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POP SINGLE BOOM BOOSTS SALES IN JAZZ AND C.&W.

Solid business continued to keep dealers' spirits up in practically every major market area of the country last week. Singles were booming and sales were starting to come in on fall product that was released last month.

Increased business this summer is reflected not only in the pop field but in other fields, such as country and jazz. The latter has shown a decided increase as jazz artists have made it in the pop market this spring and summer, including Jimmy Smith and Herbie Mann. A number of jazz albums right now are getting pop attention including Lou Rawls and Les McCann's "Stormy Monday" on Capitol; "John Coltrane Plays the Blues" on Atlantic, and the new Shirley Scott-Eddie (Lockjaw) Davis LP on Prestige.

Other new albums getting action in dealers' stores include the new Ray Charles LP's on both Atlantic and ABC-Paramount, the Dave Gardner comedy LP on RCA Victor, Justin Wilson, Jubilee, and Moms Mabley's newest on Chess.

Singles business was so good last week that even some records starting to move a week previously couldn't keep pace with the pickup, though many of them probably will be heard of again in a week or two. One example of this is Chris Montez' record of "Let's Dance" on Monogram. This record hit No. 86 on BMW's "Hot 100" a week ago but fell off the chart this week. Yet it is selling mighty well in Detroit, and doing good business in Los Angeles, Boston, St. Louis and Hartford. As soon as the disk spreads to more markets, as it appears to be doing in San Francisco and Chicago, it should jump back on the "Hot 100" and has a chance to move rapidly up.

Rhubarb Grows in Dallas

DALLAS—Something of a controversy has developed in this area between disk retailers and wholesalers on one side and the top radio stations on the other. The question is over the limit being imposed by local radio stations on new records and artists. Distributors and retailers and other interested trade sources have cited KLIF's format shift from Top 60 to Top 40 as indicative of a general trend toward radio play only for hits. Representatives of radio disagree, arguing that a screening process of the mass of record material is absolutely essential.

Speaking for the radio stations of the area, Bob Bruton of KXOL noted that his station has constant competition between records and that many new sides were continually being presented. New disks drawing top listener reaction were a Johnny Burnett side, "The Giant" (this is flip of what most of the rest of the country is playing) and "The Girl From Wolverton Mountain," Jo Ann Campbell. This record was first played as a gag, but response has been strong enough to keep the record on the air. "Venus in Blue Jeans," by Jimmy Clanton also was getting good reaction. All these sides were mentioned in addition to others, many of which are by the big names like Anka, Presley, etc.

Bruton also noted that "Dance Her By Me One More Time," by Amos Milburn Jr., on LeCam had been getting much air time with good results.

Some of the best-selling new sides also getting air play in the area were "Devil Woman," Marty Robbins; "Patches," Dickie Lee; "Sheila," Tommy Roe, and Nat Cole's "Ramblin' Rose." Buyers seemed to be going for Ace Cannon's latest release on the Santo (his former) label, "Rest" and "Big Shot" are the titles. It was also noted that "Black and Tan Fantasy," by David Rose also had promise.

Await Action at New Tennessee Store

NASHVILLE—With business holding up well, this town is looking forward with some anticipation to the opening of Harvey's Madison store next month. Reason is that the record department will be run by a local record shop, Buckley's, which has been handling Harvey's record department here since

ERNEST BLOCH: SINFONIA BREVE; WAYNE PETERSON: FREE VARIATIONS FOR ORCHESTRA



Minneapolis Symphony Orchestra (Dorati). Mercury MG 50288 (M); SR 90288 (S)—Dorati and the Minneapolis have added another magnificent disk to their highly regarded and growing catalog. The conductor is masterful as he draws the tension and the moodiness of the music from his orchestra. Bloch's composition bristles with life throughout. The Peterson Variations are treated with thoughtfulness and workmanlike precision.

BEETHOVEN: QUARTET IN C SHARP MINOR, OP. 131



Juilliard String Quartet. RCA Victor LM 2626 (M); LSC 2626 (S)—A most satisfactory presentation of Beethoven's Quartet in C Sharp Minor by the Juilliard String Quartet, featuring Robert Mann on first violin, Isadore Cohen on second violin, Raphael Hillyer on viola, and Claus Adam on cello. This quartet has been called, by Beethoven as well as critics, his "greatest," and it is performed here with depth and beauty. Should be a strong seller.

WAGNER: EXCERPTS FROM DIE MEISTERSINGER; TANNHAUSER: PARSIFAL AND LOHENGRIN



London Symphony Orchestra (Dorati). Mercury MG 50287 (M); SR 90287 (S)—Here's a grouping of four, ever popular operatic orchestral works performed with brilliance and with much attention to the values of good sound. The recording is top drawer and the Wagner warhorses seem to take on new life. Included are the overtures to both "Tannhauser" and "Die Meistersinger," the "Prelude to Act I of 'Lohengrin,'" and the lovely "Good Friday Spell" from "Parsifal." The performance and the Dorati name can mean much for this set.

PROKOFIEV: PIANO CONCERTO NO. 3; RACHMANINOFF: PIANO CONCERTO NO. 1



Byron Janis, piano. Mercury MG 50300 (M); SR 90300 (S)—The first U. S. disk cut in Russia, this LP gives the event appropriately big billing on the album cover and curiosity value alone will move merchandise. In addition, however, it features pianist Byron Janis, playing two keyboard staples by Russian composers. In the Rachmaninoff, Janis will be competing with a version he cut not too long ago for RCA Victor, before he signed with Mercury. The Prokofiev is that composer's best-known concerto. The coupling should find a ready market, especially with the additional stimulus of the Russian location and the accompaniment by the Moscow Philharmonic conducted by Kyril Kondrashin.

BRUCH: SCOTTISH FANTASY; VIEUXTEMPS: CONCERT NO. 5



Jascha Heifetz. RCA Victor LM 2603 (M); LSC 2603 (S)—Two highly attractive and violinistic compositions that are seldom recorded are given typical high-powered Heifetz performances that may bring them a popularity that hitherto has avoided them. Only two other versions of the Bruch are in the catalog, while the Vieuxtemps has but a single competitor, in mono on a minor label. Heifetz is given strong backing by the New Symphony of London, under the baton of Sir Malcolm Sargent. A new Heifetz release is a major event, and this release definitely qualifies.

Record-Makers Search For Magic Classic Angle

By BOB ROLONTZ

NEW YORK—The classical record market appears to be causing a lot of soul searching by key manufacturers. Classical sales are not increasing in proportion to the increase in LP sales.

That is one concern. Another is over what is happening to catalog items, now that a goodly percentage of LP's are sold by racks and chains that only handle cream and current sellers. Still another is that the number of key classical dealers is smaller than it used to be.

Directly related to these factors is the glaring truth that while hit classical LP's sell more than they ever used to (Van Cliburn's first recording, for instance), rising costs have shrunk profits on many other

releases that can't reach the hit class.

Victor, still the leader in classical sales in the U. S., had a poor Red Seal year in 1961. The firm was enough concerned about its classical market to institute an all-out campaign through a special dealer program—the Red Seal Dealer Development Program.

This is costing Victor a neat \$1 million in 1962, with most of the money to be spent during the last five months of the year. Victor looks upon this as a long-term, step-by-step program, which may not show results for another year or so. This program involves stocking a dealer's store, satisfying special orders and arranging special ads paid for by the distributor.

Cuts Releases

Another step Victor took was to cut the number of Red Seal releases. In 1962 Victor has issued for six months only 20 Red Seal albums. For the same period in 1961 it released 43. Yet business for the first six months of 1962 almost equals the same period of 1961—with half the releases. Victor feels it is on the right track. In cutting its releases Victor has dropped many name artists, who have been snapped up by other labels.

In contrast to Victor, Columbia's classical business has shown a dramatic upsurge this year, according to a.&r. chief Schuyler Chapin.

Growing acceptance of many of Columbia's artists (Leonard Bernstein, Isaac Stern), and the steady sales of Eugene Ormandy and others have helped Columbia move its Masterworks sales upward.

The feeling of Columbia is that new releases must have a decidedly different flavor. This makes for appeal in an already oversaturated market, at least as far as the war horses are concerned. Combinations of soloists and orchestras must be exciting enough to make a customer want to buy the work, claim firm spokesmen.

Command Moving

Part of the exciting quality mentioned by Columbia appears to have spilled over to Enoch Light's Command Classics label.

Command's classical line, only a year old, has had remarkable success. (Continued on page 20)

BMW NAMES BIRO MIDWEST EDITOR

NEW YORK — Nicholas Biro, Billboard Music Week Radio-TV Programming Editor, this week was promoted to the post of Midwest Editor. In making the announcement, BMW Editor Sam Chase said that in his new post, Biro would headquarter in the Chicago office of BMW, effective August 27.

The move brings Biro back to the scene of his labors over the past several years prior to his coming to New York for his present post. His new assignment results from studies made by BMW on its coin machine and music editorial coverage needs in the vital Midwest area. His new position gives Biro greatly increased responsibilities over those he held when he last headquartered in Chicago as Midwest News Editor. As Midwest Editor, he will be BMW's executive representative on editorial matters in the Central States area, and will make regular trips to key markets in the area, in addition to his functions in the Chicago-land region.

Starday Sale Orders Brisk

MADISON, Tenn. — Starday Records' orders on its third annual country music sale are running 40 per cent above last year in the first two weeks that the deal has been available. Starday is offering three free LP's for every 10 purchased from the firm during the sale days that run until the end of August. Sale started July 15.

According to Starday chief Don Pierce, orders so far have been above expectations. Deal is offered to distributors, whose accounts are current, along with 30-60-90-day billing to every distributor who places at least two orders during the sale. Starday is asking distributors to offer the same terms as they receive to qualified dealers.

Over 100 country albums are covered in the Starday sale, both new releases and catalog material. Backing the sales campaign are point of sale items for dealers, including four-color posters, browser boxes, streamers, catalogs, etc. Four-color sleeves are being used to add punch to new Starday albums.

Salesmen are being offered a sales "spiff" of 5 cents per album except on samplers. Pierce said the firm will issue no new releases in August to let distributors work on the sales program.

Motion Records, New N-K Subsid, Boasts Carole King on 1st

NEW YORK — The Nevins-Kirschner organization is introducing a new subsidiary to its current Dimension label. The subsid is called Motion Records, and it replaces the Companion ensign, withdrawn some weeks ago because of a conflict with George Paxton's Coed subsid, also titled Companion. The first N-K Companion disk, Carole King singing "It Might as Well Rain Until September" is now available on a Dimension disk. The first Motion side will be "Everybody Loves a Guy Named Johnny," by the Cardigan Brothers. Amy-Mala is in charge of national distribution.

'Take Five'—Says Philips

NEW YORK — Philips Records new August album program, aptly dubbed, "Take Five," offers a 10 per cent discount on five LP's in the firm's catalog. Philips is also issuing additional point-of-sale material and is launching an advertising and publicity program to promote the plan.

The five albums included in the plan are: "Country Guitar," Cotton Pickers; "Along Came Ruth," Ruth Brown; "Stowaway in the Sky," sound track from movie of the same name; "The Most Beautiful German Children's Songs," and "Swing Low, Sweet Clarinet," Woody Herman.

Sam Fox Enters BMI Fold By Acquiring Palisades

Active Role Seen for New Label, Headed By Mahlon Merrick, Music Man for Benny

NEW YORK—Sam Fox Publishing Company has entered the BMI fold, through its acquisition of Palisades Music, Inc., a BMI firm. Palisades president is Mahlon Merrick, long-time musical director for the Jack Benny radio and TV shows. Both Merrick and Benny were present at a press conference in the Fox offices here Thursday (2) to announce the deal. At the conference Fox also said he was

reactivating his label, Galland Records, with Paul Wexler as consultant.

Fox said the Palisades operation will be an active one and will seek new writing talent in the educational, popular and background music fields. In addition, existing copyrights in the firm will receive new exploitation.

Merrick's own works in the firm include many of the jingle and song items used in the Gillette Safety Razor radio and TV commercials, in addition to background music for such TV series as "The Donna Reed Show," "The Untouchables," "The Robert Cummings Show," "The Ann Sothern Show," "The Jack Benny Show," "Dragnet," "Checkmate," "The Real McCoys," "Panic," "Life With Father" and "The Burns and Allen Show." All this material will be incorporated into Fox's Film Rights Library of Recorded Background Music.

Gallant Records

Fox President Fred Fox, also announced the reactivation of his Gallant Record label. Plans call for regular release of album and single (Continued on page 16)

Angel Offers Deal On Klemperers

HOLLYWOOD—Angel is offering dealers a one-for-two discount program on the complete Otto Klemperer catalog of 35 albums, including the conductor's new releases during August and September, period during which the deal is in effect. A free stereo LP will be given for each two double-channel albums, and a free mono for each two monaural packages purchased. In multiple disk sets, the amount of free merchandise given will be figured on the number of disks per package.

Deal embraces forthcoming Klemperer releases including his three-Lp recording of Beethoven's opera, "Fidelio," and his five-disk reading of the Bach "St. Matthew Passion," as well as two new Klemperer albums to be issued next week, and two in September.

Eddie Costa Killed In Auto Accident

NEW YORK—Jazz star Eddie Costa was killed in an automobile accident Saturday (28). The musician, who would have been 32 on August 14, played piano and vibes and was one of New York's most active sidemen.

He had made countless recordings, one of the latest being the "Jazz Mission to Moscow" LP on Colpix. Costa is survived by his widow, Jeanne M., daughters Janet and Susan, and sons Robert and Michelle.

Johnny Cash Heads USO Bill for Tour Of Japan & Korea

MEMPHIS — Johnny Cash will make a three-week tour of Japan and Korea to entertain U. S. troops stationed in these countries for the U.S.O. He will leave on October 24 from the West Coast and will arrive in Japan on October 28. He will perform in Japan until November 2, and then will head for Korea, where he will appear from November 3 through November 12.

With Cash on his U.S.O. tour will be a combo consisting of Marshall Grant, Luther Perkins and W. S. Holland. Comedians Gordon Terry and June Carter, both of whom sing and play, also will be featured with Cash on the tour. Cash's manager, Saul Holiff, will go with the singer and act as emcee.

Cash will be able to make personal appearances on his own for his fans abroad, in addition to his U.S.O. performances. After the tour, Cash heads for a flock of p.a.'s in Germany.

Tony Bennett Signs Again With Columbia

NEW YORK—Tony Bennett has signed an exclusive, long-term renewal pact with Columbia Records, Columbia President Goddard Lieberson said last week.

Bennett has gained much disk action recently through his single recording of the ballad, "I Left My Heart in San Francisco," which has since become the title of a fast-moving album. Bennett has also recently gained stature as a major concert attraction, through his successful June concert at Carnegie Hall, now available on records through a de luxe two-LP Columbia package.

The Carnegie album and the recording of "San Francisco" were produced by Columbia's Ernie Altshuler.

Jazz Is a 4-Letter Word: Z-O-O-M!

NEW YORK — Jazz recordings, which began an impressive show of strength on the pop market in 1961, continue to build album and singles sales. The early gains registered by Cannonball Adderley, Eddie Harris and others last year on the "Hot 100" and "Top LP" charts have been augmented by a number of potent new artists and solidified by consistent performance by already established talents.

Jazz has created much excitement in the singles field with the potent showing of Jimmy Smith. The jazz organist has had two successive hits on the "Hot 100" and even more impressive has been his sales strength on the album chart with his "Midnight Special" (Blue Note) and "Bashin'" (Verve) LP's.

Dave Brubeck, who continues to gain commercial prestige with

each succeeding album, scored with his first single hit earlier this year, "Take Five." In addition Victor Feldman, a pianist and vibes player from the Pacific Coast, has showed action with "Taste of Honey" on the Infinity label. Although the Martin Denny version of the tune has passed Feldman's on the "Hot 100," there is considerable excitement on the tune itself, which has led to many other versions, among them Eddie Cano on Reprise and Lloyd G. Mayers on U. A.

The jazz showing is even more impressive on the album front. Brubeck, Smith, Stan Kenton, Miles Davis and the latest entry, "Herbie Mann at the Village Gate" on Atlantic, have all registered action on the LP charts this year. Of them all Brubeck and Smith seem the most consistent. Smith's two sets, already named, and Brubeck's

"Time Out," "Time Further Out" and "Countdown Time in Outer Space," all on Columbia, have been solid performers. Another strong item has been the LP shared by Nancy Wilson and Cannonball Adderley on Capitol which is selling steadily after 6 straight weeks on the LP listing.

Dealer reports, as detailed by BMW research, would seem to indicate that jazz continues to improve its place in the record marketplace. As noted in the Page 1 lead story this week, dealers are reporting a variety of jazz artists besides those already mentioned as some of their leading album sellers. Sets by Shirley Scott and Eddie (Lockjaw) Davis, and a new LP, "John Coltrane Plays the Blues," on Atlantic, were among the sets singled out for specific mention as new LP sellers for this past week.

Europe Disks Not Riding U. S. Beam, Ertegun Believes

NEW YORK — The record-buying habits of European consumers generally are comparable with those of the American public of a couple of decades ago, and this is reflected in the general lack of salability of most European LP product here.

So says Atlantic Records President Ahmet Ertegun, recently returned from a four-week trip to Britain, France and Germany, where he met with the label's European representatives.

Ertegun was particularly struck by the number of LP's being produced in Europe that reflect no "programming philosophy," whereas hardly an LP is turned out by a label of any importance in the U. S. these days that is not predicated upon some theme, a basic production idea that gives the package sales appeal.

The lack of this type of appeal for the bulk of European product is what limits its salability in this country, Ertegun said. To compete in the U. S. market, European product will have to grab the attention of the American record buyer in competition with our domestic releases.

Like Buying a Tie

The lack of this type of programming dynamic is reflected in the attitude of the European record buyer, who seems to shop in a record store the way he would in a

tie store, said Ertegun. By comparison, the U. S. buyer generally enters the record store with a specific record by a specific artist already in mind, though once there he may buy additional disks on impulse. But consumers on the Continent seldom seem to have a specific purchase in mind.

Indications are, however, that this situation will undergo a change. Ertegun noted that the huge success of the Twist in Europe made the public much more record-minded and also night-club-minded. Too, the increasing popularity of specific artists has helped develop selectivity on the part of the consumer.

In this regard, Ertegun particularly noted that Ray Charles has begun to have the kind of acceptance in many nations which has been reserved in the recent past for such artists as Elvis Presley and Connie Francis. He also said that Ben E. King is starting to come on very strong.

Lots of Charts

A strong record that is excerpted from a film that is in simultaneous release throughout the Continent has a good chance to break out on many charts at one time. Ertegun cited "Multiplication" as a disk that was on 11 different BMW European charts at once.

Ertegun paid special tribute to Denis Preston, British indie record producer, as "one of the world's most astute record men." Preston produced the Acker Bilk disks which have been scoring so strongly, and Ertegun secured exclusive rights for all new Bilk product for the Atco label during the trip.

Bilk, he said, is "an incredible musician" who is one of the few able to play the clarinet with warmth and emotion that reaches people, rather than in the cold manner that is most typical of the use of the instrument in modern music. This, he said, stemmed from the fact that Sidney Bechet was one of the strongest influences on Bilk's playing, and also accounts for his ability to make the clarinet sound like a soprano sax. Acker Bilk is one of the rare type of musicians who should be big for years to come, said Ertegun.

Dudley Moore, jazz pianist turned comic in London, is labeled a "great piece of talent" by Ertegun, who hopes to record him here later this year. Moore is in the cast of "Beyond the Fringe," the hit revue slated for a Broadway run this fall, at which time Ertegun hopes to get permission from EMI to record Moore as a pianist. He also raved about the guitar playing of Diz Disley in London as another British artist he would like to record on Atlantic.

British Fall Import 'Stop the World' Already Spinning on Its U. S. Axis

NEW YORK—A British legit musical import, that will not open on Broadway for two months, and with a score by two writers never before represented on the legit scene here, is already causing the heaviest show score single record activity seen here since the opening of "My Fair Lady."

The current show, "Stop the World, I Want to Get Off," with a score by Leslie Bricusse and the star of the show, Anthony Newley, has been a smash in London for the past season, and is now set for a Broadway opening at the Broadhurst Theater next October 3, following a two-week run in Philadelphia. Newley will star in the American version, along with other British original casters, Anna Quale and the Baker Twins, Susan and Jennifer.

Howie Richmond's Hollis Music, which has the American rights to "Stop the World" as well as another upcoming British hit, "Oliver," has released four tunes as of August 1 for advance disking activity. Rest of the score is restricted for recording until October 1.

Ballad Catching On

Tune currently getting the biggest interest on the disk front, "What Kind of Fool Am I?" was never a hit in England, yet the ballad already has had heavy American disk exposure. Also, unlike the cast of most plug show songs, in which the singles activity is often largely limited to the firm which has the original-cast album rights, "Fool" is getting multi-label action.

London, owner of the cast rights, has three versions already cut, by Mantovani, Tony Newley himself and pianist Ronnie Aldrich. The London-allied Felsted label has two current versions by Burt Farber and the Cordials.

Meanwhile, Robert Goulet's Columbia version was released this week, as was the Billy Daniels version on Jubilee. Billy Eckstine has cut the tune for Mercury and a Sammy Davis version on Reprise is already out. Meanwhile, there are versions upcoming by Vic Damone on Capitol, Shirley Bassey on United Artists and Buddy Greco on Epic.

Eckstine, it may be noted, cut the song some time back, and, in fact, taped it for an Ed Sullivan

TV outing scheduled earlier this year. At the time, the publisher enforced the restriction on the song, but gave special permission for airing the Eckstine performance on the Sullivan outing of July 22.

Heard in Clubs

As long ago as last year a number of artists were known to be using the song in their night club acts. These included Jerry Lewis, Billy Eckstine, Keely Smith and Billy Daniels, all of whom used the tune in Las Vegas appearances. Davis, Goulet, Greco and Miss Bassey all cut the song months ago and American release has been held up until now, though the Davis version was released in England earlier.

Another "Stop the World" tune, "Gonna Build a Mountain," is also getting plenty of single disk action. There are versions by Sammy Davis, Billy Daniels and Tony Newley, as well as by Paul Evans on Kapp, Georgia Brown on London and Nick Noble and Matt Monro. The last two are expected to be released on Liberty.

The tune "Once in a Lifetime," also from the same show, has been recorded by Ronnie Aldrich, Burt Farber, the Cordials, Mantovani and Sammy Davis. The Davis disking is not yet out. Meanwhile, Hollis' general professional manager, Happy Goday, is setting up additional single disks on the tunes. London is expected to release an original-cast album in October.

'Oliver' Opens in L. A.

Hollis also has the American rights to another British smash, "Oliver," now scheduled to open in Los Angeles Monday (6), starring the British thrush from the original cast, Georgia Brown. Howie Richmond acquired the rights to this show over 18 months ago.

"Oliver," with a score by Lionel Bart, will reach New York in December after a lengthy road tour, so restrictions on its score will hold until October 1. RCA Victor will have the cast version and Hollis is already setting up a number of singles releases of plug tunes to be issued about the same time.

Shirley Bassey already has recorded the hit tune from this show, "As Long as He Needs Me," and used it in her club act at the Persian Room of the Hotel Plaza a year ago.

Accused 4 Let Off With Fine

MINEOLA, N. Y.—Four men, originally accused of record counterfeiting, were allowed to plead guilty to a reduced charge of trademark violation here last week. The men were fined and released.

Included in the quartet were Norman Berman and Milton Rabuse, fined \$250 each, and Henry Arak and Harold Zatal, fined \$100 each, according to Newsday, local daily. Upon payment of the fines, the four were released.

The arrest of the four men over a year ago, was the culmination of a lengthy investigation carried out by Nassau County detective, John Lada, who masquerading under the name of "Big Mike," gained the confidence of the four in their counterfeiting operations and worked in their midst for several months. The arrests took place at a carefully planned scene in a suite of the Hotel Plaza here.

Announce Fall Liberty Deal

HOLLYWOOD — The complete Liberty and Dolphin catalogs, including new releases and the Premier line, are being offered in the label's fall program at a 15 per cent cash discount on purchase of more than 15 packages.

The program dates from August 1 through September 1, and allows five months for billing, payable in three equal monthly installments, starting in November and going through January. Chipmunk product is not included in the program.

A full 100 per cent exchange is granted at any time after February 1, 1963. In addition, Liberty is making available a self-standing Premier Furniture-type merchandiser to those dealers who order a minimum of 90 Premier packages.

FAIR MEETINGS SCHEDULED FOR ONE-STOP ASSN.

PHILADELPHIA—An embryonic trade association of one-stops, sponsored by Irv Perlman, executive of I. J. Morgan, leading Quaker City one-stop, will hold its first series of meetings during the World's Fair of Music in Chicago late this month.

In a letter to one-stops last week, Perlman noted that meetings will be held in the Palmer House, August 30 and 31, from 2 to 5 p.m., and on September 1, from 9 a.m. to noon.

"I am sure that our organization will benefit everyone who joins and I look forward to meeting you," Perlman told the one-stops.

Caedmon Shoots for 2d British Folk Set

NEW YORK — Caedmon Records has signed Alan Lomax and Peter Kennedy to prepare five more recordings as a follow-up to the label's first entry into musical product, "British Folk Song." This set was a five LP series. The new material also will be made up of live English folk material, including songs by troubadours, farmers, fishermen and coal miners. The new set will be released in the fall and winter of 1962 and will be priced at \$5.95.

The firm is also making strong promotion use of the Stratford (Conn.) Shakespeare Festival Award of 1962 presented for the label's Shakespeare Recording Society product. The Society is using the award in its advertising extensively. The label is also conducting a window display contest throughout the summer.

Fair Show Adds Clooney, Nero

CHICAGO — The World's Fair of Music and Sound, opening at the Chicago lakefront exhibition center, McCormick Place, on August 31 for a 10-day run, has added Rosemary Clooney and Peter Nero to star in its big show spectacular. Previously announced as stars of the Arie Crown theater show were opera star Eleanor Steber and Eddie Fisher.

Fair President Aaron Cushman said there will be at least five more stars joining the roster before the show gets under way. He indicated the announcement may come out next week.

The Fair has set up a rotating

Also slated to speak are Irving B. Green, Mercury Record Corporation president, and Irwin H. Steinberg, executive vice-president. Marketing specialists, financial experts, economists and specialists

Deal New Posts At Columbia

NEW YORK — Columbia Records has realigned its singles merchandising and promotion organization, Maurice Hoffman, national sales manager, said this week. The reorganization includes expanded duties for Bob Thompson, national promotion manager for pop product; promotion of Tom Catalano to the new post of merchandising manager of singles, and the promotion of Dave Rosner to succeed Catalano as singles product manager.

Hoffman said that Columbia's position in the singles market has shown "exceptional growth" during the past year and that the current changes are part of a program to establish "the same sales leadership in singles as the firm has achieved in LP's."

Under the realignment plan, Thompson will continue to report to Hoffman, with the added responsibility of liaison with national TV and radio outlets. Don Curry, manager of radio station services, now will report to Thompson.

Broadhead Buys Back Allied Record Firms After Year Away

HOLLYWOOD — Daken Broadhead last week reacquired his 29-year-old Allied Record Manufacturing and Allied Record Sales companies from Precision Radiation Instruments (Tops Records). A year ago, Broadhead sold the concerns to Precision Radiation Instruments and joined the Tops firm in an executive capacity, heading the Allied Division PRI had established.

In buying back the Allied companies he has headed for the past 15 years, Broadhead reacquired Allied's 57th Street pressing plant in Los Angeles, ownership of the Allied name and the custom accounts Allied has been handling here. These include Mercury and the Disney labels, among others. Allied's Bellville, N. J., plant, included in the original sale to PRI a year ago, is not part of last week's transaction and remains with PRI.

Jack Wegner returns to his post as vice-president in charge of finance.

Vet Songwriter Milton Drake Quits AGAC

Blasts Guild Officials For Lack of Leadership

NEW YORK — Milton Drake, veteran songwriter, has resigned from the American Guild of Authors and Composers. Drake had been a member of the Guild (formerly known as Songwriters Protective Association) for 28 years. For 20 years of this time he served on the AGAC Council and for five years he was its chairman.

Drake, who is the writer of such tunes as "Mairzy Doats," "Nina Never Knew" and "Java Jive," said he has been discouraged with AGAC for some time.

"The Guild has lost the progressive leadership it used to have," Drake said. "For one thing, the standard AGAC writer contract is now five years past due for rewriting. Yet nothing is done."

"I also feel that the Guild should have communication with publishers no matter what their performing rights society is. And certainly should have communication with record companies whose affiliated publishing firms are important in music today."

"Instead of this, relationships are maintained only with some of the bigger, old-line publishers. Let's face it. AGAC needs a fresh approach."

"About the only function the Guild is really carrying out now is collecting the money from the publishers. But a lot of the members have become disenchanted with that idea. Besides, all those functions can be done with IBM machines. They don't need a society for that."

White Renamed V.-P. Of Japanese Firm

TOKYO — Eddie White was re-elected vice-president of Yamaha Music here last week. Yamaha is the music publishing and recording wing of Japan's Nippon Gakki, owner of music department stores, music schools, and manufacturer of pianos, organs, boats, motorcycles and musical instruments.

One of the resolutions passed at the firm's meeting was to expand into classical, educational music and recording fields. White picked up for Japan the U. S. hits "Roses Are Red," "Party Lights" and "A Swingin' Safari." The firm is currently on the Japanese charts with "The Twist," "A Steel Guitar and a Glass of Wine," "Limbo Rock" and "Rubber Ball." White returns to the U. S. about August 10 with a flock of Japanese album and single masters.

EVEREST RECORDS NAMES MURRAY COHEN GEN. MGR.

the spring, and has racked up solid business through specials, sales, substantial advertising and spot radio announcements.

Since Buckley's took over Harvey's there hardly has been a day all summer when a customer couldn't buy at least a few current singles hits for 39 cents. Right now, six of the records on WKDA are available at Harvey's for 39 cents, as well as many non-current singles.

Buckley's, however, charges 89 cents for all the rest of his single hits, and feels it is well worth while to draw in customers by selling a few at 39 cents.

Harvey's also has specials on LP's as well as singles, selling some cream items for \$1.99 and with occasional 99-cent specials as well. Throughout these sales a Buckley spokesman reports that Harvey's business has stayed consistently high all summer—with singles selling in extra strong fashion and LP's also moving well. Buckley's also said that its mail order business out of the main store is up this year. Buckley's sponsors evening shows on WLAC for its mail order business.

Harvey's Madison store opens September 10. Record companies have promised a flock of recording artists to attend the big opening. And record insiders expect the same kind of spectacular sales and merchandising at the new Harvey's as were introduced at Harvey's in Nashville last spring.

St. Louis Pick-Up Best Since 1959

ST. LOUIS—Business, particularly in singles, was the best in three years for the summer period according to tradesters here last week.

"This is the first pick-up of business I've seen since 1959," said John Pohl, exec of One-Stop Record Service. "Since that year, each month's business, compared to the same period in the preceding year, has been down. Now the trend is definitely up and has been for the last three months."

"I can't account for the change specifically," Pohl continued, "but one factor that we notice, being in the one-stop business, is that each year there is a decline in the number of juke boxes. For example, there are almost 400 less locations now than a year ago. Many locations are disappearing and they won't be replaced, because new building projects are going up where old locations used to be. Maybe with less boxes to play, people are buying more records."

Gary Skatoff, who operates the Melody House Record Shop, said business has been ahead each month this year over the corresponding month a year ago. "I think everybody is making better records," said Skatoff. "Kids especially are buying more. And we've had some very hot artists like the Shirrelles, Ray Charles and Bobby Vinton to keep the excitement going."

Meanwhile, plans were afoot here to expose the new Bobby Vinton album by radio spot announcements. Commercial Distributors, Epic outlet here, was making plans at week's end to buy 20 spots on WIL to promote the Vinton album and possibly the new set by George Maharis as well. It's understood the idea developed here after similar time buys were successful in Boston and Philadelphia.

The trade was heartened here at the continuing recovering of Bud Lampe, head of Commercial Distributors. Lampe suffered a stroke during the recent ARMADA Convention in Florida and was hospitalized immediately following his return here from Miami. His progress has been so good, his associates reported, that Lampe is now able to come into his office several hours each day.

Phoenix Reflects Quiet 1-Stop Drift

PHOENIX, Ariz.—The quiet but nonetheless thorough changes taking place on the distributor level of the business once again were pointed up this week when the M. B. Krupp Company, one of this city's leading independent distribs, disclosed that the firm was moving "more and more" toward one-stop selling.

A representative of the firm said that the company would continue to distribute its labels, but also said that the nature

Music Firm Asks OK To Sell Public Stock

WASHINGTON — Music Royalty Corporation, a New York firm which deals in music copyrights and talent contracts, has filed with the Securities & Exchange Commission to register 150,000 shares of common stock for public sale at \$1 per share.

The company, headed by Richard Carpenter, was organized in June, 1962, and has acquired 18 contracts for representation of artists, performers, songwriters and composers in the pop field, with emphasis on jazz. Additionally, it proposes to go into music publishing.

The estimated \$106,000 net proceeds from the stock sale will go for promotion and public relations to defray copyright expenses, acquire musical properties and to pay off a \$15,000 promissory note to Carpenter in consideration of assets brought into the firm. The company has 150,000 shares of common stock outstanding, of which Carpenter and Chauncy S. Olman own 50 per cent each. Underwriting is headed by Associated Securities Company, Pittsburgh.

of the business was such that one-stopping seemed a logical and profitable adjunct to the distrib operation. It was said that the firm's Houston outlet also would begin to move in the one-stop direction.

On the single record level, area business was a good deal ahead of last year, though things have settled down in the past week after a torrid six weeks from mid-June through the end of July.

A singular singles exposure pattern was spotted by Buck Stapleton, of Phoenix Record Sales here. It is his contention that disks break in the area after concentrated exposure in Los Angeles. "Singles seem to break wide open here after their appearance on the KFWB charts," Stapleton says.

All the top names seemed to be selling well — Anka, Avalon, Francis—while Little Eva's "Loco-Motion," the new Tillotson disk and Tommy Roe's "Sheila" were scoring among the newer chart items. Calls also were being registered for a disk called "The Cure," by Smitty Williams on MGM. A new "Wolverton Mountain," pseudo-Spanish take-off, "Tijuana Border," by El Clod on Challenge was also causing some stir on radio. A local disk "Don't Ever Leave Me" on the Tempi label also seemed to be getting early nibbles.

Denis Ganim Gets Kapp Midwest Post

NEW YORK—Denis Ganim has been named Midwest promotion representative for the Kapp label. He was appointed by Phil Skaff, managing director of sales for the label. Ganim was formerly with M.&S. Distributing Company of Chicago.

Meanwhile Kapp's new merchandising division has come up with a combination LP bag and sun reflector to aid the firm's summer sales. The LP bag holds six albums, and when opened can be used as a sun reflector. It is being shipped at no charge to Kapp distribs.

Meanwhile, Kapp Records has released nine new albums for August promotion with the sales campaign carried directly to distributors throughout the country by sales chief Phil Skaff.

Skaff and his corps of regional salesmen returned here last week after a nationwide swing. Skaff termed distributors' reception to the release as "overwhelming," adding that "It's the strongest fall program in our history, and proposed goals were personally increased by each distributor."

material with Paul Wexler serving the diskery in the capacity of consultant. Wexler recently exited his top post at Colpix Records. The label will have American distribution through many of those distributors who handled Colpix during Wexler's tenure there. Overseas distribution will be handled in many cases through existing Fox affiliates and in England, France, Italy, Germany and Belgium through the facilities of Transglobal Music recently launched, New York-based international publisher and diskery agent and representative. The Gallant line already has started a singles release program, according to Fox. He will release its first album, entitled "The Best of Jazz From the Best of TV," featuring a number of well-known jazz artists, shortly. Fox also plans a "Bitter End" album series on the label, to consist of live performances of various folk artists appearing at the New York night club of the same name. Sam Fox, father of Fred Fox, and the man who started the firm which bears his name, will leave on an extended European tour almost immediately. He will call on the many Fox overseas affiliates.

Fred Fox will follow with a tour of his own in October.

Stay With ASCAP

Fox also announced that the firm will continue to be an important facet of the ASCAP scene. The man who has long been identified as a crusader for changes within the ASCAP structure of distribution and voting, declared:

"We hope to pursue the ASCAP matter and we will continue to seek a more equitable distribution of ASCAP collection among the membership. We have discontinued our attempts to bring about these changes from within and will now concentrate on effecting them from without, with the help of the Justice Department, the Congress, the Executive Branch of the Government, or whatever avenues may be open to us.

The Fox move to a BMI operation is the latest in a series of similar moves by a number of the bigger ASCAP firms. Painted Desert Music is a BMI affiliate of Shapiro-Bernstein. The Bourne interests have Jimskip, BMI, and E. H. Morris has Vogue Music, BMI. The Big Three (Robbins, Feist and Miller) just started Hastings Music, BMI.

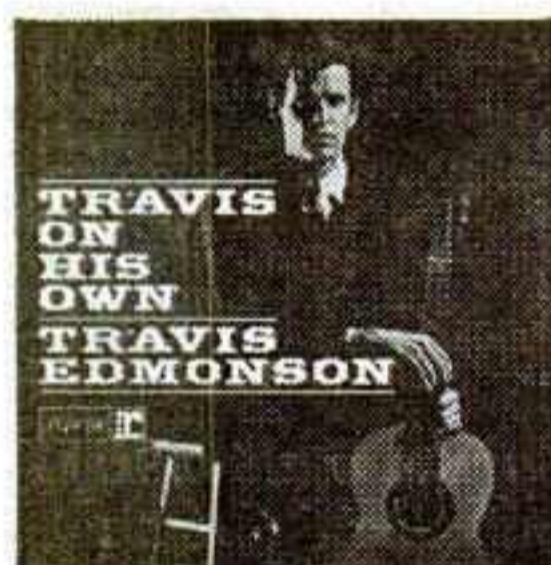

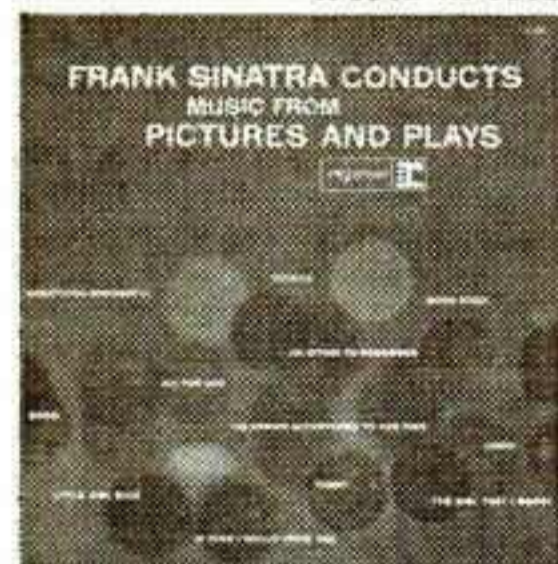

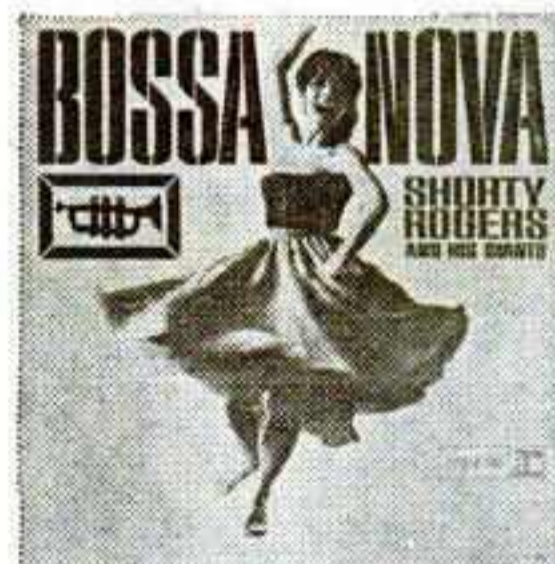

NASHVILLE—A glittering group of the greatest country music stars in the business helped win a resounding victory throughout Tennessee August 2, playing political sidemen to their star, former Gov. Frank G. Clement, as he was re-nominated to the State's chief executive post for the third time.

The triumph was considered a Tennessee waltz into the governor's office for Clement, as winning the Democratic nomination in this State virtually assures him of victory in the general election this fall.

Never in a political campaign has so much talent been donated to a candidate. The tab would have been close to \$100,000 had the Clement organization bought the services of the stars who traveled with him throughout the State. But the unsolicited talent came free to Frank Clement, and there is a reason why.

Clement C.&W. Crusader

As governor of Tennessee, Clement was a constant crusader in behalf of the Nashville music industry. Whenever and wherever country music needed him, Clement was on hand, often at his own personal expense. During the past four years, while he could not, under State law, succeed himself as governor, Clement remained a loyal friend to the industry, and his friendship paid big political dividends.

Dave Carter, who spins the country wax on CJLX, reports that the station's "Great Northwestern Opry" has kicked off successfully and is receiving much favorable comment from listeners in Minnesota and along the Lake Superior shoreline to the south. Special guest on the show last week was Jack Kingston, who records on the Quality label and spins the c.&w. for CHOW-Radio, Welland, Ont.

Randy King and His Country All-Stars trek to Wichita, Kan., August 11, for an appearance at the 3,000-seat air-conditioned Cotillion Ballroom. Randy's new release on Enterprise, "Fool the World" b-w "Hearts Entwined," is getting considerable air exposure in the West-

ern States. Randy and the boys are set at the Chalet, Estes Park, Colo., August 16, and wind up the week at the Garden Spot Pavilion, Elks Mountain, Wyo., August 18. . . . Joe Lucas, sales manager of Hickory Records, Nashville, announces two distributor changes. Mainline, Cleveland, will carry the Hickory line in the Cleveland area, with Calmar Distributors handling the line in the Dallas sector. Bill (Hoss) Allen has been assigned to cover the Southern market on promotion. Bill's first two plug tunes are, "Torture," by Kris Jenses, and "Cajun Joe," by Rusty and Doug.

The interest in commercial folk music is booming on the West Coast, especially in the Los Angeles area, where numerous small clubs are using local and new folk talent as their feature entertainment, and to good results at the cash register. cess with only a handful of releases. One of the albums is selling like a pop hit. Whether Light can keep this up as the firm comes up with more releases is moot, but a lot of customers who purchased Light's pace-setting percussion albums dig his classical wax.

That other firms are searching for new ways and new ideas to sell more classical wax is evident from some of the repertoire coming out and from the adaptation of new merchandising techniques.

Mercury Records, for instance, cut Bryon Janis in Russia, and expects that this first Russian-made recording by an American company to turn into a big seller.

Capitol, unhappy with its classical sales, is reportedly going to put all of its classical artists on the Angel label starting in 1963. Feeling is that Angel, with its classical name, is a stronger label for long-hair success than Capitol, and that special selling techniques can be

used, appropriate for the classical market.

Techniques Help

Vox Records, with its Vox Boxes and Vox Twins, which comprise sets of three and two disks sold at very low prices, has proved that special merchandising and packaging techniques can help sales in the classical market. It is understood that other firms are mulling the Vox Box idea.

Meanwhile, low price classical LP lines have turned into healthy selling in the field. The Richmond, Telefunken and Vanguard Stereo-Lab lines have had steady sales, and more important, they are not discounted to 99 cents or so as are many of the low price pop lines.

Another label that has managed to come up with a solid packaging and merchandising idea is Artia-Parliament, with its 10-record set of classical LP's that retails for \$9.97. The set, with top artists, has racked up strong sales for the label.

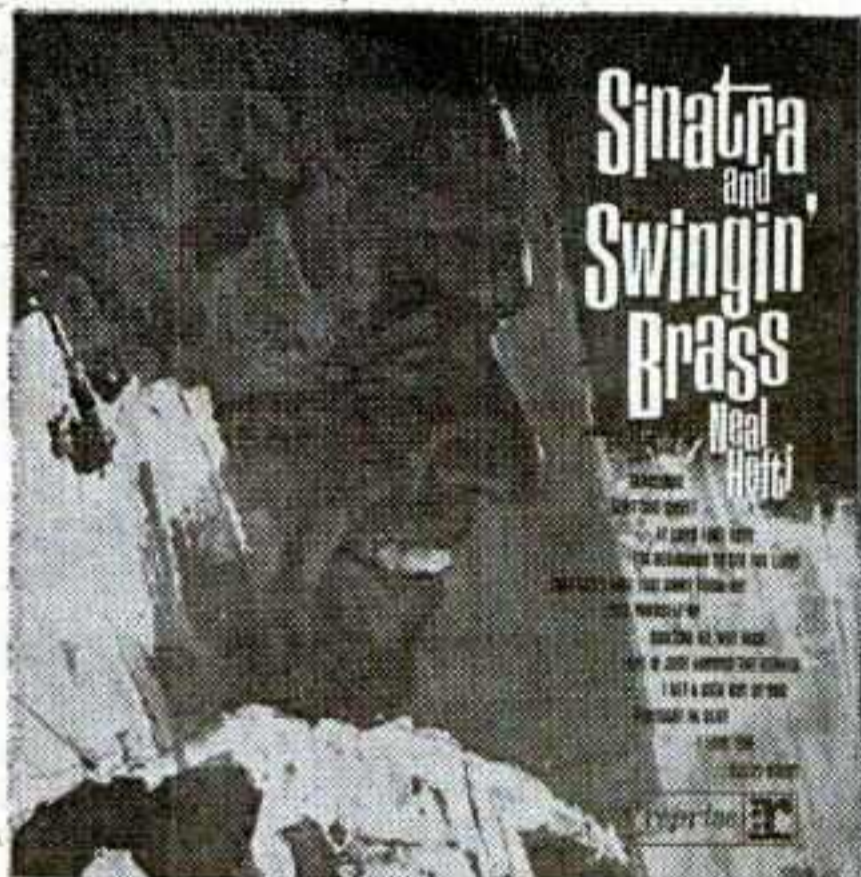

Mack McConkey Dies

HOLLYWOOD — Funeral services were held at Forest Lawn here last week for Jay S. (Mack) McConkey, 60, veteran Midwestern and Hollywood booking agent. He died Friday (27) of a heart attack while driving his car. He was the only agent ever to receive the Billboard Gold Medal Award for small unit booking.

He entered the booking field in 1927 in Champaign, Ill., and 10 years later moved his agency to Kansas City, where it became the foremost booking office in the Midwest. In 1947, he moved his headquarters to Hollywood. At the peak of his business, the McConkey Artists Corporation had offices in eight U. S. cities and three foreign lands. Survivors include his former wife, Gail, seven children, and one grandchild.

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Foreign Work Force Molding Record Trend

FRANKFURT — Sales statistics show that West Germany's mammoth force of "guest workers"—in all, 650,000 Italians, Spaniards, Greeks and Turks—are beginning to exert strong influence on the German disk trade.

About half of the foreign labor force are Italians, and this fact is clearly reflected in strong record sales of Italian music singers and themes.

For example, the German song, "Two Little Italians," originally produced with only the German market in mind, has scored big with Italian workers. The hit is now being re-issued in Italian especially for the foreign labor market.

There are 650,000 foreign workers now in West Germany and the number is rising constantly as Germany's labor dearth becomes more severe. Nearly all are very young, most of them under 25. They depend heavily on music for entertainment. The first item they buy, upon arriving in Germany, is a record player.

Surveys show that disk shops in areas of heavy foreign worker concentration, particularly of Italians, show an almost vertical rise in disk sales, geared to the arrival and increase of foreign workers.

Hit-Singles LP's Sell at Cut Rate

Disc Jockey is assembling the principal names of their catalog, Rosamel Araya, Reg Owen, Horacio Malvicino and Garcia Etcheverry for a special disk sold at a lower price.

French Cop Prize In Knokke Test

For the second time in the four years since the "Coupe d'Europe du Tour de Chant" contest was organized by the Casino of Knokke, the French team has won the event. Everyone agreed with the jury's verdict, something that rarely happens during the week-long contest. The Dutch team, however, chose

to quit the contest and go home. Lou Van Rees, leader of the team, could not agree with the jury's decision which gave Belgium 80 votes more than Holland. France won the contest from Italy by only one vote, 690,50 to 689,50.

A special press prize (\$400) went to Sonia of the Belgian team. Second was French songstress Luce Klein.

Sonia, who sings songs out of the repertoire of Georges Brassens and Leo Ferre, returned from Canada some eight months ago. She already sang in the United States. Other stars were Colin Day (Great Britain), Ralf Paulsen (Germany), Luciano Rondinella (Italy) and Staf Wezembeek (Belgium). Also of note was Alain Barriere, who should become one of France's most outstanding artists.

Many well-known music figures were present at the contest which is beginning to assume importance as the yearly meeting for European music biz. American record people might find it worthwhile to attend the fifth edition of this important contest which takes place in July 1963.

New Label

A new label called Marshall Records has been introduced on the Belgian market. Marshall is an independent and has its headquarters in Brussels. The directors of this record firm are Robert Bylon, manager of Benelux Theatre, and Louis Marishal, the composer of the "Boerinnekensdans," a million seller that was translated in different languages and distributed all over the world.

He has signed Jacques Raymond to record in Germany. The titles are "Sweet Florentine" and "In diesem Augenblick." The latter was composed by Marishal.

BRITAIN

Paramor Going Around the World

EMI a.&r. manager Norrie Paramor is making an around-the-world trip this fall. On September 21, he sets out for Toronto and then continues through the U. S. to Australia and Asia. He will visit many of EMI's foreign branches. Paramor is one of the most successful of Britain's disk producers. Under his wing at EMI are Cliff Richard, the Shadows, Helen Shapiro, current chart-topper Frank Ifield and Craig Douglas. He is also responsible for Acker Bilk's disks in conjunction with Indie producer Denis Preston and does some recording himself with various combinations from full orchestra to the Big Ben Banjo Band.

Trade Talk

Philips has issued an EP on CBS of the four best selling singles titles on the label since it was launched May 3, Eydie Gorme's "Yes, My Darling Daughter," Dave Brubeck's "Unsquare Dance," Andy Williams' vocal "Stranger on the Shore" and Jimmy Dean's "Steel Man."

Publishing Business

As a result of its collections in 1961, the Performing Right Society paid out to its members almost \$9 million. Surveying the pay-out, the PRS notes that the average figure is less than \$840 a year for each author, composer or heir. There are only about 150 living composers whose income from musical performing rights exceeds \$2,800 a year; excluded from this category are stage rights. Membership of the PRS consists of approximately 50 per cent living members, the remainder being heirs benefit-

ing under British copyright law, which affords protection for 50 years after the writer's death.

The British market for LP's is increasing. More than 2,000 were released in the first half of the year. (Singles issues totaled almost 1,000 and there were just over 500 EP's.) Official sales figures are so far only available until May, but in these five months, 9.1 million LP's were produced, 41 per cent more than in the same period last year. Production of 45's (singles and EP's) was down 5 per cent to 21.6 million.

Visitors

Norman Petty, of Lubbock, Tex., former manager of the late Buddy Holly, recorded Buddy Britten, a British singer in the Holly ilk, on three numbers destined for Pye release. Petty also brought over an American singer, Johnny Duncan, and recorded him here. Karl Kundsen, of Danish Storyville, recorded the Len Baldwin trad band in London. . . . Caterina Valente cut an LP for British Decca with Stanley Black and ork. . . . EMI-Columbia is planning to record the Danish duo Nina and Frederik, currently summering here. Previously the couple's disks have been made in Copenhagen and issued under license from Metronome. . . . Australian Rolf Harris cut George Martin for EMI-Parlophone August 1.

Ted Heath and his Music again appear at the Berlin radio exhibition; they fly August 30. . . . Acker Bilk is due for personals in the U. S. for about four days from September 10; he will go during his band's annual vacation. . . . Philips hosted Ray Coniff August 3 on the eve of the main British holiday week end.

Disk Business

Louis Benjamin, general manager of Pye Records, has also been appointed a director of the firm and its subsidiaries. . . . Alpha Rythm Records, a small indie, has obtained some material from Air Records, run by Jack A. Curry of Miami. Titles by Joan Auborn and Sonny Marshall are planned as initial singles. . . . Max Bygraves recorded an album of songs from Lionel Bart's musical "Oliver" intended mainly for American release on London.

Polish Song Fest Names Winners

The Sopot (Poland) Song Festival was held again this year for the second time, July 6 and 7. BMW interviewed composer Gyorgy Behar about the Festival doings. Behar was one of the members of the jury judging the contest.

Behar reports that on the first day only Polish pop songs—25 in all—were presented and interpreted by Polish and foreign singers. First prize went to the song "Jesienna rozlaka" by J. Gert and B. Brok, sung by very attractive Anita Traversi from Switzerland.

On the second Festival day 23 songs were presented from 20 European countries. Winner was the Greek song "Ti Krima" by M. Plessas, sung by the very charming and talented Greek singer Jeanne Yovanna. Second prize went to Israel's "Stav" by M. Vilinsky and S. Chalfi, excellently performed by Esther Reichstadt, and splitting third prize were the Bulgarian "Arlekino" by E. Dymitrov and W. Andrejev, sung by composer Dymitrov, and the Czechoslovakian title "Oskiva Nedele" by J. Slitr and J. Suchy, and sung by Hana Hegerova, according to Behar.

Mr. Behar said Connie Francis, though promised to be present, was very much missed.

Copyright Law

Decision Due on Chevalier Tour

Maurice Chevalier is the cause of a new "problem" facing Israel authorities. An impresario announced his forthcoming personal tour of the country and a complaint was raised over his activities during the Nazi occupation of France in World War II. Chevalier continued his career during the war and appeared before the Nazis and won their acclaim. After the war he was banned temporarily in France and in some other countries, but has since been exiated.

His records are played over the Israel radio stations and none of the films in which he participated have been banned. The government committee would have to make a clear decision about allowing him to appear here in person. The decision is expected within the next month.

Tour Talk

Eddie Hodges is coming to Israel. His first record, "Made for Love," has been issued here. This is the first of a number of Cadence records that are being pressed in Israel by special arrangement between the U. S. company and Israel's Hataklit. Another of those out is the Berry Sisters' second record. Their Yiddish as well as English songs are very popular here.

ITALY

Balky Star Gets 2d Festival Shot

Four labels will share the honors of the Naples Festival with Voce del Padrone finally landing its temperamental ace, Sergio Bruni in a top spot. Two years ago he walked out on the festival in a dispute over the order of his appearance and his song, assigned to another, was the festival winner. Gloria Christian, whose numbers finished Nos. 1 and 2, is heard on the Vis-Radio label, while Aurelio Fierro, perennial Neapolitan song ace, who records for Durium, was Nos. 2 and 3. The other of the top places went to Fonit's Giacomo Rondinella.

While the Twist may be fading elsewhere, it holds top place here this summer. Fonit has just issued three new Twists, "Chicory Twist," by Domenico Modugno; "Magic Twist," by Vittoria Raffael, and "Summer Twist," by Vittorio Palmieri.

Neil Sedaka, whose latest here for RCA Italiana is "King of Clowns," began an Italian tour in Milan July 19 and continues to play the summer spots along the seashore until August 7. . . . Tony Renis' recording of "Quando, Quando, Quando" has now been issued in U. S. and Germany. . . . Mina's fourth LP, an unusual number for an Italian pop artist, has just been put out by Italdisc. Her chief rival is also out

with one for Cetra under the title of "Milva Sings for You."

More and more South American hits are being exploited via the Italian market. Among those which gained European ascendancy through Italy have been "Brigitte Bardot," "Grinding Coffee," "The Bride," and now "The Poet Weeps" has made its debut by Cauby Peixoto. . . . Two more cinema sound tracks have been issued by Cam, "World on the Beach," by Renzo Rossellini, and "The Red Light Bandit." . . . A Les Baxter album of show hits has been put forth by Capitol.

Record News

A new label, Night Club Records, has been introduced by Piero Gabrielli, whose three niteries around Rome feature name recording artists and who has probably spotlighted the debut of more top Italian names than anyone else. First disk is "Raid Twist," by Rita Morin and the Luciano Fineschi orchestra to coincide with celebrity motorboat race along Italian coast known as "Raid." RCA Italiana will distribute the label.

Disk sales are on the upgrade in Italy. In 1961 sales were 18 million records for a total of \$14,400,000, while in first six months of 1962 sales have jumped to 10 million records. Vocals are top sellers followed by classics, jazz and grand opera in that order.

Ezio Redaelli, director of the recent "Cantagiuro," is suing Milva for \$24,000 because she dropped out of the event. . . . Cetra has just honored the singer with a private catalog which lists her 38 records, 8 EP's and 5 LP's to date, but another by the same company for Claudio Villa shows 207 two-sided 45's, 53 four-song EP's and 12 LP's, something of an Italian record.

Decca is claiming "the most original disk of the year" with its issue of "Salvador Dali at Venice," a recording of the ballet he presented during Venice Film Festival in 1961. Also on its list is original cast record of "State Fair" which in Italian is called "To the Fair for a Husband." On a single, Pat Boone sings one of the film hits along with Italy's current favorite, "Quando, Quando, Quando."

CGD is following the current line of presenting LP's with Italy's top femme vocalists. It has offered "Successes of Betty Curtis." On its MGM list are three film soundtrack LP's, Elmer Bernstein's "Walk on the Wild Side," Andre Previn's "Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse" and Miklos Rozsa's "El Cid."

Peppino de Capri sold 50,000 of "St. Tropez Twist" in first month after his return to recording for Carisch after a South American tour.

JAPAN

Nippon Official Visitor to U. S.

K. Naganuma, chairman of Nippon Columbia, attended the national convention of Columbia Records held at Hotel Americana in Miami. On that occasion he visited Olympic Radio & Television and several other companies who are purchasing Nippon Columbia's TV sets, radios, and tape recorders.

King Records consummated a deal with Metronome of Sweden and will release first material in autumn. . . . Nippon Gramophone built a small plant of about 30 feet square for the manufacture of a de luxe stereo player to sell for about \$400. At present the label's four models are manufactured by another company.

Talent News

Aram Khachatryan, Russian composer, and Leonid Cogan, violinist,

have been booked for a series of concerts starting in February 1963. Khachatryan will direct Yomiuri Nippon Symphony Orchestra, a recently organized group, to perform his violin and piano concerti and other works. . . . Joseph Schuster, Constantinople-born American cellist, will make debut here early next year.

Ivonne Carre, English Decca thrush now singing at night spots throughout the country, taped two selections in the Japanese language: "Kompira Boat" (a folk song) and "Goodbye, Nippon" (a specially composed tune), at King Records studios, which is Decca's affiliate. This is the sixth language she has used for recording.

NORWAY

Promo Push for Two Film Tunes

The Norwegian film "Operasjon lovsprett" has been licensed for showing in Sweden and Denmark, and the music will be distributed there as well. At the same time, the Ray Adams recording of "Brother Bill" may be issued in other European countries. Egil Monn Iversen is distributing the disks.

Jose Guardiola and his daughter, Rosa Maria (four years old), sing "Di Papa" (Say Father) which is a French hit by George Guetary. . . . "Tu sei lontana da me" by Adriano Celentano is a new rendition of "Tower of Strength." . . . Ricardo Korn of Korn Music (Argentina) traveled in Europe and announced here that "Y el poeta Lloro" (And the Poet Cried), the big Cauby Peixoto hit in South America, will be recorded in Italy and other countries.

Marisol came back from the U. S. and has recorded "Tombola," a song written by Guijarro and Alguero. . . . The TNT vocal group has had its disk released on RCA. "Que tengas suerte" (Be Lucky) could be spotted among the coming hits in the Spanish summer. The song is also another one written by Guijarro and Alguero.

The most played record in Spain during July was "Caterina" by Perry Como. . . . U. S. dominates the current market with 48 songs, while Argentina, Italy, Spain, Mexico, France, Chile and Germany complete the list of the songs aired last month.

"Llevan" (They Carry) by Reguero and Llorente won the Benidorm Festival last week. Rapahel won the "best performance" prize. "Quisiera" by De Leon, "Maxi," Baratas and Tonio Areta won the second place. A crowd of more than 15,000 attended. "Cada Cual" (Each One), composed by Selles and Portoles, won third place. The winner gets 100,000 pesetas (almost \$2,000).

Musidisc, also a label from Brazil, is seeking European distribution and pressing after closing negotiations in Colombia with Hernan Restrepo of Sonolux and RCA. . . . Guillermo and Rafael Alvarez, owners of Gema (Cuba, Puerto Rico and Santo Domingo), have signed pacts to launch Gema in Italy.

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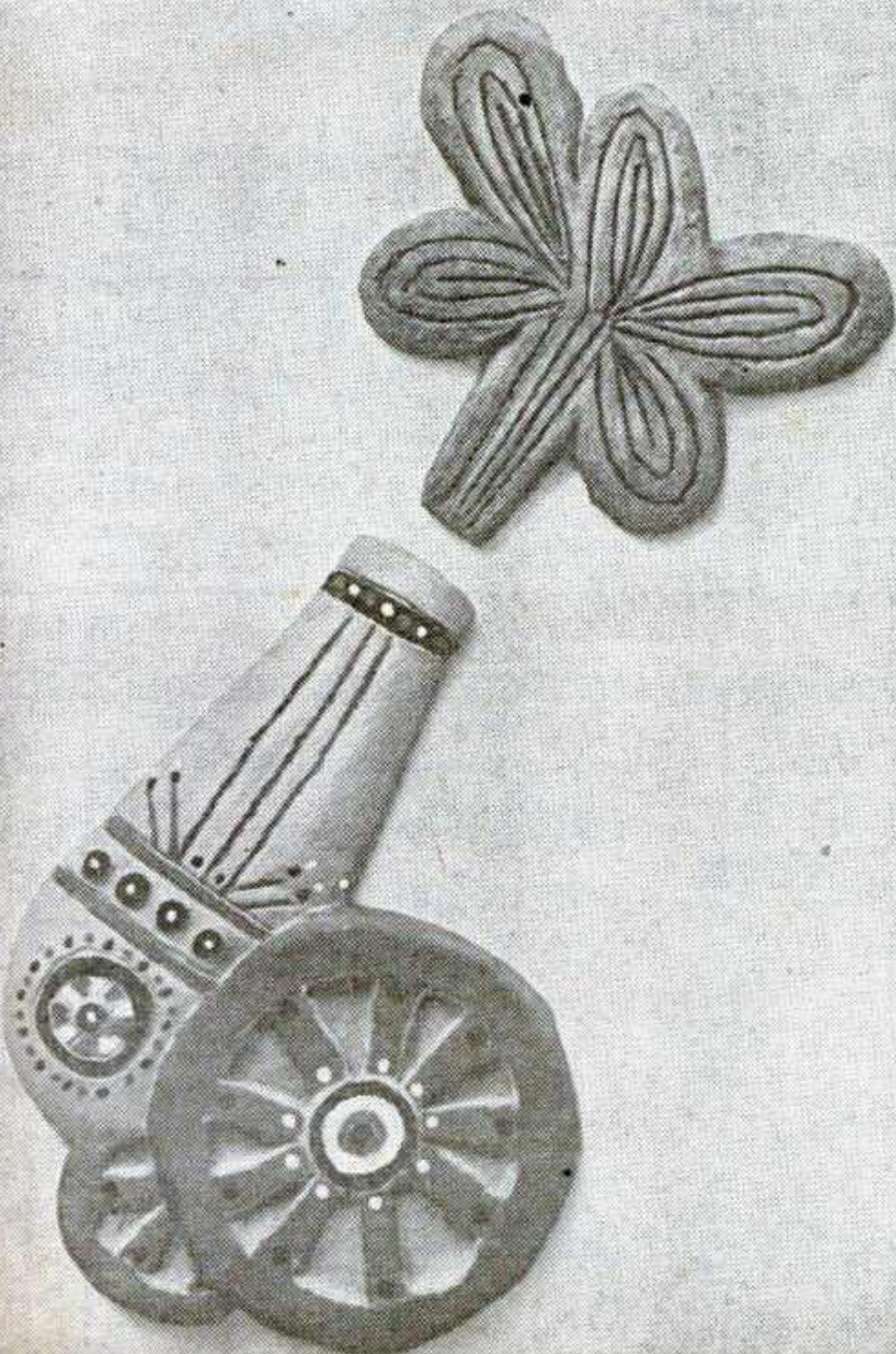

ANATOMY OF DANCING VOLS. 1, 2 AND 3—THE LOVIN' MOOD; THE LATIN MOOD; THE TWISTIN' AND SWINGIN' MOOD



Various Artists. MGM E 4036, 4037, 4038 (M); SE 4036, 4037, 4038 (S)—Here are three separate albums of mood music, uniquely tied together via a huge portrait of an attractive, nighty-clad blonde. Place Vol. 1 on top of Vol. 2, in turn on top of Vol. 3 and you have the full portrait, three feet tall. Top third of the gal is the cover for music featuring arrangements by Ray Ellis. Larry Elgart and LeRoy Holmes of standard tunes. Vol. 2, with the middle third of the lady's anatomy on the cover, has Latin selections by Charles Kai Winding and LeRoy Holmes, while Volume 3, showing the lady's sleek pins, offers swinging, twisting items by such as Morty Craft, Al Hirt and Pete Fountain, LeRoy Holmes, Ray Ellis and Danny Davis. A lot of incentive here to buy all three sets.

SOMETHING SPECIAL



Kingston Trio. Capitol T 1747 (M); ST 1747 (S)—The Kingstons have another imposing package in this LP. The album is a good bit different from its predecessors though. The boys are backed by a string section and chorus. The Kingston spark and style is just as evident in this new setting as ever before. The new backing, which was arranged by Jimmy Haskell, only enhances the over-all sound. The repertoire is still in the strong folk-flavored groove with titles such as "Brown Mountain Light," "One More Town," "Tell It on the Mountain" and "Away Rio" are all typical of the type of material.

JIMMY SMITH PLAYS FATS WALLER



Blue Note 4100—Here comes organist Jimmy Smith with another powerful package. The set is filled with magnificent modern interpretations of Fats Waller material by the instrumentalist supported by bass and drums. Some of the most famous Waller material is included: "Everybody Loves My Baby," "Squeeze Me," "Ain't Misbehavin'," and "Honeysuckle Rose." Easy, relaxed blowing by Jimmy should make this a big jazz and pop favorite.

HELLO YOUNG LOVERS



Nancy Wilson. Capitol T 1767 (M); ST 1767 (S)—Nancy Wilson made a name for herself via her smash album on the label with Cannonball Adderly and she could go to bigger heights with this new set. The thrush shows off her own, stylish way with a pop song on this album cover over a lush string choir arranged by George Shearing. The tunes include "Hello Young Lovers," "Sophisticated Lady," "Little Girl Blue," "Put on a Happy Face" and "A Good Man Is Hard to Find." Lass does a fine job here.

SHOW BOAT



Various Artists. Columbia OL 5820 (M); OS 2220 (S)—Here's one of the big push albums of Columbia's new fall release, and one that could cause a lot of excitement among original-cast album buyers. This is one of the label's continuing series of re-creations of hit shows of the pre-cast album era, and certainly it's one of the finest recent performances on or off records of the Jerome Kern classic. Maestro Franz Allers conducts the "pit" ork, accompanying the fine voices of John Raitt, Barbara Cook, William Warfield and Anita Darian. Also heard is the Merrill Staton Choir. A fine cover can also create much interest.

RINKY DINK



Dave (Baby) Cortez. Chess LP 1473—Here's a swinging album by that "Rinky Dink" man Dave (Baby) Cortez on organ with a collection of instrumental rockers including his current singles smash. All of the sides go, including "Jammin' Part I" and "Jammin' Part II," and "Wobble Part I" and "Wobble Part II," "Getting Right," and the light "Little Paris Melody." Solid wax for the teen crowd.

THE GARLAND TOUCH



Judy Garland. Capitol W 1710 (M); SW 1710 (S)—Here's a solid sequel to the highly successful Garland Carnegie Hall package, which did such great things for the singer. Although this lacks the zing and punch of the live audience in the Carnegie and the earlier "Garland at the Grove" packages, it still finds the gal in fine voice, as good vocally as she has been at any time in her revived career, and she does a brace of numbers bound to please. These include her famous "Palace Medley," "Happiness Is a Thing Called Joe" and "Do I Love You?" Strong entry for jocks and stores.

MORE COLE ESPANOL



Nat King Cole. Capitol W 1749 (M); SW 1749 (S)—Nat Cole's original "Español" package was a solid chart success for a good many months, and this new, well-conceived follow-up to that idea, can reap the same, long-term kind of benefits. The chanter selects a flock of pleasant Latin tunes, does them in the native tongue, and gets some solid backing, much in the native groove (including some mariachi sounds) and all arranged by Ralph Carmichael. The even dozen selections are bound to please American friends above and below the border.

THE CRYSTALS TWIST UPTOWN



Philles PHLP 4000—Strong wax for the five-girl group, whose big smash was the recent "Uptown." Here, this hit single is included along with an earlier hit, "There's No Other," plus some fine new outings, featuring their powerful, individual style. Other titles include another recent single "What a Nice Way to Turn 17," "Please Hurt Me" and "Frankenstein Twist." A lot of good potential here.

THE LIVELY ONES



Vic Damone. Capitol T 1748 (M); ST 1748 (S)—The title of this album is the title of Damone's new TV show, and the album contains the theme song as well. In addition, there are a flock of fine standards here, all performed by Damone in his tender, effortless style, over solid support from the swinging Billy May crew. Best tracks are "Marie," "Nina Never Knew," "The Most Beautiful Girl in the World," "Dearly Beloved" and "Little Girl." Solid wax for Damone fans.

I LOVE TO TELL THE STORY



Tennessee Ernie Ford. Capitol T 1751 (M); ST 1751 (S)—Wonderful and deeply meaningful renditions by the great chanter of hymns and gospel songs, many of which have been featured as closers on Tennessee Ernie's regular ABC-TV show. Many of the tunes are preceded by the singer's folksy and personalized reflections, which then lead into the song. It's like a reprise of the on-the-air material and he's ably assisted by piano, organ, trumpets and a fine vocal quartet, also from the show. Twelve numbers in all, and all of them very moving. This should be a strong seller, just like its several predecessors.

(Harmon)



PERSONAL MANAGER: Ted Harmon Associates. **BOOKING OFFICE:** GAC. **REAL NAME:** Ricardo Sebastian De Giacomo. **AGE:** Middle 20's. **HOME TOWN:** Brooklyn. **EDUCATION:** High school. **BACKGROUND:** Dick Roman broke into show business in 1944 as a child actor when he was cast as one of Mama's brood in the Broadway show, "I Remember Mama." Though he sang in his church choir and high school glee club, his early ambition was to become a commercial artist. Art was quickly set aside, however, when he won first prize three times on a local TV talent show. Roman soon was making personal appearances and in 1954 was signed to a contract with a small label for which he recorded a tune called "How Many Others?" It wasn't a smash, but it did lead to night club and national TV bookings, and eventually to a recording contract with MGM Records. While appearing at a night club in 1958, Roman's act was caught by Liberace, who was looking for a male vocalist for his TV show. Roman was signed and appeared with Liberace for a full season. Since then he has cut some sides for Epic Records and now is pacted to the Harmon label.

LATEST SINGLE: "Theme From a Summer Place," on Harmon Records, moving up steadily on the Hot 100. This week the disk inches into No. 84 slot.

BENT FABRIC
(Atco)



REAL NAME: Bent Fabricius-Bjerre. **AGE:** Middle 30's. **HOME:** Denmark. **BACKGROUND:** Bent Fabric is head of Metronome Records in Denmark, and, in addition to his executive responsibilities, he is also a successful a.&r. man, composer, pianist and TV personality. As a teen-ager, Fabric had his own jazz band which recorded some of the early Danish jazz records, but soon he went over to the pop field. When in 1950 the Sweden-based Metronome organization started to expand to other European countries, Fabric became chief of the operation in Denmark. During this time he had been composing pop songs, writing movie scores and playing the piano, though his public appearances outside of TV have been infrequent in recent years. Sometimes called the Danish Perry Como — with a cigarette dangling in the corner of his mouth — Fabric's relaxed piano styling seems to be in great favor with the Royal Danish family and he has performed at the Royal Palace in Copenhagen on several occasions.

LATEST SINGLE: "Alley Cat," spinning on the Atco label, is moving up swiftly on the Hot 100 and captures the No. 54 slot this week as a Star Performer.

'MUSICAL CHAIRS' BIT

WINS Shuffle Not Seen Hitting D.J.'s

NEW YORK — The expected "musical chairs" got under way at WINS here last week following its purchase by the Westinghouse Broadcasting Company recently.

Walter A. (Wally) Schwartz was named to the newly created post of assistant general manager and Arthur Harrison was named sales manager. Both appointments were made by Mark Olds, who last week replaced Ted Steele as general manager of the outlet.

Whether additional appointments are on the way is a matter of conjecture. A WBC official said: "It's all in the process of being straightened out."

Westinghouse has said nothing about programming changes, but the chain is expected to take at least nominal steps toward softening WINS' rock and roll sound.

Westinghouse already has indicated it plans to bring in its news operation — replacing Mutual — and institute more discussion and service-type programs. The feeling seems to be that no major shuffles are planned among station deejays.

Chief interest in the trade centers around Murray (The K) Kaufman, whose classic teen rock-roll segment in the evening is currently the top-rated show in the city.

A Westinghouse official noted that Kaufman has a contract with the station, that he's considered a valuable and important property, and that there is little likelihood of the chain wanting to upset this relationship. He wouldn't rule out the possibility of a change in Kaufman's time-slot, however.

Schwartz has been the national radio sales manager for Westing-

★★★★ **CHARLES K. L. DAVIS SINGS SONGS FROM THE MAGIC ISLANDS** Decca DL 4276 (M); DL 74276 (S)—Himself a Hawaiian, Charles K. L. Davis, has a natural insight into and feeling for the music of his native State. Possessed of an outstanding classical voice, he bends it here to popular-styled renditions of a group of island songs that include "On the Beach at Waikiki," "Lovely Hula Hands," "Little Grass Shack" and "Song of the Islands." This is his second collection of Hawaiian songs.

★★★★ **WE SPEAK THE SAME LANGUAGE** James Shigeta. Choro A-7 (M); AS-7 (S)—Leading man of the films "Bridge to the Sun" and "Flower Drum Song," Hawaiian-born James Shigeta has also won a following from TV and night club appearances. In his first LP, he sings a group of romantic ballads and shows a voice which has a certain intimate appeal to which younger female buyers are likely to respond. The songs, while not among the best known standards, all are attractive and make for a relatively fresh repertoire.

★★★★ **FORTY FABULOUS FINGERS VOL. II** The Original Piano Quartet. Decca DL 10055 (M); DL 710055 (S)—The success of the first stereo LP featuring the Original (nee first) Piano Quartet has encouraged Decca to follow up with another. This should emulate or perhaps surpass sales of the initial release, for the group plays some very popular selections with verve and style. Works include the "Blue Danube," Liszt's "La Campanella," Padarewski's "Minuet" and a Chopin nocturne, among others.

★★★★ **IN THE DUCHIN MANNER** Peter Duchin. Decca DL 4291 (M); DL 74291 (S)—Twelve highly listenable tracks here from the pianist who, stylistically, is following closely in the footsteps of his late father. The album should appeal to listeners who like their music straight and unadorned, with a heavy accent on melody and a danceable society beat. The pianist is supported by a medium-sized orchestra. The material is drawn from the standard repertoire. "My Kind of Girl," "Witchcraft," "Gigi," "Love for Sale" and "Easy to Love" are indicative of the material.

★★★★ **THE ROMANTIC SOUNDS OF TOOTS THIELEMANS** MGM E 4014 (M); SE 4014 (S)—A delightful set of standard melodies played by harmonica virtuoso Toots Thielemans. The instrumentalist is backed throughout the album by voices, strings and rhythm. Most of the tracks are taken at a leisurely ballad tempo. "Stairway to the Stars," "Long Ago," "This Is Always" and "Stranger in Paradise" are representative examples.

★★★★ **GREAT WALTZES FROM GILBERT AND SULLIVAN** Philip Green and his Orchestra. Riverside RLP 7530 (M); RLP 7530 (S)—Gilbert and Sullivan are perhaps best known for their cute operettas and catchy lyrics. All this overshadows the fact that Sir Arthur Sullivan wrote some very danceable music

He is surrounded by Coleman Hawkins, tenor sax; Eddie Costa or Hank Jones, piano, and George Duvivier, bass, for unique blowing in two, three and four-man groups. "Take the 'A' Train," "Lean On Me" and "Cherokee" are excellent and imaginative tracks.

COUNT BASIE AND THE KANSAS CITY 7



Impulse A 15 (M); AS 15 (S)—Here's one for Basie buffs. The Count's inimitable piano, so often lost to the general listener in the shouting big band sound, comes forth eloquently here. In addition, the top soloists in the band form a throbbing small group that plays with taste, tight unison and swing. Thad Jones contributes great trumpet, Frank Wess, Eric Dixon and Frank Foster cover the reed work and the rhythm section is in great form. "Lady Be Good," "I Want a Little Girl" and "Tally Ho Mr. Basie" are all fine tracks.

IN THE BAG



Nat Adderley Sextet. Jazzland JLP 75 (M); JLP 975 (S)—Nat Adderley, Cannonball Adderley and three young performers from New Orleans spark this down-home, soulfully swinging recording. The young men from New Orleans are Nat Perrilliat on tenor, Ellis Marsalis on piano and James Black on drums. They acquit themselves creditably here, but the honors are borne off by Nat Adderley and Cannonball, with some of Nat's best work heard here. Outstanding tracks are "In the Bag," "R.S.V.P." and "Mozart-in."

YOUNG IDEAS



The "J.F.K." Quintet. Riverside RLP 9424 (S)—The J.F.K. Quintet, named for the President, are making a name for themselves on their own new frontier. This is the second album from the label featuring the young and adventurous Washington group, and they show again on this set that they can handle avant-garde music and soulful stuff with élan. The group has its own sound and style and it's exciting and fresh. The best tracks on the album include "S.D.D.S.," "Coltrane Lane" and "Golden Earrings." Salable wax for the young jazz fan.

HEROIC MUSIC FOR ORGAN, BRASS AND PERCUSSION



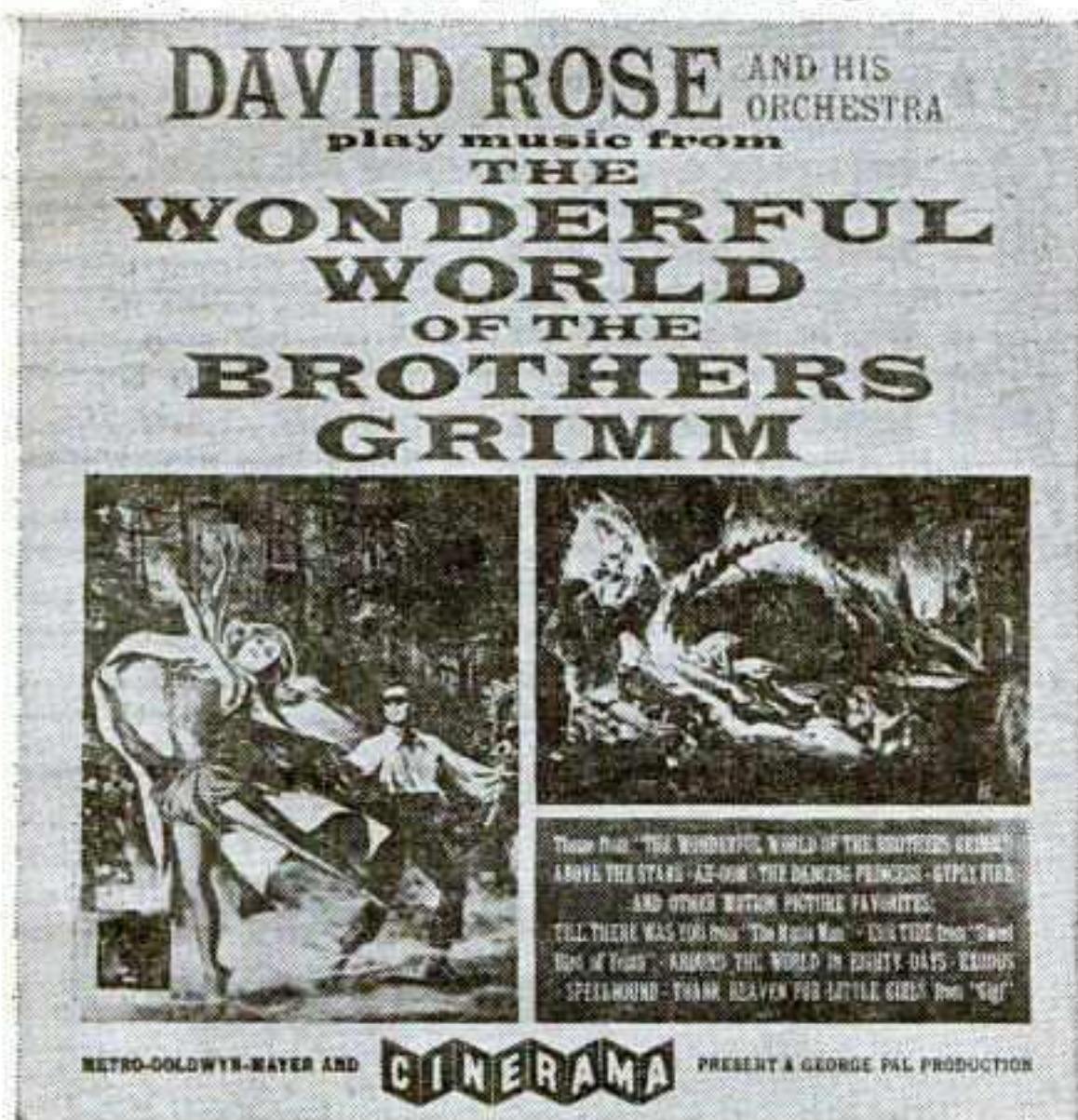

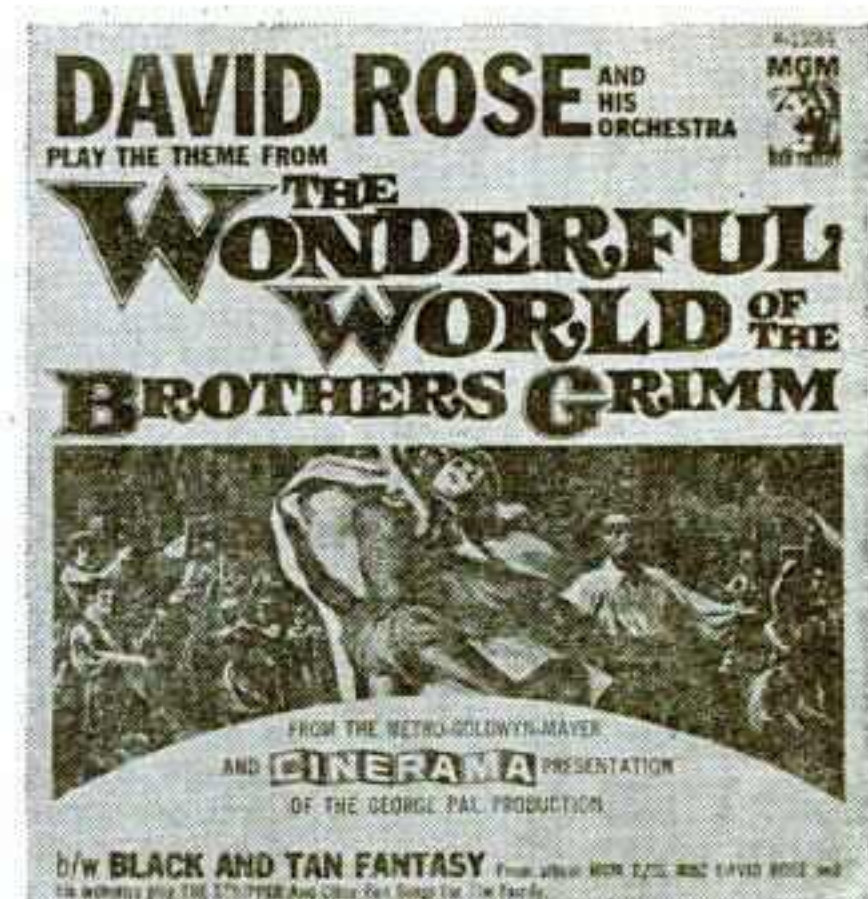

Stereo recording of the race with cars racing from one speaker to another and running commentary and interviews add to the excitement. One feature is a pit argument, in two or three languages, over a rule infraction. Set should sell as previous racing albums have.

Spiritual

I BELIEVE
 Marv Johnson, United Artists. UAL 3187 (M); UAS 6187 (S)—Here's a really powerful gospel-spiritual package. The album features Marv Johnson singing 12 imposing inspirational tracks. The material ranges from the moving "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot" to the spirited "He's Got the Whole World in His Hands." The backing is smartly done with a large choral group, strong rhythm, sweeping organ and unique use of trumpets and other instruments. Album should sell well in gospel areas.

Children

SNOW WHITE AND ROSE RED
 Celia Johnson, Wonderland RLP 1472—"Snow White and Rose Red" is a delightful story, nevertheless it is one of those fables which has been less favored by diskings than many others. The all-British cast here performs the work in highly animated fashion, and the score of songs contributed by orkster Cyril Orndel and lyrics by David Croft are tops. Rex Graham is fine as the narrator here. Side two contains actress Celia Johnson in a narration of "The Goose Girl," an equally charming story, also boasting an effective score by Orndel and Croft.

LITTLE WOMEN AND LITTLE MEN

Evelyn Laye and Anna Massey, Wonderland RLP 1473—A remarkable coupling of children's classics. On side one, there is the condensation (the work of Robert Cabot) into 20 minutes' playing time of the Louisa May Alcott classics, "Little Women" and "Little Men." With an excellent British cast, headed by Evelyn Laye. On side two, Miss Massey (daughter of actor Raymond Massey) becomes the heroine of "Daddy Long Legs," the fascinating story of an orphan with the mysterious benefactor who sends her to college. In both these works Cyril Orndel and David Croft collaborated on the music and lyrics.

THE TALE OF PETER RABBIT AND THE TALE OF BENJAMIN BUNNY

Vivien Leigh, Wonderland RLP 2434, 2457—Both these fine editions of classics by Beatrix Potter have been on the market for quite a spell. Now they are re-released with the same covers as before, but with the important addition of original text and color drawings included as a bound-in supplement, inside the new, bookfold packaging. Kiddies, particularly the younger ones, will love these stories as they always have, and the addition of the illustrated story book, to look at while listening, will furnish a lot of extra sales impetus.

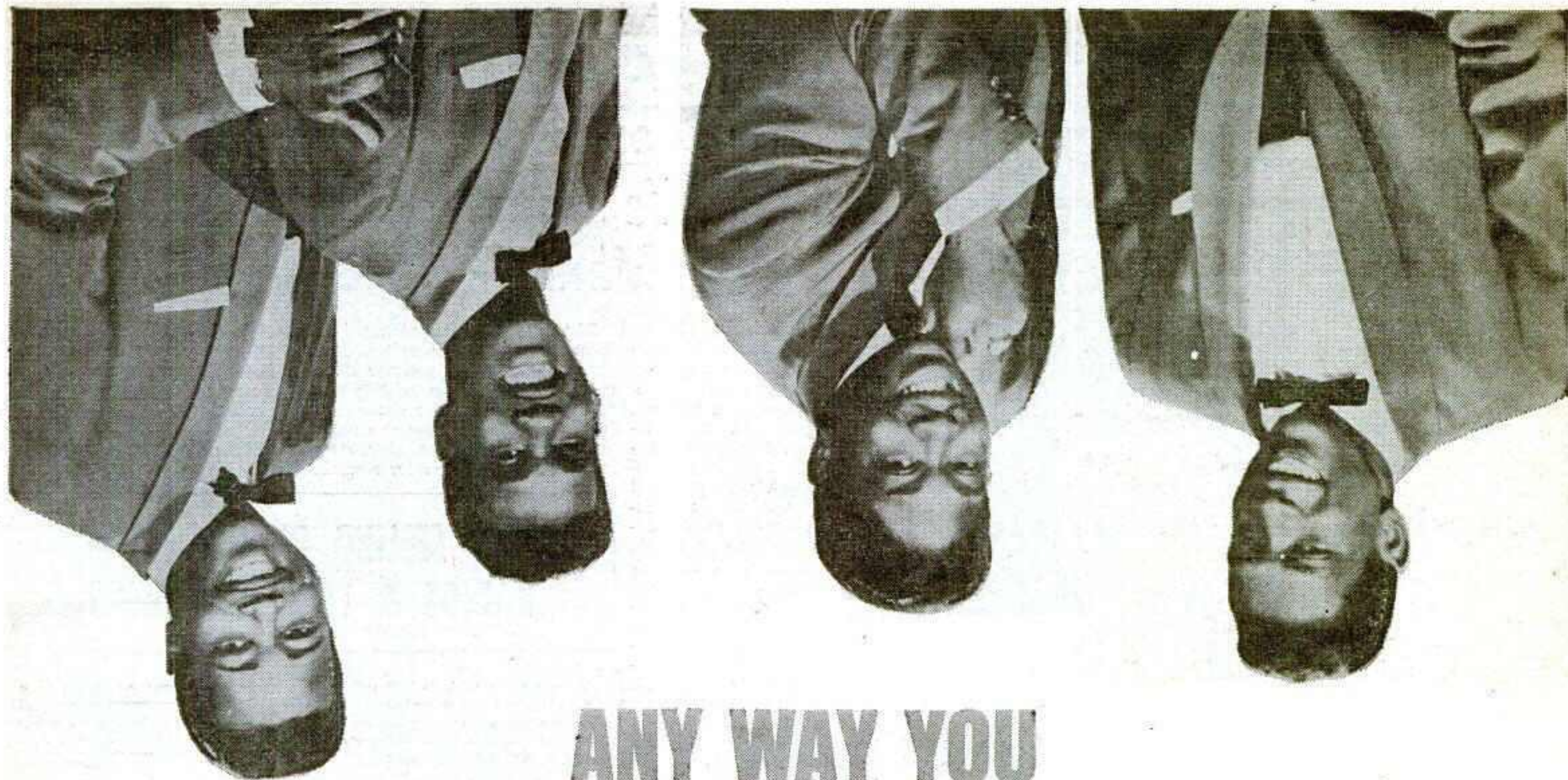

'LESS THAN 26 POUNDS'

New 3-M's Tape Recorder-Playback Features Versatility, Compactness

NEW YORK — Revere Camera Company, a subsidiary of Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Company (3-M's), introduced a new compact, full-stereo, two and four-track, reel-to-reel tape recorder last week. The press showing was held at New York's exclusive 21 restaurant, and employed the services of NBC Music Director Skitch Henderson in demonstrating the versatility of the unit.

J. C. (Jake) Landen, Revere's marketing director, pointed out that the new unit, called the Wollensak 1580, is one of the first truly portable, high quality recorder-playback sets to hit the market. It weighs "less than 26 pounds," and measures a compact 11¼ by 10¼ by 6½ inches. It records and plays back in both two and four-track, stereo and monaural, and carries playing speeds of 3¾ and 7½ i.p.s.

Only Four Controls

The unit has only four controls for ease of operation, and is housed in a highly styled cabinet, both features designed to appeal to milady.

Other features include matched dual record and playback pre-amplifiers, dual 11-watt amplifiers and dual built-in speakers. The unit is also equipped to play back through extension speakers and hi-fi systems.

Landen also noted that the 1580 can record on stereo or mono tapes from mikes, speaker terminals of radios, phonos or TV sets or from tape outputs of hi-fi amplifiers or tuners can be used with FM multiplex. There are also separate tone and volume controls for each channel.

Other Features

Two of the most important features of the unit are the ability to use one amplification channel as a public address system, and the "Record-on-record" feature.

The latter was demonstrated by Henderson, who showed how it is possible to record a separate channel of sound over an existing pre-recording on the other channel. It is also possible to erase one channel without erasing the other, making the unit adaptable for amateur

musicians to play along with orks or combos already on tape.

There is also a safety lock that prevents accidental erasure of a track. Suggested list price is \$379. Units will be in camera, hi-fi and department stores almost immediately.

**3-M'S TAPE CARTRIDGE
TO GET FIELD TEST**

NEW YORK — A new tape cartridge recorder-playback device will be field-tested in a major U. S. market before the end of the year by the Revere Camera Company, a subsidiary of the Minnesota Mining and Manufacturing Company.

At a special press showing Wednesday (1) of a new Wollensak, reel-to-reel portable tape machine, 3-M's Executive Vice-President Bert S. Cross said that contrary to reports circulating earlier in the week, the firm was not going to demonstrate the cartridge machine at that time.

Termining reports of imminent marketing of the new cartridge unit as erroneous, Cross did say that national marketing of the new tape cartridge system "will begin next year."

The test city has not yet been selected, Cross said, adding, "We want to make our plans well known in advance because the tape cartridge system is likely to have far-reaching effect on the tape recorders-music industry." Cross also noted that 3-M Revere will continue marketing a complete line of reel-to-reel tape recorders even after the cartridge system becomes available.

"In many respects," he said, "our position is similar to that of the auto industry in the early 1950's when automatic transmissions first started to become popular. In those years, car makers continued to produce standard shift cars in great volume, while supplying a lesser number with automatic transmissions. In other words, the auto industry didn't stop manufacturing standard shift cars when automatic transmission appeared."

"In the tape industry, we feel that reel-to-reel and tape cartridge units both offer the consumer certain advantages and that we must supply products in both areas."

**What Exhibs

Fair Patrons**

CHICAGO—Seven new exhibitors for the upcoming Chicago World's Fair of Music were announced last week. The Fair will take place August 31 to September 9 at McCormick Place here.

Revere will show its line of monaural and stereo tape equipment, including the firm's brand new tape cartridge player. Sampson will show its complete line of Hitachi transistor radios and tape recorders as well as a line of AM and FM table and portable radios. Packard Bell will demonstrate its line of stereo phonos, radios and TV sets.

Motorola will include in its exhibit its line of TV sets, stereo phonos, car radios and portable transistor radios.

Columbia C3L22—An exquisite set that should appeal to the historically minded jazz collector. The late Miss Bailey, one of the really great singers, is presented here in a series of three LP's which chart some of the highlights of her career. The material has been culled from the Columbia vaults by John Hammond and features the songstress with a wide variety of ork and combos; Benny Goodman, Teddy Wilson, Eddie Sauter, Red Norvo orks provide some of the backings. There are some superb performances on this set.

THE SOUND OF INSPIRATION



Bill Brown Choir, Choro A-8 (M); AS-8 (S)—An LP of exceptional quality in this category of product. The Bill Brown Choir sings with a thrilling modern sound, yet also with reverence. Most of this must be attributed to the dynamic direction of the group's leader, who also composed five of the selections and arranged the others. Latter, including "Whole World in His Hands," "Swing Low" and "Sometimes I Feel Like a Motherless Child," all have a fresh sound. But the originals such as "Hallelujah" and "Psalm 23" are truly outstanding and should create a stir among buyers of religious disks.

A CHILD'S INTRODUCTION TO SHAKESPEARE



Various Artists, Wonderland RLP 1464—Unique among children's records, this LP offers some excerpts from Shakespeare's plays that are apt to interest children and excite their imaginations. Narrator Mary Dirks, who also acts in the excerpts, sets the stage in a manner which makes listeners anticipate the dramatic excerpts, which are from "Taming of the Shrew," "Hamlet," "Romeo and Juliet," "As You Like It" and "Merchant of Venice." Strongly recommended as a gift item for children.

Philip Green, popular English ork leader, has taken just such a selection and scored it for his huge concert ork with very appealing results. The cover, too, is a classic in early-English print design. Featured are waltzes from "The Mikado," "Pirates of Penzance," "The Gondoliers," "Patience," and many others.

★★★★ DANCING ON BROADWAY TO THE MUSIC OF RICHARD RODGERS
Harry Arnold and his Ork, Riverside RLP 7531 (M); RLP 97531 (S) — Harry Arnold has taken 12 Richard Rodgers songs—mostly from Rodgers' collaboration days with Lorenz Hart in the 1930's—and scored them for his large orchestra. Results are a fine instrumental album. Cover is an appealing collage of the titles of the plays from which the music was taken—a sure eye-catcher. Selections include: "Lover," "This Can't Be Love," "Blue Moon," "Dancing on the Ceiling," "My Funny Valentine."

★★★★ BARROOM GOLDEN FAVORITES BY (BIG) TINY LITTLE
Coral CRL 57407 (M); CRL 757407 (S)—If they don't sing in the barroom like they used to—it doesn't mean the songs have died. (Big) Tiny Little, who has more than a half-dozen albums of the oldie tunes to his credit, offers a new helping here. He's featured with his honky tonk piano, and the wild vocal and instrumental antics of Josephine and Tiny's entire group. Songs include "Beer Barrel Polka," "Wheel of Fortune," "Silver Dollar," "Sweet Violets," "Bill Bailey."

★★★★ MARGERIE PLAYS AGAIN
Ralph Margerie and his Ork, United Artists UAL 3223 (M); UAS 6223 (S)—Ralph Margerie and his big band are featured with an even dozen old standards—all ideal for dancing or just plain listening pleasure. Arrangements are by a pair of modernists, Manny Alban and Bill Potts, and the combination of the modern sound and the well-known Margerie ork makes an appealing package. Cover is an eye-catching shot of Margerie taking off on a solo with his boys in the background. Selections include "Laura," "Take the 'A' Train," "Theme From Carnival," "Moonlight in Vermont" and "Pennies From Heaven."

★★★★ ONE MORE TIME
Wild Bill Davis, Coral CRL 57417 (M); CRL 757417 (S)—The swinging organ work of Wild Bill Davis makes this a lively set that could sell across three markets, pop, r.&b. and jazz. He is backed by Grady Tate on drums and Calvin Newborn on guitar on most of the sides, a Latin rhythm section on others and tenor and harp on two others. But it's Davis' organ that sparks the record, which features such fine evergreens as "April in Paris," "Canadian Sunset," "Lisbon Antigua," "Midnight in Moscow" and "African Waltz."

★★★★ 50 YEARS OF DANCING
Hal Mooney and Ork, Mercury MG 20726 (M); SR 60726 (S)—Hal Mooney and his ork have come up with a foot-tapper here that should flip the dancing crowd. It starts with the "Turkey Trot" of 1911 and concludes with "The Twist" of 1961. In between, there are such dances as the merengue, the cha cha, the conga, the bunny hop, the rumba, the black bottom, etc. The ork plays them with zip and verve, and the sound is first-rate. This LP could be a lot of fun at a party.

★★★★ ALL STAR CAST
Various Artists, ABC-Paramount ABC 423 (M); ABCS 423 (S)—This all-star sampler from the label spotlights some of the first-rate artists in its catalog. Ray Charles, Lloyd Price, Ferrante and Teicher, Steve Lawrence, Paul Anka, and Brian Hyland's "Ginny Come Lately" are all included. Should move well for the label.

★★★★ MUSIC FROM OUTER SPACE
Frank Comstock, Warner Bros. W 1463 (M); WS 1463 (S)—There have been many "outer space" musical records, but this one is not only musically attractive but also contains a gimmicky collection of space sounds that add a nice touch to the recording. The arrangements are by Frank Comstock who also leads the ork here, and the songs are all fine standards. They sound new and attractive as packaged here, especially "Stella By Starlight," "When You Wish Upon a Star" and Comstock's own "On the Dark Side of the Moon" and "Journey to Infinity."

★★★★ MISTY MOOD
Sam (The Man) Taylor, Decca DL 4302 (M); DL 74302 (S) — Smooth and often pretty, breathy, blowing by Sam Taylor on tenor, helps make this routine background music set stand out above the normal run. Taylor turns in his own nicely styled solos on such tunes as "Come Rain or Come Shine," "When I Fall in Love," "Darn That Dream" and "Misty." Warm and haunting set should interest mood music fans.

★★★★ WALT MILLER'S HARMONICA STARS
United Artists UAL 3163 (M); UAS 6163 (S)—Walt Miller, a Swiss harmonica virtuoso, toured the country with the Minevitch Harmonica Rasenals, and gets his first chance here to show off his work leading his own combo. Sparked by Miller's solo work, the harmonica group runs through such standards as "Night and Day," "Sentimental Me," "The Man in Love" and "Sweet Georgia Brown" with feeling. Good wax for the many fans of harmonica.

★★★★ WHAT MORE CAN A WOMAN DO
Big Maybelle, Brunswick BL 754107—Here's some colorful singing by Big Maybelle on a group of familiar standards. She shows off her big voice, her bluesy styling and her excitement on such items as "Cry," "I'll Close My Eyes" and "Candy." She is ably backed here by chorus and ork who play the intriguing arrangements with feeling. Good item for blues and pop followers of the thrush.

★★★★ SWINGIN' DOWN THE RIVER
Grady Martin and the Slewfoot Five, Decca DL 4286 (M); DL 74286 (S)—Here's a set that's much in the pop groove, yet it can also appeal to Martin's many fans in the country field. The bouncy band with the alto sax lead is heard, well-recorded, on tunes having a loose connection with the idea of "river,"—that is tunes like "Moon River," "Swanee River," "River Stay 'Way From My Door," "Beautiful Ohio," etc. Fans will like.

★★★★ GOLDEN OPERA FAVORITES
Jesse Crawford, Decca DL 4301 (M); DL 74301 (S)—Jesse Crawford died just a few weeks ago, and it is possible that this last album, may thus take on some of the characteristics of a memorial package, in the minds of buyers. Some of the most delightful melodies of all are recreated here from the opera repertoire. These include "Berceuse" from "Jocelyn," "Meditation" from "Thais," "Barcarolle" from "Tales of Hoffman," and the lovely "Intermezzo" from "Cavalleria Rusticana." Recording was performed on the Simonton Grande Wur-litzer Pipe Organ.

★★★★ RHAPSODY BY CANDLELIGHT
Liberace, Coral CRL 57395 (M); CRL 757395 (S)—Liberace sticks strictly to his piano here, and turns in a pleasant program of instrumental mood music. There are movie songs, several tunes of which the artist himself is the writer, and other selections, borrowed from the classics of Debussy, Liszt, Chopin, Schubert, Rachmaninoff.

★★★★ SAMMY KAYE PLAYS SWING AND SWAY

Decca DL 4306 (M); DL 74306 (S)—This album bears the distinct Sammy Kaye stamp, and in fact, except for the excellent sound quality of the stereo age, could have been made 20 years ago, so identical is the approach here to the Sammy Kaye bands of old. The familiar swing and sway rhythms go along with the equally familiar singing title and vocalist introductions, plus the treatment of such agreeable repertoire as "It's the Talk of the Town," "Angry," "Maybe You'll Be There," "P. S. I Love You," and others. A solid nostalgia set.

★★★★ COLLEGE SONGS EVERYBODY KNOWS

Jan Garber and his Ork. Decca DL 4319 (M); DL 74319 (S)—Here's an album well keyed to the fall market period. It features the familiar dance band sound of Jan Garber applied to a collection of college football marching tunes from Princeton, Georgia Tech, Yale, Wisconsin, Harvard, Notre Dame, USC, Michigan, Ohio State, Washington and Lee and others. The tracks are danceable and a good many folks will probably find they make good sing-along accompaniment.

★★★★ THE BEST OF JOLSON (2-12")

Decca DXA 169—All of these tracks have, of course, been out before, but they can generate attention all over again as

part of this two-LP set of the most famous items identified with the beloved Jolie. The 28 songs include "Swanee," "Toot Toot Tootsie," "Sonny Boy," "California Here I Come," "Mammy," "Margie," "April Showers" and "About a Quarter to Nine," to mention a few. The book-fold package contains some action photos inside of Jolson at work.

★★★★ THE WILDEST MUSIC FROM THE WILDEST PARTY EVER FILMED

Leith Stevens and Ork. Colpix CP 427 (M); SCP 427 (S)—The covers, both front and back, will sell this set as fast as the material in the grooves. The picture is about a wild party, at which a quiet reserved nurse, bursts out of her inhibitions at a rather orgiastic interns' party, in the film, "The Interns." The nurse (a comely one at that) is generously pictured on the cover. The 12 tracks (four by Stu Phillips and eight by Leith Stevens) are not of the normal, moody, background type, but rather, they're all danceable items as tempos ranging from Twist to cha cha, etc. The band arrangements do sparkle and many would find this a good dance set, as well as a conversation piece due to its cover.

★★★★ MUSIC MADE FAMOUS BY GLENN MILLER

Eberle, Bencke, Modernaires. Warner Bros. W 1468 (M) WS 1468 (S)—Here's the second Warner's album by this group of well known Glenn Miller alumni. This set was recorded live at the Sahara, Las Vegas, with the Tex Beneke-batoned band doing a good job in the emulation of the original Miller arrangements of "Tuxedo Junction," "Elmer's Tune," "Sunrise Serenade," "Santa Fe Trail," etc. Ray Eberle, the smooth sounding baritone; Bencke himself, and the Modernaires all have much the same quality as they did in the original days of the Miller band 25 years ago, and their performances here should bring a lot of pleasure to the "over-35" group.

THE MAGIC TOUCH
Tadd Dameron and His Ork. Riverside RLP 9419 (S)—This new album by composer-arranger Tadd Dameron, his first in some time, is filled with bright swing and a soft loveliness—something recently developed by the writer. His works are played by a big band made up of top stars; Bill Evans, Clark Terry, Johnny Griffin and Philly Joe Jones are just a few. Dameron, one of the top arrangers in the early bop style, shows much grace and his tight ensemble sound trade-mark throughout the LP. "Our Delight" and "Fontainebleau" are two of the better known tracks while "Just Plain Talkin'" and "Dial B for Beauty" are exceptional examples of the new lushness. A top-flight set.

THE KERRY DANCERS AND OTHER SWINGING FOLK
Johnny Griffin Quartet. Riverside RLP 9420 (S)—On the eight tracks in this LP, tenor saxist Griffin peruses folk melodies old and new. One side is devoted to modern jazz interpretations of evergreen material like "The Kerry Dancers" and "Londonderry Air," while the flip presents newly written tunes that contain the disarming simplicity of folk songs. Each is handled with expertness by Griffin and the set is well paced, featuring up-tempo, medium-tempo and ballad interpretations. Barry Harris is featured on piano.

LOW FLAME
Sonny Stitt. Jazzland JLP 71 (M); JLP 971 (S)—Sonny Stitt is featured here in a format that should score with a good many jazz fans. He is featured playing alto and tenor sax with organ and guitar accompaniment—a type of instrumentation that has proved profitable for Jimmy Smith and many others. The album has swing and mood and Stitt receives good support from Don Patterson, organ; Paul Weedon, guitar, and Billy James, drums. "Donald Duck," "Close Your Eyes" and "Low Flame" are top tracks.

MAN WITH A HAPPY SOUND
Joe Carroll. Charlie Parker RLP 802—A swing album from the singer here. Carroll has been rather inactive on the recording scene for the last few years, but this set has solid pulse and that happy feeling. He is backed by a fullsome quartet led by Specs Williams, organ; Connie Lester, tenor sax, and Grant Green, guitar. The singer does some of his most famous tunes (performed while he was with Dizzie Gillespie some years ago) plus some fine new stuff.

KING LOUIS
Louis Armstrong and the All Stars. Decca DL 4245 (M); DL 74245 (S)—The music here is Dixieland, and King Louis is as solid an exponent of the art as ever. He's featured here with a number of old arrangements by Sy Oliver and Bob Haggart. Songs—some with Louis playing, some singing, include "High Society," "Some of These Days," "When You're Smiling," "Them There Eyes," etc.

THERE IS NOTHING LIKE A DAME
Pete and Conte Candoll. Warner Bros. W 1462 (M); WS 1462 (S)—The popular jazz trumpets of Pete and Conte Candoll are featured here with a group made up of such other jazz names as Shelly Manne, Howard Roberts, Gary Peacock, John Williams and Jimmy Rowles. Selections all have a girl in the title and the cover has seven lively ones jumping around. Tunes include "There's Nothing Like a Dame (Amen)," "Diane," "Gigi," "Margie," "Candy" and "Georgia on My Mind."

ALICE IN WONDERLAND
Cyril Ritchard. Wonderland RLP 2406—Colorfully bound, with eight pages of large-print text and color drawings, this package offers two pleasing excerpts from the complete "Alice in Wonderland," as read by Cyril Ritchard. The contents include the Mad Tea Party on one side, and the "Lobster Quadrille" on the other. A very charming gift item that will please most youngsters and which dealers can suggest for younger listeners.

A CHILD'S INTRODUCTION TO THE INSTRUMENTS OF THE ORCHESTRA
Sinfonia of London (Cooper) Wonderland RLP 2443—Recorded in Great Britain, this first view of orchestral instruments is delivered with the assistance of a commentary by Joseph Cooper which is very elementary in approach and thus suitable for quite young children. A dozen instruments are covered on one side of the disk, while the other is given over completely to a history of the piano and its keyboard predecessors. Large illustrations of the instruments are provided on eight album-sized pages wound into the package.

THE WONDERFUL WONDERLAND OF NURSERY RHYMES
Anthea Askey with the Westminster Concert Ork. Wonderland RLP 1475—A whole flock of nursery rhymes are done here by a whole toybox full of toys and animals, all with distinctly British accents. Narrator Anthea Askey is highly effective as she leads the children on the tour of singing toys. "I Love Little Pussy," "Old King Cole," "Tweedledum and Tweedledee," are a few of the many songs performed. The disk is unusually good for kiddies in terms of the animal sound effects, performed by Percy Edwards.

LET'S MAKE MUSIC
Ann Callender and Margaret Harmsworth. Wonderland RLP 1474—An interesting experiment in the sugar-coated pill department, in which the children are taught the basics of music and rhythm, by playing a simple game, and without being aware they're being taught. Miss Callender has a pleasant British way about her (she has been featured on the BBC in kiddie shows) and she is assisted here by Margaret Harmsworth, who wrote the script and plays the piano in the background. Some kids will like it, but others, with short spans of attention, may get restless at the slow movement.

COUNTRY GOES TO TOWN
Claude Gray. Mercury MG 20718 (M) SR 60718 (S)—Claude Gray brings the unique honesty and earthy flavor, long associated with country music, to this selection of urban songs. Gray is a fine artist and he's backed with the typical piano-guitar-chorus sound generally associated with Nashville. A.k.r. man is Shelby Singleton, an old Nashville pro. Selections include "You Belong to Me," "Shrimp Boats," "Cry," "Too Young," "Mona Lisa" and "Just Walking in the Rain."

OFF HIS ROCKER
Pat Buttram. Warner Bros. W 1455 (M); WS 1455 (S)—Pat Buttram is a folksy humorist with a country-ish style of talking, and witty comments to make on various aspects of California living. He covers such subjects as "Teen-Agers," "San Fernando Valley," "Toys," "Human Nature," and his home town in Alabama with warm back porch humor. His comedy may not appeal to the hippies but it should prove pleasing to a lot of average folk, in large as well as small towns.

THE FAITH OF A MAN
Rex Allen. Mercury MG 20719 (M) SR 60719 (S)—Allen, through his tenure with various labels, has always had a most dedicated, sincere quality, and it was never more apparent than here. This program, recently recorded in Nashville, offers a collection of spirituals ("Ain't Gonna Study War No More"), sacred songs ("Precious Memories"), and hymns ("The Old Rugged Cross"). Allen's performance has a lot of warmth and soul and he is fittingly accompanied by organ, guitar, rhythm and voices. Certainly rates an "A" for effort here and the set could easily draw sales.

Henri Rene and Ork. Decca DL 4269 (M); DL 74269 (S)—Henri Rene plays the musette accordion, that peculiarly French instrument and brings forth authentic-sounding renditions of a group of songs associated with France in the public mind. Tunes like "Under Paris Skies," "J'Attendrai," "C'Est Si Bon," "Paris in the Spring" and Cole Porter's "Paris Loves Lovers" are included. Rene is an accomplished arranger and band leader, and his skill is shown in the deft handling of this collection.

ROBERTINO
Kapp KL 1293—This young lad has a big following overseas and followers of European (especially Italian) should find this set to their liking. The album is composed primarily of familiar material sung in the lads native language. Backings include string ork and chorus. Brahms' "Lullaby," "Oh My Pa Pa," "La Paloma," Schubert's "Serenade" and "Tell Me That You Love Me" are some of the fine tracks.

AMORI D'ALIRI TEMPI
Emilio Pericolo. Vesuvius VLP 4404—International music fans should find this album very much to their liking. The set has been reissued from the Vesuvius line and should score with Italian-American fans, and maybe some pop fans too, who will remember the artist from his "Rome Adventure" hit recording. The tunes are all easy, romantic ballads sung with style and in Italian. Strings accompany

NOSTALGIA
Nilo Ossani. Vesuvius LP 1301—The label should have extended success with this reissue of familiar Italian tunes. Set was re-released to cash in on new MGM distribution and features some top Italian stars like Auriello Fierro, Ruggero Cori, Marino Marini, and Bruno Rosettani.

GIRANDO PER L'ITALIA
Various Artists. Vesuvius LP 1302—Here are 12 songs native to various regions of Italy—sung by a variety of Italian artists, male and female, in Italian. In fact, the sides were recorded in Italy by Durium. The artists are backed by a fine, large ork. Arrangements are very beautifully and tastefully done. Very listenable music. Selections: "Venticello De Roma," "Voca Colola," "Eh' Siciliana," "Bella Bologna," "Piemontesina."

CHILDREN'S

A CHILD'S INTRODUCTION TO SQUARE DANCING
Pinte Pete and His Freedomland Band. Wonderland RLP 1463—Very attractively played, a group of favorite square dances are rendered in a manner which should appeal to almost any child and quite a few grownups as well. Even though some of the instructions are not too explicit, this disk would be very popular at parties of youngsters, especially if played with some adult supervision. From the standpoint of music, it is a particularly pleasing release.

THE FIRST CHRISTMAS
Dame Edith Evans. Wonderland RLP 1469—Dame Edith Evans tells the Christmas story for young listeners with an appropriate musical background of carols sung by the Chorleywood College Blind Children's Choir of England. On the reverse side of the LP, six Christmas songs are sung by four choral groups. A worthy first contact with the Christmas story for children.

See Europe Flipping for U. S. Bingo

By OMER ANDERSON

COLOGNE—An expanding European market for U. S. bingo games is predicted by Continental trade sources.

West Germany, Italy and Austria appear to offer a large potential market for U. S. bingos.

German trade sources are highly optimistic at the moment, their optimism stemming largely from a decision of the court at Dortmund, in the Ruhr, that a bingo is not a gambling machine in the sense of German legislation.

This decision is taken by the trade to signal the all-clear for bingo operation in West Germany. Italy has no strong legal objections to bingos, and Austria, it is learned, is permitting the almost wide-open entry of bingos despite a token ban.

Trade sources predict that Austria shortly will remove the bingo barriers, officially and finally. Meanwhile bingos are entering Austria without difficulty.

See Loophole

Belgium has given notice that bingos will be banned effective January 1, 1963. However, the trade is not convinced that this ukase is necessarily final and irrevocable.

There is strong pressure on Parliament to cancel the ban and, instead, try to get agreement among the political parties on a realistic bingo law that will legalize the machines with regulation satisfactory to all concerned.

The problem is difficult, but the trade is betting that it can solve it. Despite the legal problem, bingos have an enormous following in

Belgium, far too great in trade opinion to ignore in outlawing the machines.

It is assumed, moreover, that the Dortmund court's decision will have strong impact on the Belgian attitude.

Bingos are still banned in France, but even there the trade is sanguine about obtaining a reversal of the ban. The French trade currently is embarked on a mammoth public relations drive which is expected to help acceptance of bingos.

Trade surveys indicate that West Germany and Italy alone could provide a huge market for U. S. bingos. Both countries are untapped markets, and both countries cotton to bingo-type games.

Payouts Popular

The best evidence of the potential German market for bingos is suggested by the payout success in this country. At the peak, about 1957, there were 250,000 payout machines sited in West Germany.

The count has skidded sharply since then, now down to about 150,000. But even with this decline, the payout is a tremendous trade factor. Many German juke box operators claim it is only pay-

out operation that keeps them afloat.

German trade surveys suggest that the payout decline is caused by saturation of the market, diminishing patron interest, and growing public resistance.

Bingos could capture the changing German mood toward the payout, and, fortified by the Dortmund court decision, it could create for itself an image of respectability. Such, at any rate, is trade reasoning here.

Bingo's burden in Italy is the pinball machine, which suffers a guilt-by-association stigmatization. Pinball foes succeeded in pinning blame on the machines for juvenile delinquency in areas where young roisterers established hangouts at pinball sites. The pinball ban has been eased for private premises, but the machines are still banned in public locations.

There is no such ban on bingos, however, and the Italian trade believes a bingo boom could be promoted easily, albeit with decorous promotion. Trade experts calculate that Italy could absorb 50,000 bingos over the next four years, given the Italian economic boom.

BMW NAMES BIRO MIDWEST EDITOR

NEW YORK — Nicholas Biro, Billboard Music Week Radio-TV Programming Editor, this week was promoted to the post of Midwest Editor. In making the announcement, BMW Editor Sam Chase said that in his new post, Biro would headquarter in the Chicago office of BMW, effective August 27.

The move brings Biro back to the scene of his labors over the past several years prior to his coming to New York for his present post. His new assignment results from studies made by BMW on its coin machine and music editorial coverage needs in the vital Midwest area. His new position gives Biro greatly increased responsibilities over those he held when he last headquartered in Chicago as Midwest News Editor. As Midwest Editor, he will be BMW's executive representative on editorial matters in the Central States area, and will make regular trips to key markets in the area, in addition to his functions in the Chicago-land region.

PLAN HIGH COURT ACTION IF EASTLAND BILL PASSES

CHICAGO — Enactment of the Eastland Bill would be followed by a challenge of its constitutionality in the U. S. Supreme Court, BMW learned last week.

The action—which would be initiated by a key segment of the coin machine industry—would take the form of a petition for a declaratory judgment to be addressed directly to the High Court. The bill remains in a House-Senate conference committee to which it was assigned July 12 after Senate refusal to concur with amendments adopted in the House. Sen. Everett Dirksen (R., Ill.), minority leader of the Senate, is a member of the conference committee.

If passed, the bill would be in force 60 days after its approval by the President. No effort to invalidate the bill could be made until the effective date, it is surmised here. The section of the bill which would empower the Attorney General to determine the legality or illegality of equipment is expected to be a principal target of the action.

Also under attack would be the omission and exclusion of certain types of equipment from the provisions of the measure. The Constitution provides that all laws must have general application.

United Brings Out New Bowling Games With 7 Different Methods of Play

CHICAGO—Release of two new games—Action Shuffle Alley and Sahara Bowling Alley—was announced last week by United Manufacturing Company.

"The new equipment allows a choice of seven ways to play—special, dual, flash, flash regulation, bonus, spares and advance," said C. B. DeSelm, the firm's sales manager.

"Dual flash has strike values of 30, 40, 40, 50, 60 and 80; spare values of 20, 30, 40, 50 and 60. However, if a strike is not made and a second shot is required, the player has a chance to pick up 60 spare value."

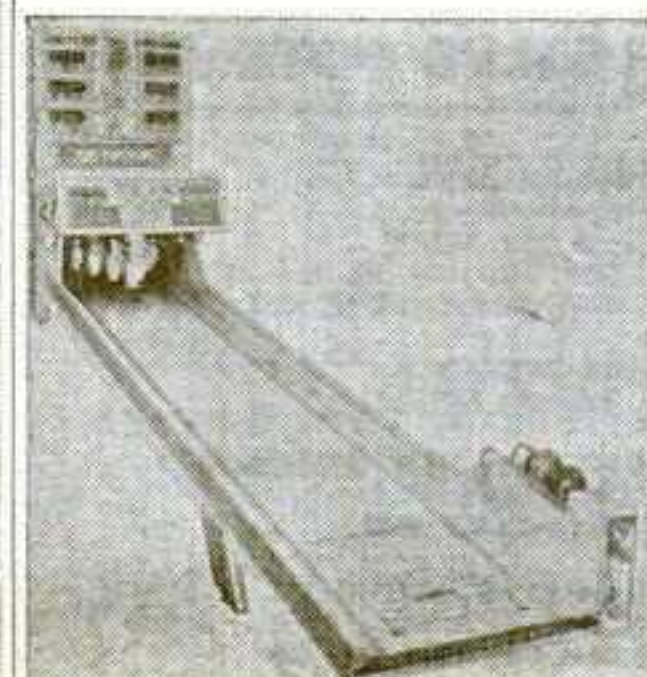
After each game, the player's choice reverts to regulation, with button control for a choice of the other six ways to play.

Action Shuffle Alley is the standard 8½-foot length. Sahara Bowling Alley has been made in 13-foot and 16-foot models with 4-foot or 8-foot sections available.

DeSelm also announced that two additional games — Shuffle Baseball and Silver (rolldown) are now in production.

Why Underwriters Back Off on Games

By JOE KLEIN

CHICAGO—Few, if any, American insurance companies would provide coverage today for coin-operated phonographs or games, the Insurance Information Institute revealed here last week.

At the same time, however, a spokesman for the Chicago office of Lloyd's of London disclosed that his firm would accept such business. But Lloyd's, of course, will insure anything—at a price.

Operators always have found it difficult to obtain insurance for their equipment.

Now that difficulty is almost insurmountable.

Coin-operated devices have become virtually uninsurable for several reasons, an Institute official pointed out.

One is that the equipment is too easily subject to vandalism.

Another is that it is accessible to anyone with tampering ideas.

No Control

Still another is that the insurance company has no control over locations. It was explained, for instance, that the machines could be placed in a building where the fire hazard is extraordinarily high. That, it was observed, suggests the problem the underwriters would have in trying to fix a rate.

A further reason that coin machines remain without insurance are the prohibitive rates quoted on the rare occasions an insurer consents to provide coverage.

The Institute spokesman said that the uninsurable status of equipment is in no way a reflection on the people in the industry.

"The very nature of the equipment rather than the people who own it make it a bad insurance risk," he said. "The machine re-

ceives money. Thus it offers a constant temptation to theft."

He admitted, too, that in determining a policy with respect to coin-operated equipment, insurance companies consider the problem connected with the fierce competition for locations.

Maintenance Factor

"Some of our people found that providing such coverage becomes a maintenance problem," he said. "The frequency of changes in locations and the almost continuing adjustment of rates and benefits make the matter economically unsound."

But the operator would find the famed Lloyd's of London more responsive to his insurance needs.

"We would consider writing such protection," said a Lloyd's company official at the Chicago office. "But, of course, we would do so only at the right rate."

Coin Games Have Sobering Influence, Tavern Man Says

CHICAGO — Coin-operated phonographs and games are serving the purposes of temperance and should not be loaded with fees and taxes, the head of the Illinois tavern owners' organization said last week.

Additionally, he observed, the income from coin equipment has become economically indispensable to the average liquor outlet.

"In point of fact," said George Ulrich, executive secretary of the Retail Liquor Dealers Association of Illinois, "the juke box and the games make a tavern the place of recreation it should be. The average person seeks more than alco-

holic beverages in a tavern. He seeks conviviality. And these machines are helping to give it to him."

Ulrich also thinks that coin devices are deterrents to excessive drinking.

Slows Intake

"The time people spend in playing the jukes or the games is time they don't spend in drinking," he said. "That is known to all observant tavern keepers and it is appreciated by all of them. The people in our business are opposed to excesses in drinking. We know that abuses are followed by repressive laws.

"So, even in such exceptional cases where coin equipment is of no economic importance to the tavern, it serves a good purpose in maintaining a proper atmosphere."

He said that the business relationship between the members of his Association and coin machine operators is of the best.

Help Tax Fight

Ulrich recalled that it was the Association which launched the recent suit to enjoin the Illinois Liquor Control Commission from penalizing holders of the \$250 federal stamp. Originally, the Association itself was the plaintiff in the case.

Subsequently, however, a court had ruled that the suit, to be valid, would have to be undertaken by a tavern keeper. That was done with the support of the Association. Upholding the Association's position, Superior Court Judge Donald S. McKinley ruled against the Commission.

"This thing had to be clarified," Ulrich said. "The federal govern-

ment comes along and taxes the equipment through the \$250 license. Then the State of Illinois comes along and taxes the machines again through a State license fee. Then, after all this, the State wants to put us out of business for complying with the laws of the nation and State."

Coin Machine Groups Set Fall Meeting Plans

CHICAGO — Three coin machine industry organizations are preparing for important fall meetings.

Directors of the National Vendors Association will meet October 14 at the Jack Tower Hotel in San Francisco, Donald Mitchell, the organization's attorney, announced here last week. NVA will also hold its regional meeting at the same time.

The National Coin Machine Distributors Association will convene for its annual meeting at the Morrison Hotel during the weekend after Thanksgiving, O. L. (Bob) Slifer, executive secretary, announced. The association will stage its show at the Sherman Hotel.

The full board and executive committee of Music Operators of America will meet October 12, 13 and 14 at the Morrison Hotel.

Robert H. Blundred, MOA's newly chosen managing director, will participate in the deliberations. Blundred will officially assume his responsibilities with MOA on August 15.

John Haley Buys Latham Route

EUPORA, Miss.—Jack Latham, owner of Latham Amusement Company, has sold his route of approximately 30 pieces to John Haley, owner of Haley Amusement Company, Canton, Miss., for a reported \$15,000 to \$20,000.

The purchase by Haley, an aggressive, energetic operator who has built up a lucrative operation from a small start, makes him one of the largest operators in the State.

Canton is a suburb of Jackson, the State capital. Haley has branch offices in Jackson and Durant.

Haley has phonograph and games routes and also a large cigaret vending route. He also operates a large wholesale tobacco warehouse.

Coin Industry Plans Active Role In Trade Display at Music Fair

CHICAGO—The coin machine industry will be actively represented in the World's Fair of Music and Sound which opens a 10-day run here on August 31.

The National Coin Machine Distributors Association will be among the participants in the trade and consumer exposition which will encompass all segments of the music and sound industry.

To be held in McCormick Place, the fair will exhibit electronic equipment in special sections of 200,000 square feet.

"Together, these expositions will comprise the largest, most comprehensive showing and demonstration of music and sound equipment ever made," said Aaron D. Cushman, fair president.

Also on the program are several business seminars for exploration of problems connected with various phases of the industry.

In hailing the participation of NCMDA, Cushman said that "the wholehearted support of the music and sound industry is most significant."

The firm had a net loss for the quarter of \$129,956, or 15 cents per share on 891,264 shares of common stock, compared to a loss of \$157,210 or 18 cents per share on 889,817 shares for the same period last year.

Sales for the first quarter, while better than a year ago, were less than projected earlier in the year, according to R. C. Roling, president.

Roling said he felt this reflected the general feeling of uncertainty on the part of a great many people concerning the future.

He noted, however, that Wurlitzer enjoyed a substantial pickup of business in July and that if the trend continues, the year as a whole should be satisfactory for the company.

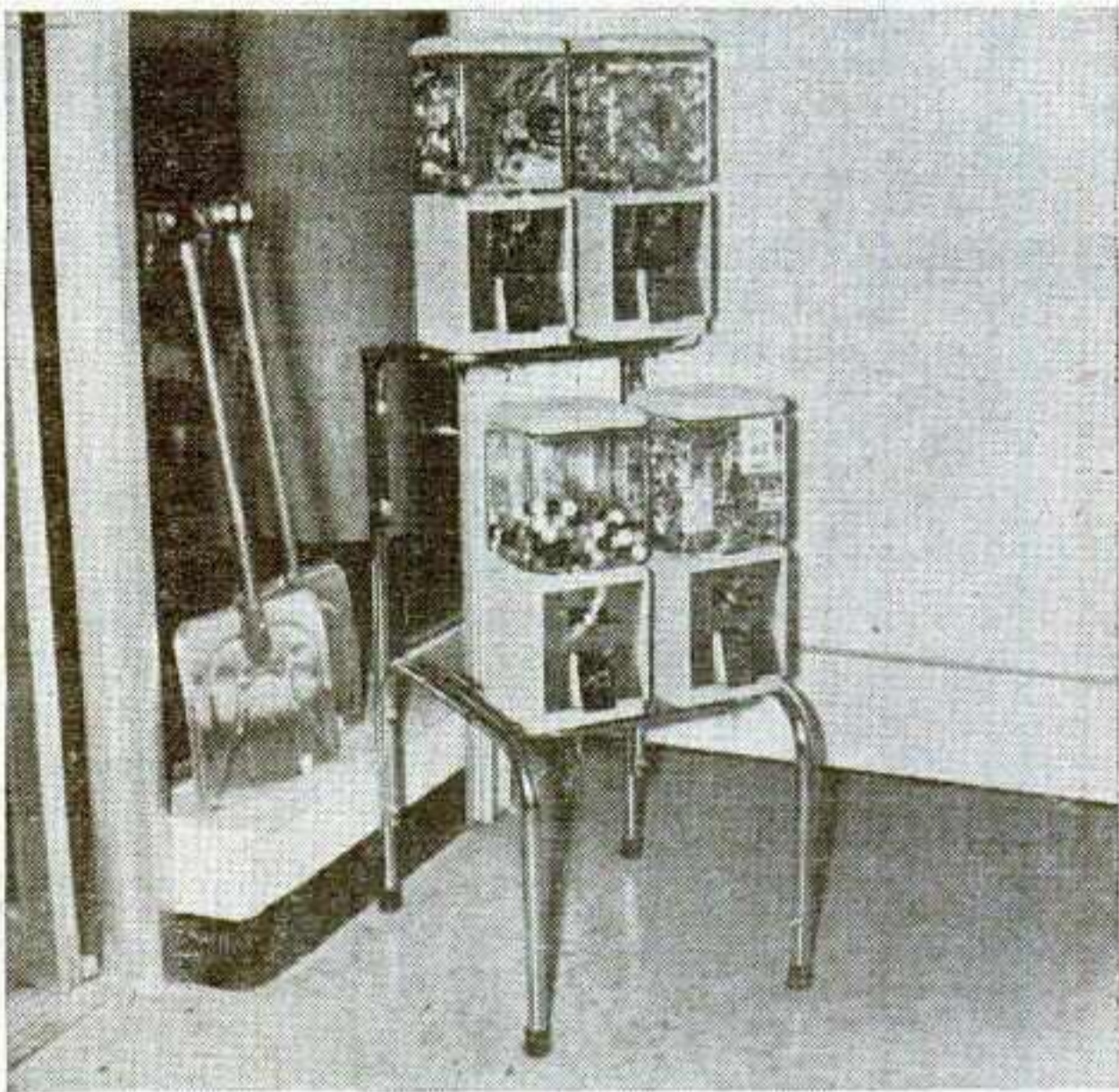
With large numbers of new toy stores and discount houses opening in the Colorado capital, Shannon has been quick to approach each owner or manager as soon as the

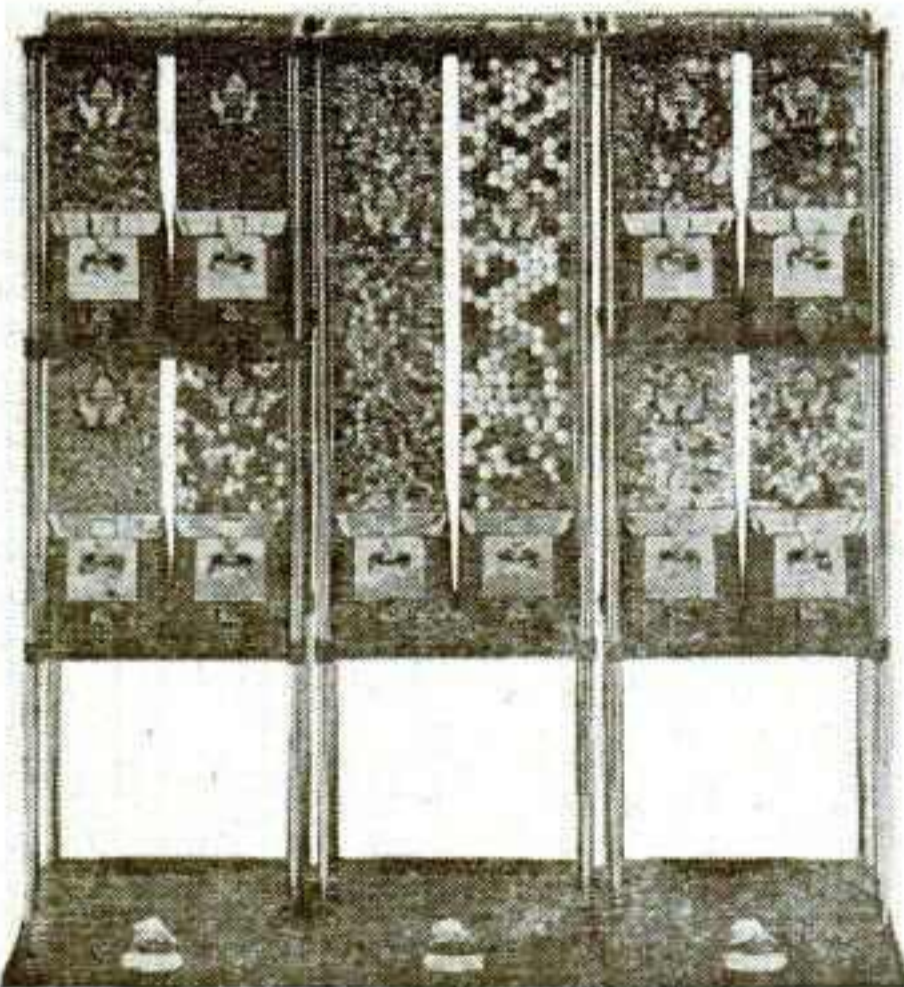

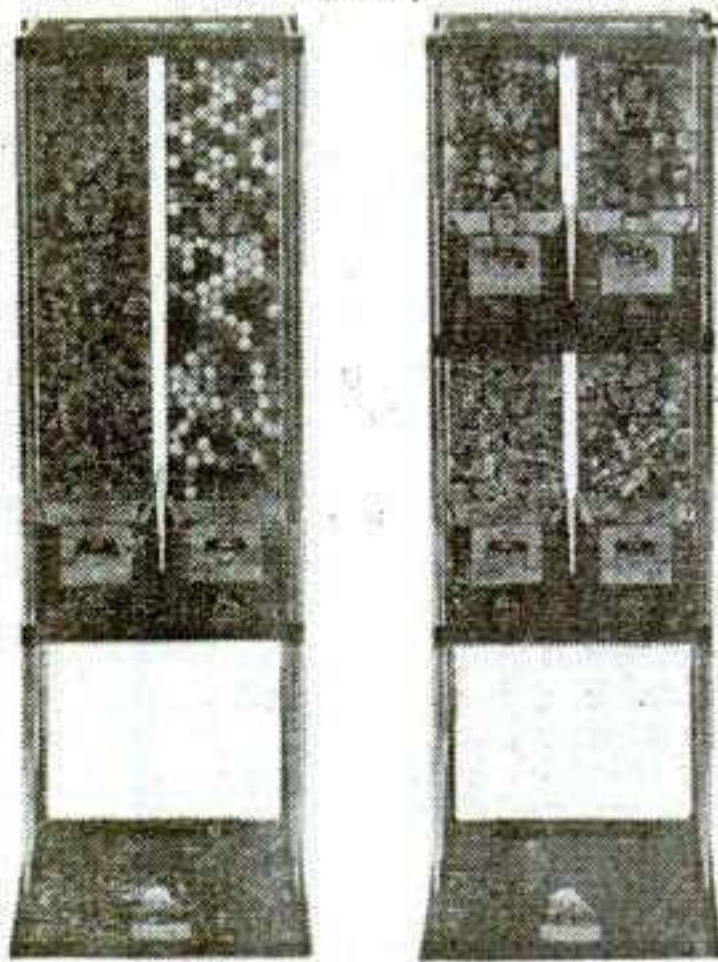

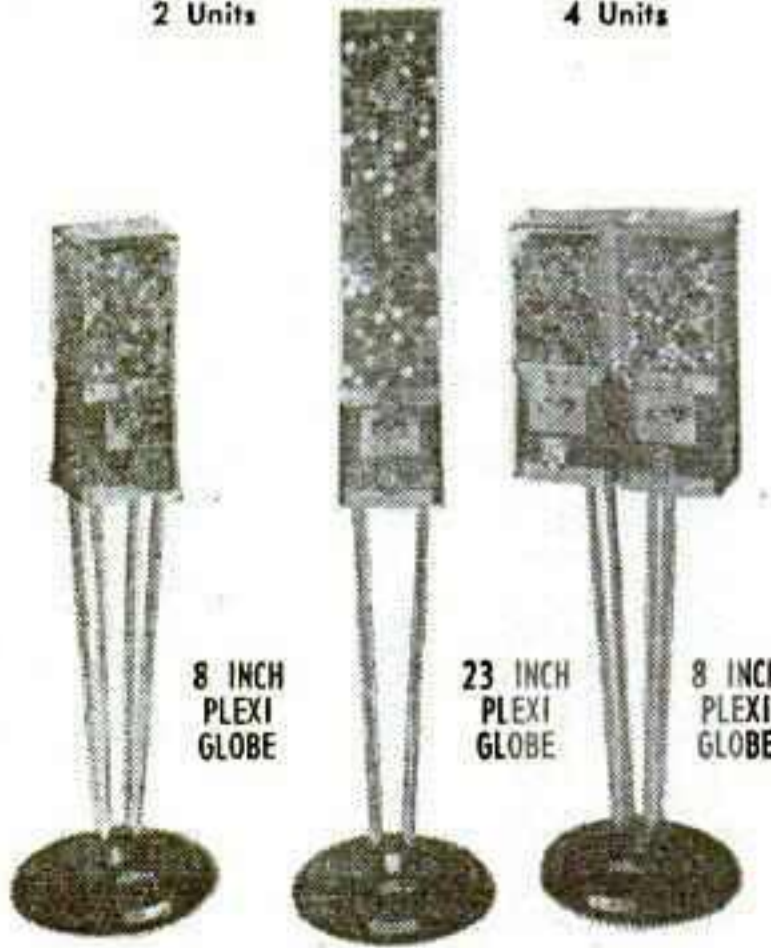

Tax Agents Swoop Down Again, Call Gum Machines 'Gambling'

POTTSVILLE, Pa.—The Internal Revenue Service has cracked down on penny gum ball machines in Schuylkill County, calling them gambling machines in some cases and demanding that operators buy a \$250 federal gambling stamp.

IRS agents said that the reason they classified some of the penny ball gum machines as gambling devices was that if the customer got a certain colored ball he won a phonograph record. This, said the IRS, is gambling.

Thomas F. Morgan, collection manager for the IRS in Schuylkill and Berks counties, said his men came across the outlaw penny ball machines while checking 65 locations in a mop-up operation following numerous raids searching for \$250 federal gambling stamp scofflaws.

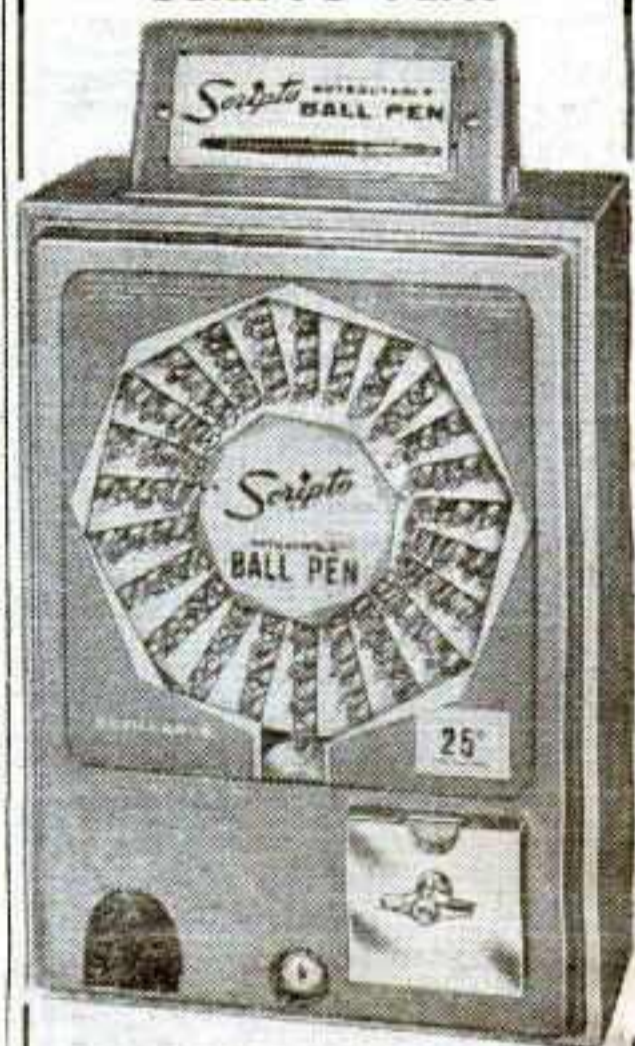
"Over some of these chewing gum machines in some stores were signs telling the kids if they got a ball of a certain color they would get a free rock and roll record," Morgan said.

He said the operators were told that they would have to buy the \$250 stamp and they replied that they would stop such operations. But Morgan told them it was too late since they had already been operating the machines for gambling purposes.

Schuylkill County has been the scene of many raids on gambling machines in recent years—especially one-armed slot machines.

It caused The Philadelphia Sunday Bulletin on July 29 to state editorially that it seems the Pennsylvania gambling laws do not apply to Schuylkill, just the 66 other counties in the Commonwealth.

ROME—Six men have been arrested by the Judicial Police organization of the carabinieri, charged with swindling 250 businessmen of a total of \$320,000 by failure to deliver popcorn and similar machines for which they signed contracts and collected payments of \$1,130 each.

They did business under the name of IATA, which stands for International Automatic Trade Association with headquarters in Via America 93.

Members of the group are charged with having made sales to bars, tobacco shops, dairies and groceries, but having failed to deliver. Each purchaser was promised that he would earn back the entire cost of the machine and upon doing so would receive a gift of a five-room co-operative apartment. It included prospective purchase of the "corn" from IATA.

In reporting the arrest, Rome's leading daily, Il Messaggero, described "popcorn" as "those disgusting oat flakes introduced in Italy by the Allied Forces along with chewing gum." No date has been set for a hearing of the charges.

parents. Second, parents who don't buy toys gladly seize upon bulk vendors which vend charms and novelties as the ideal way to pacify a youngster, without investing in more expensive toys.

For that reason, Shannon uses the multiple-head set-up pictured at the new Holly Toy Store in the big Alameda shopping center in West Denver. As shown, this location features a 10-cent capsule venter offering rubber spiders, alligators and bugs, along with more staple novelties, a 5-cent machine with more of the same in smaller sizes, plus a penny ball gum machine and a penny unit.

Youngsters whose parents were not able to buy a toy which attracted the toddler can usually get the child smiling again by selecting something from the 5-cent or 10-cent machines and allowing the youngster to drop the coin and operate the pull handle.

Adult Patronage

"Surprisingly, a lot of adults want to vend themselves novelty items as well," said the store's

manager. "We have plenty of sales to adults in everything from ball gum to 10-cent charms, probably because they are in a spending mood when they come into the store, and because there is a heavy emphasis on novelties which men, in particular, seem to appreciate."

Shannon does a complete rejuvenation job on each bulk venter which goes into a toy store. Those in the photo, for example, are mounted on chromium legs, and each machine has been refinished in dull-finish hammerloid paint, which covers evenly, presents a tough, durable surface, not likely to be damaged by customers running into it with shopping carts. It also presents a smooth, clean uniform appearance which appeals to parents and children alike.

Capsules Sell

At the time this photograph was made, the machine had been in place only a few days, but had sold three-quarters of its ball gum stock, while 5-cent and 10-cent capsules were moving more swiftly than the penny variety.

Bugs, wiggleworms, Texas boots, cowboy and Indian picture scenes, tiny picture frames and novelty charms were selling as rapidly at this new independent Denver toy store as at any location in Shannon's big Denver string.

The operation will be called Automatic Sales, Inc., Springfield, with William R. Hagman assuming the presidency. Other officers will be William E. Dawson, vice-president and general manager; William R. Hagman Jr., secretary, and C. E. Duncan, treasurer.

The firm will operate cigaret, candy and coffee machines throughout South Central Missouri.

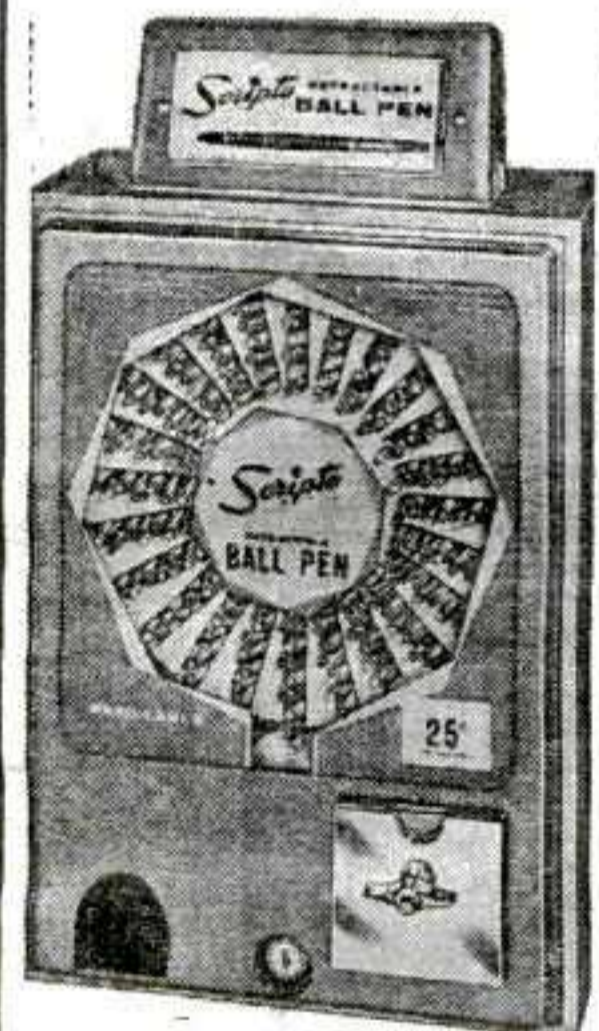

Bulk Ops on Coast Elect Phil Sreden

LOS ANGELES—Veteran bulk operator Phil Sreden has been elected president of the Western Vending Machine Operators Association. He succeeds Daniel F. Lally, who has held the post for the past two and a half years.

Leo Weiner, a past president of several terms, was named secretary, and Lee Davis, treasurer, at the Nikabob Restaurant dinner meeting.

Before the election, which had been postponed for several meetings, the largest turnout in recent months heard Eugene Zola discuss his work in seeking retail licenses for bulk operators or a reduction in taxes for machines.

Zola, who followed a lengthy discourse on licenses given by Davis, reported that Santa Monica now has a combined flat fee license and machine assessment. The rate is \$20 for up to 50 machines and 25 cents for each machine above that figure. Redondo Beach

retains its per machine schedule with \$2 for penny, nickel and dime machines.

Zola said that he was conferring with the officials at Manhattan Beach, where penny and nickel machines are charged \$3 each per year plus 25 cents for a decal. He is hopeful, he added, of obtaining a schedule of \$1 for penny machines.

The matter of the \$6 for each machine a year at Buena Park has been taken under advisement, Zola said.

Herb Goldstein of Operators Vending Machine Supply Company and Oak Manufacturing Company said that a "war chest" had been placed at the Operators company for contributions to further the fight against what operators say are unfair licenses. The firm has made at least two sizable contributions to the vendors' campaign.

The group voted to meet August 28.

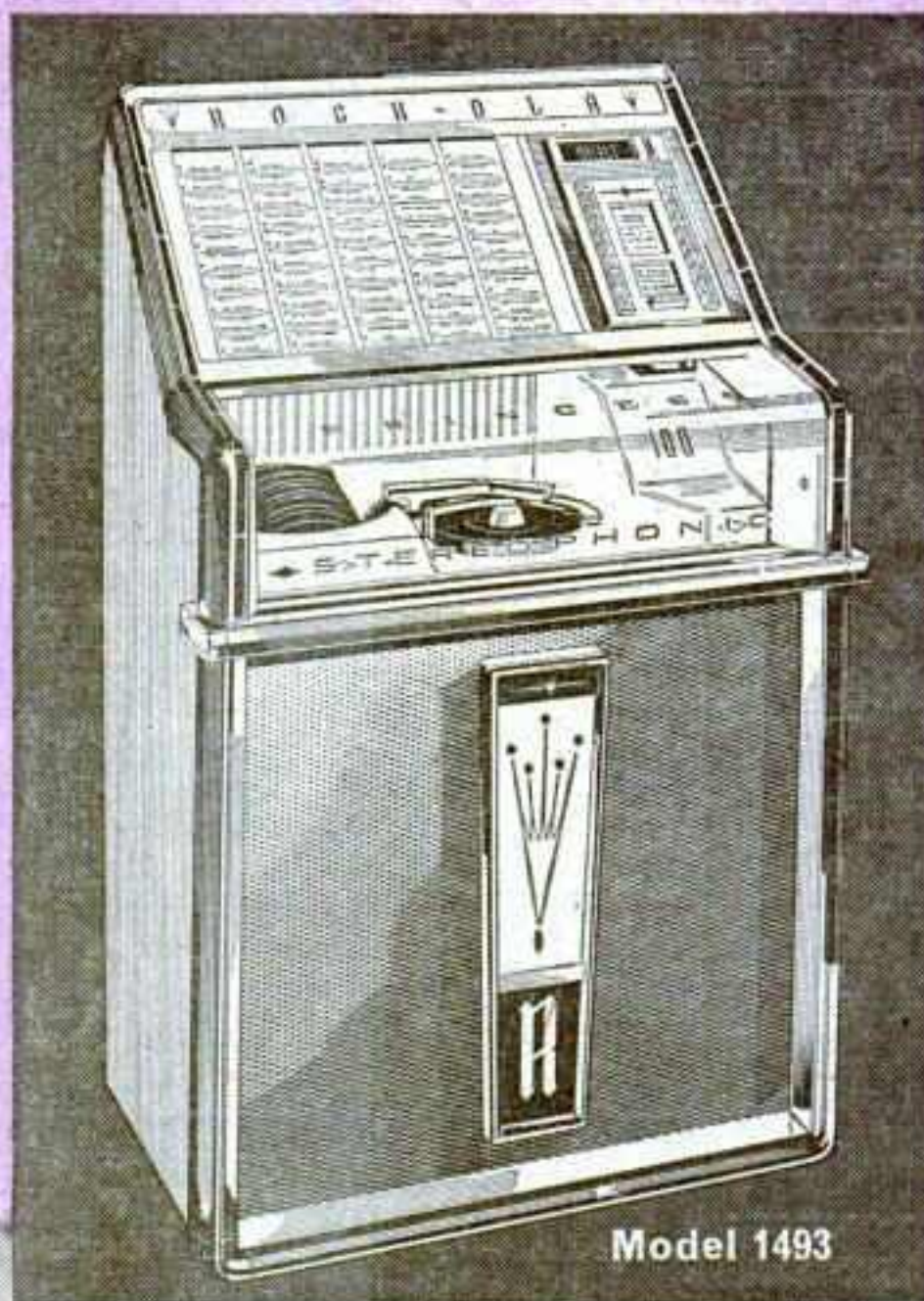
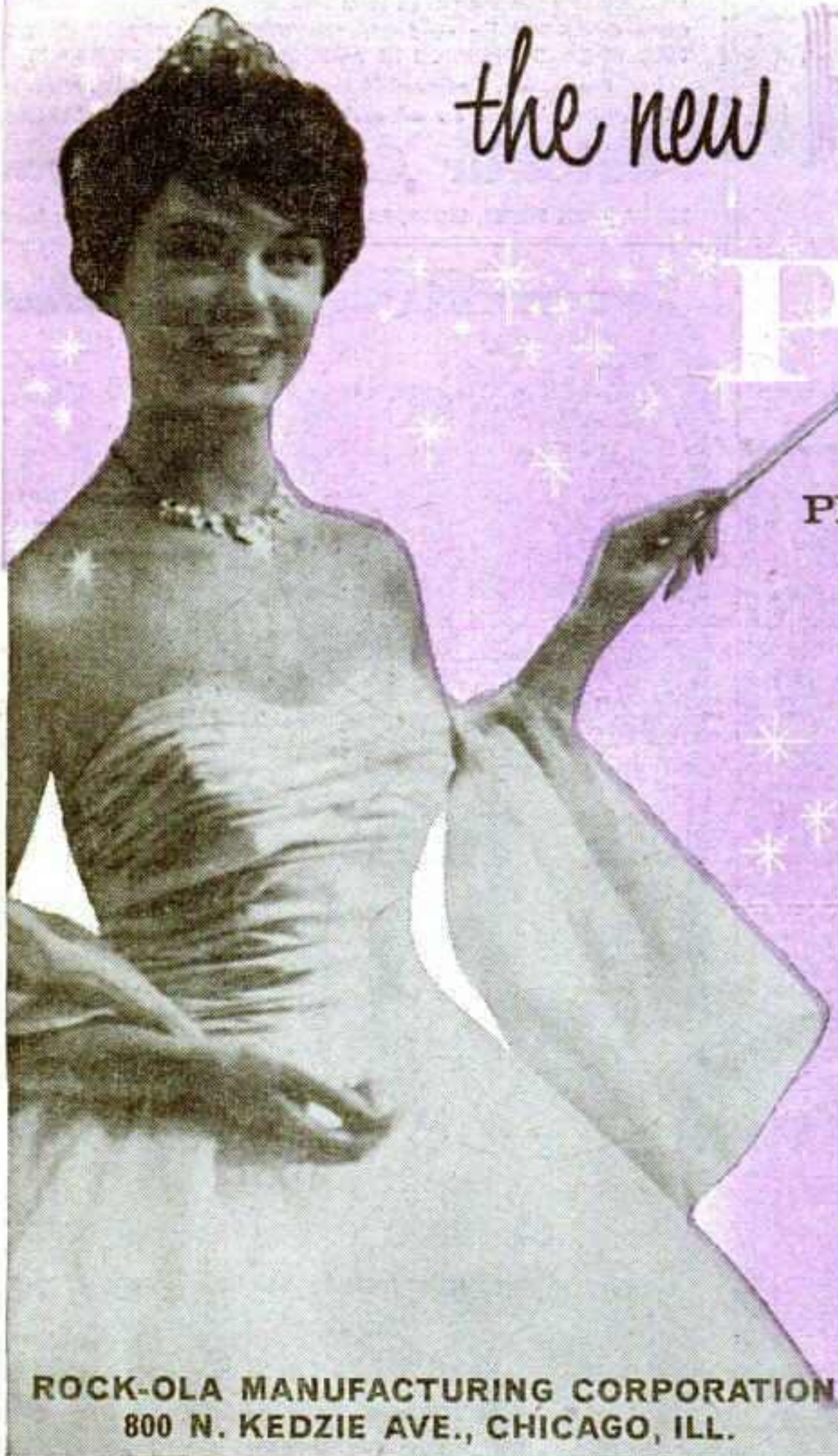
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Tailored Background Music Can Lead Small Phono Op Into Uncharted Fields

CHICAGO—Background music can and will be tailored to enable its profitable exploitation by the average juke box operator.

That is the opinion and promise of Dean R. McMurdie, executive vice-president of Rowe A. C. Services.

"We are doing all that we can to encourage phonograph operators to get into this field," McMurdie said. "We are prepared to help them in every way we can—with financing, with training. Background music and juke box operations have much in common. The man equipped to handle juke boxes is certainly qualified to cope with the problems connected with background music."

The impression that background music is beyond the means or capacity of the small juke box operator is inaccurate, McMurdie said.

"He will succeed with background music if he can find the time to sell it or someone with the ability to sell it for him," he said. "The effort at salesmanship is of great importance. For in attempting to sell background music, the operator or his salesman will meet people of high caliber occupying positions of some importance."

The operator will encounter great initial advantages with background music, he said. Most new businesses today anticipate its use and make provisions for it. Moreover, the country's expand-

ing economy will continue to assure new and even greater opportunities, according to McMurdie.

Many places, now barred to him, would be opened to the juke box man if his operations included background music, McMurdie pointed out.

He would be in a position to provide atmosphere music for the cocktail lounge, the beauty salon, the fashionable restaurant, the private club—now off limits to him.

Other Locations

His commercial library—recorded by medium-sized orchestral groups in medium tempo—could give him a foothold in offices, banks, stores, lobbies and transportation terminals.

Then there is the production library—the lively rhythms emphasizing brass, wood wind and percussion sections—programmed specifically for industrial plants, amusement parks, shopping centers and sports arenas.

To be ready for distribution in September, the new Customusic Programaster would prove to be particularly appropriate for a joint operation with juke boxes, McMurdie said.

Cartridge Tape

The equipment plays from endless tapes contained in six enclosed dust-tight cartridges. It plays more than 60 hours without repetition.

Customusic provides music in any combination of five-minute increments—5 on, 5 off; 10 on, five off; 15 on, 10 off; 20 on, 20 off. The system may be timed to operate mornings, afternoons or evenings or any combination thereof during a 24-hour period over any duration.

Customusic is a compact 38 pounds, measuring only 13 3/4 inches wide by 11 1/8 inches high by 13 3/4 inches deep.

"Many, many juke box operators, particularly in the secondary urban centers, handle background music—and do so profitably," McMurdie said. "We would like to see the participation of many, many more of them. And I think we will—difficult as it may be to change a man into a business where there isn't a chute."

Ops Pay 400G For Chi Permits

CHICAGO — Chicago operators have poured more than \$400,000 into the city's treasury in fees for game and juke box licenses during the first seven months of 1962.

The automatic amusement section of the municipal license department reported Tuesday (31) that it has issued 16,695 \$25 licenses since January 1. Of these, 9,007 were for phonographs and 7,688 for games.

As of last week, the license fees yielded a total of \$417,375.

Chi Amusement Park Business Hums Merrily, Weather or No

CHICAGO — Fourteen weekend days of rain notwithstanding, Herb Tekip, arcade manager of Chicago's vast Riverview Amusement Park, finds it difficult to complain about the summer's business.

"It's good," he reports. "It's better than last summer."

Even the downpours—which invariably came on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays—have helped, he says.

"When it starts to come down, people run for shelter," he pointed out. "And they couldn't miss our indoor establishment."

Tekip speaks with unrestrained concern about the lack of new equipment. Business would be even better if the manufacturers would produce something new, he said. And he'd be ready to buy if they would do so.

"The equipment problem is a serious one," he complains. "There is nothing new. And that hurts everybody. I am rebuying equipment I sold five years ago at three times the price I received for it."

What he has, however, is "going fine," he reports.

July was up something like 10 per cent over the July of 1961. It has dipped a little in recent days, but it's still all right.

"The rifles are going well this year—just as last year," he says.

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Budapest Arcade Surprising Success As First Year May Return Entire Nut

Budapest's Gay Park arcade was the subject of a special report in *BMW*, March 24. Now in full swing since May 1, it is given another look by *BMW's* Hungarian correspondent, Paul Gyongy.—Ed.

BUDAPEST—The city's plush, new Gay Park arcade is a big success here with teenagers as well as adults, so successful, in fact, that the amusement park management is thinking in terms of adding even more coin-operated games next year, if the park's space problem can be solved.

Complete installation of the 15 used coin-operated games, including purchase, custom, freight, alteration and mounting amounted to around 250,000 forint or \$11,250. The uniform prize for each play is 2 forint or 9 cents.

Up to now, the minimum collections have been:

on weekdays, 1,200 forint or \$54; on Saturdays, 2,000 forint or \$90, and on Sundays, 4,000 forint or \$180.

As the park is open from May 1 to September 30, the receipts which might be expected during the season are: 131 weekdays per \$54 is \$7,074; 22 Saturdays at \$90 is \$1,980 and 22 Sundays at \$180 each is \$3,960.

The estimated season's gross is around \$13,000. It is an amazing thing to the management that the equipment, including operation and maintenance, might be paid for in a single season.

The success of the Arcade is attracting the attention of the State Guest Trade Organizations and the Innercommercial lending enterprise—up till now the only operator in places where equipment is not the property of the location, leading to possible changes in Hungarian coin machine operating methods.

Outlook Shifting on Store Kiddie Rides

CHICAGO—Reports to the Chicago-based Super Market Institute suggests the desirability of a change from the conventional commission arrangement between the

operators of kiddie rides and the big-store location owner.

The dime-a-ride toll is frequently proving impractical for both the operator and the store, a chain executive has advised the Institute. Children, he observed, demand a second and a third ride. Mothers then tend to leave them at home, where that is possible, or deny them the use of the facilities when they do bring them.

Thus, a flat rental deal is preferable to the commission contract, the executive found.

"In order to make it a success we found that we would have to operate it strictly as a customer service with very little or no cost to the customer," he said. "We got together with the operator and worked out a plan whereby we would rent the horse outright for \$40 a month.

"Then we were able to operate it as we saw fit. We were not able to provide the ride as free entertainment, as we were afraid one child might occupy it indefinitely. But we have established the very popular price of 1-cent a ride. Now the children are able to ride to their heart's content at nominal cost. Also, the token charge not only helps to keep the children taking turns, but over a period of a month the 1-cent a ride amounts to about \$65.

"Such equipment should be placed in the front of the store so that the children are easily accessible to both the entrance and the exit. This is to enable the customer to leave the children in the ride area when they enter and to pick them up when they leave."

Libio John Barsotti, Memphis Operator, Dies Suddenly at 49

MEMPHIS—Libio John Barsotti, Memphis cigaret vending operator, died recently of a heart attack. He was 49.

He was a partner with his father, O. J. Barsotti, and brother, Louis Barsotti, in O. J. Barsotti & Company, large vending operation, and in Tennessee Tobacco Company, wholesale tobacco house.

Barsotti was active in the Memphis Music Association and served on the committee of coin machine men which met with city officials and convinced them that 2-cent-a-pack city tax on cigarets was unwise. The city at that time, almost two-years ago, already had a 1-cent tax and was planning an increase to 2 cents.

Barsotti's widow, Mrs. Genevieve Thompson Barsotti, and children will keep his interest in the firms, which will continue under management of Barsotti's father and brother.

Barsotti was a member of Knights of Columbus, Colonial Country Club, Memphis Athletic Club and the Italian Society.

In addition to his widow, father and brother, he leaves two sons, one daughter, two stepchildren and three grandchildren.

Dynamic Named Borg-Warner Austria Distrib

NEW YORK—Borg-Warner has named Dynamic Vending Corporation distributor for its line of coin-operated laundry and drycleaning equipment in Austria and Luxembourg, opening the door for the first distribution of such equipment in the two countries.

The appointment is a follow-up to Dynamic's establishing similar Borg-Warner equipment centers in West Berlin, Frankfurt, Mainz and several other West German cities.

Last February Dynamic installed the first such center in West Berlin and has opened new installations regularly since then.

Detective Paid Off, Bingo Slapped Down

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Calif.—Police began a crackdown on bingo games here last week following an illegal payoff made to a plainclothes officer by a location owner.

Coincidentally, the machine the officer played to win his payoff was a legal novelty-type pinball game. The location did, however, have two bingo-type games on location. All three were confiscated.

Gildart Jamail Associate

SAN ANTONIO — A recent story naming Santone Sales here as Rowe-AMI phonograph distributors, listed Louis N. Jamail as head of the firm. Actually, Santone is under the joint leadership of Jamail and his associate, Malcolm Gildart.

Lets Patron Call Own Juke Box Shots

DENVER—Giving customers a chance to ask for specific records has helped to increase play consistently, according to Tony Lucero, suburban operator here.

Lucero hit on this idea when he found that very few location owners, particularly in restaurants and bars, were conversant with their own customers' musical tastes.

This gave Lucero the idea of surveying the location customers with the most simple, direct idea possible. He bought a variety of bright pink scratch pads from a local stationery store, glued the back of each to a stiff cardboard, which was then Scotch-taped to the glass in the center front of the juke box.

Above, using a speed-ball pen and India ink, Lucero printed, "Tell us what record you'd like to hear." No other copy was used, but waitresses and bartenders would take the trouble to explain that the juke box operator wanted to give his

patrons all the co-operation possible in the matter of making up the music menu.

Though Lucero confesses that there were a lot of amateur humorists who scribbled bawdy suggestions on the scratch pad, just about as many people took the trouble to list their actual favorites, often scribbling in two or three favorites as shown by the handwriting.

More important, whenever a requested record was placed on the spindle, it was obvious that it got immediate play. In fact, every special request of this kind usually showed from two and a half to three times as much play as standard hits.

Lucero's assessment of the result proved to him that wherever a regular customer, who spends much of his spare time in the same bar, will take the trouble to ask for specific music he is usually serious about it. And he will reciprocate for the extra trouble operator has taken by playing the record every time he comes in.

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EUROPEAN NEWS BRIEFS

Monaco Looks Kindly on Coin Patents

MONTE CARLO—Monaco is expanding its patent registration service, and Monegasque authorities announce that registration of coin machine patents is being solicited along with general patents. Monte Carlo's patent office, established as a government institution, will issue certified documents of ownership within 24 hours of deposit for a per-item fee of \$10. The Monte Carlo patent registration bureau is affiliated with the international Patent Union. Legal priority of registration here will be recognized by all members of the Copyright Union. Anyone anywhere can avail themselves of the Monte Carlo patent registration, whose 24-hour service compares with six months or longer in most other countries. The patent bureau is one of the inducements to international business that Prince Rainier has established in Monaco.

Japan Lifts Phono Import Rules

BONN—Japanese trade officials here report that the Japanese government has rescinded all restrictions on the importation of juke boxes and that foreign exchange is available for phonograph imports. However, Japanese officials here predict that Japanese firms will undertake licensed production of West German and U. S. machines, rather than import equipment from abroad. Japanese operators are reported by the Embassy here to be particularly interested in the production of wall box machines, because of congestion in most Japanese locations. A Japanese coin machine mission is scheduled to visit West Germany this autumn to discuss production licensing possibilities with German concerns.

News Hooks Hype to Old Tunes

VIENNA—Austrian juke box operators report spectacular results from the posting of "What's new" cards on juke boxes. The advertising trailers are designed to call the patron's attention to new records just placed in the box or disks which for one reason or another suddenly have assumed special interest. The placards, eye-catching in vivid colors and with artistic borders, serve to "personalize" the juke box to its patrons. For example, some alert Viennese operators have hit the jackpot in recent weeks by restocking "Mustafa" and linking it through machine placards with the Algerian turbulence, "Mutafa" being the unofficial song of the Algerian FLN Liberation army. Consistent plugging of new and special disks has boosted collections here as high as 25 per cent above average.

Hope Note: Tshombe Digs Juke Boxes

BRUSSELS—Moise Tshombe's Katanga government has emerged as a friend of the phonograph, according to trade sources here. Tshombe's officials are authorizing the unrestricted importation of juke boxes, and the Katanga government is giving phonographs preferential tax treatment. Tshombe frequently visits, plays juke boxes on visits to Elizabethville cafes and snack bars. Thirty-five phonographs have been shipped to Katanga so far this year despite the political trouble in the Congo. Trade sources here believe Katanga, once peace is restored to the Congo and if Tshombe stays in power, could develop into an important African juke box market.

Disk Snatching Laws Puzzle Ops

MUNICH—German operators are requesting police to post "ground rules" for the seizure of phonograph records. Bavarian operators complain that disk confiscation presently is a mysterious procedure dictated by whim and happenstance. Three disks have been confiscated recently amid hot operator controversy—"Adele"; "Oh, Johnny, Hier Nicht Parken," and "Das Wirtshaus an der Lahn." Operators contend that open censorship is preferable to the present situation, which exposes operators to the risk of substantial pecuniary loss from disk confiscation. Operators protest that even more damaging than the monetary loss is the tarnishing of their reputations as "purveyors of smut." Yet, some of the records seized contained no openly offensive passages, it is claimed.

Ask Franco to Act in Royalty Fee Fight

MADRID—Spanish phonograph operators have directed an appeal to Generalissimo Francisco Franco against the hiking of copyright fees by Spain's ASCAP counterpart organization, Sociedad General de Autores de Espana (SOGAE). SOGAE has ignored operator protests against the royalty fee hike. Now the operators are turning directly to Franco, who, in the wake of the disastrous miner strike, is essaying the role of the "impartial arbiter of social peace," with no dispute too big or too small for El Caudillo's personal attention. The appeal to Franco is being handled by an operator committee made up of veterans of the Spanish Civil War who fought with Franco's Nationalist forces.

Drive Stepped Up Against Payouts

FRANKFURT—Anti-payout machine agitation in West Germany is becoming increasingly effective, according to a trade survey. As a result of the drumfire anti-payout propaganda, the

federal States and local authorities are steadily increasing taxes and license fees. Furthermore, local areas are stepping up efforts to discourage patronage of payouts, justifying such discrimination on youth protection and protection of the "Lohnleute," the worker's paycheck. Payouts have declined by 50,000 in West Germany over the last three years in response to the hostile

propaganda, according to trade surveys. This is a cutback of roughly 25 per cent of the payouts in this country at the peak of their popularity.

Seek Op Image: Pillar of French Life

PARIS—France's operator association, Federation des Professionnels de l'Automatique (F.F.P.A.), is mounting a public relations campaign which will picture the coin machine operator as a pillar of the community. The press and local officials are to be the focus of the F.F.P.A.'s "know your neighbor—the coin machine operator" drive. The PR effort aims at depicting the operator as hardly less a pillar of French life than the French farmer, a frugal, industrious, civic-minded businessman. The operator is pictured as stringently law-abiding and the unremittingly foe of juvenile delinquency and beatnik brawling.

Fishermen Float to Phono Strains

OSLO—The Norwegian fishing fleet is beginning installation of phonographs on trawlers to relieve the deep-sea tedium. Trawler crews finance the purchase of their own phonographs. Crew members deposit coins and the collections are used to amortize cost of the juke box and to pay for records. Surpluses are turned over to the trawler recreation fund. Compact boxes dominate, particularly wall models suited to cramped trawler accommodations. On long voyages the trawler's radio keeps the crew in tune with top tunes, which are ordered by radio and delivered with general stores for the trawler when it puts into port. When vessels spend long periods at the fishing grounds, records are delivered along with other supplies by special shipment.

Adult Fare Dominates German Play

HAMBURG—A full 85 per cent of German juke box music programming is now aimed at adults, according to a new trade survey. The survey shows there is virtually no twist on median box programming and very little jazz on rock and roll. The emphasis is on nostalgic music of the "sweet" variety. There is substantial programming of folk music, particularly in regional centers such as Bavaria. Chansons are enjoying a surge of popularity, and popular old U. S. favorites such as "Harbor Lights" are enjoying big success in current German juke box program-

Adjust 50-50 Split—Secore

CHICAGO — Economic conditions would justify a readjustment of the traditional 50-50 arrangement between operator and location in the opinion of Mort Secore, sales director of Chicago Dynamic Industries.

The commission retained by the location owner is excessive and, consequently, unfair to the operator, he said.

Reducing the split the operator leaves behind him would serve to strengthen the entire structure of the coin machine industry, Secore said.

Operator Key

"We cannot have a strong industry without strong operators," he said. "As manufacturers, therefore, we are justifiably concerned about the economic health and practices of the operator. The future of this industry depends on him."

Asked as to how a 50-50 understanding could be "renegotiated" by the operator without risking loss of the location, Secore replied:

"By a statement of facts. By the truth. By telling him that it is no longer feasible to operate under the old arrangement. By talking to him as one business man to another."

Cites Precedent

Similar obstacles were cleared, he recalled, in the nickel-to-dime phonograph switch. At first many operators felt that location resist-

ing. Gimmick tunes about the Berlin Wall and the East-West cold war find little response in Germany. The official of a music programming service, Horst Enders, remarked, "Our people play phonographs to relax and forget. They want to be reminded of the good old days and of happy times past—not the crazy present or possibly lethal future."

ance to the change would be insurmountable, he pointed out.

"But the change was made to the ultimate advantage of both the operator and the location owner," he said.

Secore is not among those who feel that the offer of new equipment, however novel and excellent,

would soften the location owner into accepting a cut.

"I believe that he must be sold on the facts of economics and nothing more," he said. "It may not be easy."
