These cards can then be traded or even wagered in Wi-Fi races with other players. Some of these cards are incredibly tough to unlock so you'll need to make sure you have confidence in your ability before risking them on a race. These cards also open up new challenges and allow for expansive character customisation. Exactly what form this customisation will take hasn't been revealed yet but we're guessing it will be skill-based as well as aesthetic.

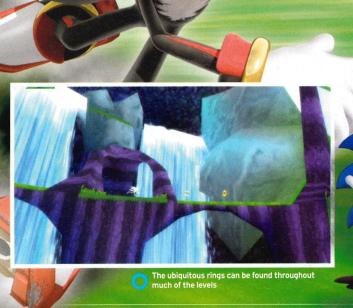

If you didn't know already, the other big Sonic game out this year is the next-gen Sonic The Hedgehog, which will be available on PS3 and Xbox 360. The game couples classic Sonic gaming with fantastic new graphics and speed, made possible by the new consoles. Silver makes another appearance in this game and helps (or perhaps hinders) Sonic tackle Eggman yet again. The plot sees the evil genius kidnapping a young princess by the name of Elise. She is the protector of a secret in the seaside town of Soleanna and that secret is something that could dramatically affect the world. Whatever it is, Eggman wants to use it, so Sonic and the rest of the gang must do everything to stop him.

Drive in 1991, he was an unknown entity. What made him stand out was his incredible speed. His success was ensured with Sonic 2, but branching off into the world of karting, racing, pinball and board games didn't always work as intended and the 3D versions have received mixed reactions.

Yet despite some rather dubious games, Sonic remains a popular icon. Yuji Naka thinks his image plays a key part. "I think it's

his characteristics of speed and coolness that make him as popular now as in the past," he explains.

hen Sonic first hit the Mega

character really has his traits and that's what makes Sonic so special."

As for Sonic's transition from 2D to 3D, Naka feels that there's no reason why the two styles can't coexist side by side. "If there is something to gain, there is also going to be something to lose," he cryptically begins. "There are pros and cons to both 2D and 3D. I think it is what kind of enjoyment the player gets from the various forms that actually matters."

Naka was keen to tell us about the new 360 and PS3 title that will be available towards the end of the year. "We're planning to release Sonic The Hedgehog for Sonic's 15th anniversary, which has the same name as the first Mega Drive title," he proudly tells us. "Timed with this special occasion of 15 years, and the transition to the new next generation of consoles, we are trying to create a title with the basis being that Sonic is going back to the basics of 'speed' but will still be full of surprises." ■



### SONIC THE HEDGEHOG (MEGA DRIVE)

The game that kick-started it all and made Sonic the superstar he is today. Here the formula for the series is set: collecting 100 rings rewards Sonic with an extra life (over 50 accesses the Special Stage), finding all the Chaos Emeralds unlocks another ending and the end of each act sees Sonic against either Dr Robotnik or one of his cronies to complete the world. Green Hill Zone is a constant source for familiarity of the series, reappearing under different guises. Defeating the robot enemies means that the animals are freed from their metallic prisons. creating joy for animal lovers everywhere. The Special Stage of the original game consisted of a frustrating rotating maze where Sonic had to be steered to the chaos emerald.

#### SONIC THE HEDGEHOG (GAME GEAR/MASTER SYSTEM)

No, you're not hallucinating; Sonic on Sega's Game Gear was an entirely different game to the Mega Drive version, which proved disappointing for those expecting a straight conversion. At the time, the visuals were a great showcase for what the handheld could do and although it has been surpassed technically, it still remains very playable today. This time around, the special stage saw Sonic bouncing on springs collecting as many coins and continues as possible in the bumper-filled environment. Chaos Emeralds were instead hidden around the levels so searching every nook and cranny was essential to locate them all. A few months later the game was converted to the Master System, which is the same, with some of the sprites made slightly larger for a big screen.



#### SONIC THE HEDGEHOG 2 (GAME GEAR/MASTER SYSTEM)

Contrary to opinion, the Game Gear version of Sonic 2 came out first although again is a different game to the Mega Drive. Tails made his debut here but unfortunately this was solely in the introduction, which saw Dr Robotnik abducting him, leaving Sonic to come to the rescue. Again, Chaos Emeralds had to be found hidden in the levels. A slightly wayward camera made boss battles trickier than they should have been, something remedied in the Master System conversion. No Special Stages.

#### 1992 SONIC THE HEDGEHOG 2 (MEGA DRIVE)

With Sonic's popularity cemented, Sega went all out on a huge marketing campaign, naming the release date Sonic 2sday. This time, Tails (known as Miles Prower) accompanied the hedgehog and could be controlled by a second player. The game also included a two-player mode, competitive mode and introduced for the first time seven Chaos Emeralds over the standard six. The Special Stage, which consists of Sonic and Tails racing down a chute collecting rings, is the best of all the games, although Tails does get in the way of the bombs. Sonic 2 was also the first appearance of Super Sonic. After collecting all of the Chaos Emeralds, getting 50 rings would enable Sonic to transform into a yellow invincible hedgehog and the rings acted as a timer, only increasing with the collection of additional rings. Interesting fact: foxes in Japanese legend are magical and mystical creatures that sometimes grow two tails

#### 1993 SONIC CHAOS AKA SONIC & TAILS (GAME GEAR/MASTER SYSTEM)

For some reason, the games had their names changed with America and Europe knowing the game as Sonic Chaos and Japan calling it Sonic & Tails. As a first on the Game Gear/Master System, it was possible to play the game as Sonic or Tails, although with the latter you couldn't collect Chaos Emeralds or see the ending. After collecting 100 rings, you were warped to the special stage.

#### 1993 SONIC CD (MEGA CD)

Sonic CD was the only game to be released on Sega's failing add-on yet its impressive size and unique gameplay meant that it still managed to impress the hedgehog's fan base. For a long time

in a minecart. Watch out for those spikes

before release, the game was rumoured to be a remake of Sonic 2 with added animated sequences but this wasn't the case. As a first, the game features an extensive animated introduction showcasing the power of the CD format although the opening tune differs depending on whether you own the Jap or European version. Sonic has the ability to warp into the past and the future using designated signposts, the state of which will differ depending on whether or not Robotnik's roboticizer is destroyed in the past of each act. Several new characters were introduced including Amy Rose, the obsessive pink female hedgehog infatuated with our hero, and Metal Sonic, a metallic robot with the skills that Sonic possesses. It's also the first game to feature multiple endings, with the good ending taking place if all time stones are collected and all the roboticizers are destroyed. The Special Stage is in

complete 3D, the objective being to destroy the alien spaceships within the time limit while running along a track and avoiding the various hazards that occur...







as Vector the Crocodile, Charmy the Bee and Espio the Chameleon appeared and each partnership was joined together by a ring. Each character differed in ability: Knuckles could climb walls while Charmy could fly in the air. Sonic fans may want to track it down, but it's no traditional Sonic title.

#### 1995

#### TAILS SKY PATROL (GAME GEAR)

Tails gets to star in his first stand-alone title, which was only ever available in Japan at time of release. It's a strange addition to the Sonic canon, with Tails carrying a ring across the levels, which has to be used to defeat enemies and progress through the game. Awkward controls and a weird camera angle make it difficult and frustrating to play.

#### 1995

#### TAILS ADVENTURE (GAME GEAR)

Another variation on the Sonic franchise, this one (also featuring Tails) is more of a puzzle game with the emphasis on collecting items. Despite the change in style, it's a remarkably playable title that's becoming increasingly difficult to find at a decent price. Instead of Dr Robotnik, an army of strangelooking birds have invaded Tails Holiday Island and set it on fire, leaving it to Tails to rescue his friends.

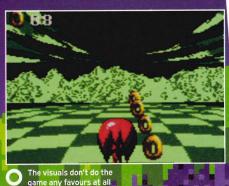

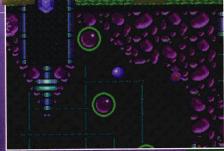
#### SONIC LABYRINTH (GAME GEAR)

Sonic returns in yet another twist to the platform formula, this time in the vein of a Marble Madness clone. The fight against the time limit means that you constantly have to use Spin Dash to get anywhere, taking care not to go too fast as death lurks around every corner. Not a great game, but it has its moments (plus a great soundtrack).

#### 1995 SONIC DRIFT 2 (GAME GEAR)

Mario Kart style racing returns but this time round everything has been greatly improved. Better

controls, a more advanced Grand Prix mode and a nifty two-player link-up option make this a worthy game in the series. Hell, we'd take an update of this over *Sonic Riders* any day of the week.

#### 1996

#### SONIC BLAST/G SONIC (GAME GEAR)

Sonic Blast (G Sonic in Japan) is a 2D-style game that was let down badly by poor controls and bland level design. It was the first and only Game Gear game to allow you to control Knuckles. In a bid to push the boundaries, all characters have been created with pre-rendered graphics and look appalling - too imposing for the small screen. The special stages were in full 3D and were visually impressive for the Game Gear.

### 1996 SONIC CHAMPIONSHIP/SONIC THE FIGHTERS (ARCADE)

A primitive fighting game in the *Virtua Fighter* mould, this arcade title only appeared in a few European arcades, although *Sonic* devotees can now play it on the *Sonic Gems Collection* that's available for the GameCube and PlayStation2. Its simplicity meant that it never really garnered much of a following outside of native Japan and is best viewed as a curio item only.

#### 1996

#### SONIC 3D FLICKIES' ISLAND/ SONIC 3D BLAST (MEGA DRIVE/SATURN/PC)

Developed by Traveller's Tales rather than Sonic Team, Flickies' Island stood out by having a 3D-overhead perspective. Although the basics of Sonic remain, this time round the Flickies (the cute birds in the arcade and Mega Drive title Flicky) have been scattered across the levels and have to be rescued. The Saturn and Mega Drive games are similar apart from the former boasting enhanced visuals and a far superior soundtrack.

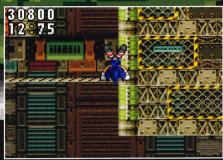

#### **1997** SONIC R (SATURN/PC)

The only racing game that makes the Sonic name proud, this effort also came from the heart of Traveller's Tales. Although short, there are six unlockable racers including Doctor Robotnik, Metal Sonic, Tails Doll, Metal Knuckles, Egg Robo and Super Sonic, all of which handle differently. And the soundtrack boasts some of the best music that Richard Jacques has ever composed. If you haven't got a large grin on your face while listening to Can You Feel The Sunshine? then we reckon you're probably already dead.

#### 1997

#### SONIC JAM (GAME.COM)

Not to be confused with the compilation of the same name on the Sega Saturn, *Sonic Jam* on Game.com threw in elements from *Sonic 2* and 3 but was a complete travesty. Monochrome screen aside, speed of gameplay was sluggish, rendering Sonic's speed down to a snail-like crawl. One of the worst Sonic games we've ever been unfortunate enough to play.

#### 1998

#### SONIC ADVENTURE (DREAMCAST)

As the first true 3D title, Dreamcast owners were wowed by the sheer speed and graphical trickery that was contained in a shiny disc. Sonic Adventure was released three times in all; the first edition in Japan, the second a limited edition released in selected areas of the US, while the third, Sonic Adventure International, was released worldwide. Aside from being able to play the game with each individual character (and collect emblems), a virtual pet Chao was introduced that could be transferred to a Dreamcast VMU card. In 2001, Sonic Adventure DX was released: a port of the original for the GameCube including new mission modes, 12 unlockable Game Gear games and the ability to transfer a Chao to the Game Boy Advance; amazingly, the main game was a poor port, meaning that the Dreamcast version is still the one to own.

#### 1999

#### SONIC THE HEDGEHOG POCKET ADVENTURE (NEO GEO POCKET COLOR)

A port of Sonic The Hedgehog 2 minus Tails, this is an excellent conversion and although the levels are visually toned down, everything is intact including the tunnel Special Stage. Features included a picture puzzle section where pieces could be collected across the levels and time trials for each stage. It was possible to link up with another machine for two-player races and was originally intended to make use of the NGPC to Dreamcast cable, but sadly this didn't get implemented in the final version.

#### 2000

#### SONIC SHUFFLE (DREAMCAST)

A spin-off board game copying the *Mario Party* series, *Sonic Shuffle* was a poor effort that combined

copious mini-games around the *Sonic* universe. Playing as either Sonic, Tails, Amy or Knuckles (Big the Cat, E-102 Gamma, Super Sonic and a Chao can be unlocked), you must travel around the board and then, depending on where you land, collect rings, play a game or battle with the eventual aim to collect as many precious stones as possible. The cel-shaded visuals worked well, but the mini-games weren't much fun to play and the slow movement of other characters dragged playability down considerably.

#### 2001

#### **SONIC ADVENTURE 2 (DREAMCAST)**

Even bigger than before, Sonic Adventure 2 abandoned the exploration elements of the original and stuck to speed, shooting and hunting for emeralds. It was the first game in the series to introduce Hero and Dark sides to play with, the latter allowing you to play as the infamous Shadow the Hedgehog and Eggman. Chao mode was also back with added features. To tie in with Sonic's 10th anniversary, a special pack was released in Japan including a commemorative book, gold coin and soundtrack. In 2004, the game ported to the GameCube as Sonic Adventure 2: Battle, with an enhanced Chao mode and extra multi-player modes.

#### 2002 SONIC ADVANCE (GAME BOY ADVANCE)

The first outing on Nintendo's handheld; Sonic Advance is a decent effort although it pales in comparison to the Neo Geo Pocket title. It's certainly a colourful game and is miles better than the more recent 3D efforts, but it still falls short of the original 16-bit classics.

#### 2002 SONIC ADVANCE 2 (GAME BOY ADVANCE)

Much improved over the original, this sequel sees the appearance of new character, Cream the Rabbit, who

appears in the storyline of *Sonic Rush* on DS. Special coins have to be collected to activate the Special Stage and although the game doesn't add anything new, all the trademark material is here.

### **2003** SONIC N (N-GAGE)

This isn't really a new game as it is essentially a port of *Sonic Advance* but we're mentioning it here for completion reasons. Unfortunately, it took away any good aspects by not converting it properly to the smaller screen and omitting multi-player options. Oh and having to play it on a keypad doesn't help matters either. A decent effort, but stick with the original Game Boy Advance version.

#### 2003 SONIC PINBALL PARTY (GAME BOY ADVANCE)

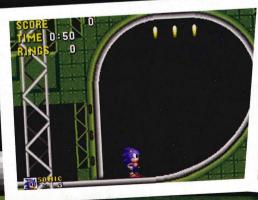
After a failed attempt with *Sonic Spinball*, Sega managed to get the formula right this time with *Pinball Party* on the GBA. Featuring three tables, Sonic, Samba (based on the Dreamcast game) and Nights (focusing on the Saturn original), a certain number of rings have to be collected before Eggman can be taken on and defeated. The Sonic table is based on the zones featured in *Sonic Advance*. A solid game that will please pinball and Sonic fans alike.

#### 2004 SONIC HEROES (GAMECUBE/PS2/XBOX)

Much like Knuckles Chaotix, Sonic Heroes used a tag-team system between three characters. The three characters between them had the ability of speed, power or flight on their side. Clumsy control and an obstinate camera meant it was a frustrating experience, although not completely without merit.

#### 2004 SONIC ADVANCE 3 (GAME BOY ADVANCE)

Here the partner system returns, but with each





character adding and taking away abilities; plenty of combinations need to be used to locate all the secrets. Chaos Emeralds are trickier than ever to collect, with all 70 Chao hidden in the game needing to be found to unlock the keys to the special stages. By far the best *Sonic* title currently available on the GBA.

### 2004 SONIC BATTLE (GAME BOY ADVANCE)

Another fighting game, this time in the style of *Smash Bros*, only nowhere near as impressive. Horrendous controls, appalling visuals and some questionable collision detection means that *Sonic Battle* is a travesty of a game that should be avoided at all costs.

### **2006**SHADOW THE HEDGEHOG (GAMECUBE/PS2/XBOX)

Again not really a Sonic game but it's officially part of the canon so it's getting included here. Yuji Naka went on the record as saying Sega "wanted Shadow to be a different character to Sonic as it also allows us to expand the possibilities for Sonic titles". Despite guns being available, they weren't as prominent as implied but the generic gameplay and uninspiring level design meant that Shadow really was lingering in Sonic's wake.

#### 2006 SONIC RIDERS (GAMECUBE/PS2/XBOX)

To commemorate the 15th anniversary of our beloved hedgehog, Sonic Team released *Sonic Riders*. Although visually it plays the part and features the frantic speed one expects from the series, the controls are poor, plus the blur effect while racing at high speed makes it incredibly difficult to enjoy. One for the younger fans only we're afraid.

#### 2006 SONIC RUSH (NDS)

A 2D Sonic game that takes advantage of both screens, *Sonic Rush* is a blinding return to form and recaptures the magic of the earlier iterations. *Sonic Rush* introduces a new character called Blaze the cat, who handles in a similar way to Sonic and has a different storyline. Although only the touch screen is used in order to collect Chaos Emeralds, all the classic ramps, springs and loops are back in a superb platform outing.

#### 2006 SONIC THE HEDGEHOG (PS3/XBOX 360)

Currently under development for the PS3 and Xbox 360, Sonic is set to reinvent his image. All the usual rings, pinball bumpers, rails and enemies are here, only this time round, two additional hedgehogs are in town: the annoying Shadow, who bizarrely tears around in a jeep and Silver, who amongst other things, uses telekinesis to hover mid-air and can grab far away objects all with the power of his mind. Has a surprising amount of potential.

#### 2006 SONIC WILDFIRE (WII)

Hopefully due for release later this year, *Sonic Wildfire* nevertheless looks set to make good use of the Wii's innovative controller. By tilting the controller horizontally, Sonic can be steered left and right to avoid obstacles while moving it forward allows the hedgehog to attack enemies and barriers. A variety of mini-games adapted for the controller are also set to be included.

#### **NOTABLE OMISSIONS**

There are some titles that weren't listed in the main article so here goes:

Sonic appeared in educational titles including Sonic Schoolhouse on PC and on Sega Pico in Sonic The Hedgehog's Gameworld. Sonic Eraser had a limited release via download with the Mega Drive modem Meganet in Japan. There's also the unreleased Sonic Xtreme and Sonic Crackers, a prototype that was supposedly Sonic 4. #### Sony starts to roll out Spots...

s we reported back in issue 4, the PlayStation Spots have been in operation in Japan since February. They allow PSP owners to enjoy all manner of content including game demos, movie trailers, music tracks, video content, image galleries and other content for free - all beamed to your console via the wonders of Wi-Fi.

Last month the first major promotion for UK PlayStation Spots was held in the Oxford Street and Milton Keynes branches of GAME. To get these free goodies all you need to do is flick your WLAN switch to on and hover around one of the Spots while you're waiting for your chosen content to download.

To celebrate the launch, the Milton Keynes branch held a *LocoRoco* Funday with a Ceramic White PSP and loads of games to give away. 'Spot Staff' were on hand to guide customers through the download process.

Anna Macario, Marketing Director for GAME had this to say about the PlayStation Spot service - "Through the PlayStation Spot initiative, our PSP owning customers can gain free access to a rich collection of diverse content when they come into one of our 'spot' locations. It offers customers an opportunity to try out games before they buy them and the incentive to keep coming in-store to get the latest content and offers available for download."

The only drawback of this service is that the content is not saved to your Memory Stick and is therefore lost once you turn off your PSP. This also means that only one piece of content can be held on the PSP at a time. However, it's all free so what do you expect?

This looks like it's just the beginning of the PlayStation Spot roll-out and should it prove successful we will undoubtedly see more of them appearing in GAME stores up and down the country. 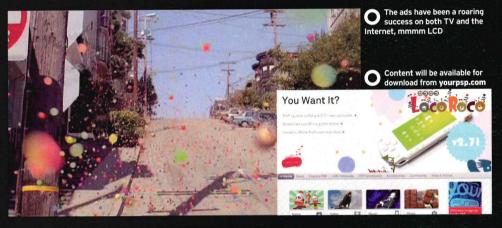

### CAROL SPEAKS OUT

The most famous PSP owner we know chats about the console and her love of Sudoku...

#### University raises the bar on law and order

ike law? Love games? Well we've got the answer. Well, we haven't really got the answer, but we needed an introduction to this news piece. La Verne College of Law in California, having included elements of videogame law for some years, are set to offer an entire course dedicated to the subject. This seems pretty sensible given the amount of legal actions currently taking place at the moment, and something that's only likely to get more intensive with the next generation of consoles.

In charge of the project is Professor Ashley Lipson, a chap well experienced in the field of both playing and developing games. Having taught law for a good few years, Professor Lipson has created a fair amount of supplementary software including The Objection! Series and SivPro! titles designed to enhance both students' awareness of the legal system and courtroom etiquette. "This is the first generation of students raised on computer games, and with the explosion of interactive technologies impacting just about every facet of life today, these courses have tremendous relevancy for today's law students," enthused Lipson when questioned about the validity of the course. He also went on to mention the modules included in the studies, which include 'Multimedia Law', 'The Law of Cyberspace' and 'The Law of the Computer Games Industry'. Entertainment law and lectures on intellectual property have also been included in the studies, which commence next semester in California.

Whilst the course doesn't solely concentrate on the industry completely, there will be a textbook Computer Game Law made exclusively available to

students at the La Verne, which will cover a range of related topics such as content regulation, product rights and licenses as well as acquisition and Internet property rights. We don't know about you, but we don't have any objections to this course, as long as it simplifies what seem to be particularly involved cases

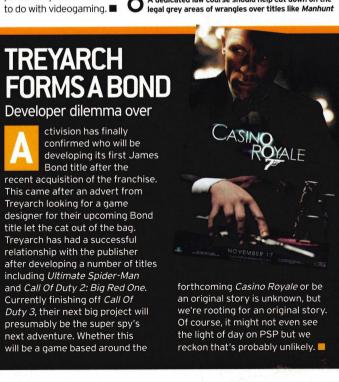
Wi-Fi hotspot gets a taste of the Caribbean...

#### **GAME OF LIFE**

An insight into the world of Japanese PSP-ing by our man in Tokyo - Takeru Amazawa

few months ago I told you about *Portable Island* for PSP. I think I might have kind of gotten angry at the game, and maybe said some really mean things. I'd like to just let you know, first and foremost, that I'm not taking any of those things back. I still think the game is a bizarrely insulting, poor substitute for a vacation. In addition, it's not much of a videogame. In fact, now that I've actually had time to sit down with it and see how it plays, I hold even more vague contempt for the motives of its production.

I'm writing this column on a brisk summer morning when I was, believe it or not, actually slated to be out in China surfing with my girlfriend and her father. Instead, the weather forecasted rain, so the trip got cancelled. I awoke to find an email in my cellular phone saying, "Hey, it's supposed to rain, so my dad doesn't think we should bother going to the beach". The sky is a weird grey color, though it looks friendly to me. I was sitting in, playing *Brave Story* on my PSP while lying on my sofa, when I realised this column was due. It's the yearly, week-long summer vacation at my company (you don't even want to know what my company does), and all it does is make me wish I didn't have a job.

Vacations kind of do that to people. You know what kind of modern age we live in? I'll tell you - an age where people will only ever use their paid vacation days right before a scheduled company-wide vacation week, and a society where people will only ever play their portable videogame systems indoors. We're a soup of contradictions.

Having a week off work for the first time in half a year really puts things into a weird perspective. I fire up the Internet and look at the best-selling games on Amazon, thinking it'll give me something to say to you all. It seems that Namco is putting out *Tales Of Phantasia* for PSP, just a year after they put it out for Gameboy Advance. Only the PSP version is going to be fully voiced, which the original Super Famicom version most certainly was not.

Yet I've also heard rumours that Namco (or, uh, Bandai-Namco, as it were), seemingly the most prolific supporters of PSP, is pulling out of the

system. I wonder why that is. Namco's *Ridge Racers* was the game that sold the system to a lot of people, for example. *Ridge Racers 2* is coming soon, even.

The most interesting game I come across today has to be *Homestar Portable*, by Sega. It's based on a home planetarium system Sega released last year. You sit in the middle of the floor and it casts little stars on your ceiling. It wasn't extremely popular. You can find them discounted in certain electronics stores. I mean, who really wants a talking home planetarium? Who wants to look at an imaginary sky, these days, when they have otherwise exciting videogames or movies to look at?

That this planetarium is now for PSP strikes me as almost as bizarre as Namco's *Portable Island*. Why the hell would you want a portable planetarium on PSP? A starry sky is black and white; the dark background would really reflect the player's face if he played it on, say, a train. And if you played the game at home, under the covers - I mean, how would that be a game? You're just looking at stars. There's a "trivia mode" to answer questions about stars, though really, that you're playing the game on a



PSP in your bed should probably shed some light on how little those stars have to do with you. No offence to astronomers or anything.

Just the other night, my girlfriend was showing me a video of fireworks on her cellular phone. Her phone is equipped with a 2-gigabyte Memory Stick PRO Duo, so she was able to get a good 30 minutes of a fireworks show in low resolution. I could hear her and her friend chatting about how amazing the fireworks are. I'm just standing there in the middle of my living room with this phone in my hand, wondering when it's going to end. See, fireworks are a big deal to Japanese people, in the summer. There's something great about walking down a street packed with people lined up to watch the fireworks. Everyone thinks they've come out of the way, and gotten a better seat than everyone else. Everyone thinks they've avoided a crowd. When really, they haven't. They are the crowd. And they're usually nice crowds. They wear kimonos, drink beer, and stare at the sky. I'm just wondering, after the other night - when is someone going to make a PSP game wherein you co-ordinate a fireworks show and then force other people to watch it via Ad Hoc mode?

It seems to me that a lot of developers just... aren't using the PSP the right way. They're taking its graphical processing power for granted, and letting the creativity fall behind. There may be people who say something like Homestar Portable is "creative", though, really, wouldn't lying on a blanket next to your significant other and staring up at stars somewhere out in the country be more "creative" than playing a game about it? It's a bizarre society we're turning into, where "contrived" and "creative" mean the same thing. Quite frankly, it's a little tacky.

And another popular game is *Bleach: Heat The Soul 3*, by Sony Computer Entertainment. It's a multi-player VS battle game, the third released in two years, in which players attack other players with RPG commands. What the heck? You say, "Attack!" and your guy attacks the other guy? It's not even an action game? Why don't you just punch each other in the face for real?

### **SONY DUMP UMD?**

#### Movies on Memory Stick

n a surprising move, Sony in the US has started to put movies onto Memory Sticks. However, at the moment this is a marketing ploy to encourage consumers to buy 1GB and 2GB Memory Stick Duos (\$60 and \$100 respectively) by showing how you can watch movies on a PSP without having to buy UMDs.

The Memory Stick Entertainment Pack comprises one of the above sizes of Memory Stick and a DVD that can be used in your PC to unlock, with a supplied code, one of four PSP-formatted Sony Pictures movies. The choice of movie is between *Hitch*, *SWAT*, *The Grudge* and *XXX*: *State Of The Union*. Once your choice is made you simply transfer the movie to the Stick and away you go. However, the code only allows one download and after you've made your choice you're stuck with it, which is crazy if you ask us.

Despite being a tool to sell more Memory Sticks, it still shows that Sony might finally be conceding that UMD movies, while a novel idea, are overpriced and are now redundant. SCEE have not announced whether the same packs will be made available in the UK but we'll certainly endeavour to find out.

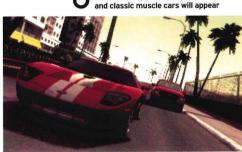

### MICROSOFT HANDHELD REVEALED?

Could this be the Xboy?

he rumours circulating about a Microsoft handheld console have died down slightly after the giant corporation revealed details on its forthcoming gadget. The device, codenamed Argo, is billed as a competitor to not only the PSP and Nintendo DS, but also to Apple's iPod. Looking very similar to the iconic Apple MP3 player, the Argo will not only be able to play MP3s and videos, but also games. The device will also have Wi-Fi connectivity; something which the iPod is distinctly lacking.

However, with buttons in short supply (as far as we can tell) the games on offer will probably be more akin to those on mobile phones than anything approaching PSP quality. We'll go out on a limb and suggest that the games will be downloadable from Microsoft's iTunes-like online media service. Of course, Microsoft could have another handheld device up its sleeve, who knows?



## **PS3 UPDATE**

#### Delay for the PS3?

ith both Sega and THQ venting their anger at Sony for not releasing final specs for the PS3, along with Ubisoft and Activision similarly berating the PS3 manufacturers for setting the price of the console too high, Sony seems to be taking it from all sides. Of course, this is something they won't really want at the moment, if recent reports of a possible delay of the PS3's launch happen to be anywhere near the mark. Whilst these rumours are just that, it's difficult to completely dismiss the suggestion that the PS3 may not be scheduled for a 17 November launch. So where do these reports stem from? First, a spokesperson for the producers of the console rather worryingly stated that "We're waiting for [Blu-ray input and output technology specifications] until the last possible minute, but the launch date could be pushed back if we don't get them soon". Second, similar reports have come through from numerous sources indicating that the diodes used to read Sony's proprietary Blu-ray storage medium are in very short supply.

A recent study by financial management company Merrill Lynch has - as well as indicating a delay of the console - concluded that each unit produced will cost upwards of \$800 to produce, something that, should PS3 sales go as planned on the launch day, would mean Sony taking a giant hit of over \$1 billion dollars. Now we all know that manufacturers always make

losses on hardware, but is this a step too far for Sony?

Apparently, if the Tokyo stock exchange is anything to go by, yes. With shares falling 3.6% in reaction to the analysis, it's easy to imagine Sony getting into trouble with the PS3, should Microsoft take advantage of this moment of weakness to raise the Xbox brand above PlayStation.

Many other analysts see PlayStation as having too strong a presence in the console market for it to be shaken by speculation, however, and whilst there does seem to be credence in the rumours, Asian console producers AsusTek - one of the largest console and computer plants - has reportedly begun production on the PS3. If these reports are true, the company has already begun shipping over 200,000 units and will be in full flow by October, with the ability to produce over a million consoles per month. These figures are in line with Sony's promise of 2 million units on launch day (our best guess would be anywhere from 130,000 to 200,000 for the UK), 4 million by the end of the year and a further 2 million by March the following year. We're convinced Sony will be able to produce the goods by November, but their suggested losses or each unit seem too sizeable to ignore.

Take 2 Interactive has had it pretty rough of late, what with numerous legal actions flying in the company's general direction. It doesn't look like things are going to get much better soon either, with news that the publishing giant is under investigation. The Securities and Exchange Commission have announced that it's conducting an 'informal, non-public investigation into stock option grants made from January 1997 onwards'. Sounds ominous.

#### Cancer hope Re-Mission set to help cancer sufferers

It's good to hear that gaming is helping fight cancer, with a new title designed to help young patients come to terms with their illness. Re-Mission, created by a team of commercial developers sees gamers take control of Roxxi, a female nanobot, blasting cancer cells to bits. "[It gives] kids a tool to fight the disease, a sense of power and control," says Pat Christen, president of HopeLab, designers of the game. Thank you HopeLab.

#### Sell out Lara and Agent 47 selling like hot cakes

Tomb Raider and Hitman, Two games recognised as truly great entries in the genre, but both ones that, at one point or another, looked to be going down the can. According to Eidos however, both franchises are going strong with Lara selling 2.9 million copies with her latest outing, and Hitman: Blood Money not doing too badly either with a pretty sizeable 1.5 million. Not bad guys, keep up the good work



#### **NFL Street 3** Seguel on the way

In an unsurprising move, EA is bringing another sequel to the PSP. NFL Street 3 sees the popular series bolstered with new aerial moves that allow you to show off your style, boost your score and reach special items and game modifiers that hover in the air above the field. The Gamebreaker can be controlled and allows you to pull off new power moves that are available to both offence and defence.

### Atari driven off

THQ start up new dev team

n a shock announcement made on 14 July, Ubisoft announced it has acquired the intellectual property and technology rights to the Driver franchise from publishers Atari and developer Reflections. The agreement reached by the companies also saw Ubisoft obtaining most of the assets and all of the personnel of Reflections Interactive Limited. The whole lot cost Ubisoft a not insubstantial 19 million Euros (approx. £13million). Atari claims the sale is part of a plan to refocus its portfolio of franchises and streamline its cost structure. Test Drive Unlimited is considered the key franchise at the moment and all possible resources are being put into that.

Whether the sale has anything to do with the drop in revenue over the past year for the company Atari isn't saying, but we'd be surprised if the two weren't related. When work on the next Driver game will commence is unknown (perhaps it's already started) but Ubisoft are sure to want a return on their investment sooner rather than later. Could a PSP port be in the pipeline? We hope so. ■



### **SONY RELENT ON 'RACIST' ADS**

Campaign branded "insensitive"

ony has withdrawn an ad campaign in Holland that was designed to promote the arrival of the ceramic white PSP, due to some deriders claiming it was overtly racist. The offending images contained a black woman dressed in black and a white woman dressed in white, obviously representing the different colours of the PSP. While all the images showed the ladies tussling in some way, none caused more offence than the image of the white woman gripping the black woman by the jaw and looking down at her.

While little stir was caused by the campaign in its native Holland, once the images found their way to California Assemblyman Leland Yee he branded the ads as "insensitive at best and racist at worst".

Sony claimed the ads had no other message but to promote the ceramic white PSP but after pressure they relented and withdrew the ads. It conceded that: "People have a wide variety of perceptions about such imagery and we wish to apologise to those who perceived the advert differently to that intended." ■

The SRT-10 is a heavily restyled model of the classic Dodge Viper and features an engine that has been enlarged to 8.3(!) litres. This increases the output to 504bhp and gives the car a ridiculous 525lb-ft of torque. All in all it's a damn fine addition to the vehicle roster.

The SRT-10 can reportedly do 0-60mph in less than four seconds.

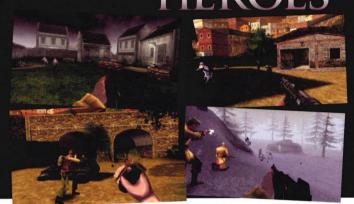

to hear you didn't like Issue 7 as much but as for LocoRoco 'saving our bacon', we'd have to disagree. The number of reviews was exactly the same as the previous issue so we weren't exactly scraping the barrel.

As for Metal Gear Solid - we know that not everyone is going to be interested in it but many people would be. Seeing as it's one of the biggest franchises to hit PSP we thought it was worth dedicating that amount of pages to, especially as we put it on the cover. Personally we hate it when we buy a magazine based on what's on the cover only to find there's only a couple of pages, or less, about it inside.

On to your main bone of contention: the apparent evil that is homebrew. While you're absolutely correct that certain people do use it to play pirated games, we have never, nor will we ever, promote that side of homebrew. We feel that Sony is being a little too heavy handed in its quashing of applications with firmware upgrades. People will always want to hack consoles and hampering their progress simply makes many of them more determined to succeed. Not only that, but people who want to make the most of a PSP by playing both new games and homebrew are put off even buying the console in the first place and when the line-up of games on the PSP is so weak that's not really something Sony can afford. Piracy certainly harms publishers financially but let's not forget that one of the reasons the PSOne was so popular was because the games were relatively easy to pirate and look how many quality games were released on that.

Anyway, we hope you'll stick with us while the PSP finds its feet in the gaming world. Hopefully things will get better once the PS3 arrives.

2. If I have the normal 1800mAh battery, how long will it normally last if I play games or listen to MP3s for around 8 hours a day? Are there any longer lasting batteries?

3. Are the online firmware updates really safe and bug free and is it easy to update?

4. I've heard the Japanese PSP has better picture quality - is that true? Can it also play PAL UMDs and have English menus?

That's the spirit, if no one else will buy you one treat yourself! On to your questions - PSP games from anywhere in the world will play on any PSP, however UMD movies are a different matter and are region coded like DVDs. Unfortunately a UK PSP will only play Region 2 UMDs and at the moment there's no way around this. Bear in mind that as the PSP is a handheld there is no PAL or NTSC format for it, as that is a television standard and doesn't actually apply to handhelds.

You should generally get around four hours of gaming out of your battery depending on brightness and volume settings. Just listening to MP3s should give you a little longer. There are a number of different battery options though and by the time you have your PSP, Sony should have released a double capacity one, which might even come with the PSP as standard after its release. Currently Datel sell a normal size battery that you can simply swap over once one runs out of power. They also do a double capacity battery but it's somewhat ugly and ruins the sleek lines of the PSP.

Updating the firmware couldn't really be easier and we've certainly never experienced any problems. It's worth remembering that some games come with firmware updates on the UMD, so you don't necessarily have to download them from the internet.

There are no differences in picture quality between PSPs from different countries but if you do decide to go for a Japanese one you'll be pleased to hear that not only can you set the menus to English but you will also be able to play Region 2 UMD movies as Japan and the UK are in the same region code.

We hope you get hours of fun from your PSP and make sure you stick with Go>Play for all the best in PSP gaming.



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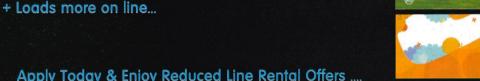
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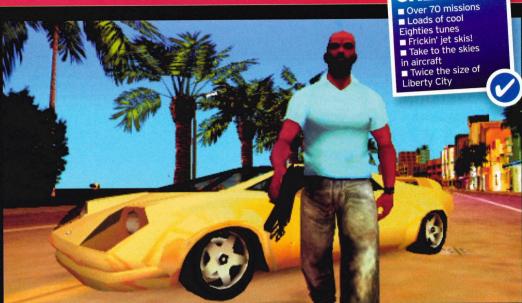

ever were back on Sega's great white hope and things have hardly changed at all. However, what we seemed to have forgotten is how basic the original games actually were; coming from Capcom, the king of the beat-'em-up genre, we'd got it into our heads that Power Stone

was a veritable game of combat chess, but with fists instead of pawns and

throwable furniture in place of knights. Unfortunately, we were somewhat off in our judgement. The truth is that Power Stone is a frantic scrabble of a fighting game where players spend more time racing round the levels trying to collect three magical gems (the Power Stones of the title) than they do smacking each other. If one player gets all three, they turn into a superpowered version of themselves for a limited time with several special moves at their disposal, while the other player generally runs away as much as they can to avoid getting

pummeled. And if the gems get split between the two? Then it's simply a case of who can throw the most furniture at the other person until someone gets cracked in the head and drops said gem, leaving the opponent clear to pick it up. Doesn't sound like great fun to us...

> And, to be honest, it's not - at least not as far as the original Power Stone goes. With only two players in any one fight, it's a fairly stagnant affair that usually plays out in the same way over and over again. However, things change once you move onto Power Stone 2. Why? Because the sequel allowed for up to four people to play in any one arena, turning the battles into something far more frantic and madcap, with more possibility for variation. With some genuinely bizarre weapons on offer to lay the smackdown with, much more interesting level design

that threw in multiple floors and intricate interactive detail to make use of and, of course, more Power Stones to keep players squabbling over, it's the sequel that kept us coming back for more. It's not a fighting game so much as it is a party game with combat - exactly

what the PSP needs considering the lack of decent Wi-Fi based games available.

Of course, the fact that Capcom has ignored the PSP's widescreen capabilities is a bit of a crime - instead, you've got a stretched image that looks rather awkward - and the PSP's analog does leave a bit to be desired, but, as it stands, Power Stone Collection is something we could certainly see ourselves getting into. If you want to read about potting the pink or the brown then go read Jordan's book, you'll find no such churlish behaviour here. What you will find here, however, is a sense of genuine excitement about World

Snooker Challenge 2007 the PSP counterpart to the hugely successful PS2 World Snooker Championship. In our opinion, the 2005 edition was one of the unsung heroes of the PSP launch almost a year ago, but, with another 12 months' work, what has developer Blade Interactive done to ensure we won't be splashing out 30 notes for the same game? In terms of visual style, there aren't too many changes, things have been tweaked and tightened in places to make the game that much smoother - the character animations deserve special mention for being ridiculously authentic. Far from being merely functional, the visuals actually seem like they were made with the PSP in mind and are, at this stage of development, outperforming the console cousin.

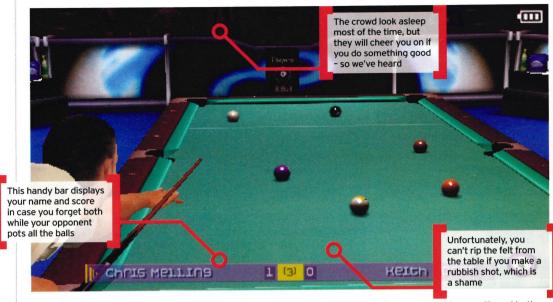

**Tomohiro Nishikado:** I anticipated it would be a hit, but never thought it will be so huge. I was delighted to see it became popular.

G>P: How long did it take to come up with the designs for the invaders themselves, and what was your inspiration for them?

TN: It was not an easy job. First, I thought of making tanks or airplanes as the targets to shoot, but it was technically hard to make airplanes look like they are actually flying. Human movement would have been easier, but I felt it would be immoral to shoot humans, even if they were bad guys. Then I heard about a movie called Star Wars released in the US, which was coming to Japan next year, so I came up with a game based in space and that had space aliens as targets. The alien design was inspired by The War Of The Worlds by HG Wells. In the story, the alien looked like an octopus. I drew a bitmap image based on that idea. Then I created several other aliens that looked like sea creatures such as squid or crab.

G>P: How long did the game take to actually create from conception to completion?

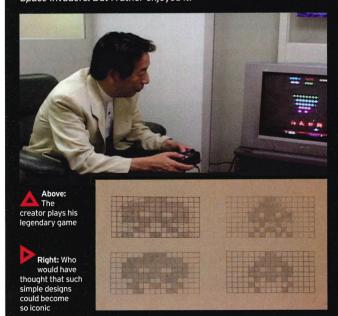
**TN:** Nearly one year. Although developing the game only took three or four months, developing the programming environment alone took almost six months.

G>P: Was Space Invaders a difficult game to make?

**TN:** It was very a difficult process. The hardest part was the development of a micro computer. I had to create everything by myself. I created a development device, wrote a part of the game that runs on it, and then created more devices along the way.

**G>P:** What are your strongest memories from the time when you were making these games?

**TN:** I never had a bad time during game creations. There were some difficult times such as creation of a development environment for *Space Invaders*. But I rather enjoyed it.

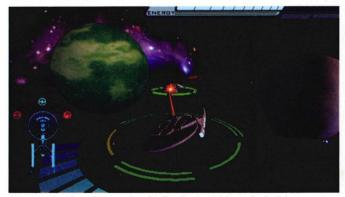

As if to compensate for this, Dragunov is rather rubbish. We've tried to think of a better way of putting it but that would involve time and effort, something Namco Bandai hasn't invested in this bizarre Russian soldier. There's nothing particularly remarkable about him, from his fighting style (some weird bar-room brawl/wrestling hybrid) to his actual character (some weird Ivan Drago/ Michael Jackson hybrid). If that's not enough, then you're spoilt, you're greedy and your parents didn't bring you up properly but no matter. Namco Bandai has also included Tekken Dojo, a loose attempt to recreate the arcade tournament scenes that originally brought Tekken to life, minus the chav boys drinking cans of Stella and their Essex chip-shop chav girlfriends. You travel to a new dojo, start at the bottom and work your way up through the rankings by beating local players in the area until you're good enough to compete in the actual tournaments. Each character has their own funky username and costumes, with supposedly a unique fighting



style too but any individual flair the AI shows tends to get lost under the deluge of juggle combos. Regardless, you'll have fun battering the likes of Michig@n Asuka.

What's the point of all this? Money. Money buys costumes, costumes buy respect, respect buys nothing so you get depressed, mope a bit, then go back to playing love. You can progress through the ranks until you earn the title of Grandmaster and deck out your favourite characters in funky gear along with weird items (electric guitars, sickles, monkeys and so on). Tekken to earn more money. The customisation hinted at in Tekken 5 has been built upon, so there are now even more outlandish options for dressing up your character. Lili can be transformed into a gothic schoolgirl, Asuka can be transformed into a fully fledged geisha, Panda can be transformed into a pink bear with Elton John sunglasses and, if you really fancy it, every character can be transformed into a mess of weird colours and eccentric items that only you could

with them, *Dark Resurrection* makes one hell of a racket. Even without them, this is still classic *Tekken*. It retains the series' trademarks of long juggle combos, as you delicately balance your attack (landing your launcher, so you can go into a combo), defence (avoiding your opponent's launcher) and mixups (doing unpredictable moves to confuse your opponent).

The only gripe we have about Tekken: Dark Resurrection is there isn't a reliable way of getting multi-

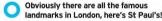

alkyrie Profile: Lenneth is the port of the same named (sans 'Lenneth') seven-year-old PSone game, which for whatever reasons, received only a limited release in America and none at all in Europe. Like so many games with a low production run it gained cult popularity some time after release, resulting in resale prices that now top £100. For those who astutely follow RPGs, Lenneth has caused much rejoicing, since it now means that everyone can affordably enjoy what many proclaim as one of the greatest RPGs ever.

Not that the uninitiated would think this upon starting! Make no mistake, this is not the RPG that will convert die-hard haters and neither is it easy even for veterans to get into. It initially requires some hard work - the game begins with an inescapable and almost useless two-hour tutorial that barely covers the basics. But if you have even a vague interest in adventuring then don't let this dissuade you, because once finally unleashed into its freeroaming world, you will discover one of the most satisfying and innovative RPGs around - one that practically reinvents the genre.

Unlike other Japanese RPGs, you're not in control of a stereotypically hormonal and angsty teenager with spiky hair, but rather the titular Valkyrie goddess of Norse myths and legends. Her task in the game is to seek and recruit the souls of fallen warriors, train them. up against all manner of demons, and then send them off to Valhalla to fight alongside Odin in the eternal and Sacred War of the gods. Weaving a tale from something that originated in Scandinavia is highly unique and helps avoid the tired clichés normally peddled by Square Enix. The scripting is excellent and

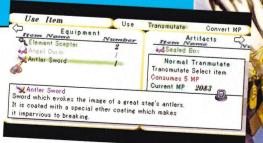

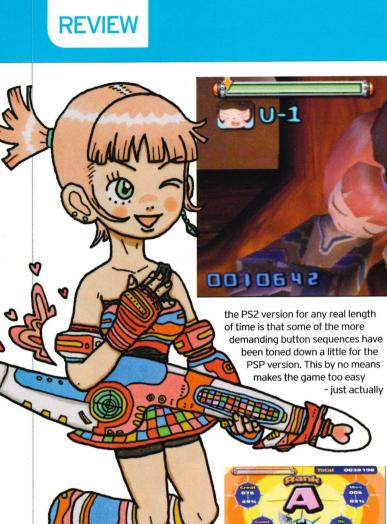

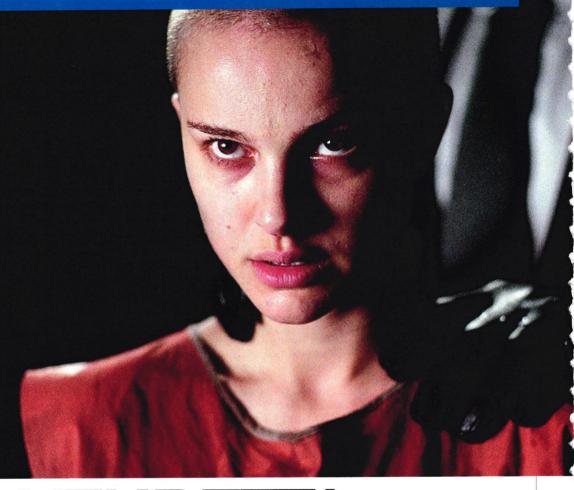

uperhero movies can be sneered at by the more pompous critics. This is possibly because they are often derived from comic books, which are seen by the same groups of snobs as reading material for those afraid of pages with nothing but words on. Indeed, the only time said group can bear to consider

comics as anything more than

just ink-smothered pap is when they're written by Alan Moore or Frank Miller. This in turn influences their consideration of superhero movies, meaning that *Batman Begins* (heavily, but not directly inspired by Miller's *Year One*) was taken seriously last year and that the adaptation of Moore's *V For Vendetta* was viewed with similar interest this year. The problem with this is that it assumes Moore is actually any good and that an adaptation of his work would naturally carry merit.

Now whilst far from the worst comic book writer, Moore is still a hugely overrated author, his comics so dense with drivel and so free from decent drama that you wonder why he doesn't just bog off and write bad novels for a living. V For Vendetta is a great example of Moore getting too much credit, with the tedious premise of a fascist British government being terrorised by a lone vigilante so unbelievably routine you think that you must be missing something. You're not. Famously precious about his reputation, Moore refused to have his name endorse the film, which would at first imply that he had been appalled with its treatment, but further examination might lead you to believe that he just didn't want a wider audience to have the chance to judge his tale directly.

As it turns out, it probably wouldn't have been a bad career move for Moore to stick his name above the title though, as V For Vendetta, despite retaining much of the comic's derivative dystopian ramblings, is actually okay. On the whole it's a slickly crafted flick that certainly works better than many of the recent comic book adaptations, the dark tone and thick style working in its favour throughout. Even the action, whilst never quite

bold enough to be memorable, is executed with a degree of precision and confidence.

The film is, however, far from perfect, with Natalie Portman's violently inconsistent accent a constant reminder of this. It doesn't help that she's given some of the most irritating dialogue we've heard since The Matrix sequels (incidentally, the screenplay for VFor Vendetta was handled by the Wachowski brothers). On top of this, it lacks the pizzazz of Spider-Man 2 or Batman Begins and we can only hazard a guess that this was down to a more miserly budget than it perhaps deserved. As it is, it's just about okay.

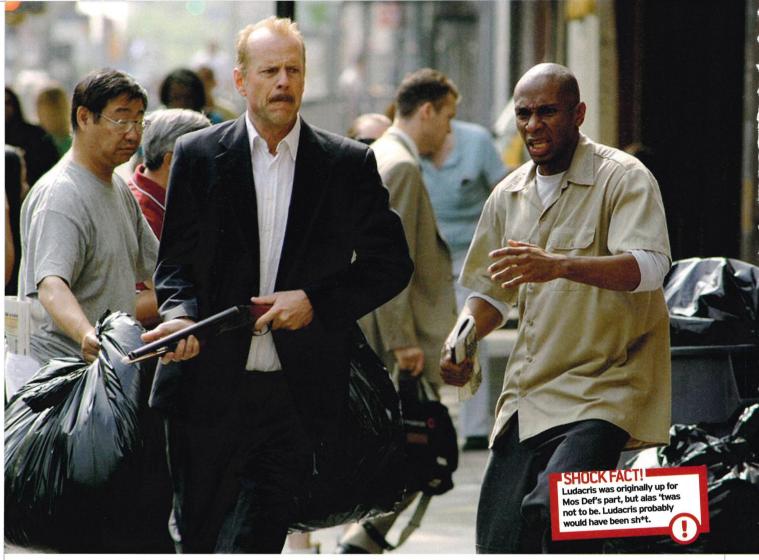

t wasn't too long ago that the Internet was buzzing with the news that *Die Hard 4* was finally on its way, with Bruce Willis reprising his most famous role as the very unlucky but double-hard John McClane, last seen saving all the money in the world from Jeremy Irons' clutches. Few things, it seems, are as appealing as Bruce Willis playing

one of New York's finest... or so we thought. In Richard Donner's 16 Blocks, Willis again plays a downbeat member of the NYPD complete with attitude and drink problems, but we feel compelled to warn you that it will serve as nothing but indisputable evidence that such a prospect isn't necessarily one to get excited about, and may even be one to fear.

First the good: the plot is relatively simple, with the grizzly (and, if we're honest, aged) Bruce Willis escorting an eye-witness from jail to a courthouse 16 blocks away. It transpires that some corrupt cops want the witness dead, and only Bruce Willis stands in their way. The film is shot with that gritty feel we've grown accustomed to, but is no less stylish because of it, and there is always going to be something quite cool about cops with a penchant for shady dealings. It helps that the majority of the supporting cast give some well-measured performances.

Now the bad (you'll notice that this section is longer): It was widely reported how woefully misjudged Mos Def's performance is, and by and large the condemnation is fair. It's a fact made all the more disappointing by the rapperturned-actor's promising turn in The Woodsman, and whilst you can eventually get used to his character's fast-paced, high-pitched squeal, his cartoon mannerisms and incessant ramblings are far more difficult to ignore. However, this is not the worst performance in the movie: that honour belongs to Mr Willis. Perhaps because of his familiarity with the type of role, Willis thought he could just sleepwalk through it. Oh the irony. He genuinely looks like he's sleepwalking in this film, even when he's shooting a gun. And when he doesn't look like he's about to nod off, he looks like he's about to sneeze. His portraval of a drunk cop is terrible to the point of accidental hilarity, and with this at the film's core, nothing could have saved it, not even some astounding action sequences. 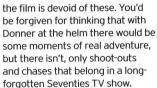

### **ROBOCOP**

It's not always like this though, 1987's RoboCop being a prime example. Sophisticated, deeply satirical and visually stunning throughout, RoboCop is as complete a sci-fi as you're ever likely to see. On a more superficial level, its rough, tough action sequences still hold up nearly 20 years on, whilst the design of both the supercop hero and his mechanical nemesis, Ed-209, have achieved iconic status. Bolstered with excellent performances from both Weller and Smith, RoboCop succeeds where so many fail and consequently deserves to be considered as impressive a piece of science fiction as Westworld, 2001: A Space Odyssey, and Metropolis. It's also really good for a laugh.

Only the other day Go>Play got into a discussion about Die Hard, with Mr Griffin harping on, as he often does, about how it's the greatest film ever made. Then someone said that he thought it might be a little long. Griffin went nuts. Blood was shed. It's understandable though, because for men Die Hard is more than just a film - it's a realisation of every dream of heroism they've ever had. It's the movie they can watch with their dad, and share a smile over. It's the movie that means that no matter what happens, if you act like John McClane, everything will be alright. It's also a great action movie. It's also one of those rare films that has not one but two great seguels, with a fourth possibly on the way.

## HISTORY OF VIOLENCE

Director: David Cronenberg / Starring: Viggo Mortensen, Maria Bello, Ed Harris \*\*\*\*

From the casually terrifying opening sequence to the subdued, heartfelt climax, Cronenberg's movie is a masterclass in pace and revelations. The slow trickle of detail about a coffee shop owner's gory past is perfectly controlled, as is the downward spiral of his once stable family. And it's here that the movie really feels special, the family's abrupt descent into a world of lies and fear made all the more emotional by some superbly understated performances, with Viggo Mortensen balancing the caring father and coldhearted killer parts of his character's persona with consummate ease. Blistering stuff.

### **Console History**

n the early Eighties, Nintendo was on a roll. Fresh with the success of arcade hits such as *Donkey Kong*, it decided that the time was right to release a home console. Atari and Mattel had already had huge success with the likes of the Atari 2600 and ColecoVision and Nintendo was determined to follow suit.

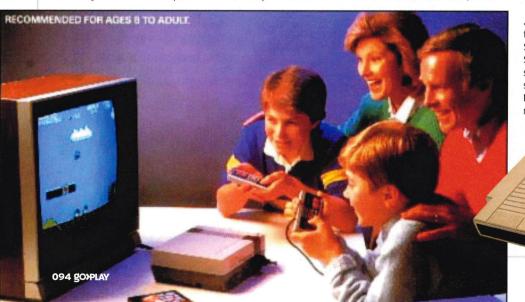
Designed by Masayuki Uemura - who also went on to create the NES's bigger brother, the SNES - the Nintendo Family Computer (or Famicom) debuted in Japan on the 15 July 1983. Sadly, for Nintendo, early builds were riddled with problems and design issues and the system was eventually recalled and re-issued with a brand new motherboard. The newly designed board did the trick and the console quickly became a huge hit.

Keen to build on the machine's reputation, Nintendo looked toward the US and entered into a series of negotiations with Atari, who had already had astounding success with the aforementioned Atari 2600. With Atari wanting to focus on its own system (Atari 7800) Nintendo decided to go it alone, and, after deciding against releasing a version of its machine that would feature a tape deck, keyboard and wireless controller, it renamed the machine as the Nintendo Entertainment System (NES for short) and released it on 18 October 1985. Although the initial launch was confined to New York (where

it shifted an impressive 50,000 units), NES was such a success that it received a nationwide release in February 1986.

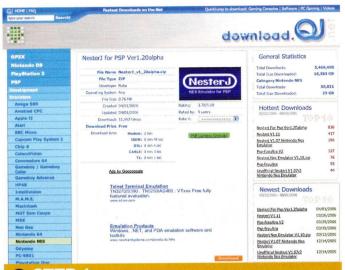
For \$199 you could pick yourself up the 'Control Deck' pack, which featured the machine itself and the excellent Super Mario Bros. Those with a little more brass could buy the 'Deluxe' set for \$249. A far better deal as it came with two games, *Duck Hunt* and *Gyromite*, a lightgun called the NES Zapper and two joypads (a rarity these days as most new consoles just have one). The most interesting part of the bundle, however, was a cute little Robot called R.O.B. (Robotic Operating Buddy) which was supposed to play games with you - unfortunately, only two titles were ever released for it.

While it went on to dominate the US and Japanese markets, it never managed to achieve the same success in Europe which enabled Sega to gain a foothold with its Master System. Still, NES went on to become one of the most successful consoles of all time and ended up selling over 60 million units and established Nintendo as a worldwide player in the console market, a position it still holds today.





# Setting up the emulator in five easy steps



O STEP 1

o you know a little bit about Nintendo's first 8-bit console, but how on earth do you manage to shrink it into a PSP? Simple. Just make a note of the following instructions and you'll have a portable NES in the palm of your hand before you can say Supercalifragilisticexpialidocious. Okay, maybe not that quickly, but it'll be pretty damn quick.

Your first port of call is to head over to a reputable site that's full of PSP homebrew goodness. As always, point your mouse towards the rather excellent PSP Updates and use the following weblink: http://dl.qj.net/NesterJ-for-PSP-Ver1.20alpha-PSP-Emulators/pg/12/fid/5912/catid/127 (Step 1).

We're mainly using NesterJ version 1.20Alpha because it will work with the wonderful GTA eBoot Loader, so will be usable by most of our readers. Save the required file to your desktop (Step 2) and open it up with a program such as WinZip (Step 3). If you're using the GTA method then you need to use Version 1.5, so make sure you select the right version, otherwise nothing's going to happen.

Now that you've selected the correct version, there's the small matter of getting it onto your PSP, so grab your USB-to-PSP cable, link everything up and open your PSP's details via My Computer. As always, you need to search through your PSP folders until you find one named PSP (Step 4). Open it by double clicking on the folder - if you don't have one already, create a folder called Game (Step 5). Once you're done, open up the NesterJ 1.5 folder and place the two folders it contains (NesterJ and NesterJ%)

Samus starts off her adventure with just a straightforward blaster, but as she explores she gradually gains new suit abilities which, in turn, enable her to explore more of the hostile planet she finds herself on. A cracking adventure that shouldn't be missed under any circumstances.



#### Super Mario Bros 3

Before Super Mario World on the SNES came along and stole its thunder, this was easily the best game that Nintendo's resident plumber had appeared in.

Beautifully crafted levels, glorious looking visuals, magic whistles, Mario's third NES adventure had it all. Not only does *Super Mario Bros 3* introduce the Koopa Kids for the first time, it was also the first Mario game to supply the moustachioed one with a variety of useful suits, and the first to enable him to return to previously completed stages. A true classic.



#### Mega Man 3

A staggering six Mega Man games appeared on Nintendo's 8-bit console, and while several of them are now starting to show their age, Mega Man's third outing (like Mario's) remains as good as ever. It's a tough little game, but the well designed stages, decent visuals and tough-as-nail bosses will constantly pull you back for just one more go. Featuring plenty of new additions to the series (including Mega Man's dog, Rush) Mega Man 3 is a fantastic yet hard platformer.



#### Snake, Rattle 'N Roll

Before it was bought by Microsoft, Rare was firmly in Nintendo's camp and created over 50 games for its 8-bit console. *Snake, Rattle 'N Roll* is easily one of its most memorable titles and is a beautifully crafted isometric adventure that stars two very hungry snakes. The two reptiles must eat strange creatures called nibbley pibbleys, which will allow them to gain weight. Once enough pibbleys have been eaten you can advance to the next stage. A wacky adventure that's typically Rare.



# **CAPCOM CLASSICS GO PORTABLE**

#### Capcom's CPS1 arcade port gets emulated on PSP

hile we've greatly enjoyed playing the likes of Strider, Forgotten Worlds, Final Fight and Magic Sword on our PSP's, we can't help but notice that many Capcom classics still aren't available yet. We're unlikely to see traditional scrolling brawlers like The Punisher, Cadillacs & Dinosaurs and Willow due to licensing agreements.

Help is at hand though, as a coder named NJ has been steadily tweaking his very own Capcom Play System 1 (CPS1) emulator, and ruddy good it is to. Currently on version Beta 2, NJ's emu is already receiving a number of fans on various homebrew forums that can't sing enough of his praises. The emulator has

moved incredibly quickly since it was first announced on 19 July, and it would appear that NJ is prepared to go without food, sleep or drink in order to ensure that his emu is finished as quickly as possible.

Of course, while this emulator is more than likely to be a godsend for those that want to return to the over-the-top violence of The Punisher, or play through Willow again, it does throw up a fair few questions. Will NJ be working on a CPS2 emulator which would feature even more games; will it impact on sales of Capcom Classics Collection: Remixed and will Capcom be pissed off? Have no fear, we will bring you the answers as and when we get them.

enguins eh? They're lucky little buggers. When they're not regurgitating fish for their young ones, or marching through the inhospitable snowy wastes that they call home, they're appearing in bloody documentaries and starring on their own biscuits.

While the emu is still a long way from being perfect, it's come quite a long way in the past few weeks and now boasts a greatly improved speed of around 10fps. Admittedly, this is still far from perfect, but it's at least a huge jump up from the initial 2-3 frames per second that it was



first running at. In fact the only downside at the moment is that Mario 64 now refuses to run, and that many of the games are still very, very glitchy. Still, it's an impressive effort, and at the rate StrmnNrmn is going it will only be a matter of time before it's as good as it can be.

e've not got the space here to review the Master System's fourth Wonder Boy title

- Wonder Boy In Monster World fact fans - but don't worry as Wonder Boy's third outing on Sega's 8-bit console is easily his best. In fact, we'd go as far as to say that in our opinion it's probably one of the greatest Master System games ever and if you've never played it then you deserve to be strung up by your danglies while weevils burrow into your arse cheeks.

Continuing the theme of *Monster Land, The Dragon's Trap* is an amazingly ambitious adventure that sees the boy wonder starting off his quest by destroying the dragon featured at the end of *Monster Land.* Unfortunately for the ambitious hero, the dragon leaves

behind a parting gift that turns Wonder Boy into a fire-breathing Dragonman. Thus begins Wonder Boy's new quest to regain his human form and hopefully find a cure for his dragon halitosis breath.

Following a similar theme to Monster Land, the main difference here is that defeating the main bosses sees you being bestowed with a new animal form that can then be used to reach new areas of the huge game world - most handy. Each new form comes with its own unique ability, so Mouseman can cling to walls, while Lionman's overhead swing is useful for reaching difficult-to-reach blocks.

With loads of secrets to discover, beautiful cartoony visuals and some catchy tunes, *The Dragon's Trap* is simply unmissable, even if you're new to the *Wonder Boy* series.







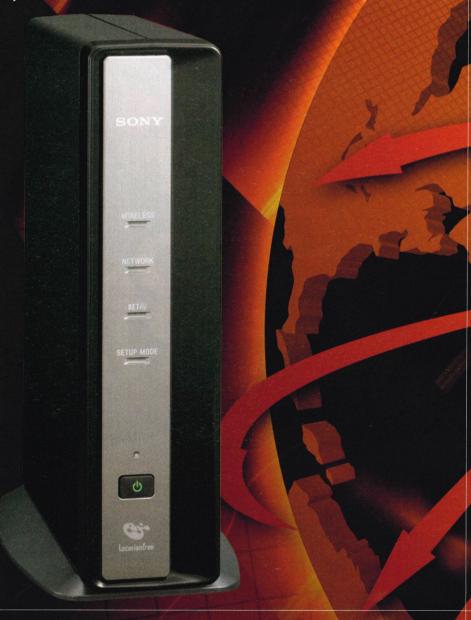
Go>play takes a look at Sony's magic black box that lets you watch what's on your telly, anywhere around the globe. Gimmick? Essential purchase? Easy to set up or unnecessarily complicated? We put the system through its paces

ave you ever felt annoyed that you're missing Eastenders while backpacking in Thailand? Or wanted to watch Big Brother's eviction night while sunning yourself in Barbados? No, us neither, but Sony's LocationFree Player can make this a reality... of course, it does have better uses. For instance, you can watch a choice of two video streams anywhere around your own house on your PSP. So if your housemates have decided to have a Soul Calibur marathon and you want to watch the London Marathon instead, just fire up your PSP and load up the LocationFree Player.

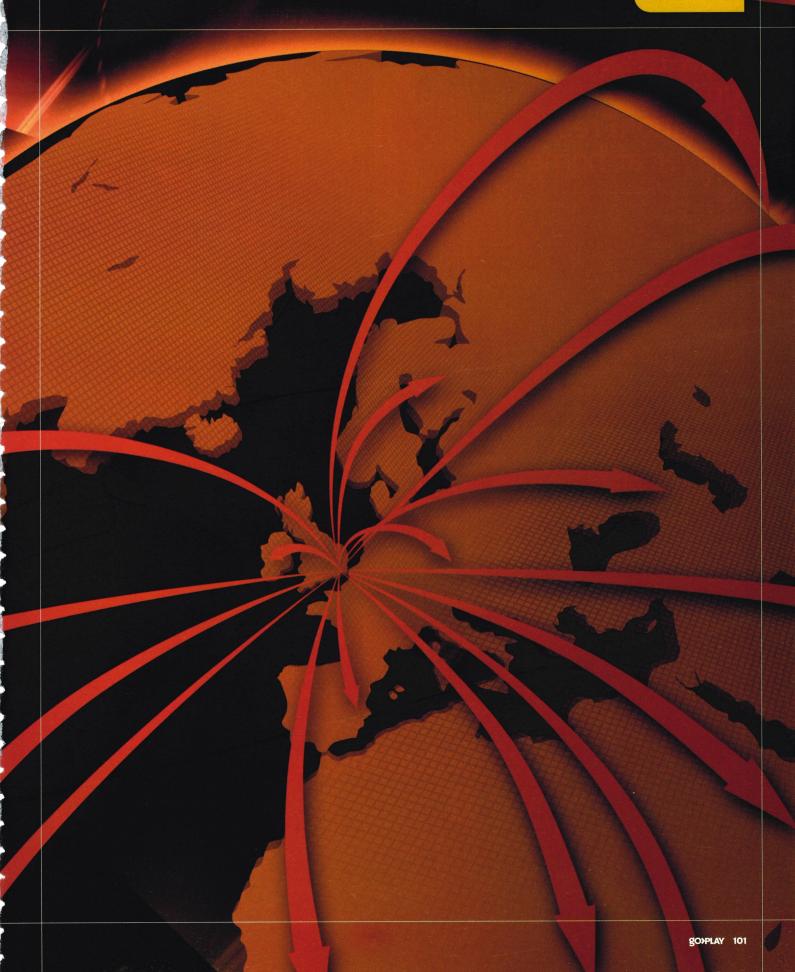
The unit will also allow you to control your output device like a remote control using the PSP. You'll have to download control settings to a memory stick, but we'll show you how later. You can also connect to the Internet, control the input via a universal remote and see what's in your DVD player anywhere around the world where you can access a Wi-Fi hotspot.

The device is not without its problems – as we frequently found out. The most annoying and pointless part of its design is the fact that it cannot connect to the Internet wirelessly. Bizarre, since it clearly has a transmitter inside that can communicate with any PSP within a hundred feet of it. Instead you have to plug the box directly into a router. This poses more difficulties than you'd expect. In our test, the router wasn't in the front room along with the DVD player, cable receiver and so on. No, it's upstairs attached to bundles of wires that no one wanted to move. So if and when you buy one of these, be prepared to uproot your Internet connection or buy a really long Ethernet cable and bury it under the carpet on the stairs.

And the most important question? Is it worth the £230 price tag? It is amazing watching television on your PSP in the garden, even telly on PSP in the front room had us tingling with excitement. Despite having been in awe of its capability to broadcast and control TV around the house, its flaws, such as limited remote control support, lack of wireless Internet, and generally being a pain in the arse to view video on the net with might make it too pricey to be worth it.







# How to set up your LocationFree Player at home

he device itself is pretty light and small. It'll fit beside most DVD players and consoles. It has two rear inputs and you can switch between the feed while using LocationFree. On the back are two inputs where you can plug in a DVD player, satellite, cable, digital TV receiver or even a PS2. You can't plug a telly in directly as this won't output any signal to the LocationFree box and you'll be stuck with a blank screen while out jet-setting in Milton Keynes. ■





Attach the composite cables to the output of either

a DVD player, cable, satellite or Freeview receiver.

#### IR Blaster

Place the Remote Blaster into this socket and put the other end right by your video sources.

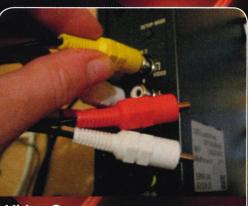

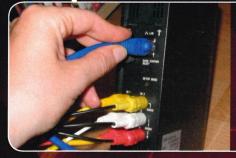
#### Plugging it in

First make sure the thing is plugged into the mains and is close to all the stuff you usually plug into your telly.

Attach another device as you did with Video 1 to this input.



#### LAN

Since you can't use wireless, you'll have to attach this directly to your router using a patch lead. You can pick these up off eBay for a couple of quid, Sony doesn't provide you with one.

nce everything is plugged in, you'll have to press the 'Setup mode' button. Do not do this yet, you'll need to fire up your PSP first, so check out the next tutorial in this guide.

n order to use LocationFree, you'll need PSP firmware of 2.70 or above. You'll need 2.8 if you need to download extra remote settings. Download the software before proceeding.

#### 2. Setup the LocationFree

Hold down the Setup mode button on the back until the orange light on the front of the unit begins to flash. Your PSP should respond after a while and will start talking to the black box... well, not literally.

# 1. Turn on vour PSP

Flick on the WLAN switch and select LocationFree from the network menu, then start.

#### 3. Choose <u>LocationFree</u>

Select LocationFree AP from the menu after the PSP has done its work and input the password. With any luck you'll be viewing exactly what's on your telly, in the palm of your hands.

# Remote Blaster

ith the base station happily broadcasting video feed around your home, you'll want to be able to change the channel while sitting on the loo. Also included in the lovely bundle, is a 'Remote Blaster'. This handy little gadget acts like a universal remote, controlling both inputs, but instead of a handset, you'll be using your PSP. We used a standard Pace NTL cable receiver, but despite downloading additional remote codes, we couldn't get it to work with the LocationFree. Neither did our Bush DVD player. The only thing that would work, surprise surprise, was our Sony PS2. Here's how we did it...

# Set up the remote control

Place the little black box with the small clear blob on it by the IR receiver on your DVD player or digital box, after plugging the other end into the small headphone-like socket on the back of the base unit.

The panel should look like a clear piece of black plastic stuck on the front of your gadget. If you're not sure where it is, try looking in the manual or cover up what you think it is with your hands and then use the ordinary remote control. If nothing happens, you've found it, or you've run out of batteries.

Keep both of your sources' remote receivers close to the IR Blaster to make sure the signal reaches them both.

Usually, the receiver will look like a small shiny black plastic panel on the front of the DVD player. It may be marked with an 'IR' symbol.

#### Download remote data

With the blaster positioned, fire up your PSP and the LocationFree Player software. Now connect to the unit and you should see streaming video. Hit (a) to bring up the menu and select 'Settings' and then 'Remote Control Settings'.



Then select the video stream you want to control. For instance, if your DVD player is connected on the left side at the back of the box, select 'Video 1'. Answer 'Yes' and select how you would like to access the net.



Pick 'Europe', then click on 'Remote Control Data: Version 1.00' in the centre. Accept the file and wait for it to download. Push 

to go back to the LocationFree software and connect back to it from the main menu.

#### Test the controller

Once you have all the data, you can test it out. Pick the

video stream that you want to control and then select the manufacturer of your DVD player or digi-box. You'll now see a nondescript list of settings, such as 'cable\_1\_eu" or "DVD Player'. They're not much use, and from now on it's a case of trial and error - if you only have a DVD player, do not pick one that says DVD recorder.

It will now ask you to test if the power can be switched on and off. Test it and wait to see if anything has happened. If the device doesn't switch off within the next 10-15 seconds you can safely say it hasn't worked, and move on to the next. Keep going through the list until your tests do work - although they probably won't.

# Using the remote control

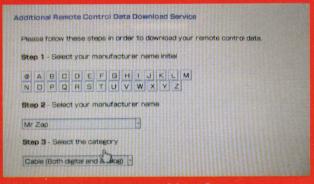
Phew, with all that set up you can actually switch the channels from another room. Each remote setting is different, but all you have to do is connect to the base unit and watch some telly, and when you want to change channels, bring up the menu by pressing 
and then select 'Remote Control.'



#### If you can't find your remote settings

So you've managed to get this far, but Sony hasn't catered for your Tesco bargain bucket DVD player from Matsukacki. It's time to get back on the net. Go back to 'Remote Control Settings' and select 'Version Information', now you'll be asked how you want to go on the web. Select your connection and wait for the page to load.

Click on 'Europe' with ⊗ and then 'Additional Remote Control Data' – for this you'll need the latest PSP firmware 2.80. If you haven't already, download and install it. If you do have it, hold down and pull the analogue nub down until you reach the bottom of the page. Now click on 'Download Additional Remote Controls'.



#### Step 1

Select the first letter of the make of your item, so it's 'S' for Samsung, that's right kids.

#### Step 2

Now click on 'Select Your Manufacturer Name' and use the D-pad to scroll down. Pressing ⊗ on the name a couple of times will load the next step.

#### Step 3

Click on 'Select A Category' and pick the nearest matches to your system.

#### Step 4

You should now have a list at the bottom with 'Accept And Download' buttons at the side of each one. We recommend downloading them all so you don't have to do this again.

With the additional data on your memory card, you can return to the LocationFree Player and select and test it as you did before. Just don't expect many of them to actually work.

# What you can do around the house

he LocationFree base unit, even when not connected to the Internet, can transmit the video inputs around your house. So anywhere you can switch on your PSP, you can watch TV, catch a DVD while taking a bath, or maybe even check if your housemates are watching porn

You can also use it to watch another channel while everyone else is watching something else. So if, for some bizarre reason, you really wanted to watch *Coronation Street*, but everyone else you lived with wanted to watch *Evil Dead 2* on VHS, you could sit right beside them and tune your PSP into the unit and watch it that way.

We wouldn't recommend playing any games using LocationFree as the lag is quite a few seconds behind, which isn't a problem for viewing films, but you'll be dying mighty fast on *Grand Theft Auto*.

Once you're connected, you should be able to view the two video streams and the analogue one too.

#### Broadcasting on the net

Despite having a wireless transmitter, the LocationFree base unit cannot use it to connect to the Internet; you have to physically plug it in. As we've mentioned already, our TV, DVD and NTL box were downstairs and the Internet router was upstairs – highly irritating. We were lucky enough to have a secondary router which we uprooted and dragged downstairs. Not everyone has this 'luxury' and after paying over £200 for the box, it seems crazy to plug a wireless-capable unit into the Internet.

With your PSP already connected to the unit, in theory you can now go to any Wi-Fi hotspot and connect to the player. However it's not

that simple as we found out many a time. The first thing to worry about is your upload speed. It must be over 300kbps. The easiest way to check this is to phone up your ISP and ask them. Once you've confirmed that it is over 300kbps, you can test it out.

Just go to LocationFree in network, scan for wireless networks and connect to one. In a café, you may have to use the web browser to connect, then enter your credit card details to pay for the service, but we recommend testing this out at a friend's house before paying for it.

So before embarking on a backpacking tour around Mongolia, keep a mate stuck on the other end of the phone at home, plugging and unplugging stuff in. This part of the system really isn't user friendly and we can't even fill you in on what the streaming was like because we simply couldn't connect to it.

#### How to get it on the net

After setting it up with the base station, you'll need to set up your PSP with the LocationFree Player to use it online. While still at home, go to settings and select 'Base Station Settings'.



Enter the username 'Ifx' and the password printed on the silver sticker on the side of the box. It should be four digits. Click on 'Easy Setup' and then continue through the tests. After it's all finished pop over to the house of a friend who has Wi-Fi and test it out by opening up LocationFree and using their Internet connection to get online. With any luck it should work...

At this point we'd like to say we didn't actually get it working properly, despite testing it out a variety of hotspots and having someone at home fiddling with his unit... ahem. It kept throwing up an error which the Sony website

The base station was not found. (80108A97)

# Other uses

Instead of just watching films on the net there are a number of other uses for the LocationFree Player.

#### CCTV

You can connect it to a CCTV camera and keep an eye on your house while on holiday.

#### Baby cam

Set up a video camera in your child's room and then relax in front of the telly downstairs while still able to see that the kids are okay upstairs – great for peace of mind.

#### Universal webcam

If something important is happening at home while you're abroad, or you just want to reminisce, give you LocationFree to the rest of your family. They

(and the entirety of google) knew nothing about. Our base station was not found. In theory, wherever your PSP can access the net, it should be able to access the base unit, but it seems you'll need a slightly advanced understanding of IP addresses, DNS stuff and network malarkey in order to get it working. Plug and play this ain't...



#### Places you can go

If you do manage to get it up and running on the net, there are a number of places you can watch your telly out and about. Most Costa Coffee houses have what are known as 'surfandsip' Wi-Fi connections which cost around a

fiver for 24 hours. Connect to the Internet as normal and it'll redirect you to a payment page. Enter your credit card details before loading up the LocationFree player. Check out www.jiwire.com to see where your nearest or furthest hotspot is.

#### Steal TV

If you're feeling particularly cheeky, you can wander down any high street and see if anyone living on it has an unprotected Wi-Fi router. When you scan for new connections, the second column should say 'none' meaning you don't need a WEP password key to go online. Most of the time there won't be enough signal, but when there is you could be watching the match while your other half dives into River Island for the latest togs. Typical!





- Let you watch TV and DVDs anywhere around the world where there's a Wi-Fi hotspot
- Use your PSP as a remote control all over the world
- Connect to your PSP wirelessly
- Allow you to push the Record button on your DVD recorder on the other side of the world, or down your local pub.
- Use your laptop to watch TV in the same way you can use your PSP
- Let you watch TV on certain Wi-Fi-enabled planes

# What it won't do



- The remote control won't work with all makes of DVD or cable boxes. (In fact it didn't work with any we had available, apart from PS2.)
- Allow you to control and watch more than two video inputs
- Let you watch analogue TV on a PSP
- Connect to the Internet wirelessly
- Change DVDs from another country, you'll be stuck with whatever's in your player for the journey, unless you have a multi disk DVD changer
- Allow for people changing channels on the other side of the planet in your front room
- Let you watch Location Free on more than one computer without buying more software
- Let you use the system if your upload speed is less than 300kbps - so check your ISP
- Make you can steaming hot cup of tea in the morning

#### What we reckon...

The LocationFree base unit is great if you have money to spare, and like jetting off around the world. We wouldn't call it an essential purchase by any stretch of the imagination as getting it to work on the Internet is quite frankly a nightmare. If, however, you are a member of the kind of family who frequently want to watch different things on TV at the same time, you might be inclined to consider a LocationFree base unit. You never know, you and your PSP might not only venture into your back garden but you could potentially both end up in China or perhaps Timbuktu.



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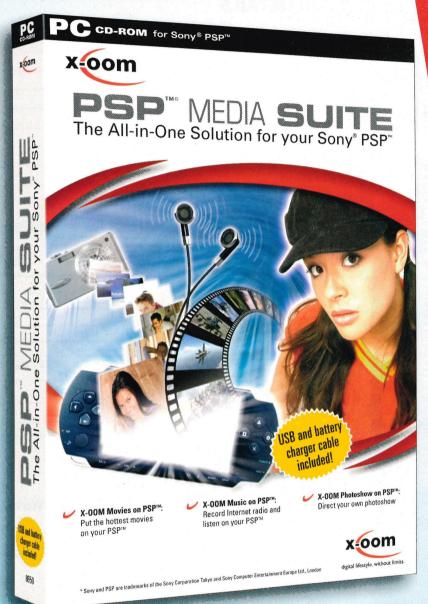
