back on this one and turns in an effective job. Ops who have the spots that go for this brand might listen in.

"Sunflower" (2:44)

RUSS MORGAN ORCH.

● Some great wax by orkster Russ Morgan and the set-up of "Sunflower" and "Cruising Down The River." Top deck, with the Skylarks wailing the vocal, bounces along in mellow tempo. It's the type of tune that grows on you, and one that is sure to win wide favor. The flip, currently a hot item with juke box ops everywhere, gets a fairly nice sendoff by Russ and the Skylarks. Organ background on the side adds to the polish of this platter. Ops who haven't as yet latched on to the tunes should listen in here.

● Orkster Tex Beneke into the musical spotlight with a pair that beckon a ton of coin play. One of the most consistent coin cullers in the nation, maestro Tex and his boys offer some great wax in this rendition of "Look Up" and "Mississippi Flyer." Both sides of the platter beam for a bright wax future. The maestro himself takes the spotlight on the pair to warble

the attractive lyrics in glowing manner. Stuff is sure-fire material for the dance crowd, and should be received with wide favor. The steady bounce-beat tempo furnished by the band, above Tex's extremely infectious vocal styling, make for a ton of musical pleasure. It's the first dinking by Tex since he revamped his band style, and should find many new fans for the maestro. Lyrics of the tune are clever as all get out and make you wanna sing along with the needling. It's the kind of biscuit that is easily taken to, and one that seems certain to find a top spot on many a music operator's machine. The flip, "Mississippi Flyer" is another ditty that easily points to the maestro's orchestral wizardry. The blending of the Moonlight Serenaders on this side adds to the luster and polish of an already glowing platter. It's a fond choo-choo story, with the title offering ops the wax story. Both sides of this cookie bid for top drawer phono fame—latch on!

Top deck, a slow, infectious piece, has the trio wailing in their typical soft, low patter. Stuff makes you wanna listen. The flip, in lighter tempo, shows the group at their best as they wail the cute lyrics offered here. Ditty is from the click musical production "As The Girls Go," and should draw loads of bally therefrom. Wax is a natural for the wired music locations—ops take note.

● Click tunes from the click musical "Kiss Me Kate" are these offered here

by chirp Jane Harvey. Music ops should know the wax fairly well since they have been widely recorded. Titled "So In Love" and "Always True To You In My Fashion," Jane chirps the charming lyrics in effective fashion throughout. The gal's lilting pipes ring true on both sides to set the stage for some potential coin play. Take note of Hugo Winterhalter's wonderful orchestral background, which adds to the luster of the disk immensely. Wax won't stop traffic—it will hold its own though.

"Beyond The Purple Hills" (2:41)

"I Got Lucky In The Rain" (2:44)

● Ditty that should blossom into a winner for music operators is this offering by piper Johnny Bradford. It's "Beyond The Purple Hills" we're ravin' about. The manner that Johnny renders the song makes it one that seems certain to notch onto a top spot in juke boxes throughout the nation. Wax spins in care-free manner, with Johnny's pleasant pipes purring the soft, flowing lyrics. It's a song that is easily taken to, and one that makes you wanna listen all the more after the first earful. The flip, "I Got Lucky In The Rain," from "As The Girls Go," is a light novelty that dances along in skip tempo. It's cute stuff and should win its fair share of coin play. Keep your eye peeled on the top deck—it's a winning "sleeper."

● Pair of light polka tunes that might grab on are these offered by orkster Jimmy Carroll, with piper Scotty MacGregor wailing the lyrics. Tagged "Barbara Barbara Barbara Polka," Scotty and a vocal chorus join on the pair to come up with an effective piece of music. Both sides are in the happy vein and spin at sprightly tempo. Wax won't cause a stampede of any sort, but it might fill the bill as a filler item. Ops who have the room in their machines might take a look-see.

"Don't Lie To Me" (2:50)

● Orkster Vaughn Monroe on deck with a pair that make for nice listening pleasure. Wax, titled "Don't Lie To Me" and "A Senorita's Bouquet," is in there all the way. Top deck is a sugar 'n spice ballad, with the maestro and the Moon Maids purring the flowing lyrics in beautiful fashion. It's smooth stuff throughout, with the ork's string section featured widely in the background. Stuff is tailor made for the romance crowd and should meet with excellent reception by the many Monroe fans. The flip, a cute piece, has Vaughn taking it solo, with the title giving out the wax story. Top deck should ride heavily with juke box fans.

● The great Charlie Ventura crew make their first bit on RCA Victor an excellent one that shows a whale of promise. It's the top deck we go for, with thrush Jackie Cain purring the light hop lyrics. Tagged "Lullaby In Rhythm," Jackie hogs the limelight with her smooth purring of mellow wordage, while the rest of the gang make with some wonderful music. Stuff is easy on the ears straight thru, and should meet with wide favor. The flip, "Birdland," is a bit more pronounced, with the gang taking a turn in the limelight on some solo licks. We go for the top deck—we're sure you will too.

● Pair of tunes by the Ink Spots, long missing from the juke box spotlight, are these items tagged "No Orchids For My Lady" and "Bewildered." Top deck is handled effectively by Billy Kenny and his lads, with some nice harmony sifting throughout. The flip, a heavy click in so many spots, is treated in the usual manner of the Spots and should hold its own. Ops might listen in.

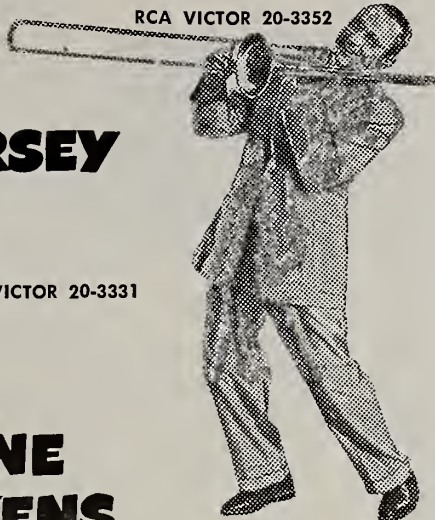

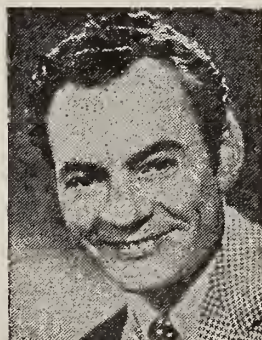

● Deek Watson and The Brown Dots come into the disk spotlight via this platter tagged "Bow-Wow-Wow" and "At Our Fireplace." Long missing from the phono lime-light, Deek and boys should bounce

back in a blaze of glory with this pair. Top deck, a zany hunk of wax is done up in heavy up-tempo patter, with a fond hand clap sifting thru. Deek's vocal work, offered with plenty of riff and holler is top notch throughout. The steady beat, and instrumental work displayed here all go toward making this item a hot coin culler. It's novelty stuff that seems tailor made for the race spots. You've gotta hear this thing to really appreciate it—and that's just what we recommend. The flip, "At Our Fireplace" has the gang slowing down the tempo to offer a slow, soulful pitch that makes for favorable listening pleasure. It's sentimental wax that can be easily taken to. Music ops are bound to go wild over the top deck—get with it!

"Laughing Boy" (2:40)

● The wonderful tones of chirp Dinah Washington are shown to excellent advantage about this item tagged "Laughing Boy." Ditty, currently kicking up a storm in a slew of spots, is one that should catch on and go like wildfire. Lyrics of the song are top notch, with Dinah's tones matching beautifully. The flip, a slow jazz item, has Dinah purring to the metro of "You Satisfy" in favorable tones. "Laughing Boy" for the moola.

"Fat Meat And Greens" (2:27)

"Century Room" (2:47)

EDGAR HAYES ORCH.
(Exclusive 78X)

● Here's a side that should catch on and go like wildfire. It's the Edgar Hayes ork bowing into the disk spotlight via this bit tabbed "Fat Meat And Greens." It's slow, moody instrumental stuff that makes you wanna listen. The shuffle rhythm, mixed with a mellow piano and guitar spot all go toward making this bit a hot item for the juke boxes. On the flip with another instrumental, the Hayes' crew bounce back with "Century Room," another item that bears watching. Music ops should, by all means, get with the top deck.

"I Don't Care Who Knows" (2:40)

● First wax by Sammy Davis, Jr. on Capitol Records turns up to be loaded with some heavy potential. Sammy's offering of "I Don't Care Who Knows," a ditty currently winning wide favor in spots throughout the land is effective throughout. The flip, a routine full of mimicry, has Sammy singing the mannerisms of the Four Blazers, Billy Eckstine, King Cole, Frankie Laine, Al Jolson and Vaughn Monroe. Wax is novel enough to catch on. Music ops should pay this waxing some attention.

"Sauterne Special" (3:02)

"Lucy Lindy Boogie" (2:21)

JOE LUTCHER ORCH.
(Capitol 15361)

● Some mellow wax by Joe Lutchur and his jump crew and the set-up of "Sauterne Special" "Lucy Lindy Boogie" are headed music ops way. Top deck is an all instrumental piece done up in semi-bop fashion, with tenor saxman Bill Ellis leading all the way. Nice mellow horn spot shines thru too, with the rhythm refrain making for pleasant listening. The flip, with the maestro spooning some nice lyrics, is a leaping blues piece that should be greeted warmly. Both sides rate ops listening time.

"Weasel Walk" (2:46)

"Wow!" (2:36)

● Some great wax for music ops to latch onto are these sides by the Joe Morris ork. Titled "Weasel Walk" and "Wow!," Joe and the boys combine to offer ops some mellow rhythm. Top deck features sax star Johnny Griffin on tenor, with a steady beat in the background adding to the luster of the platter. The flip, with a bop vocal spot makes for nice listening. Both sides of the platter should find some healthy coin play. Ops take note.

"Girls Were Made To Take Care Of Boys" (2:47)

"Busy Line" (2:38)

ROSE MURPHY
(RCA Victor 20-3341)

● The wee-voice of chirp Rose Murphy is offered here, with the refrain of "Girls Were Made To Take Care of Boys" and "Busy Line" seeping thru. Her chee-chee warbling throughout both sides of this disk make for fairly pleasant listening. Ops should know the top deck since it has been widely recorded. The flip, a novelty piece working around a cute telephone gag, has the gal spooning the lyrics in her own inimitable style. Ops who use this brand might listen in.

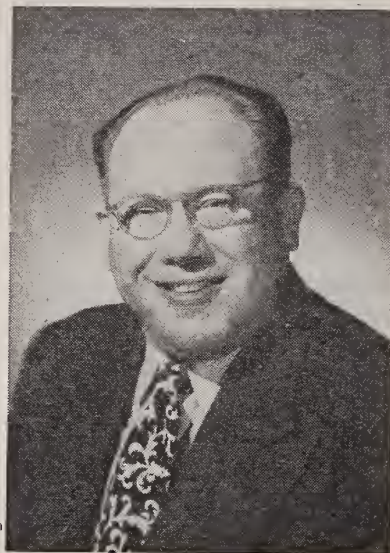

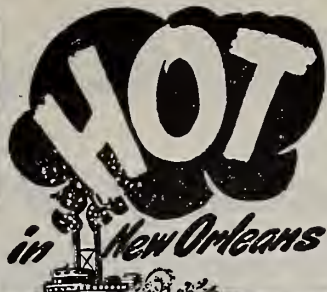

"Waltz Me Around Again, Nellie"

MOA Alerted as First Rumbblings are Heard of Pending Battle to Change Copyright Act. Expect Revamped Scott Bill to be Introduced in Congress, also Senate Bill to Make Juke Boxes Pay Royalty.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—As one noted juke box leader this past week, "Here we go again—with another battle on our hands—to overcome the change of that paragraph in the Copyright Act of 1909 referring to juke boxes."

The first rumbblings regarded the fact that new (and possibly revamped old) bills would be introduced within a few weeks in the House of Representatives and the Senate, in an effort to once again try to make the juke box industry pay royalty to the owners of copyrighted music, were reverberating thru the juke box industry here who have already sent this information to George A. Miller of the Music Operators of America.

It is believed here that George A. Miller will call together all the leaders and directors of Music Operators of America when the time arrives to be present in this city at hearings which are, as always, conducted on these bills.

Last year the bills were shelved by both the House Sub-Committee and the Senate.

This year, it is believed, due to the early introduction of the bills, and the further fact that they were shelved last year, those who are attempting to get their introduction on the floor of both the House and the Senate, will redouble their efforts and will try with all might and main to get them out into the open.

Ops here are not as frightened as they were in 1947 and 1948. They feel that, even if this turns into one of the hardest fought battles, somewhat like that of '47, they still have the edge in the fact that they have continued to labor as small business and haven't, in the past 15 years, changed the price of their juke box entertainment to the public.

All explain that should the Copyright Act of 1909 be changed, at least that part of it referring to juke boxes, that it would bring about one of the worst legal tangles in all history.

Many reasons for this were advanced in hearings before the Sub-Committee of the House of Representatives Judiciary Committee in 1947 not only by juke box ops but also by others.

It is sincerely hoped here by juke box ops that some solution can yet be arrived at whereby such bills will forever be eliminated.

They look to the legal lights of MOA to arrange for some sort of action which can stop further introduction of these bills in Congress.

While hearings on copyright legislation might take some time, members of the industry close to the situation feel confident that the matter will definitely be reviewed in this 81st Congress. A House Judiciary Subcommittee on Patents and Copyrights is reported reviewing all past bills introduced, and gathering information relative to the proposed changes in the Copyright Law. It seems fairly certain that the hearing will be lengthy, and there is the possibility that they will be precipitated by the Senate review of the Inter-American Copyright Treaty.

It was learned that the House Judiciary Sub-Committee has already scheduled weekly executive meetings, the first of which started this past February 4.

Proposed changes to the copyright law are planned to embrace the methods of using and transmitting all creative works, including music, theatre, television, radio and the movies.

Decca Records Pop With FM Airshow

NEW YORK—An experiment to effect an expansion in the selection of recorded material for Frequency Modulation programs will be undertaken by Decca Records in association with FM station, WABF, operated by Ira Hirschmann. The nature of this experiment was revealed with the announcement today that Decca is going to present a once-weekly, seven-hour recorded show on WABF beginning Thursday, March 3rd. The Thursday program will run for seven consecutive hours and will be called "The Decca Program."

Jack Kapp, president of Decca, in announcing the new Decca undertaking, pointed out that record programming on FM has been limited to the confines of classical and semi-classical material. "To encourage enlarging of the FM scope in the presentation of recorded material, we intend to make full use of the entire Decca catalog. Sections of our program will be devoted to special children's presentations taken from our vast selection of children's records, folk music, 'Songs Of Our Times,' classic jazz, Latin American music, FRRR English recorded classical works, and other special musical and spoken-word series to be culled from the Decca catalog."

Mr. Kapp stated that the program will feature "live talent" whenever Decca artists are available in addition to making complete use of Decca's catalog.

Signature Records To Market New Low Cost Platter At 35c

New Label Aimed At Chain Stores, Music Ops

NEW YORK—Signature Records, Inc., this past week disclosed the formation of a new indie label diskery, tagged Hi-Tone Records, which is scheduled to market for the new low-cost price of 35c plus tax.

The issuance of the new platter makes the Hi-Tone label the lowest in the already established low-price field. Eli Oberstein's Varsity disks now sell at 44c including tax, as does the Spotlight label.

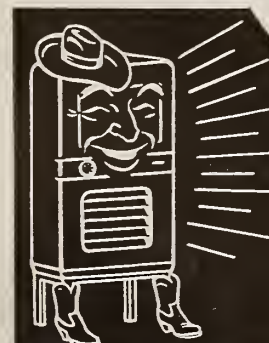

RCA Victor Bows With Unique Color Scheme For New 45 R.P.M. Disks

Rainbow Colored Platters To Be Issued For All Classifications Of Music.

CAMDEN, N. J. — Translucent, plastic phonograph records in gay, cheerful rainbow colors to identify all categories of music will make their first appearance in the 50-year-old record industry when RCA-Victor introduces its completely new 45-rpm system for reproducing recorded music in the home, it was revealed by J. G. Wilson, Executive Vice President of the Radio Corporation of America in charge of the RCA-Victor Division.

The new distortion-free, vinyl plastic records, in hues characteristic of seven classifications of music, and their complementary phonograph instruments, operating at 45 revolutions per minute, will be introduced to the public around April 1.

Departing from the varied-size black records, RCA-Victor is first to announce a new system featuring small, single-size discs for all classifications of music, with the various categories identified by the use of translucent vinyl plastic in bright shades of red, green, blue, yellow, cerise, and other hues. Though only 6 7/8 inches in diameter, the small 45-rpm record plays up to 5 1/3 minutes of music—equal to the longest playing time of the conventional 12-inch disc.

Designed with an awareness of public demand for smart, modern styling and sprightly, eye-appealing finishes, the new colored records are also seen as a boon to the consumer in classifying, storing, and identifying the various categories of recorded music in home libraries.

"The buying public today demands appearance and convenience on a par with quality," Mr. Wilson stated. "To

the unprecedented distortion-free, noise-free quality of our new 45-rpm records we have added bright, cheerful colors which, for the first time in the history of the industry, add eye appeal to ear appeal in the playing of recorded music. The use of colors also serves as a means of classifying and storing records in the home." Single discs, he stated, will be packaged in transparent cellophane envelopes.

RCA-Victor this past week shipped trade reviewers sample copies of the new transparent colored disks. Regional distributors were scheduled to hold showings of the new platter and phonograph in their respective territories, it was also disclosed.

Johnny Long Ork Not Signed To Disk Pact

NEW YORK—Johnny Long has not signed a long term recording contract with any record company, as reported in various fan and trade papers the past several weeks, Buddy Basch, Long's publicist, declared this week. The various articles stated Long had signed with a recording company for a period of two years.

Truth of the matter is that Long hasn't signed with anyone at all. What he did do was to sign for two recording sessions with Signature. One of the sessions was cut this past week (14). The source of the original article was evidently misinformed. Negotiations are on, however, with a few companies, Basch added.

A special tax committee meeting of the National Association of Automatic Machine Owners (NAAMO) was held at the Traymore Hotel, Miami Beach, Florida, on Monday, February 14. Attending the meet were F. McKim Smith of Atlantic City, N. J., president; Ben Rodins of Washington, D. C., vice president; A. Joseph Geist of Rockaway Beach, N. Y., legal advisor; John Fitzgerald of New Haven, Conn.; and Al Goodman of Atlantic City, N. J.

The purpose of the meeting was to outline plans for presentation to the proper governmental representatives of a method for changing Federal tax payments on coin operated amusement machines. The group unanimously agreed that the Ten Dollar Federal tax payments on amusement machines was most inequitable and especially unfair and a hardship to the small business man operated machines in resorts, amusement parks and other seasonal locations. At the present time the full Federal tax of Ten Dollars per machine becomes due on July 1st, the beginning of the government fiscal year. This yearly tax must be paid regardless of the length of time the machine may be in operation.

"It is felt that the government did not realize this inequitable legislation at the time it was made in 1942," stated Smith. "It was also considered inopportune to protest this method of payment during the war years. Now that business has greatly dropped, operators feel it is time to appeal thru NAAMO for relief of this unjust yearly Federal tax payment and petition the proper authorities to allow payments to be made quarterly on January 1st, July 1st and October 1st.

"As soon as arrangements can be made," continued Smith, "Geist, Rodins and myself will confer with NAAMO's Washington attorney as to the best method of presenting this case to the proper Federal officials. If necessary, a request will be made for a hearing before the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives."

* * * * *

Blue Book, rather than show no price, retains the last known quotations for such equipment so that the subscriber at least has the last known prices as a basis to work with. Prices continue to be very widely divergent these days. Someone on the West Coast may feel a certain machine worth \$150.00 whereas someone on the East Coast may think it worth but \$75.00. Of course, condition, serial, appearance, demand, territory, quantity, etc., must all be taken into consideration. The C.M.I. Blue Book reports each quotation exactly as it is made and depends on the subscriber to make average price adjustments to fit the peculiarities of his territory.

METHOD: The C.M.I. Blue Book should be read as follows: First price listed is lowest price for the week; second price listed is highest price. Where only one price appears this should be considered lowest price.

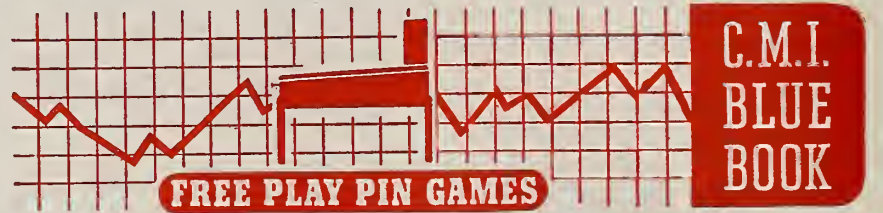
