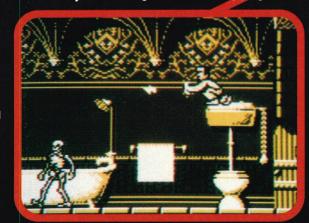
Crane and Game Boy graphic artist Dave Percival. These are the two who came up with the idea for *Dr. Franken* while working late one night in the Elite labs.

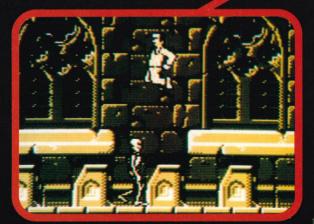

Results of early experiments with the bunsen burner and glass phial were hordes of ghosts and ghouls who were left to roam at will around the castle. But later, as he got more practised at his art, Frankenbone managed to create his masterpieces Franky (out of a huge pile of spare parts) and Franky's girlfriend Bitsy.

Got that so far? Good. I'll just translate the

Got that so far? Good. I'll just translate the next bit then and we'll be ready to carry on. (More rustling.)

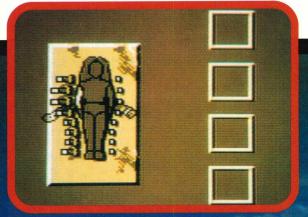


Flushed with success, Franky utilises the background detail in one of the castle bathrooms and leaps onto the top of the toilet cistern in order to avoid one of the Doc's earlier boney creations.

Franky has to run round the castle collecting Bitsy's pieces and a number of other items so he can put her back together again. Unfortunately he's not got very far at the moment. Oh dear.

Erm, let's see. Er, this isn't as easy as I thought. Excuse me a moment while I just look something up in my dictionary. (Flick, flick, flick,) Symbiosis..., symphysis..., ah here we are, symptom.

**'Symptom** (simptem) *n*. 1, any phenomenon or circumstance accompanying something and regarded as evidence of its existence:

Oh yes. This must be the bit where, in programming terms, Mark and Dave manifested symptoms of late nights and frantic programming by creating 16 buckets of sweat apiece while working their fingers to the digits in the Elite labs to take their idea for *Dr. Franken* from original conception to playable game.

First they sweated it out designing the playing area. This consisted of seven floors and 230 rooms, each of which was carefully drawn in great detail and then named. Into these rooms they then put a number of different things. First off for example, they utilised the background of each room by creating tops of pillars, mantlepieces and window ledges which would then be accessible to the main character. Then the main character, Franky, was created with the ability to run, jump and walk through all the various rooms.

Next the rooms were stuffed full of all manner of evil-looking ghosts and ghouls who would cause damage to the main character each time they made contact with him. Power-up items were placed in some of the rooms too, so Franky would be able to replenish his lost energy throughout the game. And finally, various objects and keys were added which the main character would need to access various levels of the castle and complete the game.

There were also two special map and menu screens included which could be accessed at any time during the game. The map screen gave access to the blueprint of the floor that you were on, as well as indicating your current position and where you should head for. While the menu screen gave you various options such as Save Game, Reset and so on.

In game terms, Doctor Von Frankenbone's untimely demise had a marked effect on his gang of creations, and in particular on Franky: this manifested itself in the shape of a bout of

depression. (Erm, I think.)

You see when the Doc popped his clogs, all his creations were left to fend for themselves in the castle. The trouble was of course, all the neglected survivors from Von Frankenbone's earlier failed experiments; they got a mite peeved seeing his happy couple, Franky and Bitsy, snogging in castle corners every day. 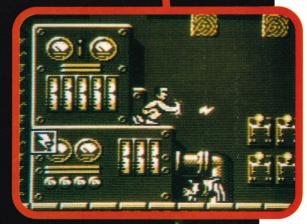

t the recent CES in Las Vegas, a rather fab little **Game Boy peripheral made** its debut, Called the Work Boy, it served to change your Game Boy into a personal electronic organiser. What a brilliant idea, we thought. Those wiley Jap blighters certainly know a thing or two about electrickery. But wait, the Work Boy isn't a Japanese invention at all, by jingo. It's actually been designed and developed in good old Blighty. David 'Gadget' Wilson dug out that old pair of Union Jack boxer shorts secreted in the back of his undie drawer and hotfooted it to the Source.

## work boy work source

ow many times have you had to throw your Dad off your console? It's a nightmare, isn't it?! Well, you'd better watch out Game Boy owners 'cos this situation is going to get worse with the introduction of a brand new 'grown up' peripheral for Nintendo's handy handheld.

It's called the Work Boy, and it was unveiled at the recent CES show in Las Vegas.

Nintendo's Game Boy is big business. There are an estimated 30 million Game Boy owners worldwide. This

Christmas in the UK alone Nintendo shifted over 300,000 of its lovable monochrome handhelds making it the best selling 'toy' of the festive season. It's also the console that breaks down barriers; recent research suggests 40 percent of owners are aged over 18, and a similar proportion of American Game Boy owners are female. Added to this universal appeal, those game carts are just so darn addictive.

Nintendo's success was visible by its showing at the CES – it virtually had a whole hangar to itself, filled with its own products and those of its developers, but there was little on offer that was radically different – little that is, except the Work Boy. Having been impressed by the

demonstration on Fabtek's stand, I approached Frank Ballouz, Fabtek's founder who introduced me to the developers.

Having travelled around seven thousand miles to visit the show it was quite a shock to discover that this impressive little utility had been designed and developed in Otley, nine miles north of Leeds in the heart of the Yorkshire countryside. It comprises a clever little keyboard and stand assembly, offers a dozen impressive functions, and is the brainchild of Source R&D Limited.

## so what does the work boy do?

The Work Boy boasts twelve main functions, but some of these sub-divide further into yet more. When you very first switch it on, you'll have to input your home, (the nearest city out of 180 places worldwide) the date and time. This enables the Work Boy to calculate foreign time zones and telephone dialling codes in relation to your own. The keyboard is powered by two of its own 'hearing aid' type batteries and these enable it to store the time and alarm even when your Game Boy is switched off. Dependent upon what you touch first, the Work Boy can be operated by the keyboard or by the Game Boy joypad. Using the latter, a digitised keyboard appears with a pointy hand cursor (though of course you can only input text via the keyboard).

Clock this. It's er... the clock. You'll see a clock face graphic with the analogue time, a digital time and the date.

This chap is the diary function. It lets you set the four alarms – a priority alarm, a birthday reminder alarm, a Christmas alarm (nice tune), and er, a bleeper alarm. You can also input up to thirty little messages so when the alarm goes off, you'll know what you're being reminded of.



Blimey, the temperature's rising. But is it in Celcius or Fahrenheit? Well, with this handy thermometer function you can convert the two.

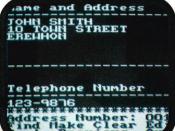
This tell-tale icon is the calculator function and turns the Game Boy into a basic calculator with memory function.

Want to know what day it was on January 1 1905? How about March 3 2001? This calendar lists the dates from January 1 1900 to December 31 2055.

This function converts between US gallons, litres, pounds, metres and all manner of imperial metric and weird measurements.

This is the main set up function. From here you can choose to clear everything, find out how much memory you have remaining, and change your 'home' (if for example you're on holiday and want to know times relative to your new location).

This is the main database and address book. The database incorporates a search facility and can store between 58 and 200 entries (the shorter the message the more you get). The address book holds around 58 addresses. There's also an autodial function from the address book that will dial telephone numbers for you if your phone boasts a digital exchange.





From this icon you can access two main features. There's a translator and the world map. Input Tokyo, for example, and the Japanese capital will be highlighted on the map, you'll be treated to a rendition of the Japanese anthem and you'll also get the time, date, and telephone dialling codes relevant to your home time zone.

The translator offers translations into five major European languages, English, French, Italian, German and Spanish. You can either type in a word you'd like translated or you can choose from a selection of headings like 'restaurant', 'hotel', 'hospital' for a list of useful vocabulary.

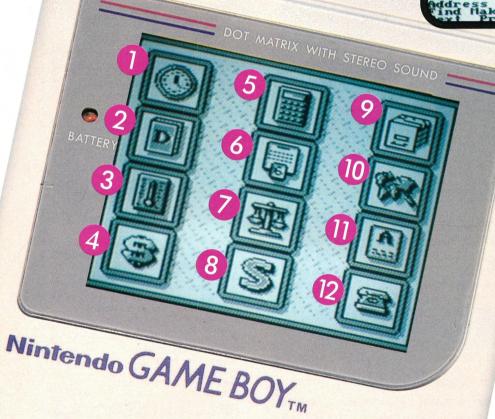

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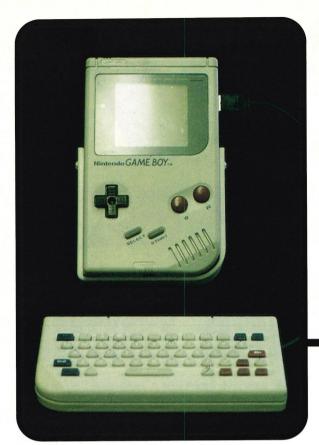

Well, it's a pretty neat little utility, isn't it. But when will it be available? Well, the Work Boy is destined for release in the US around June this year and will probably retail for around \$79 – the same price as the handheld itself in the US. In the UK it's expected to be available soon after the American release though like the console itself, the price of the peripheral will probably be nearer £70. Still this combined price compares very favourably to the cost of custom made personal organisers (and you can't play games on them).

So what of the future? Where will we go from here and what of the connotations for gameplayers?

Once the Work Boy is put to bed, a PC link up will be offered to enable users to download the Work Boy to an IBM compatible PC. Then, in addition to the game development currently underway, Source will get to work on Work Boy 2. Improving and building upon the functions of the ground-breaking first utility, Work Boy 2 is planned to offer a form of text editor that could then enable you to use your Game Boy for word processing! The potential is mindboggling. As far as game potential is concerned, several game publishers have apparently been approaching Source to use the utility for creating games with a text interface.

Eddie Gill, Source's Production Manager is also keen to produce a game design program to be utilised with the Work Boy and which incorporates a sprite designer. In an industry dominated by Japanese technology, it's reassuring to find a British company producing such an innovative add-on. It also looks like there could be plenty to look forward to from Source in the future.

In the role of a rather cute Noah you'll get to visit seven continents (each comprising three levels plus an end-of-level meanie). There's also a hidden bonus level in each of the normal levels – an extra 21 levels!

In each continent you'll have to to rescue an animal to complete your collection for the ark. Unfortunately the animals have been snatched by villains and these self-same nasties do their utmost to hinder your rescue attempts.

## countdown to doomsday















Buck 'sex pistol' Rogers; a desert runner called Spock; Norman Tebbit; one of Madonna's bodyguards; come and see my puppies; Daly Thompson; a scaly reptile called Cheggers...



**Buck Rogers and Tim** Ponting. One of them is the hero of Electronic Arts' new game; the other has a penchant for bell bottoms and flared collars and is reviewing it. But which one? Read on and find out.

nthony 'Buck' Rogers: the name that launched a thousand really rather crap TV series; a face that only a Venusian acid frog could love; a pair of trousers only a bombed out Seventies hippy chick would want to own. All this and more in Electronic Arts' seemly conversion of the PC and Amiga role-playing adventure classic, Countdown To Doomsday.

Just in case you spent the last four centuries floating in orbit in cryogenic suspension and missed either the books or the comic strip or the film or the completely crap TV series (lucky you), here is the Buck Rogers low-down. Buck Rogers has spent the last four centuries in orbit in cryogenic suspension after the destruction of his spacecraft during an attack on a Soviet satellite. Revived after a chance discovery, he awakens to discover the Earth under the control of a corrupt regime called RAM (Russo American Mercantile) which rules with an iron hand and a wooden foot. Siding with a young bunch of soul rebels called NEO (New Earth Organisation), he reaches number one with his hit 'Hippy Flares' – er, sorry, er, no, he destroys the orbital weapons platform Gauntlet and RAM withdraws from earth to its stronghold Mars. "The victory seems easy... too easy" says the manual. Too bloody right.



A body drifts into view... Don't worry, it's armless.

#### where on earth do I feature in this?

You control a young band of newly signed up NEO rebels. Countdown To Doomsday is your story. The game begins with an animated sequence of an eerily lit face readying a Doomsday laser and initiating a countdown to the destruction of the earth. ("Whorra rotter" in the immortal words of Cilla 'Book Rojes, whorra hoonk, and he's frum orbit' Black.)

Meanwhile, having signed up with NEO, you're just about to head

off for Salvation (the NEO space station in orbit round Cyril Smith) when RAM attack the space port. And from then on, you're on your own, fighting for the greater glory and the survival of the earth.

#### the game

Countdown is a role-playing game, which means two things: first of all, there's a lot of time spent faffing about creating characters and caretaking their gear, weapons and so on, and secondly it's the plot that counts rather than the action. As a result, Bucky takes some getting used to and is



his is the screen you come to when you train characters between game sections.

Career skill: Your main specialisation. Trousers is a 'hard' man, so his specialisation is in battle tactics/leadership.

balls-achingly slow until you suss out how to navigate the game system.

Countdown is based on the Buck Rogers RPG which in turn is based on the Dungeons And Dragons system, so if you're familiar either with any of the D&D games on paper or computer, you'll have a head start. You start off by creating a set of characters (any six of which form your party). The computer randomly generates their vital statistics (strength, dexterity, charisma, tech knowhow etc). You choose their race, sex and profession, either warrior, rocket jock, medic or rogue. If you want to be a hairdresser - tough.

## scrapping with an alien

his is what it looks like when you're cornered by a load of experimental combat gennies. Combat is performed on a turn by turn basis. You select your actions by clicking on the appropriate icon at the bottom of the screen.

Torrests Click on this, then position the crosshairs over your preferred target. The meaner, uglier and less well endowed the monster, the better. You can pop out into the equipment screen to alter the weapon you're using. Knitting needles ahoy!

Mower Click this icon and use the control pad to move around. The more you're carrying, the less far you can stagger. Oh, and if you're in space, you need to pass a zero-g manoeuvring skill check, otherwise you're giggered. (Sorry to use jargon, sometimes it's unavoidable.)

Guilcike An excellent icon for the impatient – click this and the computer controls the character in combat as it sees fit until interrupted. Great for boring fights against namby-pamby opponents. (Rare.)

Wester Moves the character's turn to the end of the round. Useful, for example, if you want to throw a grenade but want to give everyone the chance to get out of the way first. On the other hand, so can your opponents, but still...

5 End: Forfeits the character's turn.



Then you train them in various skills, either associated with their profession (rogues are good at bypassing security for example) or more general skills (like fast talking). At which point you're ready for anything, as long as it isn't too dangerous and your mother will let you stay up late.

As you progress through the game, you accrue experience points (from making the right decision or winning in combat) which every so often reach the threshold required to go up a level. (Each character begins at level one.) This increases your prowess and gives you the chance to improve or learn new skills.

### exploring your surroundings

Basically, Countdown is all about wandering around looking for clues and killing things. Action takes place from an isometric-3D-from-abit-above-and-to-the-left viewpoint, with a single figure representing your party. You wander around, trying to perform your next task (like finding a store of argon gas and then going to the air filtration plant to release it) until you encounter a hostile force; at this point the view zooms in on your party and the single figure is replaced by separate figures for the various characters and creatures involved in the combat. The fighting itself is not an action sequence; characters move and fight in 'initiative' order. Move into position, select an appropriate weapon and attack. After the battle, characters with medic skills tend the wounded and any

equipment left lying around by the enemy (armour piercing heated hair tongs, knitting needle guns etc.) can be salvaged. Oh, and experience points are allotted depending on how hard or shandy the enemies were.

The actual plot breaks down into individual episodes which are performed – more or less – in a specific order. For example, after you survive the RAM attack on earth, you are transported to

The storyline is what keeps the game alive. No, it's the instantly appealing one-more-go-ness of the plot that keeps you coming back for more. At any one moment you know who or what you're looking

for, but you don't know who to trust. Each time you meet a grisly end, you wonder whether you might have survived had you turned left not right..

Countdown To Doomsday is first and foremost a romp through a comic-book adventure. If you enter into the spirit of things and put a goldfish bowl over your head, grab a mop and wander round the house shouting 'exterminate' then I reckon a) you're bleedin' bonkers and b) likely to enjoy taking Bucky for a spin. If, however, Shadow Of The Beast is your idea of a good blast, Dungeons And Dragons is something that all the people in the world you despise most do

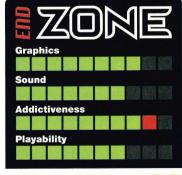

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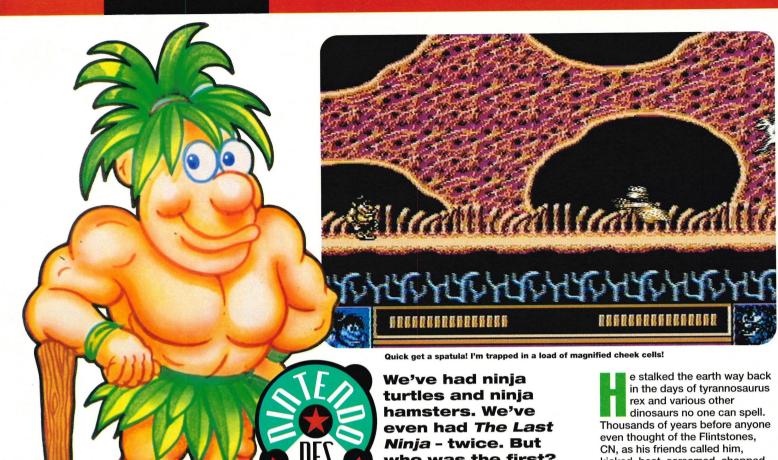

violence and gigantic reptiles, but it's a little short on the old kicking, beating, screaming, chopping and back-flipping. Caveman Ninja ain't really a ninja at all - he's just some geezer in a leopardskin nappy who throws things at dinosaurs. Caveman, yes. Ninja, no.

Still, as arcade conversions go, this isn't bad at all. In this shoot 'em, crush 'em, flint 'em up of an arcade adventure you must play palaeolithic caveman Joe or Mac out on an errand to rescue your chicks who have been kidnapped by marauding rival cavemen. Being pretty macho marauders, your pride, and the theft of your chicks,

must be avenged. To rescue the girls, however, you'll first have to battle your way through five levels of prehistoric pandemonium fighting off various dinos and crazy cavemen as you go.

Now NES games have rarely been known for their graphics, but just as it took time before the programmers got the max from the Spectrum and the C64, so it seems to be proving with the old Nintendo. Here's another game that looks an absolute treat. Caveman Joe is a healthily proportioned sprite, and some of the dinosaurs he faces are quite superb - big, nasty and very very colourful.

The backgrounds are pretty impressive too: a little fussy, perhaps, but great to look at. Joe runs from left to right, trying to kill anything that moves, and there's not a lot that's staying still. Beautifully animated - his running motion is one of the best I've seen in ages - he also pulls odd faces when he

sees the endof-level nasty - and I must admit I would too, so huge and apparently invincible are

they. I worked out a way of removing the first six of these, but the seventh one gets me every time. He's bleedin' ginormous!

Fortunately there are occasional bits of food to pick up - as long as you kill enough nasties, that is and these re-energise you for the fight ahead. Different weapons also become available as you dispose of your enemies - a stone wheel, a flint, a boomerang, and best of all, fireballs which not even the largest and worst tempered brontosauruses greet with indifference. There are ten different

locations which recur after you've solved them the first time around in ever harder versions, making a respectable 70 levels in all. And, most impressive of all, there are actually some sampled sounds you can understand - virtually a first for the poor old NES.

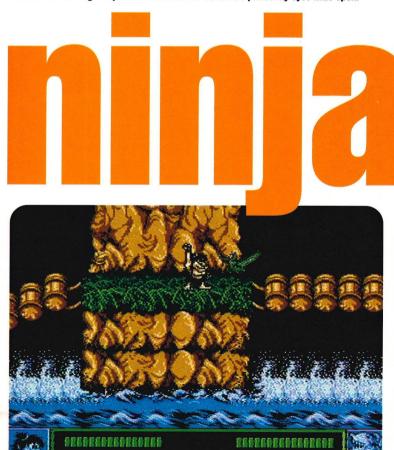
My one and only qualm, in the end concerns the game's speed. Old Joe may be a nifty fighter, but he's not the fastest

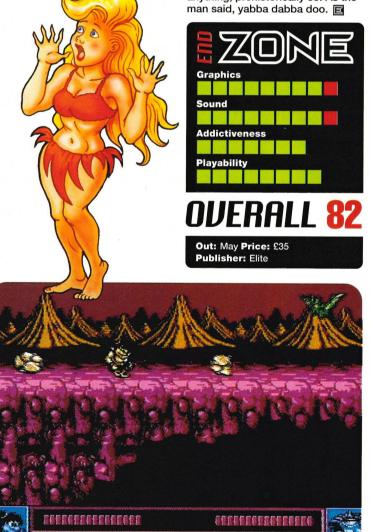

There are twelve geezers in a speedball team - nine players and three substitutes. Enough babbling, onto the game itself. The graphics are good with some nice backgrounds, particularly the psychedelic swirly one on the lava flow level. The main difference which sets it apart from those older classics is its 3D viewpoint, portrayed in a

Populousy sort of way which can be zoomed in on for closer examination.

You are cast as Buc, a promising young sorcerer with the unenviable task of assembling a party of adventurers and recovering the aforementioned Rings Of Power which are spread around the world of Ushka Bau. These rings are made from the remains of the mighty Rod Of Creation and if they were to fall into the wrong hands those of Void The Destroyer - you might as well impale yourself on a rusty spike as it would probably be more fun. It is your task to get these rings to Nexus The Benevolent and thus ensure that there is no return to the Age Of Sorrow.

You begin the game in the City Of The Mind (Man) which is home to sorcerers like yourself. Wandering around brings you into contact with people who you can engage in conversation via a user-friendly menu system. Information must be gleaned and trading, and even bribery, can take place here. By entering and exploring different buildings a host of information can be built up and items such as keys, stones and the world map can be found or purchased. At the Sorcerers' Academy you are introduced to your spells and given

a demonstration of how to use them. Initially you only have one spell - 'Stun' - a low power, low damage, class one job but as experience grows this becomes more powerful and new spells are learned. When gathering together your party will consist of one of each and will need to gain experience to be able to access up to nine available spell levels and consequently be able to dish out some meaty magic.

Before each mission your radio officer, Nancy, gives you lots of handy info on the crim you're after, like what type of car they're driving,

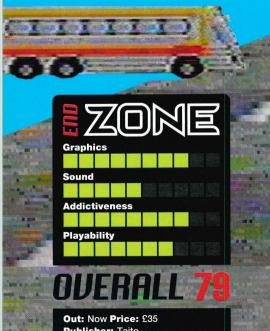

so irritating, so instead the first thing you do is wend your way around your unfeasibly large home, gathering jewellery, candlesticks, your toys and everything else the baddies want to get their sticky mitts on.

Each level gives you the run of just one 'wing' of your house in which you must collect a certain amount of stuff, and you

stuff, and you begin equipped with nowt but a water pistol and a rucksack (which can hold a limited

amount of the things you collect). As you make your way through the various rooms and hallways looking for treasure, you must open up drawers and cupboards, (jumping onto chairs, beds and shelves, if need be) and check behind pictures, in laundry baskets and even in the sink, fridge and toilet.

Frankly, if you ask me, any family who is stupid enough to hide a candelabra in the bog deserves whatever's coming to them, but then I guess no one did ask me, so on we go. Anyhow, when your rucksack can hold no more, you must find a laundry chute and bung your booty down it to the safety of the basement before continuing. There are power-up pizzas to collect as well as a selection of

other weapons of the charmingly non-violent variety (such as a catapult and baseballs), and to hinder you in your quest are the lurking burglars and their henchmen. The lackeys won't actually attack, but merely hang about waiting for you to drop a piece of treasure. The duo

themselves, however, are after your hide, as they say way out West. All can be halted temporarily with

your weapons, and

more permanently by way of a booby trap - you can either drop conveniently positioned items on their heads, or lure them to chase you over strategically placed thumbtacks and piles of toys, all of which will result in them slipping off screen to the accompaniment, for some reason, of a sampling of someone being sick.

At the end of each level, you must face Kevin's worst nightmares in the cellar: rats, bats, spiders - you get the general idea - before you can finally lock away that round's items in complete safety. And that, folks, is about the measure of the thing. How does it sound? A bit boring? Funny, that, because in actual fact, erm... it is.

Although there are occasional puzzles to solve, they're neither

very taxing, nor very interesting, and your sprite's ability to interact with his environment is annoyingly limited: you can only open drawers that have something in them, or jump on the things that you need to jump on and the booby traps, which could have been a really fun element, are unceremoniously plonked in place for you already.

The baddies are so easily dealt with that they're more of a niggly, dull irritation than a scary threat to your progress, and although most of the graphics are fairly nice, the occasional digitized pictures are ruddy useless and the animation of all the sprites is just too lame compared to what we all know the Super Famicom to be capable of.

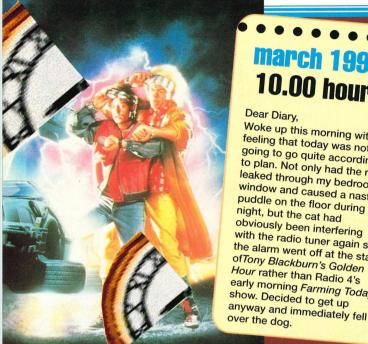
Add to this gloomy picture long, samey levels, repetitive gameplay, just one continue option and the constant feeling that the improvements that could have been made are so simple and so obvious that your granny could have thought of them, and you have a rather lame, disappointing mess. 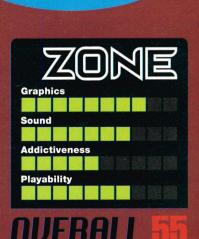
"Great!" I thought. "A pie em up rather than a shoot

And so I did, quite easily.

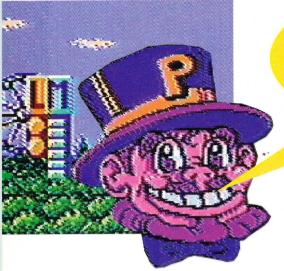

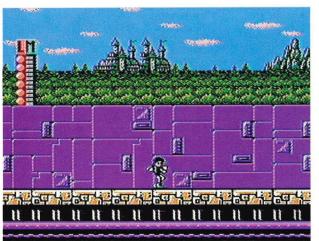

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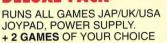

Crystal Quest is basically a huge multi-level shoot and collect 'em up. Each level takes place on a single screen with your ship, some crystals and a myriad of intergalatic vermin. You must manoeuvre around the screen and collect all the crystals. Once you've collected them, the level exit will open and you can fly onto the next one. Don't forget the intergalatic vermin though. Letting loose with your trigger finger and collecting the extra power-ups will help you too. So what of the graphics and music? Well, the graphics are unsophisticated and the music adequate, so what saves this game? Those old chestnuts, addictiveness and a slight twist of originality that comes via the 'inertia' effect on your ship's response; when you change directions your ship doesn't respond immediately, but a split second later, adding to the difficulty of the game.

So what's there left to say then. How about 'Crystal Quest, simple, slightly off-beat and addictive to boot'. Yes that'll do.

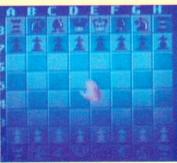

Against all this you are tooled up with some fairly noncey, fire straight ahead and do about as much damage as a pea shooter powered by soggy peanuts torpedoes. There's

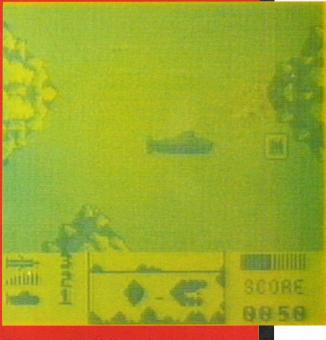

Pride of place at the Atari stand was given to Steel Talons, not a game featuring high-heeled stilettos, but a 3D helicopter combat sim. It's all

the rage in the States with its realistic helicopter controls, rudder bar (pedal) and 12 complete missions to play on your Tod or with a chum.

Remember last year's arcade smash Mad Dog McCree - the interactivevideo-laser technology light gun game which hooked millions of trigger happy people? Well, this year Atari was proudly displaying the sequel Who Shot Johnny Rock? Set in the prohibition era, poor Johnny Rock's been shot by one of four people. You've got to find the clues which will lead you to the combination of Johnny Rock's safe. Egged on by Johnny Rock's chick, bearing an uncanny ressemblance to Sharon in EastEnders, who proclaims: "I want you to find out who did this. Nail the rat". Streuth.

Atari was also showing its three player beat 'em up, Guardians Of The Hood. Three evil gangs have taken over the neighbourhood. You

must break them up and get their thuggish bosses on your side. No mean feat in this Pitfighter-style, digitised graphics coin-op.

Laser disk technology returned with a vengeance in the form of Leland's Dragon's Lair 2 and Space Ace which caused queues deeper than Ken Dodd's pockets. Another popular venue was Taito's Sonic Blast Man. literally a one-to-one beat 'em up. The cabinet includes a boxing glove and punch bag

The idea is to smack the bag as hard as possible. The harder you hit, the more injuries you inflict on your on-screen opponent. Smaaart!

Tatsumi's new cabinet displayed Round Up 5, a car race game not unlike Chase HQ. There was also a touch of the Mad Maxes about it - with spook robotic bikers leaping on top of your car and asking the whereabouts of Tina Turner.

Midway went the er, whole way with its rather fab Oppo Wolfstyle rendition of Terminator 2. No poncey single machine gun for this baby - the cabinet comes complete

with two huge mutha 9mm Uzis strapped to its side. Graphically it's the danglers with helicopters, exo-skeletons and shade-wearing Arnie look-alikes to splatter all over the screen. All in all, a rather sophist shoot 'em up. (As you'll discover if you win our fab compo.)

Tad Corporation's latest, Legionnaire, offered frantic beat 'em up action whilst Data East's newie, Rogha featured some rather peculiar looking robots. Essentially a two player shoot 'em up, you choose your robot and arm him to the hilt before plundering the enemy. Ho hum.

At the Capcom stand was the mighty Knights Of The Round Table. Reminiscent of the company's previous offerings,

Magic Sword and King Of Dragons, it offered nothing very innovative in the gameplay and graphics stakes but it certainly matched the high standard of its predecessors.

But the prize for the

'most amount of players' on one cabinet must go to Marvel Comics' X-Men up to five chums can play on this one, so if you've got no friends you've had it really. Still you can just stand on the sidelines and watch the neat graphics reminiscent of Captain America and Superman.

Comic book heros were evidently the order of the day for Konami - its third new title featured that loveable Gaul, Asterix. All your old, cuddly faves were there in almost larger than life sprite size. In addition the spirit of the cartoon has been retained with more than a

few humourous touches to keep you happily

into, then you wouldn't have gone far wrong by visiting the SNK stand. Although, there was only one machine on offer in its

Neo Geo incarnation, it was a fine display of footie brutality entitled Soccer Brawl. This little beauty harked back to the delights of Speedball 2 and World Cup '90.

The only

problem is, what would you rather play in your local slot house, a mega 32-bit

arcade machine or a 16-bit tarted up coin-op with a Mega Drive, Super NES or Neo Geo in its belly? The choice is yours.

Jaleco also had three new coin-ops waiting to be fed. First up was MicroProse's rather offensive sounding BOTSS. Thankfully nothing to do with Anneka Rice, BOTSS stand for Battle Of The Solar System (obvious really). You're in charge of a robotic walker (similar to the ones in The Empire Strikes Back), groping around a 3D world, blasting tanks, jet fighters and enemy robots. Neat. On the beat 'em up front there was 64th Street, a multi-player smack in the marth, similar in style to Capcom's Final Fight. The fab bit was when you doled out 'ver treatment' and the victim smashed into the background scenery, leaving a tell-tale imprint. If Formula One racing games are more up your street, then you would have made a beeline for the Grand Prix Star cabinet. Slightly less sophisticated than Super Monaco, but with neat night driving and link-up options.

Talking of Super Monaco, Sega was proudly displaying the sequel to its superb 1990 hit. Entitled Exhaust Note (Hmmm, catchy. Ed.) the graphics were stunning

and I don't think that fans of the original will be disappointed. Unfortunately, there were no sit-in cabinets – hopefully **Sega** will get round to building some soon. An innovative little marvel was the company's 3D hologram game, *Time Traveller*. Sadly not blessed by the presence of a 'reach out and touch me' Jon

Pertwee, the screen was littered with impressive digitised images of Hollywood actors. Their mums must be very chuffed but quite frankly I didn't know them from Adam. Sega also joined the

ranks of the Marvel comics appreciation society with its Spiderman slottie. Like **Konami's** X-

Men there were huge cartoony sprites, though this time of the webbed variety, and also a 'big' Mode for close-up action and a 'wide' mode for a broader outlook.

Last, but certainly not least, let's take a

look at Namco's coinies - an enormous amount of the little blighters - and many of them brand spanking new. For all aspiring ghostbusters there was the Oppo Wolf-style Golly Ghost - a fun romp through a sort of 3D model house zapping ghosts as they spook about the place. This slottie boasted a fab projection system (the video graphic ghosts are superimposed over the house) which coupled with a concave screen gave you that 'being there' feeling (well almost). Another Namco product incorporating this new projection system was Starblade, a brilliant scroll into the screen shoot 'em up harking back to the original Star Wars. It really has to be seen to be believed. No big stand would be complete without its driving game and Namco's was no

exception. *Driver's Eye* was a bit of a looker – a huge mutha cabinet housing the best

part of a Williams F1 car with a three monitor wraparound view. Two sequels were also there: *Gunner 2* and *Final Lap 2* plus a four player, strategy game, imaginatively titled *Tank Force*.

So there we are – I left the show suffering from severe tinnitus, comforted only by Eric Bristow's autograph and the fact that the whole thing hadn't cost me a single sov.

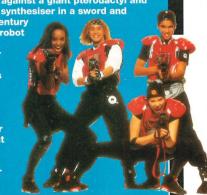

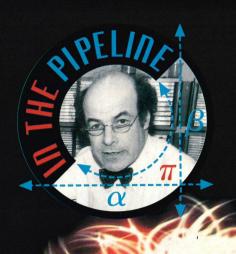

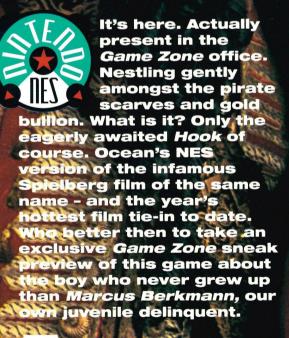

n days of yore, as legend has it, Peter Pan was a small person in a silly green suit, who liked to fly around Never Never Land with loads of small girls in nightdresses. Well, wouldn't you, if you had the chance? Precisely.

Nowadays, of course, Peter Pan is Robin Williams, and *Hook*™ is a multi-media experience whose tendrils stretch across the globe into every home. You've seen the film. You've bought the T-shirt. You've eaten the gravy. Withdrawal symptoms beckon. But if you're hooked on *Hook*, help is at hand. The computer game version will soon be here, and NES and Game Boy owners will be slicing each other up for a chance to get a look at it. For a mighty sharp little item it's going to be for sure – if the exclusive sneak preview of the NES version that I've seen is anything to go by.

Okay, so it's true. All of us at some time or other have been fooled into buying the computer version of some film we've really enjoyed, only to find out when we get home that the game is a) not like the film at all and b) total cobblers. But Hook is different. Although I haven't played the finished game, the version I tried is as-near-as-dammit complete, and it was fab. Pretty close to top hole, in fact. The only reason I am not playing it now is because I have the Ed standing over me with a medium-sized wooden club.

rinky tinky do

The plot? Well, like the film, Peter Pan is back in Never Never Land (never say never in Never Never again - and try saying that after a couple of Tizers). Pan's kiddies, cute and American though they sadly are, have been kidnapped by the evil Captain Hook and it's up to you and unquestionably pink Tinkerbell to rescue them. Not only pink - she's 'Tink' as well, this being American. Sadly, she's not much like Julia Roberts, which should keep your heartbeat at normal levels. Do we serious gamesters need such distractions? (Yes. Ed.)

So, to defeat old Hooky, you have to find him somewhere in Never Never Land. This means getting through 16 'worlds' (in the *Super Mario* sense), most of which are horizontally and vertically scrolling arcade-adventure scenes in the traditional style. In each world you have to pick up a certain number of goodies while avoiding, or if you prefer, fighting the many nasties that wander about. If you pick up a thimble, you'll gain the assistance of Tinkerbell, who can sprinkle magic dust on these nasties.

This was just about the only aspect of the

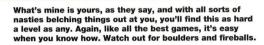
gameplay that hadn't been programmed into the version I played, but when it's been crowbarred in, the dust will prove satisfyingly fatal to these nasties. If you then pick up some marbles, you have 'happy thoughts', which may not seem particularly useful right now – but you won't be able to walk on the magic dust without them.

All these jolly little extras aside, the gameplay won't be terribly unfamiliar to anyone who has played a Super Mario game, ie. everybody. Still, as we know from that series, it's the thought that goes into the gameplay that matters, and the puzzles are satisfyingly tricky. Even if you get stuck, there's usually another 'world' you can have a go at. On the map screen, you'll see yourself standing waving like a pillock, while your compass shows you which places you can explore next

South-east from the start screen is the ghost mine, and fortunately there's a clue from 'Tink'

before you get going. "Use metal to find hidden gold," she squeaks, pinkly. "By collecting food Thudbutt has explosive results." Eh? you wonder. But these clues certainly fire up your curiosity. Who is Thudbutt? Does he always have such problems with his tum? Or did he just have an iffy chicken madras last night?

The other direction you can go from the start is west, to the pirate forest. This is a rather easier screen – and once you're through it, the whole game opens up to you. Before long you'll have access to the flying screen – only you won't, as you need to have collected something on another screen first. (These objects are hidden in the wriggliest places.)

Flying, though, is quite different to anything else you've come across so far – and for once, the *Super Mario* comparisons aren't appropriate. Here you're flying into the screen, and to keep afloat you need more blasted marbles – although I suppose that if a "happy thought" is the only thing keeping you from plunging to your doom, it's not a great time to start complaining. The marbles are sent up in balloons by the lost boys – but beware, as Hook and the pirates also send up some booby-trapped balloons, carrying sticks of dynamite. Charming, huh? Collect gold coins for extra points, but mind the dark thunder clouds, which strike you with lightning. It's a barrel of laughs up there, I can tell you.

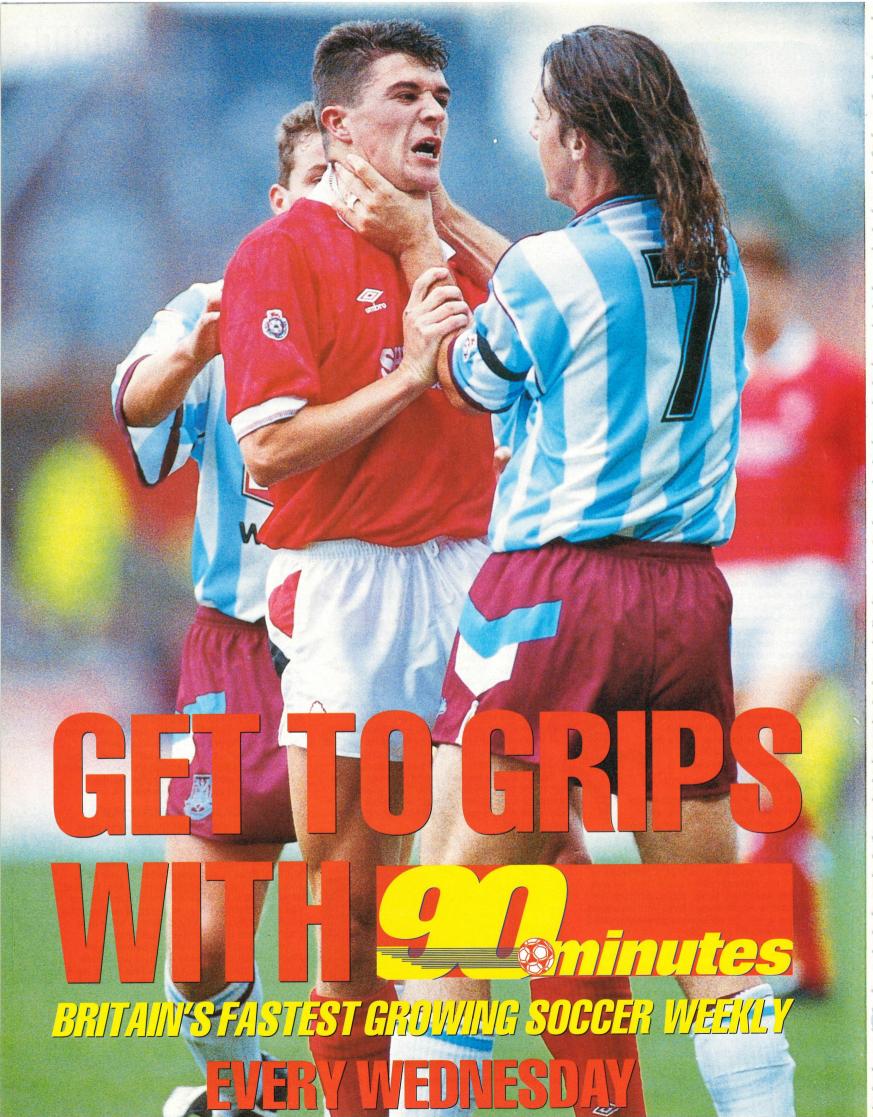
### lost your trousers?

There's also a combat screen, when you meet Rufio, the leader of the lost boys, for a fencing match. Each hit cuts a button off the combatant's shirt, which is certainly original – but then Rufio is supposed to be on your side, so you don't necessarily want to kill him. Instead, all you have to do is slice all his buttons off and you win. It's just as well, in fact, that you've got a zip on your fly rather than buttons – otherwise your trousers would probably fall down.

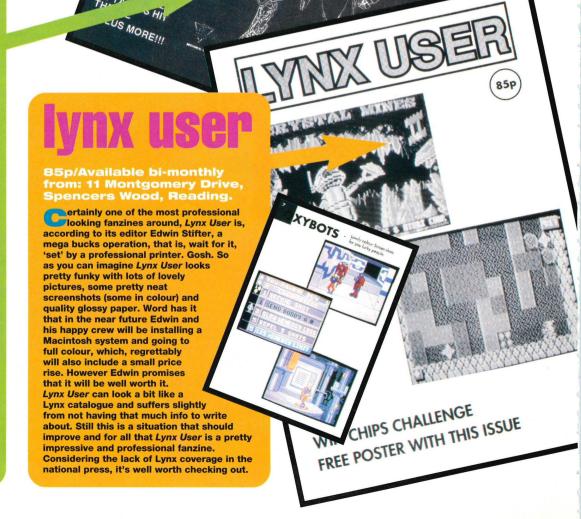

here is life north of the border! Boasting a rather natty pink cover, Game Boy Guide is certainly one of the smallest fanzines around, with only 20 A3 pages. However they are jam packed with reviews, tips and articles. And no Petite typewriter and PrittStick production this, oh dear me no. With a circulation of over 200, GBG is the big time. With twelve Game Boy reviews in issue two, ranging from classic games to new imports, Game Boy Guide rates each game for its presentation, graphics, sound, fun factor and lastability. They also give each game an overall score, which if it's more than 90, results in the Game Boy Classic seal of approval.

Also included in every issue are several pages of up-to-date cheats, features, usually at least one compo and a free readers ad section. With a redesign planned for issue three, Game Boy Guide sure is good value. Smart screenshots (despite a black and white only format) and a professional design makes Game Boy Guide one of the best 70ps a Game Boy owner could spend.

# call me charles foster kane

ook, you don't have to be the loaded editor of the Daily Record to set up your own console fanzine. All you have to do is sit down with some friends (or by yourself, if you want) and write it. Simple hey? However there are some tips you might like to think about before you start.

# vou've got

Most fanzines start off by bringing out one issue every three or four months. There's no real point in bringing out an issue every month if you've only got enough stuff to fill three pages.

Try and give your fanzine a distinct, recognisable style. Fanzines are traditionally made up of rather dark (illicitly) photocopied pages stapled together with someone else's stapler. There's nowt wrong with that but if you can get access to a word processor and/or printer so much the better. Can't read won't buy.

# try and make

No one ever sets up a fanzine to make cash; if anything, in the first couple of months you're gonna make a loss. Somewhere between 50p and 70p is an okay price. But be prepared to fork out some dosh from your own pocket for the first few issues.

Approach local software shops, you might be able to sell them a page of ads for a tenner or so, and more importantly, get them to stock your fanzine and even sell it on your behalf. If your fanzine is a specialist jobbie then you might get a bit of support in the form of news/review games from software companies. However they'll want to see at least one issue first.

Be careful that you don't turn your fanzine into an ego trip. Take other people's advice (and criticism), get other people to write for your fanzine, and don't print too many 'in' jokes. If people think your fanzine is cliquey they'll get fed up and won't bother to read it.

# be careful what

As editor you are responsible for everything that appears in your fanzine, irrespective of whether you wrote it or not. The law is an ass

You can advertise free each month in Soled Out to boost your readership, and if you send us a copy we might even run a news story on your fanzine.
