Coupé couple set up to sell SAM upgrade

MGT bosses Alan Miles and Bruce Gordon have struck out on their own after receiver Touche Ross fired them from the firm they founded.

Their new firm, SAM Computers Ltd, is a company dedicated to supporting the SAM Coupé and all its registered owners, but the necessary ROM upgrades won't be free as MGT hd promised.

The administrative receiver has been unable to find a buyer for MGT and rather than see the Coupé fade into obscurity the former MGT bosses pledged to honour their obligations to the 8,000 owners who have returned their guarantee cards.

Alan Miles said: "We see this as a positive step to honour the guarantees given by MGT," but confirmed that ROM upgrades for existing owners would be in the region of £12. The new company, set up with Miles' and Gordon's own cash, aims to provide a

source of ROM upgrades to existing users and a pivot point for people producing software and peripherals and the end user.

The company hopes to publish software titles as well as distributing existing software. During the period while a buyer is found for MGT, SAM Computers will help fill the void caused by its demise.

Miles outlined the new company's strategy. "We're getting together with software houses, repair companies and developers and forming Team SAM," he said. "In the interim, SAM Computers will provide upgrade ROMs on an individual basis as required and offer technical support while offering a grass-roots environment with service that amounts to more than just box shifting." The latest version of the DOS and the Spectrum emulator will be included in the ROM upgrade package.

SAM Computers Limited will make its

public debut at the All Formats Computer Fair at the Horticultural Halls, Victoria on August 4 and 5. At the show it will share an exhibition area with Enigma Variations which has pledged its support to the new venture.

Enigma was the first software house to write SAM-specific software which took advantage of the machine's sound and graphic abilities and its Defenders of the Earth has been likened to the 16-bit versions.

Entrepreneur Bruce Everiss is continuing his support for the machine with a SAM Coupé 0898 telephone hotline and distributor Hollington Myers will continue to distribute the product.

Miles is confident that his 'Team SAM' can deliver the goods and said: "We believe in the Coupé and so do all its buyers. We hope that people will see that we are acting in the best interests of all our customers."

Details are emerging of the new Amiga bargain bundle for Christmas 1990, which features five brand-new titles of which four are blockbuster Christmas movie tie-ins.

Prime suspects for the line up are the omnipresent Teenage Mutant Hero Turtles, by Mirrorsoft, and the Mindscape game based on the new Tom Cruise film, Days Of Thunder.

The Turtles game is a beat-'em-up based on the famous Mutant Turtle coinop machine, and Days is a 3D road racing game somewhat like Stunt Car Racer in style.

The marketing of the £399 pack is apparently going to be even more aggressive than the scheme which pushed the Batpack sales through the roof last yule-

tide. The bundle will be launched like all this year's Christmas products at the Computer Entertainment Show on September 13. ■






Space show aids chip design

On Tuesday July 17 a satellite was launched into orbit from Cape Canaveral on a joint Anglo-German mission to test the effects of radiation on astral microchips.

The device, called Combined Release and Radiation Effects Satellite (CRRES), will light up the invisible lines which make up the radioactive Van Allen belt allowing the scientists at University College London to map them.

The satellite will create 'the biggest fireworks display in history' around January next year, while giving designers of space-borne computers and other hardware vital clues to designing cheaper chips.

It is suspected that the strength of the Van Allen belts has been overestimated. If the information gained on this mission shows radiation cladding can be reduced on these devices, then it will cost substantially less to put these items into space.

TOP-END AMIGAS GO ON THE WARPATH

After Express's revelations of a new 32MHz TT last week, Atari devotees have been dealt a severe blow with the announcement of three new products which push Amiga 3000 technology into the lead once more.

A superfast 68040 accelerator card, a new Amiga 3500 tower system and a secret 3000 portable are all waiting in the wings.

The Supra 68040 accelerator card, previewed at the AmiExpo in Chicago this month, slots into the 200-pin processor slot of an Amiga 3000 equipping it with the faster processing 25MHz 68040. The new Motorola chip features an on-board memory management unit (MMU) and maths co-processor, making it up to 10 times faster than the chip in the plain vanilla 3000.

"It accelerates operations like ray tracing, rendering or even spreadsheet recalculation," Supra's spokesman Joern Hey told Express, "and it does these things by a factor of about 10 times faster than a 25MHz Amiga 3000. And if you compare it to the 2000, it's a factor of about 100 times."

Supra sees a big market for the device in fields like graphics, CAD, DTP, but more importantly markets which don't yet exist like real time digitising or video sampling. Supra is the first company in the world to take advantage of the processor slot in the 3000, even ahead of Commodore itself.

The real snag with '040 chips and the Amiga is that the Amiga OS compo-

nent called Exec, which normally deals with memory management itself, wants to ignore any external MMUs if not told to do otherwise. This means a radical rewrite to the system software if an '040 chip is to be used, but Supra has clearly overcome this. The cards should be shipping in the US in the autumn and the UK some time around spring/summer 1991, with prices estimated to be in the region of \$1,500.

Also confirmed through a number of sources in the US and UK this week is the Amiga 3500 tower system.

The 3500 is an Amiga 3000 in a new businesslike tower-style case sporting more space for the Zorro III format expansion cards which allow users to add on hard disks, emulators, monitors and

modems. The official line from Commodore is that the new unit is scheduled for release towards the end of this year and is geared towards corporate CAD/CAM. While the 3000 still awaits its planned Unix operating system the 3500 is seen as a means of further consolidating the machine as a serious platform.

Details of the spec of the machine originally emerged from the schematic diagrams at the back of the 3000 manual which state that more slots will be available in the 3500. No price details are available, but as the units contain 3000 motherboards they should be in line with 3000 prices.

But perhaps most exciting of all the recent developments are the claims of sources close to Commodore that the company has just started work on a portable version of the 3000 with a projected price-point of around £5,000.

The exact specifications are still sketchy, but 4Mb of RAM, a built in high-resolution monitor with external connections to colour multisync monitors, a single 3.5-inch drive and 40Mb hard disk are known to be under firm consideration.

Commodore has declined to comment on the 3000 portable, but this is no big surprise given its penchant for absolute secrecy until a product is officially launched.

Clearly the 3000 is Commodore's flagship computer for the Nineties, and is going to be exploited in as many different forms as possible in the coming 12 months.

PARDON, I DIDN'T SEE WHAT YOU WERE SAYING...

A computer is being developed which will be able to lip read. Until now computers have been programmed to recognise letters and numbers. This new development, which is being worked on by Alan Goldshen, a hearing-impaired student

from George Washington University in Washington DC, aims at extending this to words and even sentences.

The computer is 'trained' by making it analyse digitised pictures of a speaking human mouth. From this it develops a lexicon of phonemes – a set of speech sounds which differentiate one word from another.

The project is having the same difficulties as anyone who has to learn to lip read, for example it struggles over the difference between 'bet' and 'pet'.

Lotus 1-2-3 opens Windows

Lotus Development is to release a new version of its very popular Lotus 1-2-3 spreadsheet package which is compatible with the new-look Windows 3.0 WIMP interface for PC compatibles.

The new version is to be called Lotus 1-2-3-4 Windows. The product is in development right now, but as yet no firm release date has been announced.

The Windows version of 1-2-3 will be in direct competition with the already well-established WIMP spreadsheet Microsoft Excel. The war between the spreadsheet manufacturers, which has lead to superb upgrade deals for end users from rival firms, looks set to accelarate still more.

450 books on one disk

Californian scientists working for World Library have put unabridged versions of 450 books on a single CD-ROM.

The first edition of World Library's Library Of The Future series features works of classical Greek literature, plus works of European authors including Chaucer, Shakespeare, Edgar Allen Poe, Arthur Conan-Doyle and Walt Whitman and a range of historical documents including the Magna Carta.

The disk features software called Automated Archives which lets you search the entire disk for a certain phrase, and comes priced at just \$695 for the PC version. A Mac version is expected in the near future.

Give files proper names with XNP.

MS-DOS programs can now have longer, more meaningful file names, thanks to Extend-a-Name Plus, or XNP, by the World Software Corp.

This means that instead of calling a file something cryptic like 'FNDSOUT1.WK1' you can call it "Funds Out File One 15/4/90" and use up to 60 characters.

The secret of XNP is that it works in the background of any program you use. When your application looks for files on your disk, XNP intercepts with its own pop-up menu and allows you to retrieve the file using its extended name. It has been tested with many popular programs like WordPerfect, Lotus 1-2-3, Word, AutoCAD, and others.

The program only uses about 4.5K of memory, if you have any expanded memory on board, otherwise it takes 42K. XNP costs \$89 for single user and \$249 for a five user network version in the States, no UK distribution has yet been fixed. For more information call 010-1-800-962-6360. ■

Smaller chips from new kind of diamond

A breakthrough in diamond manufacture could reduce the size of chips still further.


Man-made diamonds have been developed which are 50 per cent more heat conductive than their natural counterparts. Not only this, but they are also less inclined to damage from laser beams.

What this means to the computer user is that microchips can be packed even tighter with less chance of heat damage. Smaller chips mean more power can be packed into the desktop computer.

The new diamond has been developed by General Electric in the United States. Man-made diamonds can now be made in large sizes, worrying jewellers who fear a price drop.

Father of the chip dies

The inventor of the integrated circuit, Robert Noyce, is dead. He died suddenly earlier this month. Without Dr Noyce and his team at Intel the desktop computer would still be a dream machine.

Personal Intelligent Communicator planned in US

APPLE STARTS WORK ON MAGIC MACHINE

Apple is to help fund the development of a new computer called the Personal Intelligent Communicator, which will be put together by a new firm, General Magic.

The project is primarily designed to produce computers with intuitive interfaces, and to that end the new company is off to a good start, having been founded and partly funded by none other than MacPaint and Hypercard author Bill Atkinson, and the Mac operating system designer Andy Hertzfeld.

Although the first computer from GM is said to be 'two years away', Express has learnt of another General Magic device scheduled for launch in the spring.

The MacSlate is a smart keyboard with LCD screen which can be used away from the host machine. Basically a Mac portable minus the GUI desktop and other niceties like a disk drive, but able to accept and edit data for later download-

ing to a Mac, the MacSlate is as yet unpriced.

Meanwhile Apple Computer has paid \$1 million to use the name 'Classic' on its new low-end Mac (Express 81). The rights to the name were previously owned by Modular Computer Systems of Fort Lauderdale, Florida, but it has sold the name to Apple.

The Mac Classic will replace the Plus and SE as the cheap way into Mac technology, and will sport 1Mb of RAM and a 1.6Mb drive, plus all the same port connections as an SE.

The price is expected to come out at around \$1,500, although Apple has yet to confirm the price point for the new machine.

 Apple Computer UK has announced large cuts in the price of Macs to educational establishments.


Despite only being available for a few weeks, Windows 3 is already attracting utility programs. The latest of these is the hard disk file handling system *Prompt* (pictured right).

Unofficial national personal listing on the cards, warns Registrar

ALL PERSONAL INFO MAY B HELD IN ONE BIG DATABASE

Databases could be used to cross reference data held on each and every one of us to form an unofficial national database, according to the annual report from the Data Protection Registrar (DPR), released last week.

Areas of concern mentioned in the report included the creation of an unofficial national identity system using out of context 'data matching', understaffing of the DPR itself, problems with the Community Charge and credit agencies, and the lack of any international standards for data protection.

The report claims that national insurance numbers can be used as a 'de facto common identifier' which will 'creep into existence' on a national basis.

The main worry is that such a common identifier could be used to cross-reference or 'data match' files on an individual without that individual's knowledge. In this way databases from different sources could be combined together, producing a comprehensive database on a person without that person knowing anything about it.

This data matching could combine data which is totally out of context, producing a misleading file, and could also replicate mistakes made on computer

files, which would be difficult to correct since the person using it might have no working knowledge of the possible mistakes arising from a specific area.

Other countries already have legislation to control this kind of activity, including the US, Canada and Australia.

Concern is also mounting about data on third parties being accessed as part

of an otherwise legitimate request. The DPR has already informed four of the main credit assesment agencies that it is considering taking action over the supply of information on individuals not directly connected to the loan information they are processing.

The collection of information for the Community Charge or poll tax is another

major issue. Complaints about the facts requested on poll tax forms have come into the DPR thick and fast, so much so that 14 councils have been refused registration and a further nine have been issued with formal enforcement notices.

The lack of any international standard for data protection is also a problem. A direct (junk) mail company may well get hold of personal details and conduct the direct mail operation from abroad, avoiding the restrictions of the act. Mail shots from the United States are a growing phenomenon, as are those from Europe.

Although the 1989 International Meeting of Data Commissioners called for "equivalent protection in trading nations" nothing has yet been ratified.

A problem for the Data Protection Agency in policing computer-held data is understaffing in the agency itself. The DPR currently has 60 full-time staff, complemented by another 41 part-timers.

After only three paragraphs of the report, the Registrar, Eric Howe made the following statement: "I have to say that pressures on staff time have made responses by no means perfect. I hope that new staff now being recruited will enable me to give faster responses from late this year onwards."

Big database is watching you...

One of the most insidious and irritating uses for computer-held personal information is direct marketing, or junk mail.

Junk mailing has grown from a hit-andmiss affair making up only two or three per cent of large marketing strategies to an industry which accounts for nearly a quarter of many companies' marketing budgets.

Companies get their information from sources such as the Electoral Register (the Representation of the People Amendment Regulations 1990 mean that electoral registration officers have to supply copies of the register to anyone on demand). In fact list after list of personal information is passed on, or more commonly sold, to companies wishing to carry out junk mail campaigns.

One main source for the marketeers is the new National Consumer Database (NCD). This holds up to 300 'facts' on 43 million people in this country alone. It holds investment details on 8 million people complete with postcodes.



The National Consumer Database is sold to marketing professionals with the following clarion call: "43 million people. 22 million households. 80 billion bits of information."

This information does not simply relate to name and address, the NCD boasts: "Information is gathered on people, homes, wealth, location and lifestyle. The NCD holds accurate information on individuals, their income and equity investments. All available private telephone numbers are also being added ... lifestyle information combined with other sources enables us to build psychographic clusters ..."

COURT **CASES**

1989 saw 30 prosecutions brought, 23 of which have been concluded. The bulk of these were heard by Magistrates' Courts, but one, thought to concern a major High Street building society, is to be heard in a Crown Court. 22 of the 23 cases brought produced guilty verdicts. Prosecutions involved company directors, security companies, a golf club and mailing organisations among others.

Japan buys top UK firm

Japanese computer and electronics firm Fujitsu is to buy a majority shareholding in the British firm ICL, which is Europe's most profitable high-technology company.

This move will compromise several joint European projects, including Esprit and Eureka, with which ICL was involved. These projects were aimed directly at combatting Japanese technological supremacy.

The projects are Europe-led but they also include the participation of American companies such as IBM. The threat of a major European company coming into Japanese hands may force a rethink in American strategies and consequently affect funding and the ability of the consortium to sell into the US market.

This move follows the trend set by Mitsubishi which bought Apricot, the onetime personal computer manufacturer.

While ICL is better known for its mainframe computer production, it is in a good position to provide a base for Fujitsu's disk drive and printer production this country.

ICL is valued at around £1.5 billion. The final agreement should be signed on July 30.

Your chance to ask god

Ask God is a \$129 text searcher combining hypertext and artificial intelligence routines which can find any word among up to four gigabytes of ASCII text in just two disk seeks.

Running on a standard PC, but demanding 4.5 Mb of hard disk space, Ask God comes, of course, with a digital Bible. The software's publisher, Business Solutions on 0800 648 6258, plans to make versions availble for legal, medical and accounting purposes.

Friday 13th damp squib

Yet again Friday 13th passed with a whimper rather than the mediaboosted bang.

The annual spate of virus fear was followed by the equally regular anticlimax. People had either protected their computers with disinfectant programs, had changed the dates or had simply not bothered switching their machines on. The Saturday 14th virus which was also supposed to wreak havoc declined to make an appearance.

Two unlucky organisations did suffer, but more from embarrassment than any great damage; Tokyo's Waseda University reported that 100 of its computers were infected – no damage – and Fujitsu, the Japanese electronics mega-corp, managed to cure 20 of its machines after a virus was detected.

AMSTRAD TO CUT PC PRICES IN AUTUMN

Amstrad is to cut the price of the PC1640 and the PC2086, and it will also be putting together new software bundles.

In the face of mounting attacks on the budget PC market from companies such as Commodore with its Starter Pack, Olivetti with its PCS range, Philips with its PCD range and even IBM with its new PS/1 computer, Amstrad has gone for software bundling, price cutting and a £1.5 million advertising campaign.

The PC2086 range will, from September, be bundled with Lotus 1-2-3 version 2.01 which is valued at £395. On top of this, the hard disk based 2086 models will be cut in price by £50.

The long-expected pairing of the 1640 with Locomotive's LocoScript PC (valued at £125) will also come about in September. The single drive, mono monitor 1640 will be cut in price by £100 which means that it will sell for £449, less than the price of a PCW9512. The 1640 with hard drive and mono monitor will have £150 cut from its price and will consequently retail for £699.

Amstrad's UK managing director Barry Young claims that the moves are "aimed once again to stimulate the market by offering a simplified and competitively-priced solution."

The market will be further stimulated by a £1.5 million advertising campaign in order to push the new packages.

Both the cuts and the new packages will be available in early September. The offers will last until December 31.

Minerva Software has announced two new 'home office' programs for the Archimedes A3000, called PC Access and DeskTop Office.

DeskTop Office is a suite of integrated productivity programs. The multitasking program comprises of a word processor, spreadsheet, graph and chart program, and communications package. General Magic's plans for the future of personal computing may be under wraps, but its association with Apple will guarantee surprises....

couple of months back, Apple's Chief Executive, John Sculley, defended his company's relatively high pricing policy with reference to the large proportion of monies invested in research and development.

His argument ran something along the lines of 'cutting prices would mean cutting jobs, cutting jobs would mean cutting the cutting edge'. At the risk of playing too heavily with words, this was the man who actually did cut jobs. Steve Jobs - the company's co-founder and all-round Silicon Valley whizz kid who took Apple from Bill Wozniak's garage to the multi-national horizons of America's most successful personal computer corporation. While the NeXT machine may not have taken off with quite the same impact as his Apple II, it again demonstrated something of the vision emanating from the Apple corral.

Apple has always been innovative, indeed it's built its reputation on originality. Central to this has been its drive towards the ultimate in user-friendliness typified by the front-end it pioneered with more than a little help from Xerox. The recent massive take-up of Windows 3 is proof that both power user and punter prefer to relax while computing. Proof too that profits will be tighter for Apple in the future now that the once hostile PC is, arguably, as friendly as a Mac.

So, within the space of a few short weeks we have a couple of announcements from Apple which show its resolve to take the competition onto a new battleground. First of all, the decision to launch the low-end Mac, which we now know to be the Apple Classic. A sub-£1,000 modular machine intended to replace the Plus and SE, compete professionally with the likes of the Atari ST

and Commodore Amiga, and corporately with the Amstrads and, after the PS/1, the IBMs of this world. The race is indeed on for power without the price. And it will be won at any cost.

But Apple has another ace up its sleeve. And it's one it can draw on from a long association with another of California's wunderkind. Bill Atkinson brought Mac owners the all-singing, alldancing HyperCard - the program that still refuses to be pigeon-holed. Ask anyone who's ever used used HyperCard to describe what it is and you'll be met with a "well it's kinda like er...everything...er" reply. Thought processor, multimedia database, personal organiser, etc etc. So now that clones have arisen on the ST, Amiga and PC and a new version supporting colour is set for launch, Atkinson takes time out and decides to conjure up some General Magic.

Apple holding on to the exclusive marketing rights to the new company's Personal Intelligent Communicator may signify that it is, after all, preparing to divest itself of some R&D costs. General Magic's first release, one of those 'if it was that simple why didn't I think of it' devices, is a smart keyboard with RAM and LCD you can take away to work on and just plug in and continue when you return to its host machine. The MacSlate is indeed a neat idea. Doubtless a very profitable neat idea undercutting just about every portable this side of a Z88.

But the PIC could well be neater. Although there are virtually no hard facts to go on, we can at least surmise what tricks General Magic may have up its sleeve. The Express bet? Oh, something like a hand-held colour LCD with built-in fax, videophone and on-line applications packages for under \$1,000. No? Well let's just wait and see eh? ■



ONE YEAR AGO

Amstrad decided to replace all the hard disk drives in its 286 and 386 machines after months of complaints and speculation about performance and reliability.

A hard disk hotline was set up and owners were encouraged to call and organise the replacement of the errant drives. Amstrad organised the maintenance contract with Dictaphone, whose engineers replaced the Western Digital hard disk and controller unit and transferred the data to the new disk.

Cult puppeteer Gerry Anderson launched the computer game version of Thunderbirds. Virgin Record's Megastore in Oxford Street was crammed with legions of fans of Thunderbirds for the launch.

Computer games joined the list of desirable loads for lorry hijackers when a French gang cracked a lorry near Paris and made off with boxes of software.

The thieves chose Psygnosis's Blood Money in preference to thousands of pounds worth of cigarette lighters and clocks that were also in the lorry.

Amstrad climbed in bed with IBM in a cross licencing patents deal which gave both companies access to each other's products... at a price.

The deal was reported as a payas-you-go arrangement where Amstrad and IBM would pay as and when they used each other's patents and licences.

A US report by Dataprog Inc predicted that by 1995 computer crime in the US would be more common than conventional crime and that a whole generation of police would have to know the inside of a computer as well as they knew their traditional beat.







The game will feature scenes and action from the movie of the same name, which itself promises to be a blockbuster, boasting as it does such stars as Madonna and Warren Beatty. (Mind you, it's still kind of difficult to get used to the idea of Madonna being in a Disney movie...)

Also coming up from Titus are a range of educational programs, featuring Disney characters like Goofy, Mickey Mouse, Donald Duck and others. Further details are yet to emerge, but the educational packages are due to arrive in September.

I've a letter here from Adam Roper, of Gillingham, who says:

HOSTAGES HITS THE CPC

OK, call it in questionable taste if you like, but Infogrames' Hostages is actually a pretty good game. It's been out on the 16-bits for quite a while, and the 8-bit version has been well worth the wait.

The plot owes more than a little to those celebrated SAS exploits a few years ago, with trained servicemen swinging through embassy windows throwing caution and stun grenades to the wind. Only the names have been changed - your six-man squad is now called a Direct Intervention Combat Team.

The game comes in three distinct sections. Firstly, three of your men must deploy to special positions around the embassy to act as snipers, but to do this they must run the gauntlet of the enemy's guns. The bad guys continually sweep the streets with spotlights, and at the same time as avoiding these you must keep calling up the map which tells you the spots your men must get to. If one of them gets caught by a spotlight, there's only your reflexes and his acrobatic forward rolls between him and a hail of bul-

Get your men into position and you start the second stage of the game. Here, your men are sitting at windows, watching those of the embassy for the tell-tale silhouettes of the terrorists. As soon as a shadow appears at the curtains you must aim and fire - this section is timed, so don't take too long.

The third stage, and the best in the game, arrives when the other three men in your squad land on the embassy roof. One at a time they have to abseil down to a window and then burst in. The view changes to a 3D simulation of the embassy's rooms and corridors, and there now follows a rather nasty game of hide-and-seek, where your men must advance through the building with weapons cocked. You have a map to show you the layout of the floor and where everyone else is, but apart from that you play the game from the viewpoint of each DICT man. Just because you can't see them, it doesn't mean they can't see you... (Look behind you!)

Your aim? On the lower levels you simply have to wipe out all the bad guys. On the higher levels you've got to save all the hostages too - and those terrorists are not averse to using them as human shields.

International terrorism might be a rather dubious thing to make a game out of, but Infogrames' Hostages is a well-planned and well put-together game. The graphics are good all the way through, and the suspense builds up progressively as you advance through the game. The first two sections are a bit thin on the gameplay front, but the third makes up for it. Not bad at all. Price is £9.99 on cassette, £14.99 on disk.

The object of the game is to make land for your people to settle on while also trying to stop your enemy's population from growing bare game code with 'data disks', each by causing floods, earthquakes and so on. This is one of the best games I have played, and I was wondering if any 'God' simulation games like this have come out on the Amstrad. If so, where can these games be purchased and how much are they?"

Well, Adam, to the best of my knowledge there are no plans to release Populous on the CPC. However, you might be interested in Sim City, from Infogrames. In this game, you act as mayor of a rapidly-developing city, deciding where and when to allocate your financial resources. Do you build more houses or more industry? Do you give the population the sports stadium they demand, or do you build that extra power station to cut down on blackouts? On top of this, you have natural disasters to cope with too - air crashes, earthquakes, floods...

Sim City will be available on the CPC soon. Look out for it.

Raf Cecco sounds more like a Cuban revolutionary freedom fighter than a Speccy programmer (who are usually called Shaun or Kevin or something) but he's a household name among Spectrum owners thanks to an excellent softography of classic games. Now his four best to date have been collected in one package, available from Hewson. Cecco's Collection comprises Exolon, a colourful walking-along-shooting-aliens type game with lots of strategic thinking as well as blasting needed; Cybernoid, a reconstruction of the traditional shootem-up with lots of colour and a similar line in strategic thinking to Exolon; Cybernoid II, more of the brilliant same; and Stormlord, an arcade adventure with detailed graphics and lots of fairies.

All four are true landmarks in the eight years of Speccy games, and their finely balanced shooting/planning gameplay and of course large, colourful, welldrawn graphics need to be sampled if you're to hold your head high and speak knowledgeably in Speccy game-playing circles. Cecco's Collection costs £12.99 on cassette and £17.99 on disk, picked up a 92-degree rating in Your Sinclair and is essential if you don't already own all four games. Even the box is snazzy.

QUESTION TIME

Regular poke supplier Matthew Wilson of Brighton has got some questions and, perhaps a bit hopefully, has written to me for some answers. Amazingly, I can actually answer one of Matthew's queries - he wants to know if you can get Speccy software on cartridge. Years and years ago, when the Speccy was young and everything was made out of wood etc., some cartridge software was available which you could slot into the Speccy via a special interface. Despite the fact that Ultimate's early

TASWORD TIP

Barry Walton has just been generous enough to let me have an excellent tip involving Tasword 2 (TW2) and Address Manager 1 (AM1) by Lerm. Barry's tips allows you to alter the BASIC in TW2 so that you can access AM1 to print out your address labels. Here's what you do:

Have a copy of TW2 and AM1 on the same disk. Load and Run TW2, go into BASIC and do the following alterations:

Alter line 600 to read

600 IF a\$="B" THEN GOSUB lab:

KEY 200,62: STOP

Then add the following lines:

2000 LABEL lab

2010 PRINT AT 10,1; "Go into BASIC "; FLASH 1; "B"; FLASH 0;AT 12;7;"OR";AT 14,1;"Load Label Printer ";FLASH

1;"L";FLASH 0

2030 GET g\$

2040 IF q\$="b" THEN RETURN

2050 IF g\$="1" THEN CLEAR 2060 LOAD "autoadd"

Now Save the altered program onto disk by Saving "TW" line 20. This will overwrite TW2 with the customised version - or you could run and save it from the menu.

When you run TW2 and type your letter to whoever, simply select to go into BASIC then reply "1" to the prompt. AM1 will then load and you can print out your labels. By altering the Address Manager BASIC in a similar way, you could elect to return to TW2, or indeed to any other utility.

Thanks to Barry for sharing that with us. Have you got any hints, pokes, shortcuts or wrinkles that could be printed here for the good of all Coupé owners? Really good tips win software, so send everything you know to me here at New Computer Express.

X-RAY SPEC

Mark Hewson of Leicester writes in to say his LocoScript data disk has just gone on the blink, giving 'Missing address mark' messages when he tries to use it. Fortunately hhe e's got a backup, but wonders what caused it, and suspects that an airport X-ray machine might have had something to do with the

Well, Mark, according to all the experimental evidence so far, X-rays have no effect on data disks. I'm sure your disk has just given up at random, as they do from time to time. 'Address marks' - which are actually magnetic blips - are like the grooves at the beginning of a record that the needle lands on; they get the disk motor 'locked on' to the disk. If these blips get corrupted by a magnet (for example a ringing telephone, a loudspeaker and so on) then the disk drive has nothing to lock on to, just as if you'd scrubbed out the lines at the start of a record so the needle had nothing to land on.

Disks can give up the ghost after a few months, or after several years; there is no hard-and-fast 'lifetime'. Although you can often re-format a corrupted disk and use it again, it's best not to trust it with anything valuable. And, as always, keep regular backups - copies - of every-

Finally: never, ever try to pack your PCW disk drives with marzipan on a British Airways flight.

CD-ROMS

Grandslam's latest (and probably last) release for the MSX is the game Space Harrier II, a full price game at £9.99.The game play is very much like the original Space Harrier, and although that game did not appear on the MSX in the UK, you must surely have seen it in the arcades, or on other formats.

The first thing I should say is that the game loads on an MSX 2 computer, so it should run on any MSX 1 as well. Obviously, it is very much like the Spectrum version, as we have come to expect from Grandslam. This is not always a bad thing, as sometimes what a game loses in the graphics department, it makes up for in playability. This is partly the case with Space Harrier II, and although a touch of colour would have been appreciated, at least all the moving objects scroll fairly smoothly. Sound effects and so on are very good and the game is difficult enough to keep you entertained for hours.

As you probably know, I love shoot-'em-ups, and although I found this game difficult to master due to it being a vertical scrolling game with pseudo-3D effects, I think most of you will think it worth the asking price. As such it is recommended.

VIRTUAL REALITY - SORT OF

It's interesting to see the excitement about 'virtual reality' among the software houses. This is the technique used by outfits like NASA, with separate display screens for each eye. With appropriate software, amazingly realistic 3D simulations are possible.

Oddly enough, this technique was pioneered on the QL, with a game emanating from France called The Wanderer. Using red and green wire-frame images, offset from each other with software, and spectacles with a red filter in front of one eye and a green filter in front of the other, a reasonable 3D effect resulted, similar to that achieved with the old 3D movies like House of Wax. The game itself was a bit crappy, but the system obviously had possibilities.

ADMAN SERVICES

BREAK OUT

Everybody has hit the BREAK key by mistake at one time or another and cursed the result, but is it so final? Well, BASIC programmers, of course, will know that you can often recover your program by typing OLD, followed by RUN. Machine code programs are rarely so well behaved, however, and in any case your data is very likely to have been corrupted.

Overcoming the BREAK bogey is possible, if you use a few strategies. First, you can physically lock the key, as on the Master 128, but this is not an elegant solution. A better solution is to set error trapping in your programs to detect when it is pressed, and a more permanent method is to reprogram it in your !BOOT file.

PACK A MAC

There are an increasing number of rumours about a Macintosh emulator for the Arc, though it's not clear whether this would be based around an add-on 68000 podule or a purely software solu-

It's known that several companies are working on 68000 software emulators, though I've not heard of any that are in an advanced state. The idea of emulating the specialist ROMs or video chips of the Amiga or Macintosh has always been thought too processorintensive.

A hardware podule might make more sense, particularly since it seems to be getting easier to obtain semi-legitimate Mac ROMs on the open market. With an emulator working on its own host processor, the kind of speeds needed for a Mac Plus are more attainable. It'll be interesting to see whether the hardware solution is in fact the one chosen.

WATCH THIS SPACE

ots of little enclaves of activ ity in the Archimedes world, where hardware specialists and ace programmers sit ferreting away at interesting projects. A phone call to a contact this week shone light on several new products, which may well show themselves by the time of the Acorn User Show in Septem-

PC TO EGA

Getting more solid in probability terms as the column progresses, Acorn is known to be working on a revised PC emulator. It will offer EGA screen resolution and will be able to show a PC screen within a RISCOS window. It may well also be able to break the PC conventional memory limit of 640K. I wouldn't expect to see this before the autumn, though.

SECOND (AND THIRD) IMPRESSIONS

Computer Concepts' Impression document processor is to become part of a family. Impression Junior, at £103.44 will, according to CC, offer many of the features of the existing product, but without the laser drivers and the restriction of font style changes to the style menu - they do listen, after all. It will also lack any hardware protection system (hooray!) and will be fully upgradable to Impression, with built-in file compatibility. The product should be ideal for 1Mb Arcs and can run the full, check-as-youtype spell checker.

Impression 2, at £194, offers the flexibility improvements of Junior as well as the ability to show the flow from one frame to the next. Rulers can be placed around the page and extra fonts are included in the package. It's not yet available, but registered users of the current product are in line for a free upgrade. CC are on 0442 63933.

AS LONG AS YOUR ARM 3

ARM 3 chips are still not easy to get hold of, with the Watford boards thinner on the ground than the Aleph 3 products. The chip-sets themselves cost around £160 in small quantities, which is all most companies can get hold of, as VLSI aren't up to full production of the chip yet. It is rumoured that both Microsoft and Apple are considering using the chip in future graphics enhancement products.

KEEPING TRACKS

I would like to bet that, in the next 18 months, making music on the ST will become all the rage. For users of PD sequencers upwards, the ST's built-in MIDI in and out ports and incredibly thorough catalogue of musical software will increasingly become their most important reason for owning an ST - yes, even more than playing the latest shoot-'em-up.

The latest addition to the MIDI scene comes from MPH, which has all but completed work on an upgrade to PCB Tracker, the four-channel, stereo music program that features a built-in drum machine, a sequencer and a mixing program. "No musical knowledge is required," boss Philip Harman tells me, to my depression (just think, all those tone-deaf no-hopers, happy at last to have found a music program that requires no expertise whatsoever).

"You can create music from either the ST keyboard (which is laid out like a piano)," he adds a fact I must admit had hitherto escaped me - "or from a MIDI keyboard." Newly added features for this version include a volume control, loop control, special effects and a function to

tune samples. "All this can be yours," says Phil, in best salesman voice, "using just 28 per cent of the processor time and in glorious stereo on the STE."

One of the nice things about PCB Tracker (in fact probably the worst thing about it is its name) is that Phil is working hard to make sure that after-sales service is up to scratch. Registered users get a quarterly newsletter, for instance, extra disks of .SPL and .MOD files and information of updates.



Walking through these levels you meet hosts of enemies and the key to success is finding the correct way to defeat them. You're equipped with limited weaponry which can be used to blast most of the bad guys. There are so many of them heading towards you that firepower sometimes isn't enough. Instead, you may need to climb a platform or work out another way of avoiding them.

Letting lose a blast of firepower on some of the bad guys isn't an advisable action. Occasionally you come across a sleeping enemy and you can walk straight past him without dying. If, however, you shoot him first, he heads straight for you and all the blasts in the world can't destroy him.

their wallets (and purses, of course!).

NETWORK NEWS

One of the major complaints levelled at the Amiga from the business 'big boys' is the machine's lack of networking facilities. In a large corporate computer system, machines must be able to talk to each other, sharing information and resources with ease and efficiency.

'system'? If you're a systems analyst (as I originally trained to be), the definition of a system is a series of different elements that are brought together either to aid the operation of each other or to work 'as one' to achieve a particular goal. As any 'professional' corporate computer user will tell you, life (and in particular, computing) is full of different systems. This is all important within the corporate market, and only now is Commodore making serious steps to improve the Amiga's situation within this area of computing.

Soon to be released by Commodore is its A2065 Ethernet card which is designed for use with the 2000 series upwards. The card comes complete with drivers to support Novell, NFS (Sun) and TCP/IP protocols. Although you may never of heard of it, TCP/IP is an all-important standard that has been adopted within the Unix environment. The board will be sold for about £350 per machine.

More interesting for most of us is the announcement of a cut-down version for A500 owners. The A560 Arcnet is a slower but lower cost network that should find favour among education establishments as it will allow many A500's to share data and resources, therefore making the cost of pulling together an effective system that bit cheaper.

How many of you have popped down to the shops and treated yourself to Mandarin's AMOS? By now, you'll already know what an astounding piece of programming it really is - Mandarin really has fulfilled all the promises and claims that it made about AMOS during the many months that we had to wait for the product's final arrival. With two disks packed with useful accessories and a bumper manual to back it all up, it seemed that Mandarin gave us just about everything that we could possibly ask for within such a package.

To prove still further the company's dedication to AMOS, Mandarin has announced the immediate release of AMOS Extras, a compilation of new and useful utilities to complement the AMOS development system. According to Richard Vanner of Mandarin, AMOS Extras contains many utilities which Mandarin originally wanted to include on the AMOS distribution disks, but disk space stopped it. "We could have made AMOS a three-disk package, but that could have complicated things for many people. We wanted to make AMOS as accessible to as many people as is possible."

AMOS EXTRAS DISK

The disk contains the new AMOS Menu Editor, which is a powerful utility to aid the creation of AMOS pull-down menus. The utility allows you to create complex menu structures containing text or even bobs. For musicians, AMOS Extras also includes the two music score conversion tools that were promised on the original AMOS to handle scores from Sound Tracker and Aegis' Sonix tool.

Sprites alive! AMOS Extras includes a whole host of bits for all you spritely AMOS users. For starters, you get AMOS Sprites 600 free! Not only that, but there's even an IFF to sprite converter that will let you use a tool such as DPaint to design all your sprites. Finally, producing AMAL animation strings is suddenly very much easier with an AMAL editor which will allow you to create animation paths with the mouse pointer.

Most important of all, is the tool that every programmer who wishes to make money out of AMOS has been waiting for - no, not the compiler, but the AMOS Runtime system. RAMOS, as it is called, will allow you to create stand-alone AMOS programs that can be freely distributed (or sold!).

How can I get my hands on this?, I hear you ask. Well, if you've sent in your AMOS registration card, then chances are that it's already winging its way to you as you read.



Speak to any puzzle game fan about their preferences and the name Tetris is bound to appear more often than many others. The simple falling blocks game has long held the crown of 'best puzzle game on computer' and has deservedly become a classic.

Years later, the game is still as playable as ever, so will anything be able to rival it? Possibly, since Alexey Pajitnov has come up with another stage in the continuing Tetris saga in the shape of Welltris.

Whereas Tetris was played in a vertical grid with the player trying to construct horizontal lines from falling blocks, Welltris takes place in a foursided 'well' (hence the name). The tiles slide down the walls and along the bottom of the well, where the shapes fit together to form horizontal and



vertical lines. Once a line is complete, it gets removed from the well allowing the other tiles to move inwards.

If a shape blocks up one of the walls, then that wall turns red and is locked for the next three shapes, and no tiles can be moved onto that wall. If all four walls become locked at the same time, then the game ends.

Welltris isn't exactly original, since it simply follows on from its predecessor. Having said that, the game retains all the playability of the original but still adds an interesting twist due to the addition of the extra 'planes'. It takes a while before the logic of moving around the walls makes sense, but once you manage to start thinking along the right lines then it soon becomes difficult to stop playing. In fact it becomes every bit as compulsive as Tetris! Ask anyone who has played the original and they'll tell you how addictive it really is!

Even if you don't think you like puzzle games and you've never played Tetris, get hold of a copy of Welltris and have a crack. But if you can't afford to spend hours at a time in front of your computer, think very hard before getting involved, since once you're hooked that's the rest of the week gone!



TO LIM OR NOT TO LIM

Amstrad has got itself into a bit of pickle by supplying a LIM 4 standard expanded memory driver on its 2286 PCs which does follow the complete standard.

There is at least one function call - function 24 made by software using expanded memory which is not included in Amstrad's version of the driver software. When attempts are made to access this function, the Amstrad driver responds with the message 'Not

implemented'.

The vast majority of software makes no use of this function, but a software house in Cambridge claims it needs to and that the PCs supplied by Amstrad do not therefore fulfill their advertising claims. The Advertising Standards Authority (ASA) is bringing the case to court on the software company's behalf. Amstrad is said to be worried that if the ASA win, many other cases could be raised along the same

The ramifications actually go further than that, though. How about the number of printers that claim Epson or Hewlett Packard emulation? Or VGA card manufacturers who claim BIOS or register-level compatibility. Recent benchtest charts in the press for both categories of device suggest that compatibility is far from complete in many cases. If the Amstrad case makes it clear that conforming to a stated standard means every part, byte and function call, effects could be far-reaching indeed. The case could, in fact, bear heavily on the whole clone and emulation industry.

WHY WRITE FOR ONE LANGUAGE?

How would you guess the following piece of code from a program called MYPROG. BAT

works, and for which language is it written?

GOTO begin :begin CD C:\ GEM BASIC2 \BASIC2\MYPROG.BAT GOTO end LABEL begin REM Rest of program code :end

It's not that hard to guess really, except that it actually runs in two languages. If you this program on a PC with BASIC 2 and GEM on it - on hard disk drive C: - it will run GEM, BASIC 2 and then itself. The reason it can do this is that BASIC 2 doesn't demand that it's programs end with the filetype BAS. It's quite happy to run a program ending .BAT, which is also the filetype for batch files, of course.

When run as a batch file, control jumps to the label :begin, as the batch file processor doesn't recognise the word LABEL. The code after :label logs onto the C: drive and runs GEM with the application parameter BASIC 2. BASIC 2 can also take a program as a parameter and in this case its the program MYPROG.BAT. BASIC 2 runs MYPROG and on seeing the line GOTO looks for the keyword LABEL, ignoring the line :begin and running 'Rest of program code', instead.

On quitting BASIC 2, the batch file takes over again and the jump to the the label :end will exit the batch correctly. Sneaky and elegant at the same time

NOT SO SMARTDRIVE

If you are using Microsoft's Windows 3 (over half a million people worldwide are) and have a large hard drive attached to your PC, there is a small chance that your hard drive could be corrupted. Only 12 verified cases of data loss have so far been established, and in every case it is connected with the use of third-party disk partitioning software and conflicts with the way Windows' SmartDrive disk cache tries to work.

The problem may occur if either:

- You use disk partitioning software and a hard disk with more than 1,024 cylinders.
- · You use disk partitioning software and a hard disk which is not supported directly by the ROM BIOS and version 3.30 or higher of MS-DOS

You can probably see why the problem is said to be rare.

KING'S QUEST IV

According to the cover, over 800,000 people have explored the kingdom of Daventry so loving portrayed by Roberta Williams over the past six years, which makes King's Quest Sierra's best-selling animated adventure series. Now here we are with part four, subtitled The Perils of Rosella.


For those not already familiar with Daventry and its inhabitants, Princess Rosella is the daughter of King Graham. She featured heavily in part three, To Heir is Human, where she played the victim. This time round she is the heroine, with not only her father's life but the whole future of fairyland in her hands.

The game uses the system adopted by Sierra for all its more recent adventures, last seen in Leisure Suit Larry III and Code Name Iceman. Each location is portrayed in 16 colours on a 320 by 200 resolution screen, giving a cartoon atmosphere to the game. The scene is three dimensional, in that you can move Rosella into and out of the picture, behind trees and so forth, as well as left and right. She can be controlled by cursor keys, mouse or joystick, although the mouse is particularly useful as she will attempt to walk wherever you click on the picture.

Many of the images are animated, so candles flicker, moonlight glistens on the sea and ogres chase you through the forest. But aside from the graphics the game is essentially a text entry adventure, as you still have to type most instructions on the keyboard in the time-honoured fashion.

As Sierra's longest running adventure series, King's Quest does not have the depth of vision of Origin's Ultima range. Nevertheless it is vastly entertaining, particularly - thanks to the appearance of characters such as the Seven Dwarves and the Frog Prince - to children of six to twelve years old. Good clean fun.

LINING UP DESKPRESS

One of the major new features of DESKpress, GST's big DTP sister to Timeworks Publisher is its ability to wrap text round irregular shapes. The principle works like this; each half of any rectangular frame can be shaped independently of the other, from the top mid-point of the frame to the bottom. This means you can have a frame with one straight and one shaped edge, or with two shaped edges, perhaps for an inset between two columns.

There is a slight problem when it comes to a frame with an angled top or bottom, though, it's more a problem of visualisation than any defect in DESKpress. The problem rears its head because it's not possible to raise any point on the altered frame outline above the top of the rectangular outline from which it's stretched. The top and bottom mid points of the frame are also fixed, so you can't drop the top mid-point down onto an angled

What you can do, though, is stretch a point from one side of the frame onto the other. For example, if you want to create a frame with an angled top sloping down from left to right, you would alter the right-hand edge of the frame and place your first redefined point on top of the left-hand top corner of the basic frame. You can then angle the line down by placing the next point at the other end of the slope, somewhere along the existing righthand edge of the rectangular frame. Double-click to complete the edge definition and the text will wrap down the new, sloped top edge.

The disk partitioning programs involved are Disk Manager from Ontract Computer Systems, SpeedStor from Storage Dimensions, InnerSpace from Priam Systems and Vfeatures Deluxe from Golden Bow Systems

All of these programs install through device drivers which are loaded at start up. To find out if your machine uses such a device driver, move to the root directory of your hard drive and enter TYPE CONFIG.SYS. If the display contains any of the following lines, your system uses one of the four diskpartitioners:

device = DMDRVR.BIN device = SSTOR.SYS or device = HARDRIVE.SYS device = EDVR.SYS

device = FIXT DRV.SYS

Even if your machine is running such a driver, you need only worry if you have a hard drive with more than 1,024

cylinders (over 60Mb or so) or your hard drive is not supported by your PC's ROM BIOS. In either of these cases, the safest thing to do is remove the SmartDrive utility from your machine. Windows 3 will run quite happily without it, though you'll notice more hard drive access and slightly slower performance. SmartDrive is also installed as a device driver, so delete the line

device = smartdrv.sys from your CONFIG.SYS file, or insert a REM statement at the start of the line to stop the device statement being executed.

THE SHOPPING EXPRESS GUIDE TO THE TOP WORD PROCESSORS

The most vital piece of computer software for most serious users is the word processor – many use their micro for nothing else. Here is the Express verdict on the best you can find for every machine

The most popular use for the micro is as a word processor. Its uses are many and everyone can benefit from it at one time or another.

Whether you intend to write to the Times as 'Angry of Pinner', write to thank Aunt Elspeth for the vellum bound copy of Pilgrim's Progress or send Jeffrey Archer running for the smelling salts with your latest thriller, a word processor is for you.

First things first, what is a word processor? It is an applications program that runs on your micro allowing you to use it as an intelligent typewriter. You can see the results of your typing before you print it and can correct mistakes, manipulate text and format documents on screen.

There's no need to print your document there and then, as it can be saved to cassette or disk and retrieved later for further additions, editing or printing.

The beauty of word processing is that you can set up and save commonly used layouts and letters and load them when needed to avoid repetitive typing.

Most word processors allow you to change margins and reformat text and any number of tab settings can be incorporated.

Common series of commands or keystrokes can be incorporated in macros in most word processors, allowing multiple commands at a single keypress. This is also useful for saving strings of text. Commonly used phrases, addresses and phone numbers can be assigned to a macro.

The more comprehensive (for which read 'more expensive') word processors generally have spelling checkers, mail merge facilities, word counters, and some of the better ones can even display italics, bold type face and different text sizes on the screen.

The ability to present the document on screen as it will appear on paper is known as WYSIWYG (What You See Is What You Get) and this feature is becoming 'standard' on new software.

To combine a letter with names

and addresses in a database is called mail-merge and is especially useful to businesses who wish to send the same letter to different clients, or perhaps a student wanting to tailor a curriculum vitae to suit prospective employers.

Page numbering and titling can be handled by most programs, and some even allow footnotes, bibliographies and indexing to be incorporated.

As word processing becomes more advanced, features such as importing graphics, working on several documents at once and calling lists from databases increase the efficiency of a simple typist or a large multinational. We all need to write at some time, and the word-processor takes some of the drudgery out of the task.

what impressed me though, were the disk drives. Not only did it have the usual sound level display with bars jumping up and down the screen. In addition the disk drive lights flashed away to the beat! A cheap trick may be, but I liked it.

The So What demo from the Care Bears came to me courtesy of Sphinx Software. Now there are scrolly messages and scrolly messages, but this one boasts the biggest scrolly message I've ever seen! The multi-coloured characters take up the whole screen – including the border.

mercial software may be slow to exploit the machines capabilities, but the demowriters have far from ignored the beefed up beast. Most of the STE-only demos take advantage of the uprated stereo sound. Indeed, the three that came my way were all sound related demos.

The Sound off Demo from Goodman PD simply consists of eight little pictures. Click on one of them and it plays a sample related to that picture. The sound effects are of extremely high quality - blasting out both speakers. The sampled subjects are fairly obscure though. Anything from the Tardis shooting through space, to Amazonian pipe music.

The Fantasia Demo also comes from Goodman. It plays a very decent rendition of The Cure single, In Between Days. The sound is of unsurpassed quality - but I could be biased as a Cure track played on a kazoo would get the thumbs-up from me. Graphically, STEonly demos have a fair way to go before taking advantage of the computers uprated colour palette. That's not to say that they're dull to look at. Here, constantly changing geometric shapes make their way around the screen as the music plays.

Sphinx Software's STE demo is simply called The STE Demo. It's another soundtrack, once again showing just what the STE's improved sound chip is capable of. Jan Hammer's theme to Beverley Hills Cop plays away. On screen it spins a few balls about while

E&OE - Advertised prices and specifications may change - please return the coupon for the latest information. adical new technology-based art forms come along so seldom that often when something new does crop up it's quite hard to see the point of it. Never was this more true than with 'demos' on the Amiga. The disks full of colourful graphics and music are quite fun to watch but of no enduring value, or so it appears. But after a while a pattern emerges, and it's not the disks themselves but the reasons behind them that become the interesting part.

The Commodore Amiga, as you know, is an advanced graphics and sound computer, so it was inevitable that some new type of art would be created especially for it. Demos are music- and/or graphics-based disks of fun which are written by enthusiastic teams of coders and released into the public domain. The disks are passed around at computer club meetings and sold for a nominal fee to the public through PD libraries. They are varied in style and often quite stunning in their technical complexity, and yet they are given away to anyone who wants a copy. They do it for the fame, or more accurately the notoriety, of having their demos 'out there' with the people who run and love Amigas. But the art of demo writing has come on a long way since its inauspicious beginnings in piracy.

THE 64 CONNECTION

Demos have their origins in the infamous cracking teams on the Commodore 64. Ah yes, the crackers. Everybody used to know one; someone who used to collect games by obtaining a genuine copy of a game, studying its protection system, 'cracking' it so it could be copied easily using normal DOS copiers, and filing it in their capacious disk boxes. Soon it became possible to compact the games into illegal compilation disks, whereby the games were cracked, compressed using data compression programs, and the results stored on disk with a menu to select which of the five or six games you wanted to play.

The cracker started out being a fairly average coder, but as he (almost all were male) cracked more games he became better and better, until he was able to code quite sophisticated menus and title screens. Soon there was barely enough room on the disk for the games, what with all the music and graphics the cracker was adding at the beginning.

After that the intros, as they were now called, were much more important than the cracked games themselves, and so by dint of sheer hard work the cracker became a coder. As he produced more and more intros, he made contact with other coders and they formed a team or 'crew'. Some teams still crack games, but the majority of them are only interested in the intros.

Then, just as the C64 was pushed virtually to its limit with all the graphics and music they crammed into the machine, the Amiga was released to a suspicious Commodore community.

BRAVE NEW AMIGA WORLDS

The coders embraced the new machine with open assemblers, and soon the cracking started all over. They'd been getting bored with the same old protection

routines and the Amiga had a totally new architecture for them to get their heads around. So the process began again, this time on the Amiga.

Games were cracked and stored – seldom played, as the cracking was the point of the thing – and again the intros the crackers added began to get better and



better. Boot block viruses were invented when some bright spark coder figured out there was some extra space on Amiga disk boot blocks big enough for a program to enter the computer unnoticed, and to run automatically when the disk is inserted at start-up.

Some cracking crews, like the notorious Swiss Cracking Association, utilised this space for viruses which propagated themselves onto other disks, wiping out the boot block of the target disk or even causing damage to other disk files. Other, less idiotic, crews used this space for tiny but effective intros to their cracked disks.

ROCK STEADY CREW

Amiga crews have been springing up like mushrooms in a warm cellar for some years, with bases in England, Finland, Sweden, Germany, France and Denmark. The crews congregate at what they term 'copy parties', where they meet in a village hall somewhere, connect up a bunch of computers and set about showing off their demos.


Obviously a lot of game copying goes on, totally illegal and reprehensible of course, but in the coders' minds this is secondary to the main business of them being the best coders at the party. They hold demo competitions and tutorials on how they do what they do. They stay up all night compiling demos from all the members of the crew, sorting them together on two or three disks and calling them 'megademos'. There's a lot of Amiga chat, and lots of other related stuff like music and other leisure swapping, like tapes and magazines.

The crews are an integral part of youth culture in most of these countries, and young people look up to the bigger and better crews almost as heroes. And when you look at it one way, they are worthy of some of the praise they get. OK, so they indulge in some illegal practices, infringement of copyright being the primary offence, but they are on the whole extremely gifted programmers, artists and musicians, on a par with the best computer musicians or commercial computer artists.

In fact, the end of the cracking-intros-demosmegademos cycle usually ends, not in the dock, but in commercial games programming. What often happens is that the demos the crew makes get better and better and then the crew suddenly vanishes, only to turn up programming the latest chart topping game some months later. The crews are snapped up by some software house which has been following their progress, collecting their demos, and just waiting for them to come out with an earth-shattering bit of coding, or some effect which suggests a likely game.

Then there are the demo collectors who stockpile the demo disks in the same way that some people collect records or CDs, and with the same motive; to have a collection of works which will be put on the deck in an idle moment for entertainment's sake alone. This is what demos are in real terms, the newest form of entertainment known to man. Part record album, part movie, part computer program, and part something completely new. Some are interactive, some passive, but all are on the screen for one purpose, and that is to give the viewer the ride of his or her life.

Demos fall into many different categories, with more being added all the time. The simplest are

screens of graphics with a simple piece of music and 'scrolly messages', a scrolling line of text going across the screen saying hi to other crews, their friends and girls they quite fancy, usually laced with a lot of multilingual swearing and other young boys' big talk.

They also feature a lot of bragging about how good their crew is and how rubbish the others are, a topic also popular among rappers it seems, but also more interesting stuff like technical information on how the demo was made and the equipment they own. And just to show how much more above board it all is these days, they usually give their phone number for feedback on what you thought of the demo. It's loud and brash, sometimes embarrassing, sometimes disgusting, but always rivetting viewing.

Another type which is finding favour with more and more companies is the commercial game demo, where a software house will give you a brief taster of one of its new products. Sometimes they even let you play a level just to see what it's like, but in most cases you just have to sit back and watch the game playing by itself.

This is an excellent idea, and a type of demo which we are seeing a lot more of these days. Let's hope in future that this kind of games demonstration becomes the rule rather than the exception.

GAME PLAY

On the other end of the playable scale is the recent surge of PD games. Rather than just do a demo which you can affect by twiddling the mouse, the crew have actually come up with a game which you can play.

Obviously the programs only have very short development times (modern attention spans being as short as they are), and there is no commercial pressure to make them as good as they can be, so the quality is fairly low. But the quality of the games is slowly rising, and it won't be long before they will be as good as budget game titles.

The remaining demos fall into the categories of slideshows, intro collections, and pure music demos. Slideshows are disks full of pictures which fade, slide, swoop, drop and peel on to the screen in a variety of original ways. The pictures will either be digitised (either of nudes, pop stars or, in some more interesting cases,

nude pop stars) or drawn using one of the many popular art packages.

The drawn graphics are of a broadly variable quality, with some being really talentless or bland but others being inspired, skillful and brilliant. The digitised pictures vary between tasteful fine art photos or paintings to out-and-out hard core porn. The porn comes from Europe mainly, and, as a PD librarian pointed out to me recently, this kind of stuff is weeded out of most PD library's collections. Which, as he put it, is a real shame as in some cases the coding is tremendous, and if it wasn't for the subject matter falling quite easily under the hammer of the obscenity laws they would be top-class demos.

Intro collections are just that, collected crew intros, stripped off of the cracked disks and assembled onto a single disk with a menu system enabling you to view any one you like. Lastly, one of the most interesting developments is the purely musical demo. Songs are remixed using sampling techniques, and the quality of some of these remixes is as good if not better than some of the records you get in the charts! Other more adventurous types use the sound chip in the Amiga to reproduce full scale classical works using soft synthesized timbres to very good effect.


THE FUTURE OF DEMOS

So where do we go from here? Well I've seen some sound and graphics demos which look and sound like pop videos – *Coma* from Static & Vandal springs readily to mind. Perhaps in future we'll see demo makers being snapped up by video companies to make real videos for pop bands. Or perhaps the crews *themselves* will become the bands, making 3.5-inch disks to add to the racks of CDs and cassette singles.

Having mentioned CD, there is another as yet untouched area of exploitation. With the Amiga CDTV coming out in September perhaps it will be CD-ROMs that the record companies will be releasing, and wouldn't that be a shot in the arm for the entertainment business? ■ HELP! Rice Crispies

At present I own a Commodore 64 with a Star LC-10C serial printer. Like many people, I am seriously considering upgrading to an Amiga A500. I was wondering if you could give me some advice about using my serial printer on the Amiga. I have consulted a friend's Amiga user manual and it says that you can use a serial printer once you have changed printer options in the Printer Options page on the Workbench package. As I don't know a great deal about how the Amiga DOS works, I was hoping that you could tell me whether or not you can load any piece of software via the Workbench and, if so, will it use the printer settings previously set on the Workbench?

For example, if you were to load any

art package, would it assume that you were using a parallel printer and send any print commands to the parallel port, or detect the serial printer connected to the serial port, or is it possible to change the printer options on the Workbench to print to a serial printer, then load the package? D W Lambert, Truro, Cornwall

To persuade the Amiga to drive a serial printer is a simple matter of going to the Preferences page on the Workbench, and installing the correct printer driver. There is a section in the Preferences page dedicated solely to the installation of printers and the Extras disk has several printer drivers for most of the commonly used printers and for the most common formats. Pick the correct one for your printer and follow the installation

instructions on screen. If you get another printer, or you need to use a different printer, it's a simple job of installing the relevant driver from Preferences.

Some software comes with its own printer drivers, and you will need to check whether or not these support a serial printer. Some of the whizzier software packages even allow you to configure more than one printer driver and choose from within the program.

HELP! Printer of the 90s

I intend to buy the Amiga Class of the '90s pack in the very near future and was wondering which printer I should buy.

Included in the pack are several packages that would need a printer, for example *Publisher's Choice, Maxiplan 500* and Superbase Personal, so I decided to look for a printer in the pages of Shopping Express, where I came across the Olivetti DM100S advertised by Evesham Micros.

Could you please tell me whether the printer is compatible with the Amiga A500 included in the pack and whether it's a good printer to use with the packages mentioned above?

Evesham Micros confirmed that the Olivetti DM100S is an Epson compatible printer, and as such will work with an A500 as long as the appropriate Epson printer driver is installed on the Preferences page (or in the software). As Epson printer drivers are provided (on the Extras disk), you shouldn't have any trouble persuading the Olivetti to work with an A500 and Class of the '90s.

HELP! Falling like ninepins

I recently upgraded from an Amstrad DMP 2160 9-pin printer to an Epson LQ-400 24-pin printer, having used a friend's Amstrad LQ3500 in conjunction with Pagestream and Protext.

I use Pagestream for strictly smalltime DTP – mailshots for colleagues, posters etc. – and Protext for all correspondence and an expanding CVwriting service.

Pagestream works fine, and continues to amaze me with the quality of its printout. Incidentally, when I tried using the Pagestream EpsonQ driver with the Amstrad LQ3500 I continually got software failures and had to resort to using the EpsonX driver: the subsequent printout was inferior to that of a 9-pin printer!

The reason for writing is that all is not well when using *Protext* in its Quality Print mode. If I print out text as draft then there are no problems, but if I print out using the Quality Print option, the top 15 or so lines of text are simply ignored, and so are text effects such as Expanded.

I'm typing this letter using Kindwords, which is OK, but Protext suits my needs far better and is in my opinion a superior word processor anyway.

I've configured Protext to Epson24

from the Configuration Menu, I've tried messing around with the dip switches on the printer, I've even tried praying, but all to no avail.

If you can't help, and I'm not expecting a miracle, please print my name and address so that if there's a reader out there who's experienced, and has overcome the same problem, they can contact me.

The best remedy for your printer problems is for you to telephone the *Protext* helpline on 0733 68909, and describe your version number and hardware setup to them. They will be able to take you through the printer installation procedure.

HELP! ST RAM cards

In Express 78 you advised a reader about extra RAM (Rammed Home) which just plugs in to the Amiga user port. I am the proud owner of an Atari 520 STFM but I also suffer from lack of memory, so I would like to ask you if there is a similar plug in RAM card for the ST? Maybe there are even some cards which give the 520 more than one meg of memory?

Those clever chaps up at Frontier in Harrogate are offering all sorts of RAM upgrades for the STFM and the STE. Although the STE is an easier machine to upgrade, your STFM need not feel left out and a call to Frontier on 0423 567140 should get you set up with up to 4Mb of RAM, although they are just as happy to add a mere half a megabyte.

HELP! Upgrade path

I am thinking of upgrading my current system of an Amiga A500, Star LC24-10 and Protext. I have two choices:

- 1. A hard drive (Commodore A590).
- 2. A cheap PC compatible.

My decision was to go for a cheap PC and I was wondering what you think of the Dolan 12MHz XT? I want a PC which has good upgrade facilities as at the moment I

have a budget of about £500. The PC will be used mainly for school work (and not games, 'cos I do have an Amiga!) and my new school is dominated by PC compatibles.

At the moment I am using my Sony KV-M14TU as a monitor for my Amiga via a SCART plug, and I am thinking of connecting it to the PC. What display standard will it allow me to use?

A potential use of the PC is for DTP, and I would like to make use of the Amiga clip art that I have collected, so I have rummaged through a PD catalogue to find software to convert Amiga graphics to a PC readable format. A GIF/IFF converter caught my eye (ouch!) from the Softville Collection, Disk No 24. It allows graphics to be shared between the PC, Amiga, Mac and Atari ST. Would you please investigate this for me, as it is a tad difficult without a PC at the moment.

And now... a tip – wow! If you press the two Amiga keys and C simultaneously in *Protext*, you are presented with a cursor-operated menu.

Another tip – If you press the two Amiga keys and CTRL simultaneously in Protext without saving, you will be extremely pissed off.

Thank you for printing my first ever letter to your magazine: and if you don't print it, it will be the last!

We haven't had a chance to give the Dolan a good dose of scrutiny yet, but reports say that it's an adequate machine and would be suited to the purpose that you describe. The Softville graphics sharing program is a useful utility, but don't expect it to convert everything.

If you intend to use a PC, then it's a false economy trying to use a TV for your display. Even with a SCART connector (and Sony's SCART doesn't follow the true SCART standard), it is a difficult job to persuade a PC to drive a TV adequately.

By the time you've finished messing around with connectors and converters, you won't be any better off than if you'd bought a cheap PC monitor. As well as a fuzzy picture, you will not be doing your eyes much good. Decide on the graphics that you want from your PC and choose the appropriate display card and monitor. There are short cuts, but they are not worth if

Also, remember that in order to use the same programs as your PC-dominated school uses, you will have to go out and buy the programs. PC programs are expensive and some of the serious programs and applications run into hundreds of pounds.

ST/STE


- 1) To get full colour dumps from your Star LC-10C, just use the JX80c printer driver in Degas *Elite*. (NB Degas *Elite* prints 'portrait' with this driver which is a bit of a tight squeeze on A4 paper. Make sure to align the paper about 5mm from the tip of the paper alignment triangle on the paper tray).
- 2) Users of the excellent Fastcopy 3 program can use it as a desk accessory instead of a stand-alone application by changing the extension from 'PRG' to 'ACC'.
- STE users can reset their machines simply by holding down the 'CONTROL', 'ALTERNATE' and 'DELETE' keys simultaneously.
- 4) Pressing the 'ESC' key on the desktop re-reads the disk in the current drive (very handy if you have just undeleted a file).5) You may sometimes have trouble getting the LC10 to load
- 5) You may sometimes have trouble getting the LC10 to load single sheets. If this is the case set the release lever to continuous, insert your paper as normal, set the release lever back to single sheet, pull the bail bar back and it should load the paper no problem.

■ HELP! The final solution

With regard to the Tech Tips letter from BTM regarding problems experienced with assembly language routines on an Amiga, here are some pointers:

- 1. The AlertMessage structure is:
- 1 word x coordinate of text
- 1 byte y coordinate of text
- n bytes the text itself, including zero terminator
- 1 byte continuation byte

If you require more than one line of text, you must set the continuation byte to a non zero value (eg \$FF) and follow it immediately with the next string structure.

2. If you want to write code to a specific

- address in memory, you must first request that memory from the system using the AllocAbs() function in the Exec library. Also, the dc declaration is an assembler command, not one of the 68000's instruction set. This is where your example code falls down.
- 3 You did not specify if you were using the PrintlText() or Text() routine to render your text into a rastport. However, there is no problem with the Text() routine located in the graphics library.

Route planners have become one of the most popular pieces of software around, and now two have made the ferry crossing to France to help out with holiday travel. Keith Pomfret got out the Michelin guide..

"Bonjour, monsieur. Ou est l'autoroute pour Cagnes sur Mer? Vous m'aidez, s'il vous plait?"

With that being the standard of my French, asking for directions on the Continent is no fun, so I was pleased to receive a couple of packages which claim to make planning Continental journies much easier. Apart from knowing where to go, it's handy to know how to get there, how long it will take and how much the trip is likely to cost.

Road maps and atlases are OK if you're the sort of person who can scan the page with a practised eye, nod and know where you're going. Lesser mortals may find themselves fiddling around with with pins, scale rulers and pieces of string while referring to maps and flipping thorugh the pages of guide books. The manufacturers of the opisometer (the little wheeled beastie that can be pushed across a map to work out distance) must be quaking at the sight of these programs.

This approach to detailed journey planning can prove both time-consuming and tedious – so why not delegate the task of planning that Continental expedition to your PC?

Now you can, using either Autoroute Plus France, from NextBase or Pan European Navigator, which is distributed by NewStar Software. They are both route-planning packages which delegate the task of planning trips to your PC, but they take different approaches to tackling the same problem.

AUTOROUTE PLUS

Autoroute has been around for a couple of years, starting life as a computerised route planner for the UK that used cartographic information provided by the Ordnance Survey. At a stroke, it took the guesswork out of travelling the highways and byways of Britain.

The original Autoroute is still available in its basic form, but publisher Next Base listened to what users wanted and produced a revised and open-ended version called Autoroute Plus. Some of the less endearing features of the original were removed in Plus.

The open-ended nature of the new version allows extra features, such as hotel guides, to be integrated into the package. By purchasing add-on modules, the user can tailor the package to suit individual requirements.

This modular approach makes Autoroute Plus an ideal candidate for 'swimming' the Channel: now Autoroute Plus France offers detailed route planning facilities for the French road system. As a bonus, it also takes into account the French system of toll autoroutes when costing journies.

The system is easy to install, and runs on any PC that has at least 512K of memory and a hard disk. The package can be used in text-only mode, without graphical displays but to realise its full mapping

potential, a graphics card is necessary. Autoroute supports CGA, EGA, Hercules and VGA but to be seen at its best must be viewed on a crisp VGA screen.

The opening screen displays a menu that offers the basic options to plan a journey: choose the mode of transport, set speeds and preferences as to road type, enter the start and finish points and the 'calculate' option works out possible routes.

This takes a few seconds per route (you can opt for the fastest, shortest, or a selection of journey plans), and you are then left with a choice as to what to do with the data that the software has generated.

A single keypress displays a map showing the entire journey. At first this map can be a bit disconcerting as it displays the roads on a black background, but there is a facility to change the colours and get it looking more like a conventional paper map. However the black version offers the best contrast.

Any part of this map can be enlarged – the zoom facility can take you down to an area the size of a small village. You can find the names of roads and places by pointing with the cursor and pressing the appropriate function key.

The different route options can be cycled through by pressing a function key – the active route is shown on the map by flashing the roads on and off.

From the map, a press of the spacebar takes you to a written set of instructions for the route, which can be printed out on most popular printers. The map can be printed out too, and with a good printer it is complementary to the listed route.

Because Autoroute covers every yard (and metre) of the ground in so much detail and has a system that can be added to and overlayed, the basic French version is likely to grow in the same modular way that the UK version has.

From the basic *Autoroute* program, gazeteers of places and overlays of information can be attached to suit a particular purpose.

Someone using it purely as a way of calculating routes will probably be satisfied with the basic £399 French package which mirrors the UK version of Autoroute Plus.

A coach firm or haulage business will be interested in the planned optimisation and costing module which allows detailed costings to be prepared for different vehicles and different routes so that the optimum method of moving goods around can be chosen.

An isochronic planner (which shows all the places which can be reached in a given time) and picture display module might be just the thing that the French estate agents are waiting for.

Companies wanting to pick a target market on the French mainland will find the post code add-on module invaluable and the Isochronic Planner will allow the

selectionof post codes within a set travel time area.

The approach taken by NextBase to producing Autoroute allows you to add the facilities that you need when you need them. While the UK and France are currently the ony territories covered by the system, the modular nature of Autoroute would suggest that travellers to other European countries might soon be able to take advantage of other versions of the package.

NAVIGATOR

Pan-European Navigator comes from a completely different background to Autoroute. Designed by DPS, it is the product of several years of cross-frontier transport management and distribution.


It is targetted primarily at the company that wants a heavyweight no-nonsense fully-integrated transport package but there are different versions to suit each business and wallet.


As well as covering the UK (there is a separate UK only version), the package caters for all of mainland Europe – including the bits behind the ex-Iron Curtain – and allows cross-border route planning and complex optimisation. It has been designed to cater for the needs of companies who might need to produce a local drayman's round as well as organise delivery runs from Leicester to Leningrad via London and Liepzig.

Navigator needs to be installed on a hard disk system and has similar hardware requirements to Autoroute, although it turns its nose up at a CGA display.

The current version is a little short on printer drivers, only offering a generic Epson driver, but facilities to run a range of printers from the clatteriest DMP to the sharpest laser are soon to be added. Once the program is installed and run, help and information are available as single keypresses and, as with Autoroute, areas of the map can be examined in detail. Detailed costing information for a number of different vehicles is included, and can be simply configured to

suit a fleet with several vehicle types.

In general, Navigator's operation is intuitive and, with help screens readily available, the package can be handled by any reasonably intelligent person. The documentation is concise and simple to understand, and contains all the information necessary to install, configure and run the program.

The transport industry will be grateful for Navigator's ability to calculate driver's breaks and work times while organising a schedule based around the relevant EC regulations. Rush hours can be taken into account as well, and busy periods that are likely to slow down progress can be entered on the basis of theory – or drivers' experience.

DEAD HEAT?

It's difficult to pick a winner from the Navigator versus Autoroute race. If it were purely a case of deciding which program suited the long-distance heavy haulier, Navigator would come out miles (or kilometres) ahead. Navigator covers the whole of Europe and, while in places its detail isn't as fine as Autoroute's, it contains more countries and major destinations. The trucking or coach firm travelling the Continent wouldn't find it difficult to justify the investment of £1,719 in Navigator.

On the other hand, a company that operates exclusively in France (or the committed French tourist) is more likely to opt for *Autoroute Plus*. This open, flexible system doesn't demand such a huge capital injection to get started, and it can be tailored to individual requirements more easily.

As its name suggests, Pan-European Navigator offers route-planning facilities for the entire European landmass, and as such is considerably more expensive. It's a little unfair to compare it directly to Autoroute, which currently has less ambitous aims. Route wars may hot up over the coming months, however, especially if NextBase plans to expand its system with guides for other countries...

TAKING A TRIP

To put the French Autoroute and the Pan-European Navigator to the test, we took a trip to the south of France armed with Autoroute printouts, maps and a battered 2CV.

Colleagues climbed into a shiny hired XR3i clutching copies of maps and itineraries and the Pan-European Navigator. They may have got the best car but who had the best route?

The journey was chosen as a compromise between a holiday trip to the French Riviera and a business trip passing by Paris, Lyon, Marseille and Nice. The rules were simple. Across on the midnight P&O boat to Calais, through customs together and follow the route to the letter. We agreed to take the quickest route on the way down and the most economical on the way back.

Both journey plans had been printed out while we were still in the office, and there were no great surprises when the two routes chosen by the packages were compared. Even with stops planned at Peronne, Macon and Lancon de Provence, both systems had given us the same 'quickest' route – only differing by one short road at the southern end of the journey and a strange detour from Navigator, which chose a 5-mile trip off the autoroute onto the RN2 north of Paris.

02:30 on a warm Saturday morning saw our colleagues in the XP3i sniggering as they watched us trundle off into the dark. Round the

first anti-clockwise roundabout and we were in foreign parts.

Following Autoroute's instructions took us a couple of miles along the N1 where we joined the autoroute. The steady drone of the 2CV kept time with the plan and a scheduled stop at the service area at Peronne was reached two minutes ahead of the predicted time.

We hit the notorious Paris Ring Road, the Peripherique, at 0600 (bang on time) and after a hectic eight minutes joined the A6 for the long haul to Lyon. We lost time between Paris and Lyon, but that was due to the monotony of that stretch of road (known as the black hole by those who use it regularly) and a snatched 15 minute break at Macon. Things picked up on the A7 and A8 after Lyon and we were able to regain some of the lost minutes. At Lancon de Provence we were ready for a spot of lunch and the 45 minutes allowed for the lunch stop proved adequate... just.

Back on the road for the last leg and the final 80 or so miles had us dropping off the autoroute and on to the RN7 at 14:50 – just eight minutes ahead of schedule. A couple of miles along the RN7 and we arrived at the Hippodrome, the large trotting track on the seafront at Cagnes Sur Mer.

The chaps using Navigator in the XR3i had followed the same route as us but had found plenty of space in their timings and adjusted their breaks accordingly. Their route

had been calculated for a family car and hadn't taken into account the enthusiasm of a journalist unleashed on a French motorway in a sports car. Their expected arrival of 14:02 had been beaten by half an hour, even taking into account a detour into Juan les Pins caused by an errant road sign.

Navigator chose the A26, A1, RN2, Peripherique, A6, A7, A8 and RN98 for the journey, almost mirroring Autoroute, but it was on the alternative routes that the programs differed the most. After a few hours frolicking in the blue Mediterranean, it was time to trek back – only this time without the benefit of the speedier toll roads. We chose the shortest journey option from both programs and settled down to a gentle trip back to Calais and the duty frees.

Navigator chose a route timed at 12 hours 40 minutes. Autoroute picked a more pedestrian 15 hours and 51 minutes. A vehicle swap caused ructions with the other team, and with an XR3i and Navigator, we arrived back at Calais Maritimes in time for a late breakfast on Sunday. With the 2CV turning up at lunchtime, we joined the queue for the afternoon ferry.

On the Pride of Calais, P&O introduced us to its new Club Class Lounge where we plugged in a luggable PC and spend the 75 minutes of the crossing arguing whether Autoroute or Navigator chose the best route home.

DOWN TO A TEE

ast week's British Open was one of those sporting events which, like Wimbledon and the World Cup, forced thousands of otherwise normal men, women and children to go out on the parks and pavements of the world and attempt to play their favourite sport. In the case of tennis this is simply a case of getting hold of an old racquet, a wooly ball and a wall. Football requires a can or, if you're lucky, a ball. But golf is more of a problem. How do go out and pick up 18 holes, 14 clubs and a sun-hat on the cheap? The easiest way is via the golf simulation.

PATHETIC SHARKS


You could attempt to realise your golfing dreams with Greg Norman's Ultimate Golf from Gremlin. This is also known as Shark Attack, probably due to the fact that this is just what you want to happen to you rather than have to play the game more than once.

Shark Attack comes with almost post-impressionistically rendered courses – two of them. The figure of the golfer stands to the left of the screen at all times which gives no sense of movement – this lack made worse by the fact that the ball perspective leaps from big (when you hit it) to small (once it's a suitable distance away) and then disappears for a while, re-appearing like a UFO to land on one of the patchwork fairways, greens or bunkers. Hitting the ball, as in most golf sims, is a case of judging power and snap by hitting a key in time to an on-screen cue – you judge the snap from a small gauge which looks like it came straight out of a Jules Verne novel.

There is a wealth of information to hand – you can even design your own swing for example – and the options this offers should have given a rich game with plenty of action. All in all, though, it is marred by bad graphics and lack of 'feel'. Sadly not one of the classic golf sims.


JACK THE KNIFE

On the other hand, however, we have the snappily titled Jack Nicklaus' Greatest 18 Holes of Major Championship Golf by Accolade. Once you have got passed the packaging, which explains that the reason



Jacko wins such a lot is that "he devours holes", the game itself is an excellent example of the genre. Unlike Shark Attack, which has a cluttered screen, Jack Nicklaus gives you what you need to know: wind direction, par, distance, and swing.

The swingometer is to the left of the screen and is vertical. Once you've got used to the swing and snap you will probably find yourself whizzing around the



courses with Jack to guide you.

The feel of the game complements the excellent graphics and style of play – the Amiga version will also talk to you. The main failure point with *Jack Nicklaus* is the almost sadistic pleasure the programmers seem to have taken with their trees, blind holes and hazards. Get behind a shrub and it grows to an impenetrable proportions. The trick, obviously, is to avoid them and it is a credit to the game that after only a few duff holes you will soon pick up a good style. Not the finest sim but definitely up there on the leader board.

JOLLY SILLY

Moving away from the serious end of computer golf, populated by blond, blue-eyed, American golfing pros (where is *Nick Faldo's Top Ten Troon Triumphs* when we need it?) we have *Hole in One Miniature Golf* from DigiTek. This is truly wonderful if you fancy a few hours of pure fun.

Basically, it's all of the crazy golf courses which would appear in a 2001 Disney World and them some. You don't need to bother with swing or snap or wind, you don't even have to bother looking good for the caddy. Simply place your small yellow golf ball on a mat and attempt to pot it. Easy. Easy except for the fact that the holes are hidden behind alligators, force shields, skeletons, and space invader games or are on pinball tables, trans-dimensional greens – you get the idea.

Holes-in-one are quite feasible, but then again you do have some par 2 holes. If you get too carried away and end up on stroke 6 for a par 3 hole the game stops you and forces you to move on to the next – cruel but




fair. A great game, save for the name. It's got nothing to do with golf, but it's still immensely playable.

THE REAL THING

Back to the real world and we have the *Kick Off* of golf sims: *PGA Tour Golf* from Electronic Arts. All golf and no mucking about. The graphics, even running on an Amstrad 1640, are a sight to be seen – fast, slick and detailed. Although there are faults – the trees do have a tendency to disappear if you get too close and there is no out of bounds – they does not detract from the overhead views or the flying tour of each tee.

Play is a seamless affair. The swingometer is horizontal on the screen, giving power and snap with some accuracy. The greens are contour mapped as well as being normally rendered. This 'green view', with all the



contours shown in terrifying detail, has left grown Express hacks quivering in feats of mental calculation — does that dip to the left miss the right-sided rise? Do you under hit? The detail is amazing and the addictiveness is startling. PGA Tour Golf is ahead of the pack. ■






