

If there is one lesson to be learned from the record business in the past several years, it is this: Creativeness pays off.

We've all of us observed during this period a great change in the business. Some saw it coming from the start. Some were aware of it while it was happening. But all of us now know it has happened.

And this change is one of basic principles.

What it means is that old reliable means of operation are no longer reliable; what was valid ten years ago, or even two years ago is not valid today; what was 'a sure moneymaker then is sure of absolutely nothing now.

But what it means most of all is that the way to make a buck in this business is no longer to depend on tried and true methods but to create new methods and then try them to find whether they are true.

Every few months we observe one record company is at the top of the heap and another is dormant. A few months later the situation changes and the positions are reversed.

What's the cause of this?

It's obvious, if you observe the operations not only of the A & R departments of these firms, but the entire executive set-up including sales, promotion, distribution etc.

The story might go something like this: Company A is doing well. A good percentage of its records are hitting. Everyone is happy. Soon however current records are following the formula that was successful for the past several months—only now they're no longer successful. Slowly it dawns that things aren't quite what they used to be. And then the uproar starts. Either heads roll or there are shakeups in various departments or the people involved come to the realization that something has to be done. So the A & R department thinks up new twists, searches for new artists, fresh material. The sales department goes on a revitalization kick. And the promotion department overhauls its methods too.

Then if the A & R department really comes through and gives the other departments some material to work with, the picture gradually changes and here is Company A heading for the top again.

Now this process may seem like a simpli-

fied version of what really happens, and it is. But essentially, with all sorts of variations, that IS what happens.

And what it proves is that you can't even depend on what went a couple of months ago. You must constantly be creating.

Another example.

Every once in a while an independent record company will come along and set the whole business afire. There are then all sorts of explanations of this phenomenon usually starting with the thought that anyone could have done it with "that great record" and ending with the equivalent of it's a flash in the pan.

Both ends of this argument are wrong.

Let's examine them. Could anyone have made it with "that great record." First of all the mere saying of that reveals a total misconception of the record business. For a hit record does not involve only a great performance, song or A & R job. It involves a total cooperative operation on the part of everyone connected with the record and the diskery. How many records do all of us know who were absolutely unbeatable as far as artistry was concerned — and yet they dropped dead? Artistry is obviously not enough. It takes sales promotion and wise direction of the entire integrated effort.

Now for the last part of the argument, "It's a flash in the pan." Well in many cases it may be. But, on the face of it, it's not true in all cases, for all of us know the names of independent companies which have capitalized on their initial successes to build lasting and prosperous firms.

Now if these arguments are not true, then what is the explanation of the great jobs which independents can achieve? It is this: Each individual firm operates in a different manner. And the independent with the creative ability to take advantage of its particular position in the music business is the one that makes the success.

One of the top A & R men in the country said to us the other day, "The one great thing about the record business is that it's a creative business and if it weren't I would get out of it."

We've examined that thought and the only conclusion that we can come to is that it's so, this is a creative business for it's only creativeness that pays off in it.

"SCRATCH" (2:26) [Lubin Mu-sic] Mort Lindsay talk-sings, in a comic manner, a cute novelty about an itch in the middle of his back. He wrote the tune himself and should get laughs on this cute deck. This novelty could catch like wild fire. "JEEPERS CREEPERS" (2:52) [Witmark Music] The small group happily glides along through a ditty that was big quite a few years back. The boys put over the song in a light hearted fashion.

DAVID ROSE ORCHESTRA (MGM 30773; K-30773)

B "WALTZ OF THE BUBBLES" (2:12) The lush gliding strings of the David Rose ork team their fullness and waltz through a lovely mel-ody that hight happen. It has a sway-ing full floating feeling about it that is real smooth.

G "LONESOME ON MAIN ST." (3:12) Dave and the men create a lonesome and bluesy feeling as they send out a production offering of a tune similar in style to "Slaughter On 10th Ave." Two good variety sides for the boxes.

ALICE BABS (Rudder 5011; 45-5011)

B IZE" (2:34) [Rudder Music] The lovely voice emanating from Alice Babs does wonders with a lovely bal-lad. She does a tender and star-dusted reading of a moderate tempo tune waxed in Sweden.

waxed in Sweden. "CHOOSE YOUR PARTNER" (2:30) [Rudder Music] Alice changes the mood and rides over a cute ditty in a happy go lucky man-ner. Her pert voice sounds cute and is higlighted by Harry Arnold's fit-ting orking.

JIMMY PALMER ORCHESTRA (Mercury 70126; 70126 x 45)

G "SOMEBODY STOLE MY GAL" (2:35) [Robbns Music] Tiny Mc-Daniel does a bouncing vocal job on a tune that's being revived. The boys in the band add color to the side by filling in with talking. An ok deck.

B "NEVER, NEVER, NEVER, NEVER" (2:34) [Elmore Music] Tiny and the men team up to send out another light and happy ditty in the cute and novel vein. The piece is good for the boxes. Catchy piece.

EARTHA KITT (RCA Victor 20-5284; 47-5284)

B "TWO LOVERS" (2:42) [Broad-b cast Music Inc.] With the full chorus and ork of Hugo Winterhalter as a backing, Eartha Kitt gallops through an exciting different type of number. Her voice is startling on this fast mover.

Tast mover. "USKA DARA" (3:05) [P.D.] The thrush with the thrilling voice bounces along through a catchy Turkish melody sung in the same lan-guage with English explanations. It's a light hearted cutie that sticks in your memory. Great performance.

FRANKIE LAINE Mr. Rhythm, Frankie Laine, who can do a grade "A" job with any tune from "Tell Me A Story" to "I Believe" seems to be headed for another top hit in "Ramblin' Man". This emotional, heart ren-dered, galloping, spiritual tale was a hit in the folk and country field a while back, and it looks like it's bound for stardom pop wise. This Hank Williams song is backed by Jimmy Carroll and the ork. Paul Weston and Carl Fischer back Frankie on "I Let Her Go", an-other tormented zestful chant. The master of timing does a belting job on both ends. Both platters could be big successes with either end showing up first.

MILLS BROTHERS The phenomenal Mills Brothers have an amazing knack of taking old songs, refreshing them with their own exciting sound, and again making them hits. They did it with "Paper Doll" and "Glow Worm" and now it looks like they have another in "Say Si Si". The Sonny Burke ork sets up a good Latin jump backing that the boys harmonize to perfectly. Their mel-low voices make the song live again. On the bottom platter the men get together on another novelty jump in a soft vocal manner tagged "I'm With You". The top portion is tailor made for the boxes and a na-tural for a top seller in the shops. Keep an eye on it, it looks big.

FRANK SINATRA (Capitol 2450; F-2450)

"I'M WALKING BEHIND YOU" B "I'M WALKING BEHIND YOU" (2:55) [Leeds Music] Frank Sinatra comes through with a solid job on his first Capitol release. Axel Stordahl backs him and the result is mighty good. Could catch on for the artist artist

"MY LEAN BABY" (2:34) The smooth voiced warbler gives a light hearted touch to a novelty jump ditty that he blasts out with a pack of zest. A lively piece good for dancing. Frank's voice is in top form.

It's a terrific tune given a good ride. (2:52) [Acuff Rose] Dave Car-roll backs the lad on another love song that the chanter packs with feel-ing. He has a wonderful quality in his voice that helps put over any song. This tune is terrif. Might happen.

"DOT'S NICE-DONNA FIGHT" (2:38) [Frank Music] Stan Free-man pounds away on the harpsichord as Rosemary and Marlene play mother and daughter on a cute bounce tune based on the "Don't fight children" joke. It's cute listening and might catch on. joke. It's catch on.

B "IT'S THE SAME" (2:30) [Leeds Music] Stan and the rhythm accompaniment work the back-drop again on a cute rag time ditty. The girls team up in an inviting man-ner on two decks that should get laughs and spins.


BETTY COX

G "ALABAMY BOUND" (1:51) [Shapiro Bernstein] Jerry Shard and his infectious "doo wacka" type of mute trumpeting team up on a good handelapping standard. The fast train motion and rhythmic orking make this attractive listening.

"TEN LITTLE FINGERS AND TEN LITTLE FINGERS AND [Leo Feist] The ensemble does some cute vocaling on a happy charleston tempo bouncer. The song has that quality that makes you wanna sing along. Might click.

AL MARTINO (Jubilee 6034; 45-6034)

"I'M AFRAID" (2:30) [Gallico Music] Al Martino's voice is in top form as he offers a Latin mood love song with a beautiful melody, lyric and treatment. It's wonderful listening with a plush choral setting and a fine Hal Kanner orking.

G''GIVE ME BACK MY LONELY HEART" (2:58) [Blazer Music] Al gives all his power to a sentimental waltz time love song that comes out expressively. He belts it.

G "TOOTLE-LOO-SIANA" (2:30) [Shapiro Bernstein] The har-monious McGuire Sisters say goodbye to Louisiana on a light happy bouncer that makes your hands clap. Their soft voices blend sweetly.

"MISS YOU" (2:59) [Santly Joy] The girls warble another softie with a romantic air. They have a warm and melodic approach to their treatment that is easy on the ear.

ART MOONEY ORCHESTRA (MGM 11486; K-11486)

B "GEE WHIZ!" (2:29) [Pickwick Music] The Cloverleafs and Cathy Ryan gets a sock ork support from Art Mooney and the gang as they hop through a cute ditty. Rhythm and delivery should rate plenty of spins. spins.

"MISS YOU" (3:02) [Santly-Joy] Allan Brooks takes a solo run on this end and eases through a ballad in a pleasing manner. The backdrop by Art is fitting for the soft tune.

Shaw's record of "The Only One In Love" was written by Norman Kaye and a St. Louis housewife, Midge Levy.







Good-Time Jazz Goes LP



Here and There

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Rising costs are forcing newspapers to trim the page size. 190 of the 780 members of The American Newspaper Publishers Association have already taken this step—and some of the giants of the industry are joining the trend. The New York Herald Tribune narrowed its page by one inch and three other standard-size Gotham dailies—World Telegram, Times and Journal American are preparing to make the switch. In June, Chicago's Daily News, American, and Tribune will issue smaller papers while in Boston the Herald-Traveler, Globe and Monitor have already made the move.

NEW YORK, N. Y.—Could this have been the daddy of the juke box? In 1824 an instrument called the Componium was invented by M. Winkel of Amsterdam and exhibited in Paris with great success. This mechanical music machine was met with a feeling of incredulity by many and the suspicion arose that the effects of the Componium could only be produced by a human concealed inside the machine. It was necessary for scientist members of the French Academy to examine and issue a report verifying its mechanical ability.

NEW YORK—Thirty companies did a billion dollars or better during 1952 according to a survey conducted by the Journal of Commerce. Among the 30, only 6 companies failed to equal sales in 1951. Other 24 went way ahead. Compared to 1950, only one company fell below 1952 gross sales. (Not a single coin machine firm was listed as a member of the "Billion Dollar Club.")

NEW YORK, N. Y.—We'll be dispensing carbonated soft drinks in 6 and 12 ounce cans shortly. Cantrell & Cochrane Corporation, through Walter S. Mack, president of the parent company, National Phoenix Industries, Inc., announced the first carbonated drinks to be canned will be ready about mid-May. This is the first major change in packaging carbonated soft drinks in fifty years.



DENVER, COLO.—J. C. Dorsey has brought the vending machine into the worm business. Dorsey's homemade machine, a converted juke box, returns 25 to 30 neatly packaged worms to fishermen who insert a quarter in a slot and turn a crank on the machine.

"The old junkers are out. Wherever you go you see the latest models. That's what I call a tremendous improvement.

"It could only happen because of dime play making it possible for us to buy and be able to pay for new machines."

At the same time, to equal the finan-cial needs necessary for new equip-ment, operators pay more attention to better programming.

This has also been of invaluable aid to all concerned.

"The better programming here," this same operator reported, "would make your heart feel good. The opera-tors realize that to pay off their ma-chines they've got to get more.

"They program their phonographs much better than ever before so that, all in all, everyone is happier with dime play."

One noted op stated, "Our phonos here showed an increase of about 20 percent this first week.

"We hope," he continued, "that they will show an even greater increase in the forthcoming weeks.

"After all," he says, "this was only the first week's play, and not a complete week at that."

Other operators also report increases, regardless of the fact that the majority who operate here, were rather timid to start dime play action.

This town was chosen as "the test center" by the Northern Indiana music ops association.

It has taken quite a bit of time, ops report, to convert their phonos over to dime play.

Storekeepers are reported happy over the increase and the greater majority are closely cooperating in an effort to boom play.

"We are in a tough spot as we do not have an association.

"However," he continued, "we are going to keep holding meetings and, if it takes all summer, feel sure we will finally make the complete change."

He also appeals to *The Cash Box*, "Keep those articles rolling in your magazine. I know they are a big help to all of us."

In one case where an operator switched a location to dime play he was, later, forced to return to 5c, be-cause of the fact that a location on the very same block wasn't changed. This started trouble with his location

It seems, according to this operator, if there were an association in exist-ence in this city, the operators would have agreed to switch over block by block and, once the locations realized that it was a city-wide change, dime play would be the rule.

100% Dime Play

PEORIA, ILL. — Les Montooth, president of the Central States Music Guild, this city, reports that music operators here are cooperating 100 percent on dime play.

He says, "We are on dime play and are going good. We have 100 percent cooperation."

It was sometime ago when Les Mon-tooth and others here tried to get 10c play going.

After meetings with ops here it was decided to test dime play in this city.

After these first tests complete changeover was made and phonos were converted to 10c play.

Cooperation from locations has been very good with ops here stating that location owners are well pleased.

LEOMA WISEMAN

BELLE, W. VA.—Just six years ago, Miss Leoma Wiseman of Belle Amusement Co., this city, entered into the operating business, after dividing up a route. She was only 25 years old at the time. She started with but 17 locations.

Regarding her knowledge of operating at that time, Miss Wiseman says, "All I can say is that whoever said, 'necessity is the mother of invention', sure knew what he was talking about.

"It was a case of necessity", she states. "I just simply had to learn all about the mechanics of games and phonographs and, at the same time, learn how to take care of them myself, so that I could economically and efficiently conduct my business."

Today, Miss Wiseman has over 100 locations, with far over that number of machines, in active operation. She has the help she needs to better handle her route.

She says, "Any woman who wants to enter into this very fascinating and active business should make up her mind that here is work, hard work, and long hours.

"Longer hours than she would put in on any sort of job, but", she says, "the returns are there for the woman who is willing to worl: hard."

Miss Wiseman is on the job by 9 A. M. Usually, she says, her work is finished around 6 or 7 P.M. "But", she also states, "many times it's midnight before we're finished."

She advises that any woman, who maintains her dignity, will be shown the greatest of respect at all times, by any and all locations and, especially, by her fellow operators.

Miss Wiseman travels a route that extends over 50 miles around her city of Belle, West Virginia. Belle, W. Va. is just seven miles from Charleston, W. Va.

Miss Wiseman says, "I wouldn't just say that any woman could be successful in this business.

"What I would say, instead", she remarks, "is, if this woman finds she really likes and enjoys the coin machine business and, further, if she really intends to continue in this business, she do so with the following thoughts in mind.

"These are", she enumerates, "one, that she will always give her locations the very finest of service. Two, that she will always keep her word with them and do whatever she tells them she will do for them. And three, she will always be completely honest and do everything she can to help bring about pleasant relationships with her accounts. She will, then, have every chance for success."

She also insists, "A woman must have business ability. She must have perserverance. Things just don't happen overnight in this, or any other, business.

"She must make up her mind that she's going to work hard. And work really hard to make her business successful.

"She should also pay attention to mechanical details and, thereby, assure herself knowing just what is what, as far as the mechanics of equipment are concerned."

Thruout this entire area, Miss Wiseman is renowned for the fact, "That," as many operators have said, "she can read any wiring diagram or chart just as well as any mechanic. In fact", they claim, "Miss Wiseman can repair any type of machine on the market, just as speedily and just as perfectly, as the best mechanics."

Like in any other business, Miss Wiseman believes, "A woman has to be careful with every dollar she earns. She can't over-purchase on any certain type of equipment. She must be economical. There are always lean days for which she has to prepare herself.

"She must have financial ability, to know how and when to set up a reserve, for the future, better welfare of her business."

Miss Wiseman points out that, like in any other field, salesmen are sometimes tempted to overload the buyer.





She will find that visiting from one place to another, meeting different people, developing a better understanding and knowledge of all types of businesses, will bring about a more interesting and fuller life in every regard."






